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LINK BETWEEN CYCLICITY OF A VECTOR IN ℓ^p SPACES AND ZERO SET OF ITS FOURIER TRANSFORM

ABSTRACT. We study the cyclicity of vectors u in $\ell^p(\mathbb{Z})$. It is known that a vector u is cyclic in $\ell^2(\mathbb{Z})$ if and only if the zero set, $\mathcal{Z}(\hat{u})$, of its Fourier transform, \hat{u} , has Lebesgue measure zero and $\log |\hat{u}| \notin L^1(\mathbb{T})$, where \mathbb{T} is the unit circle. Here we show that, unlike $\ell^2(\mathbb{Z})$, there is no characterization of the cyclicity of u in $\ell^p(\mathbb{Z})$, $1 , in terms of <math>\mathcal{Z}(\hat{u})$ and the divergence of the integral $\int_{\mathbb{T}} \log |\hat{u}|$. Moreover we give both necessary conditions and sufficient conditions for u to be cyclic in $\ell^p(\mathbb{Z})$, 1 .

1. INTRODUCTION AND MAIN RESULTS

In this paper we will study cyclic vector in ℓ^p spaces for $1 . A vector <math>u = (u_n)_{n \in \mathbb{Z}} \in \ell^p(\mathbb{Z})$ is called *cyclic* in $\ell^p(\mathbb{Z})$ if the linear span of $\{(u_{n-k})_{n \in \mathbb{Z}}, k \in \mathbb{N}\}$ is dense in $\ell^p(\mathbb{Z})$ and u is called *bicyclic* in $\ell^p(\mathbb{Z})$ if the linear span of $\{(u_{n-k})_{n \in \mathbb{Z}}, k \in \mathbb{Z}\}$ is dense in $\ell^p(\mathbb{Z})$. Note that the bicyclicity in this paper is defined as cyclicity in [13] and [14].

We denote by \mathbb{T} the unit circle of \mathbb{C} . The Fourier transform of $u = (u_n)_{n \in \mathbb{Z}} \in \ell^p(\mathbb{Z})$ is given by

$$\widehat{u}: \zeta \in \mathbb{T} \mapsto \sum_{n \in \mathbb{Z}} u_n \zeta^n$$

and we denote by $\mathcal{Z}(\hat{u})$ the zero set on \mathbb{T} of \hat{u} :

$$\mathcal{Z}(\widehat{u}) = \{ \zeta \in \mathbb{T}, \ \widehat{u}(\zeta) = 0 \}.$$

Note that if $u \in \ell^1(\mathbb{Z})$ then \hat{u} is continuous and $\mathcal{Z}(\hat{u})$ is well defined, while if $u \in \ell^2(\mathbb{Z})$ then $\hat{u} \in L^2(\mathbb{T})$ and $\mathcal{Z}(\hat{u})$ is defined modulo null sets.

Wiener showed in [18] that the bicyclicity of a sequence u in $\ell^1(\mathbb{Z})$ and $\ell^2(\mathbb{Z})$ is characterized in term of only $\mathcal{Z}(\hat{u})$: u is bicyclic in $\ell^1(\mathbb{Z})$ if and only if $\mathcal{Z}(\hat{u}) = \emptyset$ and u is bicyclic in $\ell^2(\mathbb{Z})$ if and only if $\mathcal{Z}(\hat{u})$ has Lebesgue measure zero. Wiener asked if the same phenomenon holds for $u \in \ell^p(\mathbb{Z})$, 1 .

Lev and Olevskii, in [14], answered this question negatively. We cannot characterize the bicyclicity of $u \in \ell^1(\mathbb{Z})$ in term of only the zero set of \hat{u} : for 1 there exist $<math>u, v \in \ell^1(\mathbb{Z})$ such that $\mathcal{Z}(\hat{u}) = \mathcal{Z}(\hat{v})$ and one is bicyclic in $\ell^p(\mathbb{Z})$ and the other is not. Here we consider a similar problem for cyclicity in $\ell^p(\mathbb{Z})$, 1 .

It follows from Wiener characterization about bicyclic vectors and Szegö infimum that a vector u is cyclic in $\ell^2(\mathbb{Z})$ if and only if $\mathcal{Z}(\hat{u})$ has Lebesgue measure zero and $\log |\hat{u}| \notin L^1(\mathbb{T})$ (see [16, Corollary 4.1.2, Theorem 4.1.4]). Furthermore when u is cyclic in $\ell^p(\mathbb{Z})$ then u is cyclic in $\ell^q(\mathbb{Z})$ for $q \geq p$. A direct consequence of this fact is that, for $u \in \ell^1(\mathbb{Z})$, if u is cyclic in $\ell^p(\mathbb{Z})$, $1 \leq p \leq 2$, then $\mathcal{Z}(\hat{u})$ has Lebesgue measure zero and $\log |\hat{u}| \notin L^1(\mathbb{T})$. It follows from this and Wiener characterization of bicyclic vectors in $\ell^1(\mathbb{Z})$ that there is no cyclic vectors in $\ell^1(\mathbb{Z})$ (see also [1] for a different proof).

The existence of cyclic vector on $\ell^p(\mathbb{Z})$, for p > 1, was established by Abakumov, Atzmon and Grivaux in [1, Corollary 1] in 2007. Note that this result was proved first by Olevskii in an unpublished manuscript in 1998 (see [1, Remark 1]).

We show that for sequences $u \in \ell^1(\mathbb{Z})$ such that $\log |\hat{u}| \notin L^1(\mathbb{T})$, there is no characterization of the cyclic vectors u in $\ell^p(\mathbb{Z})$ in term of only $\mathcal{Z}(\hat{u})$.

Theorem 1.1. Let 1 . The exist <math>u and v in $\ell^1(\mathbb{Z})$ such that $\mathcal{Z}(\hat{u}) = \mathcal{Z}(\hat{v})$, $\log |\hat{u}| \notin L^1(\mathbb{T})$, $\log |\hat{v}| \notin L^1(\mathbb{T})$, with u not cyclic in $\ell^p(\mathbb{Z})$ and v cyclic in $\ell^p(\mathbb{Z})$.

Until now we do not know more than the existence of cyclic vectors in $\ell^p(\mathbb{Z})$. Here we give, when \hat{u} is smooth, both necessary conditions and sufficient conditions for u to be cyclic in $\ell^p(\mathbb{Z})$, $1 and in a more general case: the weighted <math>\ell^p$ spaces. In particular this allows to construct explicit examples of cyclic vectors in weighted ℓ^p spaces. Here are some results that we get: for $u \in \ell^1(\mathbb{Z})$ and 1 ,

- if $\hat{u} \in C^{\infty}(\mathbb{T})$, dim $(\mathcal{Z}(\hat{u})) < 2(p-1)/p$ and log $|\hat{u}| \notin L^1(\mathbb{T})$ then u is cyclic in $\ell^p(\mathbb{Z})$,
- if $\hat{u} \in \operatorname{Lip}_{\delta}(\mathbb{T})$ for $\delta > 1/p 1/2$, $\dim(\mathcal{Z}(\hat{u})) < 2(p-1)/p$ and $\log(d(\cdot, \mathcal{Z}(\hat{u}))) \notin L^{1}(\mathbb{T})$ then u is cyclic in $\ell^{p}(\mathbb{Z})$,

where dim is the Hausdorff dimension (see [10, Chap II]), $d(\cdot, \mathcal{Z}(\hat{u}))$ is the euclidian distance to $\mathcal{Z}(\hat{u})$ and $f \in \text{Lip}_{\delta}(\mathbb{T})$ means that there exists C > 0

$$|f(\zeta) - f(\zeta')| \le C|\zeta - \zeta'|^{\delta}, \qquad \zeta, \zeta' \in \mathbb{T}.$$
(1.1)

Let E be a closed subset of \mathbb{T} . The set E is called a Carleson set if $\log d(\cdot, E) \in L^1(\mathbb{T})$. This condition is equivalent to E has a Lebesgue measure zero and $\sum_n |I_n| \log |I_n| > -\infty$, where (I_n) are the complementary intervals of E. Note that if $\hat{u} \in \operatorname{Lip}_{\delta}(\mathbb{T})$ such that $\mathcal{Z}(\hat{u})$ is not a Carleson set then $\log |\hat{u}| \notin L^1(\mathbb{T})$.

The paper is organized as follows: in section 2 we give preliminary results, in section 3 we prove Theoreme 1.1 and section 4 is devoted to establish both necessary conditions and sufficient conditions for cyclicity in weighted $\ell^p(\mathbb{Z})$.

We use the following notations:

- $A \leq B$ means that there is an absolute constant C such that $A \leq CB$.
- $A \simeq B$ if both $A \lesssim B$ and $B \lesssim A$.

2. Preliminaries

Let X be a topological linear space of complex functions on \mathbb{T} such that the shift operator S, given by

$$S(f)(\zeta) = \zeta f(\zeta)$$

is a topological isomorphism of X onto itself. Let $f \in X$ and $\Lambda \subset \mathbb{Z}$, we denote by $[f]_{\Lambda}^X$ the closed linear span of $\{z^n f, n \in \Lambda\}$. We say that $f \in X$ is *cyclic* in X if $[f]_{\mathbb{N}}^X = X$ and f is *bicyclic* in X if $[f]_{\mathbb{Z}}^X = X$. Note that f is cyclic in X if and only if f is bicyclic in X and $[f]_{\mathbb{N}}^X = [f]_{\mathbb{Z}}^X$. Moreover

$$[f]_{\mathbb{N}}^{X} = [f]_{\mathbb{Z}}^{X} \longleftrightarrow f \in [f]_{\mathbb{N}^{*}}^{X}$$

$$(2.1)$$

We denote by $\mathcal{P}(\mathbb{T})$ the set of trigonometric polynomials on \mathbb{T} and by $\mathcal{P}_+(\mathbb{T})$ the set of analytic polynomials on \mathbb{T} . Now we suppose, in addition, that X is a Banach space such that $\mathcal{P}(\mathbb{T})$ is dense in X. Then $f \in X$ is bicyclic in X if and only if there exists a sequence (P_n) of trigonometric polynomials such that

$$\lim_{n \to \infty} \|1 - P_n f\|_X = 0.$$
(2.2)

So we obtain, from this and (2.1), the following proposition:

Proposition 2.1. Let $f \in X$. The function f is cyclic in X if and only if there exist $P_n \in \mathcal{P}(\mathbb{T})$ and $Q_n \in \mathcal{P}_+(\mathbb{T})$ satisfying

$$\|1 - P_n f\|_X \xrightarrow[n \to \infty]{} 0 \quad and \quad \|f - zQ_n f\|_X \xrightarrow[n \to \infty]{} 0.$$

Now we study the weighted ℓ^p spaces. We denote by $\mathcal{D}'(\mathbb{T})$ the set of distributions on \mathbb{T} and $\mathcal{M}(\mathbb{T})$ the set of measures on \mathbb{T} . For $S \in \mathcal{D}'(\mathbb{T})$ and $n \in \mathbb{Z}$, we denote by $\widehat{S}(n)$ the *n*th Fourier coefficient of S defined by $\widehat{S}(n) = \langle S, z^{-n} \rangle$ and we write $S = \sum_{n \in \mathbb{Z}} \widehat{S}(n) z^n$. If $f \in L^1(\mathbb{T})$ we have

$$\widehat{f}(n) = \int_{\mathbb{T}} f(\zeta) \zeta^{-n} \frac{|d\zeta|}{2\pi}$$

For $p \geq 1$ and $\beta \in \mathbb{R}$, we define the Banach spaces

$$\ell^{p}_{\beta}(\mathbb{Z}) = \left\{ (u_{n})_{n \in \mathbb{Z}} \in \mathbb{C}^{\mathbb{Z}}, \ \|(u_{n})\|^{p}_{\ell^{p}_{\beta}} = \sum_{n \in \mathbb{Z}} |u_{n}|^{p} (1+|n|)^{p\beta} < \infty \right\}$$

and

$$A^p_{\beta}(\mathbb{T}) = \bigg\{ S \in \mathcal{D}'(\mathbb{T}), \ \|S\|^p_{A^p_{\beta}} = \sum_{n \in \mathbb{Z}} |\widehat{S}(n)|^p (1+|n|)^{p\beta} < \infty \bigg\}.$$

We will write $A^p(\mathbb{T})$ for the space $A^p_0(\mathbb{T})$ and $A(\mathbb{T})$ for the space $A^1(\mathbb{T})$ which is the Wiener algebra. The Fourier transformation is an isometric isomorphism between $\ell^p_\beta(\mathbb{Z})$ and $A^p_\beta(\mathbb{T})$ since for $S \in A^p_\beta(\mathbb{T})$ we have

$$||S||_{A^p_{\beta}} = ||(S(n))_{n \in \mathbb{Z}}||_{\ell^p_{\beta}}.$$

Moreover, for a sequence $(u_n)_{n\in\mathbb{Z}}$ and $k\in\mathbb{Z}$, we have $\widehat{(u_{n-k})} = z^k(\widehat{u_n})$, so u is cyclic in $\ell^p_\beta(\mathbb{Z})$ if and only if \widehat{u} is cyclic in $A^p_\beta(\mathbb{T})$. From now we will state and prove our results in $A^p_\beta(\mathbb{T})$. Note that if $1 \le p \le 2$ and $\beta \ge 0$, $A^p_\beta(\mathbb{T})$ is a subset $L^2(\mathbb{T})$.

For $1 \leq p < \infty$ and $\beta \geq 0$ we define the product of $f \in A^1_\beta(\mathbb{T})$ and $S \in A^p_\beta(\mathbb{T})$ by

$$fS = \sum_{n \in \mathbb{Z}} \left(\sum_{k \in \mathbb{Z}} \widehat{f}(k) \widehat{S}(n-k) \right) z^n,$$

and we see that $\|fS\|_{A^p_\beta} \le \|f\|_{A^1_\beta} \|S\|_{A^p_\beta}$.

The following lemmas gives us different inclusions between the $A^p_{\beta}(\mathbb{T})$ spaces.

Lemma 2.2 ([13]). Let $1 \leq r, s < \infty$ and $\beta, \gamma \in \mathbb{R}$.

(1) If $r \leq s$ then $A_{\beta}^{r}(\mathbb{T}) \subset A_{\gamma}^{s}(\mathbb{T}) \iff \gamma \leq \beta$. (2) If r > s then $A_{\beta}^{r}(\mathbb{T}) \subset A_{\gamma}^{s}(\mathbb{T}) \iff \beta - \gamma > \frac{1}{s} - \frac{1}{r}$.

For $p \neq 1$, the dual space of $A^p_{\beta}(\mathbb{T})$ can be identified with $A^q_{-\beta}(\mathbb{T})$ $(q = \frac{p}{p-1})$ by the following formula

$$\langle S,T\rangle = \sum_{n\in\mathbb{Z}}\widehat{S}(n)\widehat{T}(-n), \qquad S\in A^p_\beta(\mathbb{T}), \ T\in A^q_{-\beta}(\mathbb{T}).$$

We denote by $\operatorname{supp}(S)$ the support of the distribution S and $\mathcal{Z}(f)$ the zero set of the function f. For $\delta \geq 0$ we recall that $\operatorname{Lip}_{\delta}(\mathbb{T})$ denote the set of functions f defined on \mathbb{T} which satisfies (1.1).

We need the following proposition which gives a necessary condition for a function $f \in \text{Lip}_{\delta}(\mathbb{T})$ to be bicyclic in $A^{p}(\mathbb{T})$.

Proposition 2.3 ([8]). Let 1 , <math>q = p/(p-1) and $f \in A(\mathbb{T})$. If there exists $\delta > 0$ such that $f \in \operatorname{Lip}_{\delta}(\mathbb{T})$ and if there exists $S \in A^q(\mathbb{T}) \setminus \{0\}$ such that $\operatorname{supp}(S) \subset \mathcal{Z}(f)$ then f is not bicyclic in $A^p(\mathbb{T})$.

3. NO CHARACTERIZATION OF CYCLICITY IN TERMS OF ZERO SET

The following Theorem is a reformulation of Theorem 1.1 in $A^p(\mathbb{T})$.

Theorem 3.1. Let 1 . There exist <math>f and g in $A(\mathbb{T})$ such that $\mathcal{Z}(f) = \mathcal{Z}(g)$, $\log |f| \notin L^1(\mathbb{T})$, $\log |g| \notin L^1(\mathbb{T})$ with f not cyclic in $A^p(\mathbb{T})$ and g cyclic in $A^p(\mathbb{T})$.

For the proof we need some notations and definitions. Let

$$\mathcal{I}_1 = \{ f \in A(\mathbb{T}), \ f(1) = 0 \}$$

and \mathcal{J}_1 the closure in $A(\mathbb{T})$ of the set

$$\{f \in A(\mathbb{T}), \ 1 \notin \operatorname{supp}(f)\}\$$

Since {1} is a set of synthesis (see [10, Theorem IV] p. 123 or [7, Appendix 3] pp. 416-418), we have $\mathcal{I}_1 = \mathcal{J}_1$. Contrary to the space $A(\mathbb{T})$, \mathcal{I}_1 admits cyclic vectors. Moreover, by [1, Proposition 2], the set of cyclic vectors in \mathcal{I}_1 is a dense G_{δ} subset of \mathcal{I}_1 .

Lemma 3.2. Let $f \in \mathcal{I}_1$. If f is cyclic in \mathcal{I}_1 then f is cyclic in $A^p(\mathbb{T})$ for all p > 1.

Proof. Let $f \in \mathcal{I}_1$ cyclic in \mathcal{I}_1 and $\varepsilon > 0$. We denote h_k , for $k \in \mathbb{N}^*$, the function defined on \mathbb{T} by

$$h_k(z) = \frac{z-1}{z-1-1/k}.$$

Cleary $h_k \in \mathcal{I}_1$. Moreover for $z \in \mathbb{T}$,

$$h_k(z) = 1 - \frac{1}{k+1} \sum_{n=0}^{\infty} \frac{z^n}{(1+1/k)^n}.$$

Thus for p > 1, we have

$$\begin{aligned} \|1 - h_k\|_{A^p}^p &= \frac{1}{(k+1)^p} \sum_{n=0}^{\infty} \frac{1}{(1+1/k)^{pn}} \\ &= \frac{1}{(k+1)^p} \frac{1}{1 - \frac{1}{(1+1/k)^p}} \\ &= \frac{1}{(k+1)^p - k^p} \underset{k \to \infty}{\sim} \frac{1}{pk^{p-1}} \end{aligned}$$

So for fixed p > 1, we choose $k \in \mathbb{N}^*$ such that $||1 - h_k||_{A^p} < \varepsilon$. Since f is cyclic in \mathcal{I}_1 , there exist P and Q in $\mathcal{P}_+(\mathbb{T})$ such that

$$\|h_k - Pf\|_{A^1} < \varepsilon \quad \text{et} \quad \|f - zQf\|_{A^1} < \varepsilon.$$

We obtain that $||f - zQf||_{A^p} < \varepsilon$ and

$$|1 - Pf||_{A^p} \le ||1 - h_k||_{A^p} + ||h_k - Pf||_{A^1} < 2\varepsilon.$$

This proves, by proposition 2.1, that f is cyclic in $A^p(\mathbb{T})$ for all p > 1.

To prove our main Theorem of this section, we need to introduce the notion of Helson sets.

Definition 3.3 ([10], Chap XI). A compact set $K \subset \mathbb{T}$ is called a Helson set if it satisfies any one of the following equivalent conditions:

(i) if $f \in \mathcal{C}(K)$ then there exists $g \in A(\mathbb{T})$ such that $g|_K = f$,

(ii) there exists $\delta_1 > 0$ such that for all $\mu \in \mathcal{M}(\mathbb{T})$ satisfying $\operatorname{supp}(\mu) \subset K$ we have

$$\sup_{n\in\mathbb{Z}} |\hat{\mu}(n)| \ge \delta_1 \int_{\mathbb{T}} |\mathrm{d}\mu|,$$

(iii) there exists $\delta_2 > 0$ such that for all $\mu \in \mathcal{M}(\mathbb{T})$ satisfying $\operatorname{supp}(\mu) \subset K$ we have

$$\limsup_{|n| \to \infty} |\hat{\mu}(n)| \ge \delta_2 \int_{\mathbb{T}} |\mathrm{d}\mu|$$

By (*iii*), a Helson set does not support any non zero measure μ such that $\hat{\mu}(n) \to 0$ as $|n| \to \infty$. On the other hand Körner shows , in [12], that there exists a Helson set which support a non zero distribution S such that $\hat{S}(n) \to 0$ as $|n| \to \infty$ (see also Kaufman in [11] for a simple proof). Lev and Olevskii extend significantly this result by showing the following Theorem which is the key of their result about bicyclicity in $\ell^p(\mathbb{Z})$.

Theorem 3.4 ([14], Theorem 3). For q > 2, there exists a Helson set K which supports a non-zero distribution $S \in A^q(\mathbb{T})$.

We need also the following lemma obtained by Lev and Olevskii.

Lemma 3.5 ([14], Lemma 10). Let K be a Helson set. For $\varepsilon > 0$, p > 1 and $f \in \mathcal{C}(K)$, there exists $g \in A(\mathbb{T})$ such that

$$\begin{cases} g|_{K} = f, \\ ||g||_{A^{1}} \leq \frac{1}{\delta_{2}} ||f||_{\infty}, \\ ||g||_{A^{p}} < \varepsilon \end{cases}$$

where δ_2 is a constant which satisfies (iii) in the definition 3.3.

The main result, Theorem 3.1, is a consequence of the following Theorem which is an analogue of Lev and Olevskii result.

Theorem 3.6. Let K be a Helson set on \mathbb{T} . There exists $g \in A(\mathbb{T})$ such that g vanishes on K and such that g is cyclic in $A^p(\mathbb{T})$ for all p > 1.

Proof. Let K be a Helson set on \mathbb{T} . We define

$$\mathcal{I}(K) = \{ g \in A(\mathbb{T}), \ g|_K = 0 \}$$

which, endowed with the norm $\|\cdot\|_{A^1}$, is a Banach space. We define

 $\mathcal{G}(K) = \{ g \in \mathcal{I}(K), g \text{ is cyclic in } A^p(\mathbb{T}), \forall p > 1 \}.$

We will show that $\mathcal{G}(K)$ is a dense G_{δ} subset of $\mathcal{I}(K)$. For $\varepsilon > 0$ and p > 1, we consider the set

 $G(\varepsilon, p) = \{g \in \mathcal{I}(K), \exists P \in \mathcal{P}(\mathbb{T}), \exists Q \in \mathcal{P}_+(\mathbb{T}), \|1 - Pg\|_{A^p} < \varepsilon \text{ and } \|g - zQg\|_{A^p} < \varepsilon \}.$ Let $\varepsilon_n = \frac{1}{n}$ and $p_n = 1 + \frac{1}{n}$. To use a Baire Category argument, we will show that

(i)
$$\bigcap_{n=1}^{\infty} G(\varepsilon_n, p_n) = \mathcal{G}(K)$$

(ii) For $\varepsilon > 0$ and $p > 1$, $G(\varepsilon, p)$ is an open subset of $\mathcal{I}(K)$
(iii) For $\varepsilon > 0$ and $p > 1$, $G(\varepsilon, p)$ is a dense subset of $\mathcal{I}(K)$.

(i): Let $g \in \mathcal{I}(K)$ such that for all $n \in \mathbb{N}^*$ there exist $P_n \in \mathcal{P}(\mathbb{T})$ and $Q_n \in \mathcal{P}_+(\mathbb{T})$ satisfying $\|1 - P_n g\|_{A^{p_n}} < \varepsilon_n$ and $\|g - zQ_n g\|_{A^{p_n}} < \varepsilon_n$. Since for all p > 1, there exists N such that for all $n \ge N$ we have $p > p_n$,

$$\|1 - P_n g\|_{A^p} \le \|1 - P_n g\|_{A^{p_n}} < \varepsilon_n \to 0, \qquad n \to \infty$$

and

$$\|g - zQ_ng\|_{A^p} \le \|g - zQ_ng\|_{A^{p_n}} < \varepsilon_n \to 0, \qquad n \to \infty$$

By proposition 2.1, g is cyclic in $A^p(\mathbb{T})$ for all p > 1 and thus we have $g \in \mathcal{G}(K)$. The other inclusion is clear.

(*ii*) follows from the fact that, for $f \in A(\mathbb{T})$ and $g \in A^p(\mathbb{T})$,

$$||fg||_{A^p} \le ||f||_{A^1} ||g||_{A^p}.$$

(iii): Let $g_0 \in \mathcal{I}(K)$. We will show that for all $\eta > 0$, there exists $g \in G(\varepsilon, p)$ such that $||g - g_0||_{A^1} < \eta$. Without loss of generality, we suppose $1 \in K$. So we have $g_0 \in \mathcal{I}_1$. Since K is a Helson set, we consider δ_2 the constant satisfying the condition (iii) of Definition 3.3. Since the set of cyclic vectors in \mathcal{I}_1 is dense in \mathcal{I}_1 (see [1]), there exists a function h cyclic in \mathcal{I}_1 such that

$$||h - g_0||_{A^1} < \frac{\delta_2}{1 + \delta_2} \eta.$$

Hence for all $t \in K$,

$$|h(t)| = |h(t) - g_0(t)| \le ||h - g_0||_{\infty} \le ||h - g_0||_{A^1} < \frac{\delta_2}{1 + \delta_2}\eta.$$

Since h is cylcic in \mathcal{I}_1 , by lemma 3.2, h is also cyclic in $A^p(\mathbb{T})$. By proposition 2.1, there exist $P \in \mathcal{P}(\mathbb{T})$ and $Q \in \mathcal{P}_+(\mathbb{T})$ satisfying $||1 - Ph||_{A^p} < \frac{\varepsilon}{2}$ and $||h - zQh||_{A^p} < \frac{\varepsilon}{2}$. By Lemma 3.5, there exists $f \in A(\mathbb{T})$ satisfying

$$\begin{cases} f|_{K} = h|_{K} \\ \|f\|_{A^{1}} \leq \frac{\|h|_{K}\|_{\infty}}{\delta_{2}} < \frac{\eta}{1+\delta_{2}} \\ \|f\|_{A^{p}} < \min\left(\frac{\varepsilon}{2\|P\|_{A^{1}}}, \frac{\varepsilon}{2\|1-zQ\|_{A^{1}}}\right) \end{cases}$$

Let g = h - f. We have $g \in \mathcal{I}(K)$ since $f|_K = h|_K$. Moreover $g \in G(\varepsilon, p)$ since

$$||1 - Pg||_{A^p} \le ||1 - Ph||_{A^p} + ||P||_{A^1} ||f||_{A^p} < \varepsilon$$

and

$$||g - zQg||_{A^p} \le ||h - zQh||_{A^p} + ||1 - zQ||_{A^1} ||f||_{A^p} < \varepsilon.$$

Finaly we have

$$||g - g_0||_{A^1} \le ||h - g_0||_{A^1} + ||f||_{A^1} < \frac{\delta_2}{1 + \delta_2}\eta + \frac{\eta}{1 + \delta_2} < \eta.$$

Hence $G(\varepsilon, p)$ is a dense subset of $\mathcal{I}(K)$.

By Baire Category argument, $\bigcap_{n=1}^{\infty} G(\varepsilon_n, p_n)$ is a dense G_{δ} subset of $\mathcal{I}(K)$. In particular $\mathcal{G}(K)$ is not empty.

Proof. (of Theorem 3.1) Let K be a Helson set given by Theorem 3.4. By Theorem 3.6, there exists $g \in A(\mathbb{T})$ such that g vanishes on K and such that g is cyclic in $A^p(\mathbb{T})$. This implie in particular that $\log |g| \notin L^1(\mathbb{T})$. Moreover there exists $f \in C^1(\mathbb{T})$ such that $\mathcal{Z}(f) = \mathcal{Z}(g)$ and $\log |f| \notin L^1(\mathbb{T})$ (take $f(\zeta) = e^{-1/d(\zeta, \mathcal{Z}(g))}$ if $\zeta \notin \mathcal{Z}(g)$ and 0 otherwise). By Proposition 2.3 and Theorem 3.4, f is not bicyclic in $A^p(\mathbb{T})$ so not cyclic in $A^p(\mathbb{T})$. \Box

4. Cyclicity in weighted l^p spaces

In the following we denote q = p/(p-1). This section is devoted to give both necessary conditions and sufficient conditions for f to be cyclic in $A^p_\beta(\mathbb{T})$, when f is smooth, for $1 and <math>0 \leq \beta q \leq 1$. When $\beta q > 1$, there is no cyclic vector in $A^p_\beta(\mathbb{T})$. Indeed, for $1 \leq p < \infty$ and $\beta \geq 0$, $A^p_\beta(\mathbb{T})$ is a Banach algebra of continuous functions if and only if $\beta q > 1$ (see [6]). So, if f is cyclic in $A^p_\beta(\mathbb{T})$, when $\beta q > 1$, then $\mathcal{Z}(f) = \emptyset$ and $\log |f| \notin L^1(\mathbb{T})$ which is impossible since f is continuous. In particular the conditions obtained in this section allow to construct explicit examples of cyclic vectors. We also study the density of the set of cyclic vectors in weighted $\ell^p(\mathbb{Z})$.

4.1. Conditions for the cyclicity. We denote H^{∞} the space of functions $f \in L^{\infty}(\mathbb{T})$ satisfying $\hat{f}(n) = 0$ for all n < 0. It is well known that H^{∞} can be identified with the space of bounded holomorphic functions on the disk $\mathbb{D} = \{z \in \mathbb{C}, |z| < 1\}$. Recall that outer functions are given by

$$f(z) = \exp \int_{\mathbb{T}} \frac{\zeta + z}{\zeta - z} \log \varphi(\zeta) \frac{|d\zeta|}{2\pi}, \qquad (z \in \mathbb{D}),$$

where φ is a positive function such that $\log \varphi \in L^1(\mathbb{T})$. Note that the radial limit of f, noted also by f, exists a.e. and $|f| = \varphi$ a.e. on \mathbb{T} .

Proposition 4.1. Let $1 , <math>\beta \ge 0$ and $f \in A^2_{\alpha}(\mathbb{T})$ with $\alpha > 1/p - 1/2 + \beta$. The following are equivalent.

 $(1) \ [f]_{\mathbb{N}}^{A_{\beta}^{p}(\mathbb{T})} = [f]_{\mathbb{Z}}^{A_{\beta}^{p}(\mathbb{T})}$ $(2) \ \inf\left\{\|Pf\|_{A_{\beta}^{p}}, \ P \in H^{\infty}, \ Pf \in A_{\alpha}^{2}(\mathbb{T}), \ P(0) = 1\right\} = 0$

Note that, by Lemma 2.2, $\alpha > 1/p - 1/2 + \beta$ implies that $A^2_{\alpha}(\mathbb{T}) \subset A^p_{\beta}(\mathbb{T})$.

Proof. We suppose first $[f]_{\mathbb{N}}^{A_{\beta}^{p}(\mathbb{T})} = [f]_{\mathbb{Z}}^{A_{\beta}^{p}(\mathbb{T})}$. By proposition 2.1, there exists $P_{n} \in \mathcal{P}_{+}(\mathbb{T})$ such that $\lim \|f - zP_{n}f\|_{A_{\beta}^{p}} = 0$ as $n \to \infty$. Since $1 - zP_{n} \in H^{\infty}$, we have

$$\inf \left\{ \|Pf\|_{A^p_{\beta}}, \ P \in H^{\infty}, \ Pf \in A^2_{\alpha}(\mathbb{T}), \ P(0) = 1 \right\} = 0.$$

Now suppose that (2) holds. Let $P_n \in H^{\infty}$, for $n \in \mathbb{N}$, such that $P_n(0) = 1$, $P_n f \in A^2_{\alpha}(\mathbb{T})$ and $\lim \|P_n f\|_{A^p_{\beta}} = 0$ as $n \to \infty$. We write $P_n = 1 - zQ_n$ with $Q_n \in H^{\infty}$. So we have, $\lim \|zQ_n f - f\|_{A^p_{\beta}} = 0$. Recall that $[f]^{A^p_{\beta}(\mathbb{T})}_{\mathbb{N}^*} = [f]^{A^p_{\beta}(\mathbb{T})}_{\mathbb{Z}}$ holds if and only if $f \in [f]^{A^p_{\beta}(\mathbb{T})}_{\mathbb{N}^*}$. Thus it suffices to show that $zQ_n f \in [f]^{A^p_{\beta}(\mathbb{T})}_{\mathbb{N}^*}$ since $[f]^{A^p_{\beta}(\mathbb{T})}_{\mathbb{N}^*}$ is a closed subset of $A^p_{\beta}(\mathbb{T})$. Note that $zQ_n f \in A^2_{\alpha}(\mathbb{T})$ since $P_n f$ and f are in $A^2_{\alpha}(\mathbb{T})$. So we will show the following claim : if $Q \in H^{\infty}$ verifies $zQf \in A^2_{\alpha}(\mathbb{T})$ then $zQf \in [f]^{A^p_{\beta}(\mathbb{T})}_{\mathbb{N}^*}$.

We note, for 0 < r < 1, $Q_r(z) = Q(rz)$. We have $zQ_r f \in [f]_{\mathbb{N}^*}^{A^p_\beta(\mathbb{T})}$ since for all $\varepsilon > 0$, there exists $\tilde{Q}_r \in \mathcal{P}_+(\mathbb{T})$ such that $\|Q_r - \tilde{Q}_r\|_{A^1_\beta} < \varepsilon$ and $\|zQ_r f - z\tilde{Q}_r f\|_{A^p_\beta} \leq \|Q_r - Q_r\|_{A^p_\beta}$ $\tilde{Q}_r\|_{A^1_{\beta}}\|zf\|_{A^p_{\beta}} < \varepsilon \|zf\|_{A^p_{\beta}}$. Moreover, by the Hahn-Banach theorem, $[f]^{A^p_{\beta}(\mathbb{T})}_{\mathbb{N}^*}$ is weakly closed in $A^p_{\beta}(\mathbb{T})$. So it suffices to show that $zQ_rf \to zQf$ weakly in $A^p_{\beta}(\mathbb{T})$ as $r \to 1$. Let $g \in A^q_{-\beta}(\mathbb{T})$ with 1/p + 1/q = 1. There exists a sequence (g_n) in $\mathcal{P}(\mathbb{T})$ such that $\lim \|g - g_n\|_{A^q_{-\beta}} = 0$, as $n \to \infty$. So we have

$$\begin{aligned} |\langle zQ_rf - zQf, g\rangle| &\leq |\langle zQ_rf - zQf, g - g_n\rangle| + |\langle zQ_rf - zQf, g_n\rangle| \\ &\leq ||zQ_rf - zQf||_{A^p_\beta} ||g - g_n||_{A^q_{-\beta}} + \\ &\left| \int_{\mathbb{T}} (zQ_rf - zQf)(\zeta)g_n(\zeta)|d\zeta| \right|. \end{aligned}$$

Since $||zQ_r f - zQf||_{A^p_\beta} \leq ||zQ_r f - zQf||_{A^2_\alpha}$, we can show, with the same calculus that in [17, proposition 3.4] and [4], that $||zQ_r f - zQf||_{A^p_\beta}$ remains bounded as $r \to 1$. Moreover $||g - g_n||_{A^q_{-\beta}} \to 0$ and, by the dominated convergence theorem, $\int_{\mathbb{T}} |(zQ_r f - zQf)(\zeta)g_n(\zeta)||d\zeta| \to 0$ as $r \to 1$ since $f \in L^1(\mathbb{T})$. So $zQ_r f \to zQf$ weakly in $A^p_\beta(\mathbb{T})$ as $r \to 1$ and $zQf \in [f]^{A^p_\beta(\mathbb{T})}_{\mathbb{N}^*}$. This completes the proof.

We also need the following lemma.

Lemma 4.2 ([2] pp. 7-8). Let E be a closed subset of \mathbb{T} with Lebesgue measure zero and such that $\log(d(\cdot, E)) \notin L^1(\mathbb{T})$. Let $\delta' > 1/2$ and $\gamma > 0$ such that $2\delta' - \gamma - 1 \ge 0$. Let F_{ε} be the outer function F_{ε} satisfying

$$|F_{\varepsilon}(\zeta)| = (d(\zeta, E)^{\gamma} + \varepsilon)^{1/2}$$
 a.e. on \mathbb{T}

and

$$M_{\varepsilon} = \frac{1}{2} \int_{\mathbb{T}} \log\left(\frac{1}{d(\zeta, E)^{\gamma} + \varepsilon}\right) d\zeta.$$

For all $\varepsilon > 0$ we have

$$\iint_{\mathbb{T}^2} d(\zeta', E)^{2(\delta'-\gamma)} \frac{|F_{\varepsilon}(\zeta) - F_{\varepsilon}(\zeta')|^2}{|\zeta - \zeta'|^2} |d\zeta| |d\zeta'| \lesssim M_{\varepsilon}.$$

The following result was obtained in [2] for p = 2 and $\beta = 1/2$.

Theorem 4.3. Let $1 and <math>\beta > 0$ such that $\beta q < 1$. Let $f \in Lip_{\delta}(\mathbb{T})$, where $\delta > \beta + 1/p - 1/2$. We suppose that $\mathcal{Z}(f)$ has Lebesgue measure zero. If

$$\int_{\mathbb{T}} \log d(\zeta, \mathcal{Z}(f)) |d\zeta| = -\infty$$

then

$$[f]_{\mathbb{Z}}^{A^p_{\beta}(\mathbb{T})} = [f]_{\mathbb{N}}^{A^p_{\beta}(\mathbb{T})}.$$

Furthermore, if dim $(\mathcal{Z}(f)) < \frac{2}{q}(1-\beta q)$ then f is cyclic in $A^p_\beta(\mathbb{T})$.

Proof. Let $\alpha > 0$ such that $\beta + 1/p - 1/2 < \alpha < \min(\delta, 1/2)$. First we have $f \in \operatorname{Lip}_{\delta}(\mathbb{T}) \subset A^{2}_{\alpha}(\mathbb{T}) \subset A^{p}_{\beta}(\mathbb{T})$. Indeed by Dougla's formula (see [17, section 5]), $f \in A^{2}_{\alpha}(\mathbb{T})$ if and only if $f \in L^{2}(\mathbb{T})$ and

$$\mathcal{D}_{\alpha}(f) = \iint_{\mathbb{T}^2} \frac{|f(\zeta) - f(\zeta')|^2}{|\zeta - \zeta'|^{1+2\alpha}} |d\zeta| |d\zeta'| < \infty.$$

Moreover we have

$$\|f\|_{A^{2}_{\alpha}}^{2} \asymp \|f\|_{L^{2}(\mathbb{T})}^{2} + \mathcal{D}_{\alpha}(f).$$
(4.1)

Thus if $f \in \operatorname{Lip}_{\delta}(\mathbb{T})$ then

$$\mathcal{D}_{\alpha}(f) \lesssim \iint_{\mathbb{T}^2} \frac{1}{|\zeta - \zeta'|^{1+2\alpha - 2\delta}} |d\zeta| |d\zeta'| < \infty$$

and we get $f \in A^2_{\alpha}(\mathbb{T})$. On the other hand, by proposition 2.2, we have $A^2_{\alpha}(\mathbb{T}) \subset A^p_{\beta}(\mathbb{T})$.

By proposition 4.1, it suffices to show that

$$\inf \left\{ \|Pf\|_{A^{p}_{\beta}}, \ P \in H^{\infty}, \ Pf \in A^{2}_{\alpha}(\mathbb{T}), \ P(0) = 1 \right\} = 0$$

to complete the proof. Let $\varepsilon > 0$ and $\gamma > 0$ such that $\gamma < \delta - \alpha$. We define p_{ε} to be the outer function satisfying

$$|p_{\varepsilon}(\zeta)| = \frac{e^{-M_{\varepsilon}}}{(d(\zeta, E)^{\gamma} + \varepsilon)^{1/2}} \qquad a.e$$

where $E = \mathcal{Z}(f)$ and

$$M_{\varepsilon} = \frac{1}{2} \int_{\mathbb{T}} \log\left(\frac{1}{d(\zeta, E)^{\gamma} + \varepsilon}\right) |d\zeta|$$

so that $p_{\varepsilon}(0) = 1$. Since $\log d(\cdot, E) \notin L^1(\mathbb{T}), M_{\varepsilon} \to \infty$ as $\varepsilon \to 0$.

We will show that

$$\|p_{\varepsilon}f\|_{A^p_{\beta}} \le \|p_{\varepsilon}f\|_{A^2_{\alpha}} \longrightarrow 0 \text{ as } \varepsilon \to 0.$$

By (4.1), we have

$$\|p_{\varepsilon}f\|_{A^{2}_{\alpha}}^{2} \asymp \|p_{\varepsilon}f\|_{L^{2}(\mathbb{T})}^{2} + \mathcal{D}_{\alpha}(p_{\varepsilon}f).$$

First

$$\|p_{\varepsilon}f\|_{L^{2}(\mathbb{T})}^{2} \lesssim e^{-2M_{\varepsilon}} \int_{\mathbb{T}} \frac{d(\zeta, E)^{2\delta}}{d(\zeta, E)^{\gamma}} |d\zeta| \lesssim e^{-2M_{\varepsilon}} \to 0$$

since $\gamma < 2\delta$.

Then we have

$$\mathcal{D}_{\alpha}(p_{\varepsilon}f) = \iint_{\mathbb{T}^2} \frac{|p_{\varepsilon}f(\zeta) - p_{\varepsilon}f(\zeta')|^2}{|\zeta - \zeta'|^{1+2\alpha}} |d\zeta| |d\zeta'|$$

Note that for all $(\zeta, \zeta') \in \mathbb{T}^2$ we have

$$|p_{\varepsilon}f(\zeta) - p_{\varepsilon}f(\zeta')|^2 \le 2|p_{\varepsilon}(\zeta)|^2|f(\zeta) - f(\zeta')|^2 + 2|f(\zeta')|^2|p_{\varepsilon}(\zeta) - p_{\varepsilon}(\zeta')|^2$$

So if we denote $\Gamma = \{(\zeta, \zeta') \in \mathbb{T}^2, |d(\zeta', E)| \le |d(\zeta, E)|\}$, we obtain

$$\mathcal{D}_{\alpha}(p_{\varepsilon}f) \lesssim \iint_{\Gamma} |p_{\varepsilon}(\zeta)|^{2} \frac{|f(\zeta) - f(\zeta')|^{2}}{|\zeta - \zeta'|^{1+2\alpha}} |d\zeta| |d\zeta'| + \iint_{\Gamma} |f(\zeta')|^{2} \frac{|p_{\varepsilon}(\zeta) - p_{\varepsilon}(\zeta')|^{2}}{|\zeta - \zeta'|^{1+2\alpha}} |d\zeta| |d\zeta'|$$

$$= A_{\varepsilon} + B_{\varepsilon}.$$

Let η such that $\frac{\gamma}{2\delta} \leq \eta < \frac{2\delta - 2\alpha}{2\delta}$. Then, using the fact that for $(\zeta, \zeta') \in \Gamma$, $|f(\zeta')| \leq d(\zeta, E)^{\delta}$, we get

$$\begin{split} A_{\varepsilon} &= e^{-2M_{\varepsilon}} \iint_{\Gamma} \left(\frac{|f(\zeta) - f(\zeta')|^{2\eta}}{d(\zeta, E)^{\gamma} + \varepsilon} \right) \left(\frac{|f(\zeta) - f(\zeta')|^{2-2\eta}}{|\zeta - \zeta'|^{1+2\alpha}} \right) |d\zeta| |d\zeta'| \\ &\lesssim e^{-2M_{\varepsilon}} \iint_{\mathbb{T}} \frac{d(\zeta, E)^{2\eta\delta}}{d(\zeta, E)^{\gamma}} \left(\frac{|f(\zeta) - f(\zeta')|^{2-2\eta}}{|\zeta - \zeta'|^{1+2\alpha}} \right) |d\zeta| |d\zeta'| \\ &\lesssim e^{-2M_{\varepsilon}} \iint_{\mathbb{T}} \frac{|\zeta - \zeta'|^{(2-2\eta)\delta}}{|\zeta - \zeta'|^{1+2\alpha}} |d\zeta| |d\zeta'| \\ &\lesssim e^{-2M_{\varepsilon}} \to 0. \end{split}$$

To estimate B_{ε} , we consider the outer function F_{ε} given in lemma 4.2. Let

$$\Gamma_1 = \{ (\zeta, \zeta') \in \Gamma, \ d(\zeta', E) \le |\zeta - \zeta'| \},\$$

$$\Gamma_2 = \{ (\zeta, \zeta') \in \Gamma, \ d(\zeta', E) > |\zeta - \zeta'| \}.$$

We have

$$\begin{split} B_{\varepsilon} &= \iint_{\Gamma} 2|f(\zeta')|^{2}|p_{\varepsilon}(\zeta)p_{\varepsilon}(\zeta')|^{2}\frac{|1/p_{\varepsilon}(\zeta') - 1/p_{\varepsilon}(\zeta)|^{2}}{|\zeta - \zeta'|^{1+2\alpha}}|d\zeta||d\zeta'|\\ &\lesssim e^{-2M_{\varepsilon}}\iint_{\Gamma}\frac{d(\zeta', E)^{2\delta}}{(d(\zeta, E)^{\gamma} + \varepsilon)(d(\zeta', E)^{\gamma} + \varepsilon)}\frac{|F_{\varepsilon}(\zeta) - F_{\varepsilon}(\zeta')|^{2}}{|\zeta - \zeta'|^{1+2\alpha}}|d\zeta||d\zeta'|\\ &\lesssim e^{-2M_{\varepsilon}}\iint_{\Gamma_{1}}|\zeta - \zeta'|^{2\delta - 2\gamma - 2\alpha - 1}|F_{\varepsilon}(\zeta) - F_{\varepsilon}(\zeta')|^{2}|d\zeta||d\zeta'|\\ &+ e^{-2M_{\varepsilon}}\iint_{\Gamma_{2}}d(\zeta', E)^{2\delta - 2\gamma - 2\alpha + 1}\frac{|F_{\varepsilon}(\zeta) - F_{\varepsilon}(\zeta')|^{2}}{|\zeta - \zeta'|^{2}}|d\zeta||d\zeta'|\\ &= B_{\varepsilon}^{1} + B_{\varepsilon}^{2}. \end{split}$$

Since $\gamma < \delta - \alpha$ and $|F_{\varepsilon}|$ is bounded on \mathbb{T} , we have $B_{\varepsilon}^{1} \leq e^{-2M_{\varepsilon}} \to 0$ as $\varepsilon \to 0$. On the other hand, applying Lemma 4.2 with $\delta' = \delta - \alpha + 1/2$, we obtain $B_{\varepsilon}^{2} \leq M_{\varepsilon}e^{-2M_{\varepsilon}}$. Thus $B_{\varepsilon}^{2} \to 0$ as $\varepsilon \to 0$. Therefore we have $\lim \|p_{\varepsilon}f\|_{A_{\beta}^{p}} = 0$ and, by proposition 4.1, $[f]_{\mathbb{Z}}^{A_{\beta}^{p}(\mathbb{T})} = [f]_{\mathbb{N}}^{A_{\beta}^{p}(\mathbb{T})}$. Futhermore, by [13, Theorem A], if $\dim(\mathcal{Z}(f)) < \frac{2}{q}(1 - \beta q)$ then f is bicyclic in $A_{\beta}^{p}(\mathbb{T})$, so f is cyclic in $A_{\beta}^{p}(\mathbb{T})$

Remark. Let $1 and <math>\beta > 0$ such that $\beta q < 1$. Using the fact $A_{1/2}^2(\mathbb{T}) \subset A_{\beta}^p(\mathbb{T})$ and [2, Theorem 1.2] we obtain, for $f \in A_{\beta}^p(\mathbb{T})$ such that $|f| \in C^1(\mathbb{T})$ and $|f|' \in \operatorname{Lip}_{\delta}(\mathbb{T})$ for $\delta > 0$, the following result: if $\dim(\mathcal{Z}(f)) < \frac{2}{q}(1 - \beta q)$ and $\log |f| \notin L^1(\mathbb{T})$ then f^2 is cyclic in $A_{\beta}^p(\mathbb{T})$.

4.2. Cyclicity for smooth functions. When $f \in C^{\infty}(\mathbb{T})$, Makarov proves in [15], that $[f]_{\mathbb{N}}^{C^{\infty}(\mathbb{T})} = [f]_{\mathbb{Z}}^{C^{\infty}(\mathbb{T})}$ if and only if $\log |f| \notin L^{1}(\mathbb{T})$. As a consequence of Makarov's Theorem and some result obtained in [13], we get the following Theorem:

Theorem 4.4. Let $1 , <math>\beta \ge 0$ such that $\beta q \le 1$. We have the following conditions : (1) If $f \in C^{\infty}(\mathbb{T})$, dim $(\mathcal{Z}(f)) < \frac{2}{a}(1 - \beta q)$ and $\log |f| \notin L^{1}(\mathbb{T})$ then f is cyclic in

- $A^p_{\beta}(\mathbb{T}).$
- (2) If $f \in A^1_{\beta}(\mathbb{T})$, dim $(\mathcal{Z}(f)) > 1 \beta q$ then f is not cyclic in $A^p_{\beta}(\mathbb{T})$.
- (3) For $\frac{2}{q}(1-\beta q) \leq \alpha \leq 1$, there exists a closed subset $E \subset \mathbb{T}$ such that $\dim(E) = \alpha$ and every $f \in A^1_{\beta}(\mathbb{T})$ satisfying $\mathcal{Z}(f) \subset E$ is not cylcic in $A^p_{\beta}(\mathbb{T})$.
- (4) If $p = \frac{2k}{2k-1}$ for some $k \in \mathbb{N}^*$ then there exists a closed set $E \subset \mathbb{T}$ such that $\dim(E) = 1 \beta q$ and every $f \in C^{\infty}(\mathbb{T})$ satisfying $\mathcal{Z}(f) \subset E$ and $\log |f| \notin L^1(\mathbb{T})$ is cyclic in $A^p_{\beta}(\mathbb{T})$.

Note that, for $1 and <math>\beta \ge 0$ such that $\beta q \le 1$, if f is cyclic in $A^p_{\beta}(\mathbb{T})$ then $\log |f| \notin L^1(\mathbb{T})$.

Proof. For (2) and (3), we use [13, Theorem 3.4 and Theorem 4.3] since if f is not bicyclic then f is not cyclic in $A^p_\beta(\mathbb{T})$.

For (1) and (4), suppose $\log |f| \notin L^1(\mathbb{T})$. By [15], we have $[f]_{\mathbb{N}}^{C^{\infty}(\mathbb{T})} = [f]_{\mathbb{Z}}^{C^{\infty}(\mathbb{T})}$. Since the embedding $C^{\infty}(\mathbb{T}) \subset A^p_{\beta}(\mathbb{T})$ is continuous, we obtain $[f]_{\mathbb{N}}^{A^p_{\beta}(\mathbb{T})} = [f]_{\mathbb{Z}}^{A^p_{\beta}(\mathbb{T})}$. Moreover, by [13, Theorem 3.4], f is bicyclic in $A^p_{\beta}(\mathbb{T})$. Therefore f is cyclic in $A^p_{\beta}(\mathbb{T})$.

In the following, we denote, for $E \subset \mathbb{T}$, |E| the Lebesgue measure of E

Examples. Let E be a closed subset of \mathbb{T} and Λ be a continuous, positive, decreasing function defined on $(0, \infty)$ such that $\lim \Lambda(t) = \infty$ and $\lim t\Lambda(t) = 0$ as $t \to 0$. We consider the function f defined on \mathbb{T} by

$$f(\zeta) = \exp\left(-\Lambda(d(\zeta, E))\right)$$

if $\zeta \notin E$ and $f(\zeta) = 0$ otherwise. So, by [5, Proposition A.1], we have

$$\int_{\mathbb{T}} \log |f(\zeta)| |d\zeta| = -\int_{\mathbb{T}} \Lambda(d(\zeta, E)) |d\zeta| = -\infty \Leftrightarrow \int_{\mathbb{T}} |E_t| d\Lambda(t) = -\infty$$

where $E_t = \{\zeta \in \mathbb{T}, d(\zeta, E) \leq t\}$. Let $N_E(t)$ be the smallest number of closed arcs of length 2t that cover E. We have, by [5, Lemma A.3], that $tN_E(t) \leq |E_t| \leq 4tN_E(t)$. Thus, by [3, Theorem 2, p. 30], we have for $0 < \alpha < 1$,

$$\int_{\mathbb{T}} \frac{1}{t^{\alpha+1} N_E(t)} dt = \infty \Leftrightarrow \int_{\mathbb{T}} \frac{1}{t^{\alpha} |E_t|} dt = \infty \Rightarrow \dim(E) < \alpha.$$

Now we suppose that $\Lambda(t) = 1/t^{\gamma}$ for $\gamma > 0$. The function f associated is infinitely differentiable on \mathbb{T} . Let $1 , <math>\beta \ge 0$ such that $\beta q \le 1$. We can construct a Cantor set E such that

$$\int_{\mathbb{T}} \frac{|E_t|}{t^{\gamma+1}} dt = \infty \text{ and } \int_{\mathbb{T}} \frac{1}{t^{\alpha} |E_t|} dt = \infty$$

for $\alpha < \frac{2}{q}(1 - \beta q)$. Then, by Theorem 4.4, the function f is cyclic in $A^p_{\beta}(\mathbb{T})$. Moreover if $\gamma \geq 1$ we have $\log |f| \notin L^1(\mathbb{T})$. So, by Theorem 4.4,

- (1) if dim $(E) < \frac{2}{a}(1 \beta q)$ then f is cyclic in $A^p_\beta(\mathbb{T})$;
- (2) if dim(E) > $1 \beta q$ then f is not cyclic in $A^p_{\beta}(\mathbb{T})$;
- (3) for $\frac{2}{q}(1-\beta q) \leq \alpha \leq 1$, there exists a closed subset $E \subset \mathbb{T}$ such that $\dim(E) = \alpha$ and f is not cyclic in $A^p_\beta(\mathbb{T})$;
- (4) if $p = \frac{2k}{2k-1}$ for some $k \in \mathbb{N}^*$ then there exists a closed set $E \subset \mathbb{T}$ such that $\dim(E) = 1 \beta q$ and f is cyclic in $A^p_{\beta}(\mathbb{T})$.

4.3. **Density of cyclic vectors set.** When $\beta q \leq 1$, we have seen, in the precedent section, that there exist cyclic vectors in $A^p_{\beta}(\mathbb{T})$. Here we show that the set of cyclic vectors in $A^p_{\beta}(\mathbb{T})$ is a dense G_{δ} subset of $A^p_{\beta}(\mathbb{T})$.

Proposition 4.5. Let $f \in A(\mathbb{T})$. If $\mathcal{Z}(f)$ is finite then f is bicyclic in $A^p_{\beta}(\mathbb{T})$ for p > 1and $\beta \ge 0$ such that $\beta q \le 1$.

Proof. Let $S \in A^q_{-\beta}(\mathbb{T})$ such that $\langle S, z^n f \rangle = 0$ for all $n \in \mathbb{Z}$. It suffice to prove that S = 0. First we have $\operatorname{supp}(S) \subset \mathcal{Z}(f)$ (see [13, Lemma 2.4]) and since $\mathcal{Z}(f)$ is finite, we obtain that

$$S = \sum_{k=1}^{N} \sum_{n=0}^{M} \lambda_{k,n} \, \delta_{z_k}^{(n)}$$

where $\mathcal{Z}(f) = \{z_k, k \in [\![1, N]\!]\} \subset \mathbb{T}, \lambda_{k,n} \in \mathbb{C}$ and where $\delta_{z_k}^{(n)}$ is the *n*th derivative of the Dirac delta measure concentrated at a point z_k .

Suppose that $S \neq 0$. There exists k_0 and n_0 such that $\lambda_{k_0,n_0} \neq 0$. We define

$$T = \prod_{\substack{k=1\\k \neq k_0}}^{N} (z - z_k)^{M+1} S.$$

So $T \in A^{q}_{-\beta}(\mathbb{T})$ and $T \neq 0$. Hence there exists $(c_n) \in \mathbb{C}^{M+1}$ such that for every test function $\varphi \in \mathcal{D}(\mathbb{T})$,

$$\langle T, \varphi \rangle = \langle S, \prod_{\substack{k=1\\k \neq k_0}}^N (z - z_k)^{M+1} \varphi \rangle = \sum_{n=0}^M \lambda_{k_0, n} c_n \varphi^{(n)}(z_{k_0}).$$

If we denote $n_1 = \max\{n, c_n \lambda_{k_0,n} \neq 0\}$, then we have for all $l \in \mathbb{Z}$

$$|\langle T, z^{l} \rangle| = \left| \sum_{n=0}^{N} \lambda_{k_{0}, n} c_{n} (il)^{n} z_{k_{0}}^{l} \right| \underset{l \to \infty}{\sim} |\lambda_{k_{0}, n_{1}}| |c_{n_{1}}|| l|^{n_{1}}$$

(here $z^l = e^{il\theta}$). This is not possible since $T \in A^q_{-\beta}(\mathbb{T})$ and $\beta q \leq 1$.

Lemma 4.6. Let $1 and <math>\beta \ge 0$ such that $\beta q \le 1$ where 1/p+1/q = 1. If $f \in A^p_{\beta}(\mathbb{T})$ is cyclic in $A^p_{\beta}(\mathbb{T})$ and if $P \in \mathcal{P}(\mathbb{T})$ is not zero then Pf is cyclic in $A^p_{\beta}(\mathbb{T})$.

Proof. Let $\varepsilon > 0$. By Lemma 4.5, P is bicyclic in $A^p_\beta(\mathbb{T})$ since $\mathcal{Z}(P)$ is finite. So there exists $P_1 \in \mathcal{P}(\mathbb{T})$ such that $||1 - P_1 P||_{A^p_\beta} < \varepsilon$. Moreover since f is bicyclic, there exists $P_2 \in \mathcal{P}(\mathbb{T})$ such that

$$\|1 - P_2 f\|_{A^p_\beta} < \frac{\varepsilon}{\|P_1 P\|_{A^1_\beta}}$$

Therefore we have

$$\|1 - P_1 P_2 P f\|_{A^p_\beta} \le \|1 - P_1 P\|_{A^p_\beta} + \|P_1 P\|_{A^1_\beta} \|1 - P_2 f\|_{A^p_\beta} < 2\varepsilon.$$

So Pf is bicyclic in $A^p_{\beta}(\mathbb{T})$.

Moreover, since f is cyclic in $A^p_\beta(\mathbb{T})$, there exists $Q \in \mathcal{P}_+(\mathbb{T})$ such that $||f - zQf||_{A^p_\beta} < \frac{\varepsilon}{\|P\|_{A^1_\beta}}$. So we have

$$\|Pf - zQPf\|_{A^p_\beta} \le \|P\|_{A^1_\beta} \|f - zQf\|_{A^p_\beta} < \varepsilon.$$

Hence, by proposition 2.1, Pf is cyclic in $A^p_{\beta}(\mathbb{T})$.

Theorem 4.7. Let $1 and <math>\beta \geq 0$ such that $\beta q \leq 1$ where 1/p + 1/q = 1. The set of cyclic vectors in $A^p_{\beta}(\mathbb{T})$ is a dense G_{δ} subset of $A^p_{\beta}(\mathbb{T})$.

Proof. Let $\varepsilon > 0$. We consider the set

$$G_{\varepsilon} = \{ g \in A_{\beta}^{p}(\mathbb{T}), \exists P \in \mathcal{P}(\mathbb{T}), \exists Q \in \mathcal{P}_{+}(\mathbb{T}), \|1 - Pg\|_{A_{\beta}^{p}} < \varepsilon \text{ and } \|g - zQg\|_{A_{\beta}^{p}} < \varepsilon \}.$$

To use a Baire Category argument, we will show that

(i) $\bigcap_{n=1}^{\infty} G_{1/n} = \{ f \in A^p_{\beta}(\mathbb{T}) \text{ cyclic in } A^p_{\beta}(\mathbb{T}) \}$ (ii) For $\varepsilon > 0$, G_{ε} is an open subset of $A^p_{\beta}(\mathbb{T})$ (iii) For $\varepsilon > 0$, G_{ε} is a dense subset of $A^p_{\beta}(\mathbb{T})$.

(i) : Let $g \in A^p_{\beta}(\mathbb{T})$ such that for all $n \in \mathbb{N}^*$ there exist $P_n \in \mathcal{P}(\mathbb{T})$ and $Q_n \in \mathcal{P}_+(\mathbb{T})$ satisfying $\|1 - P_n g\|_{A^p_{\beta}} < 1/n$ and $\|g - zQ_n g\|_{A^p_{\beta}} < 1/n$. By proposition 2.1, g is cyclic in $A^p_{\beta}(\mathbb{T})$. The other inclusion is clear.

(*ii*) follows from the fact that, for $f \in A^1_{\beta}(\mathbb{T})$ and $g \in A^p_{\beta}(\mathbb{T})$,

$$||fg||_{A^p_\beta} \le ||f||_{A^1_\beta} ||g||_{A^p_\beta}.$$

(*iii*) : Since for $\varepsilon > 0$, $\{f \in A^p_\beta(\mathbb{T}) \text{ cyclic in } A^p_\beta(\mathbb{T})\} \subset G_\varepsilon$, we will show that $\{f \in A^p_\beta(\mathbb{T}) \text{ cyclic in } A^p_\beta(\mathbb{T})\}$ is dense in $A^p_\beta(\mathbb{T})$. Let $h \in A^p_\beta(\mathbb{T})$ and $\eta > 0$ such that $\eta < \|h\|_{A^p_\beta}$. Consider $f \in A^p_\beta(\mathbb{T})$ which is cyclic in $A^p_\beta(\mathbb{T})$. So there exists $P \in \mathcal{P}_+(\mathbb{T})$ not zero such that $\|h - Pf\|_{A^p_\beta} < \eta$ and by lemma 4.6, Pf is cyclic in $A^p_\beta(\mathbb{T})$. Therefore this shows that G_ε is dense in $A^p_\beta(\mathbb{T})$.
