

# Changes to 5-HT4/5-HT3 ratio subserve lower contractile response to 5-HT and greater susceptibility to 5-HT receptor desensitization in the TNBS-inflamed guinea-pig ileum

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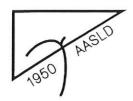
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CHANGES IN 5-HT4/5-HT3 RATIO SUBSERVE LOWER CONTRACTILE RESPONSE TO 5-HT AND GREATER SUSCEPTIBILITY TO 5-HT RECEPTOR DESENSITIZATION IN THE TNBS-INFLAMED GUINEA-PIG ILEUM. Serotonin is both a neurotransmitter, involved in the modulation of intestinal contractility, and a potent inflammatory mediator present in increased levels in inflamed tissues. The known susceptibility of 5-HT receptors to homologous desensitization, led us to investigate putative changes in the intestinal responsiveness to 5-HT receptor subtype stimulation, which could explain the altered motility associated with TNBS-induced inflammation.

Methods: Ileitis was induced by intrajejunal instillation of 0.3 ml TNBS in 50% ethanol (80 mg/kg); controls were given saline. Animals were sacrificed 6 days later and ileum circular muscle strips (8 x 2 mm) were mounted in an in vitro superfusion system (Krebs; 37°C; 2 ml/min). Isometric contractions were recorded; concentration-response curves (0.1nM-0.1mM) to serotonin (5-HT, n=12), 2-methyl-5-HT (5-HT3 agonist; n=4) and 5-methoxvtryptamine (5-MeOT; 5-HT4 agonist; n=4) were constructed and analysed by nonlinear regression. Maximal effect (Emax; mN/mm2 cross-section area) and drug potency (EC50; µM) were determined (mean±SEM). 5-HT receptor desensitization was assessed in both controls (n=6) and TNBStreated (n=6) guinea-pigs by repetitive stimulation with 10 µM 5-HT (3 min every 15 min) in presence or absence of antagonists (10 nM): ondansetron (5-HT3), DAU-6285 (5-HT4), ketanserin (5-HT2), methysergide (5-HT1-2). Results: Ileum strips from both TNBS- and saline-treated animals were dose-dependently contracted by 5-HT, 2-methyl-5-HT, and 5-MeOT. The Emax for 5-HT in TNBS-inflamed ileum was approx. half that observed in controls  $(6.9\pm1.8 \text{ vs } 12.2\pm1.6 \text{ mN/mm}^2; \text{ p<0.05})$  whilst the potency was unaffected (EC50=3.2±0.7 vs 3.0±0.7 µM). The ratio of the respective 5-HT4 and 5-HT3 receptor-mediated responses was also lowered (approx. 25/75% of the response to 5-HT in controls vs 10/90% in TNBS-inflamed strips). 5-HT3-mediated responses to 2-methyl-5-HT were shifted to the right and 5-HT4-mediated maximal response to 5-MeOT was decreased. In desensitization experiments, the lowest response to 10µM 5-HT was  $30.1\pm3.4\%$  of the initial response in controls, and  $11.6\pm2.0\%$  (P<0.001, n=6) in TNBS strips. In both groups, desensitization was partly prevented by preincubation with ondansetron, (5-HT3 antagonist) but not DAU-6285, ketanserin or methysergide.

Conclusion: Our results show altered 5-HT4 and 5-HT3-mediated contractile responses of the intestinal circular muscle during TNBS-induced ileitis. These receptor changes subserve hyporesponsiveness to 5-HT, and a greater susceptibility of 5-HT3 receptors to homologous desensitization. This later probably resulting from increased 5-HT levels, may represent a protective mechanism of the gut against subsequent stimulation during inflammation.
