Energy Harvesting For Wireless Sensors In Aeronautics Applications: From Dream To Reality

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LAAS-CNRS, TOULOUSE (France)

Abstract: New applications of embedded systems are envisioned in the context of aeronautics. However, the increasing burden of on-board cabling requires wireless solutions. Moreover, concerns such as safety or system lifetime often preclude the use of electrochemical energy storage. Ambient energy capture, storage and management are therefore key topics. In this paper we illustrate these concepts by describing three actual implementations in an Airbus aircraft. The first application is energy harvesting for wireless in flight-testing. The main objectives are autonomous, battery-free power supply of a wireless system including pressure sensing glove, signal processing and RF communication. The system should be able to start-up with initial empty storage. The second application is dedicated to the autonomous power supply for aeronautical health monitoring sensors in the engine harsh environment of an Airbus A380 using thermogeneration as energy source. The third and last example is a more prospective study on the potentialities of aeroacoustic energy harvesting that was successfully validated in a wind tunnel.

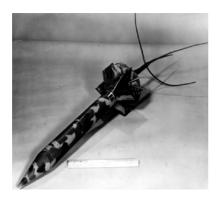
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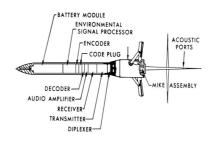
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Wireless Sensor History

- Wireless sensors are not so new...
- 1968-1973: Vietnam war Operation Igloo White





Cost: \$1-\$1.7 billion (design & fabrication) + \$1 billion/year (operation over 5 years)!

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Wireless Sensor History

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Smart Dust





- Smart Dust: DARPA-funded research proposal of the University of California, Berkeley, in 1998.
- Objective: build wireless sensor nodes with a volume of one cubic millimeter.
- Results: Autonomous 16mm³ solar-powered mote, and larger "COTS Dust" devices kicked off the **TinyOS** effort at Berkeley.

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The energy autonomy roadblock

- Energy generation and storage devices are generally bulky
- Batteries have a limited lifetime
 - Prohibitive maintenance cost
 - Environmental issue
- Batteries can have safety issues
- Application dependent
- MAIN CHALLENGES:
 - · Smart energy management
 - Low-power communication
 - · Increasing energy density
 - Efficient energy harvesting
 - Green storage

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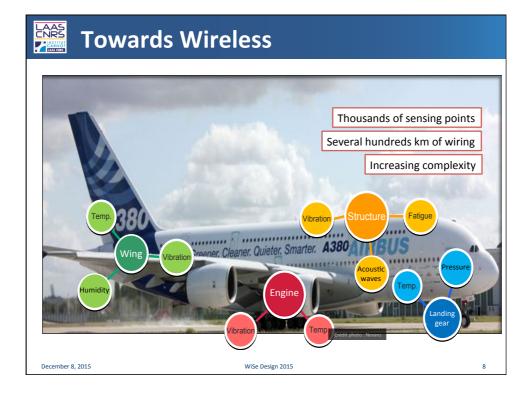
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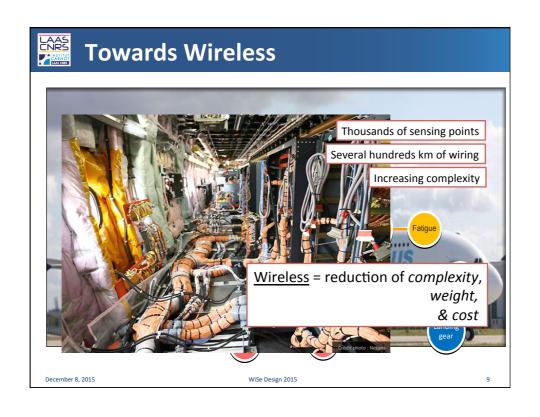


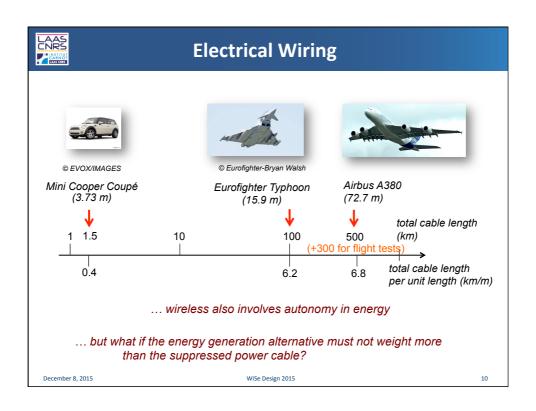

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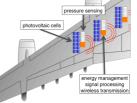
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Objectives and requirements

- Autonomous, battery-free power supply of a wireless system including pressure sensing glove, signal processing and RF communication
- Autonomous start-up with initial empty storage
- Average electrical power of at least 2W under 48V
- Few millimeters in thickness and flexible
- Operation at low light (cloudy weather)
- Operation between -50°C and 85°C,
- Reduced pressure down to 200hPa
- Daylight tests



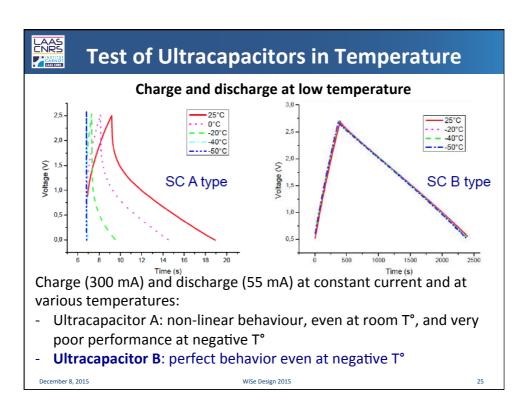


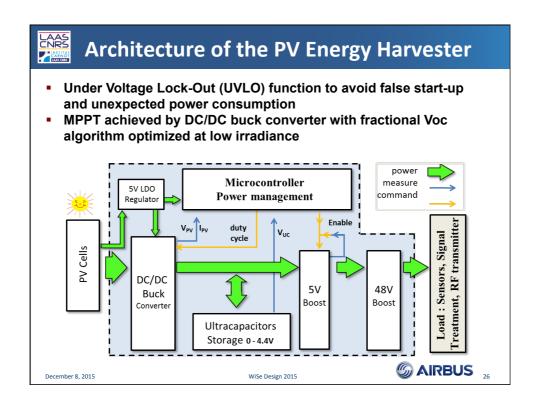

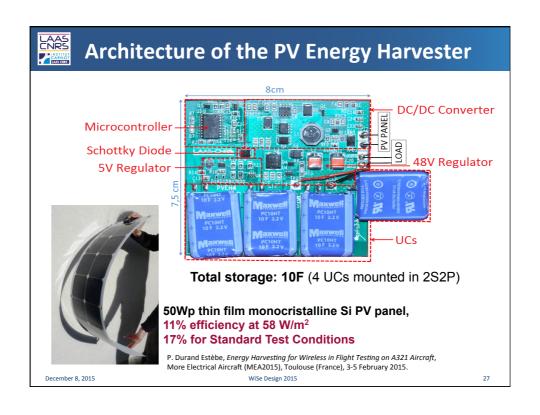
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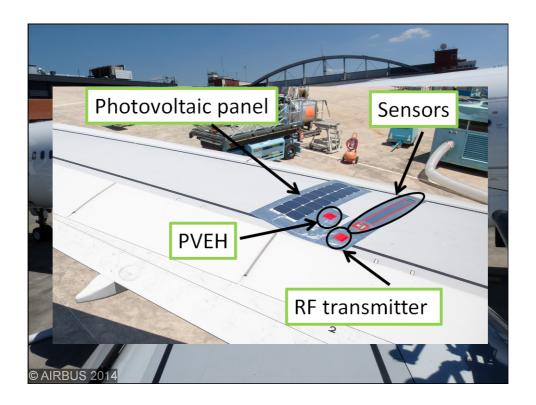
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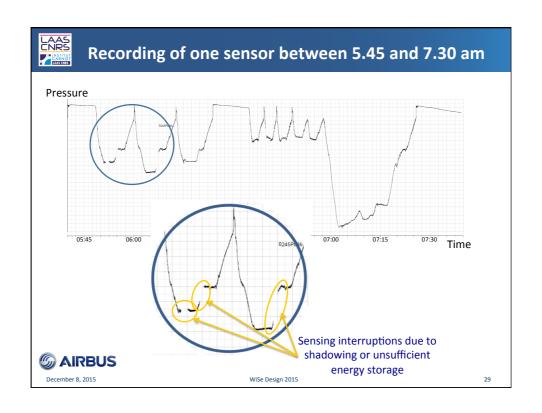
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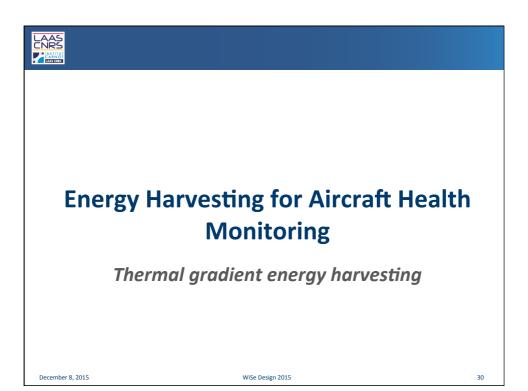


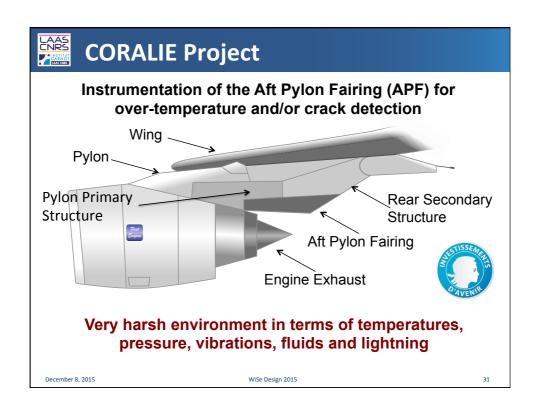


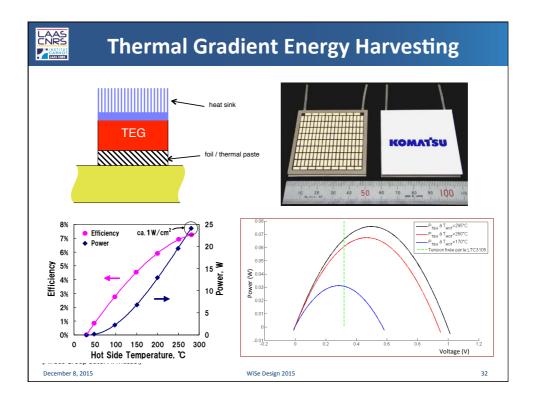


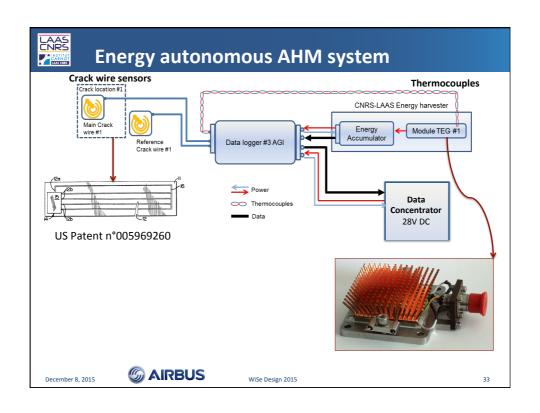


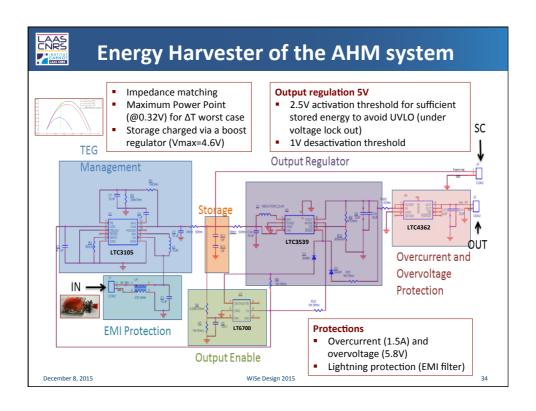


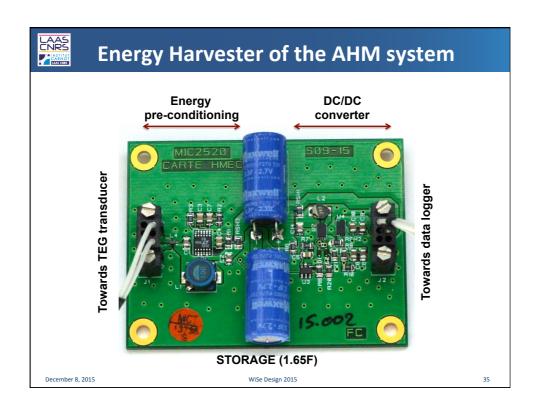


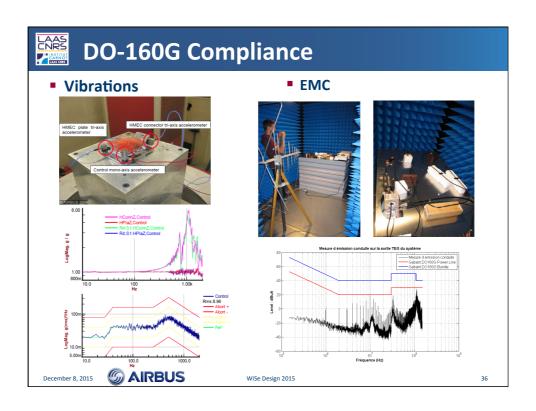


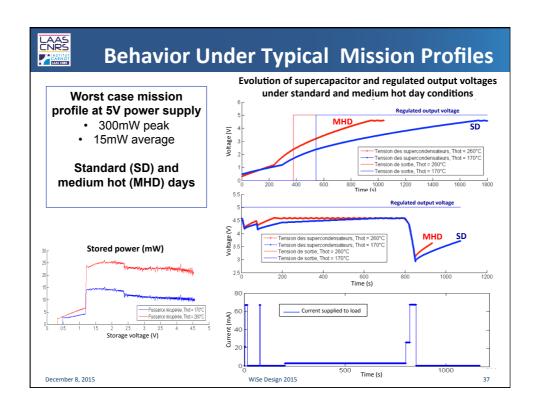


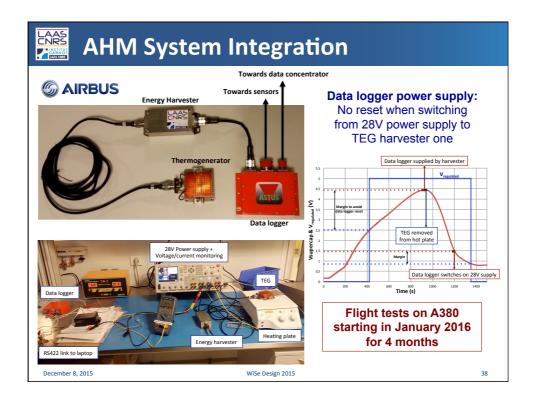




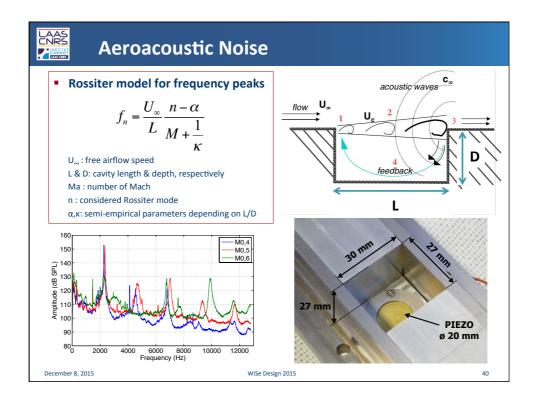


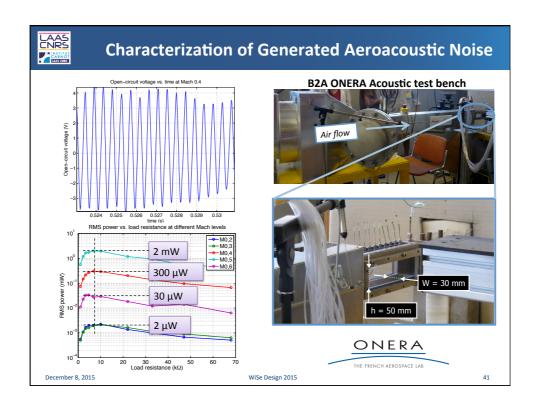


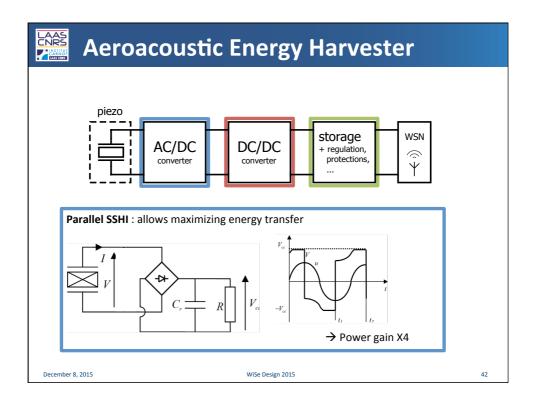


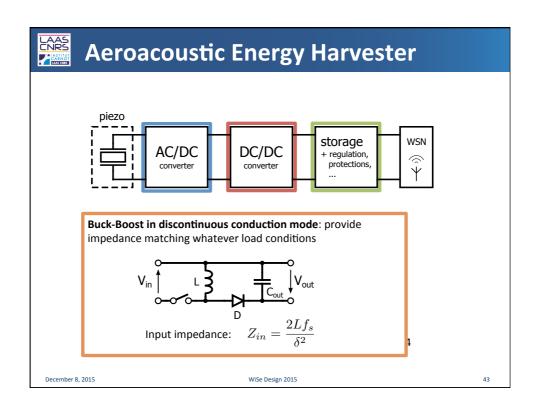


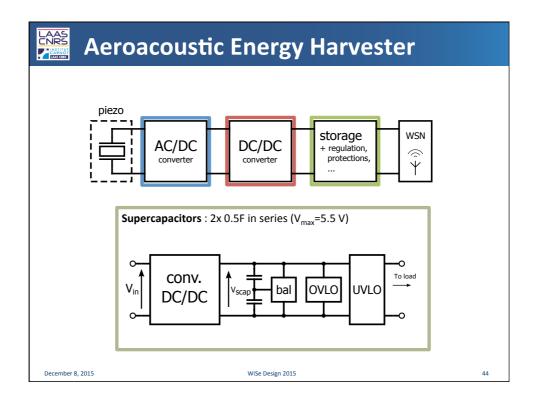


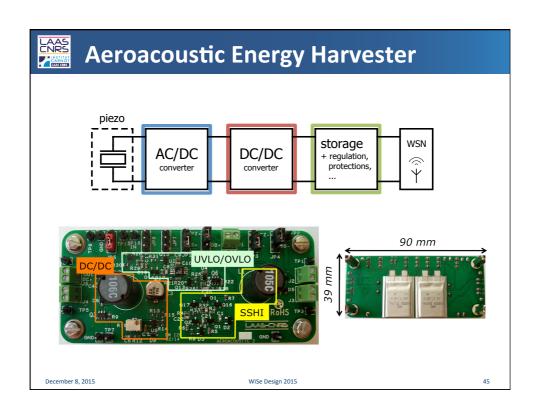


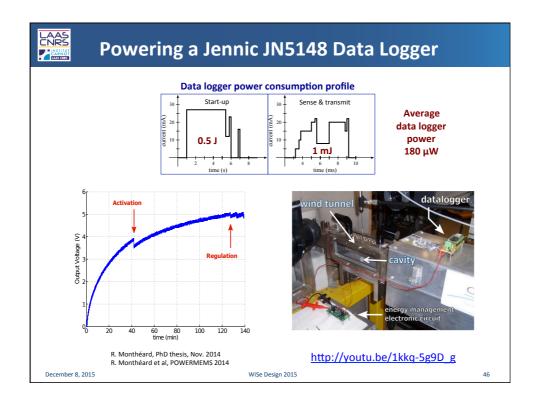


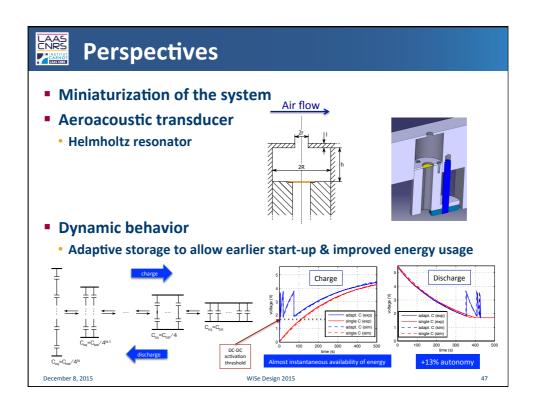


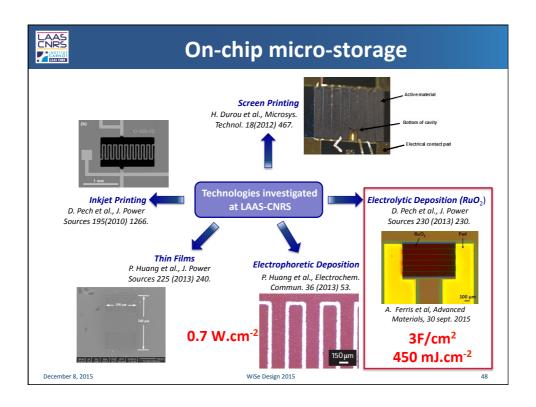


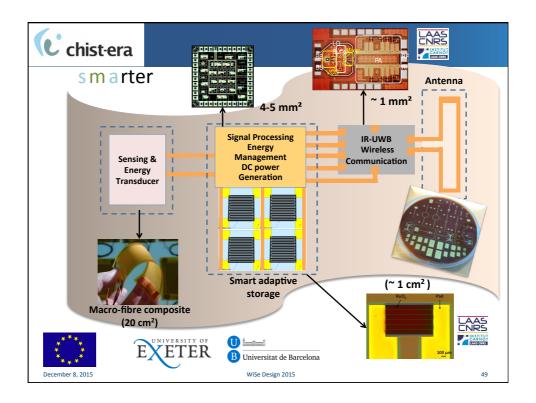














Conclusion

Aeronautics has a true need for wireless sensing

- Flight test is the most obvious killing application with great benefits in terms of:
 - Ease of installation
 - -Cost
 - -Flexibility
- Aircraft Health Monitoring:
 - Long-term goal: conditional maintenance based on advanced diagnosis/prognostic
 - -Various Proofs of Concept
 - Miniaturization limited by the harvester
 - Dependability over aircraft lifetime has to be proven

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
