### • PLA

- > Aliphatic bio-based polyester
- > Eco-friendly (vs. oil-based polymers)
- > Biodegradable

### PLA foams

> Weight reduction (energy reduction, specific properties, ...)

> Different possible material engineering applications (packaging, thermal or sound insulation, ...)

### Many attention is paid worldwide to this kind of material

> Optimization of chemical foaming of a linear PLA on a single-screw extruder based on a weight reduction criterion

- > Optimized parameters:
- Barrel temperature profile
- Die temperature
- Screw speed
- CBA content
- Cooling system

 Advantage: continuous extrusion (or injection molding) foaming on standard equipment

Drawback: lower weight reduction than physical foaming

Cooling system: Three-roll calendar T=-15 °C

Slit Die 40x1.5 mm <sup>2</sup>	

Single-screw extruder Diameter: 30 mm, L/D: 24

CBA content: 4 wt%

#### 49 % weight reduction

(Theoretical maximum: 80 %)

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Improvements expected from PLA modification:

- Irradiation
- Chain extender addition
- Melt Strength Enhancer addition (operates differently than 1 et 2)
- > Higher heat stability
- > Higher melt strength (branching, crosslinks, physical interactions)
- > Lower in-process degradability (chain scissions limitation, ...)

> Improvement of foam mechanical properties (stiffness, tensile strength, ...)

#### $\gamma$ -irradiation + crosslinking agent

### > Irradiation (electron beam, $\gamma$ -ray) induces random chain scissions (average molecular weight reduction) correlated with decrease of T<sub>m</sub>, T<sub>g</sub> and some mechanical properties (stiffness)

### > Addition of crosslinking agents could overcome these drawbacks. Polyfunctional monomers as TAIC (triallyl isocyanurate) are very effective for crosslinking of PLA by irradiation technique

#### **Chain extenders**

# > Reactive mixing in presence of peroxides or isocyanates makes possible crosslinking of PLA $\rightarrow$ partial or total gelation

#### **Melt Strength Enhancers**

> No reactive mixing is involved. High molecular weight polymers (acrylic, ...) are dispersed in a PLA matrix. The increase in melt elongation viscosty results from entanglements (Biostrength <sup>®</sup> – Arkema)

## **Objectives**

Two types of modification of a linear PLA are investigated:  $\gamma$ -ray irradiation and addition of chain extenders

- > Effects on the weight reduction (foaming ability)
- > Effects on the cellular morphology

## **Materials and Experiments**

## **Materials**

### PLA

- > Grade INGEO<sup>™</sup> 7000D (NatureWorks<sup>®</sup> LLC Injection Stretch Blow Molding)
- ≻ Linear PLA T<sub>g</sub>: 55-60 °C T<sub>m</sub>: 145-155 °C M<sub>w</sub>: 340 kDa D content: 6.4 %

### CBA

- > HYDROCEROL<sup>®</sup> CT 3108 (Clariant Masterbatches)
- > Sodium bicarbonate, citric acid and nucleating agents Gaseous output: 50 ml/g Decomposition liberating  $CO_2$  and  $H_2O$  ( $T_d$ : 138-216 °C) 4 wt% of CFA for all materials

### **Crosslinking agent**

TAIC - triallyl isocyanurate (Aldrich) – polyfunctional monomer

### **Chain extender**

CESA<sup>®</sup>-extend BLA0050109-ZN based on a styrene/acrylic/glycidyl ethylacrylate terpolymer (Clariant Masterbatches)

## **Materials and Experiments**

## Processing

Or

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\gamma-ray irradiation + coupling agent (TAIC)

> Two steps: PLA+TAIC (1, 3 wt%) compounding → \gamma-irradiation (5, 10, 25,

50 kGy – IONISOS - France)

> Coding: PLAx/y (x kGy, y wt% of TAIC)
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### **Chain extender**

> Compounding PLA+CESA<sup>®</sup>-extend

> Coding: PLAxC (x wt% of CESA)

### Compounding (PLA+TAIC, PLA+CESA<sup>®</sup>-extend)

- > Twin-screw extruder (Clextral BC21 screw diameter: 25 mm, L/D: 36)
- > Temperatures (from hopper to die): 100/165/170-170 °C, screw speed: 250 rpm

→ Single-Screw Extrusion Foaming

### **Rheology** – $\gamma$ -ray irradiation



#### **Oscillatory Rotational ShearViscometry** – Complex Viscosity Modulus

 Without TAIC the irradiation causes a decrease in complex viscosity (non extruded samples)

- > Addition of TAIC induces an increase in complex viscosity
- → Both results are consistent: TAIC compensates degradation caused by irradiation Biofoams 2011 September 23<sup>rd</sup> 2011 Modification of PLA J.-C. Quantin

### Solution Viscometry – Viscosity Average Molecular Weight M<sub>v</sub>

Without TAIC the irradiation causes a decrease of
 M<sub>v</sub> probably due to chain scissions

> The addition of a little amount (1 wt%) of TAIC increases  $M_v \rightarrow cross$ -linking limiting PLA degradation



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### **Rheology – Chain extender**



### Shear Oscillatory Viscometry – Complex Viscosity Modulus

> η\* increases as CESA fraction increases.

> Transition in the range 0 to 10 rad/s from a Newtonian (3 wt% CESA) to a power law behavior (<3 wt % CESA)</p>

### → Both results are consistent

#### Solution Viscometry – Viscosity Average Molecular Weight M<sub>v</sub>

M<sub>v</sub> increases when the weight fraction of chain extender increases (47 % increase with 3 wt% of CESA<sup>®</sup>-extend). So the incorporation of CESA into PLA is a reactive phenomenon which induces longer macromolecular chains in the PLA 7000D.



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## Void fraction /Cellular Morphology – $\gamma$ -ray irradiation

> All irradiated materials could not be foamed: viscosity either too low, either too high (presence of unmelted parts) - Foamed materials: PLA5/1, PLA10/1, PLA5/3

- > d<sub>n</sub>: number average cell size
- >  $\delta$ : average cell's wall thickness
- > N<sub>c</sub>: cell's density
- > C<sub>o</sub>: open-cell content



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## Void fraction /Cellular Morphology – $\gamma$ -ray irradiation



**PLA 7000D** 







- > Irradiation+TAIC induces a reduction of the void fraction
- > Cell size is reduced
- > Open-cell content is reduced (except at 3 wt% TAIC)
- Cell wall thickness is quite constant



→ All results are quite consistent:
 TAIC compensates degradation
 caused by irradiation → increase in
 melt strength, but this causes no
 noticeable improvement in
 foaming efficiency

### **Void fraction /Cellular Morphology – Chain Extender**

#### > All materials were foamed

#### Foamed materials: PLAOC, PLA0.5C, PLA1.5C, PLA2C, PLA3C

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## **Void fraction /Cellular Morphology – Chain Extender**



First extrusion of neat PLA
 degrades its foaming ability (void
 fraction 49 to 43 %)

> Addition of CESA induces a reduction of the void fraction

- Cells size is reduced
- > Open-cell content is reduced
- > Cells wall thickness is increased

→ All results are consistent: addition of CESA favors chain branching → increase in melt strength → nucleation rather growing of cells is promoted

→ No noticeable improvement in foaming efficiency

## Conclusions

Effects of PLA modifications on foaming efficiency and final structure

 High melt strength induced by chain branching may slow down the cell growing

 Both types of modification induce finer cellular morphologies and higher cell density

• For PLA7000D no higher weight reduction is observed. Moreover  $\gamma$ -ray irradiation or addition of chain extenders could be a way to better control the final foam morphology
