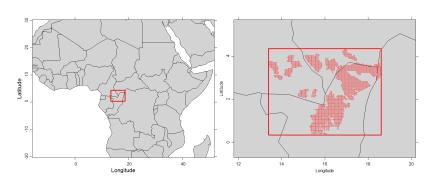
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Problem

Model and predict the abundance of tree species in the tropical moist forest of the Congo-Basin

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In order to model and explain them:

- ightharpoonup p = 56 explanatory variables
- ightharpoonup r = 2 additional covariates

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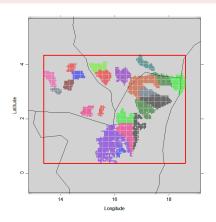
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Difficulties

- High level of correlation among the explanatory variables
 - → Regularisation is needeed
- Spatial observations
 - → Necessity to take account of the dependence structure

Previous version of SCGLR

The 2615 plots <u>WERE ASSUMED INDEPENDENT</u>, although they are partitioned in 22 natural groups (forest concessions)



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Our new version of SCGLR

- Takes into account the dependence stucture
 - → Within-group dependence modelled by a random effect
 - → Multivariate GLMM
- High correlations among the explanatory variables
 - → Supervised component-based regularisation

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 - General principle
 - Construction of the component
 - Algorithm

NB : We focus on the **first component** model estimation

- Simulation study
 - Data simulation
 - Comparison with Ridge- and Lasso- based regularisations
 - Power for model interpretation
- Application to real data

Notations:

- $ightharpoonup Y_{n\times q}$: matrix of q responses y^1,\ldots,y^q
- $ightharpoonup X_{n imes p}$: explanatory variables (many and redundant)
- $ightharpoonup T_{n imes r}$: additionnal covariates (few, no redundancy)
- ▶ $U_{n \times N}$: design matrix of the random effects

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Our linear predictors in the GLMM framework

For each $k \in \{1, \dots, q\}$,

$$\eta_{\xi}^k = (Xu)\gamma_k + T\delta_k + U\xi_k$$

$$\xi_k \overset{ind.}{\sim} \mathcal{N}_N\left(0,\, D_k = \sigma_k^2\, Id_N\right), \text{ with } N \text{ the number of groups}$$

ightharpoonup Link functions g_k :

$$\eta_{\xi}^{\pmb{k}} = g_{\pmb{k}} \left(\mu_{\xi}^{\pmb{k}} \right) \quad \text{with } \mu_{\xi}^k = \mathbb{E} \left(Y^k \mid \xi_k \right)$$

▶ Link functions g_k :

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▶ Working variables (classic local order 1 linearisation) :

$$g_k\left(y^k\right) \simeq \boldsymbol{z_{\xi}^k} = \boldsymbol{\eta_{\xi}^k} + \boldsymbol{\varepsilon_k}$$

with:

$$\begin{cases} \mathbb{E}\left(\varepsilon_{k} \mid \xi_{k}\right) = 0 \\ \mathbb{V}\left(\varepsilon_{k} \mid \xi_{k}\right) \stackrel{\mathsf{not.}}{=} W_{k}^{-1} \end{cases}$$

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"Linearised" model

$$z_{\xi}^k = (Xu)\gamma_k + T\delta_k + U\xi_k + arepsilon_k, \quad ext{with } arepsilon_k \sim \mathcal{N}\left(0, W_k^{-1}
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"Linearised" model

$$z_{\xi}^{k} = (Xu)\gamma_{k} + T\delta_{k} + U\xi_{k} + \varepsilon_{k}$$

Alternated procedure

- Given γ_k , δ_k , ξ_k and σ_k^2 , we calculate the component f = Xu
- Given u, we estimate γ_k , δ_k , ξ_k and σ_k^2 Several possibilities :
 - i Direct maximum likelihood estimation
 - ii Expectation-Maximisation algorithm
 - iii ...
 - iv Henderson systems (more efficient)

A few words about Henderson systems ...

▶ Given f = Xu, for each $k \in \{1, ..., q\}$:

$$\begin{pmatrix} f'W_k f & f'W_k T & f'W_k U \\ T'W_k f & T'W_k T & T'W_k U \\ U'W_k f & U'W_k T & U'W_k U + D_k^{-1} \end{pmatrix} \begin{pmatrix} \boldsymbol{\gamma_k} \\ \boldsymbol{\delta_k} \\ \boldsymbol{\xi_k} \end{pmatrix} = \begin{pmatrix} f'W_k z_{\xi}^k \\ T'W_k z_{\xi}^k \\ U'W_k z_{\xi}^k \end{pmatrix}$$

Update variance components :

$$\sigma_k^2 \longleftarrow \frac{\boldsymbol{\xi_k'} \, \boldsymbol{\xi_k}}{N - \frac{1}{\sigma_k^2} tr \left[\left(U' W_k U + D_k^{-1} \right)^{-1} \right]}$$

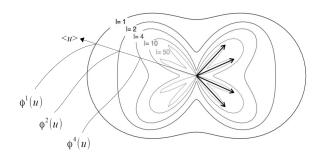

Mixed-SCGLR algorithm (single component model estimation)

Initialise

- working variables z_{ξ}^k
- weighting matrices \hat{W}_k
- variance components σ_k^2

while \(\lambda\) convergence not achieved \(\rangle\) do

$$u \leftarrow \underset{u'u=1}{\operatorname{arg\,max}} \left[\psi(u) \right]^{1-s} \left[\phi(u) \right]^{s}$$
$$f \leftarrow Xu$$

for k = 1 to q do

Estimate parameters γ_k , δ_k , ξ_k (Henderson system) and σ_k^2 Update $z_{\mathcal{E}}^k$ and W_k

end

end

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NB : The simulations and comparison are limited to the **Gaussian case**

4 Application to real data

Random responses:

▶ Multivariate framework with only two responses

$$Y = \left[y^1|y^2
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Fixed effects:

- ightharpoonup No additional covariates : $T=\emptyset$
- ▶ 30 explanatory variables $\mathcal{N}(\mathbf{0},\mathbf{1})$:

Random effects:

- ightharpoonup N = 10 groups
- ightharpoonup R = 10 units per group
- \hookrightarrow Design matrix $U = Id_N \otimes \mathbb{1}_R$

with, $\forall k \in \{1, 2\}, \forall i \in \{1, \dots, 10\}, \forall j \in \{1, \dots, 100\}$:

- $\xi_{k,i} \sim \mathcal{N}(0,1)$
- $\varepsilon_{k,j} \sim \mathcal{N}(0,1)$

M=100 samples of model ${\cal M}$ for each value of au

LMM-Ridge (Univariate framework)

- \hookrightarrow Estimation : EM algorithm
- \hookrightarrow GCV at each step to find the best shrinkage parameter λ

- \hookrightarrow Estimation : efficient coordinate gradient descent

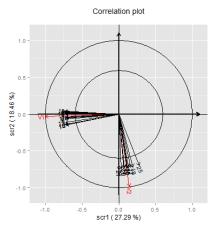

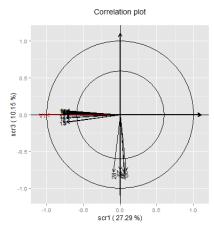
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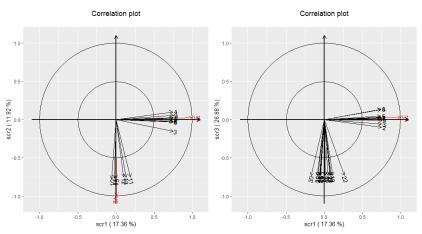

What happens in the event of a big noise bundle? 15 noise variables, 9 and 6 for the other bundles



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Return to the tropical moist forest of the Congo-Basin

The Genus dataset:

- n=2615 developped plots, divided in N=22 forest concessions (considered as groups)
- ightharpoonup q = 94 common tree genera (responses Y)
- ightharpoonup p = 56 explanatory variables (X)
- ightharpoonup r=2 additional covariates (T)

Modelisation

Abundance of tree species: count data

 \hookrightarrow Poisson regression with log link

$$\forall k \in \{1, \dots, 94\}, \quad y^k \sim \mathcal{P}\left(\exp\left(\frac{\eta_{\xi}^k}{\xi}\right)\right)$$

$$\eta_{\xi}^{k} = \begin{cases}
(Xu)\gamma_{k} + T\delta_{k} + U\xi_{k} & \text{(single component)} \\
\sum_{j=1}^{K^{\star}} (Xu^{j})\gamma_{k,j} + T\delta_{k} + U\xi_{k} & \text{(several components)}
\end{cases}$$

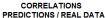
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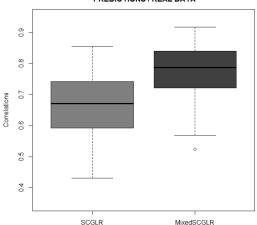
$$\forall k \in \{1, \dots, 94\}, \quad y^k \sim \mathcal{P}\left(\exp\left(\eta_{\xi}^k\right)\right)$$

$$\boldsymbol{\eta_{\xi}^{k}} = \begin{cases} (\boldsymbol{X}\boldsymbol{u})\boldsymbol{\gamma_{k}} + T\boldsymbol{\delta_{k}} + U\boldsymbol{\xi_{k}} & \text{(single component)} \\ \sum\limits_{j=1}^{\boldsymbol{K^{\star}}} \left(\boldsymbol{X}\boldsymbol{u^{j}}\right)\boldsymbol{\gamma_{k,j}} + T\boldsymbol{\delta_{k}} + U\boldsymbol{\xi_{k}} & \text{(several components)} \end{cases}$$

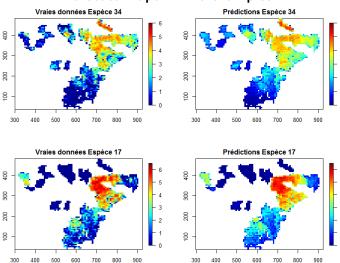
Optimal number of components (cross validation) : $K^* = 12$

Improvement in correlations of predictions and responses

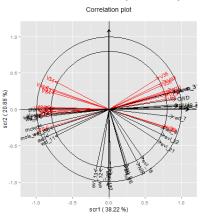


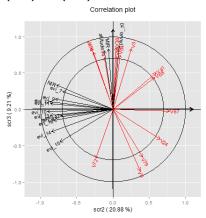


Forecast maps - Two examples

Conclusion

Mixed-SCGLR

- is a powerful trade-off between
 - i multivariate GLMM
 - ii component-based methods
- reveals the multidimensional explanatory and predictive structures
- facilitates the interpretation of the model

Longitudinal data

Mixed-SCGLR for two-way random effects model with serially correlated time effects

 \hookrightarrow AR(1) random effects

Spatial data

Mixed-SCGLR for models with spatial correlations

 \hookrightarrow CAR(1) random effects

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
