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Thin layer for the Landau-Lifschitz equation

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Abstract. In this paper we study the behaviour of the Landau-Lifschitz equation in a thin layer spread on a perfect conductor. As the thickness of the domain and the exchange coefficient of the equation simultaneously tend to zero we take into account the geometry of the domain and perform an asymptotic expansion to precise the solution for well prepared initial data.

Résumé. Nous étudions dans cet article le comportement de l'équation de Landau-Lifschitz dans une couche mince de matériau ferromagnétique étendue à la surface d'un conducteur parfait. L'épaisseur de la couche mince et le coefficient d'échange dans l'équation tendant simultanément vers zéro, nous prenons en compte la géométrie du domaine et effectuons un développement asymptotique de la solution pour une donnée initiale bien préparée.

1 Introduction

We consider a thin layer ω_{ε} with a thickness ε of ferromagnetic material covering a perfectly conductive body $\mathcal{U}^{\varepsilon}$. The ferromagnetic material is characterized by a spontaneous magnetization modelized by a magnetic moment u defined on the domain $\omega_{\varepsilon} \subset \mathbb{R}^3$ in which the material is confined. This moment satisfies $|u| \equiv 1$ and links the magnetic field H and the magnetic induction B by the relation $B = H + \overline{u}$, where \overline{u} is the extension of u by zero outside ω_{ε} . The evolution of the magnetic moment u is governed by the Landau-Lifschitz equation:

$$\begin{cases} \frac{\partial u}{\partial t} = u \wedge H_{eff} - u \wedge (u \wedge H_{eff}) \text{ in } \omega_{\varepsilon}, \\\\ \frac{\partial u}{\partial n} = 0 \text{ on } \partial \omega_{\varepsilon}, \\\\ u(0, .) = u_0 \text{ on } \omega_{\varepsilon}, \end{cases}$$

where n denotes the outward unitary normal on $\partial \omega_{\varepsilon}$ and H_{eff} is the effective magnetic field in the ferromagnetic domain:

$$H_{eff} = \varepsilon^2 \Delta u + H.$$

The first term in the expression of H_{eff} is an exchange term whose coefficient ε^2 , called the exchange coefficient, is intended to tend to zero; the second one is the magnetic field. We assume that we always are at the electromagnetic equilibrium. The magnetic field then fulfills

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the magnetostatic equations:

\end{cases}$$

When the exchange coefficient is fixed and the domain ω_{ε} , an open set placed in the vacuum, does not depend on ε , Carbou and Fabrie prove in [9] the local existence of a regular solution u of the equation (1.1). But when the exchange coefficient ε^2 goes to zero (and the domain still does not depend on ε), the time interval given in [9] also tends to zero. In [11], Carbou, Fabrie and Guès prove by showing the formation of a boundary layer of characteristic thickness ε that the time of existence of u goes to infinity when ε goes to zero for an initial data in $\mathbb{H}^5(\Omega)$. Moreover they get that the solution u tends to the solution of the hyperbolic system formally obtained by taking $\varepsilon = 0$ in Eq. (1.1).

Since the ferromagnetic materials are often used in thin domains (coating of a plane, reading head of hard disks) the behaviour of such materials and of the Landau-Lifschitz equation in that kind of domain naturally arises.

In [6], Carbou has studied the limit of the magnetic moment u in a thin domain when the thickness ε of the domain goes to 0 and the exchange coefficient is fixed. In a previous paper [24] we study the behaviour of u when the exchange coefficient is ε^2 and in an ε -thick sheet $\Omega_{\varepsilon} = (0,1)^2 \times (-\varepsilon,\varepsilon)$ which is periodic on \mathbb{R}^2 . Through an asymptotic expansion we then describe the interaction between the boundary layer phenomenon and the thin layer. We want here to enhance this result by considering a thin layer of ferromagnetic material spread on a perfect conductor delimited by a surface. In this case we have to investigate the influence of the geometry on the differential operators to obtain a decomposition suitable for the thin layer.

Let us precise the notations. Let Ω be a regular bounded domain of \mathbb{R}^3 . We denote $\Gamma = \partial \Omega$. For $x \in \Omega$ we introduce $\varphi(x) = \operatorname{dist}(x, \Gamma)$ and P(x) the orthogonal projection of x onto Γ . We remark that since Γ is a regular surface of \mathbb{R}^3 , φ and P are regular in a neighbourhood of Γ . We set

$$\omega_{\varepsilon} = \{ x \in \Omega, \ 0 < \varphi(x) < \varepsilon \}.$$



We denote $\mathcal{U}^{\varepsilon} = \Omega \setminus \omega_{\varepsilon}$.

The equations we will consider are:

and

$$\begin{aligned} H(u^{\varepsilon}) &= 0 \quad \text{in } \mathcal{U}^{\varepsilon}, \\ H(u^{\varepsilon}) &\in \mathbb{L}^{2} \left(\mathbb{R}^{3} \setminus \mathcal{U}^{\varepsilon} \right), \\ \text{curl } H(u^{\varepsilon}) &= 0 \quad \text{in } \mathbb{R}^{3} \setminus \mathcal{U}^{\varepsilon}, \\ \text{div } \left(H(u^{\varepsilon}) + \overline{u^{\varepsilon}} \right) &= 0 \quad \text{in } \mathbb{R}^{3} \setminus \mathcal{U}^{\varepsilon}, \\ \left[H(u^{\varepsilon}) \wedge n \right] &= 0 \text{ on } \partial \omega_{\varepsilon}, \\ \left[\left(H(u^{\varepsilon}) + \overline{u^{\varepsilon}} \right) \cdot n \right] &= 0 \text{ on } \partial \omega_{\varepsilon}, \end{aligned}$$

where n denotes the outward unitary normal to $\partial \omega_{\varepsilon}$ and [v] denotes the jump of v at the interface $\partial \omega_{\varepsilon}$ (the transmission conditions are deduced from (1.2)).

In order to perform the asymptotic expansion and get the profiles we work on the rescaled equation. We get the following result:

Theorem 1.1. Let $U_0^0 \in \mathbb{W}^{7,\infty}(\Gamma)$ an ε -independent function satisfying $|U_0^0| \equiv 1$ and let the initial data u_0^{ε} fulfill

If T^{ε} is the maximum existence time of the regular solution u^{ε} of Eq. (1.3) then $\lim_{\varepsilon \to 0} T^{\varepsilon} = +\infty$ and for all $T < T^{\varepsilon}$ there exists some profiles U^0 and U^1 that fulfill

• $U^0 \in \mathcal{C}^{\infty}\left(\mathbb{R}^+_t; \mathbb{W}^{7,\infty}(\Gamma)\right)$ is solution of Eq. (1.3) with $\varepsilon = 0$ i.e.

where $H^0 = -(U^0 \cdot n)n$ is a local operator,

• for all $0 < T < T^{\varepsilon}$,

such that u^{ε} satisfies:

where $r^{\varepsilon} \in \mathbb{L}^{\infty}(0,T;\mathbb{L}^{p}(\omega_{\varepsilon}))$ for all $2 \leq p \leq +\infty$ and $0 < T < T^{\varepsilon}$, and fulfills:

$$\sup_{t\in[0,T]} \|r^{\varepsilon}\|_{\mathbb{L}^p(\omega_{\varepsilon})} = \mathcal{O}(\varepsilon^{1/p}).$$

Remark 1.1. The limit model for a thin layer of ferromagnetic material we obtain here corresponds to the physical observations and expectations: the magnetic moment follows the 2D-Landau-Lifschitz equation without exchange term and the magnetic moment is orthogonal to the surface Γ of the body.

Remark 1.2. For the sake of clarity we have chosen a simple initial data. We can without restrictions assume that the initial data admits a regular asymptotic expansion if the homogeneous Neumann condition $\frac{\partial u_0^{\varepsilon}}{\partial n} = 0$ is fulfilled on $\partial \omega_{\varepsilon}$.

The proof of the theorem requires an asymptotic expansion up to third order. We can then enhance the theorem and give a second order asymptotic expansion of the solution instead of a first order one.

The geometry of the domain we consider here raises some problems: the main difficulty consists in identifying the geometrical effects of the thin layer. The development of geometrical tools gives the correct framework to obtain the asymptotic expansion and allows us to introduce tools suitable to the geometry (Sobolev spaces, inequalities,...).

This paper is organized in the following way. The second part consists in the reminder and proof of some geometrical tools. In the third part we formally build the asymptotic expansion of u^{ε} and we prove its existence for all time and the regularity of its terms. We then introduce in the fourth part anisotropic Sobolev spaces as well as the corresponding embeddings and inequalities to take into account the small thickness of the domain. We study the remainder term of H^{ε} in the fifth part where we also explain the equation satisfied by the remainder of u^{ε} and we perform the energy estimates which conclude the proof of Theorem 1.1 in the sixth part.

2 Geometrical tools

We have here a thin non-flat domain that we consider with non-cartesian coordinates. We then need to express the differential operators in a way which will take into account this geometry (See Carbou [7]).

We will use the following notations :

- $(p \cdot q)$ is the scalar product in \mathbb{R}^3 .
- $\Gamma = \partial \Omega$,
- for $\sigma \in \Gamma$, $n(\sigma)$ is the unitary normal to Γ at the point σ , entering in Ω ,
- for $\sigma \in \Gamma$, $T_{\sigma}\Gamma$ is the tangent plane of Γ at the point σ :

- $\varphi(x) = \operatorname{dist}(x, \Gamma)$ for $x \in \Omega$,
- P(x) the orthogonal projection of x onto Γ , for $x \in \Omega$,

- g is the matrix of the scalar product in the coordinates (σ, z) .
- $\omega_{\varepsilon} = \left\{ x \in \Omega, \quad 0 < \varphi(x) < \varepsilon \right\},$ • for $s > 0, \Gamma_s = \left\{ x \in \Omega, \quad \varphi(x) = s \right\}.$

For $\eta_0 > 0$ little enough, we define a parametrization of ω_{η_0} by :

$$\Psi: \ \Gamma \times]0, \eta_0[\longrightarrow \omega_{\eta_0}$$
$$\sigma, z \longmapsto \sigma + zn(\sigma)$$

Since $\Gamma = \partial \Omega$ is a regular compact surface of \mathbb{R}^3 without boundary, there exists $\eta_0 > 0$ such that Ψ is a \mathcal{C}^{∞} -diffeomorphism from $\Gamma \times]0, \eta_0[$ onto ω_{η_0} . We remark that for $\varepsilon < \eta_0$ the restriction of Ψ to $\Gamma \times]0, \varepsilon[$ is a \mathcal{C}^{∞} -parametrization of ω_{ε} .

Furthermore φ and P are regular on ω_{η_0} and

$$\forall x \in \omega_{\eta_0}, \ \nabla \varphi(x) = n(P(x)).$$

We now precise the expression of the differential operators in the new coordinates (σ, z) .

On the submanifold Γ we classically define the integrale and the differential operators ∇_{Γ} , div $_{\Gamma}$ and Δ_{Γ} . Furthermore, n is a map defined from Γ with values in the unit sphere \mathbb{S}^2 . For $\sigma \in \Gamma$, the differential $dn(\sigma)$ is a linear map from $T_{\sigma}\Gamma$ into $T_{n(\sigma)}\mathbb{S}^2$ and since $T_{n(\sigma)}\mathbb{S}^2 = T_{\sigma}\Gamma$, we can consider $dn(\sigma)$ as an endomorphism of $T_{\sigma}\Gamma$.

Integration : we now set for $s \in [0, \eta_0]$ and $\sigma \in \Gamma$:

We remark that if $u: \omega_{\eta_0} \longrightarrow \mathbb{R}$, denoting $\tilde{u} = u \circ \Psi$, we have :

Gradient : for $v : \Gamma \longrightarrow \mathbb{R}$, we define :

and if $u: \omega_{\eta_0} \longrightarrow \mathbb{R}$, denoting $\tilde{u} = u \circ \Psi$, we have :

Divergence Operator : let $Y : \Gamma \longrightarrow T\Gamma$ be a tangent vector field defined on Γ . We define :

$$\operatorname{div}_{\Gamma_s} Y(\sigma) = \frac{1}{\gamma_s(\sigma)} \operatorname{div}_{\Gamma} \left[\gamma_s (Id + s \, dn)^{-1} Y \right](\sigma)$$

and if $Z: \omega_{\eta_0} \longrightarrow \mathbb{R}^3$, denoting $\widetilde{Z} = Z \circ \Psi$, we have

where

$$\widetilde{Z}_N(\sigma, z) = \widetilde{Z}(\sigma, z) \cdot n(\sigma), \quad \widetilde{Z}_T(\sigma, z) = \widetilde{Z}(\sigma, z) - \widetilde{Z}_N(\sigma, z)n(\sigma).$$

and where : $G_s(\sigma) = \frac{1}{\gamma_s(\sigma)} \frac{\partial \gamma_s}{\partial s}(\sigma).$

Laplace operator : for $v : \Gamma \longrightarrow \mathbb{R}$ we define

$$\Delta_{\Gamma_s} v = \operatorname{div}_{\Gamma_s} \nabla_{\Gamma_s} v$$

and if $u: \omega_{\eta_0} \longrightarrow \mathbb{R}$, denoting $\tilde{u} = u \circ \Psi$, we have :

Curl operator: Let $Y : \Gamma \longrightarrow T\Gamma$ be a tangent vector field on defined on Γ . We define:

where curl $\Gamma = -\text{div }_{\Gamma}(n(\sigma) \wedge \cdot)$, and if $Z : \omega_{\eta_0} \longrightarrow \mathbb{R}^3$, denoting $\widetilde{Z} = Z \circ \Psi$, we have:

Proof: with the cartesian coordinates we have:

We substitute to $\partial_{x_i} Z_j$ their expression in the new coordinates obtained thanks to the one of the gradient (2.1) and we obtain:

where $(e_i)_{i=1,2,3}$ is the usual basis in the cartesian coordinates and $n_i = (n \cdot e_i)$. This also writes:

where A and B are linear differential operators in which the z-derivative does not appear. To obtain their expression we use the equalities "div curl = 0" and "curl $\nabla = 0$ " with the equation (2.4) as well as the expressions of the gradient (2.1) and of the divergence operator (2.2):

Since there is no z-derivative in A and B, we deduce:

We then use "div curl = 0" and we remark that $\gamma_z (I + z \, dn)^{-1} n \wedge ((I + z \, \partial n)^{-1} W_T) = W_T$ to get:

We obtain:

3 Formal asymptotic expansion

We now look for an asymptotic expansion of u^{ε} and H^{ε} in the form :

• in ω_{ε} ,

$$H^{\varepsilon}(t,x) = H^{0}\left(t,P(x),\frac{\varphi(x)}{\varepsilon}\right) + \varepsilon H^{1}\left(t,P(x),\frac{\varphi(x)}{\varepsilon}\right) + \dots$$

where $x \in \omega_{\varepsilon}$,

• in $\Omega' = \mathbb{R}^3 \setminus \Omega$,

$$H^{\varepsilon}(t,y) = H^{0}(t,y) + \varepsilon H^{1}(t,y) + \dots$$
(3.2)

where $y \in \Omega'$.

As we consider a non-flat domain we also need to perform an asymptotic expansion of the differential operators since the geometry also depends on ε .

Since this equation isolates the dissipative term we will use it in the following.

We substitute to u^{ε} , H^{ε} and the differential operators their asymptotic expansions (3.1) and (3.2) in (3.3)-(1.4) in order to get the expression fulfilled by the profiles for $(x, z) \in \mathbb{S}^2 \times (0, 1)$ or $y \in \Omega'$.

As the equations (1.4) are linear, each H^i fulfills the magnetostatic equations (1.4) in Ω' . The transmission conditions (1.4) become for all $i \in \mathbb{N}$:

The regularity in time allows then us to get more regularity in space and the existence in the announced spaces. \Box

$$\begin{split} F = & a_1 \left(\partial_z U^1 + U^0 \wedge \partial_z U^1 \right) + G_0 \left(\partial_z U^2 + U^0 \wedge \partial_z U^2 + U^1 \wedge \partial_z U^1 \right) \\ & + \Delta_{\Gamma_0} U^1 + \Delta_{\Gamma_0,1} U^0 + |\partial_z U^1|^2 U^1 + 2 \left(\partial_z U^1 \cdot \partial_z U^2 \right) U^0 \\ & + |\nabla_{\Gamma_0} U^0|^2 U^1 + 2 \left(\nabla_{\Gamma_0} U^0 \cdot \nabla_{\Gamma_0} U^1 \right) U^0 + 2 \left(\nabla_{\Gamma_0} U^0 \cdot \nabla_{\Gamma_0,1} U^0 \right) U^0 \\ & + U^0 \wedge \Delta_{\Gamma_0} U^1 + U^1 \wedge \Delta_{\Gamma_0} U^0 + U^0 \wedge \Delta_{\Gamma_0,1} U^0 + U^2 \wedge \partial_z^2 U^1 + U^1 \wedge \partial_z^2 U^2 \\ & + U^1 \wedge H^2 + U^2 \wedge H^1 - U^1 \wedge \left(U^1 \wedge H^1 \right) - U^0 \wedge \left(U^1 \wedge H^2 \right) \\ & - U^0 \wedge \left(U^2 \wedge H^1 \right) - U^1 \wedge \left(U^0 \wedge H^2 \right) - U^1 \wedge \left(U^2 \wedge H^0 \right) \\ & - U^2 \wedge \left(U^0 \wedge H^1 \right) - U^2 \wedge \left(U^1 \wedge H^0 \right) \end{split}$$

such that for all T > 0,

$$U^{3} \in \bigcap_{k=0}^{2} \left[\mathbb{W}^{k,\infty} \left(0,T; \mathbb{H}^{4} \left(\Gamma \right) \otimes \mathbb{H}^{5-2k}(I_{1}) \right) \cap \mathbb{H}^{k} \left(0,T; \mathbb{H}^{4} \left(\Gamma \right) \otimes \mathbb{H}^{6-2k}(I_{1}) \right) \right].$$

Proof: The proof follows the same scheme as the previous one. See also [24]. \Box

4 Sobolev embeddings and energy estimate in the space ω_{ε}

In the following we are lead to perform energy estimates on the remainder terms of u^{ε} and H^{ε} . These terms will be defined in ω_{ε} and we need to track the dependence on the domain and particularly on ε of the Sobolev embeddings and other classical inequalities. [24, 25]. Thanks to a rescaling (to get rid of the ε in the definition of the domain), we introduce anisotropic Sobolev spaces on the domain ω_{ε} . We let $v(\sigma, z) = u(\sigma, \varepsilon z)$ for u defined on ω_{ε} .

Definition 4.1. For all $1 \leq p < +\infty$ we define the normalized Lebesgue spaces $\mathbb{L}^p_{\varepsilon}$ in the following way:

$$\mathbb{L}_{\varepsilon}^{p} = \left\{ u \in \mathcal{D}'(\omega_{\varepsilon}), \ \frac{1}{|\omega_{\varepsilon}|} \int_{\omega_{\varepsilon}} |u(x)|^{p} \ dx < +\infty \right\},\\ |u|_{\varepsilon,p} = \left(\frac{1}{|\omega_{\varepsilon}|} \int_{\omega_{\varepsilon}} |u(x)|^{p} \ dx\right)^{1/p}.$$

We let $\mathbb{W}^{0,p}_{\varepsilon} = \mathbb{L}^{p}_{\varepsilon}$ and we define the anisotropic Sobolev spaces $\mathbb{W}^{m,p}_{\varepsilon}$, $m \in \mathbb{N}$, and their norms as follows:

$$\mathbb{W}_{\varepsilon}^{m+1,p} = \left\{ u \in \mathbb{L}_{\varepsilon}^{p}, \ \nabla_{\Gamma_{\varphi(x)}} u \in \mathbb{W}_{\varepsilon}^{m,p} \ and \ (\varepsilon\partial_{z})u \in \mathbb{W}_{\varepsilon}^{m,p} \right\},\\ \|u\|_{\mathbb{W}_{\varepsilon}^{m+1,p}} = \left(|u|_{\varepsilon,p}^{p} + \|\nabla_{\Gamma_{\varphi(x)}} u\|_{\mathbb{W}_{\varepsilon}^{m,p}}^{p} + \|\varepsilon\partial_{z} u\|_{\mathbb{W}_{\varepsilon}^{m,p}}^{p} \right)^{1/p}.$$

When p = 2 we let $\mathbb{H}_{\varepsilon}^{m} = \mathbb{W}_{\varepsilon}^{m,2}$, and $\|u\|_{\varepsilon,m} = \|u\|_{\mathbb{W}_{\varepsilon}^{m,2}}$. When $p = +\infty$, we let:

$$\mathbb{L}_{\varepsilon}^{\infty} = \left\{ u \in \mathcal{D}'(\omega_{\varepsilon}), \sup_{x \in \omega_{\varepsilon}} |u(x)| < +\infty \right\},\ |u|_{\varepsilon,\infty} = \sup_{x \in \omega_{\varepsilon}} |u(x)|.$$

With $\mathbb{W}^{0,\infty}_{\varepsilon} = \mathbb{L}^{\infty}_{\varepsilon}$, we define the anisotropic Sobolev spaces $\mathbb{W}^{m,\infty}_{\varepsilon}$, $m \in \mathbb{N}$, and their norms as follows:

$$\mathbb{W}^{m+1,\infty}_{\varepsilon} = \left\{ u \in \mathbb{L}^{\infty}_{\varepsilon}, \ \nabla_{\Gamma_{\varphi(x)}} u \in \mathbb{W}^{m,\infty}_{\varepsilon} \ and \ (\varepsilon\partial_{z})u \in \mathbb{W}^{m,\infty}_{\varepsilon} \right\}, \\
\|u\|_{\mathbb{W}^{m+1,\infty}_{\varepsilon}} = \left(|u|_{\varepsilon,\infty} + \|\nabla_{\Gamma_{\varphi(x)}} u\|_{\mathbb{W}^{m,\infty}_{\varepsilon}} + \|\varepsilon\partial_{z} u\|_{\mathbb{W}^{m,\infty}_{\varepsilon}} \right).$$

In a first time we remind some anisotropic Sobolev inequalities, the first two being proved in [25], the last one in [24] :

Theorem 4.1 (Anisotropic Agmon's inequality). Let $\Omega_0 =]0,1[^3$. There exists an absolute constant C such that for all $u \in \mathbb{H}^2(\Omega_0)$,

$$\|u\|_{\mathbb{L}^{\infty}(\Omega_{0})} \leq C \|u\|_{\mathbb{L}^{2}(\Omega_{0})}^{\frac{1}{4}} \prod_{i=1}^{3} \left(\left\| \frac{\partial^{2}u}{\partial x_{i}^{2}} \right\|_{\mathbb{L}^{2}(\Omega_{0})} + \left\| \frac{\partial u}{\partial x_{i}} \right\|_{\mathbb{L}^{2}(\Omega_{0})} + \|u\|_{\mathbb{L}^{2}(\Omega_{0})} \right)^{\frac{1}{4}}.$$
 (4.1)

Theorem 4.2 (Anisotropic Ladyzhenskaya's inequality). Let $\Omega_0 = \prod_{i=1}^3 [0, \lambda_i]$ with $\lambda_i > 0$ for i = 1, 2, 3. There exists an absolute constant C such that for all $u \in \mathbb{H}^1(\Omega_0)$,

$$\|u\|_{\mathbb{L}^{6}(\Omega)} \leq C \prod_{i=1}^{3} \left(\left\| \frac{\partial u}{\partial x_{i}} \right\|_{\mathbb{L}^{2}(\Omega)} + \frac{1}{\lambda_{i}} \|u\|_{\mathbb{L}^{2}(\Omega_{0})} \right)^{\frac{1}{3}}.$$
(4.2)

Theorem 4.3. Let $\Omega_0 =]0, 1[^3$. There exists an absolute constant C such that for all $u \in \mathbb{H}^2(\Omega_0)$,

$$\|u\|_{\mathbb{L}^{12}(\Omega_0)} \le C \prod_{i=1}^3 \left(\sum_{j=0}^1 \left\| \frac{\partial^j u}{\partial x_i^j} \right\|_{\mathbb{L}^2(\Omega_0)} \right)^{\frac{1}{4}} \left(\sum_{j=0}^2 \left\| \frac{\partial^j u}{\partial x_i^j} \right\|_{\mathbb{L}^2(\Omega_0)} \right)^{\frac{1}{12}}.$$
 (4.3)

We now use the previous rescaling to deduce anisotropic versions of the Sobolev embeddings:

Lemma 4.4. Let $u \in \mathbb{L}^p_{\varepsilon}$ and $v(\sigma, x) = u(\Psi(\sigma, x))$ for all $(\sigma, x) \in \Gamma \times \varepsilon I_1$. $v \in \mathbb{L}^2(\Gamma \times \varepsilon I_1)$ and

$$\frac{1}{M_{\varepsilon}^{1/p}} \left| u \right|_{\varepsilon,p} \le \int_{\Gamma \times \varepsilon I_1} \left| v \right|^p \, d\sigma \, dx \le M_{\varepsilon}^{1/p} \left| u \right|_{\varepsilon,p},$$

where $M_{\varepsilon} = \frac{\sup_{\sigma,x\in\Gamma\times\varepsilon I_1} |Jac\Psi(\sigma,x)|}{\inf_{\sigma,x\in\Gamma\times\varepsilon I_1} |Jac\Psi(\sigma,x)|}$. Moreover there exists some ε -independent constants μ , ν such that for ε small enough, $0 < \nu \leq M_{\varepsilon} \leq \mu$.

Proof: The application Ψ is a regular diffeomorphism for all $\varepsilon \in [0, \eta_0]$ so $|\operatorname{Jac}\Psi|$ is continuous and take non-null values on $\Gamma \times \varepsilon I_1$ and for $\varepsilon \in [0, \eta_0]$. \Box

Corollary 4.5. There exists an ε -independent constant C such that:

• for all $u \in \mathbb{H}^1_{\varepsilon}$ and $1 \le p \le 6$,

$$|u|_{\varepsilon,p} \le C \ |u|_{\varepsilon,2}^{\frac{3}{p}-\frac{1}{2}} \|u\|_{\varepsilon,1}^{\frac{3}{2}-\frac{3}{p}}.$$

$$(4.4)$$

• for all $u \in \mathbb{H}^2_{\varepsilon}$ and $2 \leq p \leq +\infty$,

$$|u|_{\varepsilon,p} \le C \ |u|_{\varepsilon,2}^{\frac{1}{4} + \frac{3}{2p}} \|u\|_{\varepsilon,2}^{\frac{3}{4} - \frac{3}{2p}}.$$
(4.5)

• for all $u \in \mathbb{H}^2_{\varepsilon}$,

$$|u|_{\varepsilon,12} \le C \, \|u\|_{\varepsilon,1}^{\frac{3}{4}} \, \|u\|_{\varepsilon,2}^{\frac{1}{4}} \,. \tag{4.6}$$

Proof: Thanks to Lemma (4.4), an atlas covering Γ and a partition of unity we only have to prove the result in $]0,1[^2 \times I_1$.

We obtain immediatly the first estimate in the case p = 6 thanks to Th. 4.2. An interpolation between $\mathbb{L}^2_{\varepsilon}$ and $\mathbb{L}^6_{\varepsilon}$ give the result.

With the rescaling strategy we use to introduce the anisotropic Sobolev spaces we deduce from Th. 4.1 and 4.3 the two inequalities. \Box

4.1 Trace and lifting

Let us remind a definition of the spaces $\mathbb{H}^{s}(\Omega)$, $s = k + \theta > 0$, 0 < s < 1 (cf [21, 20]):

$$\mathbb{H}^{s}(\Omega) = \left\{ u \in \mathbb{H}^{k}(\Omega), \int_{\Omega} \int_{\Omega} \frac{|D^{\alpha}u(x) - D^{\alpha}u(y)|^{2}}{|x - y|^{n + 2s}} dx \, dy < +\infty, \; \forall |\alpha| = k \right\}.$$
$$\|u\|_{\mathbb{H}^{s}(\Omega)} = \left(\|u\|_{\mathbb{H}^{k}(\Omega)}^{2} + \sum_{|\alpha| = k} \int_{\Omega} \int_{\Omega} \frac{|D^{\alpha}u(x) - D^{\alpha}u(y)|^{2}}{|x - y|^{n + 2s}} \, dx \, dy \right)^{1/2}.$$

With the same type of rescaling we used for the embedding theorem we define anisotropic spaces on the boundary $\partial \omega_{\varepsilon} = \Psi(\Gamma \times \{0, \varepsilon\})$ (Γ has no boundary):

$$\mathbb{H}^{s}_{\varepsilon}(\partial\omega_{\varepsilon}) = \left\{ u \in \mathbb{H}^{k}_{\varepsilon}(\partial\omega_{\varepsilon}), \frac{1}{|\partial\omega_{\varepsilon}|^{2}} \int_{\partial\omega_{\varepsilon}} \int_{\partial\omega_{\varepsilon}} \frac{|D^{\alpha}_{\varepsilon}u(y) - D^{\alpha}_{\varepsilon}u(y')|^{2}}{(|\sigma - \sigma'|^{2} + \varepsilon^{-2}|z - z'|^{2})^{n/2 + s}} dy \, dy' < +\infty, \\ \forall |\alpha| = k \right\},$$

$$\|u\|_{\mathbb{H}^s_{\varepsilon}(\partial\omega_{\varepsilon})} = \left(\|u\|^2_{\mathbb{H}^k(\partial\omega_{\varepsilon})} + \sum_{|\alpha|=k} \frac{1}{|\partial\omega_{\varepsilon}|^2} \int_{\partial\omega_{\varepsilon}} \int_{\partial\omega_{\varepsilon}} \frac{|D^{\alpha}_{\varepsilon}u(y) - D^{\alpha}_{\varepsilon}u(y')|^2}{(|\sigma - \sigma'|^2 + \varepsilon^{-2}|z - z'|^2)^{n/2+s}} \, dy \, dy'\right)^{1/2},$$

where $y = \Psi(\sigma, z), y' = \Psi(\sigma', z'), D_{\varepsilon} = (\nabla_{\Gamma_{\varphi(x)}}^t, \varepsilon \partial_z)^t$ and $\alpha \in \mathbb{N}^k$.

Lemma 4.6. There exists an ε -independent constant C such that for all $\varepsilon > 0$ small enough and $u \in \mathbb{H}^1_{\varepsilon}$,

$$\|u\|_{\mathbb{H}^{\frac{1}{2}}_{\varepsilon}(\partial\omega_{\varepsilon})} \leq C \|u\|_{\varepsilon,1}.$$

There exists an ε -independent constant C such that for all $0 < \varepsilon$ small enough and $f \in \mathbb{H}_{\varepsilon}^{\frac{1}{2}}(\partial \omega_{\varepsilon})$ there exists a lifting $\psi \in \mathbb{H}_{\varepsilon}^{1}$ of f such that:

$$\|\psi\|_{\varepsilon,1} \le C \|f\|_{\mathbb{H}^{\frac{1}{2}}_{\varepsilon}(\partial\omega_{\varepsilon})}.$$

Proof:

Anisotropic trace theorem: for all $(\sigma, z) \in \Gamma \times I_1$, we let $v(\sigma, z) = (u \circ \Psi)(\sigma, \varepsilon z)$ and we apply the classical trace theorem to v:

$$\|v\|_{\mathbb{H}^{\frac{1}{2}}(\Gamma \times \{0,1\})} \le c \|v\|_{\mathbb{H}^{1}(\Gamma \times I_{1})},$$

where c does not depend on ε . We now perform some estimations on v: thanks to an atlas covering Γ and a partition of unity we are lead back to functions with a compact support in $\Psi(U \times \varepsilon I_1)$ where U is an open subset of Γ . As in lemmas 4.4 and 4.5 there exists some ε -independent constants C and C' such that:

$$C \|u\|_{\varepsilon,1} \le \|v\|_{\mathbb{H}^1(\Gamma \times I_1)} \le C' \|u\|_{\varepsilon,1}.$$

Since the spaces $\mathbb{H}_{\varepsilon}^{\frac{1}{2}}(\partial \omega_{\varepsilon})$ take into account the anisotropy of the problem (as well as the Sobolev spaces) we obtain the following estimates on the norme $\mathbb{H}_{\varepsilon}^{\frac{1}{2}}$:

$$C \left\| u \right\|_{\mathbb{H}^{\frac{1}{2}}_{\varepsilon}(\partial \omega_{\varepsilon})} \leq \left\| v \right\|_{\mathbb{H}^{\frac{1}{2}}(\Gamma \times \{0,1\})} \leq C' \left\| u \right\|_{\mathbb{H}^{\frac{1}{2}}_{\varepsilon}(\partial \omega_{\varepsilon})},$$

which gives the result.

Anisotropic lifting theorem: By the same way we apply the classical lifting theorem to $g(\sigma, z) = f \circ \Psi(\sigma, \varepsilon z), \ (\sigma, z) \in \Gamma \times \{0, 1\}$ to obtain a lifting $v \in \mathbb{H}^1(\Gamma \times I_1)$. Since the application Ψ is a diffeomorphism on ω_{η_0} we let $u(\Psi(\sigma, \varepsilon z)) = v(\sigma, z)$. Then u is a lifting of $f \in \mathbb{H}^{\frac{1}{2}}(\partial \omega_{\varepsilon})$ and the previous estimates give the result. \Box

4.2 Some inequalities

In the following we also use the following inequalities:

Lemma 4.7. For all $u \in \mathbb{H}^2_{\varepsilon}$ such that $\frac{\partial u}{\partial n} = 0$ on $\partial \omega_{\varepsilon}$ there exists an ε -independent constant C such that:

$$\|u\|_{\varepsilon,2} \le C \left(\left|u\right|_{\varepsilon,2}^{2} + \left|\Delta_{\Gamma_{\varphi(x)}} u\right|_{\varepsilon,2}^{2} + \left|\varepsilon^{2} \frac{1}{\gamma_{z}} \partial_{z} \left(\gamma_{z} \partial_{z} u\right)\right|_{\varepsilon,2}^{2} \right)^{1/2},$$

$$(4.7)$$

For all $u \in \mathbb{H}^m_{\varepsilon}$, $m \in \mathbb{N}^*$ there exists an ε -independent constant C such that:

$$\|u\|_{\varepsilon,m} \leq C \left(\|u\|_{\varepsilon,2} + \left\| \operatorname{div}_{\Gamma_{\varphi(x)}} u \right\|_{\varepsilon,m-1} + \left\| \varepsilon \frac{1}{\gamma_z} \partial_z (\gamma_z(u \cdot n)) \right\|_{\varepsilon,m-1} + \left\| \nabla_{\Gamma_{\varphi(x)}} \wedge u + \varepsilon(n\partial_z) \wedge u \right\|_{\varepsilon,m-1} + \left\| u \cdot n \right\|_{\mathbb{H}^{m-\frac{1}{2}}_{\varepsilon}(\partial\omega_{\varepsilon})} \right).$$

$$(4.8)$$

Proof: We let $v(\sigma, z) = u(\Psi(\sigma, \varepsilon z))$ to only consider the domain $\Gamma \times I_1$ and we apply to v the classical inequality

$$\|v\|_{\mathbb{H}^{2}(\Gamma \times I_{1})} \leq C \left(\|v\|_{\mathbb{L}^{2}(\Gamma \times I_{1})}^{2} + \|\Delta v\|_{\mathbb{L}^{2}(\Gamma \times I_{1})}^{2}\right)^{1/2}$$

and Lemma 3.1. We then deduce the result thanks to Lemma 4.4 and 4.6. $\hfill\square$

Corollary 4.8. There exists an ε -independent constant C such that for all $u \in \mathbb{H}^2_{\varepsilon}$ satisfying $\frac{\partial u}{\partial n} = 0$ on $\partial \omega_{\varepsilon}$ we have:

$$\left\| (\nabla_{\Gamma_{\varphi(x)}} + \varepsilon(n\partial_{z}))u \right\|_{\varepsilon,1} \le C \left(\left| \nabla_{\Gamma_{\varphi(x)}}u \right|_{\varepsilon,2} + \left| \varepsilon\partial_{z}u \right|_{\varepsilon,2} + \left| \Delta_{\Gamma_{\varphi(x)}}u \right|_{\varepsilon,2} + \left| \varepsilon^{2} \frac{1}{\gamma_{z}}\partial_{z}\left(\gamma_{z}\partial_{z}u\right) \right|_{\varepsilon,2} \right).$$

$$(4.9)$$

Moreover if $u \in \mathbb{H}^3_{\varepsilon}$ there exists an ε -independent constant C such that:

$$\left\| (\nabla_{\Gamma_{\varphi(x)}} + \varepsilon(n\partial_z)) u \right\|_{\varepsilon,2} \le C \left(\left| \nabla_{\Gamma_{\varphi(x)}} u \right|_{\varepsilon,2} + |\varepsilon \partial_z u|_{\varepsilon,2} + \left\| \Delta_{\Gamma_{\varphi(x)}} u \right\|_{\varepsilon,1} + \left\| \varepsilon^2 \frac{1}{\gamma_z} \partial_z (\gamma_z \partial_z u) \right\|_{\varepsilon,1} \right).$$

$$(4.10)$$

5 Equations satisfied by the remainder term

• In ω_{ε} we let

$$\begin{split} u^{\varepsilon}(t,x) &= U^{0}(t,P(x)) + \varepsilon U^{1}\left(t,P(x),\frac{\varphi(x)}{\varepsilon}\right) + \varepsilon^{2}U^{2}\left(t,P(x),\frac{\varphi(x)}{\varepsilon}\right) \\ &+ \varepsilon^{3}U^{3}\left(t,P(x),\frac{\varphi(x)}{\varepsilon}\right) + \varepsilon^{3}r^{\varepsilon}(t,x), \\ H^{\varepsilon}(t,x) &= H^{0}(t,P(x)) + \varepsilon H^{1}\left(t,P(x),\frac{\varphi(x)}{\varepsilon}\right) + \varepsilon^{2}H^{2}\left(t,P(x),\frac{\varphi(x)}{\varepsilon}\right) \\ &+ \varepsilon^{3}H^{3}\left(t,P(x),\frac{\varphi(x)}{\varepsilon}\right) + \varepsilon^{3}Q^{\varepsilon}(t,x), \end{split}$$

• In Ω' ,

$$H^{\varepsilon}(t,x) = H^{0}(t,x) + \varepsilon H^{1}(t,x) + \varepsilon^{2} H^{2}(t,x) + \varepsilon^{3} H^{3}(t,x) + \varepsilon^{3} Q^{\varepsilon}(t,x),$$

where r^{ε} and Q^{ε} are the remainder terms of u and H.

Remark 5.1. All the terms which depend on U^0 , H^0 , U^1 ,... naturally live on $\Gamma \times (0,1)$. From now on, when we consider that this kind of terms in the equations on the remainder are defined on the space ω_{ε} , we assume that these terms are valued on $\Psi^{-1}(x)$ where $x \in \omega_{\varepsilon}$.

We also need to precise the expressions of the operator we used. We let

$$a_r = \frac{1}{\varepsilon^2} \int_0^{\varepsilon z} \frac{(\varepsilon z - s)^2}{2} \partial_z^3 G(\sigma, s) \, ds$$

and we get:

, where $\nabla^r u = \frac{1}{\varepsilon} \left[\int_0^{\varepsilon z} (\varepsilon z - s) \left(\partial_z^2 \nabla_{\Gamma_z} \right) (\sigma, s) \, ds \right] (u).$

• div
$$V = \frac{1}{\varepsilon} \partial_z (V \cdot n) + \sum_{i=0}^2 \varepsilon^i a_i \ n \cdot V + \varepsilon^2 a_r \ n \cdot V + \sum_{i=0}^2 \varepsilon^i \Theta^i(V) + \varepsilon^2 \Theta^r(V),$$

where $\Theta^r(V) = \frac{1}{\varepsilon^2} \left[\int_0^{\varepsilon z} \frac{(\varepsilon z - s)^2}{2} \left(\partial_z^3 \operatorname{div}_{\Gamma_z} \right) (\sigma, s) \ ds \right] (V_T).$
• curl $V = \frac{1}{\varepsilon} n \wedge \partial_z V + \sum_{i=0}^2 \varepsilon^i \Lambda^i(V) + \varepsilon^2 \Lambda^r(V)$

Under the assumptions of Th. 3.3, 3.4, 3.5 and 3.6, and if r^{ε} belongs to $\mathbb{H}^{p}_{\varepsilon}$, there exists an unique $Q^{\varepsilon} = R^{\varepsilon} + S^{\varepsilon}$ and some ε -independent constants c_{0} such that R^{ε} is a linear operator in r^{ε} and for all $i \in \{0, \ldots, 3\}$,

We then apply the Lax-Milgram theorem to obtain the existence of $\Phi^{\varepsilon} \in W^1(\Omega' \cup \omega_{\varepsilon})$. We have $\|R^{\varepsilon}\|_{\mathbb{L}^2(\Omega' \cup \omega_{\varepsilon})} = \|\Phi^{\varepsilon}\|_{W^1(\Omega' \cup \omega_{\varepsilon})} \leq \|r^{\varepsilon}\|_{\mathbb{L}^2(\omega_{\varepsilon})}$ and then $|R^{\varepsilon}|_{\varepsilon,2} \leq |r^{\varepsilon}|_{\varepsilon,2}$. To get more regularity for the solution we proceed as in [9, 11, 19]: we seek the equations fulfilled by the derivatives of Φ^{ε} .

To obtain them we introduce vector fields X which are normal or tangential to Γ on an open subset of $\omega_{\varepsilon} \cup \{x \in \Omega', \varphi(x) < \eta_0\}$ and we prolongate them by zero to the whole domain ω_{ε} and an exterior neighbourhood of Γ thanks to a bump function. We then define tangential and normal derivatives by $(X \cdot \nabla)$, this definiton remaining valid in $\Omega' \cup \omega_{\varepsilon}$.

We obtain the equations for the tangential derivatives of Φ^{ε} by differentiating tangentially the equations on Φ^{ε} . When we differentiate the equations in the normal direction we multiply by ε to take into account the anisotropy of the domain and in the Sobolev spaces and we deduce the boundary conditions for the equation on Φ^{ε} (if we have enough regularity in the tangential directions). Finally we get $\|R^{\varepsilon}\|_{\varepsilon,p} \leq C \|r^{\varepsilon}\|_{\varepsilon,p}$ where C is an ε -independent constant.

Back to S^{ε} the functions f_1 and f_2 both belong to $\mathbb{L}^2_{\varepsilon}$. There exists then an application $v \in W^1(\Omega' \cup \omega_{\varepsilon})$ such that:

div

We then apply the Lax-Milgram theorem in $\mathbb{W}^1(\Omega' \cup \omega_{\varepsilon})$ and get the existence and uniqueness of Φ in $\mathbb{W}^1(\Omega' \cup \omega_{\varepsilon})$. Moreover Φ fulfills:

Back in the equations 3.3 we simplify by using the equations of the profiles. We get:

The full expression of F^{ε} is given in Annex A. According to the regularity results we get on the profiles we have the following proposition:

Proposition 5.2. Let $U^0 \in W^{7,\infty}(\Gamma)$. For all $p, 1 \leq p \leq +\infty$ and for all T > 0, there exists some ε -independent constants C_p such that for all $\varepsilon > 0, t \in [0,T]$ and i = 0, 1, 2,

$$\|a^{\varepsilon}(t,.)\|_{\mathbb{W}^{i,p}_{\varepsilon}} \leq C_p.$$

For all $p, 2 \leq p < +\infty$ and T > 0 there exists some ε -independent constants C_p such that for all $\varepsilon > 0$ and $t \in [0,T]$,

$$\|a^{\varepsilon}(t,.)\|_{\mathbb{W}^{3,p}_{\varepsilon}} \leq C_p,$$

For all $p, 1 \leq p \leq +\infty$ and T > 0 there exists some ε -independent constants C_p such that for all $\varepsilon > 0$ and $t \in [0, T]$,

Proof: Since $U_0^0 \in \mathbb{W}^{7,\infty}(\Gamma)$, the regularity results on the profiles (Th. 3.3, 3.4, 3.5, 3.6) and the classical Sobolev embeddings give for all i = 0, 1, 2, 3,

Thanks to a rescaling we define the functions on ω_{ε} and prove the result. By the same way we prove estimates in $\mathbb{W}^{1,\infty}(\Gamma \times I_1)$ for H^i and Lemma 5.1 and 4.5 give the estimates on S^{ε} .

We then easily deduce the estimates on F^{ε} from the previous results. \Box

Remark 5.2. We could obtain more precise results since U^0 does not depend on z:

but we do not need such estimates in the following. The estimations that follow remain then valid even if U_0^0 depend on z.

6 Estimate on the remainder term

We will now give en estimate on the remainder term r^{ε} . We will then obtain a new existence proof of the magnetic moment u^{ε} but for an initial data with regularity $\mathbb{W}^{7,\infty}(\Gamma)$ instead of \mathbb{H}^2 . This loss in the regularity is typical from the asymptotic expansion method we use (See also [16, 5, 11, 23, 24]).

Thanks to the formalism given to the differential operators and thanks to the anisotropic lemmas and regularity results (we get the same loss of exponent ε) we can perform the same kind of estimates that we did in [24].

These estimates are performed on a Galerkin approximation which will allow us to justify all integrations by parts. The approximation space we consider for the Landau Lifschitz equation is built on the basis of eigenfunctions of the Laplace's operator with domain

$$\left\{ u \in \mathbb{H}^2_{\varepsilon}, \ \frac{\partial u}{\partial n} = 0 \text{ on } \Gamma \cup \Gamma_{\varepsilon} \right\}.$$

For the magnetic field we only introduce R_n the projection of $R(r_n)$ on the approximation space, but we will not detail this step and only concentrate on the estimates. In the following we let:

$$\mathbf{Q}(t) = |r_n^{\varepsilon}(t,.)|_{\varepsilon,2}^2 + |\nabla_{\Gamma_z} r_n^{\varepsilon}(t,.)|_{\varepsilon,2}^2 + |\varepsilon \partial_z r_n^{\varepsilon}(t,.)|_{\varepsilon,2}^2 + \varepsilon^2 \left(|\Delta_{\Gamma_z} r_n^{\varepsilon}(t,.)|_{\varepsilon,2}^2 + |\varepsilon \partial_z \nabla_{\Gamma_z} r_n^{\varepsilon}|_{\varepsilon,2}^2 + |\varepsilon \nabla_{\Gamma_z} \partial_z r_n^{\varepsilon}|_{\varepsilon,2}^2 + |\varepsilon^2 \partial_z^2 r_n^{\varepsilon}(t,.)|_{\varepsilon,2}^2 \right)$$

and we assume that $\mathbf{Q}(0) \leq \|r_0^{\varepsilon}\|_{\varepsilon,1}^2 + \varepsilon^2 \|r_0^{\varepsilon}\|_{\varepsilon,2}^2$ is bounded.

Since we consider a Galerkin approximation of r^{ε} we get the existence of \mathbf{Q} on a maximum time interval $[0, T_{n,\varepsilon}^*[$ where $0 < T_{n,\varepsilon}^* \le +\infty$. We want to prove here the existence of ε_T small enough such that we have the existence of \mathbf{Q} on [0, T] independently from n if $\varepsilon \le \varepsilon_T$. We also show the estimates on the main result. We will proceed as it follows:

We let T > 0 and thanks to the energy estimates we obtained by integrating by parts we show that **Q** fulfills on $[0,T] \cap [0,T^*_{n,\varepsilon}[$ the differential inequality:

$$\mathbf{Q}'(t) \le C_T(1 + \mathbf{Q}(t)) + \varepsilon P_T(\mathbf{Q}(t)), \quad t \in [0, T] \cap [0, T^*_{n,\varepsilon}[,$$
(6.1)

where C_T is a constant and P_T a polynomial, both independent from n and ε (but not from T). We let now

$$T^{\varepsilon} = \sup\left\{T, \ P(\mathbf{Q}(t)) \le \frac{1}{\varepsilon^2}, \ \forall t \in [0,T]\right\}.$$

For all $t < T^{\varepsilon}$, $\mathbf{Q}' \leq C(1 + \mathbf{Q})$, so $\mathbf{Q}(t) \leq (1 + \mathbf{Q}(0)) \exp(Ct) - 1$ thanks to the Gronwall lemma. We deduce then that $P(\mathbf{Q}(t)) \leq \frac{1}{\varepsilon^2}$ for all $t \leq a \ln \frac{1}{\varepsilon} + b$. Finally we have that $\lim_{\varepsilon \to 0} T_{\varepsilon} = +\infty$ which implies $T^*_{n,\varepsilon} \geq T$ as soons as $\varepsilon \in]0, \varepsilon_T]$ where ε_T is a small enough constant. Moreover r^{ε} is bounded independtly from ε in $\mathbb{L}^{\infty}(0,T;\mathbb{H}^1_{\varepsilon})$ as well as $\varepsilon r^{\varepsilon}$ in $\mathbb{L}^{\infty}(0,T;\mathbb{H}^2_{\varepsilon})$ for all $0 < T < T_{\varepsilon}$. We then use the anisotropic Sobolev embeddings and the renormalization in the Lebesgue spaces to obtain the main result. **Remark 6.1.** In the following inequalities the ∇ and Δ operators are the usual operators. When we estimate them in the anisotropic Sobolev spaces we lose some powers of ε :

We also have to consider commutators between the differential operators since the tangential differential operators depend on z. These commutators are differential operators of order one less in the normal direction. For example in the case of the gradient,

$$[\partial_z, \nabla_{\Gamma_z}]u = -\left(I + zdn\right)^{-1} dn \,\nabla_{\Gamma_z} u.$$

These commutators appear in the second member and in the dissipative term of the following estimates. In both cases they generate tangential derivates terms that are easy to estimate or to absorb.

To simplify the estimates we then proceed as if the differential operators commutate. We also note D_z the operator $n\partial_z$ and D_z^2 the operator $\frac{1}{\gamma_z}\partial_z(\gamma_z\partial_z)$.

 \mathbb{L}^2 estimates: we take the scalar product of (5.2) with $\frac{1}{|\omega_{\varepsilon}|}r^{\varepsilon}$ and we integrate on ω_{ε} (so that the norm $| |_{\varepsilon,2}$ appears). The integrations by parts are licit since we work with a Galerkin approximate. We get:
