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CERME O Collaborative design context

- The collaborative design took place in the European project MC Squared (<u>http://mc2-project.eu/</u>)
 - Development of a new digital socio-technical environment
 → C-book technology
 - Study of the design process in four communities of interest (Col) (Fischer, 2001) and production of new digital resources → c-books
 - Promoting the **Creative Mathematical Thinking** (CMT) in c-book users.
- Re-design of the c-book, called "Limits", through the crosscollaboration of the French and Spanish Cols.

Theoretical and methodological background

Networking of two theoretical frameworks

- Documental Approach (DA) (Gueudet & Trouche, 2009) and,
- Boundary Crossing approach (BC) (Akkerman & Bakker, 2011).

Methodology

The design process is seen as a documentational genesis (DA)

- resources (Adler, 2000) which sustained or hindered the design process and,
- resource versions (c-book versions) in order to highlight what happens between two versions.

The design took place in two cultural contexts, two worlds (BC)

- Boundary object (ideas, c-book versions, widgets, CMT grid, creative ideas score), and
- Mechanisms:
 - Identification: awareness of two cultural contexts allows to point out differences,
 - **Coordination**: de-contextualization and re-contextualization of the resource eased by the proximity of the cultures,
 - *Reflection*: perspective making and taking in relation with the communication workspace,
 - *Transformation*: pointing out differences, similarities within the c-book versions.

Factors orienting the collaborative design

Theoretical

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- representation of CMT based on fluency, flexibility, originality and elaboration (Torrance, 1968)
- Creativity, "Middle c" perspective (Moran, 2010) and social creativity operational definition (Daskolia, 2015).
- Conceptual tools:
 - The CMT grid
 - The rating system in ColCode
- Technical context:
 - The collaborative workspace for communication: ColCode
 - Technical familiarity with the authoring environment and its widget factories
- Culture
 - Didactical traditions: French and Spanish
 - Designers' background and expertise



CERME Conclusion and perspectives on cross-Col collaborative task design

- The proximity of collaborating cultures is necessary to allow understanding through building of new norms and of a common language.
- The background of the designers impacts their attitude towards the tools, their CMT representations, their position in the collaborative decision making and the widgets they use.
- The designers' cultures evolved from the cross-collaboration.
- Different cultures enable to enrich the scope of the designed tasks.
- Tools and cultures shape the design process.

- The main focus of our research is the collaborative design of a new kind of digital educational resources, the c-book units, where:
 - Designers of different background, expertise and interests, who constitutes the so-called
 Communities of Interest (Col, Fisher 2001) jointly design c-books aiming to foster Creative
 Mathematical Thinking (CMT) to the final users,
 - The **process of task design** as well as the **affordances of the product itself** is on the focus of the research to identify their characteristics and their potential for the teaching and learning of mathematics.
