A UNIQUENESS THEOREM FOR STURM-LIOUVILLE EQUATIONS WITH A SPECTRAL PARAMETER LINEARLY CONTAINED IN THE BOUNDARY CONDITIONS

Abstract

A uniqueness theorem for the Sturm-Liouville equation with a spectral parameter linearly contained in both boundary conditions is proved.

Consider the Sturm-Liouville equation

$$\ell y := -y''(x) + q(x)y(x) = \lambda y(x), \quad x \in [0, \pi]$$
 (1)

with the boundary conditions

$$\lambda(y'(0) - hy(0)) = h_1 y'(0) - h_2 y(0), \tag{2}$$

$$\lambda(y'(\pi) + Hy(\pi)) = H_1 y'(\pi) + H_2 y(\pi), \tag{3}$$

where $q(x) \in \mathcal{L}_2(0,\pi)$ is a real-valued function, $h, h_1, h_2, H, H_1, H_2 \in \mathbb{R}$ and

$$\delta := hh_1 - h_2 > 0, \quad \rho := HH_1 - H_2 > 0.$$

We denote this problem by $\mathcal{P}(q, h, h_1, h_2, H, H_1, H_2)$.

Let $\varphi(x,\lambda)$ and $\psi(x,\lambda)$ be the solutions of (1) satisfying the initial conditions

$$\varphi(0,\lambda) = -\lambda + h_1, \quad \varphi'(0,\lambda) = -\lambda h + h_2,
\psi(\pi,\lambda) = -\lambda + H_1, \quad \psi'(\pi,\lambda) = \lambda H - H_2.$$
(4)

We define

$$\chi(\lambda) := \varphi(x,\lambda)\psi'(x,\lambda) - \varphi'(x,\lambda)\psi(x,\lambda),$$

which is independent of $x \in [0, \pi]$. The function $\chi(\lambda)$ is entire and has zeros at the eigenvalues of the problem (1)–(3). The set of eigenvalues is countable, consists of real numbers ([1, 4]) and for each eigenvalue λ_n there exists such a number k_n that

$$\psi(x, \lambda_n) = k_n \varphi(x, \lambda_n), \quad k_n \neq 0. \tag{5}$$

In the Hilbert space $\mathcal{H} = \mathcal{L}_2(0,\pi) \oplus \mathbb{C}^2$ let an inner product be defined by

$$(F,G) := \int_0^{\pi} F_1(x) \overline{G_1(x)} dx + \frac{1}{\delta} F_2 \overline{G_2} + \frac{1}{\rho} F_3 \overline{G_3}$$

for

$$F = \begin{pmatrix} F_1(x) \\ F_2 \\ F_3 \end{pmatrix}, \quad G = \begin{pmatrix} G_1(x) \\ G_2 \\ G_3 \end{pmatrix} \in \mathcal{H}.$$

We define operator

$$A(F) := \begin{pmatrix} -F_1''(x) + q(x)F_1(x) \\ h_1F_1'(0) - h_2F_1(0) \\ H_1F_1'(\pi) + H_2F_1(\pi) \end{pmatrix}$$

with

$$D(A) = \left\{ F \in \mathcal{H} | F_1(x), F_1'(x) \in \mathscr{AC}[0, \pi], \ell F_1 \in \mathscr{L}_2(0, \pi), F_2 = F_1'(0) - hF_1(0), F_3 = F_1'(\pi) + HF_1(\pi) \right\}.$$

Then

$$\Phi_n := \begin{pmatrix} \varphi(x, \lambda_n) \\ \varphi'(0, \lambda_n) - h\varphi(0, \lambda_n) \\ \varphi'(\pi, \lambda_n) + H\varphi(\pi, \lambda_n) \end{pmatrix} = \begin{pmatrix} \varphi(x, \lambda_n) \\ -\delta \\ \rho/k_n \end{pmatrix}$$

are orthogonal eigenelements of A:

$$(\Phi_m, \Phi_n) = \int_0^\pi \varphi(x, \lambda_m) \varphi(x, \lambda_n) dx + \delta + \frac{\rho}{k_m k_n} = 0, \quad m \neq n.$$

We also define *norming constants* by

$$\gamma_n := \|\Phi_n\|^2 = \int_0^\pi \varphi^2(x, \lambda_n) dx + \delta + \frac{\rho}{k_n^2}.$$

The numbers $\{\lambda_n, \gamma_n\}_{n\geq 0}$ are called the *spectral data* of the problem (1)–(3).

Lemma 1. The following equality holds:

$$\dot{\chi}(\lambda_n) = k_n \gamma_n, \quad n \ge 0,$$

where
$$\dot{\chi}(\lambda) = \frac{d}{d\lambda}\chi(\lambda)$$
.

Analogously to [3, Theorem 1(i)] the following theorem can be proved.

Theorem 1. For $F \in \mathcal{H}$

$$||F||^2 = \sum_{n=0}^{\infty} \frac{1}{\gamma_n} |(F, \Phi_n)|^2.$$

By taking
$$F = \begin{pmatrix} 0 \\ 1 \\ 0 \end{pmatrix}$$
 and $F = \begin{pmatrix} 0 \\ 0 \\ 1 \end{pmatrix}$ in this theorem we obtain
$$\frac{1}{\delta} = \sum_{n=0}^{\infty} \frac{1}{\gamma_n}, \qquad \frac{1}{\rho} = \sum_{n=0}^{\infty} \frac{1}{k_n^2 \gamma_n}. \tag{6}$$

Theorem 2. Following asymptotics hold:

$$\sqrt{\lambda_n} = n - 2 + \frac{\omega}{n\pi} + \frac{\zeta_n}{n}, \quad \{\zeta_n\} \in l_2, \tag{7}$$

$$\gamma_n = (n-2)^4 \left(\frac{\pi}{2} + \frac{\zeta_n'}{n}\right), \quad \{\zeta_n'\} \in l_2, \tag{8}$$

where

$$\omega = h + H + \frac{1}{2} \int_0^{\pi} q(x) dx.$$

Proof. We denote $s := \sqrt{\lambda}$. Then from

$$\begin{split} \varphi(x,\lambda) &= -s^2\cos sx - \left(h + \frac{1}{2}\int_0^x q(t)dt\right)s\sin sx - \\ &\quad - \frac{1}{2}\int_0^x q(t)s\sin s(x-2t)dt + O\left(e^{|Imsx|}\right), \end{split}$$

$$\varphi'(x,\lambda) = s^3 \sin sx - \left(h + \frac{1}{2} \int_0^x q(t)dt\right) s^2 \cos sx - \frac{1}{2} \int_0^x q(t)s^2 \cos s(x-2t)dt + O\left(|s|e^{|\text{Imsx}|}\right)$$

using (4) we obtain

$$\chi(\lambda) = s^5 \sin s\pi - \left(h + H + \frac{1}{2} \int_0^\pi q(x) dx\right) s^4 \cos s\pi + I(s)s^4, \tag{9}$$

where

$$I(s) = -\frac{1}{2} \int_0^{\pi} q(t) \cos s(\pi - 2t) dt + O\left(\frac{e^{|Ims\pi|}}{|s|}\right).$$

Now using Bessel's inequality it's easy to obtain (7) and (8).

Lemma 2. Let $v(t, \lambda)$ be any function entire on λ with

$$v(t,\lambda) = O\left(e^{|Im\sqrt{\lambda}|t}\right), \quad t \in [0,\pi].$$

Then

$$\sum_{n=0}^{\infty} \frac{\varphi(x, \lambda_n) v(t, \lambda_n)}{\gamma_n} = 0, \tag{10}$$

uniformly on $0 \le t \le x \le \pi$.

Proof. Using (5), Lemma 1. and the residue theorem we get

$$\begin{split} \sum_{n=0}^{N} \frac{\varphi(x,\lambda_n)v(t,\lambda_n)}{\gamma_n} &= \sum_{n=0}^{N} \frac{\psi(x,\lambda_n)v(t,\lambda_n)}{k_n\gamma_n} = \sum_{n=0}^{N} \frac{\psi(x,\lambda_n)v(t,\lambda_n)}{\dot{\chi}(\lambda_n)} = \\ &= \sum_{n=0}^{N} \underset{\lambda=\lambda_n}{Res} \frac{\psi(x,\lambda)v(t,\lambda)}{\chi(\lambda)} = \frac{1}{2\pi i} \int_{C_N} \frac{\psi(x,\lambda)v(t,\lambda)}{\chi(\lambda)} d\lambda, \end{split}$$

where $C_N = \{\lambda : |\lambda| = (N - 3/2)^2\}$. Equality (9) implies that

$$\chi(\lambda) = \lambda^2 \sqrt{\lambda} \sin \sqrt{\lambda} \pi + O\left(|\lambda|^2 e^{|Im\sqrt{\lambda}|\pi}\right).$$

We denote $G_{\delta} = \{\lambda : |\sqrt{\lambda} - n| \ge \delta, n = 0, \pm 1, \pm 2, ...\}$ for some small fixed $\delta > 0$ and recall that (see e.g. [6, p. 15])

$$|\sin\sqrt{\lambda}\pi| \ge 2C_{\delta}e^{|Im\sqrt{\lambda}|\pi}, \quad \lambda \in G_{\delta},$$

where C_{δ} does not depend on λ . Therefore we obtain

$$|\chi(\lambda)| \ge C_{\delta} |\lambda^2 \sqrt{\lambda}| e^{|Im\sqrt{\lambda}|\pi}, \quad \lambda \in G_{\delta}, |\lambda| \ge \lambda_{\delta}$$

for sufficiently large λ_{δ} . Since

$$|\psi(x,\lambda)| = O\left(|\lambda|e^{|Im\sqrt{\lambda}|(\pi-x)}\right), \quad x \in [0,\pi],$$

we obtain

$$|\psi(x,\lambda)v(t,\lambda)| = O\left(|\lambda|e^{|Im\sqrt{\lambda}|(\pi-x+t)}\right) = O\left(|\lambda|e^{|Im\sqrt{\lambda}|\pi}\right), \quad 0 \le t \le x \le \pi.$$

Thus the equality (10) holds. Uniformity of this convergence can be obtained from (7) and (8) by applying Weierstraß' theorem.

Putting $v(t, \lambda) \equiv 1$ and x = 0 in (10) we obtain

$$\sum_{n=0}^{\infty} \frac{h_1 - \lambda_n}{\gamma_n} = 0.$$

Similarly, we have

$$\sum_{n=0}^{\infty} \frac{H_1 - \lambda_n}{k_n^2 \gamma_n} = 0.$$

Using (6) in these equalities we get the representation of h_1 and H_1 by the spectral data:

$$h_1 = \delta \sum_{n=0}^{\infty} \frac{\lambda_n}{\gamma_n}, \qquad H_1 = \rho \sum_{n=0}^{\infty} \frac{\lambda_n}{k_n^2 \gamma_n}.$$
 (11)

Using the transformation operators (see [5]), we can write

$$\varphi(x,\lambda) = \mathring{\varphi}(x,\lambda) + \int_{-x}^{x} G(x,\tau)\mathring{\varphi}(\tau,\lambda)d\tau, \tag{12}$$

where

$$\mathring{\varphi}(x,\lambda) := (h_1 - \lambda)\cos\sqrt{\lambda}x + (h_2 - \lambda h)\frac{\sin\sqrt{\lambda}x}{\sqrt{\lambda}}$$

is the solution of the equation $-y''(x) = \lambda y(x)$ satisfying the initial conditions

$$\mathring{\varphi}(0,\lambda) = -\lambda + h_1, \quad \mathring{\varphi}'(0,\lambda) = -\lambda h + h_2,$$

 $G(x,\tau)$ is a real-valued continuous function and

$$G(x,x) = \frac{1}{2} \int_0^x q(t)dt.$$

Theorem 3. For each fixed $x \in (0,\pi]$ the kernel $G(x,\tau)$ satisfies the following equation:

$$A(x,t) + \int_{-x}^{x} G(x,\tau)A(\tau,t)d\tau = 0, \quad 0 \le t \le x \le \pi,$$
 (13)

where

$$A(x,t) := \sum_{n=0}^{\infty} \frac{\mathring{\varphi}(x,\lambda_n) \cos \sqrt{\lambda_n} t}{\gamma_n}.$$

Proof. Using equality (12) we obtain

$$\sum_{n=0}^{N} \frac{\varphi(x,\lambda_n)\cos\sqrt{\lambda_n}t}{\gamma_n} = \sum_{n=0}^{N} \frac{\mathring{\varphi}(x,\lambda_n)\cos\sqrt{\lambda_n}t}{\gamma_n} + \sum_{n=0}^{N} \frac{\cos\sqrt{\lambda_n}t}{\gamma_n} \int_{-x}^{x} G(x,\tau)\mathring{\varphi}(\tau,\lambda_n)d\tau.$$

Applying Lemma 2. to $v(t,\lambda) = \cos\sqrt{\lambda}t$ we get the statement of the theorem. We denote

$$F(x,t) := \frac{(h_1 - \lambda_0)\mathring{\varphi}(x,\lambda_0)\cos\sqrt{\lambda_0}t}{\gamma_0} + \frac{(h_1 - \lambda_1)\mathring{\varphi}(x,\lambda_1)\cos\sqrt{\lambda_1}t}{\gamma_1} + \sum_{n=0}^{\infty} \left(\frac{(h_1 - \lambda_{n+2})\mathring{\varphi}(x,\lambda_{n+2})\cos\sqrt{\lambda_{n+2}}t}{\gamma_{n+2}} - \frac{(\cos nx + h\frac{\sin nx}{n})\cos nt}{\alpha_n^0}\right),$$

where

$$\alpha_n^0 = \begin{cases} \frac{\pi}{2}, & n \ge 1\\ \pi, & n = 0. \end{cases}$$

By differentiating the equation (13) twice with respect to t we find

$$F(x,t) + h + G(x,t) + G(x,-t) + + h \int_{t}^{x} (G(x,\tau) - G(x,-\tau)) d\tau + \int_{-x}^{x} G(x,\tau) F(\tau,t) d\tau = 0.$$

Putting x = t = 0 we obtain

$$h = -\frac{(h_1 - \lambda_0)^2}{\gamma_0} - \frac{(h_1 - \lambda_1)^2}{\gamma_1} - \sum_{n=2}^{\infty} \left(\frac{(h_1 - \lambda_n)^2}{\gamma_n} - \frac{1}{\alpha_{n-2}^0} \right).$$
 (14)

Analogously, we have

$$H = -\frac{(H_1 - \lambda_0)^2}{k_0^2 \gamma_0} - \frac{(H_1 - \lambda_1)^2}{k_1^2 \gamma_1} - \sum_{n=2}^{\infty} \left(\frac{(H_1 - \lambda_n)^2}{k_n^2 \gamma_n} - \frac{1}{\alpha_{n-2}^0} \right).$$
 (15)

Theorem 4. Suppose that $\{\lambda_n, \gamma_n\}_{n\geq 0}$ and $\{\widetilde{\lambda_n}, \widetilde{\gamma_n}\}_{n\geq 0}$ are the spectral data of the problems $\mathcal{P}(q, h, h_1, h_2, H, H_1, H_2)$ and $\mathcal{P}(\widetilde{q}, \widetilde{h}, \widetilde{h_1}, \widetilde{h_2}, \widetilde{H}, \widetilde{H_1}, \widetilde{H_2})$, respectively. If

$$\lambda_n = \widetilde{\lambda}_n, \quad \gamma_n = \widetilde{\gamma}_n, \qquad n \ge 0$$

then

$$q(x)=\widetilde{q}(x)\ a.e.\ on\ (0,\pi),$$

$$h=\widetilde{h},\quad h_1=\widetilde{h_1},\quad h_2=\widetilde{h_2},\qquad H=\widetilde{H},\quad H_1=\widetilde{H}_1,\quad H_2=\widetilde{H}_2.$$

Proof. Using (6), (11), (14) and (15) we obtain

$$h = \widetilde{h}, \quad h_1 = \widetilde{h_1}, \quad h_2 = \widetilde{h_2}, \quad H = \widetilde{H}, \quad H_1 = \widetilde{H}_1, \quad H_2 = \widetilde{H}_2.$$

The result now follows from [2, Theorem 5.2].

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
