The model: ideal, blurred and sampled lines

Reconstruction steps

- Derive an optimization problem from the framework of atomic norm and solve it with primal-dual algorithm
- Recovering the line parameters by a Prony-like method

Problem formulation



$$x^{\sharp}: (t_1, t_2) \in \mathbb{P} \mapsto \alpha \delta \big(\cos(\theta) t_1 + \sin(\theta) t_2 - \gamma \big)$$

Caratheodory theorem

Toeplitz Operator:

$$\|\ell_{n_2}^{\sharp}\|_{\mathcal{A}} = \inf\left\{\sum_k c'_k : \ell_{n_2}^{\sharp} = \sum_k c'_k a(f'_k, \phi'_k)\right\} = \sum_{k=1}^{K} c_k$$

$$t_m^{\sharp} = \hat{x}^{\sharp}[m, :] = \sum_{k=1}^K c_k a(f_{m,k}, \phi_{m,k})^T \qquad c_k e^{j\phi_{m,k}} \in \mathbb{C}$$
$$\|t_m^{\sharp}\|_{\mathcal{A}} = \inf\left\{\sum_k c'_k : t_m^{\sharp} = \sum_k c'_k a(f'_k, \phi'_k)\right\} \leqslant \sum_{k=1}^K c_k$$

Caratheodory theorem. A vector x of length N

Atomic norm via a semidefinite program

[Bhaskar et al.,2013]

Proposition. The atomic norm $||x||_{\mathcal{A}}$ can be characterized by the following semidefinite program: $||x||_{\mathcal{A}} = \min_{q \in \mathbb{C}^N} \left\{ q_0 : \underbrace{\begin{bmatrix} \mathbf{T}_N(q) & x \\ x^* & q_0 \end{bmatrix}}_{\mathbf{T}'_N(x,q)} \succcurlyeq 0 \right\}.$

$$\|t_m^{\sharp}\|_{\mathcal{A}} = \min_{q_m \in \mathbb{C}^N} \left\{ q_m[0] : \mathbf{T}'_{H_S}(t_m^{\sharp}, q_m) \succeq 0 \right\}.$$

Primal-dual algorithm

[Condat, A primal-dual splitting method for convex optimization involving Lipschitzian, proximable and linear composite terms, 2013]

condition:
$$\tau \sigma \left\| \mathbf{L} \right\|^2 = 1$$

Algorithm 1 Primal–dual splitting algorithm

Input: \hat{y} 1D FFT of the blurred and noisy data image y**Output:** \tilde{x} solution of the optimization problem

- 1: Initialize all primal and dual variables to zero
- 2: for n = 1 to Number of iterations do

3:
$$X_{n+1} = \operatorname{prox}_{\tau G}(X_n - \tau \sum_{i=0}^{N-1} L_i^* \xi_{i,n}),$$

4:
$$X_{n+1} = 2X_{n+1} - X_n$$

5: **for**
$$i = 0$$
 to $N - 1$ **do**

6:
$$\tilde{\xi}_{i,n+1} = \operatorname{prox}_{\sigma H_i^*}(\xi_{i,n} + \sigma L_i(2X_{n+1} - X_n)),$$

7: end for

8:
$$\xi_{i,n+1} = 2\tilde{\xi}_{i,n+1} - \xi_{i,n}$$

9: end for

converges toward a solution $(\tilde{X}, \tilde{\xi}_0, ..., \tilde{\xi}_{N-1})$ of the problem.

Deconvolution

Blur model

- Horizontal blur $\varphi_1 \in L^1([0, W))$ Discrete filterW periodic $g[n] = \varphi_1(n)$
- Bandlimited $c_m(\varphi_1) = 0$ for $|m| \ge (W+1)/2$ $\int_0^W \varphi_1 = 1$

Vertical blur $\varphi_2 \in L^1(\mathbb{R})$

A line characterization property

Application of the Prony method



- From m = 1, ..., M,

- 1) Compute $\tilde{f}_{m,k} = \arg(\bar{\xi}_{m,k})/(2\pi)$, where $(\xi_{m,k})_k$ are roots of the polynom $\sum_{k=0}^{K} h_{m,k} z^k$ with $\mathbf{h}_m = [h_{m,0}, \ldots, h_{m,K}]^T$ being the right singular vector of $\mathbf{T}_K(\hat{w}_m^*)$ with $I = \{0, \ldots, H_S - 1\}$. It corresponds to the singular value zero (the smallest value in practise).
- 2) Compute $\hat{\theta}_{m,k} = \arctan(W \hat{f}_{m,k}/m)$ from (15).
- 3) Form the matrix $\tilde{U}_m = [a(\tilde{f}_{m,1}) \cdots a(\tilde{f}_{m,K})]$, and compute $\tilde{\mathbf{d}}_m = [\tilde{d}_{m,1}, \dots, \tilde{d}_{m,K}]^T$ by solving the leastsquares linear system $U_m^H U_m \mathbf{d}_m = U_m^H \hat{w}_m^*$.
- 4) Compute $\tilde{c}_{m,k} = |\tilde{d}_{m,k}|$ and $\tilde{\alpha}_{m,k} = \tilde{c}_{m,k} \cos(\tilde{\theta}_{m,k})$.

5) Compute
$$\tilde{e}_{m,k} = d_{m,k}/|d_{m,k}|$$

- For k = 1, ..., K
 - 1) Compute the mean of all estimated angles $\tilde{\theta}_k = \frac{1}{M} \sum_{m=1}^{M} \tilde{\theta}_{m,k}$ and amplitudes $\tilde{\alpha}_k = \frac{1}{M} \sum_{m=1}^{M} \tilde{\alpha}_{m,k}$
 - 2) Compute the frequency $\tilde{\nu}_k$ as previously from $\mathbf{T}_K(\tilde{e}_k)$ with $\tilde{e}_k = (\tilde{e}_{m,k})_m$ and $I = \{-M, \dots, M\}$.
 - 3) Compute the horizontal offset $\tilde{\eta}_k = W \tilde{\nu}_k / (2\pi)$
