The Antiquarians: Who Were They? Proposal for a Round Table

A surprising number of scholars based in New York do research on the programs and

practices of early modern antiquarians. The two of us, who are here only until the end of

spring 2014, propose to bring as many of these experts as possible together to devote an

afternoon workshop to our common interest. One way to focus discussion would be to

ask everyone to concentrate on the meanings of the actual term "antiquarius" and related

terms for scholars and genres, in all the various contexts we work in.

Proceedings might start at 2:00 PM. We would invite participants to present

material informally for 10 to 15 minutes each, break for tea after the talks, and then open

up a discussion. One point of the exercise is simply to bring together a remarkable group

of scholars. A second is to establish whether it might be possible to plan further directed

discussions, and perhaps even a collaborative or collective publication.
