# $L^p$ -solution for BSDEs with jumps in the case p < 2

Corrections to the paper "BSDEs with monotone generator driven by Brownian and Poisson noises in a general filtration"

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In [8] we established existence and uniqueness of solutions of backward stochastic differential equations in  $L^p$  under a monotonicity condition on the generator and in a general filtration. There was a mistake in the case 1 . Here we give a corrected proof. Moreover the quasi-left continuity condition on the filtration is removed.

### Introduction

The aim of [8] was to establish existence and uniqueness of solutions to BSDE in a general filtration that supports a Brownian motion W and an independent Poisson random measure  $\pi$ . We considered the following multi-dimensional BSDE:

$$Y_t = \xi + \int_t^T f(s, Y_s, Z_s, \psi_s) ds - \int_t^T \int_{\mathcal{U}} \psi_s(u) \widetilde{\pi}(du, ds) - \int_t^T Z_s dW_s - \int_t^T dM_s.$$
 (1)

Let us recall briefly the setting. We consider a filtered probability space  $(\Omega, \mathcal{F}, \mathbb{P}, \mathbb{F} = (\mathcal{F}_t)_{t\geq 0})$ . The filtration is assumed to be complete and right continuous. We also assumed quasi-left continuity of the filtration. Nevertheless as mentioned in the introduction of [1] (see also Section 2.2 in [12]), this condition is unnecessary.

The generator f satisfies Conditions  $(\mathbf{H_{ex}})^1$  in [8], that is, f is Lipschitz continuous w.r.t. z and  $\psi$  and monotone w.r.t. y. On  $\xi$  and  $f_t^0 = f(t, 0, 0, 0)$ , we keep the integrability condition: for some p > 1

$$\mathbb{E}\left(|\xi|^p + \int_0^T |f(t,0,0,0)|^p dt\right) < +\infty.$$
(2)

Then the main results in [8] can be summarized as follows. Under Assumptions ( $\mathbf{H_{ex}}$ ) and (2), there exists a unique solution  $(Y, Z, \psi, M)$  in  $\mathcal{E}^p(0, T)$  to the BSDE (1) meaning that

$$\mathbb{E}\left[\sup_{t\in[0,T]}|Y_t|^p + \left(\int_0^T|Z_t|^2dt\right)^{p/2} + \left(\int_0^T\int_{\mathcal{U}}|\psi_s(u)|^2\mu(du)ds\right)^{p/2} + ([M]_T)^{p/2}\right] < +\infty.$$

The comparison principle holds for this BSDE. If  $p \ge 2$ , our results are true. But for 1 , as written in [8] the main difference is that for <math>p < 2 the compensator of a martingale does not control the predictable projection (see [10] for a counterexample). In the proof of Proposition 3 in [8], Equality (31) does not hold in general. A simple counterexample is  $Y_t = N_t - (T - t)$ ,  $Z_t = 0$ ,  $\psi_t(u) = \mathbf{1}_{u=1}$ ,  $\mu(du) = \delta_1(du)$ . Then

$$Y_t = N_t - (T - t) = N_T - 2 \int_t^T ds - \int_t^T \int_{\mathcal{U}} \psi_t(u) \widetilde{\pi}(du, ds).$$

Here the generator is  $f(t, y, z, \psi) = -2\psi(1)$ . In this case

$$\mathbb{E} \int_{0}^{T} \int_{\mathcal{U}} |\psi_{s}(u)|^{2} \left( |Y_{s-}|^{2} \vee |Y_{s-} + \psi_{s}(u)|^{2} \right)^{p/2-1} \mathbf{1}_{|Y_{s-}| \vee |Y_{s-} + \psi_{s}(u)| \neq 0} \mu(du) ds$$

$$= \mathbb{E} \int_{0}^{T} \left( |Y_{s-}|^{2} \vee |Y_{s-} + 1|^{2} \right)^{p/2-1} \mathbf{1}_{|Y_{s-}| \vee |Y_{s-} + 1| \neq 0} ds$$

where  $Y_{s-}$  is the left limit of Y at time s, and

$$\mathbb{E} \int_0^T \int_{\mathcal{U}} |\psi_s(u)|^2 |Y_s|^{p-2} \mathbf{1}_{|Y_s| \neq 0} \mu(du) ds = \mathbb{E} \int_0^T |Y_s|^{p-2} \mathbf{1}_{|Y_s| \neq 0} ds.$$

For  $1 , the second integral is strictly greater than the first one. In other words, if the generator does not depend on <math>\psi$ , our earlier proof in [8] is safe (see also [5] and [6]). But the dependance due to the generator cannot be controlled by the first integral if p < 2. Thereby Proposition 3, Theorem 2, Propositions 5 and 6 and Theorem 3 in [8] are not proved when p < 2. Here we present proofs for these results under strengthened assumptions.

A  $\psi$ -depending non trivial generator f can be found in [9] (see BSDE (3) in this paper). This example is coming from an optimal stochastic control problem. It follows from the proof of Corollary 1 in [9] that Condition ( $\mathbf{H_{comp}}$ ) is satisfied (see Section 3.1 below) and thus ( $\mathbf{H_{ex}}$ ) and ( $\mathbf{C}$ ) are satisfied as well (see Lemma 4 and the proof of Theorem 2). Many other examples can be found for example in [3], Part II (see among others BSDEs (9.30) or (11.13)).

# 1 Choice of a suitable function space for the Poisson integrand when p < 2

Recall briefly the notations of [8]. We consider a filtered probability space  $(\Omega, \mathcal{F}, \mathbb{P}, \mathbb{F} = (\mathcal{F}_t)_{t\geq 0})$ , the filtration being complete and right continuous. Without loss of generality we suppose that all semimartingales have right continuous paths with left limits and we assume that  $(\Omega, \mathcal{F}, \mathbb{P}, \mathbb{F} = (\mathcal{F}_t)_{t\geq 0})$  supports a k-dimensional Brownian motion W and a Poisson random measure  $\pi$  with intensity  $\mu(du)dt$  on the space  $\mathcal{U} \subset \mathbb{R}^m \setminus \{0\}$ . The measure  $\mu$  is  $\sigma$ -finite on  $\mathcal{U}$  such that

$$\int_{\mathcal{U}} (1 \wedge |u|^2) \mu(du) < +\infty.$$

The compensated Poisson random measure  $\widetilde{\pi}(du, dt) = \pi(du, dt) - \mu(du)dt$  is a martingale w.r.t. the filtration  $\mathbb{F}$ . Moreover we introduce the following notations.

•  $G_{loc}(\mu)$  is the set of predictable functions  $\psi$  on  $\widetilde{\Omega} = \Omega \times [0,T] \times \mathcal{U}$  such that for any  $t \geq 0$  a.s.

$$\int_0^t \int_{\mathcal{U}} (|\psi_s(u)|^2 \wedge |\psi_s(u)|) \mu(du) < +\infty.$$

- $\mathcal{M}_{loc}$  is the set of càdlàg local martingales orthogonal to W and  $\widetilde{\pi}$ .  $\mathcal{M}$  is the subspace of  $\mathcal{M}_{loc}$  of martingales.
- $\mathbb{D}^p(0,T)$  is the space of all adapted càdlàg processes X such that  $\mathbb{E}\left(\sup_{t\in[0,T]}|X_t|^p\right)<+\infty$ . For simplicity, we write  $X_*=\sup_{t\in[0,T]}|X_t|$  and  $X_*^{\beta,p}=\sup_{t\in[0,T]}e^{\beta t}|X_t|^p$ .
- $\mathbb{H}^p(0,T)$  is the subspace of all predictable processes X such that  $\mathbb{E}\left[\left(\int_0^T |X_t|^2 dt\right)^{p/2}\right] < +\infty$ .
- $\mathbb{M}^p(0,T)$  is the subspace of  $\mathcal{M}$  of all martingales such that  $\mathbb{E}\left[([M]_T)^{p/2}\right]<+\infty$ .
- $\mathbb{L}^p_{\pi}(0,T) = \mathbb{L}^p_{\pi}(\Omega \times (0,T) \times \mathcal{U})$  is the set of processes  $\psi \in G_{loc}(\mu)$  such that

$$\mathbb{E}\left[\left(\int_0^T \int_{\mathcal{U}} |\psi_s(u)|^2 \pi(du, ds)\right)^{p/2}\right] < +\infty.$$

•  $\mathbb{L}^p_{\mu} = \mathbb{L}^p(\mathcal{U}, \mu; \mathbb{R}^d)$  is the set of measurable functions  $\psi : \mathcal{U} \to \mathbb{R}^d$  such that  $\|\psi\|_{\mathbb{L}^p_{\mu}}^p = \int_{\mathcal{U}} |\psi(u)|^p \mu(du) < +\infty$ .

•  $\mathcal{E}^p(0,T) = \mathbb{D}^p(0,T) \times \mathbb{H}^p(0,T) \times \mathbb{L}^p_\pi(0,T) \times \mathbb{M}^p(0,T)$ .

Let  $\psi \in G_{loc}(\mu)$ . Let us recall known results on the (local) martingale N given by

$$N_t = \int_0^t \int_{\mathcal{U}} \psi_s(u) \widetilde{\pi}(du, ds), t \ge 0.$$
 (3)

It follows that the compensator is given by

$$[N]_t = \int_0^t \int_{\mathcal{U}} |\psi_s(u)|^2 \pi(du, ds).$$

For  $t \ge 0$  let

$$N_t^* = \sup_{r \in [0,t]} \left| \int_0^r \int_{\mathcal{U}} \psi_s(u) \widetilde{\pi}(du, ds) \right|.$$

Now let us define the following norm on  $\psi \in G_{loc}(\mu)$ : if  $\nu$  is the measure defined on  $\mathcal{U} \times [0,T]$  by  $\nu = \mu \otimes \text{Leb}$ , then

$$\|\psi\|_{\mathbb{L}^p(\mathbb{L}^2_\nu)+\mathbb{L}^p(\mathbb{L}^p_\nu)} = \inf_{\psi^1+\psi^2=\psi} \left\{ \left( \mathbb{E}\left[ \left( \int_0^T \int_{\mathcal{U}} |\psi^1_s(u)|^2 \mu(du) ds \right)^{p/2} \right] \right)^{1/p} + \left( \mathbb{E}\left[ \int_0^T \int_{\mathcal{U}} |\psi^2_s(u)|^p \mu(du) ds \right] \right)^{1/p} \right\}.$$

And for  $p \in [1, 2)$  and for a measurable function  $\phi$  defined on  $\mathcal{U}$ , we put

$$\|\phi\|_{\mathbb{L}^p_{\mu}+\mathbb{L}^2_{\mu}} = \inf_{\phi^1+\phi^2=\phi} \left( \|\phi^1\|_{\mathbb{L}^p_{\mu}} + \|\phi^2\|_{\mathbb{L}^2_{\mu}} \right).$$

With this norm we can define the Banach space  $\mathbb{L}^p_{\mu} + \mathbb{L}^2_{\mu}$  (for the definition of the sum of two Banach spaces, see for example [7]). By the same way we define  $\mathbb{L}^p_{\nu} + \mathbb{L}^2_{\nu}$ .

#### Lemma 1

• Burkholder-Davis-Gundy inequality: For all  $p \in [1, \infty)$  there exist two universal constants  $c_p$  and  $C_p$  (not depending on N) such that for any N defined by (3) and for any  $t \ge 0$ 

$$c_p \mathbb{E}\left(\left[N\right]_t^{p/2}\right) \le \mathbb{E}\left[\left(N_t^*\right)^p\right] \le C_p \mathbb{E}\left(\left[N\right]_t^{p/2}\right). \tag{4}$$

• Bichteler-Jacod inequality<sup>2</sup>: For  $p \in (1,2)$ , there exist two universal constants  $\kappa_p$  and  $K_p$  such that for any  $\psi \in G_{loc}(\mu)$ , if N is defined by (3)

$$\kappa_p \left[ \mathbb{E} \left( [N]_T^{p/2} \right) \right]^{1/p} \le \|\psi\|_{\mathbb{L}^p(\mathbb{L}^2_\nu) + \mathbb{L}^p(\mathbb{L}^p_\nu)} \le K_p \left[ \mathbb{E} \left( [N]_T^{p/2} \right) \right]^{1/p}. \tag{5}$$

**Proof.** The first inequality (4) is proved in [4], Proposition 3.66. The second result (5) can be found for example in [11], Theorem 1 and the following comments pages 297 and 298.

From the Bichteler-Jacod inequality (5) we deduce the next result.

**Lemma 2** For  $p \in (1,2)$ , there exists a universal constant  $K_{p,T}$  such that for any  $\psi \in G_{loc}(\mu)$  and N defined by (3)

$$\mathbb{E}\left[\int_0^T \|\psi_s\|_{\mathbb{L}^p_\mu + \mathbb{L}^2_\mu}^p ds\right] \le K_{p,T} \mathbb{E}\left([N]_T^{p/2}\right). \tag{6}$$

If a function  $\phi$  defined on  $[0,T] \times \mathcal{U}$  is in  $\mathbb{L}^1_{\nu} + \mathbb{L}^2_{\nu}$ , then

$$\int_{0}^{T} \|\phi_{s}\|_{\mathbb{L}^{1}_{\mu} + \mathbb{L}^{2}_{\mu}} ds \le (1 \vee \sqrt{T}) \|\phi\|_{\mathbb{L}^{1}_{\nu} + \mathbb{L}^{2}_{\nu}}.$$
(7)

**Proof.** Let  $\psi^1 \in \mathbb{L}^p(\mathbb{L}^2_\nu)$  and  $\psi^2 \in \mathbb{L}^p(\mathbb{L}^p_\nu)$  such that  $\psi = \psi^1 + \psi^2$ . By Jensen's inequality:

$$\mathbb{E}\left[\int_{0}^{T} \|\psi_{s}^{1}\|_{\mathbb{L}^{2}_{\mu}}^{p} ds\right] = \mathbb{E}\left[\int_{0}^{T} \left(\int_{\mathcal{U}} |\psi_{s}^{1}(u)|^{2} \mu(du)\right)^{p/2} ds\right]$$

$$\leq T^{1-\frac{p}{2}} \mathbb{E}\left[\left(\int_{0}^{T} \int_{\mathcal{U}} |\psi_{s}^{1}(u)|^{2} \mu(du) ds\right)^{p/2}\right] = T^{1-\frac{p}{2}} \|\psi^{1}\|_{\mathbb{L}^{p}(\mathbb{L}^{2}_{\nu})}^{p}.$$

and

$$\mathbb{E}\left[\int_{0}^{T} \|\psi_{s}^{2}\|_{\mathbb{L}^{p}_{\mu}}^{p} ds\right] = \mathbb{E}\left[\int_{0}^{T} \left(\int_{\mathcal{U}} |\psi_{s}^{2}(u)|^{p} \mu(du)\right) ds\right] = \|\psi^{2}\|_{\mathbb{L}^{p}(\mathbb{L}^{p}_{\nu})}^{p}$$

We deduce (6) directly from Bichteler-Jacod inequality (5).

For the second inequality, if  $\phi \in \mathbb{L}^1_{\nu} + \mathbb{L}^2_{\nu}$ , for any  $\varepsilon > 0$ , there are two functions  $\phi^1$  and  $\phi^2$  in  $\mathbb{L}^1_{\nu}$ , respectively in  $\mathbb{L}^2_{\nu}$  with  $\phi = \phi^1 + \phi^2$  and

$$\|\phi\|_{\mathbb{L}^1_{\nu}+\mathbb{L}^2_{\nu}} \leq \|\phi^1\|_{\mathbb{L}^1_{\nu}} + \|\phi^2\|_{\mathbb{L}^2_{\nu}} \leq \|\phi\|_{\mathbb{L}^1_{\nu}+\mathbb{L}^2_{\nu}} + \varepsilon.$$

Hence for almost any  $s \in [0, T]$ ,  $\phi_s^1$  (resp.  $\phi_s^2$ ) belongs to  $\mathbb{L}^1_{\mu}$  (resp.  $\mathbb{L}^2_{\mu}$ ) with  $\phi_s = \phi_s^1 + \phi_s^2$ . Thus by definition  $\|\phi_s\|_{\mathbb{L}^1_{\mu} + \mathbb{L}^2_{\mu}} \le \|\phi_s^1\|_{\mathbb{L}^1_{\mu}} + \|\phi_s^2\|_{\mathbb{L}^2_{\mu}}$ . We integrate this inequality between 0 and T and by Jensen's inequality

$$\int_{0}^{T} \|\phi_{s}\|_{\mathbb{L}^{1}_{\mu}+\mathbb{L}^{2}_{\mu}} ds \leq \int_{0}^{T} \|\phi_{s}^{1}\|_{\mathbb{L}^{1}_{\mu}} ds + \int_{0}^{T} \|\phi_{s}^{2}\|_{\mathbb{L}^{2}_{\mu}} ds 
\leq \|\phi^{1}\|_{\mathbb{L}^{1}_{\nu}} + \sqrt{T} \|\phi^{2}\|_{\mathbb{L}^{2}_{\nu}} \leq (1 \vee \sqrt{T}) (\|\phi^{1}\|_{\mathbb{L}^{1}_{\nu}} + \|\phi^{2}\|_{\mathbb{L}^{2}_{\nu}}) 
\leq (1 \vee \sqrt{T}) (\|\phi\|_{\mathbb{L}^{1}_{\nu}+\mathbb{L}^{2}_{\nu}} + \varepsilon).$$

Since these inequalities are true for any  $\varepsilon > 0$ , we deduce Estimate (7).

In particular (4) means that the martingale N is well-defined (see Chapter II in [4]) provided we can control [N] in  $\mathbb{L}^{p/2}(\Omega)$ . And from (6),  $\mathbb{P} \otimes \text{Leb-a.s.}$  on  $\Omega \times [0,T]$ ,  $\psi_t$  is in  $\mathbb{L}^p_\mu + \mathbb{L}^2_\mu$  if again we control [N] in  $\mathbb{L}^{p/2}(\Omega)$ . From Lemma 3 below,  $\psi_t$  is also in  $\mathbb{L}^1_\mu + \mathbb{L}^2_\mu$  and this implies that for any  $b \in (0,+\infty)$ 

$$\mathbb{E}\left[\int_0^T \int_{\mathcal{U}} \left( |\psi_s(u)|^2 \mathbf{1}_{|\psi_s(u)| \le b} + |\psi_s(u)| \mathbf{1}_{|\psi_s(u)| > b} \right) \mu(du) ds \right] < +\infty.$$

This last estimate can be also found in Proposition 3.68 of [4]<sup>3</sup> in a more general setting.

To illustrate and motivate our purpose, let us consider a stable Lévy process  $X=(X_t,\ 0\leq t\leq T)$ . The Lévy measure is  $\mu(du)=\frac{1}{|u|^{1+\alpha}}du$  where  $u\in\mathcal{U}=\mathbb{R}\setminus\{0\}$  and  $0<\alpha<2$ . Then by the Lévy-Khintchine decomposition:

$$X_{t} = \int_{0}^{t} \int_{\mathcal{U}} u \mathbf{1}_{|u|<1} \widetilde{\pi}(du, ds) + \int_{0}^{t} \int_{\mathcal{U}} u \mathbf{1}_{|u|\geq 1} \pi(du, ds)$$
$$= \int_{0}^{t} \int_{\mathcal{U}} u \widetilde{\pi}(du, ds) + t \int_{\mathcal{U}} u \mathbf{1}_{|u|\geq 1} \mu(du) = \int_{0}^{t} \int_{\mathcal{U}} u \widetilde{\pi}(du, ds).$$

Now  $X_T \in \mathbb{L}^p(\Omega)$  if and only if  $p < \alpha < 2$ . We take  $\xi = X_T, Y_t = X_t, \psi_t(u) = u$  and

$$Y_t = \xi - \int_t^T \int_{\mathcal{U}} u\widetilde{\pi}(du, ds).$$

For any  $t \in [0,T]$ ,  $p < \alpha$ ,  $Y_t$  is in  $\mathbb{L}^p(\Omega)$  and  $\psi_t \notin \mathbb{L}^2_\mu$ . Nevertheless for any  $\delta > 0$ ,  $\phi_t^1 = \psi_t \mathbf{1}_{|\psi_t| \le \delta}$  belongs to  $\mathbb{L}^2_\mu$  and  $\phi_t^2 = \psi_t \mathbf{1}_{|\psi_t| \ge \delta}$  to  $\mathbb{L}^p_\mu$ . Thus  $\psi_t$  is in  $\mathbb{L}^p_\mu + \mathbb{L}^2_\mu$ . And it is easy to check that  $\psi_t$  also belongs to  $\mathbb{L}^1_\mu + \mathbb{L}^2_\mu$ .

Conclusion and assumption on f: From now on, we assume that  $p \in (1,2)$ . Then we have to choose  $\psi$  in a suitable integrability space, namely  $\mathbb{L}^1_{\mu} + \mathbb{L}^2_{\mu}$ . From the next Lemma 3, this space contains all spaces  $\mathbb{L}^p_{\mu} + \mathbb{L}^2_{\mu}$ . Hence in the rest of the paper, our generator f satisfies Condition ( $\mathbf{H_{ex}}$ ):

(H1) For every  $t \in [0,T]$ ,  $z \in \mathbb{R}^{d \times k}$  and every  $\psi \in \mathbb{L}^1_\mu + \mathbb{L}^2_\mu$  the mapping  $y \in \mathbb{R}^d \mapsto f(t,y,z,\psi)$  is continuous. Moreover there exists a constant  $\alpha$  such that

$$\langle f(t, y, z, \psi) - f(t, y', z, \psi), y - y' \rangle \le \alpha |y - y'|^2$$

- (H2) For every r > 0 the mapping  $(\omega, t) \mapsto \sup_{|y| \le r} |f(t, y, 0, 0) f(t, 0, 0, 0)|$  belongs to  $L^1(\Omega \times [0, T], \mathbb{P} \otimes m)$ .
- (H3) There exists a constant K such that for any t and y, for any z, z' in  $\mathbb{R}^{d\times k}$  and  $\psi$ ,  $\psi'$  in  $\mathbb{L}^1_{\mu} + \mathbb{L}^2_{\mu}$

$$|f(t, y, z, \psi) - f(t, y, z', \psi')| \le K \left(|z - z'| + ||\psi - \psi'||_{\mathbb{L}^1_\mu + \mathbb{L}^2_\mu}\right).$$

Note that (H1) and (H2) coincide with assumptions (H1) and (H2) in [8], whereas (H3) above replaces the older condition (H3) in [8].

**Remark 1** Note that if  $p \geq 2$ , since  $\mathbb{L}^p_{\mu} + \mathbb{L}^2_{\mu} \subset \mathbb{L}^2_{\mu}$ , the generator f can be defined on the function set  $\mathbb{L}^2_{\mu}$ .

The next result will be used several times. Although it is quite simple we did not find a reference. The proof is postponed to the end of this paper.

**Lemma 3** Let  $p \in [1, \infty)$  and  $\phi : \mathcal{U} \to \mathbb{R}^d$  be a function in  $\mathbb{L}^p_{\mu} + \mathbb{L}^2_{\mu}$ . Then  $\|\phi\|_{\mathbb{L}^p_{\mu} + \mathbb{L}^2_{\mu}} < +\infty$  if and only if for any  $\delta > 0$  it holds that  $\phi \mathbf{1}_{|\phi| \le \delta} \in \mathbb{L}^2_{\mu}$  and  $\phi \mathbf{1}_{|\phi| > \delta} \in \mathbb{L}^p_{\mu}$ . Moreover it holds that  $\mathbb{L}^p_{\mu} + \mathbb{L}^2_{\mu} \subset \mathbb{L}^1_{\mu} + \mathbb{L}^2_{\mu}$ . The same results hold if  $\mu$  is replaced by  $\nu$ .

# 2 Complete proof for p < 2 of Proposition 3 and Theorem 2

We say that the Condition (C) holds if  $\mathbb{P}$ -a.s.

$$\langle \check{y}, f(t, y, z, \psi) \rangle \leq f_t + \alpha |y| + K|z| + K||\psi||_{\mathbb{L}^1_u + \mathbb{L}^2_u},$$

with  $K \geq 0$  and  $f_t$  is a non-negative progressively measurable process. Note that compared to [8], we change the norm on  $\psi$ . Recall that for  $y \in \mathbb{R}^d \setminus \{0\}$  we write  $\check{y} = \frac{1}{|y|} y$  and  $\check{0} = 0$ . Let us denote  $F = \int_0^T f_r dr$ .

**Proposition 3** Let the Condition (C) hold and let be  $(Y, Z, \psi, M) \in \mathcal{E}^p(0, T)$  be a solution of BSDE (1) and assume moreover that  $F^p$  is integrable. Then there exists a constant C depending on p, K and T such that

$$\mathbb{E}\left[\sup_{t\in[0,T]}|Y_t|^p + \left(\int_0^T|Z_t|^2dt\right)^{p/2} + ([M]_T)^{p/2} + \left(\int_0^T\int_{\mathcal{U}}|\psi_s(u)|^2\pi(du,ds)\right)^{p/2}\right] \leq C\mathbb{E}\left[|\xi|^p + \left(\int_0^Tf_rdr\right)^p\right].$$

A comment before the proof. If  $\psi \in \mathbb{L}^p_{\pi}$ , then Inequality (5) and Lemma 2 imply that  $\mathbb{P}$ -a.s.  $\psi \in \mathbb{L}^p_{\nu} + \mathbb{L}^2_{\nu}$  and from Lemma 3,  $\psi \in \mathbb{L}^1_{\nu} + \mathbb{L}^2_{\nu}$ . Hence the integrand  $\psi$  is in the required function space (see Condition (H3)).

#### Proof.

**Step 1:** We prove first that there exist two constants  $\beta$  (depending on K,  $\alpha$  and p) and  $\kappa_{p,\beta}$  such that

$$\mathbb{E} \int_{0}^{T} e^{\beta s} |Y_{s}|^{p-2} |Z_{s}|^{2} \mathbf{1}_{Y_{s}\neq 0} ds + \mathbb{E} \int_{0}^{T} e^{\beta s} |Y_{s-}|^{p-2} \mathbf{1}_{Y_{s-}\neq 0} d[M]_{s}^{c} 
+ \mathbb{E} \int_{0}^{T} \int_{\mathcal{U}} e^{\beta s} |\psi_{s}(u)|^{2} (|Y_{s-}|^{2} \vee |Y_{s-} + \psi_{s}(u)|^{2})^{p/2-1} \mathbf{1}_{|Y_{s-}|\vee|Y_{s-} + \psi_{s}(u)|\neq 0} \pi(du, ds) 
+ \mathbb{E} \sum_{0 < s \leq T} e^{\beta s} (|Y_{s-}|^{2} \vee |Y_{s-} + \Delta M_{s}|^{2})^{p/2-1} \mathbf{1}_{|Y_{s-}|\vee|Y_{s-} + \Delta M_{s}|\neq 0} |\Delta M_{s}|^{2} 
+ \mathbb{E} \int_{0}^{T} e^{\beta s} |Y_{s}|^{p} ds \leq \kappa_{p,\beta} \mathbb{E}(X).$$
(8)

where

$$X = e^{\beta T} |\xi|^p + p \int_0^T e^{\beta s} |Y_s|^{p-1} f_s ds.$$

In the following let c(p) = p(p-1)/2. For some constant  $\beta \in \mathbb{R}$ , we apply Itô's formula (see Corollary 1 in [8]) for  $\tau \in \mathcal{T}_T$  to  $e^{\beta t}|Y_t|^p$  to obtain

$$\begin{split} &e^{\beta(t\wedge\tau)}|Y_{t\wedge\tau}|^{p} + c(p)\int_{t\wedge\tau}^{\tau}e^{\beta s}|Y_{s}|^{p-2}|Z_{s}|^{2}\mathbf{1}_{Y_{s}\neq0}ds + c(p)\int_{t\wedge\tau}^{\tau}e^{\beta s}|Y_{s-}|^{p-2}\mathbf{1}_{Y_{s-}\neq0}d[M]_{s}^{c}\\ &\leq e^{\beta\tau}|Y_{\tau}|^{p} + p\int_{t\wedge\tau}^{\tau}e^{\beta s}|Y_{s-}|^{p-1}\check{Y}_{s-}f(s,Y_{s},Z_{s})ds - \beta\int_{t\wedge\tau}^{\tau}e^{\beta s}|Y_{s}|^{p}ds\\ &-p\int_{t\wedge\tau}^{\tau}e^{\beta s}|Y_{s-}|^{p-1}\check{Y}_{s-}Z_{s}dW_{s} - p\int_{t\wedge\tau}^{\tau}e^{\beta s}|Y_{s-}|^{p-1}\check{Y}_{s-}dM_{s}\\ &-p\int_{t\wedge\tau}^{\tau}e^{\beta s}|Y_{s-}|^{p-1}\check{Y}_{s-}\int_{\mathcal{U}}\psi_{s}(u)\widetilde{\pi}(du,ds)\\ &-\int_{t\wedge\tau}^{\tau}e^{\beta s}\int_{\mathcal{U}}\left[|Y_{s-}+\psi_{s}(u)|^{p}-|Y_{s-}|^{p}-p|Y_{s-}|^{p-1}\check{Y}_{s-}\psi_{s}(u)\right]\pi(du,ds)\\ &-\sum_{t\wedge\tau< s\leq\tau}e^{\beta s}\left[|Y_{s-}+\Delta M_{s}|^{p}-|Y_{s-}|^{p}-p|Y_{s-}|^{p-1}\check{Y}_{s-}\Delta M_{s}\right]. \end{split}$$

With Condition (C) this becomes

$$\begin{split} &e^{\beta(t\wedge\tau)}|Y_{t\wedge\tau}|^{p}+c(p)\int_{t\wedge\tau}^{\tau}e^{\beta s}|Y_{s}|^{p-2}|Z_{s}|^{2}\mathbf{1}_{Y_{s}\neq0}ds+c(p)\int_{t\wedge\tau}^{\tau}e^{\beta s}|Y_{s-}|^{p-2}\mathbf{1}_{Y_{s-}\neq0}d[M]_{s}^{c}\\ &\leq e^{\beta\tau}|Y_{\tau}|^{p}+\int_{t\wedge\tau}^{\tau}e^{\beta s}\left(p|Y_{s}|^{p-1}f_{s}+(p\alpha-\beta)|Y_{s}|^{p}\right)ds+pK\int_{t\wedge\tau}^{\tau}e^{\beta s}|Y_{s}|^{p-1}|Z_{s}|ds\\ &+pK\int_{t\wedge\tau}^{\tau}e^{\beta s}|Y_{s-}|^{p-1}\|\psi_{s}\|_{\mathbb{L}^{1}_{\mu}+\mathbb{L}^{2}_{\mu}}ds-p\int_{t\wedge\tau}^{\tau}e^{\beta s}|Y_{s}|^{p-1}\check{Y}_{s}Z_{s}dW_{s}\\ &-p\int_{t\wedge\tau}^{\tau}e^{\beta s}|Y_{s-}|^{p-1}\check{Y}_{s-}dM_{s}-p\int_{t\wedge\tau}^{\tau}e^{\beta s}|Y_{s-}|^{p-1}\check{Y}_{s-}\int_{\mathcal{U}}\psi_{s}(u)\widetilde{\pi}(du,ds)\\ &-\int_{t\wedge\tau}^{\tau}e^{\beta s}\int_{\mathcal{U}}\left[|Y_{s-}+\psi_{s}(u)|^{p}-|Y_{s-}|^{p}-p|Y_{s-}|^{p-1}\check{Y}_{s-}\psi_{s}(u)\right]\pi(du,ds)\\ &-\sum_{t\wedge\tau< s\leq\tau}e^{\beta s}\left[|Y_{s-}+\Delta M_{s}|^{p}-|Y_{s-}|^{p}-p|Y_{s-}|^{p-1}\check{Y}_{s-}\Delta M_{s}\right]. \end{split}$$

Moreover by Young's inequality

$$pKe^{\beta s}|Y_s|^{p-1}|Z_s| \le \frac{pK^2}{p-1}e^{\beta s}|Y_s|^p + \frac{c(p)}{2}e^{\beta s}|Y_s|^{p-2}|Z_s|^2\mathbf{1}_{Y_s \ne 0}.$$

Hence we obtain that

$$e^{\beta(t\wedge\tau)}|Y_{t\wedge\tau}|^{p} + \frac{c(p)}{2} \int_{t\wedge\tau}^{\tau} e^{\beta s}|Y_{s}|^{p-2}|Z_{s}|^{2} \mathbf{1}_{Y_{s}\neq0} ds + c(p) \int_{t\wedge\tau}^{\tau} e^{\beta s}|Y_{s-}|^{p-2} \mathbf{1}_{Y_{s-}\neq0} d[M]_{s}^{c}$$

$$\leq e^{\beta\tau}|Y_{\tau}|^{p} + \int_{t\wedge\tau}^{\tau} e^{\beta s} \left(p|Y_{s}|^{p-1} f_{s} + (p\alpha + \frac{pK^{2}}{p-1} - \beta)|Y_{s}|^{p}\right) ds$$

$$+pK \int_{t\wedge\tau}^{\tau} e^{\beta s}|Y_{s-}|^{p-1} ||\psi_{s}||_{\mathbb{L}^{1}_{\mu} + \mathbb{L}^{2}_{\mu}} ds - p \int_{t\wedge\tau}^{\tau} e^{\beta s}|Y_{s}|^{p-1} \check{Y}_{s} Z_{s} dW_{s}$$

$$-p \int_{t\wedge\tau}^{\tau} e^{\beta s}|Y_{s-}|^{p-1} \check{Y}_{s-} dM_{s} - p \int_{t\wedge\tau}^{\tau} e^{\beta s}|Y_{s-}|^{p-1} \check{Y}_{s-} \int_{\mathcal{U}} \psi_{s}(u) \widetilde{\pi}(du, ds)$$

$$- \int_{t\wedge\tau}^{\tau} e^{\beta s} \int_{\mathcal{U}} \left[|Y_{s-} + \psi_{s}(u)|^{p} - |Y_{s-}|^{p} - p|Y_{s-}|^{p-1} \check{Y}_{s-} \psi_{s}(u)\right] \pi(du, ds)$$

$$- \sum_{t\wedge\tau < s < \tau} e^{\beta s} \left[|Y_{s-} + \Delta M_{s}|^{p} - |Y_{s-}|^{p} - p|Y_{s-}|^{p-1} \check{Y}_{s-} \Delta M_{s}\right]. \tag{9}$$

In particular we have:

$$0 \leq \int_{t \wedge \tau}^{\tau} e^{\beta s} \int_{\mathcal{U}} \left[ |Y_{s-} + \psi_{s}(u)|^{p} - |Y_{s-}|^{p} - p|Y_{s-}|^{p-1} \check{Y}_{s-} \psi_{s}(u) \right] \pi(du, ds)$$

$$\leq e^{\beta \tau} |Y_{\tau}|^{p} + \int_{t \wedge \tau}^{\tau} e^{\beta s} \left( p|Y_{s}|^{p-1} f_{s} + (p\alpha + \frac{pK^{2}}{p-1} - \beta) |Y_{s}|^{p} \right) ds$$

$$+ pK \int_{t \wedge \tau}^{\tau} e^{\beta s} |Y_{s-}|^{p-1} ||\psi_{s}||_{\mathbb{L}^{1}_{\mu} + \mathbb{L}^{2}_{\mu}} ds - p \int_{t \wedge \tau}^{\tau} e^{\beta s} |Y_{s}|^{p-1} \check{Y}_{s} Z_{s} dW_{s}$$

$$- p \int_{t \wedge \tau}^{\tau} e^{\beta s} |Y_{s-}|^{p-1} \check{Y}_{s-} dM_{s} - p \int_{t \wedge \tau}^{\tau} e^{\beta s} |Y_{s-}|^{p-1} \check{Y}_{s-} \int_{\mathcal{U}} \psi_{s}(u) \widetilde{\pi}(du, ds), \tag{10}$$

where the first inequality is due to convexity. Now since  $(Y, \psi) \in \mathbb{D}^p \times \mathbb{L}^p_{\pi}$ , Inequalities (5) and (7) and Young's inequality give:

$$\begin{split} pK\mathbb{E} \int_{0}^{T} e^{\beta s} |Y_{s-}|^{p-1} \|\psi_{s}\|_{\mathbb{L}^{1}_{\mu} + \mathbb{L}^{2}_{\mu}} ds & \leq & pK\mathbb{E} \left[ \sup_{s \in [0,T]} \left( e^{\beta (p-1)s/p} |Y_{s-}|^{p-1} \right) \int_{0}^{T} e^{\beta s/p} \|\psi_{s}\|_{\mathbb{L}^{1}_{\mu} + \mathbb{L}^{2}_{\mu}} ds \right] \\ & \leq & K(p-1)\mathbb{E} \left[ \sup_{s \in [0,T]} \left( e^{\beta s} |Y_{s}|^{p} \right) \right] + K\mathbb{E} \left[ \left( \int_{0}^{T} e^{\beta s/p} \|\psi_{s}\|_{\mathbb{L}^{1}_{\mu} + \mathbb{L}^{2}_{\mu}} ds \right)^{p} \right] < +\infty \end{split}$$

and since  $F^p$  is integrable

$$\mathbb{E} \int_0^T e^{\beta s} |Y_s|^{p-1} f_s ds \le \mathbb{E} \left[ \sup_{s \in [0,T]} \left( e^{\beta s} |Y_s|^p \right) \right] + \mathbb{E} \left[ \left( \int_0^T e^{\beta s/p} f_s ds \right)^p \right] < +\infty.$$

Using a fundamental sequence of stopping times  $\tau_k$  for the local martingale

$$\int_0^{\cdot} e^{\beta s} |Y_{s-}|^{p-1} \check{Y}_{s-} \left( Z_s dW_s + dM_s + \int_{\mathcal{U}} \psi_s(u) \widetilde{\pi}(du, ds) \right)$$

and taking  $\tau = \tau_k$  and the expectation in (10), this local martingale term will disappear in (10). Then since  $Y \in \mathbb{D}^p(0,T)$ , by monotone convergence theorem we obtain when k goes to  $\infty$ 

$$0 \le \mathbb{E} \int_0^T e^{\beta s} \int_{\mathcal{U}} \left[ |Y_{s-} + \psi_s(u)|^p - |Y_{s-}|^p - p|Y_{s-}|^{p-1} \check{Y}_{s-} \psi_s(u) \right] \pi(du, ds) < +\infty.$$
 (11)

From Lemma 5 we choose  $\varepsilon > 0$  depending on p and K (see (31) for a possible choice of  $\varepsilon$ ) and we fix  $\delta = \vartheta(\varepsilon, p)|Y_{s-}|$  if  $Y_{s-} \neq 0$  (and any  $\delta > 0$  if  $Y_{s-} = 0$ ) where  $\vartheta$  is defined in Lemma 5. From the norm definition on  $\mathbb{L}^1_{\mu} + \mathbb{L}^2_{\mu}$  and Young's inequality it follows that

$$pK \int_{t \wedge \tau}^{\tau} e^{\beta s} |Y_{s-}|^{p-1} \|\psi_{s}\|_{\mathbb{L}^{1}_{\mu} + \mathbb{L}^{2}_{\mu}} ds \leq pK \int_{t \wedge \tau}^{\tau} e^{\beta s} |Y_{s-}|^{p-1} \left( \|\psi_{s} \mathbf{1}_{|\psi_{s}| < \delta}\|_{\mathbb{L}^{2}_{\mu}} + \|\psi_{s} \mathbf{1}_{|\psi_{s}| \ge \delta}\|_{\mathbb{L}^{1}_{\mu}} \right) ds$$

$$\leq \frac{pK^{2}}{2\varepsilon} \int_{t \wedge \tau}^{\tau} e^{\beta s} |Y_{s-}|^{p} ds + \frac{p\varepsilon}{2} \int_{t \wedge \tau}^{\tau} e^{\beta s} |Y_{s-}|^{p-2} \mathbf{1}_{Y_{s-} \neq 0} \|\psi_{s} \mathbf{1}_{|\psi_{s}| < \delta}\|_{\mathbb{L}^{2}_{\mu}}^{2} ds$$

$$+ pK \int_{t \wedge \tau}^{\tau} e^{\beta s} |Y_{s-}|^{p-1} \|\psi_{s} \mathbf{1}_{|\psi_{s}| \ge \delta}\|_{\mathbb{L}^{1}_{\mu}} ds.$$

From Lemma 9 in [8]

$$\int_{t\wedge\tau}^{\tau} \int_{\mathcal{U}} e^{\beta s} \left[ |Y_{s-} + \psi_{s}(u)|^{p} - |Y_{s-}|^{p} - p|Y_{s-}|^{p-1} \check{Y}_{s-} \psi_{s}(u) \right] \pi(du, ds) 
\geq c(p) \int_{t\wedge\tau}^{\tau} \int_{\mathcal{U}} e^{\beta s} |\psi_{s}(u)|^{2} \left( |Y_{s-}|^{2} \vee |Y_{s-} + \psi_{s}(u)|^{2} \right)^{p/2-1} \mathbf{1}_{|Y_{s-}| \vee |Y_{s-} + \psi_{s}(u)| \neq 0} \pi(du, ds).$$

and

$$\begin{split} & \sum_{t \wedge \tau < s \leq \tau} e^{\beta s} \left[ |Y_{s-} + \Delta M_s|^p - |Y_{s-}|^p - p|Y_{s-}|^{p-1} \check{Y}_{s-} \Delta M_s \right] \\ & \geq c(p) \sum_{t \wedge \tau < s \leq \tau} e^{\beta s} |\Delta M_s|^2 \left( |Y_{s-}|^2 \vee |Y_{s-} + \Delta M_s|^2 \right)^{p/2 - 1} \mathbf{1}_{|Y_{s-}| \vee |Y_{s-} + \Delta M_s| \neq 0} \end{split}$$

Therefore from Inequality (9) we deduce the following inequality for any  $\varepsilon \in (0, +\infty)$ 

$$\begin{split} e^{\beta(t\wedge\tau)}|Y_{t\wedge\tau}|^{p} + \frac{c(p)}{2} \int_{t\wedge\tau}^{\tau} e^{\beta s}|Y_{s}|^{p-2}|Z_{s}|^{2}\mathbf{1}_{Y_{s}\neq0}ds + c(p) \int_{t\wedge\tau}^{\tau} e^{\beta s}|Y_{s-}|^{p-2}\mathbf{1}_{Y_{s-}\neq0}d[M]_{s}^{c} \\ + \frac{c(p)}{2} \int_{t\wedge\tau}^{\tau} \int_{\mathcal{U}} e^{\beta s}|\psi_{s}(u)|^{2} \left(|Y_{s-}|^{2}\vee|Y_{s-}+\psi_{s}(u)|^{2}\right)^{p/2-1} \mathbf{1}_{|Y_{s-}|\vee|Y_{s-}+\psi_{s}(u)|\neq0}\pi(du,ds) \\ + c(p) \sum_{t\wedge\tau< s\leq\tau} e^{\beta s} \left(|Y_{s-}|^{2}\vee|Y_{s-}+\Delta M_{s}|^{2}\right)^{p/2-1} \mathbf{1}_{|Y_{s-}|\vee|Y_{s-}+\Delta M_{s}|\neq0}|\Delta M_{s}|^{2} \\ \leq e^{\beta\tau}|Y_{\tau}|^{p} + p \int_{t\wedge\tau}^{\tau} e^{\beta s}|Y_{s}|^{p-1}f_{s}ds + \int_{t\wedge\tau}^{\tau} e^{\beta s} \left(p\alpha - \beta + \frac{pK^{2}}{p-1} + \frac{pK^{2}}{2\varepsilon}\right)|Y_{s}|^{p}ds \\ - p \int_{t\wedge\tau}^{\tau} e^{\beta s}|Y_{s-}|^{p-1}\check{Y}_{s-}\left(Z_{s}dW_{s}+dM_{s}+\int_{\mathcal{U}}\psi_{s}(u)\widetilde{\pi}(du,ds)\right) \\ - \frac{1}{2} \int_{t\wedge\tau}^{\tau} e^{\beta s} \int_{\mathcal{U}} \left[|Y_{s-}+\psi_{s}(u)|^{p}-|Y_{s-}|^{p}-p|Y_{s-}|^{p-1}\check{Y}_{s-}\psi_{s}(u)\right]\widetilde{\pi}(du,ds) \\ - \frac{1}{2} \int_{t\wedge\tau}^{\tau} e^{\beta s} \int_{\mathcal{U}} \left[|Y_{s-}+\psi_{s}(u)|^{p}-|Y_{s-}|^{p}-p|Y_{s-}|^{p-1}\check{Y}_{s-}\psi_{s}(u)\right]\mu(du)ds \\ + \frac{p\varepsilon}{2} \int_{t\wedge\tau}^{\tau} e^{\beta s}|Y_{s-}|^{p-2}\mathbf{1}_{Y_{s-}\neq0}\|\psi_{s}\mathbf{1}_{|\psi_{s}|\geq\delta}\|_{\mathbb{L}^{1}_{\mu}}ds. \end{aligned} \tag{12}$$

Let us explain how to deal with this inequality.

• For  $\varepsilon > 0$  fixed by Lemma 5, we can take  $\beta$  large enough such that

$$\beta > p\alpha + \frac{pK^2}{p-1} + \frac{pK^2}{2\varepsilon}$$

and the term  $\int_0^{\cdot} e^{\beta s} |Y_s|^p ds$  can be removed (or put on the left-hand side). Again  $\beta$  depends only on  $\alpha$ , K and p.

• Using again the fundamental sequence of stopping times  $\tau_k$  for the local martingale

$$\int_0^{\cdot} e^{\beta s} |Y_{s-}|^{p-1} \check{Y}_{s-} \left( Z_s dW_s + dM_s + \int_{\mathcal{U}} \psi_s(u) \widetilde{\pi}(du, ds) \right)$$

and taking  $\tau = \tau_k$  and the expectation in (12), this local martingale term will disappear.

• From Lemma 3.67 in [4] and (11) we deduce

$$0 \le \mathbb{E} \int_0^T e^{\beta s} \int_{\mathcal{U}} \left[ |Y_{s-} + \psi_s(u)|^p - |Y_{s-}|^p - p|Y_{s-}|^{p-1} \check{Y}_{s-} \psi_s(u) \right] \mu(du) ds < +\infty.$$

This implies  $\mathbb{P}$ -a.s. that

$$-\frac{1}{2} \int_{0}^{\tau} e^{\beta s} \int_{\mathcal{U}} \left[ |Y_{s-} + \psi_{s}(u)|^{p} - |Y_{s-}|^{p} - p|Y_{s-}|^{p-1} \check{Y}_{s-} \psi_{s}(u) \right] \mu(du) ds$$

$$+ \frac{p\varepsilon}{2} \int_{0}^{\tau} e^{\beta s} |Y_{s-}|^{p-2} \mathbf{1}_{Y_{s-} \neq 0} \int_{\mathcal{U}} |\psi_{s}(u)|^{2} \mathbf{1}_{|\psi_{s}(u)| < \delta} \mu(du) ds$$

$$+ pK \int_{0}^{\tau} e^{\beta s} |Y_{s-}|^{p-1} \int_{\mathcal{U}} |\psi_{s}(u)| \mathbf{1}_{|\psi_{s}(u)| \geq \delta} \mu(du) ds$$

$$= \frac{1}{2} \int_{0}^{\tau} e^{\beta s} \int_{\mathcal{U}} \left[ \Gamma(Y_{s-}, \psi_{s}(u), K, \varepsilon, p) - \Psi(Y_{s-}, \psi_{s}(u), p) \right] \mu(du) ds,$$
(13)

with

$$\Psi(a, b, p) = |a + b|^p - |a|^p - p|a|^{p-2} \langle a, b \rangle \mathbf{1}_{a \neq 0}$$
(14)

$$\Gamma(a, b, K, \varepsilon, p) = 2Kp|a|^{p-1}|b|\mathbf{1}_{|b| \ge \vartheta(\varepsilon, p)|a|} + p\varepsilon|a|^{p-2}|b|^2\mathbf{1}_{|b| < \vartheta(\varepsilon, p)|a|}.$$
(15)

Recall that we have chosen  $\delta = \vartheta(\varepsilon, p)|Y_{s-}|$  if  $Y_{s-} \neq 0$  (and any  $\delta > 0$  if  $Y_{s-} = 0$ ). From Lemma 5, for any  $(\omega, s, u) \in \Omega \times [0, T] \times \mathcal{U}$ ,

$$\Gamma(Y_{s-}, \psi_s(u), K, \varepsilon, p) - \Psi(Y_{s-}, \psi_s(u), p) \le 0.$$

Hence the integral (13) is non positive:  $\mathbb{P}$ -a.s.

$$\int_0^\tau e^{\beta s} \int_{\mathcal{U}} \left[ \Gamma(Y_{s-}, \psi_s(u), K, \varepsilon, p) - \Psi(Y_{s-}, \psi_s(u), p) \right] \mu(du) ds \le 0.$$

• Now in (12) the only uncontrolled remaining term on the right-hand side will be:

$$-\frac{1}{2} \int_{t \wedge \tau}^{\tau} e^{\beta s} \int_{\mathcal{U}} \left[ |Y_{s-} + \psi_s(u)|^p - |Y_{s-}|^p - p|Y_{s-}|^{p-1} \check{Y}_{s-} \psi_s(u) \right] \widetilde{\pi}(du, ds)$$

which is a local martingale. Thus it can be cancelled using another fundamental sequence  $\hat{\tau}_k$ .

Thereby (12) gives for  $\tau = \tau_k \wedge \widehat{\tau}_k$ 

$$\mathbb{E} \int_{0}^{\tau} e^{\beta s} \left( \beta - p\alpha - \frac{pK^{2}}{p-1} - \frac{pK^{2}}{2\varepsilon} \right) |Y_{s}|^{p} ds 
+ \frac{c(p)}{2} \mathbb{E} \int_{0}^{\tau} e^{\beta s} |Y_{s}|^{p-2} |Z_{s}|^{2} \mathbf{1}_{Y_{s} \neq 0} ds + c(p) \mathbb{E} \int_{0}^{\tau} e^{\beta s} |Y_{s-}|^{p-2} \mathbf{1}_{Y_{s-} \neq 0} d[M]_{s}^{c} 
+ \frac{c(p)}{2} \mathbb{E} \int_{0}^{\tau} \int_{\mathcal{U}} e^{\beta s} |\psi_{s}(u)|^{2} \left( |Y_{s-}|^{2} \vee |Y_{s-} + \psi_{s}(u)|^{2} \right)^{p/2-1} \mathbf{1}_{|Y_{s-}| \vee |Y_{s-} + \psi_{s}(u)| \neq 0} \pi(du, ds) 
+ c(p) \mathbb{E} \sum_{0 < s \leq \tau} e^{\beta s} \left( |Y_{s-}|^{2} \vee |Y_{s-} + \Delta M_{s}|^{2} \right)^{p/2-1} \mathbf{1}_{|Y_{s-}| \vee |Y_{s-} + \Delta M_{s}| \neq 0} |\Delta M_{s}|^{2} 
\leq \mathbb{E} \left( e^{\beta \tau} |Y_{\tau}|^{p} \right) + p \mathbb{E} \int_{0}^{\tau} e^{\beta s} |Y_{s}|^{p-1} f_{s} ds.$$
(16)

Recall that X is the quantity

$$X = e^{\beta T} |\xi|^p + p \int_0^T e^{\beta s} |Y_s|^{p-1} f_s ds.$$

Then we can pass to the limit on k in (16), and we obtain the same estimate for  $\tau = T$  and  $\mathbb{E}(X)$  on the right-hand side, that is (8).

**Step 2:** In this part of the proof we prove that for some constant  $\kappa_p$  (depending also on  $\beta$  and K):

$$\mathbb{E}\left(\sup_{t\in[0,T]}e^{\beta t}|Y_t|^p\right) = \mathbb{E}\left(Y_*^{\beta,p}\right) \leq \kappa_p \mathbb{E}\left[X + \int_0^T e^{\beta s}|Y_{s-}|^{p-1}\|\psi_s\|_{\mathbb{L}^1_\mu + \mathbb{L}^2_\mu} ds\right].$$

From (10) with t=0 and  $\tau=T$ , and from the choice of  $\beta$  we have:

$$0 \leq \int_{0}^{T} e^{\beta s} \int_{\mathcal{U}} \left[ |Y_{s-} + \psi_{s}(u)|^{p} - |Y_{s-}|^{p} - p|Y_{s-}|^{p-1} \check{Y}_{s-} \psi_{s}(u) \right] \pi(du, ds)$$
  
$$\leq X + pK \int_{0}^{T} e^{\beta s} |Y_{s-}|^{p-1} ||\psi_{s}||_{\mathbb{L}^{1}_{\mu} + \mathbb{L}^{2}_{\mu}} ds + p \sup_{t \in [0, T]} \left( |\Gamma_{t}| + |\Theta_{t}| + |\Xi_{t}| \right),$$

where

$$\begin{split} &\Gamma_t &= \int_0^t e^{\beta s} |Y_s|^{p-1} \check{Y}_s Z_s dW_s, \\ &\Theta_t &= \int_0^t e^{\beta s} |Y_s|^{p-1} \check{Y}_s dM_s, \quad \Xi_t = \int_0^t e^{\beta s} |Y_s|^{p-1} \check{Y}_s \int_{\mathcal{U}} \psi_s(u) \widetilde{\pi}(du, ds). \end{split}$$

From Theorem 3.15 in [4], taking the expectation in the previous inequality we obtain:

$$0 \leq \mathbb{E} \int_{0}^{T} e^{\beta s} \int_{\mathcal{U}} \left[ |Y_{s-} + \psi_{s}(u)|^{p} - |Y_{s-}|^{p} - p|Y_{s-}|^{p-1} \check{Y}_{s-} \psi_{s}(u) \right] \mu(du) ds$$

$$\leq \mathbb{E}(X) + pK \mathbb{E} \int_{0}^{T} e^{\beta s} |Y_{s-}|^{p-1} ||\psi_{s}||_{\mathbb{L}^{1}_{\mu} + \mathbb{L}^{2}_{\mu}} ds + p \mathbb{E} \left[ \sup_{t \in [0,T]} (|\Gamma_{t}| + |\Theta_{t}| + |\Xi_{t}|) \right]. \tag{17}$$

Coming back to (12), the last three terms on the right-hand side are non positive (by the same arguments as in Step 1). From the convexity of  $|x|^p$ , the last local martingale can be controlled by (17). Hence from the Burkholder-Davis-Gundy inequality we obtain

$$\mathbb{E}\left(Y_{*}^{p,\beta}\right) \leq \mathbb{E}\left(X\right) + pK\mathbb{E}\int_{0}^{T} e^{\beta s} |Y_{s-}|^{p-1} \|\psi_{s}\|_{\mathbb{L}^{1}_{\mu} + \mathbb{L}^{2}_{\mu}} ds + k_{p}\mathbb{E}\left(\left[\Gamma\right]_{T}^{1/2} + \left[\Theta\right]_{T}^{1/2} + \left[\Xi\right]_{T}^{1/2}\right).$$

The bracket  $[\Gamma]_T^{1/2}$  can be handled as in [2]:

$$k_p \mathbb{E}\left( [\Gamma]_T^{1/2} \right) \le \frac{1}{6} \mathbb{E}\left( Y_*^{p,\beta} \right) + \frac{3k_p^2}{2} \mathbb{E}\left( \int_0^T e^{\beta s} |Y_s|^{p-2} |Z_s|^2 \mathbf{1}_{Y_s \neq 0} ds \right).$$

For the other terms since p > 1 we have

$$k_{p}\mathbb{E}\left(\left[\Theta\right]_{T}^{1/2}\right) \leq k_{p}\mathbb{E}\left[\left(\int_{0}^{T}e^{2\beta s}\left(|Y_{s-}|^{2}\vee|Y_{s-}+\Delta M_{s}|^{2}\right)^{p-1}\mathbf{1}_{|Y_{s-}|\vee|Y_{s-}+\Delta M_{s}|\neq0}d[M]_{s}\right)^{1/2}\right]$$

$$\leq k_{p}\mathbb{E}\left[\left(\sup_{s\in[0,T]}e^{\beta s}\left(|Y_{s-}|^{2}\vee|Y_{s-}+\Delta M_{s}|^{2}\right)^{p/2}\right)^{1/2}$$

$$\left(\int_{0}^{T}e^{\beta s}\left(|Y_{s-}|^{2}\vee|Y_{s-}+\Delta M_{s}|^{2}\right)^{p/2-1}\mathbf{1}_{|Y_{s-}|\vee|Y_{s-}+\Delta M_{s}|\neq0}d[M]_{s}\right)^{1/2}\right]$$

$$\leq \frac{1}{6}\mathbb{E}\left(Y_{*}^{p,\beta}\right)+\frac{3k_{p}^{2}}{2}\mathbb{E}\left(\int_{0}^{T}e^{\beta s}|Y_{s-}|^{p-2}\mathbf{1}_{|Y_{s-}|\neq0}d[M]_{s}^{c}\right)$$

$$+\sum_{0< s\leq T}e^{\beta s}\left(|Y_{s-}|^{2}\vee|Y_{s-}+\Delta M_{s}|^{2}\right)^{p/2-1}\mathbf{1}_{|Y_{s-}|\vee|Y_{s-}+\Delta M_{s}|\neq0}|\Delta M_{s}|^{2}\right),$$

and by the same argument

$$k_{p}\mathbb{E}\left(\left[\Xi\right]_{T}^{1/2}\right) \leq \frac{1}{6}\mathbb{E}\left(Y_{*}^{p,\beta}\right) + \frac{3k_{p}^{2}}{2}\mathbb{E}\int_{0}^{T} e^{\beta s} \int_{\mathcal{U}} |\psi_{s}(u)|^{2} \left(|Y_{s-}|^{2} \vee |Y_{s-} + \psi_{s}(u)|^{2}\right)^{p/2-1} \mathbf{1}_{|Y_{s-}| \vee |Y_{s-} + \psi_{s}(u)| \neq 0} \pi(du, ds).$$

Using (8), we deduce that there exists a constant  $\kappa_p$  depending only on p such that

$$\mathbb{E}\left(\sup_{t\in[0,T]}e^{\beta t}|Y_t|^p\right) \leq \kappa_p \mathbb{E}\left[X+\int_0^T e^{\beta s}|Y_{s-}|^{p-1}\|\psi_s\|_{\mathbb{L}^1_\mu+\mathbb{L}^2_\mu}ds\right].$$

Step 3: Let us derive now a priori estimates for the martingale part of the BSDE. We use Corollary 1 in [8]:

$$\mathbb{E}\left(\int_{0}^{T} e^{2\beta s/p} |Z_{s}|^{2} ds\right)^{p/2} = \mathbb{E}\left(\int_{0}^{T} e^{2\beta s/p} \mathbf{1}_{Y_{s} \neq 0} |Z_{s}|^{2} ds\right)^{p/2} \\
= \mathbb{E}\left(\int_{0}^{T} \left(e^{\beta s/p} |Y_{s}|\right)^{2-p} e^{\beta s} |Y_{s}|^{p-2} \mathbf{1}_{Y_{s} \neq 0} |Z_{s}|^{2} ds\right)^{p/2} \\
\leq \mathbb{E}\left[\left(\sup_{t \in [0,T]} e^{\beta t/p} |Y_{t}|\right)^{p(2-p)/2} \left(\int_{0}^{T} e^{\beta s} |Y_{s}|^{p-2} \mathbf{1}_{Y_{s} \neq 0} |Z_{s}|^{2} ds\right)^{p/2}\right] \\
\leq \left\{\mathbb{E}\left[\sup_{t \in [0,T]} e^{\beta t} |Y_{t}|^{p}\right]\right\}^{(2-p)/2} \left\{\mathbb{E}\int_{0}^{T} e^{\beta s} |Y_{s}|^{p-2} \mathbf{1}_{Y_{s} \neq 0} |Z_{s}|^{2} ds\right\}^{p/2} \\
\leq \frac{2-p}{2} \mathbb{E}\left[\sup_{t \in [0,T]} e^{\beta t} |Y_{t}|^{p}\right] + \frac{p}{2} \mathbb{E}\int_{0}^{T} e^{\beta s} |Y_{s}|^{p-2} \mathbf{1}_{Y_{s} \neq 0} |Z_{s}|^{2} ds\right) \tag{18}$$

where we have used Hölder's and Young's inequality with  $\frac{2-p}{2} + \frac{p}{2} = 1$ . With Inequality (16) we deduce:

$$\mathbb{E}\left(\int_{0}^{T} e^{2\beta s/p} |Z_{s}|^{2} ds\right)^{p/2} \leq \widetilde{\kappa}_{p} \mathbb{E}\left[X + \int_{0}^{T} e^{\beta s} |Y_{s-}|^{p-1} \|\psi_{s}\|_{\mathbb{L}^{1}_{\mu} + \mathbb{L}^{2}_{\mu}} ds\right].$$

The same argument can be used to control  $[M]^c$ . For the pure-jump part of [M] we have using the function  $u_{\varepsilon}$  defined in the proof of Lemma 7 in [8]:

$$\mathbb{E}\left(\sum_{0 < s \le T} e^{2\beta s/p} |\Delta M_{s}|^{2}\right)^{p/2} \\
= \mathbb{E}\left(\sum_{0 < s \le T} e^{2\beta s/p} \left(u_{\varepsilon}(|Y_{s-}| \vee |Y_{s-} + \Delta M_{s}|)\right)^{2-p} \left(u_{\varepsilon}(|Y_{s-}| \vee |Y_{s-} + \Delta M_{s}|)\right)^{p-2} |\Delta M_{s}|^{2}\right)^{p/2} \\
\leq \mathbb{E}\left[\left(e^{\beta */p} u_{\varepsilon}(Y_{*})\right)^{p(2-p)/2} \left(\sum_{0 < s \le T} \left(u_{\varepsilon}(|Y_{s-}| \vee |Y_{s-} + \Delta M_{s}|)\right)^{p-2} |\Delta M_{s}|^{2}\right)^{p/2}\right] \\
\leq \left\{\mathbb{E}\left[e^{\beta *} \left(u_{\varepsilon}(Y_{*})\right)^{p}\right]\right\}^{(2-p)/2} \\
\times \left\{\mathbb{E}\left(\sum_{0 < s \le T} \left(u_{\varepsilon}(|Y_{s-}| \vee |Y_{s-} + \Delta M_{s}|)\right)^{p-2} |\Delta M_{s}|^{2}\right)\right\}^{p/2} \\
\leq \frac{2-p}{2}\mathbb{E}\left[e^{\beta *} \left(u_{\varepsilon}(Y_{*})\right)^{p}\right] + \frac{p}{2}\mathbb{E}\left(\sum_{0 < s \le T} \left(u_{\varepsilon}(|Y_{s-}| \vee |Y_{s-} + \Delta M_{s}|)\right)^{p-2} |\Delta M_{s}|^{2}\right).$$

Let  $\varepsilon$  go to zero. We use a convergence result, which is a direct consequence of the proof of Lemma 9 in [8] to obtain that

$$\mathbb{E}\left(\sum_{0 < s \le T} e^{2\beta s/p} |\Delta M_{s}|^{2}\right)^{p/2} \\
\leq \frac{2-p}{2} \mathbb{E}\left(e^{\beta *} |Y_{*}|^{p}\right) + \frac{p}{2} \mathbb{E}\left(\sum_{0 \le s < T} e^{\beta s} \left(|Y_{s-}| \vee |Y_{s-} + \Delta M_{s}|\right)^{p-2} \mathbf{1}_{|Y_{s-}| \vee |Y_{s-} + \Delta M_{s}| \ne 0} |\Delta M_{s}|^{2}\right) \\
\leq \widetilde{\kappa}_{p} \mathbb{E}\left[X + \int_{0}^{T} e^{\beta s} |Y_{s-}|^{p-1} \|\psi_{s}\|_{\mathbb{L}^{1}_{\mu} + \mathbb{L}^{2}_{\mu}} ds\right].$$

The same argument shows that

$$\mathbb{E}\left(\int_0^T e^{2\beta s/p} \int_{\mathcal{U}} |\psi_s(u)|^2 \pi(du,ds)\right)^{p/2} \leq \widetilde{\kappa}_p \mathbb{E}\left[X + \int_0^T e^{\beta s} |Y_{s-}|^{p-1} \|\psi_s\|_{\mathbb{L}^1_\mu + \mathbb{L}^2_\mu} ds\right].$$

**Step 4:** Now we prove the wanted estimate. Recall that we have found a constant  $\hat{\kappa}_p$  such that

$$\mathbb{E}\left[Y_{*}^{\beta,p} + \left(\int_{0}^{T} e^{2\beta s/p} Z_{s}^{2} ds\right)^{p/2} + \left(\int_{0}^{T} e^{2\beta s/p} d[M]_{s}\right)^{p/2} + \left(\int_{0}^{T} e^{2\beta s/p} \int_{\mathcal{U}} |\psi_{s}(u)|^{2} \pi (du, ds)\right)^{p/2}\right] \leq \hat{\kappa}_{p} \mathbb{E}\left[X + \int_{0}^{T} e^{\beta s} |Y_{s-}|^{p-1} ||\psi_{s}||_{\mathbb{L}_{\mu}^{1} + \mathbb{L}_{\mu}^{2}} ds\right]$$

where

$$X = e^{\beta T} |\xi|^p + p \int_0^T e^{\beta s} |Y_s|^{p-1} f_s ds.$$

Using Inequality (6) we know that there exists some constant  $K_{p,T}$  such that

$$\mathbb{E} \int_0^T e^{\beta s} \|\psi_s\|_{\mathbb{L}^1_{\mu} + \mathbb{L}^2_{\mu}}^p ds \le K_{p,T} \mathbb{E} \left( \int_0^T e^{2\beta s/p} \int_{\mathcal{U}} |\psi_s(u)|^2 \pi(du, ds) \right)^{p/2}.$$

Young's inequality leads to:

$$\hat{\kappa}_{p} \mathbb{E} \left[ \int_{0}^{T} e^{\beta s} |Y_{s-}|^{p-1} \|\psi_{s}\|_{\mathbb{L}_{\mu}^{1} + \mathbb{L}_{\mu}^{2}} ds \right] \leq (2K_{p,T})^{\frac{1}{p-1}} \frac{(p-1)(\hat{\kappa}_{p})^{\frac{p}{p-1}}}{p^{\frac{p}{p-1}}} \mathbb{E} \int_{0}^{T} e^{\beta s} |Y_{s-}|^{p} ds + \frac{1}{2K_{p,T}} \mathbb{E} \int_{0}^{T} e^{\beta s} \|\psi_{s}\|_{\mathbb{L}_{\mu}^{1} + \mathbb{L}_{\mu}^{2}}^{p} ds.$$

Now from Inequality (8)

$$\mathbb{E}\left[Y_{*}^{\beta,p} + \left(\int_{0}^{T} e^{2\beta s/p} Z_{s}^{2} ds\right)^{p/2} + \left(\int_{0}^{T} e^{2\beta s/p} d[M]_{s}\right)^{p/2} + \frac{1}{2} \left(\int_{0}^{T} e^{2\beta s/p} \int_{\mathcal{U}} |\psi_{s}(u)|^{2} \pi(du, ds)\right)^{p/2}\right] \leq \widetilde{C}_{p} \mathbb{E}(X)$$

with

$$\widetilde{C}_p = \hat{\kappa}_p + \kappa_{p,\beta} (2K_{p,T})^{\frac{1}{p-1}} \frac{(p-1)(\hat{\kappa}_p)^{\frac{p}{p-1}}}{n^{\frac{p}{p-1}}}.$$

The key point is that  $\widetilde{C_p}$  depends on p, T and the regularity constants of the generator f. Then

$$p\widetilde{C}_{p}\mathbb{E}\int_{0}^{T}e^{\beta s}|Y_{s}|^{p-1}f_{s}ds \leq p\widetilde{C}_{p}\left(e^{\beta\frac{p-1}{p}*}|Y_{*}|^{p-1}\right)\int_{0}^{T}e^{\beta s/p}f_{s}ds$$

$$\leq \frac{1}{2}\mathbb{E}\left(e^{\beta*}|Y_{*}|^{p}\right)+d_{p}\left(\int_{0}^{T}e^{\beta s/p}f_{s}ds\right)^{p}.$$

Therefore we have proved that for any  $\beta$  large enough (with a lower bound depending only on  $\alpha$ , K and p)

$$\mathbb{E}\left[\left(\sup_{t\in[0,T]} e^{\beta t} |Y_t|^p\right) + \left(\int_0^T e^{2\beta s/p} Z_s^2 ds\right)^{p/2} + \left(\int_0^T \int_{\mathcal{U}} e^{2\beta s/p} |\psi_s(u)|^2 \pi(du,ds)\right)^{p/2} + \left(\int_0^T e^{2\beta s/p} d[M]_s\right)^{p/2}\right] \le C \mathbb{E}\left[e^{\beta T} |\xi|^p + \left(\int_0^T e^{\beta r/p} f_r dr\right)^p\right]$$

where C just depends on p. This gives the desired estimate.

**Theorem 2** Under Assumptions ( $\mathbf{H_{ex}}$ ) and (2), there exists a unique solution  $(Y, Z, \psi, M)$  in  $\mathcal{E}^p(0, T)$  to the BSDE (1). Moreover for some constant  $C = C_{p,K,T}$ 

$$\mathbb{E}\left[\sup_{t\in[0,T]}|Y_t|^p + \left(\int_0^T|Z_t|^2dt\right)^{p/2} + \left(\int_0^T\int_{\mathcal{U}}|\psi_s(u)|^2\pi(du,ds)\right)^{p/2} + ([M]_T)^{p/2}\right]$$

$$\leq C\mathbb{E}\left[|\xi|^p + \left(\int_0^T|f(r,0,0,0)|dr\right)^p\right].$$

**Proof.** We can follow the proof of Theorem 2 in [8]. If we define

$$\xi_n = q_n(\xi),$$
  $f_n(t, y, z, \psi) = f(t, y, z, \psi) - f(t, 0, 0, 0) + q_n(f(t, 0, 0, 0)),$ 

with  $q_n(x) = xn/(|x| \vee n)$ , thanks to Theorem 1 in [8], we have a unique solution  $(Y^n, Z^n, \psi^n, M^n)$  in  $\mathcal{E}^2$ , and thus in  $\mathcal{E}^p$  for any p > 1. From  $(\mathbf{H_{ex}})$  it can be proved as in [8] that Condition (C) holds:

$$\begin{split} &\langle \frac{(Y_t^m - Y_t^n)}{|Y_t^m - Y_t^n|} \mathbf{1}_{Y_t^m - Y_t^n \neq 0}, f_m(t, Y_t^m, Z_t^m, \psi_t^m) - f_n(t, Y_t^n, Z_t^n, \psi_t^n) \rangle \\ &\leq |q_m(f(t, 0, 0, 0)) - q_n(f(t, 0, 0, 0))| + K|Z_t^m - Z_t^n| + K\|\psi_t^m - \psi_t^n\|_{\mathbb{L}^1_u + \mathbb{L}^2_u}. \end{split}$$

Proposition 3 shows that

$$\mathbb{E}\left[\sup_{t\in[0,T]}|Y_t^m - Y_t^n|^p + \left(\int_0^T |Z_s^m - Z_s^n|^2 ds\right)^{p/2} + ([M^m - M^n]_T)^{p/2} + \left(\int_0^T \int_{\mathcal{U}} |\psi_s^m(u) - \psi_s^n(u)|^2 \pi (du, ds)\right)^{p/2}\right]$$

$$\leq C\mathbb{E}\left[|\xi_m - \xi_n|^p + \left(\int_0^T |q_m(f(r,0,0,0)) - q_n(f(r,0,0,0))|dr\right)^p\right].$$

Thus  $(Y^n, Z^n, \psi^n, M^n)$  is a Cauchy sequence in  $\mathcal{E}^p(0,T)$  and the conclusion follows.

Again the Bichteler-Jacod inequality (5) implies that the sequence  $(\psi^n)$  is also a Cauchy sequence in  $\mathbb{L}^1_{\mu} + \mathbb{L}^2_{\mu}$  (or in  $\mathbb{L}^p_{\mu} + \mathbb{L}^2_{\mu}$ ) and the limit  $\psi$  belongs to these Banach spaces.

# 3 Comparison principle and extension to random terminal time (Theorem 3)

### 3.1 Comparison principle

The comparison principle (Proposition 4 in [8]) holds true under Condition ( $\mathbf{H_{comp}}$ ), which reinforces Assumption (H3). Now for  $p \in (1,2)$  we assume that

(H3') f is Lipschitz continuous w.r.t. z with constant K and for each  $(y, z, \psi, \phi) \in \mathbb{R} \times \mathbb{R}^k \times (\mathbb{L}^1_\mu + \mathbb{L}^2_\mu)^2$ , there exists a predictable process  $\kappa = \kappa^{y, z, \psi, \phi} : \Omega \times [0, T] \times \mathcal{U} \to \mathbb{R}$  such that:

$$f(t, y, z, \psi) - f(t, y, z, \phi) \le \int_{\mathcal{U}} (\psi(u) - \phi(u)) \kappa_t^{y, z, \psi, \phi}(u) \mu(du)$$

with  $\mathbb{P} \otimes \text{Leb} \otimes \mu$ -a.e. for any  $(y, z, \psi, \psi')$ ,

- $-1 \le \kappa_t^{y,z,\psi,\phi}(u)$
- $|\kappa_t^{y,z,\psi,\phi}(u)| \leq \ell(u)$ , where  $\ell$  belongs to  $\mathbb{L}_{\mu}^{\infty} \cap \mathbb{L}_{\mu}^2$ .

We say that  $(\mathbf{H_{comp}})$  is satisfied if  $(\mathrm{H1})$ – $(\mathrm{H2})$  and  $(\mathrm{H3'})$  hold.

**Lemma 4** Assumption  $(\mathbf{H_{comp}})$  implies Condition  $(\mathbf{H_{ex}})$ , that is f is Lipschitz continuous w.r.t.  $\psi$ .

**Proof.** Indeed for p < 2, we have to take  $\psi$  and  $\phi$  in  $\mathbb{L}^1_{\mu} + \mathbb{L}^2_{\mu}$ . Thus if  $\ell$  belongs to  $\mathbb{L}^{\infty}_{\mu} \cap \mathbb{L}^2_{\mu}$ , the dual space of  $\mathbb{L}^1_{\mu} + \mathbb{L}^2_{\mu}$  (see [7], Chapter 3, Theorem 3.1), then for  $\psi$  and  $\phi$  in  $\mathbb{L}^1_{\mu} + \mathbb{L}^2_{\mu}$ , we obtain:

$$|f(t,y,z,\psi)-f(t,y,z,\phi)|\leq \|\ell\|_{\mathbb{L}^\infty_\mu\cap\mathbb{L}^2_\mu}\|\psi-\phi\|_{\mathbb{L}^1_\mu+\mathbb{L}^2_\mu}.$$

Then under  $(\mathbf{H_{comp}})$ , the proof of Proposition 4 in [8] remains exactly the same.

#### 3.2 Random terminal time

Now we assume that  $\tau$  is a stopping time for the filtration  $\mathbb{F}$ , which need not be bounded (as in Section 6 of [8]). We want to solve the following BSDE:  $\mathbb{P}$ -a.s., for all  $0 \le t \le T$ ,

$$Y_{t\wedge\tau} = Y_{T\wedge\tau} + \int_{t\wedge\tau}^{T\wedge\tau} f(s, Y_s, Z_s, \psi_s) ds - \int_{t\wedge\tau}^{T\wedge\tau} Z_s dW_s$$
$$- \int_{t\wedge\tau}^{T\wedge\tau} \int_{\mathcal{U}} \psi_s(u) \widetilde{\pi}(du, ds) - \int_{t\wedge\tau}^{T\wedge\tau} dM_s$$
(19)

with the condition that  $\mathbb{P}$ -a.s. on the set  $\{t \geq \tau\}$ ,  $Y_t = \xi$  and  $Z_t = \psi_t = M_t = 0$ . Note that this equation was denoted (36) in [8].

On the generator, Assumptions ( $\mathbf{H_{ex}}$ ) still hold with a monotonicity constant  $\alpha$  and a Lipschitz constant K, but the growth condition (H2) is replaced by:

$$\forall r > 0, \ \forall n \in \mathbb{N}, \quad \sup_{|y| \le r} (|f(t, y, 0, 0) - f(t, 0, 0, 0)|) \in L^{1}(\Omega \times (0, n)). \tag{H2"}$$

and the condition (2) is replaced by

$$\mathbb{E}\left[e^{p\rho\tau}|\xi|^p + \int_0^\tau e^{p\rho t}|f(t,0,0,0)|^p dt\right] < +\infty \tag{20}$$

(denoted (H5') in [8], Section 6). We suppose that the constant  $\rho$  in (20) satisfies

$$\rho > \nu = \alpha + \frac{K^2}{p-1} + \frac{K^2}{2\varepsilon},$$

where the constant  $0 < \varepsilon < \frac{p-1}{2}$  is given by Lemma 5 and depends only on K and p (see (31) for a value of  $\varepsilon$ ). As in [8] we suppose that Condition (H6) holds, that is  $\xi$  is  $\mathcal{F}_{\tau}$ -measurable and

$$\mathbb{E}\left[\int_0^\tau e^{p\rho t} |f(t,\xi_t,\eta_t,\gamma_t)|^p dt\right] < +\infty,$$

where  $\xi_t = \mathbb{E}(\xi|\mathcal{F}_t)$  and  $(\eta, \gamma, N)$  are given by the martingale representation:

$$\xi = \mathbb{E}(\xi) + \int_0^\infty \eta_s dW_s + \int_0^\infty \int_{\mathcal{U}} \gamma_s(u) \widetilde{\pi}(du, ds) + N_\tau$$

with

$$\mathbb{E}\left[\left(\int_0^\infty |\eta_s|^2 ds + \int_0^\infty \int_{\mathcal{U}} |\gamma_s(u)|^2 \pi(du, ds) + [N]_\tau\right)^{p/2}\right] < +\infty.$$

**Proposition 5** Under conditions (H1), (H2"), (H3), (20) and (H6), the BSDE (19) has at most one solution satisfying

$$\mathbb{E}\left[e^{p\rho(t\wedge\tau)}|Y_{t\wedge\tau}|^{p} + \int_{0}^{T\wedge\tau}e^{p\rho s}|Y_{s}|^{p}ds + \int_{0}^{T\wedge\tau}e^{p\rho s}|Y_{s}|^{p-2}|Z_{s}|^{2}\mathbf{1}_{Y_{s}\neq0}ds\right] \\
+\mathbb{E}\left[\int_{0}^{T\wedge\tau}e^{p\rho s}|Y_{s-}|^{p-2}\mathbf{1}_{Y_{s-}\neq0}d[M]_{s}^{c}\right] \\
+\mathbb{E}\left[\int_{t\wedge\tau}^{T\wedge\tau}\int_{\mathcal{U}}e^{p\rho s}\left(|Y_{s-}|^{2}\vee|Y_{s-}+\psi_{s}(u)|^{2}\right)^{p/2-1}\mathbf{1}_{|Y_{s-}|\vee|Y_{s-}+\psi_{s}(u)|\neq0}|\psi_{s}(u)|^{2}\pi(du,ds)\right] \\
+\mathbb{E}\left[\sum_{0< s\leq T\wedge\tau}e^{p\rho s}|\Delta M_{s}|^{2}\left(|Y_{s-}|^{2}\vee|Y_{s-}+\Delta M_{s}|^{2}\right)^{p/2-1}\mathbf{1}_{|Y_{s-}|\vee|Y_{s-}+\Delta M_{s}|\neq0}\right] < +\infty. \tag{21}$$

**Proof.** From the assumption on f, Young's inequality and Lemma 5, we choose  $\varepsilon > 0$  and  $\delta = \vartheta(\varepsilon, p)|\hat{y}|$  such that

$$\begin{aligned} p|\widehat{y}|^{p-1}\check{\widehat{y}}(f(s,y,z,\psi) - f(s,y',z',\psi') - \rho|\widehat{y}|^{p} &\leq p\left(\alpha + \frac{K^{2}}{p-1} + \frac{K^{2}}{2\varepsilon} - \rho\right)|\widehat{y}|^{p} \\ &+ \frac{c(p)}{2}|\widehat{y}|^{p-2}\mathbf{1}_{\widehat{y}\neq 0}|\widehat{z}|^{2} + \frac{p\varepsilon}{2}|\widehat{y}|^{p-2}\mathbf{1}_{\widehat{y}\neq 0}\|\widehat{\psi}\mathbf{1}_{|\widehat{\psi}|<\delta}\|_{\mathbb{L}^{2}_{\mu}}^{2} + pK|\widehat{y}|^{p-1}\|\widehat{\psi}\mathbf{1}_{|\widehat{\psi}|\geq\delta}\|_{\mathbb{L}^{1}_{\mu}} \\ &\leq \frac{c(p)}{2}|\widehat{y}|^{p-2}\mathbf{1}_{\widehat{y}\neq 0}|\widehat{z}|^{2} + \frac{p\varepsilon}{2}|\widehat{y}|^{p-2}\mathbf{1}_{\widehat{y}\neq 0}\|\widehat{\psi}\mathbf{1}_{|\widehat{\psi}|<\delta}\|_{\mathbb{L}^{2}_{\mu}}^{2} + pK|\widehat{y}|^{p-1}\|\widehat{\psi}\mathbf{1}_{|\widehat{\psi}|\geq\delta}\|_{\mathbb{L}^{1}_{\mu}} \\ &\leq \frac{c(p)}{2}|\widehat{y}|^{p-2}\mathbf{1}_{\widehat{y}\neq 0}|\widehat{z}|^{2} + \frac{1}{2}\Gamma(\widehat{y},\widehat{\psi},K,\varepsilon,p) \end{aligned}$$

where  $\Gamma$  is defined by (15). Then Itô's formula and the previous inequality give for  $0 \le t \le T$ 

$$e^{p\rho(t\wedge\tau)}|\widehat{Y}_{t\wedge\tau}|^{p} \leq e^{p\rho(T\wedge\tau)}|\widehat{Y}_{T\wedge\tau}|^{p} - p \int_{t\wedge\tau}^{T\wedge\tau} e^{p\rho s}|\widehat{Y}_{s}|^{p-1} \check{Y}_{s} \widehat{Z}_{s} dW_{s}$$

$$-p \int_{t\wedge\tau}^{T\wedge\tau} e^{p\rho s}|\widehat{Y}_{s-}|^{p-1} \check{Y}_{s-} d\widehat{M}_{s} - p \int_{t\wedge\tau}^{T\wedge\tau} e^{p\rho s}|\widehat{Y}_{s-}|^{p-1} \check{Y}_{s-} \int_{\mathcal{U}} \widehat{\psi}_{s}(u) \widetilde{\pi}(du, ds)$$

$$-\frac{1}{2} \int_{t\wedge\tau}^{T\wedge\tau} e^{p\rho s} \int_{\mathcal{U}} \left[ |Y_{s-} + \psi_{s}(u)|^{p} - |Y_{s-}|^{p} - p|Y_{s-}|^{p-1} \check{Y}_{s-} \psi_{s}(u) \right] \widetilde{\pi}(du, ds)$$

$$+\frac{1}{2} \int_{t\wedge\tau}^{T\wedge\tau} e^{p\rho s} \left[ \Gamma(\widehat{Y}_{s-}, \widehat{\psi}_{s}(u), K, \varepsilon, p) - \Psi(\widehat{Y}_{s-}, \widehat{\psi}_{s}(u), p) \right] \mu(du) ds \tag{22}$$

 $\Psi$  being defined by (14). From Lemma 5 the last term is non positive. From the integrability conditions on the solution taking the expectation in (22) leads to

$$\mathbb{E}\left(e^{p\rho(t\wedge\tau)}|\widehat{Y}_{t\wedge\tau}|^p\right) \leq \mathbb{E}\left(e^{p\rho(T\wedge\tau)}|\widehat{Y}_{T\wedge\tau}|^p\right).$$

If we replace  $\rho$  by  $\rho'$  with  $\alpha + \frac{K^2}{p-1} < \rho' < \rho$  we obtain the same result, and thus we get for any  $0 \le t \le T$ 

$$\mathbb{E}\left(e^{p\rho'(t\wedge\tau)}|\widehat{Y}_{t\wedge\tau}|^p\right) \leq e^{p(\rho'-\rho)T}\mathbb{E}\left(e^{p\rho(T\wedge\tau)}|\widehat{Y}_{T\wedge\tau}|^p\right).$$

We let T go to infinity to obtain  $\widehat{Y}_t = 0$ . Therefore  $(Y, Z, \psi, M)$  and  $(Y', Z', \psi', M')$  satisfy BSDE (19) and Y = Y'. Thus we have the same martingale parts and by orthogonality,  $\widehat{Z} = \widehat{\psi} = \widehat{M} = 0$ . Uniqueness of the solution is proved.

**Proposition 6** Under conditions (H1), (H2"), (H3), (20) and (H6), the BSDE (19) has a solution satisfying (21), the right-hand side of the inequality is given by

$$C\mathbb{E}\left[e^{p\rho\tau}|\xi|^p + \int_0^\tau e^{p\rho s}|f(s,0,0,0)|^p ds\right].$$

Moreover

$$\mathbb{E}\left(\int_{0}^{\tau} e^{2\rho s} |Z_{s}|^{2} ds\right)^{p/2} + \mathbb{E}\left(\int_{0}^{\tau} e^{2\rho s} \int_{\mathcal{U}} |\psi_{s}(u)|^{2} \pi(du, ds)\right)^{p/2} + \mathbb{E}\left(\int_{0}^{\tau} e^{2\rho s} d[M]_{s}\right)^{p/2} \\
\leq C \mathbb{E}\left[e^{p\rho\tau} |\xi|^{p} + \int_{0}^{\tau} e^{p\rho s} |f(s, 0, 0, 0)|^{p} ds\right].$$
(23)

The constant C depends only on p, K and  $\alpha$ .

**Proof.** For each  $n \in \mathbb{N}$  we construct a solution  $\{(Y^n, Z^n, \psi^n, M^n), t \geq 0\}$ , first on the interval [0, n] using Theorem 2:

$$Y_{t}^{n} = \mathbb{E}(\xi|\mathcal{F}_{n}) + \int_{t}^{n} \mathbf{1}_{[0,\tau]}(s) f(s, Y_{s}^{n}, Z_{s}^{n}, \psi_{s}^{n}) ds - \int_{t}^{n} Z_{s}^{n} dW_{s} - \int_{t}^{n} \int_{\mathcal{U}} \psi_{s}^{n}(u) \widetilde{\pi}(du, ds) - \int_{t}^{n} dM_{s}^{n}.$$

And for  $t \ge n$  (Assumption (H6)):

$$Y_t^n = \xi_t, \quad Z_t^n = \eta_t, \quad \psi_t^n(u) = \gamma_t(u), \quad M_t^n = N_t.$$

• Step 1: a priori estimate.

Again with Young's inequality and for some  $\delta > 0$  sufficiently small and any  $\eta > 0$ 

$$|y|^{p-1}\check{y}f(t,y,z,\psi) \leq \left(\alpha + \delta + \frac{K^{2}}{((p-1)-2\delta)} + \frac{K^{2}}{\varepsilon}\right)|y|^{p}$$

$$+ \left(\frac{(p-1)}{2} - \delta\right)|y|^{p-2}\mathbf{1}_{y\neq 0}|z|^{2} + \frac{1}{p}|f(t,0,0,0)|^{p} \left(\frac{p\delta}{p-1}\right)^{1-p}$$

$$+ \varepsilon|y|^{p-2}\mathbf{1}_{y\neq 0}||\psi\mathbf{1}_{|\psi|\leq \eta}||_{\mathbb{L}^{2}_{\mu}}^{2} + K|y|^{p-1}||\psi\mathbf{1}_{|\psi|\geq \eta}||_{\mathbb{L}^{1}_{\mu}}.$$
(24)

We choose  $\delta > 0$  such that  $\alpha + 2\delta + \frac{K^2}{(p-1-2\delta)} + \frac{K^2}{\varepsilon} \le \rho$ . As in [8], Itô's formula for  $0 \le t \le T \le n$  and arguments used in the proof of Propositions 3 or 5 give:

$$\mathbb{E}\left[e^{p\rho(t\wedge\tau)}|Y_{t\wedge\tau}^{n}|^{p} + p\delta\int_{0}^{T\wedge\tau}e^{p\rho s}|Y_{s}^{n}|^{p}ds\right] \\
+p\delta\mathbb{E}\left[\int_{0}^{T\wedge\tau}e^{p\rho s}|Y_{s}^{n}|^{p-2}|Z_{s}^{n}|^{2}\mathbf{1}_{Y_{s}^{n}\neq0}ds\right] + c(p)\mathbb{E}\int_{0}^{T\wedge\tau}e^{p\rho s}|Y_{s-}^{n}|^{p-2}\mathbf{1}_{Y_{s-}^{n}\neq0}d[M^{n}]_{s}^{c} \\
+c(p)\mathbb{E}\left[\sum_{0< s\leq T\wedge\tau}e^{p\rho s}|\Delta M_{s}^{n}|^{2}\left(|Y_{s-}^{n}|^{2}\vee|Y_{s-}^{n}+\Delta M_{s}^{n}|^{2}\right)^{p/2-1}\mathbf{1}_{|Y_{s-}^{n}|\vee|Y_{s-}^{n}+\Delta M_{s}^{n}|\neq0}\right] \\
+\frac{c(p)}{2}\mathbb{E}\int_{0}^{T\wedge\tau}\int_{\mathcal{U}}e^{p\rho s}|\psi_{s}^{n}(u)|^{2}\left(|Y_{s-}^{n}|^{2}\vee|Y_{s-}^{n}+\psi_{s}^{n}(u)|^{2}\right)^{p/2-1}\mathbf{1}_{|Y_{s-}^{n}|\vee|Y_{s-}^{n}+\psi_{s}^{n}(u)|\neq0}\pi(du,ds) \\
\leq\mathbb{E}\left[e^{p\rho(T\wedge\tau)}|Y_{T\wedge\tau}^{n}|^{p}+\left(\frac{p\delta}{p-1}\right)^{1-p}\int_{0}^{T\wedge\tau}e^{p\rho s}|f(s,0,0,0)|^{p}ds\right]. \tag{25}$$

• Step 2: the sequence  $(Y^n)$  converges.

Take m > n and define

$$\widehat{Y}_t = Y_t^m - Y_t^n, \quad \widehat{Z}_t = Z_t^m - Z_t^n, \quad \widehat{\psi}_t = \psi_t^m - \psi_t^n, \quad \widehat{M}_t = M_t^m - M_t^n$$

The argument already used to control the generator (see (24)) and suitable modifications (as in the proof of Proposition 3 again) imply that Inequality (43) for  $n \le t \le m$  in [8] becomes now:

$$\mathbb{E}\left[\sup_{t\geq n}e^{p\rho(t\wedge\tau)}|\widehat{Y}_{t\wedge\tau}|^p + \int_{n\wedge\tau}^{m\wedge\tau}e^{p\rho s}|\widehat{Y}_s|^p ds\right] \leq C\mathbb{E}\int_{n\wedge\tau}^{\tau}e^{p\rho s}|f(s,\xi_s,\eta_s,\gamma_s)|^p ds.$$

From the same argument as in the proof of Proposition 5 for  $t \leq n$ 

$$\mathbb{E}\left(e^{p\rho(t\wedge\tau)}|\widehat{Y}_{t\wedge\tau}|^p\right) + \mathbb{E}\int_0^\tau e^{p\rho s}|\widehat{Y}_s|^p ds \leq \mathbb{E}e^{p\rho(n\wedge\tau)}|\widehat{Y}_n|^p \leq C\mathbb{E}\int_{\eta\wedge\tau}^\tau e^{p\rho s}|f(s,\xi_s,\eta_s,\gamma_s)|^p ds.$$

The convergence of the sequence  $Y^n$  follows.

• Step 3: convergence of the martingale part  $(Z^n, \psi^n, M^n)$ .

For the convergence of  $(Z^n, M^n)$  the arguments are the same. But for  $\psi^n$ , we control only

$$\mathbb{E}\left[\left(\int_0^\tau \int_{\mathcal{U}} e^{p\rho s} |\psi_s^m(u) - \psi_s^n(u)|^2 \pi(du, ds)\right)^{p/2}\right].$$

Following the same sketch as in the proof of uniqueness we deduce

$$\mathbb{E}\left[\int_{0}^{m\wedge\tau} e^{p\rho s} |\widehat{Y}_{s-}|^{p-2} \mathbf{1}_{\widehat{Y}_{s-}\neq 0} d[\widehat{M}]_{s}^{c} + \int_{0}^{m\wedge\tau} e^{p\rho s} |\widehat{Y}_{s}|^{p-2} |\widehat{Z}_{s}|^{2} \mathbf{1}_{\widehat{Y}_{s}\neq 0} ds\right] \\
+ \mathbb{E}\left[\int_{0}^{m\wedge\tau} \int_{\mathcal{U}} e^{p\rho s} |\widehat{\psi}_{s}(u)|^{2} \left(|\widehat{Y}_{s-}|^{2} \vee |\widehat{Y}_{s-} + \widehat{\psi}_{s}(u)|^{2}\right)^{p/2-1} \mathbf{1}_{|\widehat{Y}_{s-}|\vee|\widehat{Y}_{s-} + \widehat{\psi}_{s}(u)|\neq 0} \pi(du, ds)\right] \\
+ \mathbb{E}\left[\sum_{0 < s \leq m\wedge\tau} e^{p\rho s} |\Delta \widehat{M}_{s}|^{2} \left(|\widehat{Y}_{s-}|^{2} \vee |\widehat{Y}_{s-} + \Delta \widehat{M}_{s}|^{2}\right)^{p/2-1} \mathbf{1}_{|\widehat{Y}_{s-}|\vee|\widehat{Y}_{s-} + \Delta \widehat{M}_{s}|\neq 0}\right] \\
\leq C \mathbb{E}\int_{\eta\wedge\tau}^{\tau} e^{p\rho s} |f(s, \xi_{s}, \eta_{s}, \gamma_{s})|^{p} ds.$$

Then we can use again the argument (18) in order to have a Cauchy sequence for the norm:

$$\mathbb{E}\left(\int_0^\tau e^{2\rho s}|\widehat{Z}_s|^2ds\right)^{p/2}+\mathbb{E}\left(\int_0^\tau e^{2\rho s}\int_{\mathcal{U}}|\widehat{\psi}_s(u)|^2\pi(du,ds)\right)^{p/2}+\mathbb{E}\left(\int_0^\tau e^{2\rho s}d[\widehat{M}]_s\right)^{p/2}.$$

Hence it converges to  $(Z, \psi, M)$  and from the two previous steps the limit  $(Y, Z, \psi, M)$  is a solution of the BSDE (19) which satisfies (21) and (23).

From the two previous propositions we deduce the following existence and uniqueness result.

**Theorem 3** Under conditions (H1), (H2"), (H3), (20) and (H6), the BSDE (19) has a unique solution satisfying (21) and (23).

## 4 Technical results

To prove our results in the previous section we used technical Lemmas 3 and 5. Here we give the proof of these results

**Proof.** (of Lemma 3). If  $\phi^1 = \phi \mathbf{1}_{|\phi| \le \delta} \in \mathbb{L}^2_{\mu}$  and  $\phi^2 = \phi \mathbf{1}_{|\phi| > \delta} \in \mathbb{L}^p_{\mu}$ , then  $\phi = \phi^1 + \phi^2$  and the result is trivial. Conversely if  $\|\phi\|_{\mathbb{L}^2_{\mu} + \mathbb{L}^p_{\mu}} < +\infty$ , then for any  $\varepsilon > 0$ , there exists  $\phi^1 \in \mathbb{L}^2_{\mu}$  and  $\phi^2 \in \mathbb{L}^p_{\mu}$  with  $\phi^1 + \phi^2 = \phi$  and

$$\|\phi^1\|_{\mathbb{L}^2_{\mu}} + \|\phi^2\|_{\mathbb{L}^p_{\mu}} \le \|\phi\|_{\mathbb{L}^2_{\mu} + \mathbb{L}^p_{\mu}} + \varepsilon.$$

Now for all  $\delta > 0$  it holds that

$$|\phi|\mathbf{1}_{|\phi|>\delta} \le |\phi^2| + |\phi^1|\mathbf{1}_{|\phi^1|>\delta/2} + |\phi^1|\mathbf{1}_{|\phi^1|<\delta/2}\mathbf{1}_{|\phi|>\delta}.$$

We already know that  $\phi^2 \in \mathbb{L}^p_\mu$  and that  $\phi^1 \in \mathbb{L}^2_\mu$ . Since p < 2 it follows that the second term is in  $\mathbb{L}^p_\mu$ :

$$|\phi^1|^p \mathbf{1}_{|\phi^1| \geq \delta/2} \leq \left(\frac{\delta}{2}\right)^{p-2} |\phi^1|^2 \mathbf{1}_{|\phi^1| \geq \delta/2} \leq \left(\frac{\delta}{2}\right)^{p-2} |\phi^1|^2.$$

For the third one, observe that if  $|\phi^1| < \delta/2$  and  $|\phi^1 + \phi^2| = |\phi| > \delta$ , then  $|\phi^2| \ge \delta/2$ . Thus

$$|\phi^1|\mathbf{1}_{|\phi^1|<\delta/2}\mathbf{1}_{|\phi|>\delta} \leq |\phi^2|\mathbf{1}_{|\phi^1|<\delta/2}\mathbf{1}_{|\phi|>\delta} \leq |\phi^2|.$$

Thus  $|\phi|\mathbf{1}_{|\phi|>\delta} \in \mathbb{L}^p_{\mu}$ .

Let us now turn to  $|\phi|\mathbf{1}_{|\phi|<\delta}$ . We decompose this term as follows

$$|\phi|\mathbf{1}_{|\phi| \le \delta} \le |\phi^1| + |\phi^2|\mathbf{1}_{|\phi^2| \le 2\delta} + |\phi^2|\mathbf{1}_{|\phi^2| > 2\delta}\mathbf{1}_{|\phi| \le \delta}.$$

Again we already know that  $\phi^2 \in \mathbb{L}^p_\mu$  and that  $\phi^1 \in \mathbb{L}^2_\mu$ . Thus the second term is in  $\mathbb{L}^2_\mu$ , since for p < 2:

$$|\phi^2|^2 \mathbf{1}_{|\phi^2| < 2\delta} \le (2\delta)^{2-p} |\phi^2|^p \mathbf{1}_{|\phi^2| < 2\delta} \le (2\delta)^{2-p} |\phi^2|^p.$$

For the third one, observe that if  $|\phi^2| > 2\delta$  and  $|\phi^1 + \phi^2| \le \delta$ , then  $|\phi^1| > \delta$  and

$$|\phi^2| \le |\phi^2 + \phi^1| + |\phi^1| \le \delta + |\phi^1| \le 2|\phi^1|.$$

Thus  $|\phi|\mathbf{1}_{|\phi|\leq\delta}\in\mathbb{L}^2_{\mu}$ .

Finally, if  $|\phi|\mathbf{1}_{|\phi|>\delta} \in \mathbb{L}^p_{\mu}$ , we also have  $|\phi|\mathbf{1}_{|\phi|>\delta} \in \mathbb{L}^1_{\mu}$ , and the conclusion follows.

Recall that for  $p \in (1,2)$ ,  $K \ge 0$ ,  $\varepsilon > 0$  and  $(a,b) \in (\mathbb{R}^d)^2$ , we have defined  $\Psi$  by (14) and  $\Gamma$  by (15) as follows:

$$\begin{split} \Psi(a,b,p) &= |a+b|^p - |a|^p - p|a|^{p-1} \langle \check{a},b \rangle = |a+b|^p - |a|^p - p|a|^{p-2} \langle a,b \rangle \mathbf{1}_{a \neq 0} \\ \Gamma(a,b,K,\varepsilon,p) &= 2Kp|a|^{p-1}|b|\mathbf{1}_{|b| \geq \vartheta(\varepsilon,p)|a|} + p\varepsilon|a|^{p-2}|b|^2\mathbf{1}_{|b| < \vartheta(\varepsilon,p)|a|} \end{split}$$

where

$$\vartheta(\varepsilon, p) = \sqrt{\frac{1}{2} \left(\frac{p-1}{2\varepsilon}\right)^{\frac{2}{2-p}} + \frac{1}{2}} - 1.$$

**Lemma 5** Let  $K \ge 0$  and let  $p \in (1,2)$ . Then there exists  $0 < \varepsilon < \frac{p-1}{2}$  such that

$$\forall (a,b) \in (\mathbb{R}^d)^2, \qquad \Psi(a,b,p) \ge \Gamma(a,b,K,\varepsilon,p).$$

Let us emphasize that  $\varepsilon$  depends on K and p.

**Proof.** First observe that that for a=0 the inequality holds for all  $\varepsilon > 0$  and  $b \in \mathbb{R}^d$ . Assume in the sequel that  $a \neq 0$ . For  $t \in \mathbb{R}$ ,  $\tau^2 \in [0, \infty)$  and  $\epsilon \in (0, \infty)$  let

$$\psi(t, \tau^2, p) = \left( \left( (1+t)^2 + \tau^2 \right)^{p/2} - 1 - pt \right)$$

and

$$\gamma(t, \tau^2, K, \epsilon, p) = 2Kp \left(t^2 + \tau^2\right)^{1/2} \mathbf{1}_{(|t|^2 + \tau^2)^{1/2} \ge \vartheta(\varepsilon, p)} + p\varepsilon(t^2 + \tau^2) \mathbf{1}_{(|t|^2 + \tau^2)^{1/2} < \vartheta(\varepsilon, p)}.$$

For all  $b \in \mathbb{R}^d$  there exist a unique  $t \in \mathbb{R}$  and a unique  $c \in \mathbb{R}^d$  with  $\langle a, c \rangle = 0$  and b = ta + c. If we choose  $t \in \mathbb{R}$  and  $c \in \mathbb{R}^d$  in this way and let  $\tau^2 = \frac{|c|^2}{|a|^2} \ge 0$ , we obtain that

$$\Psi(a,b,p) = |a+b|^p - |a|^p - p|a|^{p-2}\langle a,b\rangle = (|a+b|^2)^{p/2} - |a|^p - pt|a|^p$$

$$= |a|^p \left( (|1+t|^2 + \frac{|c|^2}{|a|^2})^{p/2} - |a|^p - pt|a|^p = |a|^p \psi(t,\tau^2,p), \right)$$

and

$$\Gamma(a, b, K, \varepsilon, p) = |a|^p 2Kp \left(t^2 + \tau^2\right)^{1/2} \mathbf{1}_{(|t|^2 + \tau^2)^{1/2} \ge \vartheta(\varepsilon, p)} + |a|^p p \varepsilon (t^2 + \tau^2) \mathbf{1}_{(|t|^2 + \tau^2)^{1/2} < \vartheta(\varepsilon, p)}$$

$$= |a|^p \gamma(t, \tau^2, K, \varepsilon, p).$$

Hence the conclusion of the lemma holds if and only if there exists  $\varepsilon \in (0, \frac{p-1}{2})$  such that for all  $t \in \mathbb{R}$  and  $\tau^2 \geq 0$  it holds that  $\psi(t, \tau^2, p) \geq \gamma(t, \tau^2, K, \varepsilon, p)$ .

Let  $h:(0,\infty)\to\mathbb{R}$  be the function satisfying for all  $x\in(0,\infty)$  that

$$h(x) = \frac{1}{2^{p/2}}x^p - 2^{p/2} - 1 - p(2K+1)x.$$

Since p > 1, the function h tends to  $+\infty$  when  $x \to +\infty$ . Hence there exists a constant  $\alpha(K, p) \ge 2$  such that for all  $x \ge \alpha(K, p)$  it holds that  $h(x) \ge 0$ . Now, for the sequel of the proof, fix  $\varepsilon \in (0, \frac{p-1}{2})$  such that  $\vartheta(\varepsilon, K) \ge \alpha(K, p)$ . First case: Let  $t \in \mathbb{R}$  and  $\tau^2 \ge 0$  such that  $(t^2 + \tau^2)^{1/2} < \vartheta(\varepsilon, p)$ . In particular it holds that

$$\tau^{2} < \vartheta(\varepsilon, p)^{2} = \left(\sqrt{\frac{1}{2}\left(\frac{p-1}{2\varepsilon}\right)^{\frac{2}{2-p}} + \frac{1}{2}} - 1\right)^{2} < \frac{1}{2}\left[\left(\frac{p-1}{2\varepsilon}\right)^{\frac{2}{2-p}} - 1\right],\tag{26}$$

and consequently that

$$\tau^{2} < \left(\frac{p-1}{2\varepsilon}\right)^{\frac{2}{2-p}} - 1 = \left(\frac{1}{p\varepsilon}\right)^{\frac{2}{2-p}} \wedge \left(\frac{p-1}{2\varepsilon}\right)^{\frac{2}{2-p}} \wedge \left(\frac{p-1}{2\varepsilon}\right)^{\frac{2}{2-p}} - 1 \wedge \left(\frac{1}{2\varepsilon}\right)^{\frac{2}{2-p}} - 1 \tag{27}$$

Moreover, it holds that

$$\varepsilon < \frac{p-1}{2} = \frac{p-1}{2} \wedge \frac{p-1}{p} \wedge \frac{1}{2}. \tag{28}$$

We have to show that  $\psi(t, \tau^2, p) \geq p\varepsilon(t^2 + \tau^2)$ . To this end we consider the function  $\sigma \colon \mathbb{R} \to \mathbb{R}$ ,

$$\sigma(s) = \psi(s, \tau^2, p) - p\varepsilon(s^2 + \tau^2) = ((1+s)^2 + \tau^2)^{p/2} - 1 - ps - p\varepsilon(s^2 + \tau^2)$$

for  $s \in \mathbb{R}$ . The first and second derivatives of  $\sigma$  are given by

$$\sigma'(s) = p ((1+s)^2 + \tau^2)^{p/2-1} (1+s) - p - 2p\varepsilon s,$$
  
$$\sigma''(s) = p ((1+s)^2 + \tau^2)^{p/2-2} ((p-1)(1+s)^2 + \tau^2) - 2p\varepsilon.$$

Observe that  $\sigma'(-1) = -p + 2p\varepsilon$  and

$$\sigma(-1) = \tau^p - 1 + p - p\varepsilon(1 + \tau^2) = p - 1 - p\varepsilon + \tau^p(1 - p\varepsilon\tau^{2-p}).$$

Since  $\varepsilon < \frac{p-1}{p} \wedge \frac{1}{2}$  and  $\tau^2 \le \left(\frac{1}{p\varepsilon}\right)^{\frac{2}{2-p}}$ , it holds that  $\sigma(-1) > 0$  and  $\sigma'(-1) < 0$ . Note that  $\sigma''$  is well defined for all  $s \ne -1$ . Moreover since p-1 < 1, for any  $s \ne -1$  it holds that

$$\sigma''(s) \ge p(p-1) \left( (1+s)^2 + \tau^2 \right)^{p/2-1} - 2p\varepsilon =: g(s).$$

Since  $\tau^2 < \left(\frac{p-1}{2\varepsilon}\right)^{\frac{2}{2-p}}$  we have g(s) = 0 if and only if  $(1+s)^2 = \left(\frac{p-1}{2\varepsilon}\right)^{\frac{2}{2-p}} - \tau^2$ .

$$\Xi(\tau^2, \varepsilon, p) = -1 - \sqrt{\left(\frac{p-1}{2\varepsilon}\right)^{\frac{2}{2-p}} - \tau^2} < -1.$$

is the only root of g on  $(-\infty, -1)$ . Moreover, it holds that g(-1) > 0. Hence at least on the interval  $(\Xi(\tau^2, \varepsilon, p), -1)$ ,  $\sigma'' > 0$ . Thus  $\sigma'$  is increasing on  $(\Xi(\tau^2, \varepsilon, p), -1)$  with  $\sigma'(-1) < 0$ ; in other words  $\sigma$  is decreasing on  $(\Xi(\tau^2, \varepsilon, p), -1)$ and  $\sigma(-1) > 0$ . Thereby  $\sigma(s) > 0$  for all  $s \in (\Xi(\tau^2, \varepsilon, p), -1]$ . Observe that  $(t^2 + \tau^2)^{1/2} < \vartheta(\epsilon, p)$  implies that

$$t > -\vartheta(\epsilon, p) = -\sqrt{\frac{1}{2} \left(\frac{p-1}{2\varepsilon}\right)^{\frac{2}{2-p}} + \frac{1}{2}} + 1 > -\sqrt{\frac{1}{2} \left(\frac{p-1}{2\varepsilon}\right)^{\frac{2}{2-p}} + \frac{1}{2}} - 1 > \Xi(\tau^2, \varepsilon, p),$$

where we used (26) for the last inequality. Thus we obtain that  $\sigma(t) > 0$  if  $t \le -1$ .

Next assume that t > -1. Observe that

$$\Upsilon(\tau^2, \varepsilon, p) = \sqrt{\left(\frac{p-1}{2\varepsilon}\right)^{\frac{2}{2-p}} - \tau^2} - 1 > -1$$

is the only root of g on  $(-1,\infty)$ . Since  $\tau^2 < \left(\frac{p-1}{2\varepsilon}\right)^{\frac{2}{2-p}} - 1$  (see (27)), it holds that  $\Upsilon(\tau^2,\varepsilon,p) > 0$ . And on the interval  $(-1, \Upsilon(\tau^2, \varepsilon, p)), \sigma'' > 0$ , thus  $\sigma'$  is increasing there with  $\sigma'(-1) < 0$ . Moreover, it holds that

$$\sigma'(0) = p\left((1+\tau^2)^{p/2-1} - 1\right) \ge 0.$$

Hence, there exists a value  $\delta = \delta(\tau^2, p, \varepsilon)$  in (-1, 0] such that  $\sigma'(\delta(\tau^2, p, \varepsilon)) = 0$ . And on the interval  $(-1, \Upsilon(\tau^2, \varepsilon, p))$ , the function  $\sigma$  has a unique minimum m given by  $m = \sigma(\delta(\tau^2, p, \varepsilon))$ . We want to prove that  $m \ge 0$ . By the very definition

$$\sigma'(\delta) = p ((1+\delta)^2 + \tau^2)^{p/2-1} (1+\delta) - p - 2p\varepsilon \delta = 0$$

hence

$$((1+\delta)^2 + \tau^2)^{p/2} = \frac{1+2\varepsilon\delta}{1+\delta} ((1+\delta)^2 + \tau^2).$$

This gives that

$$m = \sigma(\delta) = ((1+\delta)^2 + \tau^2)^{p/2} - 1 - p\delta - p\varepsilon(\delta^2 + \tau^2)$$
$$= \frac{1+2\varepsilon\delta}{1+\delta} ((1+\delta)^2 + \tau^2) - 1 - p\delta - p\varepsilon(\delta^2 + \tau^2)$$
$$= (2-p)\varepsilon\delta^2 + (2\varepsilon + 1 - p)\delta + (2-p)\varepsilon\tau^2 + \tau^2 \frac{1-2\varepsilon}{1+\delta}.$$

If  $\varpi$  is the function defined on (-1,0] by

$$\varpi(x) = (2-p)\varepsilon x^2 + (2\varepsilon + 1 - p)x + (2-p)\varepsilon \tau^2 + \tau^2 \frac{1-2\varepsilon}{1+x},$$

this function  $x \mapsto \varpi(x)$  has a positive second derivative and since  $\varepsilon < \frac{p-1}{2}$ , the first derivative is negative on (-1,0]. Hence this is a decreasing function and we obtain that for any  $x \in (-1,0], \ \varpi(x) \geq \varpi(0)$ . Now

 $\varpi(0) = \tau^2(1 - p\varepsilon) \ge 0$ . Thus  $m = \sigma(\delta) = \varpi(\delta) \ge 0$ . Consequently,  $\sigma$  is nonnegative on  $(-1, \Upsilon(\tau^2, \varepsilon, p))$ . Finally, observe that

$$t < \vartheta(\epsilon, p) = \sqrt{\frac{1}{2} \left(\frac{p-1}{2\varepsilon}\right)^{\frac{2}{2-p}} + \frac{1}{2}} - 1 < \Upsilon(\tau^2, \varepsilon, p),$$

where we used (26) for the last inequality. This implies that  $\sigma(t) \geq 0$  also in the case t > -1.

Second case: Let  $t \in \mathbb{R}$  and  $\tau^2 \geq 0$  such that  $(t^2 + \tau^2)^{1/2} \geq \vartheta(\epsilon, p)$ . We have to show that  $\psi(t, \tau^2, p) \geq 2Kp(t^2 + \tau^2)^{1/2}$ . First observe that

$$\psi(t,\tau^{2},p) - 2Kp\left(t^{2} + \tau^{2}\right)^{1/2} = \left((1+t)^{2} + \tau^{2}\right)^{p/2} - 1 - pt - 2Kp\left(t^{2} + \tau^{2}\right)^{1/2}$$

$$\geq \left((1+t)^{2} + \tau^{2}\right)^{p/2} - 1 - p(2K+1)\left(t^{2} + \tau^{2}\right)^{1/2}.$$
(29)

Now for any  $t \in \mathbb{R}$ ,  $(1+t)^2 \ge (t^2/2) - 2$ , thus for  $t^2 + \tau^2 \ge 4$ 

$$((1+t)^2 + \tau^2)^{p/2} \ge \left(\frac{t^2}{2} + \tau^2 - 2\right)^{p/2} = \left(\frac{t^2 + \tau^2}{2} + \frac{\tau^2}{2} - 2\right)^{p/2}.$$
 (30)

We define the function  $\varrho$  on  $[2, +\infty)$  by

$$\varrho(x) = \left(x + \frac{\tau^2}{2} - 2\right)^{p/2} - x^{p/2}.$$

This function tends to zero when x goes to infinity. If  $\tau^2 \ge 4$ , then immediately  $\varrho(x) \ge 0$ . If not,  $\varrho$  is non decreasing and  $\varrho(x) \ge \varrho(2) \ge -2^{p/2}$ . In any case, for  $x \ge 2$ ,  $\varrho(x) + 2^{p/2} \ge 0$ . With  $x = (t^2 + \tau^2)/2 \ge 2$ , from (30) we obtain that

$$((1+t)^2 + \tau^2)^{p/2} \ge \left(\frac{t^2 + \tau^2}{2}\right)^{p/2} - 2^{p/2}$$

and therefore from (29) if  $t^2 + \tau^2 \ge 4$ 

$$\psi(t,\tau^2,p) - 2Kp\left(t^2 + \tau^2\right)^{1/2} \geq \frac{1}{2^{p/2}} \left(t^2 + \tau^2\right)^{p/2} - 2^{p/2} - 1 - p(2K+1)\left(t^2 + \tau^2\right)^{1/2}$$
$$= h((t^2 + \tau^2)^{1/2}).$$

Since, we chose  $\varepsilon \in (0, \frac{p-1}{2})$  such that  $\vartheta(\varepsilon, K) \ge \alpha(K, p)$  and it holds that  $h \ge 0$  on  $(\alpha(K, p), \infty)$ , it follows that  $h((t^2 + \tau^2)^{1/2}) \ge 0$  and hence  $\psi(t, \tau^2, p) \ge 2pK(t^2 + \tau^2)^{1/2}$ . This completes the proof.

Even if we can not compute  $\alpha(K, p)$  explicitely, one can take

$$\alpha(K,p) = (4(2K+2)+1)^{\frac{1}{p-1}}.$$

And thus  $\vartheta(\varepsilon, p) \ge \alpha(K, p)$  if

$$\varepsilon \le \frac{p-1}{2\left(\alpha(K,p)+1\right)^{2-p}}.\tag{31}$$

The right-hand side is a decreasing function w.r.t.  $p \in (1,2)$  and w.r.t.  $K \ge 0$ . Hence when p is close to one and K is large,  $\varepsilon$  is be very small.

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
