#### The vulnerable user of the social services

Vulnerability arises from the interaction of personal characteristics (such as poverty, isolation, disability...) and external conditions. The user of social services is vulnerable if he feels powerless in a situation that requires competencies and resources that he cannot mobilize.

How can the service provider promote the service coproduction to reduce perceived vulnerability and improve service quality?

A case study in the reception service of a family benefice department (Caisse d'allocations familiales): 47 observations of interactions between users and front-line staff followed by 43 semi-structured interviews with the users.

#### Identify the competencies and the resources of the user in the coproduction of social service ...

#### ... To improve the coproduction of the social services:

- > A design of reception policy based on the competencies of users
  - Reception on appointment: users with the basic competencies;
  - Self-service (website, printer): users with all competencies;
  - Reception without appointment: users without basic competencies, often in an extreme situation of economic and social precariousness, or users with a punctual /new problem.

#### Interact with the users in social services is a real profession

- o Front-line staff has significant technical and relational competencies;
- Front-line staff is voluntary;
- They promote the acquisition of internal resources and competencies by the user;
  - But the service provider has limited actions on certain resources.
