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Finite elements model of heat transfer predicts the edge vial effect in different freeze-drying configurations



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What is the "edge vial effect"?

During freeze-drying process, products in **vials located at the periphery of the shelf are** warmer and have an higher sublimation rate of about 15% compared to vials in the centre [1]. This phenomenon results from the combined effects of radiation from external sources (walls, rail) and conduction due to direct contact of the vial with the rail. Which are the consequences?

The "edge vial effect" results in different thermal histories among the vials and thus in a non-homogeneous final quality of the product.







Conclusions and perspective

✓ The developed model predicts the heat flow rate in edge and central vials in different freeze-drying configurations;

✓ The edge effect is less important if the edge vials are shielded by the rail but not in contact with it;

✓ The edge effect is more important at low shelf temperature and high chamber pressure (for a range of -10 to -35°C and 4 to 9Pa);
Pext step will involve the use of the model as smart tool to predict the "edge vial effect" in freeze-dryers at commercial scale.
