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NOTES ON COMPLETE MONOTONICITY RELATED TO THE DIFFERENCE OF THE PSI AND LOGARITHMIC FUNCTIONS

ABSTRACT. In the paper, the authors simply survey complete monotonicity of several functions involving the difference of the psi and logarithmic functions and present a concise proof for complete monotonicity of a function involving the difference of the psi and logarithmic functions.

1. MOTIVATIONS AND MAIN RESULTS

Recall from [10, Chapter XIII], [14, Chapter 1], and [15, Chapter IV] that a function f is said to be completely monotonic on an interval I if f has derivatives of all orders on I and

$$(-1)^n f^{(n)}(x) \ge 0$$

for all $x \in I$ and $n \in \{0\} \cup \mathbb{N}$. Theorem 12b in [15, p. 161] states that a necessary and sufficient condition for f(x) to be completely monotonic on $(0, \infty)$ is that

$$f(x) = \int_0^\infty e^{-xt} \,\mathrm{d}\,\mu(t),$$

where μ is a positive measure on $[0, \infty)$ such that the above integral converges on $(0, \infty)$.

In [2, pp. 374–375, Theorem 1] and [8, Theorem 1], it was verified that the function

$$x^{\alpha}[\ln x - \psi(x)]$$

for $\alpha \in \mathbb{R}$ is completely monotonic on $(0, \infty)$ if and only if $\alpha \leq 1$.

In [13, Theorem 1.7], it was proved that the function

$$x^{2}[\psi(x) - \ln x] + \frac{x}{2}$$

is strictly decreasing and convex on $(0,\infty)$ and, as $x \to \infty$, tends to $-\frac{1}{12}$.

In [3, Theorem 1], it was discovered that the function

$$x^{2}[\psi(x) - \ln x] + \frac{x}{2} + \frac{1}{12}$$

is completely monotonic on $(0, \infty)$.

In [1, p. 259, 6.3.18] and [11, p. 140, 5.11.2], the asymptotic formula

$$\psi(z) \sim \ln z - \frac{1}{2z} - \sum_{n=1}^{\infty} \frac{B_{2n}}{2nz^{2n}}$$

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$$= \ln z - \frac{1}{2z} - \frac{1}{12z^2} + \frac{1}{120z^4} - \frac{1}{252z^6} + \cdots$$

as $z \to \infty$ in $|\arg z| < \pi$ was listed, where B_{2n} denotes the Bernoulli numbers.

The above conclusions motivate us to guess that the functions $n = \frac{1}{n} \frac{n}{n} \frac{1}{n} \frac{$

$$F_n(x) = (-1)^{n+1} \left(x^{2n} [\psi(x) - \ln x] + \frac{1}{2} x^{2n-1} + \sum_{k=1}^n \frac{B_{2k}}{2k} x^{2(n-k)} \right)$$

for $n \ge 2$ are also completely monotonic on $(0, \infty)$. Actually, this guess is wrong, because

$$[F_{2}(x)]' = -\frac{1}{6}x[6x^{3}\psi'(x) + 24x^{2}\psi(x) - 24x^{2}\ln x - 6x^{2} + 9x + 1]$$

$$\rightarrow \begin{cases} 0, & x \to 0^{+} \\ \frac{24\gamma - \pi^{2} - 4}{6}, & x \to 1 \\ \frac{96\gamma - 8\pi^{2} - 43 + 96\ln 2}{3}, & x \to 2 \end{cases}$$

$$= \begin{cases} 0 \\ -0.0027380... \\ -0.0006673... \end{cases}$$

shows that the derivative $[F_2(x)]'$ is not monotonic on $(0, \infty)$, where $\gamma = 0.577...$ denotes the Euler-Mascheroni constant.

In this paper, motivated by the second proof of [8, Theorem 1], we will present a concise proof, which is simpler than the corresponding proof in [3, Theorem 1], for complete monotonicity of the function $x^2[\psi(x) - \ln x] + \frac{x}{2} + \frac{1}{12}$ on $(0, \infty)$.

Theorem 1. The function

$$x^{2}[\psi(x) - \ln x] + \frac{x}{2} + \frac{1}{12}$$

is completely monotonic on $(0,\infty)$, with the limits

$$\lim_{x \to 0} \left(x^2 [\psi(x) - \ln x] + \frac{x}{2} + \frac{1}{12} \right) = \frac{1}{12}$$
(1)

and

$$\lim_{x \to \infty} \left(x^2 [\psi(x) - \ln x] + \frac{x}{2} + \frac{1}{12} \right) = 0.$$
 (2)

2. A concise proof of Theorem 1

In [11, p. 140, 5.9.13], it was listed that

$$\psi(z) = \ln z + \int_0^\infty \left(\frac{1}{t} - \frac{1}{1 - e^{-t}}\right) e^{-tz} \,\mathrm{d} t.$$

By integration by part, this formula can be reformulated as

$$\psi(x) - \ln x + \frac{1}{x} = \int_0^\infty \left(\frac{1}{t} - \frac{1}{e^t - 1}\right) e^{-xt} \,\mathrm{d}\,t$$
$$= -\frac{1}{x} \left\{ \left[h(t)e^{-xt}\right]\Big|_{t=0}^{t=\infty} - \int_0^\infty h'(t)e^{-xt} \,\mathrm{d}\,t \right\}$$

$$= \frac{1}{2x} + \frac{1}{x} \int_0^\infty h'(t) e^{-xt} \,\mathrm{d}\,t,$$

where the function

$$h(t) = \begin{cases} \frac{1}{t} - \frac{1}{e^t - 1}, & t \neq 0\\ \frac{1}{2}, & t = 0 \end{cases}$$

satisfies

$$\lim_{t \to 0^+} h'(t) = -\frac{1}{12}, \quad \lim_{t \to \infty} h'(t) = 0, \tag{3}$$

and is concave on $(-\infty, 0)$ and convex on $(0, \infty)$. For information on the function h(t), please refer to [16, Theorem 1] and [4, 5, 6, 7, 9, 12]. Consequently, integrating by part again yields

$$x^{2}[\psi(x) - \ln x] + \frac{x}{2} + \frac{1}{12} = \frac{1}{12} + x \int_{0}^{\infty} h'(t)e^{-xt} dt$$
$$= \frac{1}{12} - \int_{0}^{\infty} h'(t) d(e^{-xt}) = \int_{0}^{\infty} h''(t)e^{-xt} dt.$$

Accordingly, by virtue of [15, p. 161, Theorem 12b] mentioned at the beginning of this paper, the convexity of the function h(t) on $(0, \infty)$ implies that the function $x^2[\psi(x) - \ln x] + \frac{x}{2} + \frac{1}{12}$ is completely monotonic on $(0, \infty)$, while the limits in (3) imply the limits (1) and (2) immediately. The proof of Theorem 1 is complete.

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
