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# A NOTE ON $p$-RATIONAL FIELDS AND THE ABC-CONJECTURE

#### Abstract

In this short note we confirm the relation between the generalized abcconjecture and the p-rationality of number fields. Namely, we prove that given K/ $\mathbb{Q}$ a real quadratic extension or an imaginary dihedral extension of degree 6 , if the generalized $a b c$ conjecture holds in K , then there exist at least $c \log X$ prime numbers $p \leqslant X$ for which K is $p$-rational, here $c$ is some nonzero constant depending on K . The real quadratic case was recently suggested by Böckle-Guiraud-Kalyanswamy-Khare.


## Introduction

Let K be a number field and let $p$ be a prime number. To simplify, we assume $p$ odd. Denote by $\mathrm{K}_{p}$ the maximal pro- $p$-extension of K unramified outside $p$; put $G_{p}:=\operatorname{Gal}\left(\mathrm{K}_{p} / \mathrm{K}\right)$. By class field theory, the pro- $p$ group $\mathrm{G}_{p}$ is finitely generated and one knows, since Koch and Shafarevich, that moreover $\mathrm{G}_{p}$ is finitely presented (meaning that $H^{2}\left(\mathrm{G}_{p}, \mathbb{F}_{p}\right)$ is finite). In fact, $\mathrm{G}_{p}$ may be pro- $p$ free, for example when $\mathrm{K}=\mathbb{Q}$, or when K is an imaginary quadratic field (when $p>3$ ) and $p$ doesn't divide the $p$-class number of K , or when $\mathrm{K}=\mathbb{Q}\left(\zeta_{p}\right)$ for $p$ regular primes, etc.
A number field K for which $\mathrm{G}_{p}$ is pro- $p$ free is called $p$-rational $([\mathbf{2 3}])$. Observe that K is $p$-rational if and only if the Leopoldt conjecture holds for K at $p$ and the torsion $\mathscr{T}_{p}$ of the abelianization $\mathrm{G}_{p}^{a b}$ of $\mathrm{G}_{p}$ is trivial (see [26], or [25, Chapter X, $\left.\S 3\right]$ ).
The study of $\mathscr{T}_{p}$ and of the $p$-rationality started in the beginning of the 80 's with Gras, Nguyen, Movahhedi, Jaulent, and their students. Since the literature is rich: see for example $[\mathbf{2 2}],[\mathbf{2 4}],[\mathbf{1 1}],[\mathbf{1 8}],[\mathbf{2 3}],[19],[29]$, etc. See also [10, Chapitre IV, $\S 3$ and $\S 4]$ for a well-detailed presentation of $\mathscr{T}_{p}$, of the Leopoldt conjecture and of $p$-rational fields. In the spirit of our paper, let us mention here the works of Byeon [4] and AssimBouazzaoui [1] where they showed the infiniteness of 3 and 5 -rational real quadratic fields.

Let us also precise at this level that a recent series of papers in different topics in number theory showed the interest of $p$-rational fields: Greenberg [13], Böckle-Guiraud-Kalyanswamy-Khare [3], David-Pries [5], Hajir-Maire [14], Hajir-MaireRamakrishna [15], etc.
Assuming Leopoldt conjecture (for K at $p$ ), the $p$-rationality of K is therefore equivalent to the nullity of $\mathscr{T}_{p}$. Observe that $\mathscr{T}_{p} \simeq H^{2}\left(\mathrm{G}_{p}, \mathbb{Z}_{p}\right)^{*}$ for a cohomological point of view (see $[27])$. When the $p$-Sylow of the class group of K is trivial, the quantity $\mathscr{T}_{p}$ is isomorphic to the torsion of the quotient of the units of the $p$-adic completions $\mathrm{K}_{v}$ of K by the closure of the global units. Moreover, if we assume that no $\mathrm{K}_{v}$ contains the p-roots of the unity (which is always the case when $p>[\mathrm{K}: \mathbb{Q}]+1$ ), then the triviality of $\mathscr{T}_{p}$ is equivalent to the triviality of the normalized p-adic regulator defined by Gras [8, Definition 5.1]. Recently, Gras [6], [7], Pitoun-Varescon [28], Barbulescu-Ray [2] published a series of papers more concentrated on the computations of $\mathscr{T}_{p}$, and on some heuristics. In $[\mathbf{9}$, Conjecture 7.11], Gras proposed the following conjecture:
Conjecture (Gras). - Let K be a number field. Then for large $p$, K is $p$-rational.
This conjecture is in the same spirit of the Wieferich prime numbers problem. Indeed, given an odd prime number $p$, to compute the $p$-valuation of $2^{p-1}-1$ is equivalent to compute the normalized $p$-adic regulator of the 2 -units of $\mathbb{Q}$. In particular, in this case the nontriviality of the normalized $p$-adic regulator is equivalent for $p$ to verify the congruence $2^{p-1} \equiv 1\left(\bmod p^{2}\right)$.
In [30] Silverman showed how the Wieferich prime numbers are related to the abcconjecture. Let us be more precise. Given an integer $\alpha \in \mathbb{Q}^{\times} \backslash\{ \pm 1\}$, Silverman proved that if the $a b c$-conjecture holds then as $X \rightarrow \infty$

$$
\#\left\{\text { prime number } p, p \leqslant X, \alpha^{p-1} \not \equiv 1\left(\bmod p^{2}\right)\right\} \geqslant c \log X,
$$

where $c>0$ is some absolute constant. See also [12].
Observe now that the generalized abc-conjecture has already been used in the context of Iwasawa theory. Indeed in [16] Ichimura gave a relationship between the Greenberg conjecture and the abc-conjecture. A consequence of his work is that, for example, for any quadratic real field K if the generalized $a b c$-conjecture holds in K , then the set of primes $p$ for which K is $p$-rational is infinite.

The main idea of our work is to precise the quantity of such primes $p$, greatly inspired by the computations of Silverman.
Our result involves the isotypic subspaces $\mathscr{T}_{p}^{\chi}$ of $\mathscr{T}_{p}$. Let us observe here that the authors studied previously in [20] such cutting and the arithmetic consequences of the nullity of some $\mathscr{T}_{p}^{\chi}$.

Let $\mathrm{K} / \mathbb{Q}$ be a Galois extension of Galois group $G$. Let us fix an odd prime number $p \nmid \# \mathrm{G}$. For an irreducible $\mathbb{Q}_{p}$-character $\psi$ of G , let $r_{\psi}\left(E_{\mathrm{K}}\right)$ be the $\psi$-rank of $\mathbb{Q}_{p} \otimes E_{\mathrm{K}}$, where $E_{\mathrm{K}}$ denotes the units of the ring of integers $\mathscr{O}_{\mathrm{K}}$ of K . Let us also cut $\mathscr{T}_{p}$ by its isotypic subspaces $\mathscr{T}_{p}^{\psi}$, and denote by $r_{\psi}\left(\mathscr{T}_{p}\right)$ the $\psi$-rank of $\mathscr{T}_{p}$. Observe that, assuming Leopoldt conjecture, the number field K is $p$-rational if and only if $r_{\psi}\left(\mathscr{T}_{p}\right)=0$ for all irreducible $\mathbb{Q}_{p}$-characters $\psi$. Moreover we will see that for $p \gg 0, r_{\psi}\left(\mathscr{T}_{p}\right) \leqslant r_{\psi}\left(E_{\mathrm{K}}\right)$ for all $\psi$. Here we prove:

Theorem A. - Let $\mathrm{K} / \mathbb{Q}$ be a Galois extension of Galois group G and let $\chi$ be an irreducible $\mathbb{Q}$-character of G that appears in $\mathbb{Q} \otimes E_{\mathrm{K}}$. If the generalized abc-conjecture holds for K , then as $X \rightarrow \infty$
$\#\left\{\right.$ prime number $p \leqslant X, r_{\psi}\left(\mathscr{T}_{p}\right)<r_{\psi}\left(E_{\mathrm{K}}\right)$ for some irred. $\mathbb{Q}_{p}-$ char. $\left.\psi \mid \chi\right\} \geqslant c \log X$, for some constant $c>0$ depending on K .
(Of course, in Theorem A one considers only prime numbers $p \nmid \# G$.) As consequence we obtain the following result (the real quadratic case was suggested in [3]):

Corollary. - Let $\mathrm{K} / \mathbb{Q}$ be a real quadratic field or an imaginary dihedral extension of degree 6. If the generalized abc-conjecture holds for K , then as $X \rightarrow \infty$
$\#\{$ prime number $p \leqslant X, \mathrm{~K}$ is $p$-rational $\} \geqslant c \log X$,
for some constant $c>0$ depending on K .
Remark. - It is well known that Leopoldt conjecture holds in the situations of Corollary, but we don't assume Leopoldt conjecture in Theorem A.

Our work contains two sections. In the first one, we introduce the objects we need. In the second section, we give the proofs of our results.

## 1. The objects

We start with a Galois extension $\mathrm{K} / \mathbb{Q}$ of degree $m$ and Galois group G . We denote by N the norm in $\mathrm{K} / \mathbb{Q}$. Let $\mathscr{O}_{\mathrm{K}}$ be the ring of integers of $\mathrm{K}, E_{\mathrm{K}}$ be the units of $\mathscr{O}_{\mathrm{K}}$, and $\mu_{\mathrm{K}}$ be the group of the roots of the unity of K.

Let $p$ be an odd prime number. In all that will follow, we suppose that:
(i) $p \nmid \# \mathrm{G}$,
(ii) $p$ is unramified in $\mathrm{K} / \mathbb{Q}$,
(iii) $p$ does not divide the class number $h_{\mathrm{K}}$ of K .

One excludes this way only a finite set of prime numbers $p$. In particular, there exists an explicit prime number $p_{0}$ such that every $p>p_{0}$ satisfies (i), (ii) and (iii).

## 1.1. $p$-rational fields and isotypic components. -

1.1.1. Let $S_{p}$ be the set of places of K above $p$. For $v \in S_{p}$, denote by $\mathrm{K}_{v}$ the completion of K at $v$, by $\mathscr{U}_{v}$ the units of the ring of integers $\mathscr{O}_{v}$ of $\mathrm{K}_{v}$, and by $\pi_{v}$ an uniformizer of $\mathrm{K}_{v}$. Then the $p$-completion $\mathscr{E}_{\mathrm{K}}:=\mathbb{Z}_{p} \otimes E_{K}$ of $E_{\mathrm{K}}$ embeds diagonally, via $\iota$, in $\mathscr{U}_{p}:=\prod_{v \in S_{p}} \mathscr{U}_{v}^{1}$, where $\mathscr{U}_{v}^{1}:=1+\pi_{v} \mathscr{O}_{v}$ is the group of principal units of $\mathrm{K}_{v}$. Observe that here $\mathscr{U}_{p} \simeq \mathbb{Z}_{p}^{m}$. By $p$-adic class field theory (and due to the fact that $p \nmid h_{\mathrm{K}}$ ), the group $\mathrm{G}_{p}^{a b}$ is isomorphic to $\mathscr{U}_{p} / \iota\left(\mathscr{E}_{\mathrm{K}}\right)$. Then, assuming Leopoldt conjecture for K at $p$ (meaning here that $\iota$ is injective), the number field K is $p$-rational if and only if $\mathscr{U}_{p} / \iota\left(\mathscr{E}_{\mathrm{K}}\right)$ is without torsion.
1.1.2. Observe that as $p$ is unramified in $\mathrm{K} / \mathbb{Q}$, we also get that $p \nmid\left|\mu_{\mathrm{K}}\right|$, and as $p \nmid \# \mathrm{G}$, the character (as G-module) of $\mathscr{E}_{\mathrm{K}}$ is equal to the character of $\mathbb{Q}_{p} \otimes\left(\mathbb{Q} \otimes E_{\mathrm{K}}\right) \simeq \operatorname{Ind}_{D_{\infty}}^{\mathrm{G}} \mathbb{1}$, where $D_{\infty}$ is the decomposition group of an archimedean place in $K / \mathbb{Q}$ and where $\mathbb{1}$ is the trivial character. In particular, $\mathscr{E}_{\mathrm{K}}$ is a submodule of the regular representation.
To be complete, $\mathscr{U}_{p}$ is isomorphic to the regular representation (here $\mathscr{U}_{v}$ has no nontrivial root of unity).
1.1.3. Let us fix an irreducible $\mathbb{Q}$-character $\chi$ of G . Let $\mathbb{Q}[\mathrm{G}] e_{\chi} \simeq \mathrm{M}_{n_{\chi}}(D)$ be the simple algebra of $\mathbb{Q}[G]$ associated to $\chi$, where $D$ is a skew field of degree $s_{\chi}^{2}$ over its center (the integer $s_{\chi}$ is the Schur index of $\chi$ ). Then $\chi=s_{\chi} \sum_{\psi \mid \chi} \psi$, where the sum is taken over irreducible $\mathbb{Q}_{p}$-characters $\psi$ dividing $\chi$ (here $\left.p \nmid \# \mathrm{G}\right)$.
Let $E_{\mathrm{K}}^{\chi}$ be the $\chi$-component of the $\mathbb{Q}[\mathrm{G}]$-module $\mathbb{Q} \otimes E_{\mathrm{K}}$, then the character of $E_{\mathrm{K}}^{\chi}$ is written as $t_{\chi} \chi$ for some $t_{\chi} \in\left\{0, \cdots, n_{\chi}\right\}$. Given an irreducible $\mathbb{Q}_{p}$-character $\psi \mid \chi$, the integer $s_{\chi} t_{\chi}$ is then the $\psi$-rank $r_{\psi}\left(E_{\mathrm{K}}\right)$ of $\mathbb{Q}_{p} \otimes E_{\mathrm{K}}$.
If $M$ is a $\mathbb{Z}_{p}[\mathrm{G}]$-module of finite type, the $\psi$-rank $r_{\psi}(M)$ of $M$ is defined as $r_{\psi}(M):=\frac{1}{\operatorname{deg}(\psi)} \operatorname{dim}_{\mathbb{F}_{p}}\left(M^{\psi} /\left(M^{\psi}\right)^{p}\right)$.
As seen before $r_{\psi}\left(E_{\mathrm{K}}\right)=r_{\psi}\left(\mathscr{E}_{\mathrm{K}}\right)$, obviously $r_{\psi}\left(\mathscr{E}_{\mathrm{K}}\right) \geqslant r_{\psi}\left(\iota\left(\mathscr{E}_{\mathrm{K}}\right)\right)$, and Leopoldt conjecture is equivalent to the equality $r_{\psi}\left(\mathscr{E}_{\mathrm{K}}\right)=r_{\psi}\left(\iota\left(\mathscr{E}_{\mathrm{K}}\right)\right)$ for every $\chi$ and $\psi$. Observe that one knows that $r_{\psi}\left(\iota\left(\mathscr{E}_{\mathrm{K}}\right)\right) \geqslant 1$ when $r_{\psi}\left(\mathscr{E}_{\mathrm{K}}\right) \neq 0($ see $[\mathbf{1 7}])$.
Remark 1.1. - When G is abelian, one has $r_{\psi}\left(\mathscr{E}_{\mathrm{K}}\right) \leqslant 1$.
As seen before, with all the assumptions, the torsion of $\mathscr{U}_{p} / \iota\left(\mathscr{E}_{\mathrm{K}}\right)$ is isomorphic to $\mathscr{T}_{p}$. Thus, $r_{\psi}\left(\mathscr{T}_{p}\right) \leqslant r_{\psi}\left(\mathscr{E}_{\mathrm{K}}\right)$. If for every $\psi \mid \chi$ the $\psi$-rank of $\mathscr{U}_{p} / \iota\left(\mathscr{E}_{\mathrm{K}}\right)$ is maximal, meaning $r_{\psi}\left(\mathscr{T}_{p}\right)=r_{\psi}\left(\mathscr{E}_{\mathrm{K}}\right)$, then necessarily, for every unit $x \in E_{\mathrm{K}}^{\chi}$ such that $x \equiv 1(\bmod \mathfrak{p})$ for all $\mathfrak{p} \mid p$, one must have $x \equiv 1\left(\bmod \mathfrak{p}^{2}\right)$ for all $\mathfrak{p} \mid p$.
Lemma 1.2. - If there exists an unit $u \in E_{\mathrm{K}}^{\chi}$ such that $u \equiv 1\left(\bmod \mathfrak{p}_{0}\right)$ but $u \not \equiv$ $1\left(\bmod \mathfrak{p}_{0}^{2}\right)$ for some $\mathfrak{p}_{0} \mid p$, then $r_{\psi}\left(\mathscr{T}_{p}\right)<r_{\psi}\left(\mathscr{E}_{\mathrm{K}}\right)$ for some $\psi \mid \chi$.

Proof. - Put $x=u^{\mathrm{N}\left(\mathfrak{p}_{0}\right)-1} \in E_{\mathrm{K}}^{\chi}$, where $\mathrm{N}(\mathfrak{p})=\# \mathscr{O}_{\mathrm{K}} / \mathfrak{p}$. Observe that $x \equiv 1(\bmod \mathfrak{p})$ for every $\mathfrak{p} \mid p$ (the extension $\mathrm{K} / \mathbb{Q}$ is Galois) but, easily, one also has $x \not \equiv 1\left(\bmod \mathfrak{p}_{0}^{2}\right)$. We conclude with the small discussion above.
1.2. The generalized $a b c$-conjecture. - See [31]. If $I \subset \mathscr{O}_{\mathrm{K}}$ is an integer ideal, let us denote by $\operatorname{Rad}(I)$ the following ideal:

$$
\operatorname{Rad}(I)=\prod_{\mathfrak{p} \mid I} \mathrm{~N}(\mathfrak{p})
$$

where the product is taken over prime ideal $\mathfrak{p}$ dividing $I$ and where as usual $\mathrm{N}(\mathfrak{p})=$ $\# \mathscr{O}_{K} / \mathfrak{p}$ is the absolute norm of $\mathfrak{p}$.
The generalized $a b c$-conjecture for K states that for any $\varepsilon>0$, there exists a constant $C_{K, \varepsilon}>0$ such that the inequality :

$$
\prod_{v} \max \left\{|a|_{v},|b|_{v},|c|_{v}\right\} \leqslant C_{K, \varepsilon}(\operatorname{Rad}(a b c))^{1+\varepsilon}
$$

holds for all nonzero $a, b, c \in \mathscr{O}_{K}$ verifying $a+b=c,(a, b)=1$, where the product is taken over all absolute values of K and where $|\cdot|_{v}$ denotes the normalized norm of $\mathrm{K}_{v}$ (such that $\prod_{v}|x|_{v}=1$ for all $x \in \mathrm{~K}^{\times}$).

Here we use it in the case where $b=u_{2}$ and $c=u_{1}$ are two distinct units of K and $a=u_{1}-u_{2}$ : for every $\varepsilon>0$, there exists a constant $C_{\mathrm{K}, \varepsilon}$ such that for all $u_{1} \neq u_{2} \in E_{\mathrm{K}}$, one has

$$
\left|\mathrm{N}\left(u_{1}-u_{2}\right)\right| \leqslant C_{\mathrm{K}, \varepsilon} \operatorname{Rad}\left(\left(u_{1}-u_{2}\right)\right)^{1+\varepsilon} .
$$

## 2. Proofs

2.1. As explained in Introduction, some part of the proof the is greatly inspired by [30]. Let $\mathrm{K} / \mathbb{Q}$ be a Galois extension of degree $m$. Consider the number field $\mathrm{L}:=\mathrm{K}(\zeta)$ where $\zeta$ is a primitive $n$ th-root of 1 . The extension $\mathrm{L} / \mathbb{Q}$ is Galois of degree $O(\varphi(n))$.
Let $T_{n}$ be the set of integers $j \in\{1, \cdots, n-1\}$ coprime to $n$. We denote by $\Phi_{n}$ the $n$th cyclotomic polynomial: $\Phi_{n}(u)=\prod_{j \in T_{n}}\left(u-\zeta^{j}\right)$. The polynomial $\Phi_{n}$ is of degree $\varphi(n)$. Thereafter, we will focus on integer $n$ such that $\varphi(n) \geqslant \frac{1}{2} n$. Recall Lemma 6 of [30]:

$$
\#\left\{n \leqslant X, \varphi(n) \geqslant \frac{1}{2} n\right\} \geqslant\left(\frac{6}{\pi^{2}}-\frac{1}{2}\right) X+O(\log X) .
$$

We start with the key lemma extending Lemma 5 of [30].
Lemma 2.1. - Let $u \in E_{\mathrm{K}}, u \notin \mu_{\mathrm{K}}$. Then there exists some $k \in \mathbb{Z}_{>0}$ such that

$$
\left|\mathrm{N}\left(\Phi_{n}\left(u^{k}\right)\right)\right| \geqslant \exp (c n),
$$

for $n$ such that $\varphi(n) \geqslant \frac{1}{2} n$, where $c>0$ is a constant depending on $u$ and $k$.
Proof. - As $u \notin \mu_{\mathrm{K}}$, there exists an embedding $\sigma: \mathrm{K} \hookrightarrow \mathbb{C}$ such that $|\sigma(u)| \geqslant a>1$, for some real $a$. Hence, for $k \in \mathbb{Z}_{>0}$, we get $\left|\sigma\left(u^{k}\right)\right| \geqslant a^{k}$, and then $\left|\sigma\left(u^{k}\right)-\zeta\right| \geqslant a^{k}-1$.
Let us choose an another embedding $\tau$. We want to give some "good" lower bound for $\left|\tau\left(u^{k}\right)-\zeta^{j}\right|$.

- If $|\tau(u)|<1$, then clearly for sufficiently large $k$, we get

$$
\left|\tau\left(u^{k}\right)-\tau\left(\zeta^{j}\right)\right| \geqslant 1-\left|\tau\left(u^{k}\right)\right| \geqslant \frac{1}{2} .
$$

- If $|\tau(u)|>1$, for sufficiently large $k$, we get $\left|\tau\left(u^{k}\right)-\zeta^{j}\right| \geqslant 1$.
- The question is a little more serious when $|\tau(u)|=1$. Let $k \in \mathbb{Z}_{\geqslant 1}$ be sufficiently large (respecting the two previous cases). Suppose that $\tau\left(u^{k}\right)$ is between $\zeta^{n_{0}}$ and $\zeta^{n_{0}+1}$ over the unit circle, $n_{0} \in\{0, \cdots, n-1\}$. Then observe that $\left|\tau\left(u^{k}\right)-\zeta^{n_{0}+i}\right| \geqslant 1$ when $5 n / 6 \geqslant i \geqslant n / 6+1$. For $i \in[1, n / 6]$, we get

$$
\left|\tau\left(u^{k}\right)-\zeta^{n_{0}+1+i}\right| \geqslant\left|\zeta^{n_{0}+1}-\zeta^{n_{0}+1+i}\right|=2 \sin (i \pi / n) \geqslant \frac{i \pi}{n} .
$$

We want to estimate

$$
\prod_{\substack{1 \leqslant i \leqslant n / 6 \\ n_{0}+1+i \in T_{n}}}\left|\tau\left(u^{k}\right)-\zeta^{n_{0}+1+i}\right|
$$

But for $1 \leqslant i \leqslant n / 6$, the quotients $\frac{i \pi}{n}$ are smaller than 1 , so we get

$$
\prod_{\substack{1 \leqslant i \leqslant n / 6 \\ n_{0}+1+i \in T_{n}}}\left|\tau\left(u^{k}\right)-\zeta^{n_{0}+1+i}\right| \geqslant \prod_{i=1}^{n / 6} \frac{i \pi}{n} \geqslant \lambda_{1}^{n}
$$

for some $\lambda_{1}<1$. The same holds for $i \in[5 n / 6, n]$ :

$$
\prod_{\substack{5 n / 6 \leqslant i \leqslant n \\ n_{0}+1-i \in T_{n}}}\left|\tau\left(u^{k}\right)-\zeta^{n_{0}+i-1}\right| \geqslant \lambda_{2}^{n},
$$

for some $\lambda_{2}<1$.
To finish we need to estimate $\left|\tau\left(u^{k}\right)-\zeta^{n_{0}+1}\right|$ and $\left|\tau\left(u^{k}\right)-\zeta^{n_{0}}\right|$ if these factors intervene in $\tau\left(\Phi_{n}(u)\right.$ ), namely if $n_{0}$ and $n_{0}+1$ are coprime to $n$. Let us recall now the Liouville inequality (see for example [21]): given $s \in\{1, \cdots, n-1\}$ corpime to $n$, one has:

$$
\left|\tau(u)-\zeta^{s}\right| \geqslant 2^{-m m(s)} M(u)^{-m(s)}
$$

where $M(u)$ is the Mahler measure of the irreducible polynomial of $u$, and where $m(s)=$ $\left[\mathbb{Q}\left(\zeta^{s}\right): \mathbb{Q}\right]$. Hence we get

$$
\left|\tau(u)-\zeta^{s}\right| \geqslant r^{-\varphi(n)}
$$

for some $r \in \mathbb{Z}_{>1}$.
Hence:

$$
\prod_{j \in T_{n}}\left|\tau(u)-\zeta^{j}\right| \geqslant \lambda_{1}^{n} \lambda_{2}^{n} r^{-\varphi(n)}
$$

Consequently for large $k$ and for every $n$ such that $\varphi(n) \geqslant \frac{1}{2} n$ we get

$$
\mathrm{N}\left(\Phi_{n}(u)\right)=\prod_{i=1}^{m} \prod_{j \in T_{n}}\left|\sigma_{i}\left(u^{k}\right)-\zeta^{j}\right| \geqslant \exp (c n)
$$

where the $\sigma_{i}$ 's are the embeddings of K in $\mathbb{C}$ and where $c>0$ is some constant (depending on $u$ and $k$ ).

Suppose now that $u \in E_{\mathrm{K}}, u \notin \mu_{\mathrm{K}}$, is such that

$$
|\mathrm{N}(\Phi(u))| \geqslant \exp (c n)
$$

for every $n$ such that $\varphi(n) \geqslant \frac{1}{2} n$ (which is always possible by Lemma 2.1).
Let us write $\left(u^{n}-1\right)=I_{n} J_{n}$, where if $\mathfrak{p} \mid I_{n}$, then $\mathfrak{p}^{2} \nmid I_{n}$, and if $\mathfrak{p} \mid J_{n}$ then $\mathfrak{p}^{2} \mid J_{n}$. Then, if we write $u^{n}-1+1=u^{n}$, the generalized $a b c$-conjecture implies that

$$
\left|\mathrm{N}\left(u^{n}-1\right)\right|<_{\mathrm{K}, \varepsilon} \operatorname{Rad}\left(I_{n} J_{n}\right)^{1+\varepsilon}<_{\mathrm{K}, \varepsilon}\left(\mathrm{~N}\left(I_{n}\right) \mathrm{N}\left(J_{n}\right)^{1 / 2}\right)^{1+\varepsilon}
$$

Hence, as $\left|\mathrm{N}\left(u^{n}-1\right)\right|=\mathrm{N}\left(I_{n}\right) N\left(J_{n}\right)$, we get

$$
\mathrm{N}\left(J_{n}\right)^{1 / 2}<_{\mathrm{K}, \varepsilon} \mathrm{~N}\left(I_{n}\right)^{\varepsilon} \mathrm{N}\left(J_{n}\right)^{\varepsilon / 2}<_{\mathrm{K}, \varepsilon}\left|\mathrm{~N}\left(u^{n}-1\right)\right|^{\varepsilon},
$$

and then

$$
\mathrm{N}\left(J_{n}\right)<_{\mathrm{K}, \varepsilon}\left|\mathrm{~N}\left(u^{n}-1\right)\right|^{2 \varepsilon} .
$$

Thence one has

$$
\mathrm{N}\left(I_{n}\right)>_{\mathrm{K}, \varepsilon}\left|\mathrm{~N}\left(u^{n}-1\right)\right|^{1-2 \varepsilon},
$$

and by using the fact that $\left|\mathrm{N}\left(u^{n}-1\right)\right| \geqslant\left|\mathrm{N}\left(\Phi_{n}(u)\right)\right|$, we finally obtain:
Proposition 2.2. - If the generalized abc-conjecture holds then for all $\varepsilon>0$, one has

$$
\mathrm{N}\left(I_{n}\right)>_{\mathrm{K}, \varepsilon} \exp (c(1-2 \varepsilon) n),
$$

for every $n$ such that $\varphi(n) \geqslant \frac{1}{2} n$.

Take $\varepsilon<\frac{1}{2}$. Thanks to Proposition 2.2, there exists $n_{0} \in \mathbb{Z}_{>0}$ such that for all $n \geqslant n_{0}$, with $\varphi(n) \geqslant \frac{1}{2} n$, then $\mathrm{N}\left(I_{n}\right)>n^{m}$, where we recall that $m=[\mathrm{K}: \mathbb{Q}]$. Take $n_{0}$ sufficiently large such that one also has $n_{0} \geqslant p_{0}$ (see the beginning of Section1). Then, for each such $n$, we are guarantee of the existence of a prime ideal $\mathfrak{p}_{n} \subset \mathscr{O}_{K}$, dividing $I_{n}$ but not $n$. Let $p_{n} \in \mathbb{Z}$ be the prime number lying under $\mathfrak{p}_{n}$. For $n \geqslant n_{0}$, one then has $p_{n}>n \geqslant n_{0} \geqslant p_{0}$.
Take $\beta>1$ such that $\left|\sigma_{i}(u)\right| \leqslant \beta$ for all $i$. Then

$$
\mathrm{N}\left(\mathfrak{p}_{n}\right) \leqslant\left|\mathrm{N}\left(u^{n}-1\right)\right| \leqslant \prod_{i=1}^{m}\left(\left|\sigma_{i}(u)\right|^{n}+1\right) \leqslant 2^{m}\left(\beta^{m}\right)^{n} .
$$

In conclusion, we obtain:
Proposition 2.3. - Take $u \in E_{\mathrm{K}}$ as before. For each $n \geqslant n_{0}$ such that $\varphi(n) \geqslant \frac{1}{2} n$, there exists a prime ideal $\mathfrak{p}_{n} \subset \mathscr{O}_{\mathrm{K}}$ such that
(i) $u^{n} \equiv 1\left(\bmod \mathfrak{p}_{n}\right)$ and $u^{n} \not \equiv 1\left(\bmod \mathfrak{p}_{n}^{2}\right)$,
(ii) $\mathfrak{p}_{n} \nmid n$,
(iii) $\mathrm{N}\left(\mathfrak{p}_{n}\right) \leqslant \gamma^{n}$, for some $\gamma$ depending only on K (in fact on $u$ ).

By ( $i i$ ) of Proposition 2.3, the polynomial $X^{n}-1$ is separable over $\mathscr{O}_{K} / \mathfrak{p}_{n}$, and then $u$ is exactly of order $n$ in $\left(\mathscr{O}_{\mathrm{K}} / \mathfrak{p}_{n}\right)^{\times}$. It follows that $\mathfrak{p}_{n}=\mathfrak{p}_{n^{\prime}}$ if and only if $n=n^{\prime}$. Observe that a set of primes $\mathfrak{p}_{n}$ of size $Y$ gives at least $Y / m$ primes $p_{n}$.
Now given $X \geqslant 1$, let $n_{1}$ be the largest integer such that $\gamma^{n_{1}} \leqslant X$. Assume $X$ sufficiently large to ensure $n_{0} \leqslant n_{1}$. Then, for each $n \in\left[n_{0}, n_{1}\right]$ such that $\varphi(n) \geqslant \frac{1}{2} n$, there exists a prime ideal $\mathfrak{p}_{n} \subset \mathscr{O}_{\mathrm{K}}$ for which $u^{n} \equiv 1\left(\bmod \mathfrak{p}_{n}\right)$ and $u^{n} \not \equiv 1\left(\bmod \mathfrak{p}_{n}^{2}\right)$. Note that $p_{n} \leqslant \mathrm{~N}\left(\mathfrak{p}_{n}\right) \leqslant \gamma^{n} \leqslant \gamma^{n_{1}} \leqslant X$. Thereby:

$$
\begin{aligned}
& \frac{1}{m} \#\left\{n, n_{0} \leqslant n \leqslant n_{1}, \varphi(n) \geqslant \frac{1}{2} n\right\} \\
& \leqslant \#\left\{p_{n} \leqslant X, p_{n} \text { prime }\left|\exists \mathfrak{p}_{n} \in \mathscr{O}_{k}, \mathfrak{p}_{n}\right| p_{n}, u^{n} \equiv 1\left(\bmod \mathfrak{p}_{n}\right) \text { and } u^{n} \not \equiv 1\left(\bmod \mathfrak{p}_{n}^{2}\right)\right\} .
\end{aligned}
$$

In conclusion, one has found at least $c \log X$ prime numbers $p_{n} \leqslant X$ satisfying ( $i$ ) of Proposition 2.3 for some $\mathfrak{p}_{n} \mid p_{n}$, (with $p_{n}>p_{0}$ ).
2.2. Proof of Theorem $A$. Let $M$ be an irreducible $\mathbb{Q}[\mathrm{G}]$-submodule of $\mathbb{Q} \otimes E_{\mathrm{K}}$ of character $\chi$. Let $u \in E_{\mathrm{K}}$ generating the G-module $M$ (which is always possible, $\mathbb{Q} \otimes E_{\mathrm{K}}$ is in the regular representation). By the previous section, there exists $k \geqslant 1$ such that $u^{k n} \equiv 1\left(\bmod \mathfrak{p}_{n}\right)$ and $u^{k n} \not \equiv 1\left(\bmod \mathfrak{p}_{n}^{2}\right)$ for at least $c \log X$ prime numbers $p_{n} \leqslant X$ (where $\mathfrak{p}_{n} \mid p_{n}$ and $p_{n}>p_{0}$ ). We conclude with Lemma 1.2.

Proof of the Corollary. Observe first that the Leopoldt conjecture holds in the two cases. When K is quadratic real. Take $p>p_{0}$. Let $\chi=\psi$ be the nontrivial character of G . Then $\mathbb{Q} \otimes E_{\mathrm{K}}=E_{\mathrm{K}}^{\chi}, r_{\psi}\left(E_{\mathrm{K}}\right)=1$, and $\mathscr{T}_{p}=\mathscr{T}_{p}^{\psi}$. Then by Theorem A, $\mathscr{T}_{p}=\{1\}$ for at least $c \log X$ prime numbers $p \leqslant X$.
When K is a dihedral imaginary field of degree 6 . Take $p>p_{0}$. Let $\chi$ be the irreducible $\mathbb{Q}$-character of G of degree 2; observe that $\chi=\psi$ is also $\mathbb{Q}_{p}$-irreducible. One has $\mathbb{Q} \otimes E_{\mathrm{K}}=$ $E_{\mathrm{K}}^{\chi}$, and $r_{\psi}\left(E_{\mathrm{K}}\right)=1$. But $\mathscr{T}_{p}=\mathscr{T}_{p}^{\psi} \oplus \mathscr{T}_{p}^{\varphi}$, where $\varphi$ is the nontrivial character of degree 1 . As $\varphi$ fixes an imaginary quadratic field, we get $\mathscr{T}_{p}^{\varphi}=\{1\}$, and then $\mathscr{T}_{p}=\mathscr{T}_{p}^{\psi}$. Then by Theorem A, $\mathscr{T}_{p}=\{1\}$ for at least $c \log X$ prime numbers $p \leqslant X$.
