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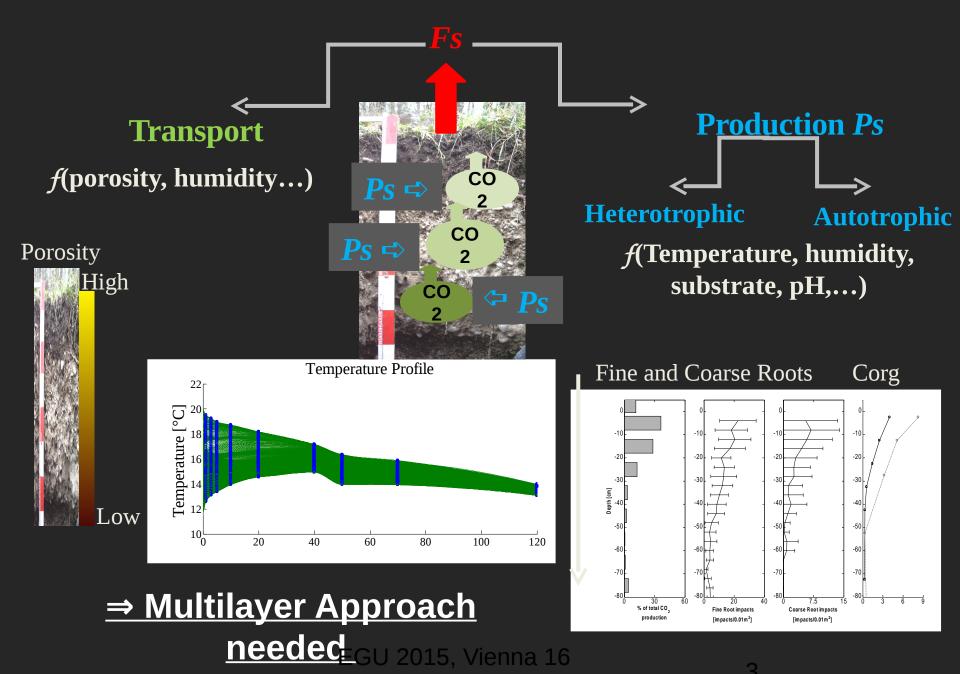

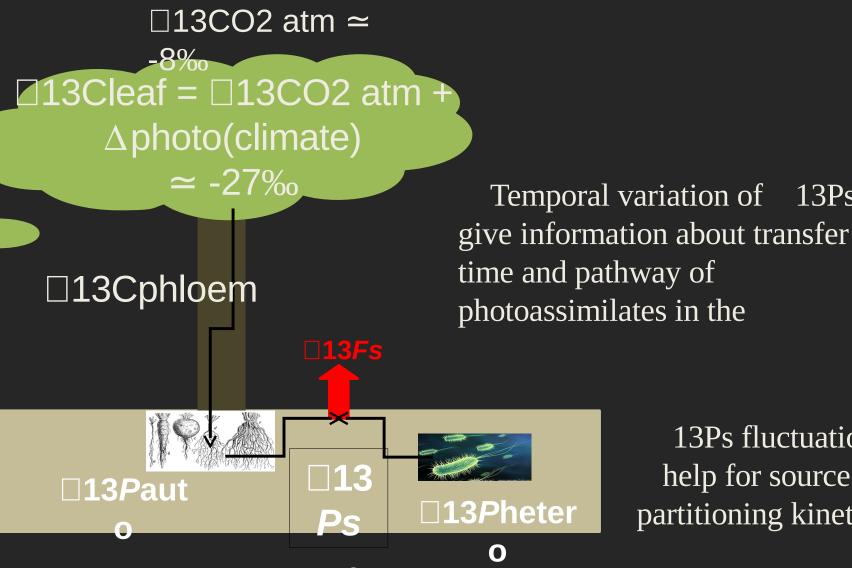

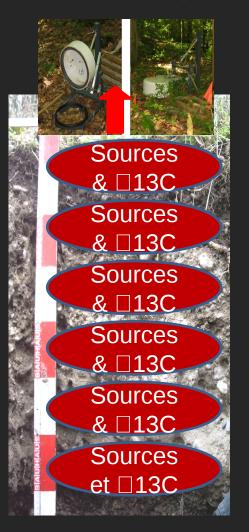
13Ps fluctuations help for source partitioning kinetic

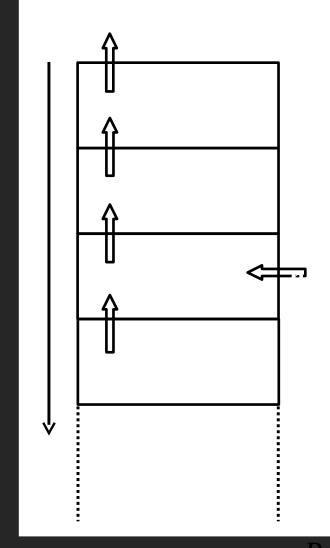

 Determine *Ps* and *13Ps* for the different soil horizons.
- Find factors affecting **Ps** & **13Ps** intra & inter 2) day fluctuations
- Evaluate by modeling what is the part of **Ps** in 3) the Fs temporal variability

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1. Determine Ps and δ13Ps for ≠ layers



12CO2 & 13CO2 mass balance for the nth

$$\frac{\log(\mathbf{E}_{n} * C_{n}^{12-13})}{\Delta t} = \frac{F_{n+1}^{12-13} - F_{n-1}^{12-13}}{thick_{n}} + Ps_{n}^{12-13}$$

· Diffusive Flux-Gradient approach :

$$F_{n+1/n} = D_{i+1/n}^{12-13} * \frac{C_{n+1}^{12-13} - C_{n}^{12-13}}{Z_{n+1} - Z_{n}}$$

$$= \left(D^{12-13} * \frac{\Delta C^{12-13}}{\Delta Z}\right)_{n+1/n}$$

$$Ps_{n}^{12-13} = \frac{\Delta(\varepsilon_{n} * C_{n}^{12-13})}{\Delta t} + \frac{\left(D * \frac{\Delta C}{\Delta z}\right)_{n+1/n}^{12-13} - \left(D * \frac{\Delta C}{\Delta z}\right)_{n/n-1}^{12-13}}{thick_{n}}$$

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Determination of ε , D and C:

Soil cores sampled along the vertical profile

Relationship $\varepsilon(SWC)$ and D(SWC) determined at the lab



The D(SWC) obtained is the D12(SWC) one, D13=1.0044*D12

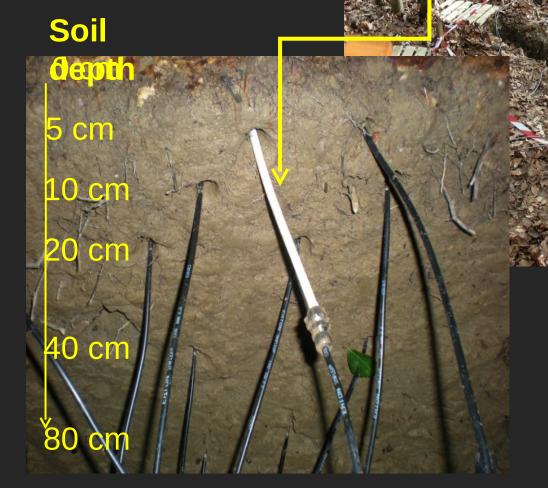

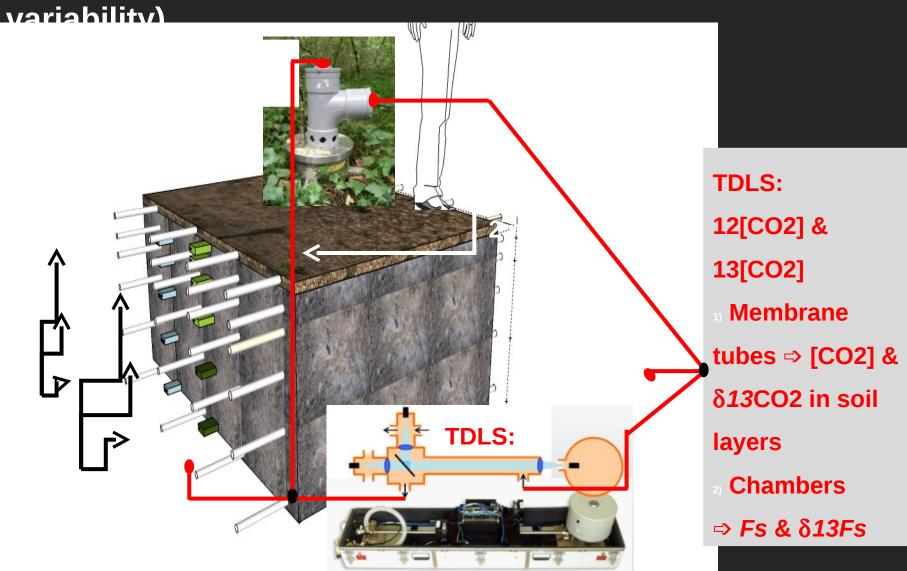

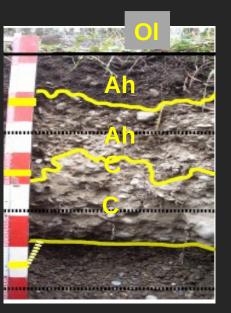


Hartheim experimental site

Humus type is mull (1-3 cm thick)



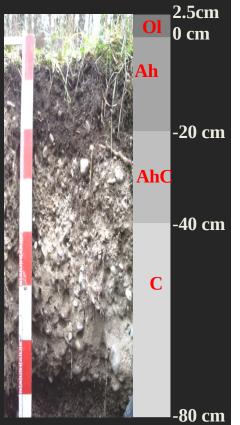


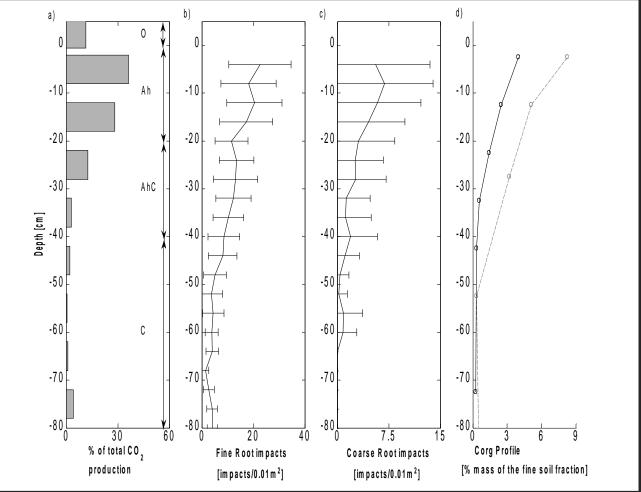

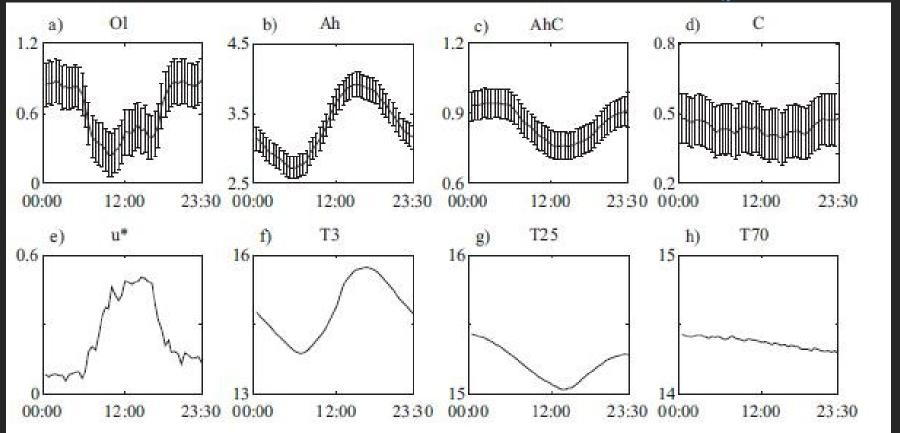

Intra-day Ps variability

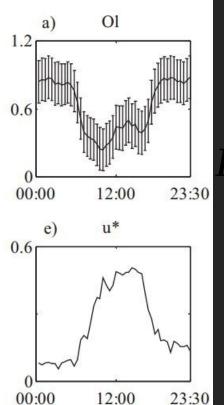
Ps mean diel evolution (μmol m-2 s-1)



Mean diel evolution of drivers

- Positively correlated to LOCAL T° in Ah & AhC
- Negatively correlated to u* in litter layer ???

² Factors affecting Ps and $\delta 13Ps$



Oh layer

- u* is the driver of advective and dipersive fluxes!
- ⇒ because of the total diffusive assumption

$$Ps_{computed} = Storage + Diffusion + Adv / Disp$$

$$Ps_{real} = Storage + Diffusion + Adv / Disp$$

$$\Rightarrow Ps_{computed} = Ps_{real} - Adv / Disp$$

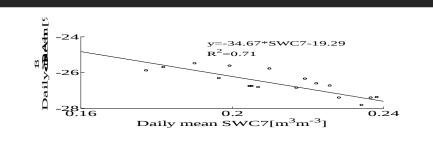
· Significant day to day variations in $\delta 13Ps$ of Ah (> 2.5%)

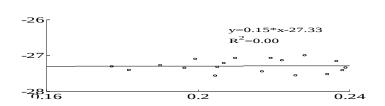

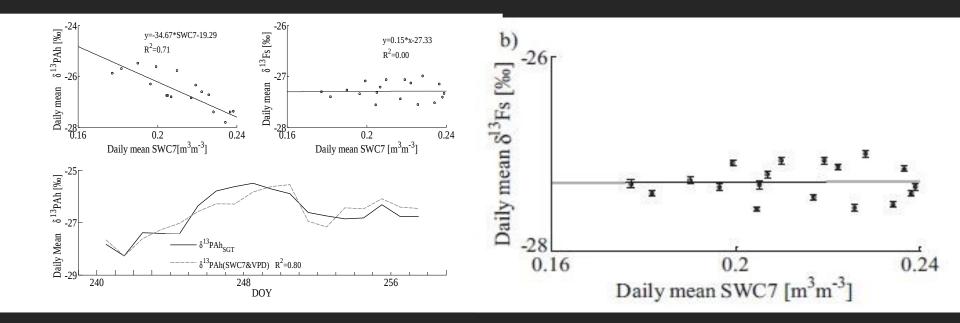

· Enrichment not observed in chamber efflux measurements

- o Mixing of ≠ layers contributions
- Perturbation of soil climate below the chambers ?

3. Who (transport or production) is responsible for Ps and $\delta 13Ps$ temporal variability?

(**Goffin et al. 2015**)

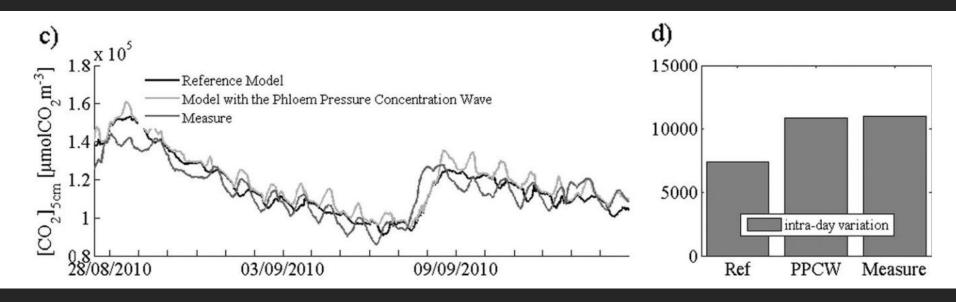
3 model versions simulating CO2 production and transport

- Reference model (RM):
 - **Psn** simulated with Q10 relationship using t° of the nth layer Diffusion is the only transport process
- Transport Version (TV):
 - Advection and dispersion are added to diffusion
- Production Version (PV):
 - In addition to T°, simulated production depend on VPD reflecting Phloem Pressure Concentration Wave (PPCW)

Comparison of RM, TV and PV outputs with soil [CO2] and Fs measurements

3. Who (transport or production) is responsible for Ps and $\delta 13Ps$ temporal variability?

RM: Relatively good reproduction of the general trend but intraday variability too low and not in phase



- No significant improvement with TV
- PPCW : Not perfect but diurnal fluctuations are better reproduced and difference in phase is reduced

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→ Working on production description before transport is a better option to improve soil CO2 model

Key points

- · Set up of an experimental *in-situ* device to obtain vertical profile of $\textbf{\textit{Ps}}$ and $\delta \textbf{\textit{Ps}}$
- · Identify a dependence of horizons to their own temperature
- · Observe enrichment of **Ps** with soil drought in Ah horizon

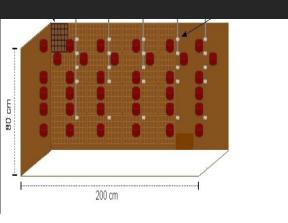
 Soil CO2 model should develop production description before transport to simulate hourly/daily variability

Undisturbed soil cores of 200cm3 collected in each horizon

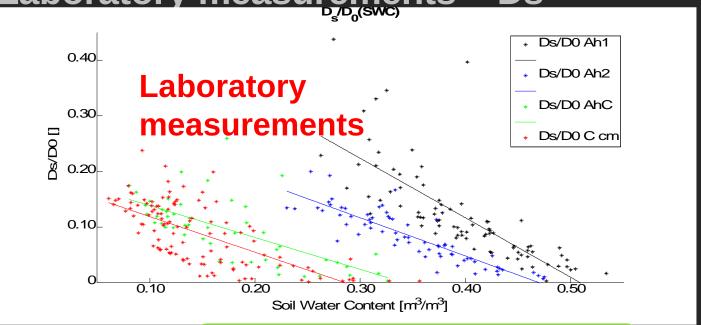


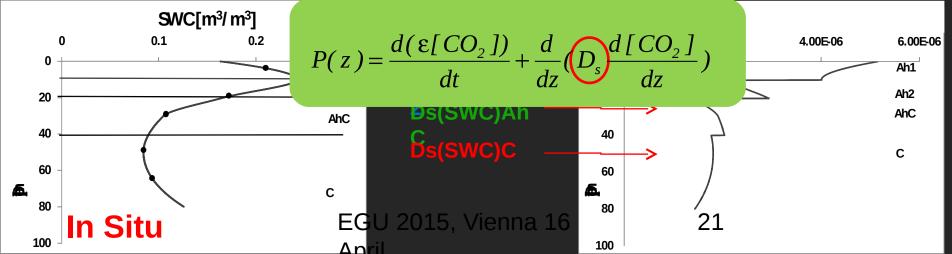
- Soil horizon specific physical parameters :

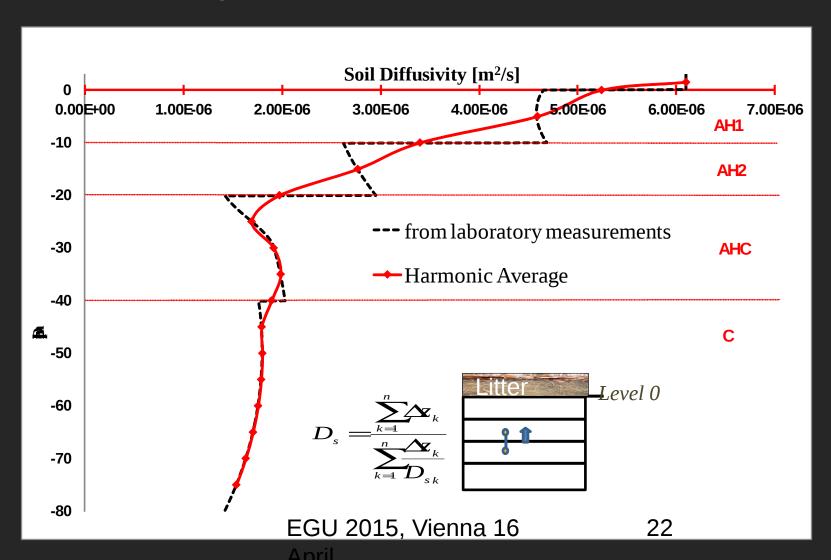

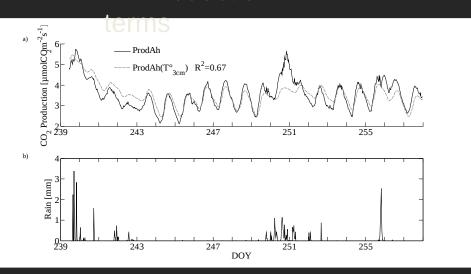

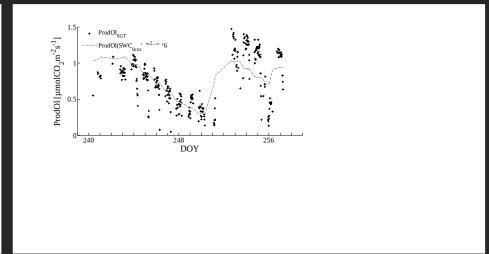

<u>sources</u> Ah Production



Litter Production terms



- · Soil production shows clear diel and daily fluctuations in **Ah**
- The diel and daily fluctuations are best explained by the T measured in the topsoil temperature is the most important driver of soil CO2 production

'Unlike other horizons, Ol production was best explained by surface soil water content (SWC) (R2=0.46)
