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EVIDENCE FOR NITRIC OXIDE SYNTHASE ACTIVATION BY SUBSTANCE P THROUGH A MECHANISM NOT INVOLVING "CLASSICAL" NEUROKININ RECEPTORS IN GUINEA PIG ILEUM. R. Garcia-Villar, Ch. Dupu J. Fioramonti & L. Buéno, INRA, Department of Pharmacology, BP.3, 31931, Toulouse, France.

Both substance P (SP), a tachykinin neuropeptide which contracts, and nitric oxide (NO), a labile transmitter that relaxes intestinal smooth muscle, have been proposed as active components of the non-adrenergic noncholinergic (NANC) control of gut motility. To address the functional relationships between these two NANC mediators, we tested the hypothesis that NO-synthase (NOS) could be activated after SP-induced contractions in guinea pig ileum, and further, whether the neurokinin (NK) receptor subtypes described so far (i.e. NK1, 2, 3) could be involved in this NOS activation.

Methods: Longitudinal strips of guinea pig ileum (8 x 2 mm) were superfused (Krebs, 37°C, 2 ml/min) with tachykinin agonists (1 pM to 10 uM; SP, GR 73,632 [NK1], GR 64,349 [NK2], senktide [NK3]), and antagonists (1µM; CP 99,941 [NK1], SR 48,968 [NK2]), as well as KCl (60 mM) and carbachol (CCh; 0,1 μM). The NO-related agents (1 μM) used were: L-NAME, L-NMMA, aminoguanidine (AG), L-arginine (L-ARG) and Darginine (D-ARG). All drugs were superfused for 3 min. Motility was recorded (isometric system) and quantified (integrated area of activity).

Results: Both SP and NK-receptor agonists (1 pM to 10 μM) produced concentration-dependent contractions, with maximal effects at 0.1-1 µM. The response to 0.1  $\mu$ M SP was 81±9% (n=16) of that to KCl (60 mM), very close to that elicited by CCh (0.1 μM; 87±5%, n=16), GR 73,632 (0.1 μM;  $74\pm11\%$ , n=12) and senktide (0.1  $\mu$ M,  $76\pm13\%$ , n=12), but higher than that induced by GR 64,349 (0.1  $\mu$ M, 52 $\pm$ 7%, n=12, p<0.05). The NOS inhibitors L-NAME, L-NMMA, AG (1 µM) superfused before any contractile agent, failed to contract the muscle strips. In contrast, all three provoked a transient contraction (40-70 s) of high amplitude (65±12% compared to KCl, n=24) when superfused 10 min after SP. This contractile response was time-(after SP) and SP-concentration-dependent, and was never obtained when the strip was stimulated by any selective NK-agonist (up to 10 µM), by CCh (0.1 uM) or KCl (60 mM). Blockade of NK1 and NK2 receptors by CP 99,941 and SR 48,968 (1 µM) reduced the response to SP (0.1 µM), but did not prevent the contraction induced by L-NAME, L-NMMA and AG (1 µM) after SP. The response was prevented by L-ARG but not by D-ARG (1 µM).

Conclusion: Substance P, by a mechanism not involving "classical" NKreceptors (i.e. NK1, 2, 3), enables NOS inhibitors to contract guinea pig ileum in vitro. This effect is likely to result from NOS activation by SP. Thus, L-NAME, L-NMMA, AG by blocking a putative SP-induced NO production, unveil an underlying contractile state whose origin remains to be elucidated.

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DOCALISATION OF THE CORTICAL CENTRES FOR HUMAN OESOPHACEAL SENSATION USING MAGNETOENCEPHALOGRAPHY. Background: Although mapping of Cortical Evoked Potentials can provide some information about the topography of oesophageal afferents, the precise anatomical representation of oesophageal sensation on the cerebral cortex remains unknown.

Aims: 1) To identify the anatomical representation of afferents arising from the Aims: 1) To identify the anatomical representation of afterents arising from the oesophagus on the cortex. 2) To determine evidence for viscerotopic representation of proximal and the distal oesophageal afferents. Methods: 1. Oesophageal stimulation: In 3 healthy volunteers, two series of 50 stimuli were applied at a frequency of 0.2Hz by rapidly inflating a 2cm silicone balloon to volumes which were clearly perceived but not painful, either 3cm below the upper oesophageal sphincter or 5cm above the lower oesophageal sphincter at a frequency of 0.2Hz. A series of 50 sham inflations were also performed at each frequency of 0.42. A series of 30 shall inflations were also performed at each site. 2. Signal Detection: A 19 channel magnetometer was used to identify the magnetic field waveforms generated by the cerebral cortex during oesophageal stimulation. Recording were made over the parieto-temporal and the frontal cortices bilaterally. Each subject was studied on at least two occasions to obtain cortices bilaterally. Each subject was studied on at least two occasions to obtain evidence for reproducibility. Global field power analysis of the averaged magnetic field waveforms was performed to identify strong dipolar field patterns. Inverse Solution Algorithms were then applied to determine the three dimensional representation of the calculated dipole sources. This technique has been shown to identify cortical sources accurately with an error margin of 2-5mm. 3. Coregistration with Magnetic Resonance (MR) Scans: Three fiducial points (nasion and two preauriculars) were digitised using a magnetic positioning system (Polhemus Navigation System), allowing the location of the head to be accurately determined with respect to the magnetometer. The same fiducial points were marked on MR scans using radio-opaque markers to allow co-registration of magnetomery and MR data in each subject. Results: Stimulation of either the proximal or the distal esconhagus evoked reproducible early and late magnetic field wave forms from oesophagus evoked reproducible early and late magnetic field wave forms from both hemispheres at a latency of 150msec to 223 msec and 178msec to 311msec respectively. Sham stimulation failed to evoke cortical magnetic fields. Coregistration of calculated dipoles with the MR scans indicated that the early waveforms from the proximal and the distal oesophagus were evoked by two distinct neural sources located in the primary somatosensory cortex close to the vertex, the source for the proximal oesophagus being more medial and superficial vertex, the source for the proximal oesophagus being more medial and superficial than that of the distal oesophagus. In contrast, the late wave forms for both oesophageal regions were localised to a similar area of the insular cortex. Conclusions: The centre for human oesophageal sensation is viscertopically located in both primary somatosensory cortices with secondary representation in the insular cortex

● CHARACTERIZATION OF P, RECEPTOR-MEDIATED CONSTRICTION OF SUBMUCOSÁL ARTERIOLES IN GUINEA PIG ILEUM. J.J. Galligan, A. Herring and T. Harpstead. Department of Pharmacology & Toxicology, Michigan State University., E. Lansing, MI 48824

Sympathetic nerve stimulation causes constriction mediated by ATP acting at P2 receptors in submucosal arterioles. In the present study, the P2 receptor subtype mediating this response was characterized. A computer-assisted video monitoring system was used to measure drug-induced changes in arteriolar diameter (40-80 μm) in small pieces of submucosa in vitro. Intracellular microelectrodes were used to record membrane potential of arteriolar smooth muscle. The rank order potency for constriction caused by several ATP analogs was (EC $_{50}$ ,  $\mu$ M):  $\alpha,\beta$ -methylene ATP (0.3) >  $\beta,\gamma$ -methylene ATP (4.1) = 2-methylthioATP (4.5) > ATP (12) > ADP (150) > AMP (>300). Constrictions caused by  $\alpha,\beta$ -methylene ATP were competitively blocked by suramin (K<sub>B</sub> 3.2 μM) and noncompetitively blocked by pyridoxalphosphate-6-azophenyl-2',4'-disulfonic acid (PPADS, 0.3-3 μM). Norepinephrine (NE)-induced constrictions were unaffected by suramin (100 µM) or PPADS (3 μM). α,β-methylene ATP (1 μM) depolarized arteriolar smooth muscle by 35 + 2 mV (resting membrane potential, -81 + 4 mV, n = 4). Extracellular solutions with 0 added calcium blocked constrictions caused by  $\alpha$ ,  $\beta$  methylene ATP (0.1-1.0  $\mu$ M) but not those caused by NE (3-10  $\mu$ M). Nifedipine (0.3-1  $\mu$ M) blocked constrictions caused by 40 and 60 mM KCl but not those caused by  $\alpha,\beta$  methylene ATP (0.1-3  $\mu M).$  These data indicate that  $P_{2X}$  receptors mediate ATP-induced constriction of submucosal arterioles. Although activation of  $P_{2X}$  receptors causes smooth muscle depolarization, calcium entry through voltage-operated, nifedipine-sensitive calcium channels does not contribute to P2X mediated vasoconstriction.  $P_{2X}$ -mediated vasoconstriction is caused by calcium entry through ATP-gated channels.  INCREASED OESOPHAGEAL SENSITIVITY TO DISTENSION DURING PHYSICAL AND MENTAL STRESSFUL CONDITIONS. F. Galeazzi, M.G. Lucà, G. Mastropaolo and Remo Naccarato Department of Gastroenterology - University of Padova - ITALY

Patients with oesophageal complaints often refers their symptoms to stressful events, but the oesophageal dismotility patterns evoked by physical and mental stress are rarely related to symptoms. The aim of this study was to evaluate whether the sensitivity of the oesophagus to distension is altered after mental and physical experimental stress.

METHODS. In 8 patients (4 males, 17 - 51 yrs) referred for oesophageal symptoms (6 heartburn, 1 non cardiac chest pain and 1 dysphagia) with normal upper g.i. endoscopy and oesophageal manometry, a stepwise distension (2 ml every 10 seconds up to 20 ml) of the oesophagus was performed with a latex balloon (4x2x2 cm) 10 cm above LOS. Sensory (first perception of distension) and pain thresholds were assessed in basal conditions and two more times in the same session, in a random order: 1) after physical stress (cicles of 45-second immersion of non dominant hand in iced water followed by 15 seconds at room temperature untill patient's tolerance) and, 2) after a mental test (sequence of logical and practical operations for 30 minutes while having a dichotomous listening disturbance). Blood pressure and heart rate were monitored during the tests and 20-minute recovery periods were allowed between

RESULTS. Blood pressure and heart rate increased by 17.7% and 11% and by 9.7% and 14.8% during the cold stress the mental stress respectively. The sensory and pain oesophageal thresholds (ml of balloon inflation) significantly decreased with the two stressful events as follows:

Basal Cold Stress Mental Stress 6.2 ± 2.3 \* 10.9 ± 4.0 \*\* Sensory Threshold  $9.0 \pm 2.0$ 6.2 ± 2.3 \* Pain Threshold 14.2 ± 5.8 \*\*  $16.6 \pm 4.7$  $(M \pm SD) * p < 0.005$  vs basal values; \*\* p < 0.02 vs basal values CONCLUSIONS. Physical and mental experimentally induced stress reduce the sensory and pain oesophageal thresholds, being the perception of distension is not influenced by the specific type of stress applied. The mental and the physical stresses seem more active on sensory and pain thresholds respectively. It is possible that in stressful situations patients' oesophageal symptoms are not only due to changes in motility patterns but also to an high increas in oesophageal sensitivity
