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

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

Recent global warming has strong impacts on both atmospheric and climatic variability.

In Europe, Northern Atlantic Oscillation is the most occuring teleconnexion mode, particularly during winter. (Hurrel, 1995) Positive phases are associated with milder and wetter types of weather than average (fig.1; Casado et al. 2013).

Associated with increased annual temperatures in Scandinavia, milder and wetter conditions in winter have a lot of direct and indirect effects on sub

## Material and methods

DATA ACQUISI -TION

- Hardangervidda wild reindeer' GPS tracks, 2007-2010, (Cagnacci et al. 2016, <a href="https://datadryad.org">https://datadryad.org</a>)
- NAO daily index, 2007-2010, <a href="www.cpc.ncep.noaa.gov">www.cpc.ncep.noaa.gov</a>
- Local meteorological records, 2007-2010, Høydalsmo & Rauland stations (www.eklima.org)

CENTR ALIZATI ON


- From 3 hours GPS logs to 1 day (mean)
- From individuals to the whole monitored reindeer population
- One day from November to February (2007-2010) = 1 latitude, 1 longitude, 1 NAO index, 1 T°C mean, 1 precipitation...

STATIS-TICS

- Linear regression (Spearman correlation coefficient) between recorded GPS latitudes and longitudes, atmospheric and meteorological tested factors
- Selection of significant correlations ( $\alpha \ge 0.3$ ; p $\le 0.05$ )




located in the Hardangervidda plateau (fig. 4) is currently facing a constant decline of its population since 1950.
For this herd, number of

reindeer was about 30 000 during 60's, and was about 5000 in 2010 (Uboni, 2016).

Figure 5 displays every reindeers' GPS track according to the month it has been recorded (2007-2010). Three main seasonal vital areas are visible here, even if mapped GPS logs show a certain heterogeneity (for example blue points/winter tracks inside calving area/red points).

Statistical results (fig. 6) shows significant relationships between reindeers' GPS location, NAO values and climatic records. The more the NAO is positive, the more GPS tracks tend to be southerner or westerner (11 significant correlations/13). NAO+ phases are strongly correlated with mild and wet weather (17 positive relationships between NAO/T°C over 19 significant correlations; 11 positive relationships over 12 for NAO/Pmm). These results suggest that NAO+ phases are related to milder and wetter conditions, themselves related to movement patterns comparable to spring migration, initially toward calving areas. A longer time series, and/or other GPS-equipped reindeers' sub-populations would strengthen this results. A detailed-scale analysis of habitat selection during positive phase of NAO in winter would allow us to better understand resilience of reindeer to climatic variability.
