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# Analysis of the optimal linear system for multicarrier FTN communications [Sap Alexandre Marquet<sup>\*, †</sup>, Cyrille Siclet<sup>\*</sup> and Damien Roque<sup>†</sup>

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### . INTRODUCTION

Most of current communication systems repect the **Nyquist criterion** [1].  $\Rightarrow$  **Perfect symbol** reconstruction on perfect (noiseless) channel guaranteed.

#### **Overriding** this criterion is a way to **improve spectral efficiency**.

- $\Rightarrow$  Induces inter-pulse interference (IPI).
- $\Rightarrow$  **Perfect symbol** reconstruction on perfect channel **not guaranteed** anymore.

Denoting  $F_0$  the inter-carrier spacing and  $T_0$  the multicarrier symbol duration, a multicarrier FTN transmission arises when  $\rho = 1/(F_0T_0) > 1$ .

# 5. Empirical interference analysis

5.1. Cumulative distribution function (CDF)

Considering a transmission involving **IID bits** forming **QPSK symbols** over a **perfect noise-free channel**, and denoting  $F_{i,\rho}(x)$  the CDF of the interference for a density  $\rho$ , we have:

$$P_e(\rho) = 1 - F_{i,\rho} \left( \sqrt{1/(1-\rho)} \right).$$

#### 2. LINEAR SYSTEM INPUT-OUTPUT RELATION

One can write the equivalent complex baseband signal as:

$$s(t) = \sum_{(m,n)\in\mathbb{Z}^2} c_{m,n}g_{m,n}(t), \quad t\in\mathbb{R}$$

where  $c_{m,n}$  are the **IID symbols** to be emitted (variance  $\sigma_c^2$ ), and  $\mathbf{g} =$  $\{g_{m,n}\}_{(m,n)\in\mathbb{Z}^2}$  is a **Gabor family** with parameters  $F_0, T_0$  and generator g(t):

$$g_{m,n}(t) = g(t - nT_0)e^{j2\pi mF_0 t}.$$

The received signal r(t) is corrupted with a complex circular **Gaussian noise** z(t) whose bilateral power spectral density is  $2N_0$ :

$$r(t) = s(t) + z(t).$$

Considering a linear receiver using a family  $\check{\mathbf{g}} = \{\check{g}_{m,n}\}_{(m,n)\in\mathbb{Z}^2}$  for filtering at the receiver side, the estimated symbols are given by:

$$\hat{c}_{p,q} = \langle \check{g}_{p,q}, r \rangle, \quad \forall (p,q) \in \mathbb{Z}^2.$$

#### 3. INTERFERENCE AND NOISE ANALYSIS

#### Let us re-write (4) to highlight the interference and noise terms:

$$\hat{c}_{p,q} = \underbrace{c_{p,q} \langle \check{g}_{p,q}, g_{p,q} \rangle}_{\tilde{c}_{p,q}: \text{useful signal}} + \underbrace{\sum_{(m,n) \in \mathbb{Z}^2 \setminus \{(p,q)\}} c_{m,n} \langle \check{g}_{p,q}, g_{m,n} \rangle}_{i_{p,q}: \text{interference}} + \underbrace{\langle \check{g}_{p,q}, z \rangle}_{b_{p,q}: \text{noise}}.$$

We use the optimal linear receiver detailed in [2], this induces that  $\check{g} =$  $1/A_q g$  is a **tight frame**. In this case, we can write

- $E_s = \frac{A_g}{2\rho} \sigma_c^2$ : per-symbol energy, •  $\sigma_i^2 = (\rho - 1)\sigma_c^2$ : variance of the interference term,
- $\sigma_z^2 = \frac{\rho}{A_c} 2N_0$ : variance of the noise (after filtering),

and thus:

$$SINR = \frac{1}{\rho - 1 + \frac{N_0}{E_s}}.$$

Even though the **central limit theorem does not apply** here, simulations of part 6 show that **normality** of the interference may be used as an **approximation** depending on the value of  $\rho$ .

- K = 5000 symbols,
- M = 128 carriers,
- $E_b/N_0 = 20 \text{ dB},$

- 6.3. System with direct feedback equalization (DFE)

#### Parameters:

- K = 5000 symbols,
- M = 128 carriers,
- $\rho = 8/7$ ,
- QPSK constellation.

### 4. Error probability on AWGN CHANNEL

Considering **IID bits** forming **QPSK symbols** and a **Gaussian** distribution for both **noise and interference**, the error probability is:

$$P_e = Q\left(\sqrt{\text{SINR}}\right) = Q\left(\sqrt{\frac{1}{\rho - 1 + \frac{N_0}{E_s}}}\right),$$

with  $Q(\cdot)$  the complementary CDF of a standard normal distribution.

# 7. CONCLUSION

Non-linear structures are necessary to reach high densities. A particular attention on the PDF of the interference is required when using algorithms working with LLRs for high densities. DFE shows great performances besides its low-complexity.
