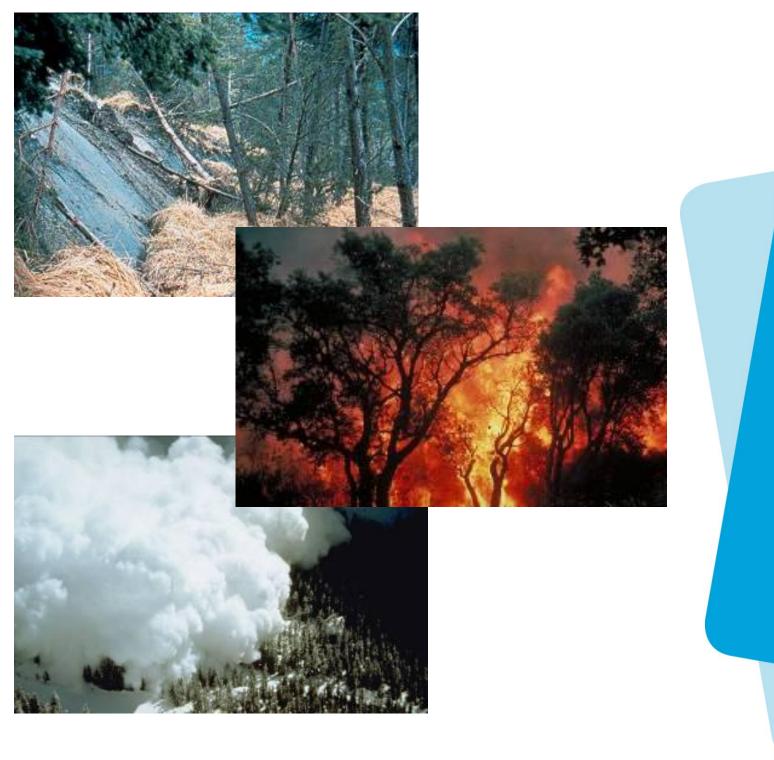

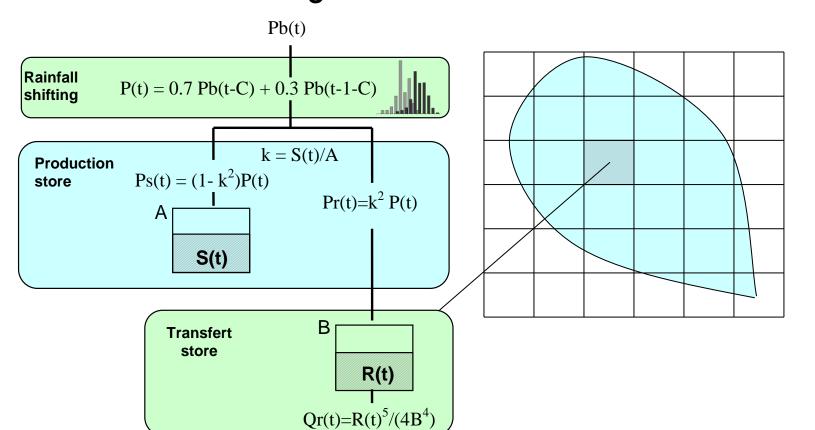
# HE KHYTMIE PROJECT

In most cases, natural hazards encountered in mountainous areas are largely dependent on precipitations: flash floods, debris flows, landslides, rock falls, snow avalanches. However, the knowledge of rainfall quantities still remains a tricky issue: the available rain-gauges are in a limited number and most often located in the valleys, and the radar rainfall estimates have to deal with a lot of problems due to the relief and the difficulty to distinguish the different types of hydrometeors (snow, hail, rain). In this context, the "RHYTMME" project aims at:

- Providing an accurate radar rainfall information in mountainous areas.
- Developing a real-time hazards warning system based on this information.

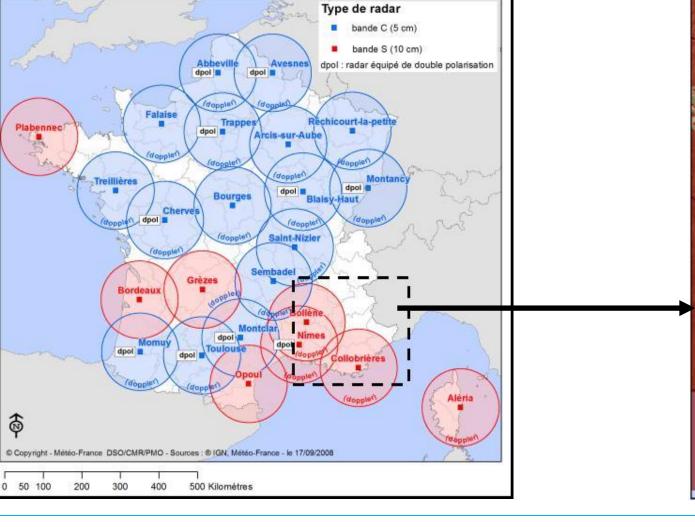
### > Actual project achievement

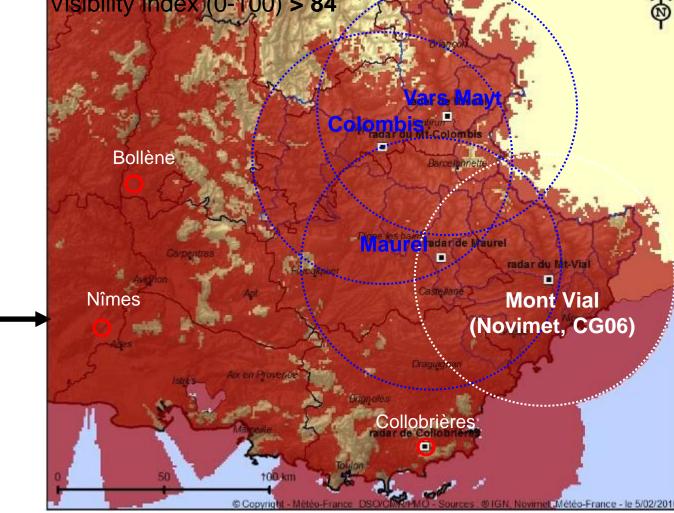
- Installation of X-band Doppler polarimetric radar in the Southern Alps at Maurel mont in addition to the already existing X-band radar from Mont Vial (at the end of the project, a network of 4 X-band radar will be operational)
- Capability to visualise rainfall accumulations in real time and on fine scales
- Display of the danger gravity levels corresponding to various hazards, made available in real time to local risk managers via the Internet



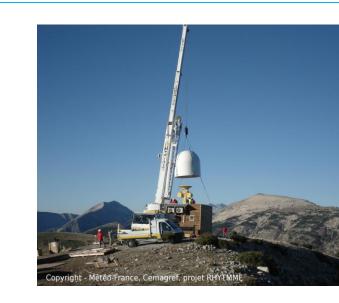
### > flash flood warning system

- using AIGA method, comparing the flood peak to a threshold
- Simple event-based conceptual model
- Limited numbers of regionalized parameters





ARAMIS network and the RHYTMME network development.





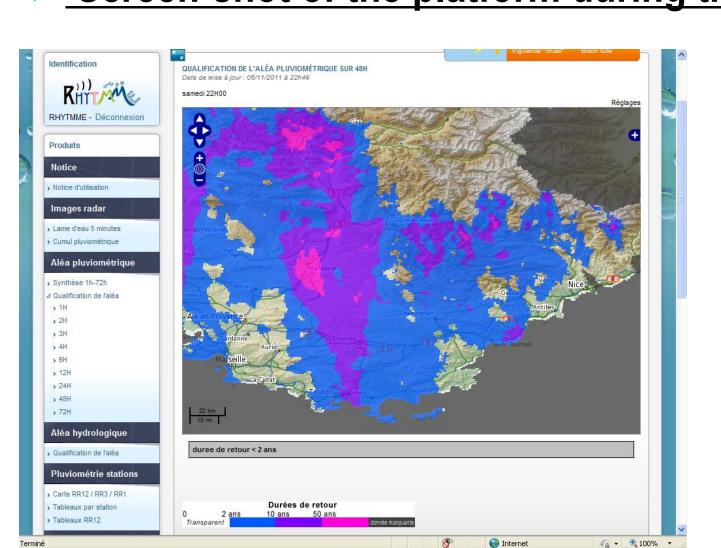
Installation of Mont Maurel radar (05) inaugurated the 23 May 2011

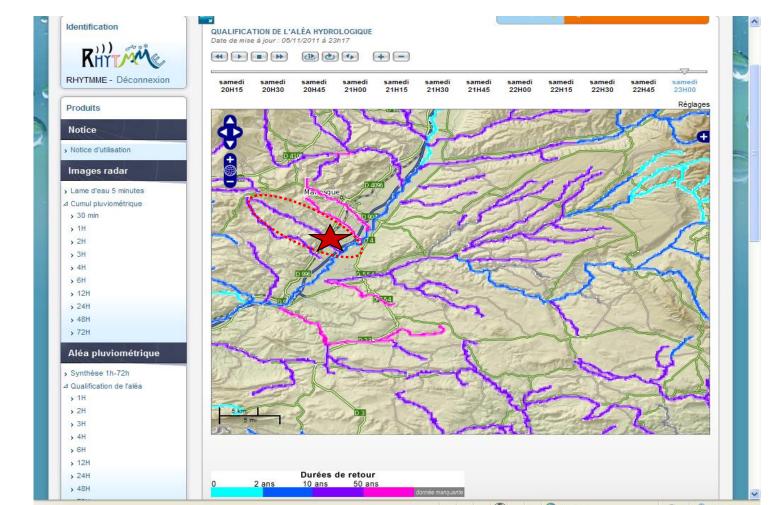

- Accident between 1 car and the train (2)

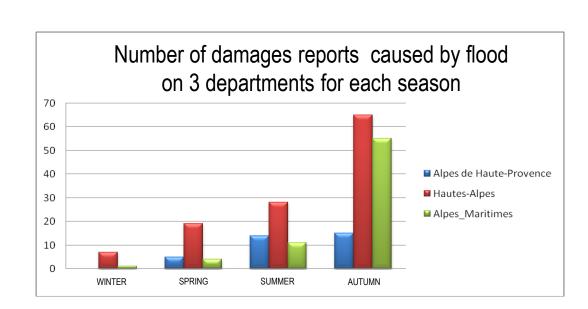


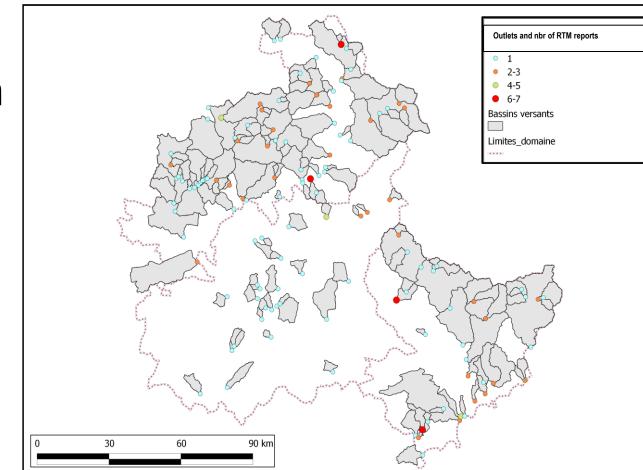


### Historical events evaluation using reports data-base

### Available data

- Reanalysed rainfall by Meteo-France over 10 years
- Damages reports from « Restauration des Terrains en Montagnes » services (RTM) for 139 catchments

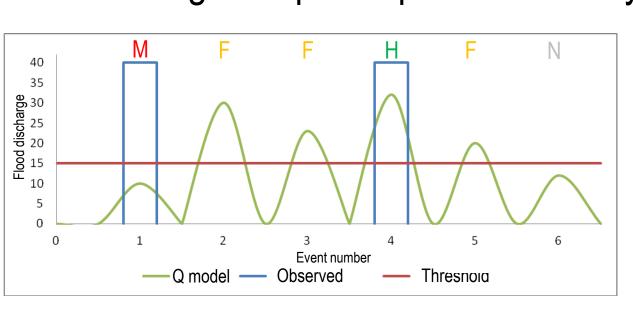


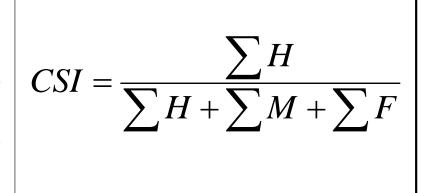


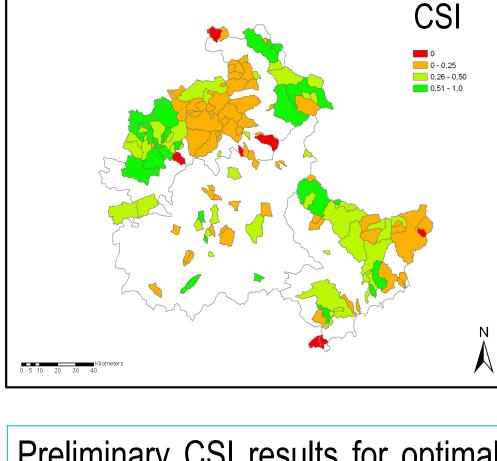
Localisation and number of flood reports between 1997 and 2006 extracted from the historical data-base (RTM)

### Methodology and first results

- Issuing an alert when modelled discharges exceed a threshold
- Comparing modelled alert to observed event into the data-base
- Determining the optimal performance by adjusting the threshold







- H = HitM = Missed = False N = No Alarm
  - Performance criterion: Critical Success Index
- Preliminary CSI results for optimal threshold for each catchment
