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The Fourier Laplace Approach of Proving The Riemann Hypothesis

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Abstract

The Author presents a Fourier Laplace transformation of The Analytic Continuation Formula of The Riemann Zeta Function and showed that the zeros of the Analytic Continuation Formula will always be real. A general formula for these zeros is also obtained which when substituted into the ACF it is shown to be the root of the ACF of the Riemann Zeta Function.

Keywords: Riemann zeta function; Fourier transform; Laplace transform; Analytic Continuation Formula (ACF).

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Introduction

Over the years, mathematicians have studied the Analytic Continuation Formula (ACF) of the Riemann Zeta Function by representing the exponential and the trigonometric functions in the ACF as Taylors Series. The author in this work chose to represent the exponential and the trigonometric functions as Fourier Cosine transform and Laplace transform respectively since Fourier and Laplace transformations have a meeting.

The Relationship between Fourier and Laplace transform can be explained as follows:

Consider the function

$$f(t) = \begin{cases} e^{-st}g(t) & for \ t > 0\\ 0 & for \ t < 0 \end{cases}$$

Then the Fourier transform of f(t) is given by

$$F\{f(t)\} = \frac{1}{\sqrt{2\pi}} \int_{0}^{\infty} e^{(is-x)t} g(t) dt = \frac{1}{\sqrt{2\pi}} \int_{0}^{\infty} e^{-\rho t} g(t) dt; \rho = (x-is) = \frac{1}{\sqrt{2\pi}} L\{g(t)\}$$

Thus, the Fourier transform of $f(t) = \frac{1}{\sqrt{2\pi}} \times$ the Laplace transform of g(t) as defined above.

(2.0) A closer look at the $\varepsilon(t)$

Riemann defined the analytical continuation formula as [1];

$$\varepsilon(t) = \frac{1}{2} - \left(t^2 + \frac{1}{4}\right) \int_{1}^{\infty} x^{-3/4} \psi(x) \cos\left(\frac{t}{2}\log x\right) dx \tag{1}$$

Such that

$$\psi(x) = \sum_{n\geq 1}^{\infty} e^{-n^2 \pi x} \tag{2}$$

The Fourier Cosine transform of (2) gives

$$\sum_{n\geq 1}^{\infty} \sqrt{\frac{2}{\pi}} \left[\frac{n^2 \pi}{n^2 \pi + S^2} \right] \tag{3}$$

Examining the trigonometric term in (1), it is obvious that one can write $\cos\left(\frac{t}{2}\log x\right)$ in its

Laplace transform as;

$$\mathcal{L}\left[\cos\left[\left(\frac{1}{2}\log x\right)t\right]\right] = \frac{S}{\left(\frac{1}{2}\log x\right)^2 + S^2} \tag{4}$$

By injecting (3) and (4) into (1), one obtains:

$$\varepsilon(t) = \frac{1}{2} - \left(t^2 + \frac{1}{4}\right) \int_{1}^{\infty} x^{-3/4} \left[\sum_{n \ge 1}^{\infty} \sqrt{\frac{2}{\pi}} \left[\frac{n^2 \pi}{n^2 \pi + S^2} \right] \right] \left[\frac{S}{\left(\frac{1}{2} \log x\right)^2 + S^2} \right] dx \tag{5}$$

This becomes:

$$\frac{1}{2} - \left(t^2 + \frac{1}{4}\right) \left[\sum_{n \ge 1}^{\infty} \sqrt{\frac{2}{\pi}} \left[\frac{n^2 \pi}{n^2 \pi + S^2}\right] \int_{1}^{\infty} x^{-3/4} \left[\frac{S}{\left(\frac{1}{2} \log x\right)^2 + S^2}\right] dx \tag{6}$$

By using the Classical estimate [15]

$$\sum_{P \le x} \frac{\log P}{P - 1} = \log x + c + \theta(1) \tag{7}$$

$$\log x = \sum_{P \le x} \frac{\log P}{P - 1} - c - \theta(1) \tag{8}$$

Substituting (8) into (6), one arrives at

$$\frac{1}{2} - \left(t^2 + \frac{1}{4}\right) \left[\sum_{n \ge 1}^{\infty} \sqrt{\frac{2}{\pi}} \left[\frac{n^2 \pi}{n^2 \pi + S^2} \right] \left[\frac{S}{\left(\frac{1}{2} \sum_{P \le x} \frac{\log P}{P - 1} - C - \theta(1)\right)^2 + S^2} \right] \int_{1}^{\infty} x^{-3/4} dx \quad (9)$$

If we take the limit of (9) as $b \to \infty$, we will have;

$$\lim_{b \to \infty} \varepsilon(t) = \frac{1}{2} - \left(t^2 + \frac{1}{4}\right) \left[\sum_{n \ge 1}^{\infty} \sqrt{\frac{2}{\pi}} \left[\frac{n^2 \pi}{n^2 \pi + S^2} \right] \right] \left[\frac{S}{\left(\frac{1}{2} \sum_{P \le x} \frac{\log P}{P - 1} - C - \theta(1)\right)^2 + S^2} \right] \lim_{b \to \infty} \int_{1}^{b} x^{-3/4} dx$$

On integrating (10), we obtain;

$$\frac{1}{2} - \left(t^2 + \frac{1}{4}\right) \left[\sum_{n \ge 1}^{\infty} \sqrt{\frac{2}{\pi}} \left[\frac{n^2 \pi}{n^2 \pi + S^2}\right] \left[\frac{S}{\left(\frac{1}{2} \sum_{P \le x} \frac{\log P}{P - 1} - C - \theta(1)\right)^2 + S^2}\right] \left[4x^{1/4}\right]_1^{b \le \infty}$$

Looking closely at the bound of the Integrand in (11),b must be equal to x in the RHS. Thus, we have;

$$\frac{1}{2} - \left(t^2 + \frac{1}{4}\right) \left[\sum_{n \ge 1}^{\infty} \sqrt{\frac{2}{\pi}} \left[\frac{n^2 \pi}{n^2 \pi + S^2}\right] \left[\frac{S}{\left(\frac{1}{2} \sum_{P \le x} \frac{\log P}{P - 1} - C - \theta(1)\right)^2 + S^2}\right] \left[4b^{1/4} - 4\right]$$

Since b = x, equation (12) gives;

$$\varepsilon(t) = \frac{1}{2} - \left(t^2 + \frac{1}{4}\right) \left[\sum_{n \ge 1}^{\infty} \sqrt{\frac{2}{\pi}} \left[\frac{n^2 \pi}{n^2 \pi + S^2} \right] \right] \left[\frac{S}{\left(\frac{1}{2} \sum_{P \le x} \frac{\log P}{P - 1} - c - \theta(1)\right)^2 + S^2} \right] \left[4x^{1/4} - 4 \right] (13)$$

For $\varepsilon(t) = 0$, it implies that;

$$\frac{1}{2} = \left(t^2 + \frac{1}{4}\right) \left[4x^{1/4} \sum_{n\geq 1}^{\infty} \sqrt{\frac{2}{\pi}} \left[\frac{n^2 \pi}{n^2 \pi + S^2}\right] \left[\frac{S}{\left(\frac{1}{2} \sum_{P \leq x} \frac{\log P}{P - 1} - C - \theta(1)\right)^2 + S^2}\right] - 4 \sum_{n\geq 1}^{\infty} \sqrt{\frac{2}{\pi}} \left[\frac{n^2 \pi}{n^2 \pi + S^2}\right] \left[\frac{S}{\left(\frac{1}{2} \sum_{P \leq x} \frac{\log P}{P - 1} - C - \theta(1)\right)^2 + S^2}\right] \right]$$

$$\frac{1}{2} = \left(\frac{4t^2 + 1}{4}\right) \left[4x^{1/4} \sum_{n\geq 1}^{\infty} \sqrt{\frac{2}{\pi}} \left[\frac{n^2 \pi}{n^2 \pi + S^2}\right] \left[\frac{S}{\left(\frac{1}{2} \sum_{P \leq x} \frac{\log P}{P - 1} - C - \theta(1)\right)^2 + S^2}\right] - 4 \sum_{n\geq 1}^{\infty} \sqrt{\frac{2}{\pi}} \left[\frac{n^2 \pi}{n^2 \pi + S^2}\right] \left[\frac{S}{\left(\frac{1}{2} \sum_{P \leq x} \frac{\log P}{P - 1} - C - \theta(1)\right)^2 + S^2}\right]$$

This results to:

On further simplification

We can see that (20) is the same as:

Making t^2 the subject of (21), we obtain:

$$\frac{\left[(4x^{1/4} - 4) \left(\sum_{n \ge 1}^{\infty} \sqrt{\frac{2}{\pi}} \left[\frac{n^2 \pi}{n^2 \pi + S^2} \right] \left[\frac{S}{\left(\frac{1}{2} \sum_{P \le x} \frac{\log P}{P - 1} - c - \theta(1) \right)^2 + S^2} \right] \right) \right]^{-1}}{2} - \frac{1}{4} = t^2 \quad (22)$$

and

One can now determine the general expression for t, the root of $\varepsilon(t)$ from (26) such that:

The author in his work [15] obtained a general formula for the zeros of the analytic continuation formula of the Riemann Zeta Function as:

On further Simplification, we obtain:
