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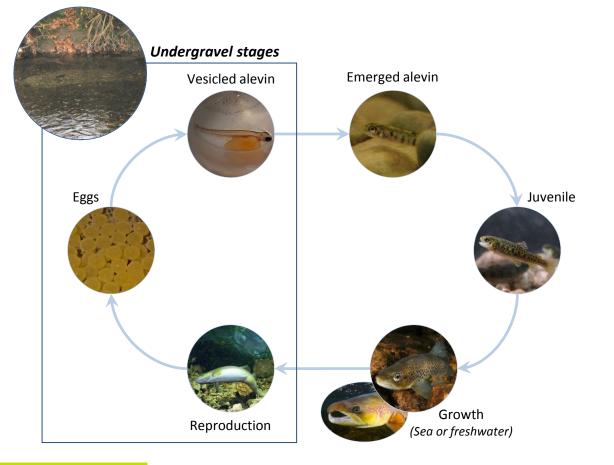






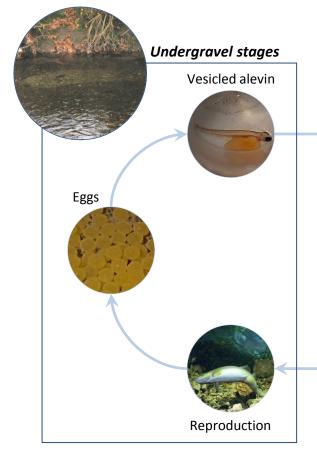

Physiological and behavioural changes

- Competition for territory
- Predator vulnerability



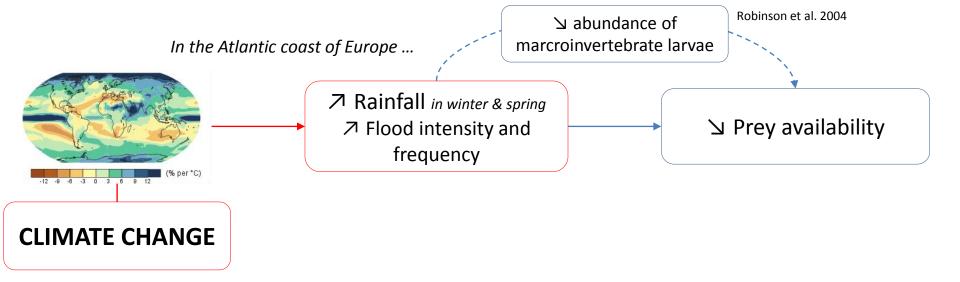
Harsh conditions could induce huge mortality

i.e. reduced prey availability (macroinvertebrate larvae)





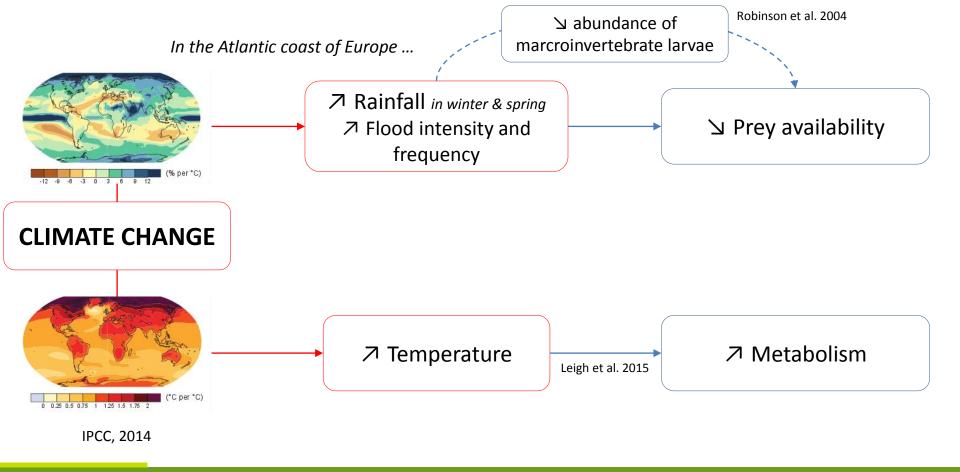

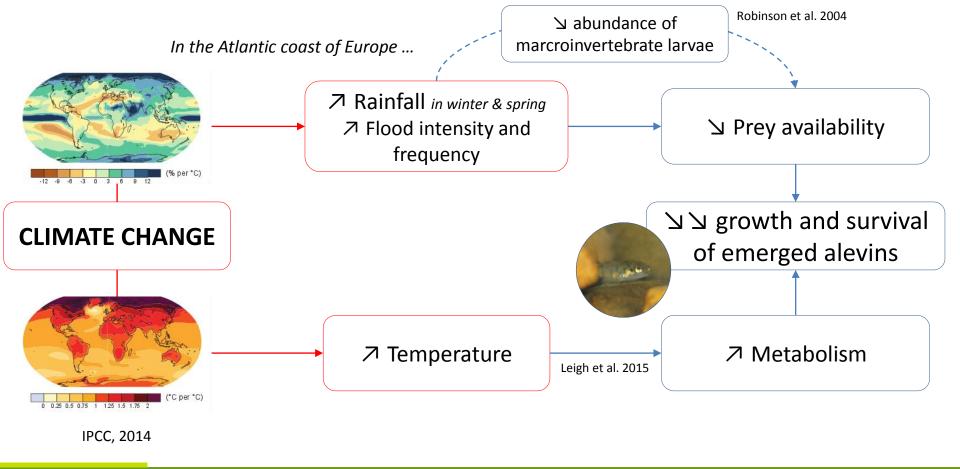






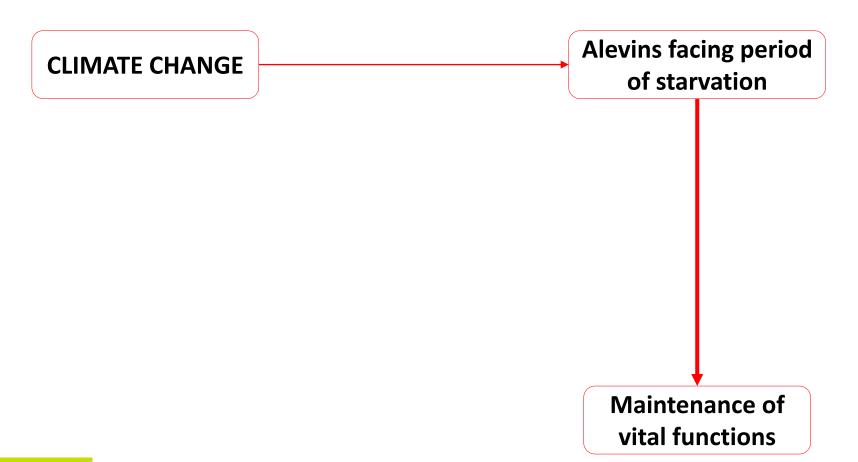






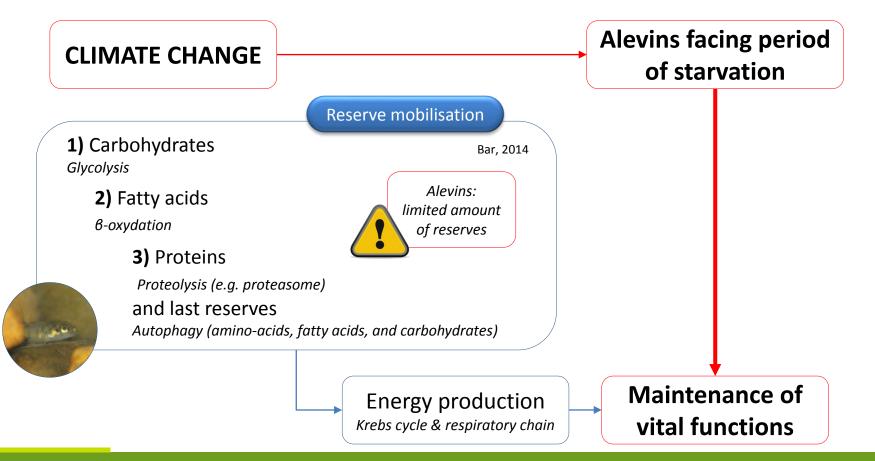
















Objectives of the experiment

1) Understand the effects of **starvation** on alevins **nutritional** status

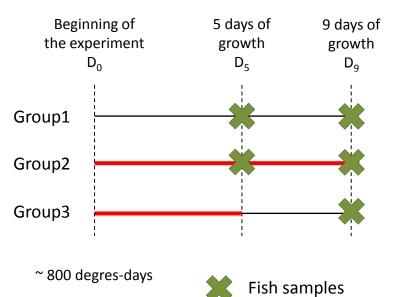
2) Test the alevins ability to recover from a delayed first-feeding

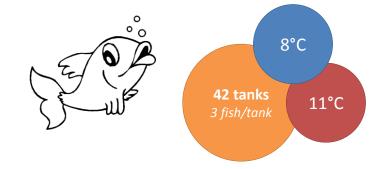
3) Analyse the effect of temperature on these phenomena





Experimental set up



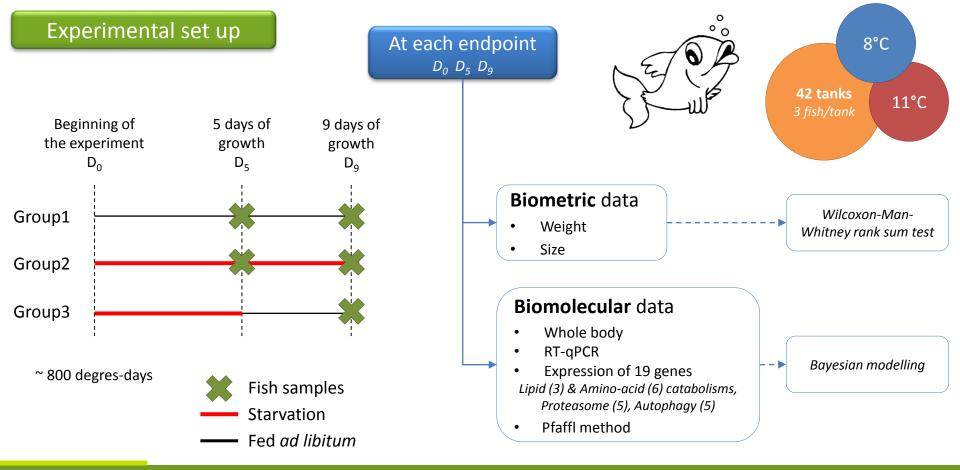






Starvation

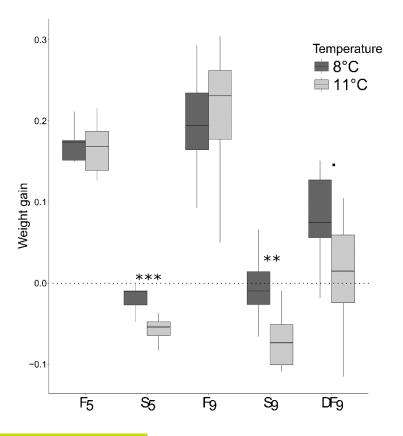
Fed *ad libitum*







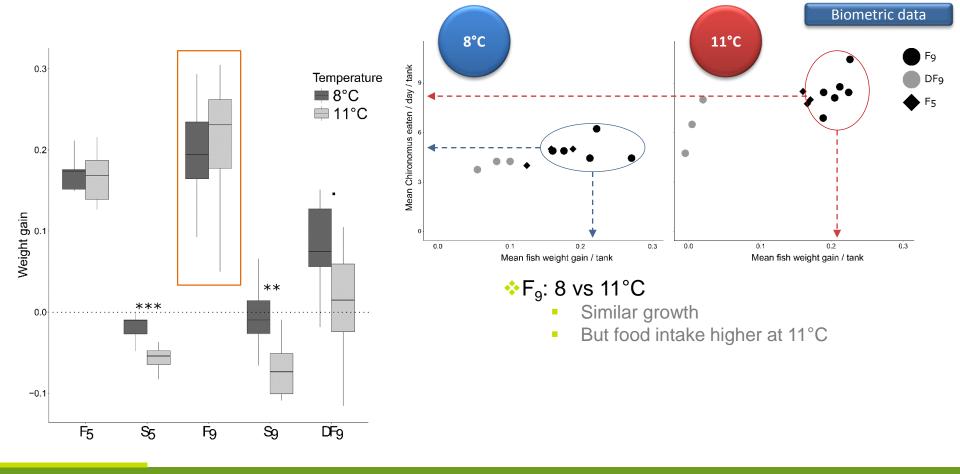
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- ⋄ F₅ & F₉: Fed fish gained weight
 - No difference between 8°C and 11°C
- ♦ S₅ & S₉: Starved fish lost weight
 - Fish leaner at 11°C
- DF₉: Delayed first-fed fish: intermediate state
 - Difference close to significance level
 - p-value = 0.059

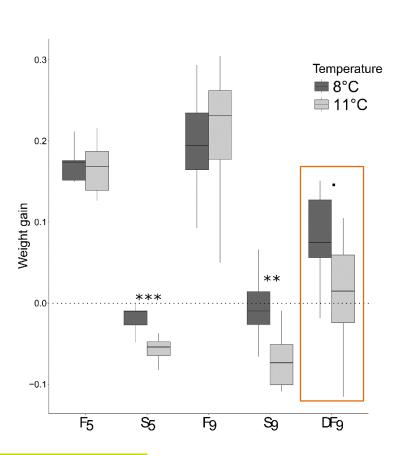


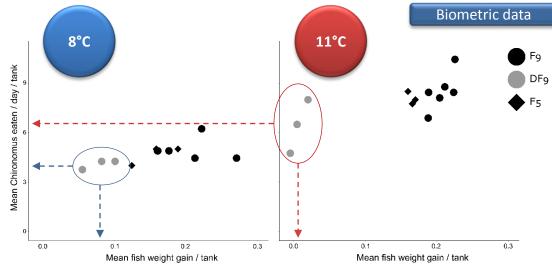












♦ F₉: 8 vs 11°C

- Similar growth
- But food intake higher at 11°C

❖DF₉: 8 vs 11°C

- Both able to start feeding
- Same food intake than fed fish
- A trend for a better growth at 8°C

2) Test the alevins ability to recover from a delayed first-feeding



∠ ∠ Growth

Recovery → More contrasted

- Some alevins recovering
- Others at the same levels than starved fish





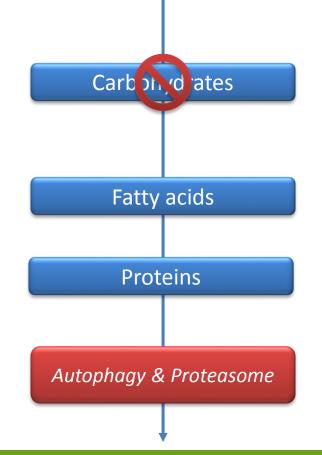
Fed fish

- Under other physiological mechanisms
- Carnivores: food → fatty acids and proteins

Rainuzzo et al. 1997 Palmer and Ryman, 1972

Food degradation

No/low induction



Starved fish

- Under other physiological mechanisms
- Limited: depletion in few hours

- Proteasome & Autophagyrelated genes higly expressed during starvation
- ❖Stress of starvation still noticeable in DF₀ fish
- Effect of temperature
 (S & DF)
 - 11°C >> 8°C

Take home message



- Food conversion is better at 8°C
- A higher temperature exacerbates the metabolic distress induced by starvation
- Despite 5 days of starvation, alevins are able to feed but recovery ...
 - Is not complete after 4 feeding days
 - Is more contrasted at 11°C
