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SEMI-ANALYTICAL MODEL FOR COATED CONTACTS. FRETTING WEAR SIMULATION

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ABSTRACT

This paper presents a fast and robust contact model based on semi-analytical method that is employed for the simulation of wear. This model takes into account the effect of cyclic wear induced from fretting solicitations under gross slip conditions.

INTRODUCTION

The blade/disk interface is one of the most critical contacts for fretting problem. In order to protect engine components from fretting, blade/disk contact surfaces are usually covered by a thick and soft coating. Important researches have been carried out in order to understand and quantify the damage in this contact. Many formalisms have been proposed for quantitative approach of wear. More than 300 have been identified by Meng and Ludema [1] in 1995, resting on different applications [2,3]. This research is based on previous works [4,5] developed at LaMCoS. An energy theory of wear, inspired by the Archard's theory [6], is selected as it is very simple to implement. The objective is to perform wear prediction using semi analytical computational methods.

FRETTING WEAR

Methodology to Predict Wear

Several successive steps are solved:

- Contact solution between the two bodies, with contact pressure distribution versus discretization points and contact area as outputs,
- Computation of the frictional dissipated energy density. E_d at each point, corresponding to the product of the tangential stress with the sliding distance.

 Quantification of the wear depth Δh for one cycle, calculated at each point according to an appropriate wear law

$$\Delta h = f(E_d) = \alpha.S. \sum_{N} \delta_0(N) E_d(N)$$

• Determination of the wear cycle increment ΔN, obtained from the relation between the maximum value of the wear depth to be removed at each iteration and the maximum increment of wear depth.

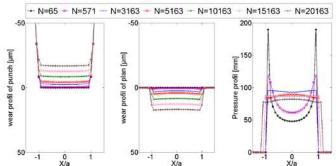
• Updating of the worn geometry. The value of Δh is then multiplied by the wear cycle increment ΔN , and the geometry is updated before next contact solution and wear calculation.

$$h_N = \Delta N * \Delta h_N$$

Results

Figure 1 presents the evolution of wear in terms of contact pressure and wear profile history, for a rectangular flat punch rubbing against a flat surface.
