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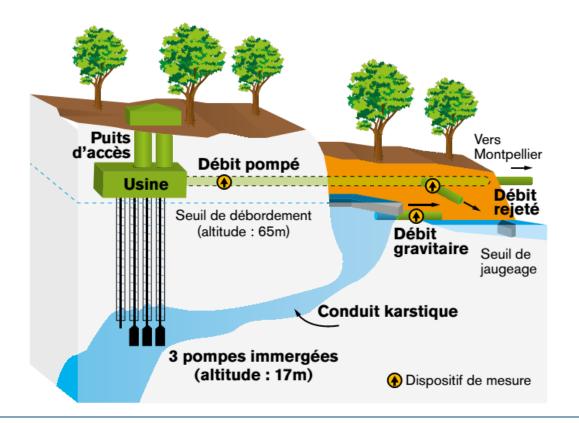


Drinking water supply to Montpellier city



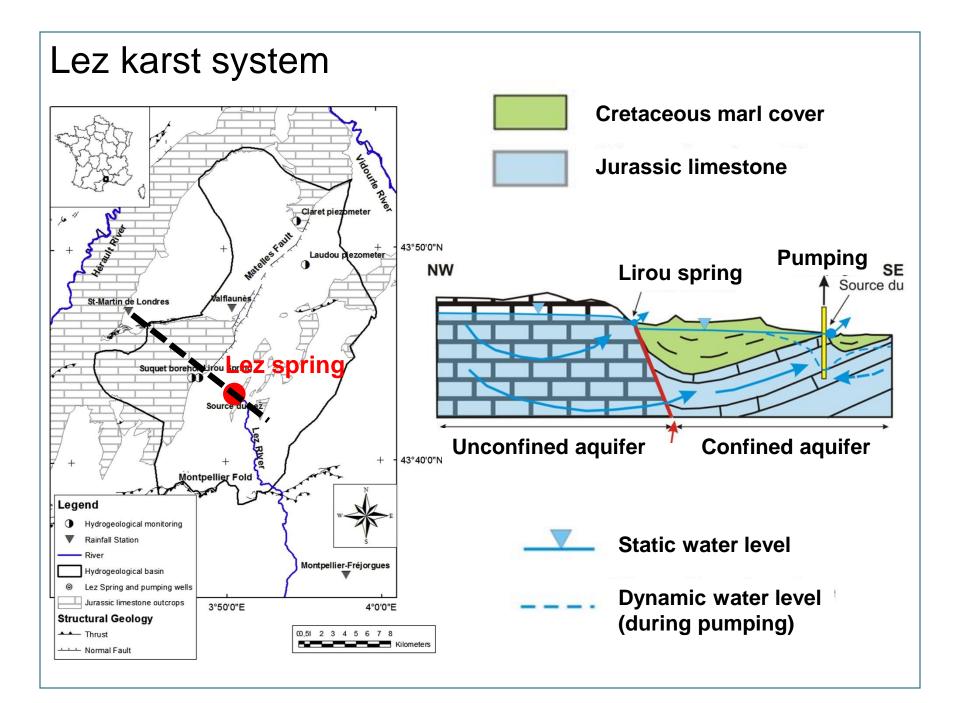


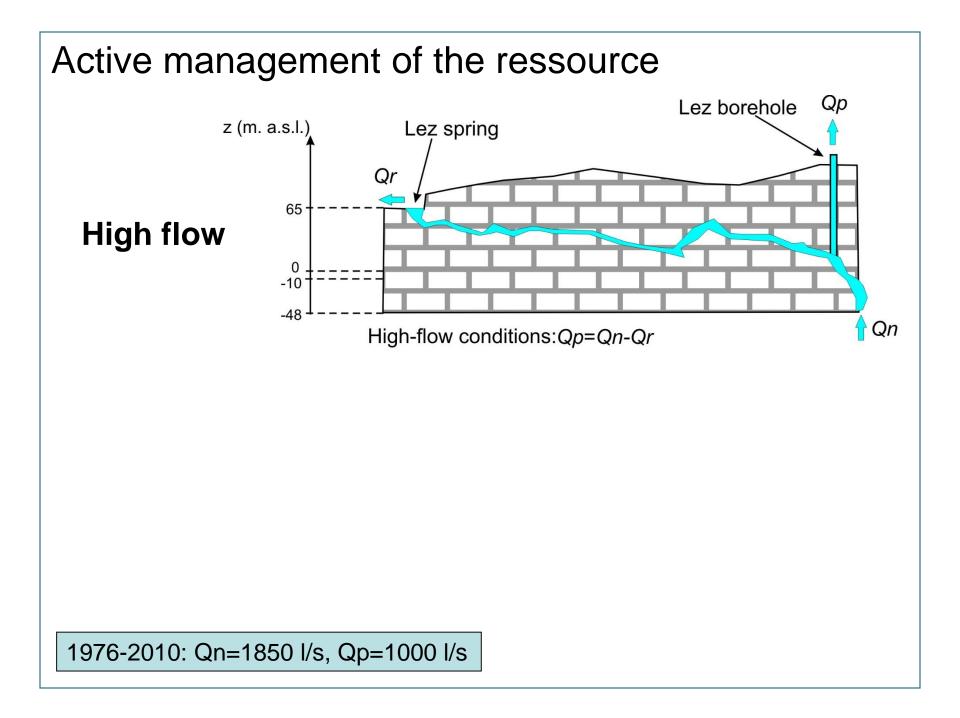
- In 1968, set-up of 3 pumps into the spring
- > In 1982, building of the pumping system

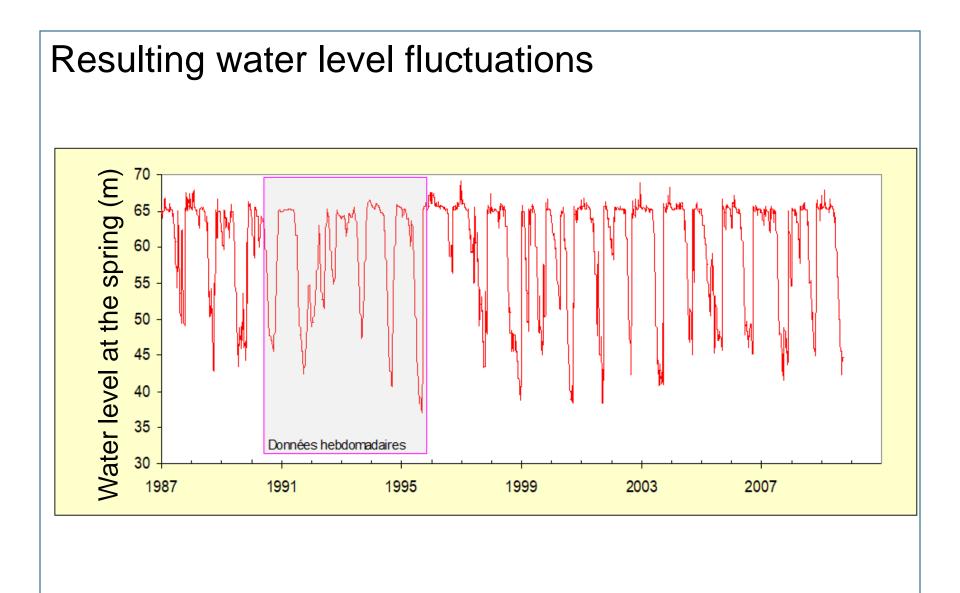


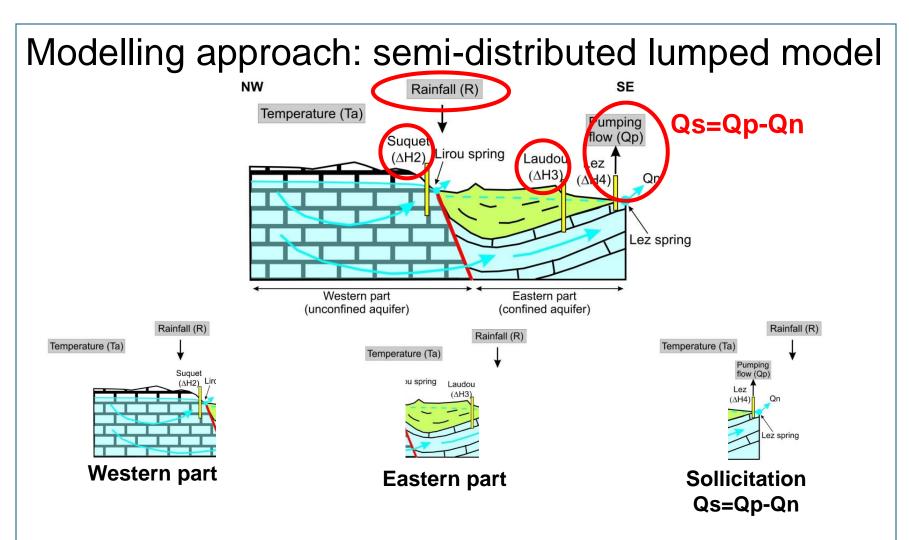




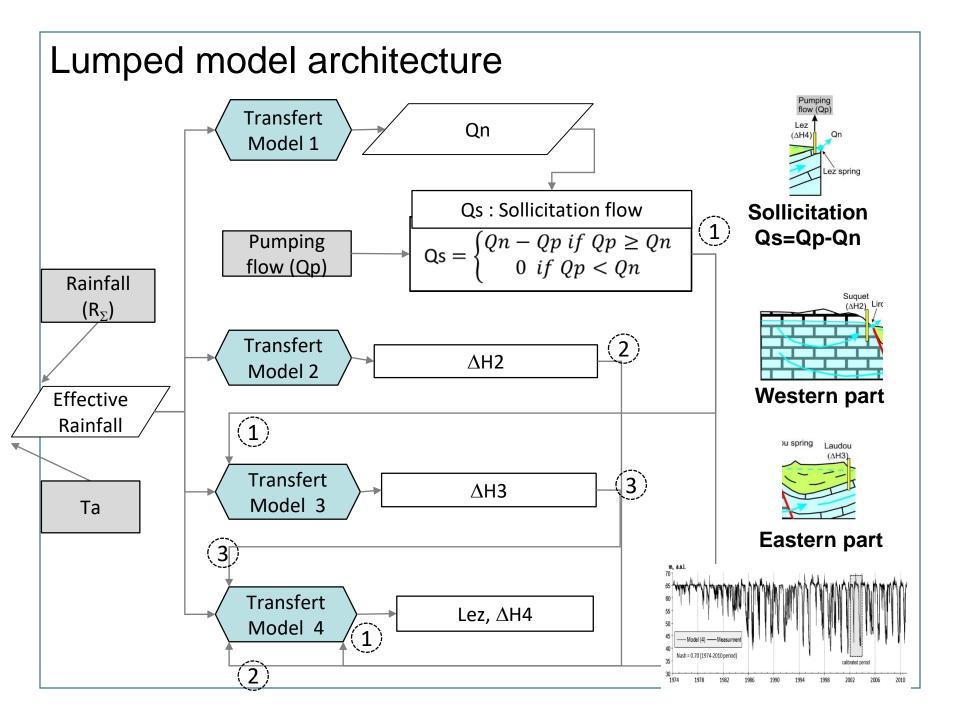




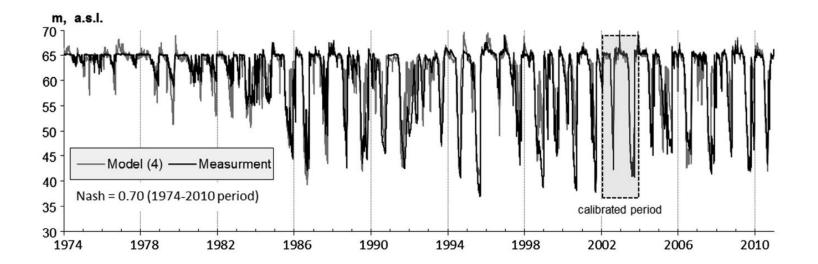




- Hydrogeologic modeling was performed using transfer methods implemented with TEMPO software
- Calculation of the impulse responses of the transfer modules is achieved by inverse modeling

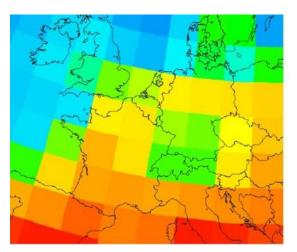

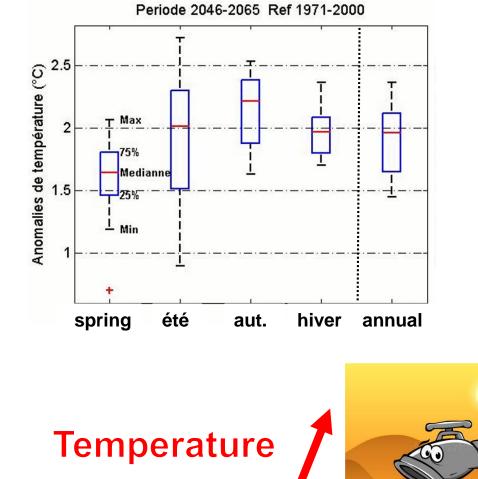

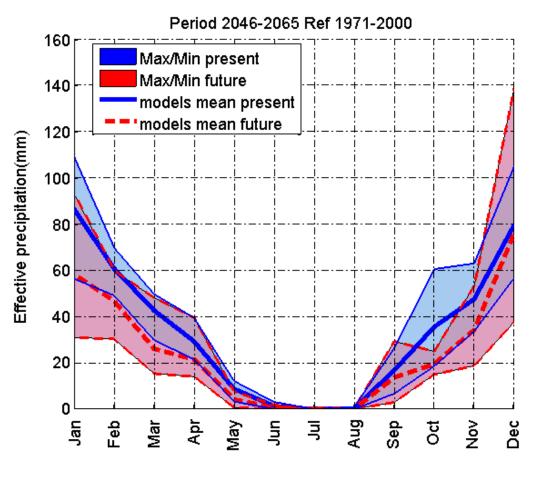
Demand change: evolution of pumping



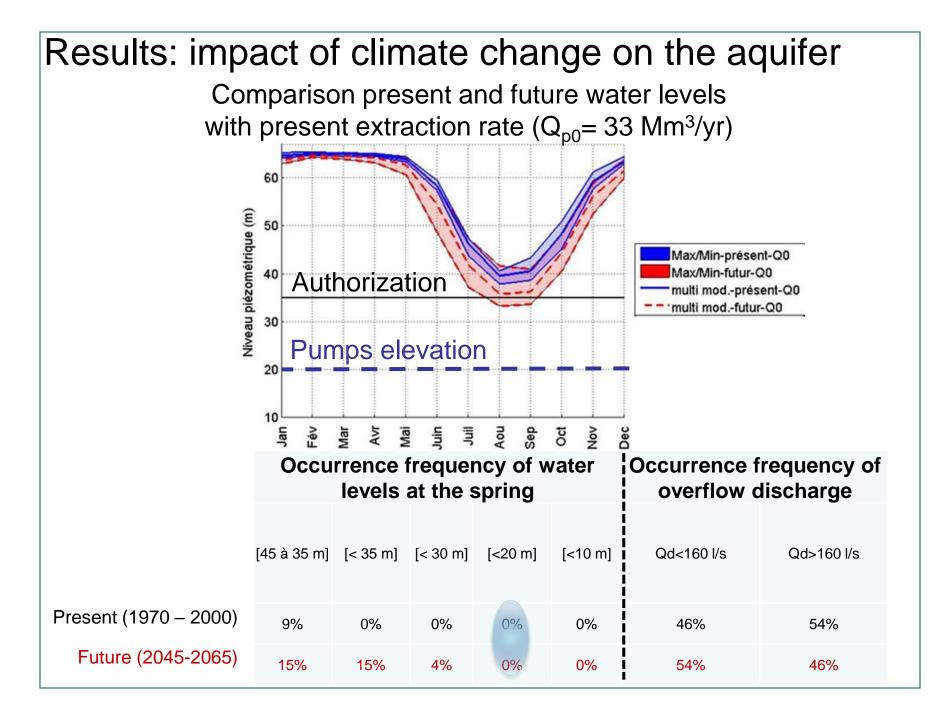
Hypothesis:

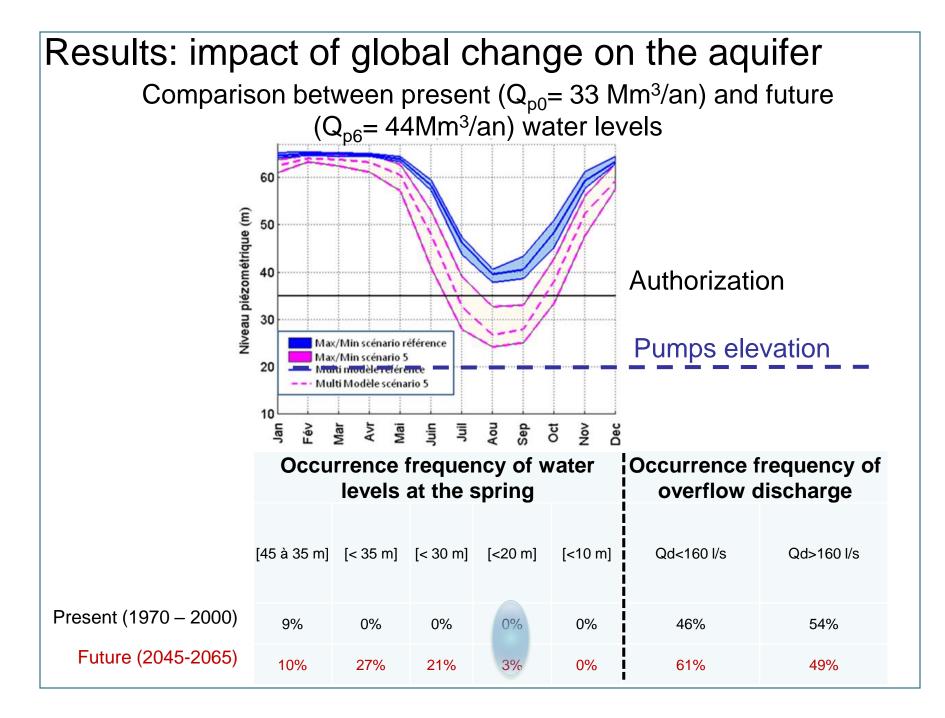
- Population increase (0,9 %/yr)
- Present consumption rate
- 10% decrease of consumption rate
- Present area
- Extended area

Impact of climate change on effective rainfall



- 30 % effective rainfall





Conclusion

- Semi-distributed global modeling approach has been developed in order to simulate water levels in the different parts of the aquifer and the discharge rate at the spring;
- Climate change would induce a decline of recharge rate → water levels and discharge rates decrease;
- Aquifer active management could allow an adaptation to global change;
- Pumping system could allow an increase of abstraction rate in the future BUT a pumping test in real conditions is necessary to investigate the hydrodynamic properties of the aquifer in low flow conditions;
- Mediterranean karst aquifers could constitute promising water reources in the future.
