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Cold adaptation of the cheese ripening bacterium *Propionibacterium freudenreichii*

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CONTEXT



Propionibacterium freudenreichii is widely used in Swiss-type cheese manufacture and especially in Emmental cheese.



In France:

- Emmental cheese production > 253 000 tones (in 2010)
 → 76% of the production of cow milk hard-cooked cheeses
 → 37% of the total production of cheeses
- Consumption: 4 kg of Emmental cheese/person/year

Emmental cheese ripening is based on different combinations of time and temperature, according to manufacturer's practices.

In France, the legal ripening time of Emmental cheese is a minimum of 6 weeks. But, it can be extended to months, like for example Emmental PDO cheese from Switzerland.





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How *P. freudenreichii* copes with the cold-induced stress and remains active when cheeses are transferred to the cold room?





STRATEGY:

An approach combining transcriptomics, proteomics and metabolomics



✓ The sequenced strain CIRM-BIA1^T

 ✓ The medium had a composition in complex nitrogen sources and carbon (lactate) close to Swiss cheese aqueous phase

→ Nutritional conditions mimicking cheese environment

An approach combining transcriptomics, proteomics and metabolomics

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RESULTS: Production of aroma compounds





P. freudenreichii is also known to produce:



 \odot Free fatty acids and esters

Methylbutanoic acids

The expression of these genes remained unchanged at 4°C

This is the first transcriptomic study for a *P. freudenreichii* strain

It brings new insights into the physiology of this bacterium in the cold

- \checkmark Its metabolic activity was slowed down
- ✓ Its carbon metabolism was re-routed to accumulate glycogen
- ✓ Its production of aroma compounds remained unchanged

These results could explain the contribution of *P. freudenreichii* to cheese ripening even during cold storage



Other P. freudenreichii strains are currently tested using the same -omic approach

This work will help in getting global insights into the physiology and the metabolic adaptation of the species during cheese ripening

This work could lead to a better selection of strains and an optimization of Swiss cheese ripening
