

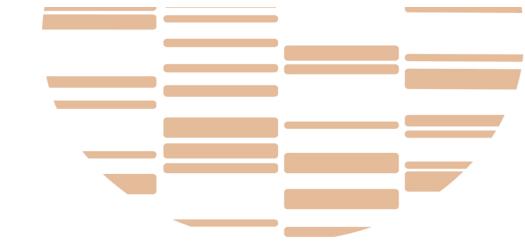

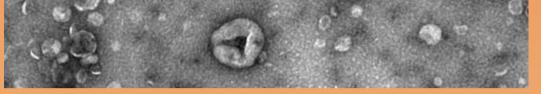
Impact of extracellular vesicles of Staphylococcus aureus N305 on the immune response of the host

Socio-economic context

- Mastitis, an inflammation of the mammary gland, is the most prevalent production disease in dairy herds worldwide affecting animal health and milk quality and causing economic losses.
- Staphylococcus aureus is one of the most important etiological agent of mastitis.
- Treatment against *S. aureus*-induced mastitis is still ineffective.

Scientific context

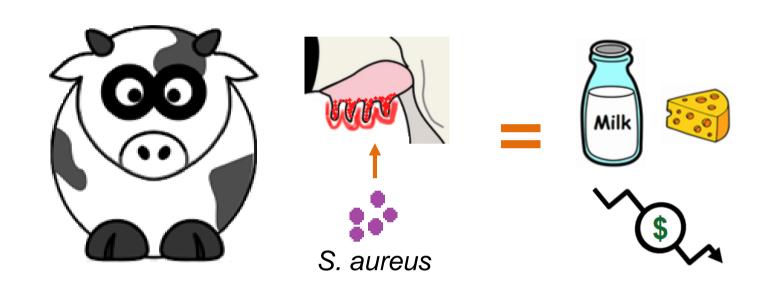
- A better knowledge on host-pathogen interactions is required to develop novel preventive or curative strategies against S. aureus mastitis.
- Extracellular vesicles (EVs) are nanosized particles secreted by most cells involved intercellular in and communication.

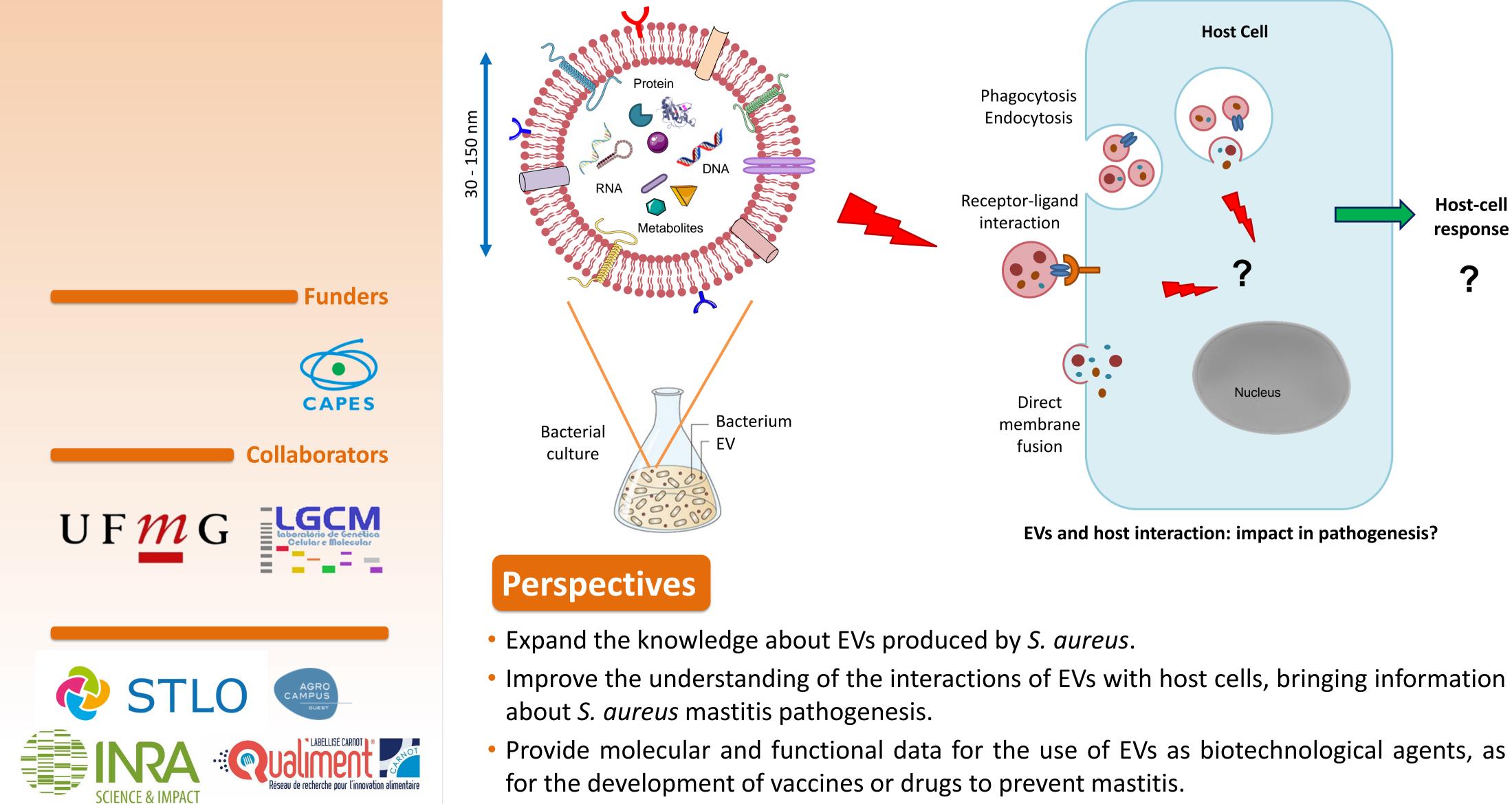

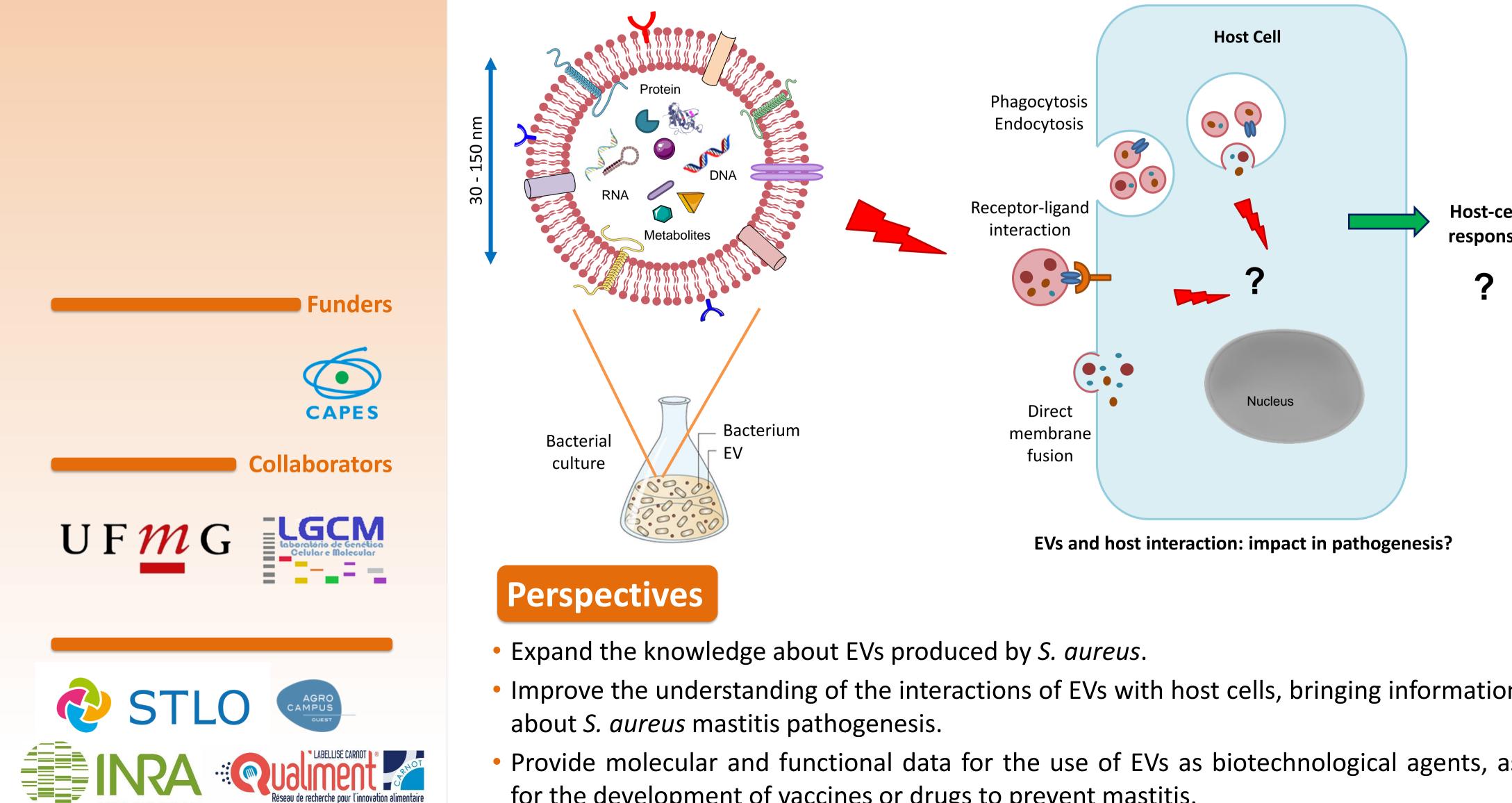

Expected results

- Identify eukaryotic genes and signaling pathways targeted and triggered by S. aureus N305 EVs in vitro (RNA-seq approach).
- Confirm the mechanisms of action of EVs in vivo by measuring expression of relevant genes activated in vitro in mammary gland tissues exposed to EVs.
- Investigate the role of EVs in *S. aureus* pathogenesis (bacterial-host interaction).
