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A LOGARITHMICALLY COMPLETELY MONOTONIC FUNCTION INVOLVING THE q-GAMMA FUNCTION

FENG QI

ABSTRACT. In the paper, the author proves the logarithmically complete monotonicity of a function involving the q-gamma function and derives some inequalities for the q-multinomial coefficient and the q-multivariate beta function. These conclusions generalize corresponding ones for the gamma function, the multinomial coefficient, and the multivariate beta function respectively.

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1. Preliminaries

Suppose that $f: I \to \infty$ is an infinite differentiable function on an interval I. If

$$0 \le (-1)^{n-1} f^{(n-1)}(x) < \infty, \quad n \in \mathbb{N},$$

then we call f a completely monotonic function; if $f: I \to (0, \infty)$ is positive and

$$(-1)^n [\ln f(x)]^{(n)} > 0, \quad n \in \mathbb{N},$$

then we call f a logarithmically completely monotonic function; if $f:(0,\infty)\to [0,\infty)$ can be written in the form

$$f(x) = \frac{a}{x} + b + \int_0^\infty \frac{1}{s+x} \mathrm{d}\,\mu(s),$$

where a,b are non-negative constants and μ is a measure on $(0,\infty)$ such that $\int_0^\infty \frac{1}{1+s} \, \mathrm{d}\,\mu(s) < \infty$, then we call f a Stieltjes transform. For more details on definitions and properties of these kinds of functions, please see [15, Chapter XIII], [32, Chapter 1], and [33, Chapter IV]. Among these three kinds of functions, there are the following relations:

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(1) a function f is completely monotonic on $(0, \infty)$ if and only if it is a Laplace transform, that is, there is a positive measure μ on $[0, \infty)$ such that

$$f(x) = \int_0^\infty e^{-xt} \,\mathrm{d}\,\mu(t);$$

- (2) the set of all logarithmically completely monotonic functions is a strict subset of all completely monotonic functions;
- (3) the set of all Stieltjes transforms is a strict subset of all logarithmically completely monotonic functions on $(0, \infty)$.

For details on these relations, please refer to [5, 8, 24, 25, 32] and closely related references therein. For information on new developments of these kinds of functions, please refer to [7, 9, 23, 26, 30, 31, 32] and closely related references therein.

The classical Euler's gamma function $\Gamma(z)$ can be defined [22] by

$$\Gamma(z) = \int_0^\infty t^{z-1} e^{-t} dt, \quad \Re(z) > 0$$

or by

$$\Gamma(z) = \lim_{n \to \infty} \frac{n! n^z}{\prod_{k=0}^n (z+k)}, \quad z \in \mathbb{C} \setminus \{0, -1, -2, \dots\}.$$

The logarithmic derivative of $\Gamma(z)$, denoted by $\psi(z) = \frac{\Gamma'(z)}{\Gamma(z)}$, and the derivatives $\psi^{(i)}(x)$ for $i \in \mathbb{N}$ are respectively called the digamma (or psi) function and polygamma functions. See [1, Chapter 6] and [16, Chapter 5].

The q-analogue $\Gamma_q(x)$ of the gamma function $\Gamma(x)$ for q > 0 and x > 0, called the q-gamma function, can be defined [3, pp. 493–496] and [6, Section 1.10] by

$$\Gamma_{q}(x) = \begin{cases}
(1-q)^{1-x} \prod_{i=0}^{\infty} \frac{1-q^{i+1}}{1-q^{i+x}}, & 0 < q < 1; \\
(q-1)^{1-x} q^{\binom{x}{2}} \prod_{i=0}^{\infty} \frac{1-q^{-(i+1)}}{1-q^{-(i+x)}}, & q > 1; \\
\Gamma(x), & q = 1.
\end{cases}$$
(1.1)

They satisfy

$$\lim_{q \to 1^+} \Gamma_q(z) = \lim_{q \to 1^-} \Gamma_q(z) = \Gamma(z) \quad \text{and} \quad \Gamma_q(x) = q^{\binom{x-1}{2}} \Gamma_{1/q}(x).$$

The q-analogue $\psi_q(x)$ of the digamma function $\psi(x)$ for q > 0 and x > 0, called the q-digamma function, is defined by

$$\psi_q(x) = \begin{cases} \frac{\Gamma_q'(x)}{\Gamma_q(x)}; & q \neq 1, \\ \psi(x), & q = 1. \end{cases}$$

The q-analogues $\psi_q^{(k)}(x)$ of the polygamma functions $\psi^{(k)}(x)$ for $k \in \mathbb{N}$ are called the q-polygamma functions. From (1.1), we obtain that,

(1) when 0 < q < 1 and $x \in (0, \infty)$

$$\psi_q(x) = -\ln(1-q) + (\ln q) \sum_{k=0}^{\infty} \frac{q^{k+x}}{1 - q^{k+x}} = -\ln(1-q) + (\ln q) \sum_{k=1}^{\infty} \frac{q^{kx}}{1 - q^k},$$

(2) when q > 1 and $x \in (0, \infty)$,

$$\psi_q(x) = -\ln(q-1) + (\ln q) \left(x - \frac{1}{2} - \sum_{i=1}^{\infty} \frac{q^{-ix}}{1 - q^{-i}} \right).$$

The formula (1.11) in the paper [11] and its corrected version [12] reads that

$$\psi_q(x) = -\ln(1-q) - \int_0^\infty \frac{e^{-xt}}{1 - e^{-t}} \,\mathrm{d}\,\gamma_q(t) \tag{1.2}$$

for 0 < q < 1 and x > 0, where

$$\gamma_q(t) = \begin{cases} -\ln q \sum_{k=1}^{\infty} \delta(t + k \ln q), & 0 < q < 1 \\ t, & q = 1 \end{cases}$$
 (1.3)

and $\delta(t)$ represents the Dirac delta function, that is, $d\gamma_q(t)$ is a discrete measure with positive masses $|\ln q|$ at the positive points $k|\ln q|$ for $k\in\mathbb{N}$. Accordingly, we obtain

$$\int_0^\infty e^{-xt} \,\mathrm{d}\,\gamma_q(t) = -\frac{q^x \ln q}{1 - q^x}$$

and

$$\int_0^\infty t e^{-xt} \, \mathrm{d} \, \gamma_q(t) = \frac{q^x (\ln q)^2}{(1 - q^x)^2}$$

for 0 < q < 1 and x > 0. Differentiating with respect to x on both sides of (1.2) yields

$$\psi_q^{(k)}(x) = (-1)^{k+1} \int_0^\infty \frac{t^k e^{-xt}}{1 - e^{-t}} \, \mathrm{d} \, \gamma_q(t), \quad 0 < q < 1, \quad k \in \mathbb{N}.$$
 (1.4)

In [10, p. 1245, Theorem 4.4, (4.15)], [18, Lemma 2.3 and Remark 2.1], [19, Theorem 7.2, (7.5)], and [28, p. 152, Theorem 4.22, (4.20)], it was presented that, when 0 < q < 1, the identity

$$\psi_q^{(k-1)}(x) - \psi_q^{(k-1)}(x+1) = (\ln q) \frac{\mathrm{d}^{k-1}}{\mathrm{d} \, x^{k-1}} \left(\frac{q^x}{1 - q^x} \right)$$

is valid for $x \in (0, \infty)$ and $k \in \mathbb{N}$. One can also find these knowledge in [18, 19, 20, 21, 27] and closely related references.

2. Motivations

Let $\mathbf{a} = (a_1, a_2, ..., a_m)$ with $a_i > 0$ for $1 \le i \le m$, let $\mathbf{p} = (p_1, p_2, ..., p_m)$ with $\sum_{i=1}^{m} p_i = 1$ and $p_i \in (0, 1)$ for $1 \le i \le m$, let

$$\binom{\sum_{i=1}^{m} a_i}{a_1, a_2, \dots, a_m} = \frac{\Gamma(1 + \sum_{i=1}^{m} a_i)}{\Gamma(1 + a_1)\Gamma(1 + a_2) \cdots \Gamma(1 + a_m)}$$

denote the multinomial coefficient, and let

$$B(a_1, a_2, \dots, a_m) = \frac{\Gamma(a_1)\Gamma(a_2)\cdots\Gamma(a_m)}{\Gamma(a_1 + a_2 + \dots + a_m)}$$

be the multivariate beta function. In [17] and [29], the authors considered the function

$$Q(x) = Q_{\boldsymbol{a},\boldsymbol{p};m}(x) = \frac{\Gamma(1 + x \sum_{i=1}^{m} a_i)}{\prod_{i=1}^{m} \Gamma(1 + xa_i)} \prod_{i=1}^{m} p_i^{xa_i} = \begin{pmatrix} x \sum_{i=1}^{m} a_i \\ xa_1, xa_2, \dots, xa_m \end{pmatrix} \prod_{i=1}^{m} p_i^{xa_i}$$
$$= \frac{\sum_{i=1}^{m} a_i}{\prod_{i=1}^{m} a_i} \frac{\prod_{i=1}^{m} p_i^{xa_i}}{x^{m-1} B(xa_1, xa_2, \dots, xa_m)}, \quad x \in (0, \infty), \quad m \in \mathbb{N} \quad (2.1)$$

and, among other things, proved the following theorem.

Theorem 2.1 ([17, Theorem 2.1] and [29, Thereom 2.2]). The function $Q(x) = Q_{a,p;m}(x)$ defined in (2.1) is logarithmically completely monotonic on $(0,\infty)$.

For more information on the backgrounds, history, motivations, origins, and applications of the function $Q(x) = Q_{\boldsymbol{a},\boldsymbol{p};m}(x)$, please refer to [2, 13, 17, 29] and closely related references therein.

In this paper, we consider the q-analogue of the function $Q(x) = Q_{a,p;m}(x)$ and investigate its logarithmically complete monotonicity.

3. A LOGARITHMICALLY COMPLETELY MONOTONIC FUNCTION

Let $\boldsymbol{a}=(a_1,a_2,\ldots,a_m)$ with $a_i>0$ for $1\leq i\leq m$ and let $\boldsymbol{p}=(p_1,p_2,\ldots,p_m)$ with $\sum_{i=1}^m p_i=1$ and $p_i\in(0,1)$ for $1\leq i\leq m$. Define

$$Q_{q}(x) = Q_{q;\boldsymbol{a},\boldsymbol{p};m}(x) = \frac{\Gamma_{q}(1 + x \sum_{i=1}^{m} a_{i})}{\prod_{i=1}^{m} \Gamma_{q}(1 + x a_{i})} \prod_{i=1}^{m} p_{i}^{x a_{i}}$$
(3.1)

for $q \in (0,1), x \in (0,\infty)$, and $m \in \mathbb{N}$. It is clear that

$$\lim_{q \to 1^{-}} \mathcal{Q}_{q}(x) = \lim_{q \to 1^{-}} \mathcal{Q}_{q;\boldsymbol{a},\boldsymbol{p};m}(x) = \mathcal{Q}(x) = \mathcal{Q}_{\boldsymbol{a},\boldsymbol{p};m}(x).$$

Theorem 3.1. The function $Q_q(x) = Q_{q;\boldsymbol{a},\boldsymbol{p};m}(x)$ defined in (3.1) is logarithmically completely monotonic on $(0,\infty)$.

Proof. From (1.3) for 0 < q < 1 and the well-known property $\delta(at) = \frac{1}{|a|}\delta(t)$, it follows that

$$\gamma_q \left(\frac{t}{\tau} \right) = -\ln q \sum_{k=1}^{\infty} \delta \left(\frac{t + k\tau \ln q}{\tau} \right) = -\tau \ln q \sum_{k=1}^{\infty} \delta(t + k\tau \ln q)$$

for $\tau > 0$. This implies that

$$d\gamma_q\left(\frac{t}{\tau}\right) = \tau d\gamma_q(t). \tag{3.2}$$

Direct calculation gives

$$\ln \mathcal{Q}_q(x) = \ln \Gamma_q \left(1 + x \sum_{i=1}^m a_i \right) - \sum_{i=1}^m \ln \Gamma_q(1 + a_i x) + x \sum_{i=1}^m a_i \ln p_i,$$
$$[\ln \mathcal{Q}_q(x)]' = \left(\sum_{i=1}^m a_i \right) \psi_q \left(1 + x \sum_{i=1}^m a_i \right) - \sum_{i=1}^m a_i \psi_q(1 + a_i x) + \sum_{i=1}^m a_i \ln p_i,$$

and

$$[\ln \mathcal{Q}_q(x)]'' = \left(\sum_{i=1}^m a_i\right)^2 \psi_q' \left(1 + x \sum_{i=1}^m a_i\right) - \sum_{i=1}^m a_i^2 \psi_q' (1 + a_i x).$$

Making use of (1.4) for k = 1 and the equality (3.2), it follows that

$$\psi_q'(\tau x + 1) = \int_0^\infty \frac{t}{1 - e^{-t}} e^{-(\tau x + 1)t} \, \mathrm{d} \, \gamma_q(t) = \int_0^\infty \frac{t}{e^t - 1} e^{-\tau x t} \, \mathrm{d} \, \gamma_q(t)$$
$$= \int_0^\infty h\left(\frac{v}{\tau}\right) e^{-vx} \, \mathrm{d} \, \gamma_q\left(\frac{v}{\tau}\right) = \tau \int_0^\infty h\left(\frac{v}{\tau}\right) e^{-vx} \, \mathrm{d} \, \gamma_q(v),$$

where $\tau > 0$ and $h(t) = \frac{t}{e^t - 1}$. Hence, we have

$$\left[\ln \mathcal{Q}_q(x)\right]'' = \int_0^\infty \left[\left(\sum_{i=1}^m a_i\right)^3 h\left(\frac{v}{\sum_{i=1}^m a_i}\right) - \sum_{i=1}^m a_i^3 h\left(\frac{v}{a_i}\right) \right] e^{-xv} \,\mathrm{d}\,\gamma_q(v). \tag{3.3}$$

By calculus, we have

$$\frac{\mathrm{d}}{\mathrm{d}\,t} \left[t^3 h \left(\frac{1}{t} \right) \right] = \frac{\mathrm{d}}{\mathrm{d}\,t} \left(\frac{t^2}{e^{1/t} - 1} \right) = \frac{e^{1/t} (2t + 1) - 2t}{(e^{1/t} - 1)^2},$$

$$\frac{\mathrm{d}^2}{\mathrm{d}\,t^2} \left[t^3 h \left(\frac{1}{t} \right) \right] = \frac{2t^2 - e^{1/t} \left(4t^2 + 2t - 1 \right) + e^{2/t} \left(2t^2 + 2t + 1 \right)}{(e^{1/t} - 1)^3 t^2} \to 0, \quad t \to 0^+,$$

$$\frac{\mathrm{d}^3}{\mathrm{d}\,t^3} \left[t^3 h \left(\frac{1}{t} \right) \right] = \frac{e^{1/t} \left(4e^{1/t} + e^{2/t} + 1 \right)}{(e^{1/t} - 1)^4 t^4} > 0$$

on $(0, \infty)$. As a result, the function $t^3h(\frac{1}{t})$ is strictly convex on $(0, \infty)$. Recall from [14, p. 650] that

- (1) a function $\phi: [0, \infty) \to \mathbb{R}$ is said to be star-shaped if $\phi(\alpha x) \le \alpha \phi(x)$ for all $\alpha \in [0, 1]$ and $x \ge 0$;
- (2) a real function ϕ defined on a set $S \subset \mathbb{R}^n$ is said to be super-additive if $x, y \in S$ implies $x + y \in S$ and $\phi(x + y) \ge \phi(x) + \phi(y)$;
- (3) if ϕ is a real function defined on $[0, \infty)$, $\phi(0) \le 0$, and ϕ is convex, then ϕ is star-shaped, but convexity is not a property of all star-shaped functions;
- (4) if $\phi:[0,\infty)\to\mathbb{R}$ is star-shaped, then ϕ is super-additive.

Consequently, since $\lim_{t\to 0^+} \frac{t^2}{e^{1/t}-1} = 0$, the function $t^3h\left(\frac{1}{t}\right)$ is star-shaped, and then super-additive, on $(0,\infty)$. As a result, it follows inductively that

$$\left(\sum_{i=1}^{m} \frac{a_i}{v}\right)^3 h\left(\frac{1}{\sum_{i=1}^{m} (a_i/v)}\right) \ge \sum_{i=1}^{m} \left(\frac{a_i}{v}\right)^3 h\left(\frac{1}{a_i/v}\right)$$

which can be rearranged as

$$\left(\sum_{i=1}^{m} a_i\right)^3 h\left(\frac{v}{\sum_{i=1}^{m} a_i}\right) \ge \sum_{i=1}^{m} a_i^3 h\left(\frac{v}{a_i}\right).$$

Combining this with (3.3) yields that the second derivative $[\ln Q_q(x)]''$ is completely monotonic on $(0, \infty)$.

Complete monotonicity of $[\ln \mathcal{Q}_q(x)]''$ implies that the first derivative $[\ln \mathcal{Q}_q(x)]'$ is strictly increasing on $(0,\infty)$. Hence, from (1.2), it follows that

$$[\ln \mathcal{Q}_{q}(x)]' \leq \lim_{x \to \infty} \left[\left(\sum_{i=1}^{m} a_{i} \right) \psi_{q} \left(1 + x \sum_{i=1}^{m} a_{i} \right) - \sum_{i=1}^{m} a_{i} \psi_{q} (1 + a_{i}x) \right] + \sum_{i=1}^{m} a_{i} \ln p_{i}$$

$$= \left[\left(\sum_{i=1}^{m} a_{i} \right) \lim_{x \to \infty} \psi_{q} \left(1 + x \sum_{i=1}^{m} a_{i} \right) - \sum_{i=1}^{m} a_{i} \lim_{x \to \infty} \psi_{q} (1 + a_{i}x) \right] + \sum_{i=1}^{m} a_{i} \ln p_{i}$$

$$= \left[-\left(\sum_{i=1}^{m} a_{i} \right) \ln(1 - q) + \sum_{i=1}^{m} a_{i} \ln(1 - q) \right] + \sum_{i=1}^{m} a_{i} \ln p_{i} = \sum_{i=1}^{m} a_{i} \ln p_{i} < 0.$$

By definition, the function $Q_q(x)$ is logarithmically completely monotonic on $(0, \infty)$. The proof of Theorem 3.1 is complete.

4. Inequalities for the q-multinomial coefficient

Let $\mathbf{a} = (a_1, a_2, \dots, a_m)$ with $a_i > 0$ for $1 \le i \le m$. Then the q-multinomial coefficient for $q \in (0, 1)$ is

$$\begin{pmatrix}
\sum_{i=1}^{m} a_i \\
a_1, a_2, \dots, a_m
\end{pmatrix}_q = \frac{\Gamma_q (1 + \sum_{i=1}^{m} a_i)}{\Gamma_q (1 + a_1) \Gamma_q (1 + a_2) \dots \Gamma_q (1 + a_m)}.$$
(4.1)

With the aid of logarithmically complete monotonicity of $Q_q(x) = Q_{q;\boldsymbol{a},\boldsymbol{p};m}(x)$, we now present some inequalities for the q-multinomial coefficient.

Theorem 4.1. Let $q \in (0,1)$, $\ell, m \in \mathbb{N}$, and $\mathbf{a} = (a_1, a_2, \dots, a_m)$ with $a_i > 0$ for $1 \le i \le m$. If $x_j > 0$ for $1 \le j \le \ell$ and $\lambda_j \in (0,1)$ with $\sum_{j=1}^{\ell} \lambda_j = 1$, then

$$\begin{pmatrix}
\sum_{j=1}^{\ell} \lambda_j x_j \sum_{i=1}^{m} a_i \\
a_1 \sum_{j=1}^{\ell} \lambda_j x_j, a_2 \sum_{j=1}^{\ell} \lambda_j x_j, \dots, a_m \sum_{j=1}^{\ell} \lambda_j x_j
\end{pmatrix}_{q}$$

$$\leq \prod_{j=1}^{\ell} \begin{pmatrix} x_j \sum_{i=1}^{m} a_i \\ x_j a_1, x_j a_2, \dots, x_j a_m \end{pmatrix}_{q}^{\lambda_j}$$
(4.2)

and the equality in (4.2) holds if and only if $x_1 = x_2 = \cdots = x_\ell$.

Proof. The logarithmically complete monotonicity in Theorem 3.1 indicates that the function $Q_q(x)$ is logarithmically convex on $(0, \infty)$. Hence, one acquires

$$Q_q\left(\sum_{j=1}^{\ell} \lambda_j x_j\right) \le \prod_{j=1}^{\ell} Q_q^{\lambda_j}(x_j).$$

Using the expression

$$Q_q(x) = \begin{pmatrix} x \sum_{i=1}^m a_i \\ x a_1, x a_2, \dots, x a_m \end{pmatrix} \prod_{i=1}^m p_i^{x a_i}$$

leads to

$$\begin{pmatrix}
\sum_{j=1}^{\ell} \lambda_{j} x_{j} \sum_{i=1}^{m} a_{i} \\
a_{1} \sum_{j=1}^{\ell} \lambda_{j} x_{j}, a_{2} \sum_{j=1}^{\ell} \lambda_{j} x_{j}, \dots, a_{m} \sum_{j=1}^{\ell} \lambda_{j} x_{j}
\end{pmatrix} \prod_{q=1}^{m} p_{i}^{a_{i}} \sum_{j=1}^{\ell} \lambda_{j} x_{j}$$

$$\leq \prod_{j=1}^{\ell} \left[\left(x_{j} \sum_{i=1}^{m} a_{i} \\ x_{j} a_{1}, x_{j} a_{2}, \dots, x_{j} a_{m} \right)_{q} \prod_{i=1}^{m} p_{i}^{a_{i} x_{j}} \right]^{\lambda_{j}}$$

which can be rearranged as (4.2). The proof of Theorem 4.1 is complete.

Theorem 4.2. Let $q \in (0,1)$, $\ell, m \in \mathbb{N}$, and $\mathbf{a} = (a_1, a_2, \dots, a_m)$ with $a_i > 0$ for $1 \le i \le m$. If $x_j > 0$ for $1 \le j \le \ell$, then

$$\prod_{j=1}^{\ell} {x_{j} \sum_{i=1}^{m} a_{i} \choose x_{j} a_{1}, x_{j} a_{2}, \dots, x_{j} a_{m}}_{q} < {\sum_{j=1}^{\ell} x_{j} \sum_{i=1}^{m} a_{i} \choose a_{1} \sum_{j=1}^{\ell} x_{j}, a_{2} \sum_{j=1}^{\ell} x_{j}, \dots, a_{m} \sum_{j=1}^{\ell} x_{j}}_{q}. (4.3)$$

Proof. In [2, Lemma 3], it was proved that, if $g:[0,\infty)\to (0,1]$ is differentiable and $\frac{g'}{g}$ is strictly increasing on $(0,\infty)$, then the inequality g(x)g(y)< g(x+y) is valid for $x,y\in (0,\infty)$. As a result, we can inductively deduce

$$\prod_{j=1}^{\ell} g(x_j) < g\left(\sum_{j=1}^{\ell} x_j\right).$$

Applying this inequality to the logarithmic convexity of the function $Q_q(x)$ reveals

$$\prod_{j=1}^{\ell} \left[\left(x_{j} \sum_{i=1}^{m} a_{i} \\ x_{j} a_{1}, x_{j} a_{2}, \dots, x_{j} a_{m} \right) \prod_{q=1}^{m} p_{i}^{a_{i} x_{j}} \right] \\
< \left(\sum_{j=1}^{\ell} x_{j} \sum_{i=1}^{m} a_{i} \\ a_{1} \sum_{j=1}^{\ell} x_{j}, a_{2} \sum_{j=1}^{\ell} x_{j}, \dots, a_{m} \sum_{j=1}^{\ell} x_{j} \right) \prod_{q=1}^{m} p_{i}^{a_{i} \sum_{j=1}^{\ell} x_{j}}$$

which can be rewritten as (4.3). The proof of Theorem 4.2 is complete.

Theorem 4.3. Let $q \in (0,1)$, $m \in \mathbb{N}$, and $\mathbf{a} = (a_1, a_2, ..., a_m)$ with $a_i > 0$ for $1 \le i \le m$. If $0 < a \le c$ and x > 0, then

$$\begin{pmatrix}
(a+x)\sum_{i=1}^{m} a_{i} \\
(a+x)a_{1}, (a+x)a_{2}, \dots, (a+x)a_{m}
\end{pmatrix}_{q} \begin{pmatrix}
c\sum_{i=1}^{m} a_{i} \\
ca_{1}, ca_{2}, \dots, ca_{m}
\end{pmatrix}_{q} \\
\leq \begin{pmatrix}
a\sum_{i=1}^{m} a_{i} \\
aa_{1}, aa_{2}, \dots, aa_{m}
\end{pmatrix}_{q} \begin{pmatrix}
(c+x)\sum_{i=1}^{m} a_{i} \\
(c+x)a_{1}, (c+x)a_{2}, \dots, (c+x)a_{m}
\end{pmatrix}_{q} (4.4)$$

and the equality in (4.4) holds if and only if a = c.

Proof. For 0 < a < c, set

$$V(x) = \ln \mathcal{Q}_q(a+x) + \ln \mathcal{Q}_q(c) - \ln \mathcal{Q}_q(a) - \ln \mathcal{Q}_q(c+x).$$

Because

$$V'(x) = \frac{\mathcal{Q}'_q(a+x)}{\mathcal{Q}_q(a+x)} - \frac{\mathcal{Q}'_q(c+x)}{\mathcal{Q}_q(c+x)}$$

and the logarithmically complete monotonicity of $\mathcal{Q}_q(x)$ hints that the function $\frac{\mathcal{Q}_q'(x)}{\mathcal{Q}_q(x)}$ is strictly increasing on $(0,\infty)$, we see that V'(x) < 0 and V(x) < V(0) = 0. Consequently, it follows that

$$\ln \mathcal{Q}_q(a+x) + \ln \mathcal{Q}_q(c) \le \ln \mathcal{Q}_q(a) + \ln \mathcal{Q}_q(c+x)$$

which is equivalent to

$$\ln \left[\binom{(a+x)\sum_{i=1}^{m} a_i}{(a+x)a_1, (a+x)a_2, \dots, (a+x)a_m} \prod_{q=1}^{m} p_i^{a_i(a+x)} \right]
+ \ln \left[\binom{c\sum_{i=1}^{m} a_i}{ca_1, ca_2, \dots, ca_m} \prod_{q=1}^{m} p_i^{a_i c} \right] \le \ln \left[\binom{a\sum_{i=1}^{m} a_i}{aa_1, aa_2, \dots, aa_m} \prod_{q=1}^{m} p_i^{a_i a} \right]
+ \ln \left[\binom{(c+x)\sum_{i=1}^{m} a_i}{(c+x)a_1, (c+x)a_2, \dots, (c+x)a_m} \prod_{q=1}^{m} p_i^{a_i(c+x)} \right].$$

This can be simplified as (4.4). The proof of Theorem 4.3 is complete.

5. Inequalities for the q-multivariate beta function

Let $\mathbf{a} = (a_1, a_2, \dots, a_m)$ with $a_i > 0$ for $1 \le i \le m$. Then the q-multivariate beta function for $q \in (0,1)$ is

$$B_q(a_1, a_2, \dots, a_m) = \frac{\Gamma_q(a_1)\Gamma_q(a_2)\cdots\Gamma_q(a_m)}{\Gamma_q(a_1 + a_2 + \dots + a_m)}.$$

In [3, p. 544], it was proved that

$$\Gamma_q(x+1) = \frac{1 - q^x}{1 - q} \Gamma_q(x)$$

with $\Gamma_q(1) = 1$ for $q \in (0,1)$. Applying this recurrence relation to (4.1) yields

$$\left(\sum_{i=1}^{m} a_i \atop a_1, a_2, \dots, a_m\right)_q = \frac{(1-q)^{m-1} \left(1 - q^{\sum_{i=1}^{m} a_i}\right)}{\prod_{i=1}^{m} (1 - q^{a_i})} \frac{1}{B_q(a_1, a_2, \dots, a_m)}.$$
(5.1)

Substituting (5.1) into those inequalities in Theorems 4.1 to 4.3, we can conclude several inequalities for the q-multivariate beta function $B_q(a_1, a_2, \ldots, a_m)$. Equivalently speaking, Theorems (4.1) to (4.3) can be respectively reformulated as follows.

Let $q \in (0,1)$, $\ell, m \in \mathbb{N}$, and $\boldsymbol{a} = (a_1, a_2, \dots, a_m)$ with $a_i > 0$ for $1 \le i \le m$. If $x_j > 0$ for $1 \le j \le \ell$ and $\lambda_j \in (0,1)$ with $\sum_{j=1}^{\ell} \lambda_j = 1$, then

$$\frac{\prod_{i=1}^{m} \left(1 - q^{a_i} \sum_{j=1}^{\ell} \lambda_j x_j\right)}{1 - q^{\sum_{j=1}^{\ell} \lambda_j x_j} \sum_{i=1}^{m} a_i} B_q \left(a_1 \sum_{j=1}^{\ell} \lambda_j x_j, a_2 \sum_{j=1}^{\ell} \lambda_j x_j, \dots, a_m \sum_{j=1}^{\ell} \lambda_j x_j \right) \\
\geq \prod_{j=1}^{\ell} \left[\frac{\prod_{i=1}^{m} (1 - q^{x_j a_i})}{1 - q^{x_j} \sum_{i=1}^{m} a_i} B_q (a_1 x_j, a_2 x_j, \dots, a_m x_j) \right]^{\lambda_j} \tag{5.2}$$

and the equality in (5.2) holds if and only if $x_1 = x_2 = \cdots = x_\ell$.

The inequality (5.2) implies that the function

$$\frac{\prod_{i=1}^{m} (1 - q^{a_i x})}{1 - q^x \sum_{i=1}^{m} a_i} B_q(a_1 x, a_2 x, \dots, a_m x)$$

for $m \in \mathbb{N}$ is logarithmically concave with respect to $x \in (0, \infty)$. Generally, we claim that the function

$$\frac{1 - q^x \sum_{i=1}^m a_i}{\prod_{i=1}^m (1 - q^{a_i x})} \frac{1}{B_q(a_1 x, a_2 x, \dots, a_m x)}$$

for $m \in \mathbb{N}$ is logarithmically completely monotonic with respect to $x \in (0, \infty)$.

Let $q \in (0,1)$, $\ell, m \in \mathbb{N}$, and $\boldsymbol{a} = (a_1, a_2, \dots, a_m)$ with $a_i > 0$ for $1 \le i \le m$. If $a_i > 0$ for $1 \le j \le \ell$, then

$$\frac{1}{(1-q)^{(\ell-1)(m-1)}} \prod_{j=1}^{\ell} \left[\frac{\prod_{i=1}^{m} (1-q^{a_i x_j})}{1-q^{x_j} \sum_{i=1}^{m} a_i} B_q(a_1 x_j, a_2 x_j, \dots, a_m x_j) \right]
> \frac{\prod_{i=1}^{m} (1-q^{a_i} \sum_{j=1}^{\ell} x_j)}{1-q^{\sum_{j=1}^{\ell} x_j} \sum_{i=1}^{m} a_i} B_q\left(a_1 \sum_{j=1}^{\ell} x_j, a_2 \sum_{j=1}^{\ell} x_j, \dots, a_m \sum_{j=1}^{\ell} x_j\right).$$

Let $q \in (0,1)$, $m \in \mathbb{N}$, and $\boldsymbol{a} = (a_1, a_2, \dots, a_m)$ with $a_i > 0$ for $1 \le i \le m$. If $0 < a \le c$ and x > 0, then

$$\frac{1 - q^{(a+x)\sum_{i=1}^{m} a_i}}{1 - q^{(c+x)\sum_{i=1}^{m} a_i}} \frac{\prod_{i=1}^{m} (1 - q^{(c+x)a_i})}{\prod_{i=1}^{m} (1 - q^{(a+x)a_i})} \frac{B_q((c+x)a_1, (c+x)a_2, \dots, (c+x)a_m)}{B_q((a+x)a_1, (a+x)a_2, \dots, (a+x)a_m)} \\
\leq \frac{1 - q^c \sum_{i=1}^{m} a_i}{1 - q^a \sum_{i=1}^{m} a_i} \frac{\prod_{i=1}^{m} (1 - q^{aa_i})}{\prod_{i=1}^{m} (1 - q^{ca_i})} \frac{B_q(ca_1, ca_2, \dots, ca_m)}{B_q(aa_1, aa_2, \dots, aa_m)} \tag{5.3}$$

and the equality in (5.3) holds if and only if a = c.

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
