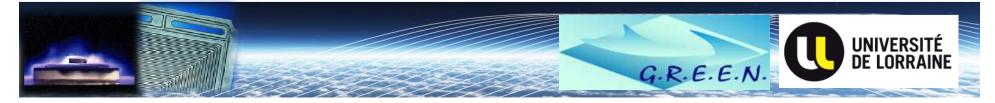


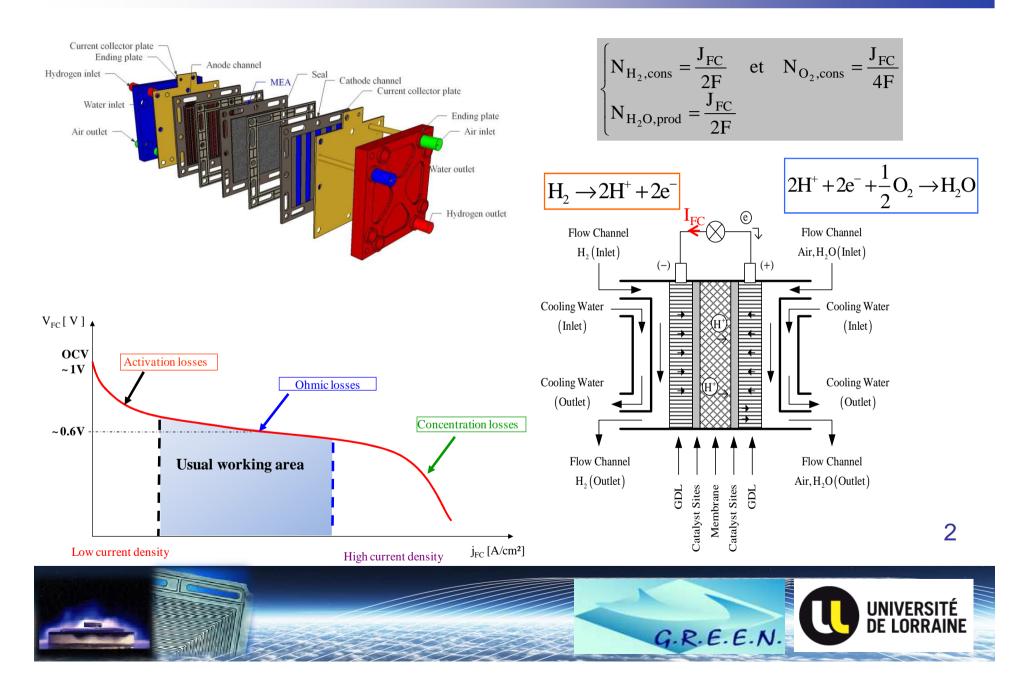

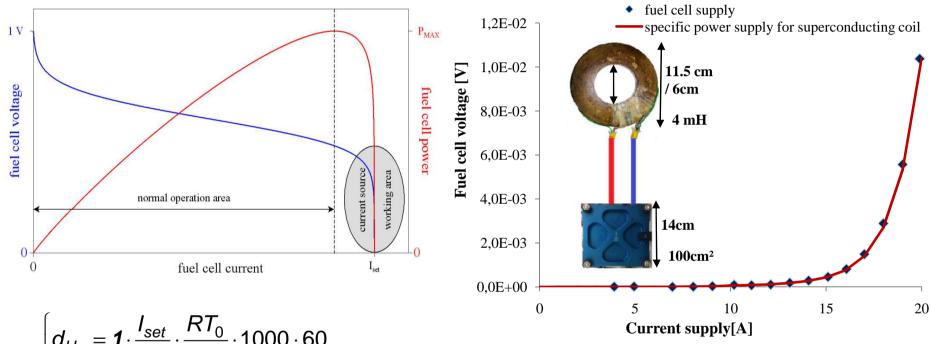
### **PEM single Fuel Cell**



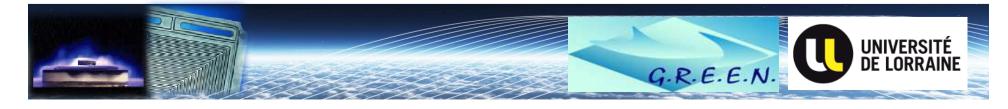
#### Use of a PEMFC as a current source

> Operating point :  $V_{FC} \rightarrow 0 V$ 

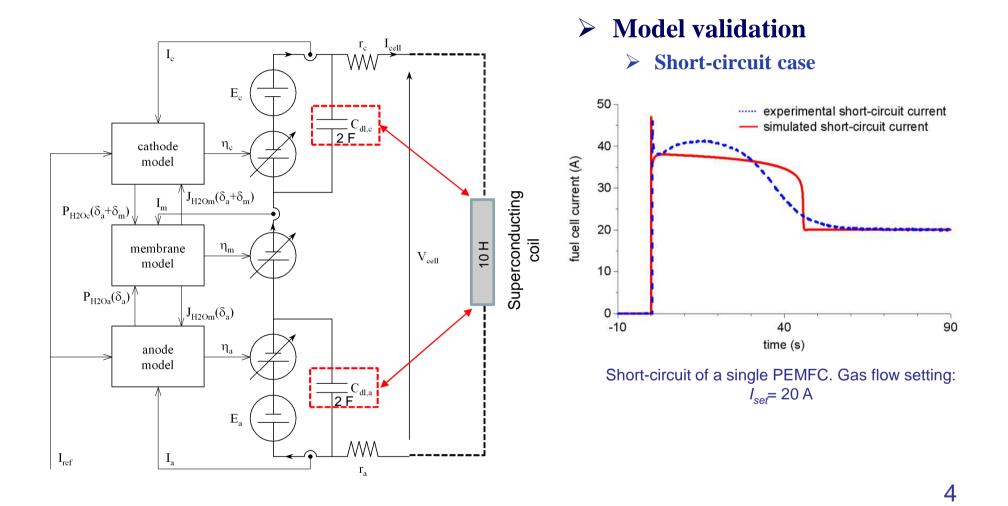
> 4 mH superconducting coil supplies



$$\begin{cases} d_{H_2} = \mathbf{1} \cdot \frac{I_{set}}{2F} \cdot \frac{RT_0}{P_0} \cdot 1000 \cdot 60 \\ d_{air} = 4 \cdot \frac{I_{set}}{4F} \cdot \frac{RT_0}{P_0} \cdot \frac{1}{0.21} \cdot 1000 \cdot 60 \end{cases}$$

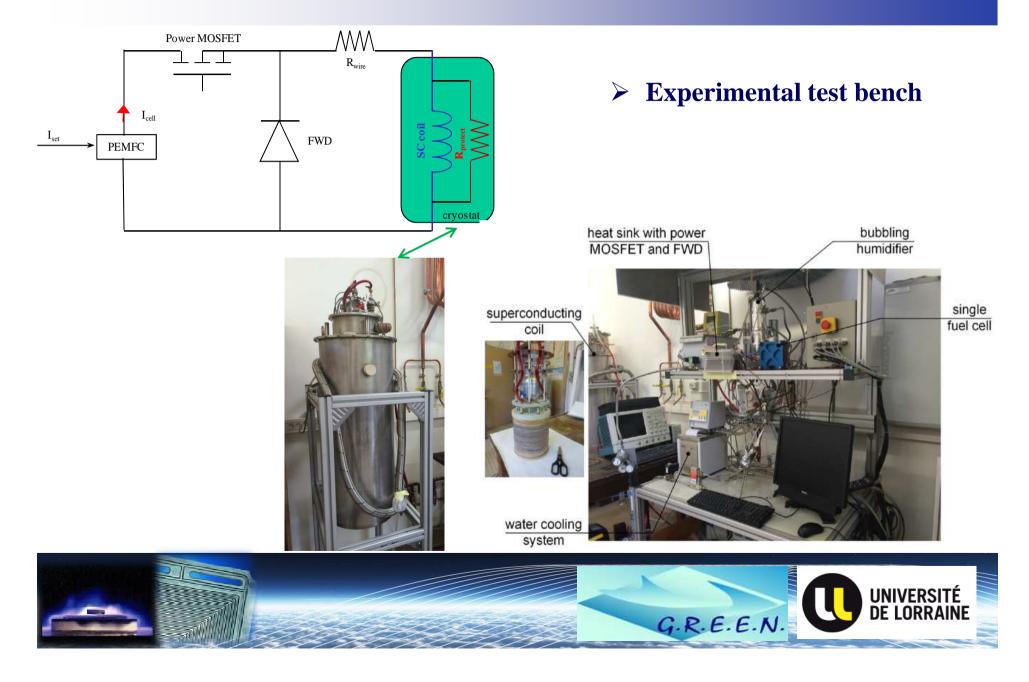


### **PEMFC** as a current source modelling



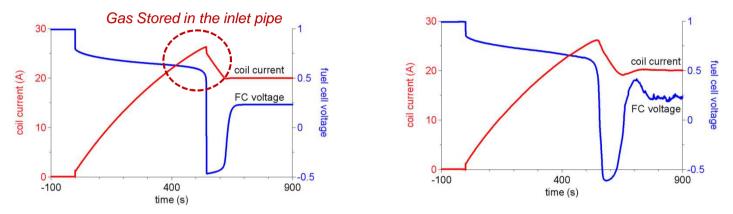


## **10H superconducting coil fed by a PEMFC**



# **PEMFC** supplies 10H SC

> Start feeding the SC at 20A

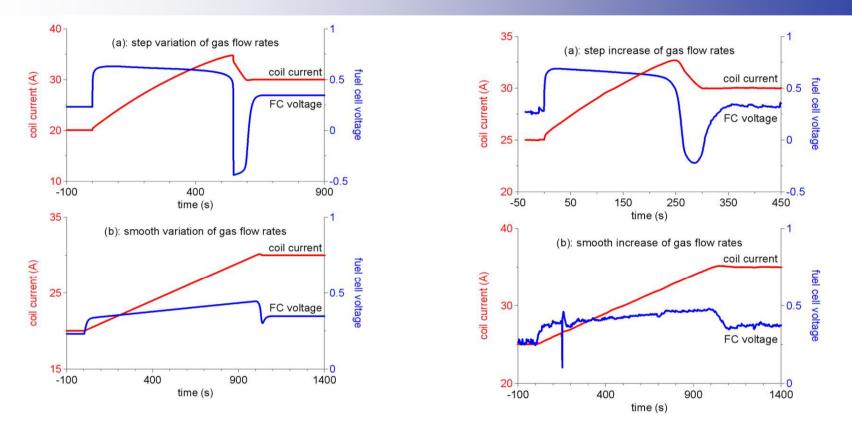


Simulated (left figure ) and experimental (right figure) coil current and FC voltage at switch turn-on. Gas flow setting:  $I_{set}$  = 20 A. FC supplied with gases before turn-on"

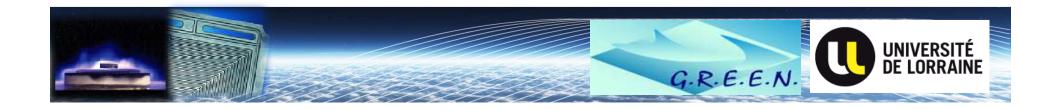
superconducting coil have to be connected together before feeding the fuel cell with reactant gases



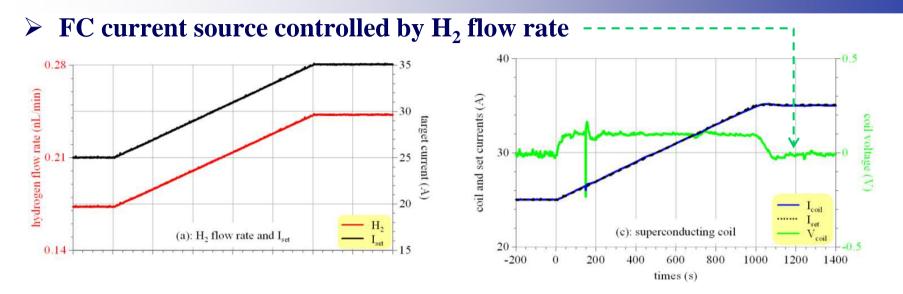
## **PEMFC** supplies 10H SC



Simulation and Experimental coil current and FC voltage for a step increase of gas flow rates from  $I_{set}$  = 25 A up to 10 A  $\Delta I_{set}$  =,  $dI_{set}/dt$  = 10 mA.s<sup>-1</sup>"



## Conclusions



- Simulation help to define requirements for an efficient current control by H<sub>2</sub> flow rate, as well as for FC safe operation
- Interest of such an application is to provide an electric current responding to superconducting device constraints:
  - Iow voltage DC current,
  - > free of harmonics or oscillations,
  - > independant from the grid, then not subject to grid power failures
