



## Finite elements model of heat transfer predicts the edge vial effect in different freeze-drying configurations

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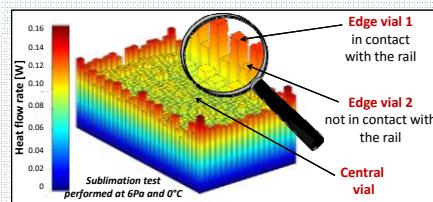
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## What is the “edge vial effect”?



### What is the “edge vial effect”?

During freeze-drying process, products in vials located at the periphery of the shelf are warmer and have an higher sublimation rate of about 15% compared to vials in the centre [1]. This phenomenon results from the combined effects of radiation from external sources (walls, rail) and conduction due to direct contact of the vial with the rail.

### Which are the consequences?

The “edge vial effect” results in different thermal histories among the vials and thus in a non-homogeneous final quality of the product.

## Mathematical model of heat transfer in freeze-drying

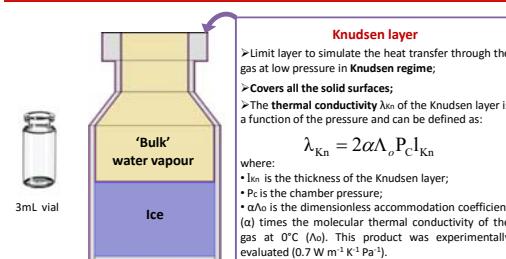
### Main hypotheses

- Pseudo-stationary state: all the heat received from the vial is used for ice sublimation;
- Constant ice thickness in the vials and flat ice-vapour interface;
- Pure water vapour in the drying chamber;
- Heat transfer by convection is negligible.

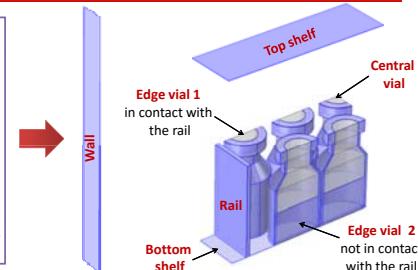
### Relevant parameters

Parameter	Symbol	Value
‘Bulk’ vapour conductivity	$\lambda_w$	0.025 [W m <sup>-1</sup> K <sup>-1</sup> ]
Knudsen layer conductivity	$\lambda_{Kn}$	2 10 <sup>-3</sup> P <sub>c</sub> [W m <sup>-1</sup> K <sup>-1</sup> ]
Depth of vial bottom curvature	$l_w$	0.1 [mm]
Knudsen layer thickness	$l_{Kn}$	0.1 [mm]

### Heat transfer in solid and gaseous bodies

$$\bar{q}_c = -\lambda_i \nabla T$$

- $\bar{q}_c$ : heat flux by conduction in the solid or gas [W m<sup>-2</sup>];
- $\lambda_i$ : thermal conductivity of the body material [W m<sup>-1</sup> K];
- $\nabla T$ : gradient of temperature [K].

### Heat transfer by contact conduction

$$q_{cc} = K_{cc} (T_1 - T_2)$$

- $q_{cc}$ : heat flux by contact conduction [W m<sup>-2</sup>];
- $K_{cc}$ : heat transfer coefficient of contact conduction [W m<sup>-2</sup> K];
- $T_1, T_2$ : temperatures of the bodies [K].

### Heat transfer by radiation

$$q_r = F_{1 \rightarrow 2} \sigma (T_1^4 - T_2^4)$$

- $q_r$ : heat flux by radiation [W m<sup>-2</sup>];
- $F_{1 \rightarrow 2}$ : visualization factor [-];
- $T_{1,2}$ : temperatures of the bodies [K];
- $\sigma$ : Stephan-Boltzmann constant [W m<sup>-2</sup> K<sup>-4</sup>].

### “Edge vial effect” in different freeze-drying configurations

#### A. Edge vials completely shielded by the rail

- Heat transfer by radiation from the wall to the rail;
- Heat transfer by contact conduction and radiation from the rail to the vials.

#### B. Edge vials partially shielded by the rail

- Heat transfer by radiation from the wall to the rail and vials;
- Heat transfer by contact conduction and radiation from the rail to the vials.

#### C. Edge vials completely exposed to the wall

- Heat transfer by radiation from the wall to the vials.

## Experimental procedure

### Gravimetric method

Fill the vials with 1.8ml of purified water...

...weigh them to evaluate the initial mass ( $m_1$ )...

...sublime dry them until 30% of ice is sublimed...

...re-weigh them to evaluate the final mass ( $m_2$ ).

Mass flow rate

$$\dot{m} = \frac{m_1 - m_2}{\text{sublimation time}}$$

$\dot{m}$ : mass flow rate [kg s<sup>-1</sup>].

$\Delta H$ : latent heat of sublimation [J kg<sup>-1</sup>].

Sublimation test

Freezing step: 2h at -50°C;

Ramp: 1°C/min;

Sublimation:

9Pa and -25°C for configuration A and C (MillRock freeze-dryer);

6Pa and -40°C and 0°C for configuration B (Aqua-Finn GT6 freeze-dryer).

Heat flow rate

$$\dot{Q} = \Delta H \dot{m}$$

$\dot{Q}$ : heat flow rate [J s<sup>-1</sup>].

Model validation

## Model validation

### Configuration A – vials fully shielded

Experimental data (red bars), Simulation (green bars)

T<sub>shelf</sub> = -25°C, P<sub>c</sub> = 9Pa

Heat flow rate [W]

Edge vial 1 (contact rail), Edge vial 2 (no contact rail), Central vial

### Configuration C – vials not shielded

Experimental data (red bars), Simulation (pink bars)

T<sub>shelf</sub> = -25°C, P<sub>c</sub> = 9Pa

Heat flow rate [W]

Edge vial 1, Edge vial 2, Central vial

### Configuration B – vials partially shielded

Experimental data (red bars), Simulation (blue bars)

T<sub>shelf</sub> = -40°C, P<sub>c</sub> = 6Pa

Heat flow rate [W]

Edge vial 1 (contact rail), Edge vial 2 (no contact rail), Central vial

## Virtual experiments

### Configuration A – vials fully shielded

Experimental data (green bars), Simulation (dark green bars)

T<sub>shelf</sub> = -10°C (top), -35°C (bottom)

Heat flow rate [W]

Edge vial 1 (contact rail), Edge vial 2 (no contact rail)

### Configuration B – vials partially shielded

Experimental data (blue bars), Simulation (dark blue bars)

T<sub>shelf</sub> = -10°C (top), -35°C (bottom)

Heat flow rate [W]

Edge vial 1 (contact rail), Edge vial 2 (no contact rail)

### Configuration C – vials not shielded

Experimental data (purple bars), Simulation (pink bars)

T<sub>shelf</sub> = -10°C (top), -35°C (bottom)

Heat flow rate [W]

Edge vial 1, Edge vial 2

Impact of the operating parameters

The heat flux difference between central and edge vials...

...is higher if the shelf temperature is lower (in a range of -10 to -25°C);

...is higher if the chamber pressure is higher (in a range of 4 to 9Pa).

Impact of the edge configuration

Configurations A and B are equivalent ( $\pm 5\%$ ) except at low shelf temperature (-35°C) and pressure (4Pa);

The best edge configuration appears to be the configuration A, in all the possible combination of operating parameters.

## Conclusions and perspective

- The developed model predicts the heat flow rate in edge and central vials in different freeze-drying configurations;
- The edge effect is less important if the edge vials are shielded by the rail but not in contact with it;

✓ The edge effect is more important at low shelf temperature and high chamber pressure (for a range of -10 to -35°C and 4 to 9Pa);

💡 Next step will involve the use of the model as smart tool to predict the “edge vial effect” in freeze-dryers at commercial scale.
