- Markers:
 - Act of birth
 - Identity document
 - (Various forms)
- Sex and gender markers
 - Sex markers = biological markers, used in some countries for marriage or access to medically assisted procreation
 - Gender markers = social markers, used for segregated spaces or quota regulation
- Deletion = suppression or optional for all

Refusing it

Flexible procedures should be observed in assigning and reassigning sex/gender in official documents while also providing for the possibility of not choosing a specified male or female gender marker. Member states should consider the proportionality of requiring gender markers in official documents.

Admitting it

• Yogyakarata principles plus 10, 2017, principle 31

States shall:

A. Ensure that official identity documents only include personal information that is relevant, reasonable and necessary as required by the law for a legitimate purpose, and thereby end the registration of the sex and gender of the person in identity documents such as birth certificates, identification cards, passports and driver licences, and as part of their legal personality;

- No specific hard law on this topic
- Could hard law be derived from right to privacy, especially art. 8 EConvHR? Yes!
 - Explanation
 - Application

Explanation

- Sex and gender markers is an attempt to privacy
- Is this attempt valid?
 - Does it follows one of the legitimate aim of article 8? No for most forms
 - Is compulsory sex/gender marker proportionate to the aim of these markers?
 - Interest of the intersex: 2 problems currently
 - Identification problem
 - Risk of discrimination
 - Interest of non intersex: markers allow them to affirm their identity, but they can do so with *optional* markers added after birth
 - Interest of third parties using ID: markers facilitate proof, but such proof is only needed far after birth, and other proof can be used
 - Interest of register and title managers: low cost obstacles for ID and acts of birth; high legal obstacle for passport
- Conclusion: no proportionality for sex/gender marker on act of birth and ID's except passport
