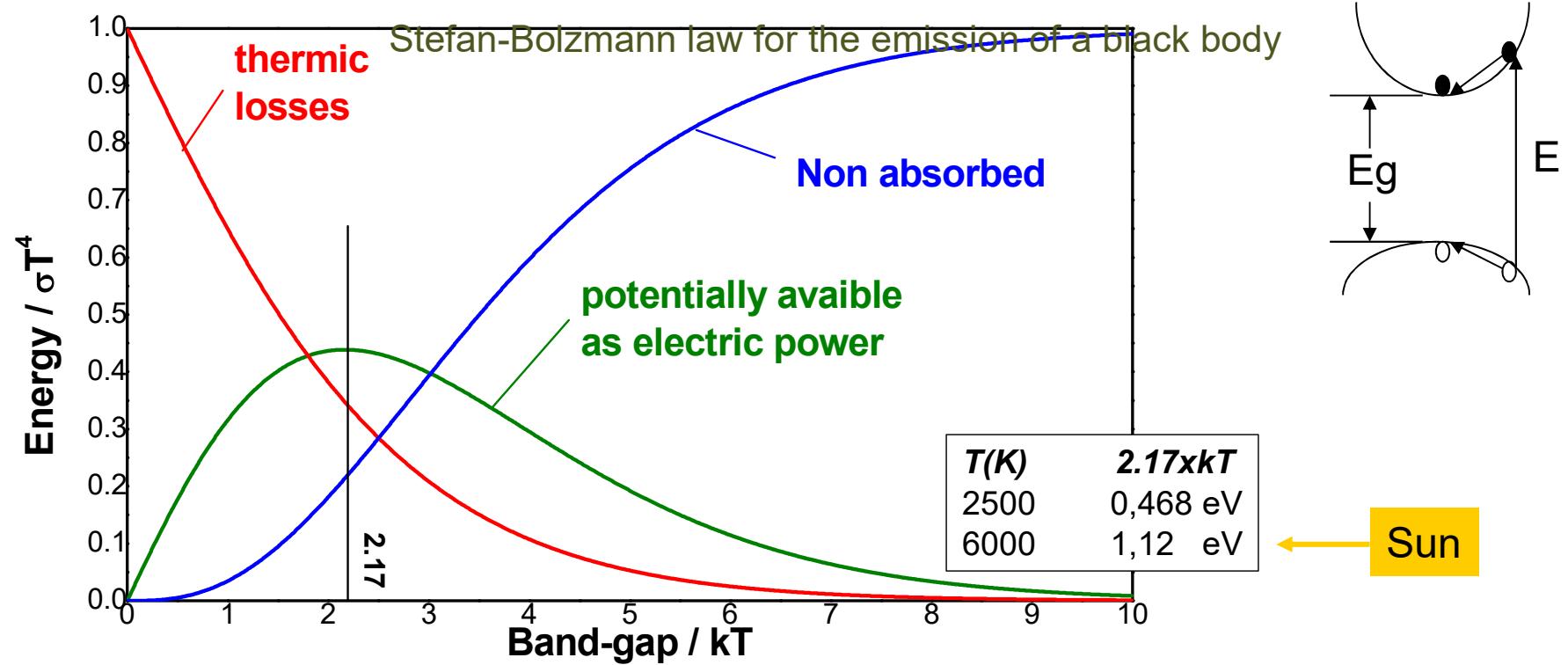

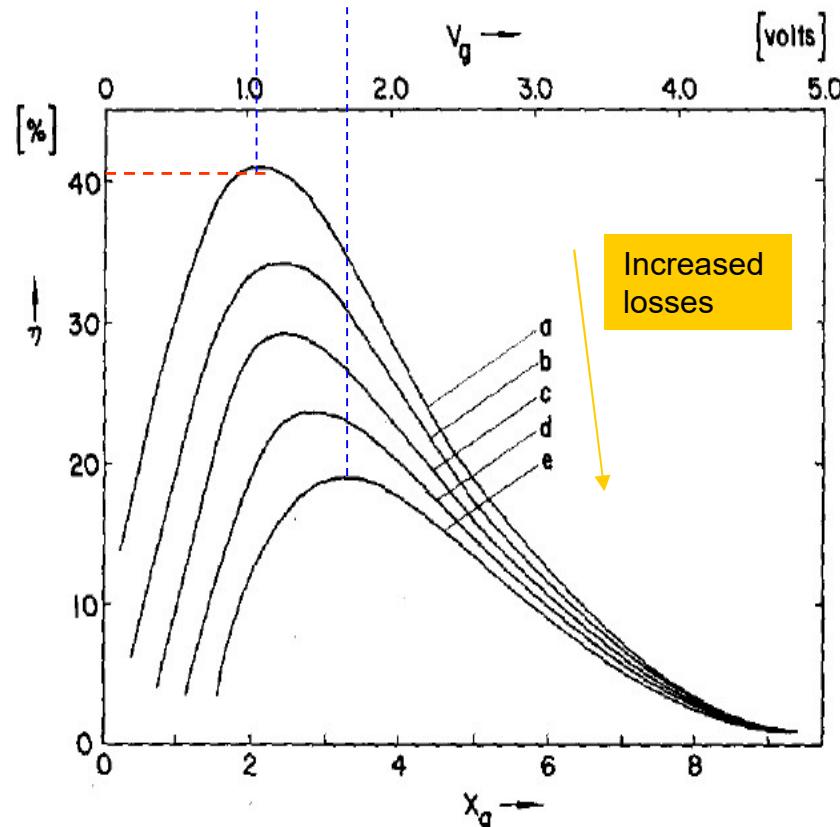


FIG. 5. Efficiency η for a blackbody solar cell at $T_c = 300^\circ\text{K}$, with sun at $T_s = 6000^\circ\text{C}$, as a function of energy gap for different values of the parameter f : curve (a) $f = 1$; (b) $f = 10^{-3}$; (c) $f = 10^{-6}$; (d) $f = 10^{-9}$; (e) $f = 10^{-12}$.

Assumptions of the model

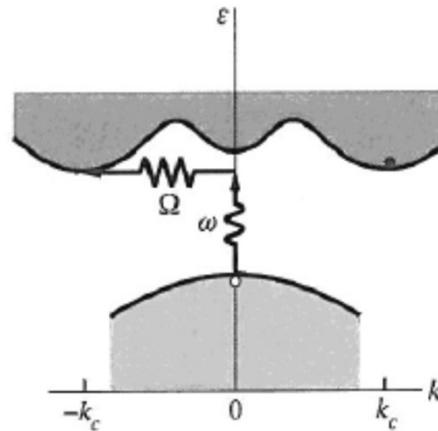
≈ Goals to reach

- all the incident photons go into the material
- choice of the semiconductor
Optimal band gap
- good separation/collection
of photo-created pairs
(no loss by recombination)

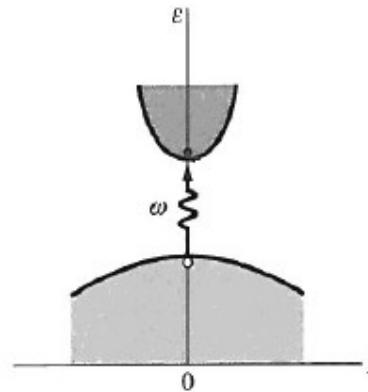
Motivation: Why these new alloys for photovoltaic conversion

direct bandgap semiconductors

- Most of the cells made of Si
→ other interesting materials



$$\alpha \approx 1 \text{ cm}^{-1} \text{ at } E_g$$



$$\alpha \approx 8\,000 \text{ cm}^{-1} \text{ at } E_g$$

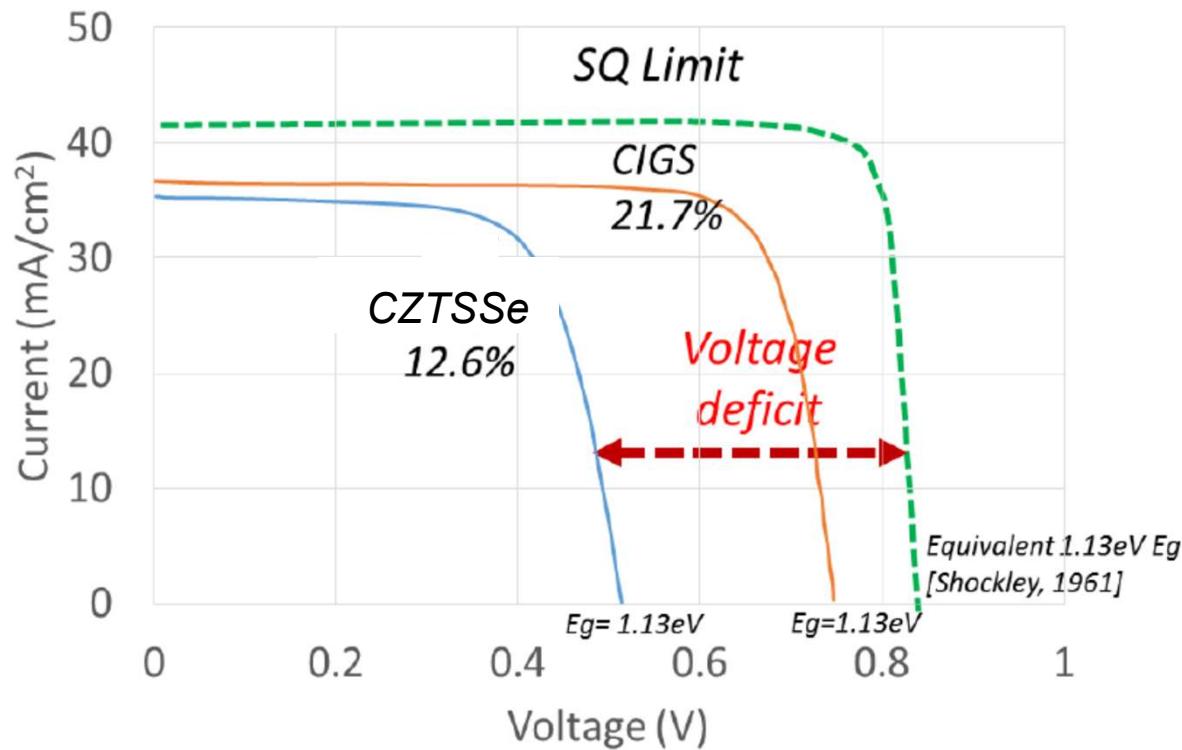

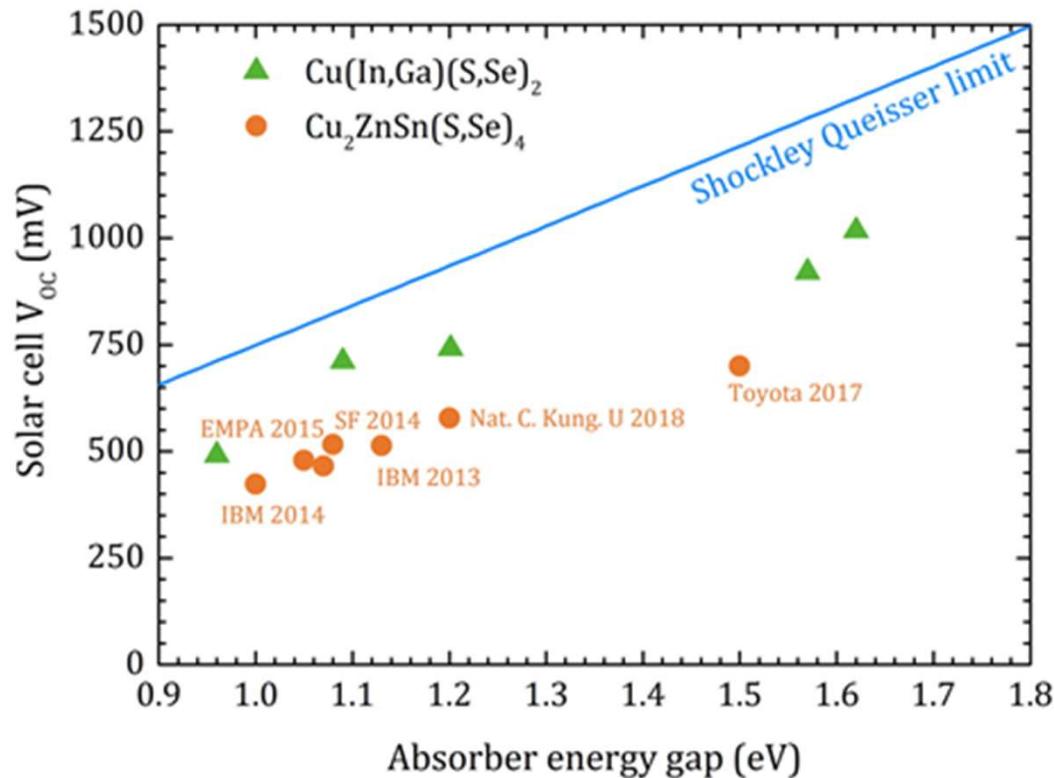

State of the art : The limits of these alloys: potential fluctuations

- deficit of V_{OC} in CZTSSe compared to CIGSSe



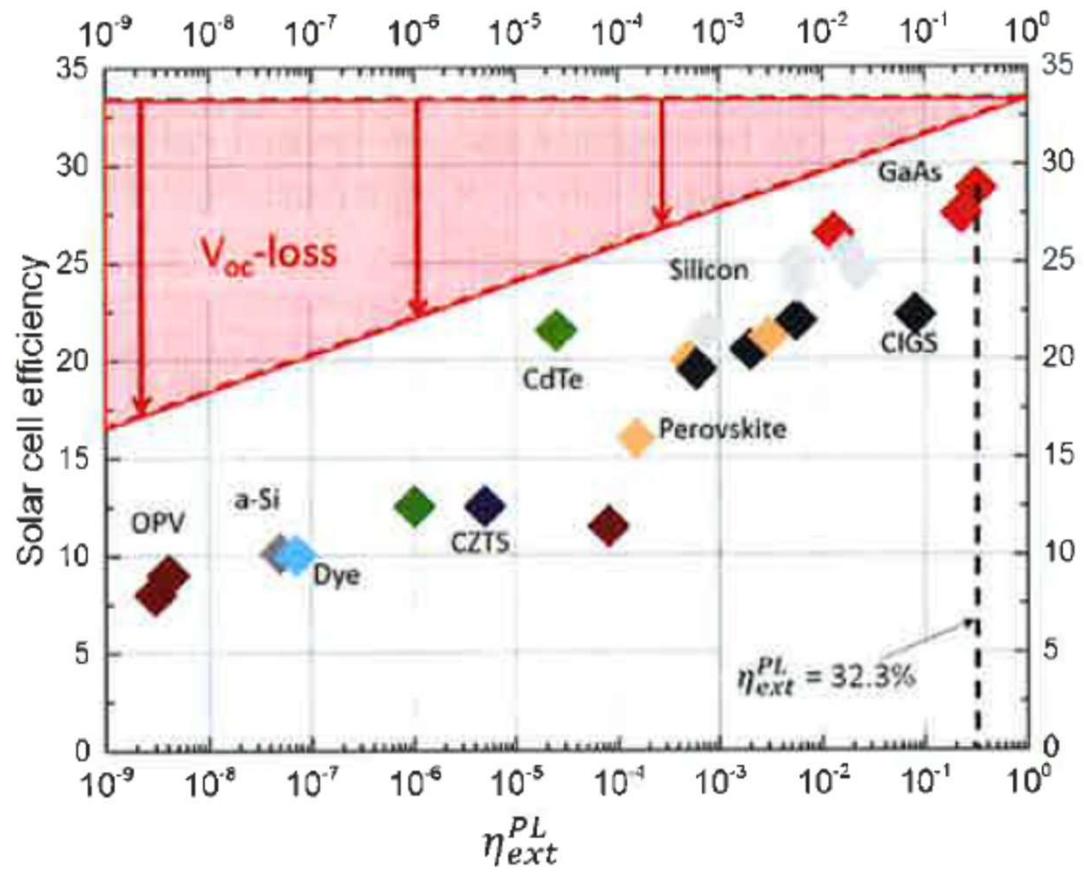
- deficit also of the field factor: FF 60% instead of 75%
- also strong series resistance at low T => freeze-out effect

- Strong limitation of V_{OC} related to severe band tailing ?

State of the art : The limits of these alloys: potential fluctuations

$$V_{oc} = V_{oc}^{rad} - \left| \frac{kT}{q} \ln(\eta_{ext}^{PL}) \right|$$

$$\eta_{ext}^{PL} = \frac{\tau_{rad}^{-1}}{\tau_{rad}^{-1} + \tau_{nrad}^{-1}} \overline{P_{esc}}.$$

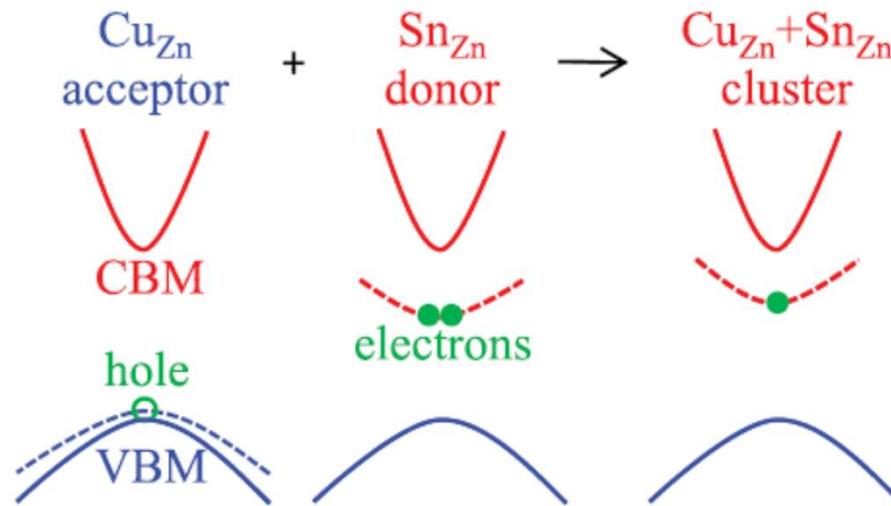


Optimization of V_{oc}

- Optimum bandgap
- 100% internal radiative efficiency
- High Light extraction efficiency

State of the art : The limits of these alloys: potential fluctuations

- Cu_{Zn} antisite has the lowest formation energy
(by contrast with CIGS for which it is V_{Cu} vacancy)
- low formation energy for defect cluster such as the pair
 $(\text{Cu}_{\text{Zn}} + \text{Sn}_{\text{Zn}})$ and the triplet $(2\text{Cu}_{\text{Zn}} + \text{Sn}_{\text{Zn}})$

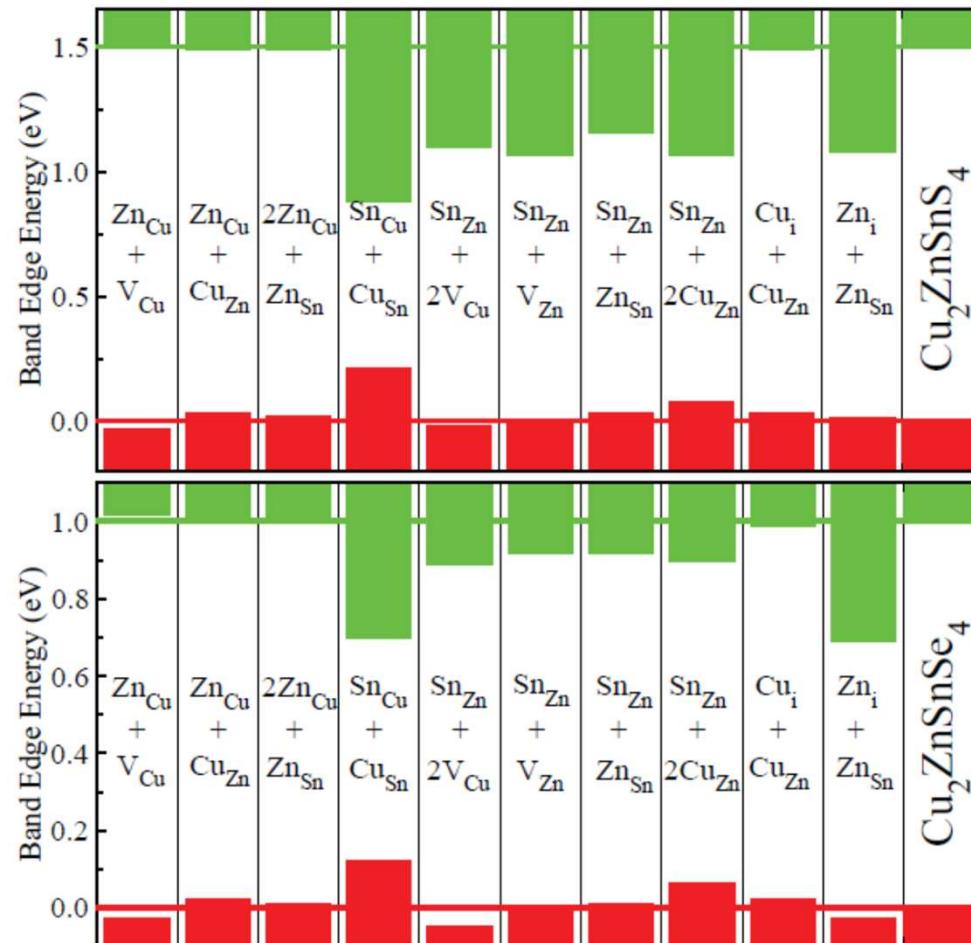


$(\text{Cu}_{\text{Zn}} + \text{Sn}_{\text{Zn}}) \Rightarrow$ deep donor level in the bandgap

$(2\text{Cu}_{\text{Zn}} + \text{Sn}_{\text{Zn}}) \Rightarrow$ decrease the gap by about 200 meV

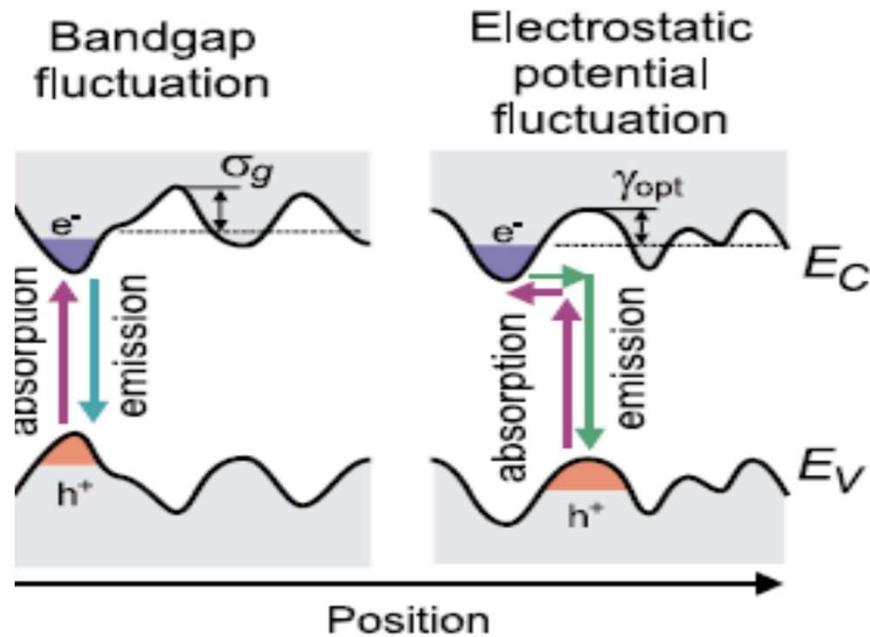
State of the art : The limits of these alloys: potential fluctuations

Calculated energy band shifts caused by different defect clusters induced by cation disorder



State of the art : The limits of these alloys: potential fluctuations

Strong limitation related to severe band tailing ?



in our work, in order to avoid the bandgap fluctuations, study of either $\text{Cu}_2\text{ZnSnS}_4$ or $\text{Cu}_2\text{ZnSnSe}_4$ samples

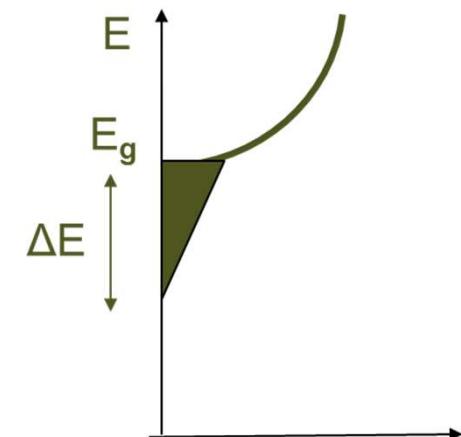

Optical spectroscopy

- Emission properties of CZTS single crystals (population) photoluminescence (PL)
- absorption properties of CZTS (density of states) photoluminescence excitation (PLE)
- Time resolved spectroscopy (energy transfer between localized states, type of recombination).

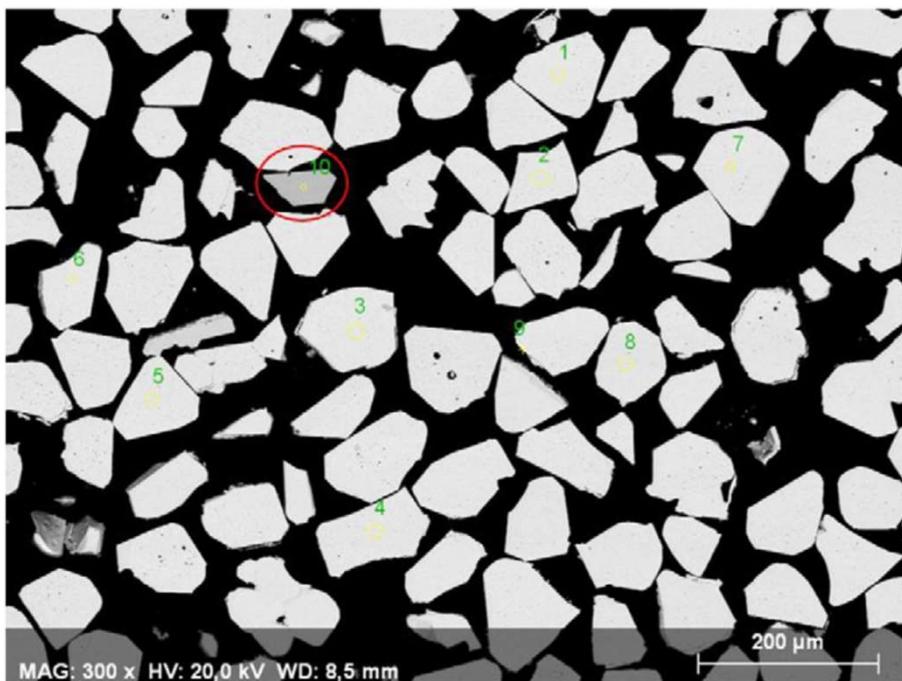
This work: : a better understanding of potential fluctuations

- Evidence of a band-tail of localized states in CZTS
 - Power dependence of the PL emission
 - Energy shift between PL and the PLE (Stokes shift)
 - Time resolved spectroscopy
- Influence of the cation disorder (Cu – Zn) on
 - the band-gap of the alloy
 - the extension of the band tail



The Cu₂ZnSnS₄ samples

Cu₂ZnSnS₄ monograin powder synthesized from elemental and binary precursors in a two step process: sputtering followed by sulfurization (annealing during 1 hour at 1013°K under sulfur atmosphere



single crystals grains of typically 100 μm

Cu-poor and Zn-rich conditions

Formation of Cu₂ZnSnS₄ monograins during the heating process and recrystallization by Oswald ripening.

Various cooling regimes to RT
=> various Cu – Zn disorder

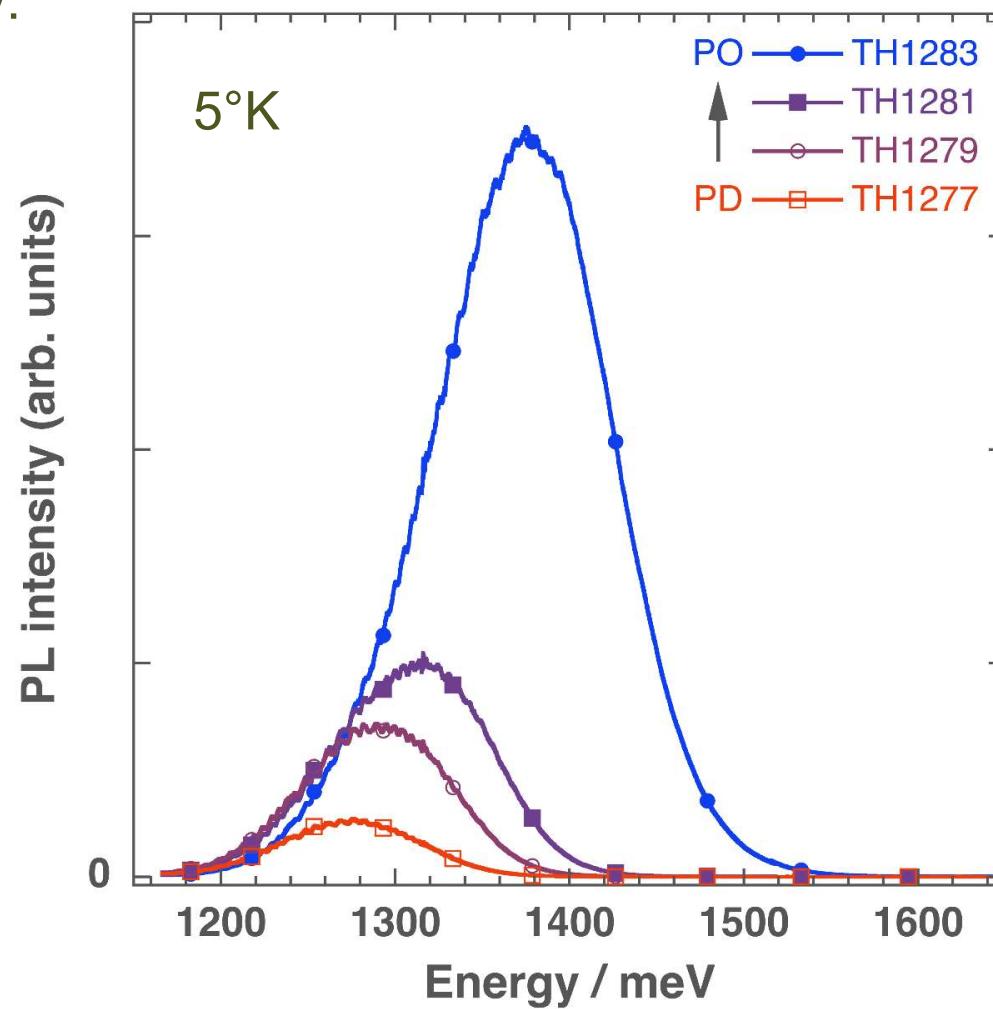
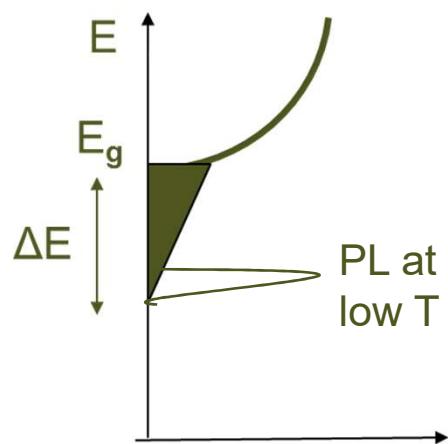

Fastest cooling to freeze the HT thermal equilibrium of lattice defects
=> maximum Cu-Zn disorder

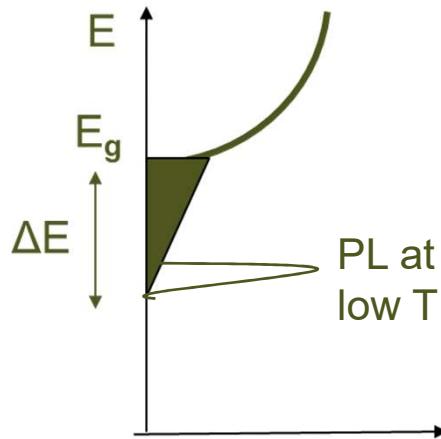

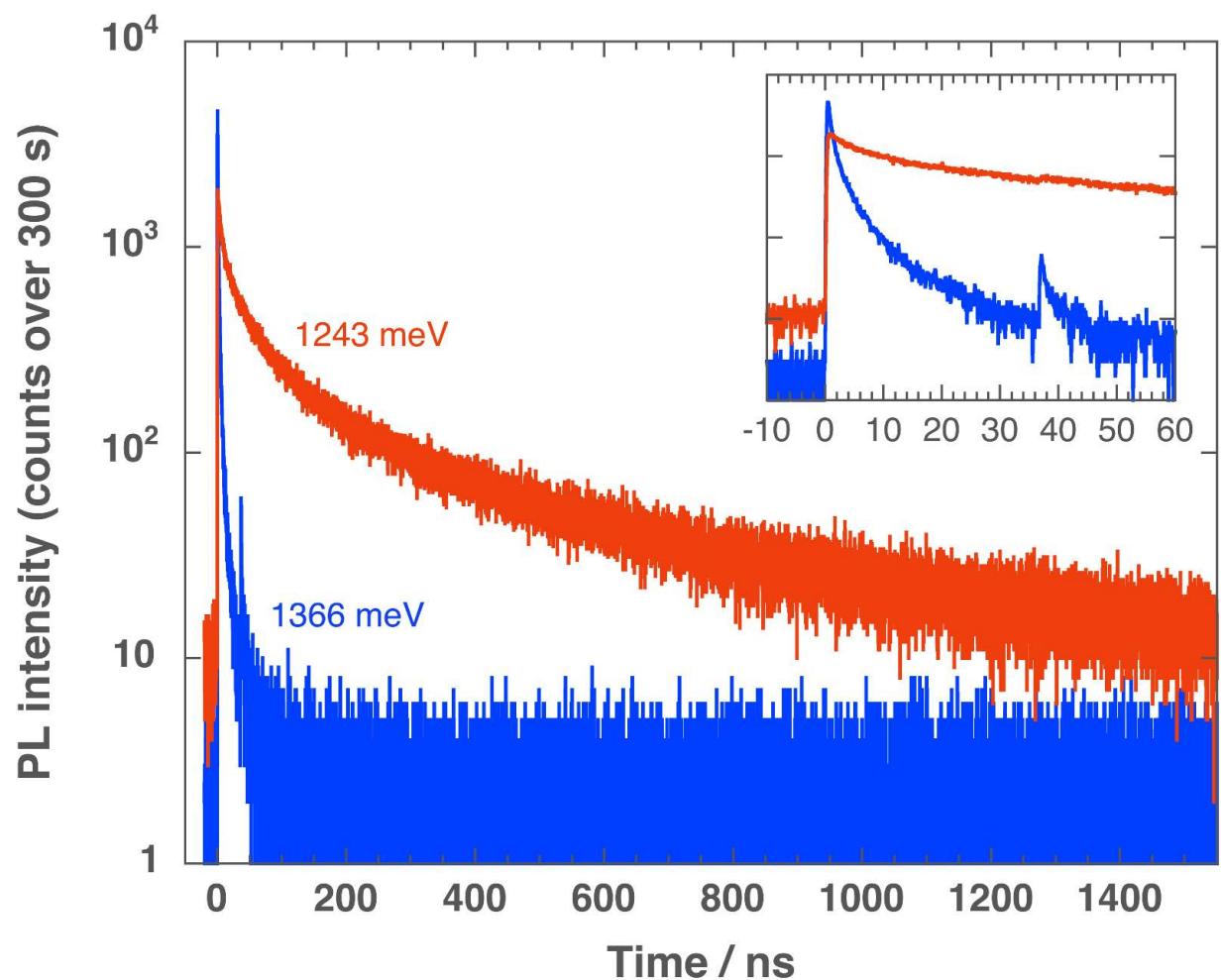

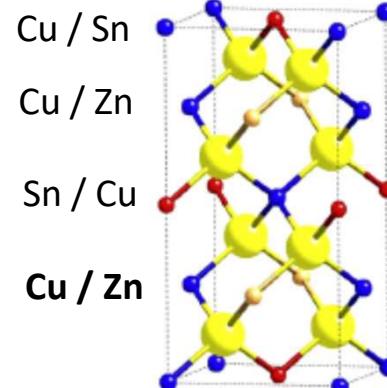

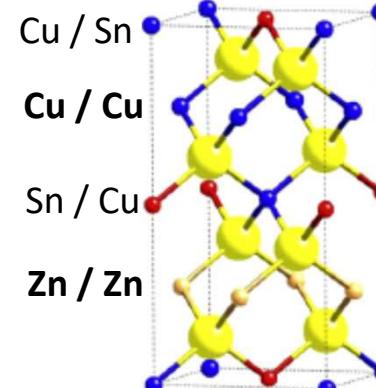
Disordered Kesterite



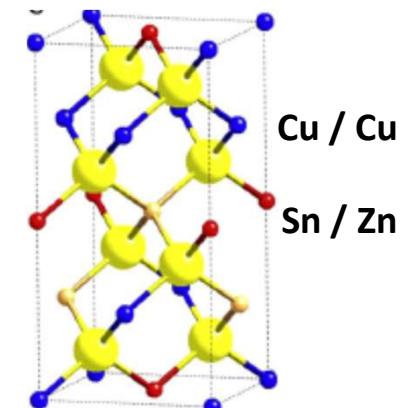
Example of local fluctuations of atomic configurations



Exchange Cu / Zn within the same plane

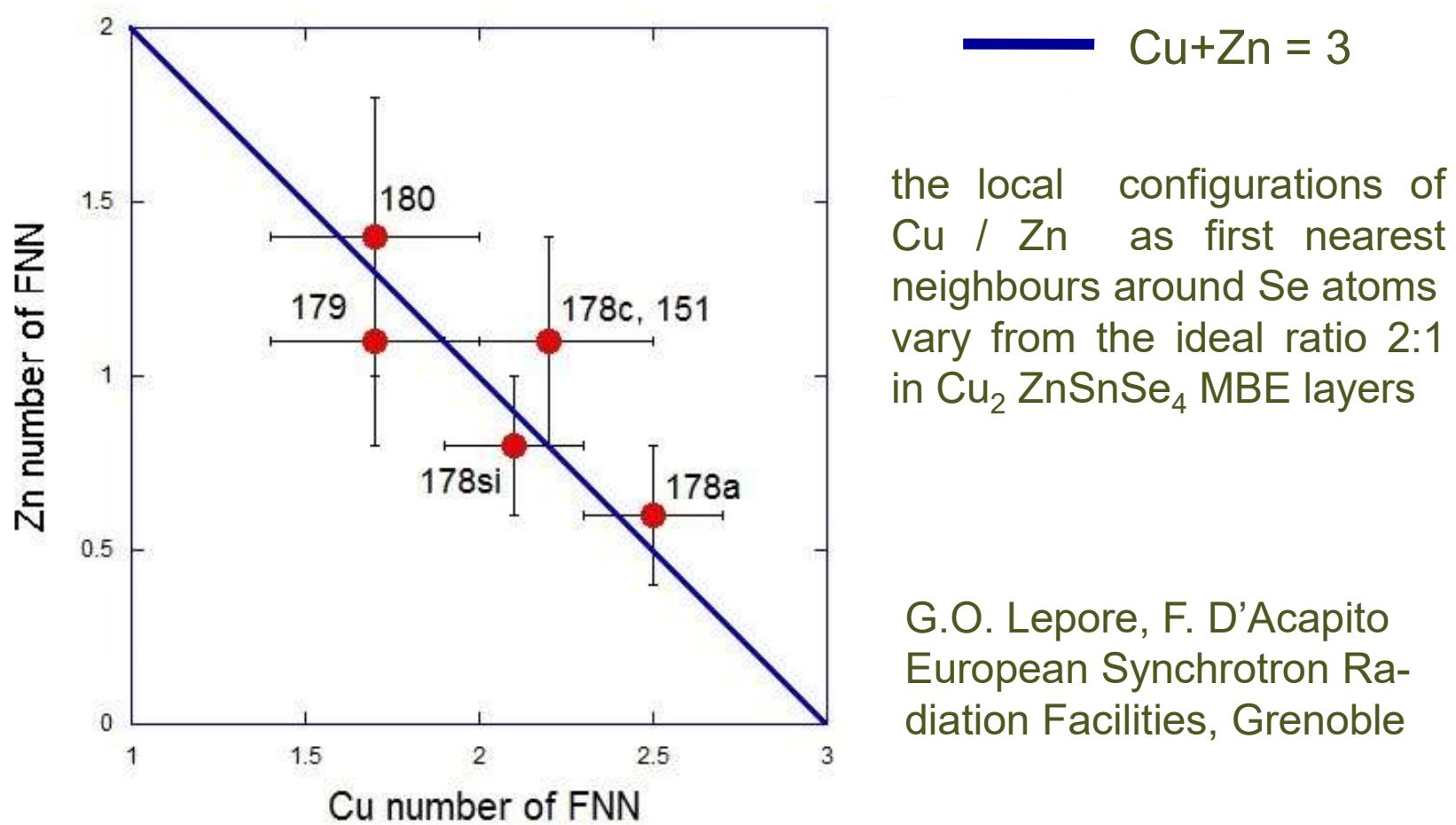


Exchange Cu / Zn between two planes
