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Cooperativity Analysis of the Open-, Closed- and Annulated-Isomers of Diarylethene that form 2-D Ordering at the Liquid/Solid Interface and their Photochemical Interchanges



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Introduction

✓ Control over molecular nanostructure: "bottom-up" strategy¹ for molecular electronic devices

 \checkmark 2-D supramolecular self-assembly at interfaces widely studied²⁻⁴

✓ Scanning Tunneling Microscopy (STM): efficient tool for the characterization of Self-assembled Monolayers (SAM)⁵

✓ Light as external stimulus: require photo-responsive material

✓ Diarylethene: high thermal stability of each isomer, high fatigue resistance^{6,7}



Conclusions

✓ Adsorption processes were modelized: openisomer **1o** is isodesmic, closed-isomer **1c** is cooperative and annulated-isomer **1a** has a very high affinity for HOPG ($K_{\rho} > 10^6$)

✓ This work highlighted the existence of mixcrystals **1o/1c** and the "Induced cooperativity" on formation of ordering α by addition of **1c**.

✓A better understanding of photochemical interchanges became possible: SAM obtained from irradiated solution can be predicted by the model

✓ Diarylethene-pyrene: photoinduced reversible control between 2 orderings⁸

✓ Stabilization by H-bond network^{9,10}

 \checkmark Ordering γ favored / ordering β : after UV, β was never observed¹⁰

✓ The STM analysis of the in-situ irradiation suggest a modification of photochomic properties at the octanoic acid/HOPG interface

Results and Discussions

Photoisomerization

✓ Irradiation (λ =365 nm) of **1o** solution ([**1o**] = 29.4 µM)

✓ Ratio $\Phi_{o \rightarrow c}$: $\Phi_{c \rightarrow o}$: $\Phi_{c \rightarrow a}$ is 1 : 0.047 : 0.001 $\Phi_{o \rightarrow c} = 0.59 \text{ (reported)}^{11}; \Phi_{c \rightarrow o} = 0.028; \Phi_{c \rightarrow a} = 0.0006$



Mono-component adsorption parameters

✓ Cooperative supramolecular polymer¹²⁻¹³

 \checkmark Cooperative model at the octanoic acid/highly oriented pyrolytic graphite (HOPG) interface¹⁰



SAM obtained from irradiated solutions

✓ Irradiation (λ =365 nm) of **1o** solution ([**1o**] = 28.7 μM)

✓ Exact composition (UV-Vis): calculated fractional coverage values (cooperative model)



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
