# Existence of solution to scalar BSDEs with weakly $L^{1+}$ _integrable terminal values

#### Abstract

In this paper, we study a scalar linearly growing BSDE with a weakly $L^{1+}$ _ integrable terminal value. We prove that the BSDE admits a solution if the terminal value satisfies some $\Psi$-integrability condition, which is weaker than the usual $L^{p}(p>1)$ integrability and stronger than $L \log L$ integrability. We show by a counterexample that $L \log L$ integrability is not sufficient for the existence of solution to a BSDE of a linearly growing generator.

## 1 Introduction

Consider the following Backward Stochastic Differential Equation (BSDE):

$$
\begin{equation*}
Y_{t}=\xi+\int_{t}^{T} f\left(s, Y_{s}, Z_{s}\right) d s-\int_{t}^{T} Z_{s} d W_{s} \tag{1.1}
\end{equation*}
$$

where the function $f:[0, T] \times \Omega \times \mathbb{R} \times \mathbb{R}^{1 \times d} \rightarrow \mathbb{R}$ satisfies

$$
|f(s, y, z)| \leq \alpha_{s}+\beta|y|+\gamma|z|,
$$

with $\alpha \in L^{1}(0, T), \beta \geq 0$ and $\gamma>0$.
It is well known that if $\xi \in L^{p}$, with $p>1$, then there exists a solution to $\operatorname{BSDE}$ (1.1), see e.g. $[5,4,1]$. The aim of this paper is to find a weaker integrability condition for the terminal value $\xi$, under which the solution still exists .

Set

$$
\Psi_{\lambda}(x)=x e^{\left(\frac{2}{\lambda} \log (x+1)\right)^{1 / 2}}, \quad(\lambda, x) \in(0, \infty) \times[0, \infty) .
$$

Our sufficient condition is: there exists $\lambda \in\left(0, \frac{1}{\gamma^{2} T}\right)$ such that

$$
\mathbb{E}\left[\Psi_{\lambda}(|\xi|)\right]<+\infty .
$$

[^0]Remark 1.1 Note that the preceding $\Psi_{\lambda}$-integrability is stronger than $L^{1}$, weaker than $L^{p}$ for any $p>1$, because for any $\varepsilon>0$, we have,

$$
x \leq x e^{\left(\frac{2}{\lambda} \log (x+1)\right)^{1 / 2}} \leq x e^{\varepsilon \log (x+1)+\frac{1}{2 \varepsilon \lambda}} \leq e^{\frac{1}{2 \varepsilon \lambda}} x(x+1)^{\varepsilon}, \quad x \geq 0
$$

Moreover, for any $p \geq 1$, there exists a constant $C_{p}>0$ such that

$$
x e^{\left(\frac{2}{\lambda} \log (x+1)\right)^{1 / 2}} \geq C_{p} x \log ^{p}(x+1)
$$

We will see that even the condition

$$
\mathbb{E}\left[\Psi_{\lambda}(|\xi|)\right]<+\infty
$$

for a certain $\lambda>\frac{1}{\gamma^{2} T}$ (which implies that $|\xi| \log ^{p}(|\xi|+1) \in L^{1}$ ) is still too weak to ensure the existence of solution by giving a simple example in Example 2.3.

Note that if the generator $f$ is of sublinear growth with respect to $z$, i.e. there exists $q \in[0,1)$,

$$
|f(t, y, z)| \leq \alpha+\beta|y|+\gamma|z|^{q}
$$

then there exists a solution for $\xi \in L^{1}$, see [1].
Our method applies the dual representation of solution to BSDE with convex generator (see, e.g. $[4,6,3])$ in order to establish some a priori estimate and then the localization procedure of real-valued BSDE [2].

Let us close this introduction by giving the notations that we will use in all the paper. For the remaining of the paper, let us fix a nonnegative real number $T>0$. First of all, $\left(W_{t}\right)_{t \in[0, T]}$ is a standard Brownian motion with values in $\mathbb{R}^{d}$ defined on some complete probability space $(\Omega, \mathcal{F}, \mathbb{P}) .\left(\mathcal{F}_{t}\right)_{t \geq 0}$ is the natural filtration of the Brownian motion $W$ augmented by the $\mathbb{P}$-null sets of $\mathcal{F}$. The sigma-field of predictable subsets of $[0, T] \times \Omega$ is denoted by $\mathcal{P}$.

Consider real valued BSDEs which are equations of type (1.1), where $f$ (hereafter called the generator) is a random function $[0, T] \times \Omega \times \mathbb{R} \times \mathbb{R}^{1 \times d} \rightarrow \mathbb{R}$ and measurable with respect to $\mathcal{P} \otimes \mathcal{B}(\mathbb{R}) \otimes \mathcal{B}\left(\mathbb{R}^{1 \times d}\right)$, and $\xi$ (hereafter called the terminal condition or terminal value) is a real $\mathcal{F}_{T^{-} \text {-measurable random variable. }}$

Definition 1.2 By a solution to BSDE (1.1), we mean a pair $\left(Y_{t}, Z_{t}\right)_{t \in[0, T]}$ of predictable processes with values in $\mathbb{R} \times \mathbb{R}^{1 \times d}$ such that $\mathbb{P}$-a.s., $t \mapsto Y_{t}$ is continuous, $t \mapsto Z_{t}$ belongs to $L^{2}(0, T)$ and $t \mapsto g\left(t, Y_{t}, Z_{t}\right)$ belongs to $L^{1}(0, T)$, and $\mathbb{P}$-a.s. $(Y, Z)$ verifies (1.1).

By $\operatorname{BSDE}(\xi, f)$, we mean the $\operatorname{BSDE}$ of generator $f$ and terminal condition $\xi$.
For any real $p \geq 1, \mathcal{S}^{p}$ denotes the set of real-valued, adapted and càdlàg processes $\left(Y_{t}\right)_{t \in[0, T]}$ such that

$$
\|Y\|_{\mathcal{S}^{p}}:=\mathbb{E}\left[\sup _{0 \leq t \leq T}\left|Y_{t}\right|^{p}\right]^{1 / p}<+\infty
$$

and $\mathcal{M}^{p}$ denotes the set of (equivalent class of) predictable processes $\left(Z_{t}\right)_{t \in[0, T]}$ with values in $\mathbb{R}^{1 \times d}$ such that

$$
\|Z\|_{\mathcal{M}^{p}}:=\mathbb{E}\left[\left(\int_{0}^{T}\left|Z_{s}\right|^{2} d s\right)^{p / 2}\right]^{1 / p}<+\infty
$$

The rest of the paper is organized as follows. Section 2 establishes a necessary and sufficient condition for the existence of solution to $\operatorname{BSDE}(1.1)$ for the typical form of generator $f(t, y, z)=$ $\alpha_{t}+\beta y+\gamma|z|$. Section 3 gives the $\Psi_{\lambda}$ integrability condition for the existence of solution to BSDE (1.1) for $f(t, y, z)=\alpha_{t}+\beta y+\gamma|z|$. Section 4 is devoted to the sufficiency of the $\Psi_{\lambda}$-integrability condition for the existence of solution to BSDE (1.1) of the general linearly growing generator.

## 2 Typical Case

Let us first consider the following BSDE:

$$
\begin{equation*}
Y_{t}=\xi+\int_{t}^{T}\left(\alpha_{s}+\beta Y_{s}+\gamma\left|Z_{s}\right|\right) d s-\int_{t}^{T} Z_{s} d W_{s} \tag{2.2}
\end{equation*}
$$

where $\alpha \in L^{1}(0, T)$, and $\beta \geq 0$ and $\gamma>0$ are some real constants. We suppose further that the terminal condition $\xi$ is nonnegative. Note that if $Y$ is a solution belonging to class D , then as $e^{\beta t} Y_{t}$ is a local supermartingale, it is a supermatingale, from which we deduce that $Y \geq 0$. In this subsection, we restrict ourselves to nonnegative solution.

For $\xi \in L^{p}(p>1)$, $\operatorname{BSDE}(2.2)$ has a unique solution. It has a dual representation as follows (see, e.g. $[4,3]$ )

$$
\begin{equation*}
Y_{t}=\underset{q \in \mathcal{A}}{\operatorname{ess} \sup }\left\{\mathbb{E}_{q}\left[e^{\beta(T-t)} \xi \mid \mathcal{F}_{t}\right]\right\}+\int_{t}^{T} e^{\beta(s-t)} \alpha_{s} d s \tag{2.3}
\end{equation*}
$$

where $\mathcal{A}$ is the set of progressively measurable processes $q$ such that $|q| \leq \gamma$,

$$
\frac{d \mathbb{Q}^{q}}{d \mathbb{P}}=M_{T}^{q}
$$

with

$$
M_{t}^{q}=\exp \left\{\int_{0}^{t} q_{s} d W_{s}-\frac{1}{2} \int_{0}^{t}\left|q_{s}\right|^{2} d s\right\}, \quad t \in[0, T],
$$

and $\mathbb{E}_{q}$ is the expectation with respect to $\mathbb{Q}^{q}$.
Theorem 2.1 Let us suppose that $\xi \geq 0$. Then BSDE (2.2) admits a solution $(Y, Z)$ such that $Y \geq 0$ if and only if there exists a locally bounded process $\bar{Y}$ such that

$$
\underset{q \in \mathcal{A}}{\operatorname{esssup}}\left\{\mathbb{E}_{q}\left[e^{\beta(T-t)} \xi \mid \mathcal{F}_{t}\right]\right\}+\int_{t}^{T} e^{\beta(s-t)} \alpha_{s} d s \leq \bar{Y}_{t} .
$$

Proof. If $\operatorname{BSDE}(2.2)$ admits a solution $(Y, Z)$ such that $Y \geq 0$, then we define a sequence of stopping times

$$
\sigma_{n}=T \wedge \inf \left\{t \geq 0:\left|Y_{t}\right|>n\right\},
$$

with the convention that $\inf \emptyset=+\infty$.
As $W_{s}^{q}=W_{s}-\int_{0}^{s} q_{r} d r$ is a Brownian motion under $Q^{q}$, we have

$$
Y_{t \wedge \sigma_{n}}=Y_{\sigma_{n}}+\int_{t \wedge \sigma_{n}}^{\sigma_{n}}\left(\alpha_{s}+\beta Y_{s}+\gamma\left|Z_{s}\right|-Z_{s} q_{s}\right) d s-\int_{t \wedge \sigma_{n}}^{\sigma_{n}} Z_{s} d W_{s}^{q}
$$

Applying Itô's formula to $e^{\beta s} Y_{s}$, we deduce

$$
e^{\beta\left(t \wedge \sigma_{n}\right)} Y_{t \wedge \sigma_{n}}=e^{\beta \sigma_{n}} Y_{\sigma_{n}}+\int_{t \wedge \sigma_{n}}^{\sigma_{n}} e^{\beta s}\left(\alpha_{s}+\gamma\left|Z_{s}\right|-Z_{s} q_{s}\right) d s-\int_{t \wedge \sigma_{n}}^{\sigma_{n}} e^{\beta s} Z_{s} d W_{s}^{q}
$$

from which we obtain

$$
\mathbb{E}_{q}\left[e^{\beta\left(\sigma_{n}-t \wedge \sigma_{n}\right)} Y_{\sigma_{n}}+\int_{t \wedge \sigma_{n}}^{\sigma_{n}} e^{\beta\left(s-t \wedge \sigma_{n}\right)} \alpha_{s} d s \mid \mathcal{F}_{t}\right] \leq Y_{t \wedge \sigma_{n}}
$$

Fatou's lemma yields that

$$
\mathbb{E}_{q}\left[e^{\beta(T-t)} \xi \mid \mathcal{F}_{t}\right]+\int_{t}^{T} e^{\beta(s-t)} \alpha_{s} d s \leq Y_{t}
$$

On the other hand, if there exists a locally bounded process $\bar{Y}$ such that

$$
\underset{q \in \mathcal{A}}{\operatorname{essssup}}\left\{\mathbb{E}_{q}\left[e^{\beta(T-t)} \xi \mid \mathcal{F}_{t}\right]\right\}+\int_{t}^{T} e^{\beta(s-t)} \alpha_{s} d s \leq \bar{Y}_{t}
$$

then we construct the solution by use of a localization method (see e.g. [2]). We describe this method here for completeness. Let $\left(Y^{n}, Z^{n}\right)$ be the unique solution in $\mathcal{S}^{2} \times \mathcal{M}^{2}$ of the following BSDE

$$
Y_{t}^{n}=\xi \mathbf{1}_{\{\xi \leq n\}}+\int_{t}^{T}\left(\alpha_{s}+\beta Y_{s}^{n}+\gamma\left|Z_{s}^{n}\right|\right) d s-\int_{t}^{T} Z_{s}^{n} d W_{s}
$$

By comparison theorem, $Y^{n}$ is nondecreasing with respect to $n$. Moreover, setting $q_{s}^{n}=\gamma \operatorname{sgn}\left(Z_{s}^{n}\right)$, we obtain

$$
\begin{aligned}
Y_{t}^{n} & =\mathbb{E}_{q^{n}}\left[e^{\beta(T-t)} \xi \mathbf{1}_{\{\xi \leq n\}} \mid \mathcal{F}_{t}\right]+\int_{t}^{T} e^{\beta(s-t)} \alpha_{s} d s \\
& \left.\leq \mathbb{E}_{q^{n}}\left[e^{\beta(T-t)} \xi \mid \mathcal{F}_{t}\right]\right\}+\int_{t}^{T} e^{\beta(s-t)} \alpha_{s} d s \\
& \leq \bar{Y}_{t}
\end{aligned}
$$

Set

$$
\tau_{k}=T \wedge \inf \left\{t \geq 0: \bar{Y}_{t}>k\right\}
$$

and

$$
Y_{k}^{n}(t)=Y_{t \wedge \tau_{k}}^{n}, \quad Z_{k}^{n}(t)=Z_{t}^{n} \mathbf{1}_{t \leq \tau_{k}} .
$$

Then $\left(Y_{k}^{n}, Z_{k}^{n}\right)$ satisfies

$$
\begin{equation*}
Y_{k}^{n}(t)=Y_{k}^{n}(T)+\int_{t}^{T} \mathbf{1}_{s \leq \tau_{k}}\left(\alpha_{s}+\beta Y_{k}^{n}(s)+\gamma\left|Z_{k}^{n}(s)\right|\right) d s-\int_{t}^{T} Z_{k}^{n}(s) d W_{s} \tag{2.4}
\end{equation*}
$$

For fixed $k, Y_{k}^{n}$ is nondecreasing with respect to $n$ and remains bounded by $k$. We can now apply the stability property of BSDE with bounded terminal data (see e.g. Lemma 3, page 611 in [2]). Setting $Y_{k}(t)=\sup _{n} Y_{k}^{n}(t)$, there exists $Z_{k}$ such that $\lim _{n} Z_{k}^{n}=Z_{k}$ in $\mathcal{M}^{2}$ and

$$
\begin{equation*}
Y_{k}(t)=\sup _{n} Y_{\tau_{k}}^{n}+\int_{t}^{\tau_{k}}\left(\alpha_{s}+\beta Y_{k}(s)+\gamma\left|Z_{k}(s)\right|\right) d s-\int_{t}^{\tau_{k}} Z_{k}(s) d W_{s} \tag{2.5}
\end{equation*}
$$

Finally, noting that

$$
Y_{k+1}\left(t \wedge \tau_{k}\right)=Y_{k}\left(t \wedge \tau_{k}\right), \quad Z_{k+1} \mathbf{1}_{t \leq \tau_{k}}=Z_{k} \mathbf{1}_{t \leq \tau_{k}}
$$

we conclude the existence of solution $(Y, Z)$.

Remark 2.2 Consider the case $d=1$. If $B S D E$ (2.2) admits a solution $(Y, Z)$ such that $Y \geq 0$, by taking $q=\gamma$ and $q=-\gamma$, we deduce that both $\xi e^{\gamma W_{T}}$ and $\xi e^{-\gamma W_{T}}$ are in $L^{1}(\Omega)$, which implies that $\xi e^{\gamma\left|W_{T}\right|} \in L^{1}(\Omega)$, as

$$
\xi e^{\gamma\left|W_{T}\right|} \leq \xi e^{\gamma W_{T}}+\xi e^{-\gamma W_{T}}
$$

Example 2.3 Let us set $d=1, T=1, \beta=0, \gamma=1, \mu \in(0,1)$, and

$$
\xi=e^{\frac{1}{2} W_{1}^{2}-\mu\left|W_{1}\right|+\frac{1}{2} \mu^{2}}-1
$$

In this case, BSDE (2.2) does not admit a solution $(Y, Z)$ such that $Y \geq 0$, as $\xi e^{\left|W_{1}\right|}$ does not belong to $L^{1}(\Omega)$ by the following direct calculus:

$$
\mathbb{E}\left[\xi e^{\left|W_{1}\right|}\right]=\frac{1}{\sqrt{2 \pi}} \int_{-\infty}^{+\infty}\left(e^{\frac{1}{2}|x|^{2}-\mu|x|+\frac{1}{2} \mu^{2}}-1\right) e^{|x|} e^{-\frac{1}{2}|x|^{2}} d x=+\infty
$$

Whereas it is straightforward to see that for any $p \geq 1, \xi \log ^{p}(\xi+1) \in L^{1}(\Omega)$.
For $\lambda>1$, consider the following terminal condition

$$
\xi=e^{\frac{1}{2} W_{1}^{2}-\mu\left|W_{1}\right|+\frac{1}{2} \mu^{2}}-1, \quad \mu \in\left(\frac{1}{\sqrt{\lambda}}, 1\right)
$$

We have $\Psi_{\lambda}(\xi) \in L^{1}$ by the following straightforward calculus:

$$
\mathbb{E}\left[\Psi_{\lambda}(\xi)\right]=\frac{1}{\sqrt{2 \pi}} \int_{-\infty}^{+\infty}\left(e^{\frac{1}{2}|x|^{2}-\mu|x|+\frac{1}{2} \mu^{2}}-1\right) e^{\frac{1}{\sqrt{\lambda}}| | x|-\mu|} e^{-\frac{1}{2}|x|^{2}} d x<+\infty
$$

while $B S D E$ (2.2) has no solution, in view of the fact that $\xi e^{\left|W_{1}\right|}$ does not belong to $L^{1}(\Omega)$.

## 3 Sufficient Condition

Let us now look for a sufficient condition for the existence of a locally bounded process $\bar{Y}$ such that

$$
\underset{q \in \mathcal{A}}{\operatorname{esssup}}\left\{\mathbb{E}_{q}\left[e^{\beta(T-t)} \xi \mid \mathcal{F}_{t}\right]\right\}+\int_{t}^{T} e^{\beta(s-t)} \alpha_{s} d s \leq \bar{Y}_{t} .
$$

For $\lambda>0$, define the functions $\Phi_{\lambda}$ and $\Psi_{\lambda}$ :

$$
\begin{gathered}
\Phi_{\lambda}(x)=e^{\frac{1}{2} \lambda \log ^{2}(x)}, \quad x>0 \\
\Psi_{\lambda}(y)=y e^{\left(\frac{2}{\lambda} \log (y+1)\right)^{1 / 2}}, \quad y \geq 0
\end{gathered}
$$

Then we have
Proposition 3.1 For any $x \in \mathbb{R}$ and $y \geq 0$, we have

$$
e^{x} y \leq \Phi_{\lambda}\left(e^{x}\right)+e^{\frac{2}{\lambda}} \Psi_{\lambda}(y)
$$

Proof. Set

$$
z=\left(\frac{2}{\lambda} \log (y+1)\right)^{1 / 2} \geq 0
$$

then

$$
y=e^{\frac{\lambda}{2} z^{2}}-1
$$

It is sufficient to prove that for any $x \in \mathbb{R}$ and $z \geq 0$,

$$
e^{\frac{1}{2} \lambda x^{2}-x}+\left(e^{\frac{\lambda}{2} z^{2}}-1\right)\left(e^{z+\frac{2}{\lambda}-x}-1\right) \geq 0
$$

It is evident to see that the above inequality holds when $z+\frac{2}{\lambda}-x \geq 0$.
Consider the case $z+\frac{2}{\lambda}-x<0$. Then $x>z+\frac{2}{\lambda}>0$. Hence

$$
\begin{aligned}
& e^{\frac{1}{2} \lambda x^{2}-x}+\left(e^{\frac{\lambda}{2} z^{2}}-1\right)\left(e^{z+\frac{2}{\lambda}-x}-1\right) \\
= & e^{\frac{1}{2} \lambda\left(x-\frac{1}{\lambda}\right)^{2}-\frac{1}{2 \lambda}}+e^{\frac{\lambda}{2} z^{2}+z+\frac{2}{\lambda}-x}+1-e^{z+\frac{2}{\lambda}-x}-e^{\frac{\lambda}{2} z^{2}} \\
\geq & e^{\frac{1}{2} \lambda\left(z+\frac{1}{\lambda}\right)^{2}-\frac{1}{2 \lambda}}-e^{\frac{\lambda}{2} z^{2}} \\
\geq & 0 .
\end{aligned}
$$

Proposition 3.2 Let $0<\lambda<\frac{1}{\gamma^{2} T}$. For any $q \in \mathcal{A}$,

$$
\mathbb{E}\left[\Phi_{\lambda}\left(e^{\int_{t}^{T} q_{s} d W_{s}}\right) \mid \mathcal{F}_{t}\right] \leq \frac{1}{\sqrt{1-\lambda \gamma^{2}(T-t)}}
$$

Proof. Firstly, by use of Girsanov's lemma, for $\theta \in \mathbb{R}$,

$$
\begin{aligned}
& \mathbb{E}\left[e^{\theta \int_{t}^{T} q_{s} d W_{s}} \mid \mathcal{F}_{t}\right] \\
= & \mathbb{E}\left[\left.e^{\theta \int_{t}^{T} q_{s} d W_{s}-\frac{\theta^{2}}{2} \int_{t}^{T}\left|q_{s}\right|^{2} d s} e^{\frac{\theta^{2}}{2} \int_{t}^{T}\left|q_{s}\right|^{2} d s} \right\rvert\, \mathcal{F}_{t}\right] \\
\leq & e^{\frac{\theta^{2} \gamma^{2}}{2}(T-t)}
\end{aligned}
$$

Then we apply

$$
e^{\lambda \frac{x^{2}}{2}}=\frac{1}{\sqrt{2 \pi}} \int_{-\infty}^{+\infty} e^{\sqrt{\lambda} y x-\frac{y^{2}}{2}} d y
$$

to deduce that

$$
\begin{aligned}
& \mathbb{E}\left[\Phi_{\lambda}\left(e^{\int_{t}^{T} q_{s} d W_{s}}\right) \mid \mathcal{F}_{t}\right] \\
= & \mathbb{E}\left[\left.e^{\frac{\lambda}{2}\left(\int_{t}^{T} q_{s} d W_{s}\right)^{2}} \right\rvert\, \mathcal{F}_{t}\right] \\
= & \frac{1}{\sqrt{2 \pi}} \int_{-\infty}^{+\infty} \mathbb{E}\left[\left.e^{\sqrt{\lambda} y \int_{t}^{T} q_{s} d W_{s}-\frac{y^{2}}{2}} \right\rvert\, \mathcal{F}_{t}\right] d y \\
\leq & \frac{1}{\sqrt{2 \pi}} \int_{-\infty}^{+\infty} e^{\frac{(\sqrt{\lambda} y \gamma)^{2}}{2}(T-t)-\frac{y^{2}}{2}} d y \\
= & \frac{1}{\sqrt{1-\lambda \gamma^{2}(T-t)}}
\end{aligned}
$$

Applying the above two propositions, we deduce the following sufficient condition.
Theorem 3.3 Let us suppose that there exists $\lambda \in\left(0, \frac{1}{\gamma^{2} T}\right)$ such that

$$
\mathbb{E}\left[\Psi_{\lambda}(\xi)\right]<+\infty
$$

Then

$$
\begin{equation*}
\underset{q \in \mathcal{A}}{\operatorname{ess} \sup }\left\{\mathbb{E}_{q}\left[e^{\beta(T-t)} \xi \mid \mathcal{F}_{t}\right]\right\}+\int_{t}^{T} e^{\beta(s-t)} \alpha_{s} d s \leq \bar{Y}_{t} \tag{3.6}
\end{equation*}
$$

with

$$
\bar{Y}_{t}=e^{\beta(T-t)}\left(\frac{1}{\sqrt{1-\lambda \gamma^{2}(T-t)}}+e^{\frac{2}{\lambda}} \mathbb{E}\left[\Psi_{\lambda}(\xi) \mid \mathcal{F}_{t}\right]\right)+\int_{t}^{T} e^{\beta(s-t)} \alpha_{s} d s
$$

and (2.2) admits a solution $(Y, Z)$ such that

$$
Y_{t} \leq \bar{Y}_{t}
$$

Proof. Applying the above two propositions, we deduce

$$
\begin{aligned}
\mathbb{E}_{q}\left[\xi \mid \mathcal{F}_{t}\right] & =\mathbb{E}\left[M_{T}^{q}\left(M_{t}^{q}\right)^{-1} \xi \mid \mathcal{F}_{t}\right] \leq \mathbb{E}\left[e^{\int_{t}^{T} q_{s} d W_{s}} \xi \mid \mathcal{F}_{t}\right] \\
& \leq \mathbb{E}\left[\Phi_{\lambda}\left(e^{\int_{t}^{T} q_{s} d W_{s}}\right) \mid \mathcal{F}_{t}\right]+e^{\frac{2}{\lambda}} \mathbb{E}\left[\Psi_{\lambda}(\xi) \mid \mathcal{F}_{t}\right] \\
& \leq \frac{1}{\sqrt{1-\lambda \gamma^{2}(T-t)}}+e^{\frac{2}{\lambda}} \mathbb{E}\left[\Psi_{\lambda}(\xi) \mid \mathcal{F}_{t}\right] .
\end{aligned}
$$

Then we get (3.6) and the rest follows from Theorem 2.1.

## 4 General Case

Consider the following BSDE:

$$
\begin{equation*}
Y_{t}=\xi+\int_{t}^{T} f\left(s, Y_{s}, Z_{s}\right) d s-\int_{t}^{T} Z_{s} d W_{s} \tag{4.7}
\end{equation*}
$$

where $f$ satisfies

$$
\begin{equation*}
|f(s, y, z)| \leq \alpha_{s}+\beta|y|+\gamma|z| \tag{4.8}
\end{equation*}
$$

with $\alpha \in L^{1}(0, T), \beta \geq 0$ and $\gamma>0$.
Theorem 4.1 Let $f$ be a generator which is continuous with respect to ( $y, z$ ) and verifies (4.8), and $\xi$ be a terminal condition. Let us suppose that there exists $\lambda \in\left(0, \frac{1}{\gamma^{2} T}\right)$ such that

$$
\mathbb{E}\left[\Psi_{\lambda}(|\xi|)\right]<+\infty .
$$

Then BSDE (4.7) admits a solution $(Y, Z)$ such that

$$
\left|Y_{t}\right| \leq e^{\beta(T-t)}\left(\frac{1}{\sqrt{1-\lambda \gamma^{2}(T-t)}}+e^{\frac{2}{\lambda} \mathbb{E}}\left[\Psi_{\lambda}(|\xi|) \mid \mathcal{F}_{t}\right]\right)+\int_{t}^{T} e^{\beta(s-t)} \alpha_{s} d s
$$

Proof. Let us fix $n \in \mathbb{N}^{*}$ and $p \in \mathbb{N}^{*}$ and set $\xi^{n, p}=\xi^{+} \wedge n-\xi^{-} \wedge p$. Let $\left(Y^{n, p}, Z^{n, p}\right)$ be the unique solution in $\mathcal{S}^{2} \times \mathcal{M}^{2}$ of the $\operatorname{BSDE}\left(\left|\xi^{n, p}\right|, f\right)$. Set

$$
\bar{f}(s, y, z)=\alpha_{s}+\beta y+\gamma|z|,
$$

and $\left(\bar{Y}^{n, p}, \bar{Z}^{n, p}\right)$ be the unique solution in $\mathcal{S}^{2} \times \mathcal{M}^{2}$ of the $\operatorname{BSDE}\left(\left|\xi^{n, p}\right|, \bar{f}\right)$.
By comparison theorem,

$$
\left|Y_{t}^{n, p}\right| \leq\left|\bar{Y}_{t}^{n, p}\right| .
$$

Setting $q_{s}^{n, p}=\gamma \operatorname{sgn}\left(Z_{s}^{n, p}\right)$, we obtain,

$$
\begin{aligned}
\left|Y_{t}^{n, p}\right| & \leq\left|\bar{Y}_{t}^{n, p}\right| \\
& =\mathbb{E}_{q^{n, p}}\left[e^{\beta(T-t)}\left|\xi^{n, p}\right| \mid \mathcal{F}_{t}\right]+\int_{t}^{T} e^{\beta(s-t)} \alpha_{s} d s .
\end{aligned}
$$

From inequality (3.6),

$$
\left|Y_{t}^{n, p}\right| \leq \bar{Y}_{t},
$$

with

$$
\bar{Y}_{t}=e^{\beta(T-t)}\left(\frac{1}{\sqrt{1-\lambda \gamma^{2}(T-t)}}+e^{\frac{2}{\lambda}} \mathbb{E}\left[\Psi_{\lambda}(|\xi|) \mid \mathcal{F}_{t}\right]\right)+\int_{t}^{T} e^{\beta(s-t)} \alpha_{s} d s
$$

Moreover, $Y^{n, p}$ is nondecreasing with respect to $n$, and nonincreasing with respect to $p$. Once again, we apply the localization method as follows to conclude the existence of solution.

Set

$$
\tau_{k}=T \wedge \inf \left\{t \geq 0: \bar{Y}_{t}>k\right\}
$$

and

$$
Y_{k}^{n, p}(t)=Y_{t \wedge \tau_{k}}^{n, p}, \quad Z_{k}^{n, p}(t)=Z_{t}^{n, p} \mathbf{1}_{t \leq \tau_{k}} .
$$

Then $\left(Y_{k}^{n, p}, Z_{k}^{n, p}\right)$ satisfies

$$
\begin{equation*}
Y_{k}^{n, p}(t)=Y_{k}^{n, p}(T)+\int_{t}^{T} \mathbf{1}_{s \leq \tau_{k}} f\left(s, Y_{k}^{n, p}(s), Z_{k}^{n, p}(s)\right) d s-\int_{t}^{T} Z_{k}^{n, p}(s) d W_{s} \tag{4.9}
\end{equation*}
$$

For fixed $k, Y_{k}^{n, p}$ is nondecreasing with respect to $n$ and nonincreasing with respect to $p$, and remains bounded by $k$. We can now apply the stability property of BSDEs with bounded terminal data. Setting $Y_{k}(t)=\inf _{p} \sup _{n} Y_{k}^{n, p}$, there exists $Z_{k}$ in $\mathcal{M}^{2}$ such that $\lim _{p} \lim _{n} Z_{k}^{n, p}=Z_{k}$ in $\mathcal{M}^{2}$ and

$$
\begin{equation*}
Y_{k}(t)=\inf _{p} \sup _{n} Y_{\tau_{k}}^{n, p}+\int_{t}^{\tau_{k}} f\left(s, Y_{k}(s), Z_{k}(s)\right) d s-\int_{t}^{\tau_{k}} Z_{k}(s) d W_{s} \tag{4.10}
\end{equation*}
$$

Finally, noting that

$$
Y_{k+1}\left(t \wedge \tau_{k}\right)=Y_{k}\left(t \wedge \tau_{k}\right), \quad Z_{k+1} \mathbf{1}_{t \leq \tau_{k}}=Z_{k} \mathbf{1}_{t \leq \tau_{k}}
$$

we conclude the existence of solution $(Y, Z)$.
