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DD Simulations

- Dislocations: line defects induced by radiations...
- Simulating elastic interactions in massive ensembles of dislocations in order to
 - study strain hardening,
 - better understand crystal placticity.
- Clear band channels in Zr alloys, Laurent Dupuy (CEA)

DD simulations

- Spatial Discretization: Dislocation line \rightarrow Segments
- Main loop:

 $\begin{array}{l} \textbf{Compute Forces} \rightarrow \textsf{Update Topology} \rightarrow \textsf{Handle Collisions} \\ \nwarrow \textsf{Output Statistics} \leftarrow \textsf{Refine Mesh} \swarrow \end{array}$

• Let $(\mathbf{b}, \mathbf{t}, L)$ characterize a target dislocation line $[\mathbf{x}^3 \mathbf{x}^4]$.



• The elastic force acting on \mathbf{x}^4 resulting from stress state σ

$$f_i^4 = \int_0^L \varepsilon_{ijk} \sigma_{jp}(x) b_p t_k \frac{x}{L} dx$$

• The internal elastic stress created by the network (\mathcal{C}') equals

$$\sigma_{ij}(\mathbf{x}) = C_{ijkl} \oint_{(\mathcal{C}')} \varepsilon_{lnh} C_{pqmn} G_{kp,q}(|\mathbf{x} - \mathbf{x'}|) b'_m t'_h dx$$

• The isotropic elastic Green's function reads as

$$G_{ij}(r) = \frac{1}{8\pi\mu} (\delta_{ij}r_{,pp} - \frac{1}{2(1-\nu)}r_{,ij})$$

where (μ, ν) are elastic constants and $r = |\mathbf{x} - \mathbf{x'}|$.

• Boundary Integral formulation involving fast decreasing and long-ranged interactions

- Direct computation $\mathcal{O}(n^2)$, where n = #segments
- Alternative: Fast Multipole Method (FMM)
 - Approx. *n*-body interactions in $\mathcal{O}(n)$ ops
 - Hierarchical partitionning (octree)
 - Balance nearfield and farfield



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Figure 3: Definition of FMM operators on a 1D tree structure.

Fast Multipole DD (FMDD)

- Nearfield interactions
 - Numerical integration **prohibitiv** as $r \searrow$ [Arsenlis et al., 2007]
 - Analytical formulae via non-singular theory [Cai et al., 2006]

$$r_a = \sqrt{r^2 + a^2}$$

- Farfield interactions (existing shemes)
 - Taylor expansions [Arsenlis et al., 2007]
 - Spherical Harmonics [Zhao et al., 2010] ...
 - Kernel specific and slow convergence (*w.r.t.* # modes)
 - Alternative: interpolation based FMM
 - Kernel independent
 - Black-Box FMM [Fong and Darve, 2009]
 - Optimizations, e.g., compression [Messner et al., 2012]

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Contributions to OptiDis code:

- Rely on **ScalFMM**, an open-source parallel FMM library.
 - Extend physical capabilities
 - Benefit from abstraction and parallelism
- Apply Black-Box FMM to DD:
 - Chebyshev polynomials: $\mathcal{O}(p^6)$ M2L and overall
 - Exact integration over segment
 - Extend bounding box
- However, no compression allowed
 - *k* is neither symmetric, nor homogeneous.
 - k has high dimension (10 with sym.)
- Implement faster scheme: UFMM
 - Lagrange interpolation
 - FFT acceleration: $\mathcal{O}(p^3)$ M2L, $\mathcal{O}(p^3 \log p)$ overall

Farfield approximation

• k: the interaction kernel

$$k_{ijk}(\mathbf{x},\mathbf{y})=r_{,ijk}$$

• $\tilde{\mathbf{k}}$: the order-*p* interpolant of \mathbf{k}

$$ilde{\mathsf{k}}(\mathsf{x},\mathsf{y}) = \sum_{|lpha| \leq

• Chebyshev interp.: Dense MVP $\mathcal{O}(p^6)$



Farfield approximation

• k: the interaction kernel

$$k_{ijk}(\mathbf{x},\mathbf{y}) = r_{,ijk}$$

• $\tilde{\mathbf{k}}$: the order-*p* interpolant of \mathbf{k}

$$\tilde{\mathsf{k}}(\mathsf{x},\mathsf{y}) = \sum_{|\alpha| \leq \rho} S(\bar{\mathsf{x}}_{\alpha},\mathsf{x}) \mathcal{F}^{-1} \left[\mathcal{F}(\mathsf{k}(\bar{\mathsf{x}}_{\alpha},\boldsymbol{0})) : \mathcal{F}(S(\bar{\mathsf{y}}_{\beta},\mathsf{y})) \right]$$

• Lagrange interp.: Circ. Embed. + FFT $\mathcal{O}(p^3 \log p)$



Farfield approximation

- approximation of the elastic stress field σ

$$\sigma_{ij}(\mathbf{x}) \approx \frac{\mu}{8\pi} (\tilde{\sigma}_{ij}^{A}(\mathbf{x}) + \tilde{\sigma}_{ji}^{A}(\mathbf{x}) + \frac{2}{1-\nu} (\tilde{\sigma}_{ij}^{B} - \delta_{ij}\tilde{\sigma}_{pp}^{B})(\mathbf{x}))$$

where

$$\tilde{\sigma}_{ij}^{A}(\mathbf{x}) = \sum_{|\alpha| \le p} S_{\alpha}(\mathbf{x}) \sum_{|\beta| \le p} k_{mpp}^{\alpha\beta} \varepsilon_{jmk} \oint_{(\mathcal{C}')} S_{\beta}(\mathbf{x}') b'_{k} t'_{i} dx'$$
$$\tilde{\sigma}_{ij}^{B}(\mathbf{x}) = \sum_{|\alpha| \le p} S_{\alpha}(\mathbf{x}) \sum_{|\beta| \le p} k_{ijm}^{\alpha\beta} \varepsilon_{nmk} \oint_{(\mathcal{C}')} S_{\beta}(\mathbf{x}') b'_{k} t'_{n} dx'$$

• Farfield force approximation (L2P)

$$ilde{f}_i^4 = \int_0^L ilde{\sigma}_{ij}(x) b_p t_k rac{x}{L} dx, \ orall i \in \{1,2,3\}$$

$$(\tilde{\sigma}_{ij}^A)$$
 $(\tilde{\sigma}_{ij}^B)$

(P2M) Aggregate segments contributions at interpolation nodes

$$\mathcal{M}_{ik}^{\beta} = \oint_{C} S_{\beta}(\mathbf{y}) b_{k} dy_{i}$$

(M2L) Transfer multipole to local expansion

$$\mathcal{L}_{ij}^{\alpha} = \sum_{|\beta| \le \ell} R_{,mpp}^{\alpha\beta} \varepsilon_{jmk} \mathcal{M}_{ik}^{\beta} \qquad \qquad \mathcal{L}_{ij}^{\alpha} = \sum_{|\beta| \le \ell} R_{,ijn}^{\alpha\beta} \varepsilon_{nmk} \mathcal{M}_{nk}^{\beta}$$

(L2P) Accumulate contributions at target points

$$ilde{\sigma}_{ij}(\mathbf{x}) = \sum_{|lpha| \leq \ell} \mathcal{S}_{lpha}(\mathbf{x}) \mathcal{L}_{ij}^{lpha}$$

Shifting derivatives: Formulation

• Let us consider the lower dimensionnal kernel

$$k_{ij}(\mathbf{x},\mathbf{y})=r_{,ij}=
abla_{x_i}
abla_{x_j}r$$

• $\tilde{\mathbf{k}}$: the order-*p* interpolant of \mathbf{k}

$$ilde{\mathsf{k}}(\mathsf{x},\mathsf{y}) = \sum_{|lpha| \leq
ho} S(ar{\mathsf{x}}_{lpha},\mathsf{x}) \sum_{|eta| \leq
ho} \mathsf{k}(ar{\mathsf{x}}_{lpha},ar{\mathsf{y}}_{eta}) S(ar{\mathsf{y}}_{eta},\mathsf{y})$$

• Trick (applies to many BIE formulations)

$$ilde{k}_{ijk}(\mathbf{x},\mathbf{y}) pprox
abla_{x_k} ilde{k}_{ij}(\mathbf{x},\mathbf{y}) = -
abla_{y_k} ilde{k}_{ij}(\mathbf{x},\mathbf{y})$$

• Thus, the new interpolation formula reads as

$$ilde{k}_{ijk}(\mathsf{x},\mathsf{y})pprox -\sum_{|mlpha|\le
ho} S(ar{\mathsf{x}}_{mlpha},\mathsf{x}) \sum_{|meta|\le

Shifting derivatives: Benefits

• Combine stress and energy farfields

$$\mathsf{E}((\mathcal{C})) = -\frac{\mu}{8\pi} \oint_{(\mathcal{C})} b_i dx_i \oint_{(\mathcal{C})} r_{,kk} b'_j dx'_j + \dots$$

- Theoretical memory requirements at M2L step:
 - Black-Box FMM $\mathcal{O}(p^6)$
 - Uniform FMM $O((2p-1)^3)$

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Artificial test cases: density of BCC loops



Figure 6: Density of d = 5e19 BCC loops with $\mathbf{b} = [111]$, diameter d = 100 and L = 20. The exact nodal force (left) and segment energy (right) is represented on the dislocation lines for each configuration.

Artificial test cases: 1 BCC loop per leaf



Figure 7: 1 BCC loops per leaf with $\mathbf{b} = [111]$, diameter d = 500 and $L = L_{min} + 1 = L_{max} - 1 = 100$. The exact nodal force (left) and segment energy (right) is represented on the dislocation lines for each configuration.

Accuracy: 1 BCC loop per leaf



Nodal forces module

Figure 8: Accuracy of the nodal forces (left) and energy (right) evaluation for different interpolation schemes with respect to the interpolation order.

Running time: 1 BCC loop per leaf

1 loop per leaf cell



Figure 9: Computational time required by nodal forces and energy evaluation for different interpolation schemes (p = 5) w.r.t. # segments.

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Conclusions:

- Efficient $\mathcal{O}(n)$ scheme for force & energy computation
- low computational cost: $\mathcal{O}(p^3)$ with $p \approx 5$
- low memory footprint: $\mathcal{O}(p^3)$
- Optimized: shifted derivative, homogeneity...
- Cache Aware Data Structure (Etcheverry's thesis)

Perspectives:

• Extend to anisotropic case [Aubry and Arsenlis, 2013]
