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GEVREY INDEX THEOREM FOR THE INHOMOGENEOUS *n*-DIMENSIONAL HEAT EQUATION WITH A POWER-LAW NONLINEARITY AND VARIABLE COEFFICIENTS

PASCAL REMY

ABSTRACT. We are interested in the Gevrey properties of the formal power series solution in time of the inhomogeneous semilinear heat equation with a power-law nonlinearity in 1-dimensional time variable $t \in \mathbb{C}$ and n-dimensional spatial variable $x \in \mathbb{C}^n$ and with analytic initial condition and analytic coefficients at the origin x = 0. We prove in particular that the inhomogeneity of the equation and the formal solution are together s-Gevrey for any $s \ge 1$. In the opposite case s < 1, we show that the solution is 1-Gevrey at most while the inhomogeneity is s-Gevrey, and we give an explicit example in which the solution is s'-Gevrey for no s' < 1.

1. Setting the Problem

For several years, various works have been done on the divergent solutions of some classes of linear partial differential equations or integro-differential equations in two variables or more, allowing thus to formulate many results on Gevrey properties, summability or multisummability (e.g. [2, 4–7, 9, 11, 12, 14, 19, 21, 23, 24, 27–35, 41, 42, 45-47, 55, 57]).

In the case of the nonlinear partial differential equations, the situation is much more complicated. The existing results concern mainly Gevrey properties, especially the convergence (e.g. [10, 16, 18, 20, 25, 36-38, 48-54]), and there are very few results about the summation (see [17, 22, 26, 40, 43]).

In this article, we propose to investigate the Gevrey properties of the inhomogeneous semilinear heat equation

(1.1)
$$\begin{cases} \partial_t u - a(x)\Delta_x u - b(x)u^m = \widetilde{f}(t,x) \\ u(0,x) = \varphi(x) \end{cases}$$

with a 1-dimensional time variable $t \in \mathbb{C}$ and a *n*-dimensional spatial variable $x := (x_1, \dots, x_n) \in \mathbb{C}^n$, where

- Δ_x := ∂²_{x1} + ... + ∂²_{xn} is the Laplace operator;
 the coefficients a(x) and b(x) and the initial condition φ(x) are analytic on a polydisc $\mathcal{D}_{\rho_1,\ldots,\rho_n} := D_{\rho_1} \times \ldots \times D_{\rho_n}$ centered at the origin of \mathbb{C}^n $(D_{\rho}$ denotes the disc with center $0 \in \mathbb{C}$ and radius $\rho > 0$);
- the degree m of the power-law nonlinearity is an integer ≥ 2 ;

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• the inhomogeneity $\tilde{f}(t, x)$ is a formal power series in t with analytic coefficients in $\mathcal{D}_{\rho_1,\ldots,\rho_n}$ (we denote by $\tilde{f}(t, x) \in \mathcal{O}(\mathcal{D}_{\rho_1,\ldots,\rho_n})[[t]]$) which may be smooth, or not¹.

Equation (1.1) arises in many physical, chemical, biological, and ecological problems involving diffusion and nonlinear growth such as heat and mass transfer, combustion theory, and spread theory of animal or plant populations. For example, if a chemical reaction generates heat at a rate depending on the temperature u, then u satisfies equation eq. (1.1). In biological and ecological problems, the nonlinear term u^m represents the growth of animal or plant population.

Let us now write the inhomogeneity f(t, x) on the form

$$\widetilde{f}(t,x) = \sum_{j \ge 0} f_{j,*}(x) \frac{t^j}{j!}$$

with $f_{j,*}(x) \in \mathcal{O}(\mathcal{D}_{\rho_1,\ldots,\rho_n})$ for all $j \ge 0$. Then, it is clear that equation eq. (1.1) admits a *unique* formal series solution

$$\widetilde{u}(t,x)\sum_{j\geq 0}u_{j,*}(x)\frac{t^j}{j!}\in \mathcal{O}(\mathcal{D}_{\rho_1,\ldots,\rho_n})[[t]],$$

where, for all $j \ge 0$, the coefficients $u_{j,*}(x) \in \mathcal{O}(\mathcal{D}_{\rho_1,\ldots,\rho_n})$ are recursively determined from $u_{0,*}(x) = \varphi(x)$ by the relations

(1.2)
$$u_{j+1,*}(x) = f_{j,*}(x) + a(x)\Delta_x u_{j,*}(x) + b(x) \sum_{k_1+\ldots+k_m=j} \frac{j!}{k_1!\ldots k_m!} u_{k_1,*}(x)\ldots u_{k_m,*}(x).$$

An important particular case of equation eq. (1.1) is the case a(x) = 1, b(x) = 0, and $\tilde{f}(t, x) = 0$, for which equation eq. (1.1) becomes the classical linear heat initial conditions problem

$$\begin{cases} \partial_t u = \Delta_x u\\ u(0, x) = \varphi(x) \end{cases}$$

In this case, it is well-known that the solution $\tilde{u}(t, x)$ is generally divergent and generically 1-Gevrey [19,27]. This Gevrey property was extended later to the nonconstant case $a(x) \neq 1$ [9] and to the inhomogeneous case $\tilde{f}(t, x) \neq 0$ [5,28]. In the latter case, it was proved in particular that the solution $\tilde{u}(t, x)$ and the inhomogeneity $\tilde{f}(t, x)$ are together 1-Gevrey.

In the present paper, we consider the very general equation eq. (1.1), where no restrictive assumption is made on the coefficients a(x) and b(x), on the inhomogeneity $\tilde{f}(t,x)$ and on the initial condition $\varphi(x)$, except the assumption that a(x), b(x) and $\varphi(x)$ are analytic at the origin x = 0 of \mathbb{C}^n and the assumption that $\tilde{f}(t,x)$ is a formal power series in t with analytic coefficients at $x = 0^2$.

Let us mention here that a *real* variant of equation eq. (1.1) was already studied in the case a(x) = 1, b(x) = 1 and $\tilde{f}(t, x) = 0$ by T. Gramchev and G. Lysik

[10], then by G. Lysik and S. Michalik [20] by replacing the nonlinearity u^m by a polynomial in u with constant coefficients, and has shown that the solution $\tilde{u}(t, x)$ is again 1-Gevrey.

The organization of the paper is as follows. In section 2, we recall the definition and some properties about the s-Gevrey formal power series in $\mathcal{O}(\mathcal{D}_{\rho_1,\ldots,\rho_n})[[t]]$ which are needed in the sequel. Section 3 is devoted to the main result of the article which states that the solution $\tilde{u}(t,x)$ and the inhomogeneity $\tilde{f}(t,x)$ are together s-Gevrey for any $s \ge 1$ (theorem 3.1), generalizing thus the results already known for the linear heat equation (see references just above). In the opposite case s < 1, we show that $\tilde{u}(t,x)$ is 1-Gevrey at most while $\tilde{f}(t,x)$ is s-Gevrey and an explicit example for which $\tilde{u}(t,x)$ is s'-Gevrey for no s' < 1 is displayed (proposition 3.2). A detailed proof of the main theorem 3.1 is developed in section 4. This one is based on the Nagumo norms, a technique of majorant series and a fixed point procedure.

2. Gevrey Formal Series

Before stating our main result (see theorem 3.1 below), let us first recall for the convenience of the reader some definitions and basic properties about the Gevrey formal series in $\mathcal{O}(\mathcal{D}_{\rho_1,\ldots,\rho_n})[[t]]$, which are needed in the sequel.

All along the article, we consider t as the variable and x as a parameter. Thereby, to define the notion of *Gevrey classes of formal power series in* $\mathcal{O}(\mathcal{D}_{\rho_1,\ldots,\rho_n})[[t]]$, one extends the classical notion of *Gevrey classes of elements in* $\mathbb{C}[[t]]$ to families parametrized by x in requiring similar conditions, the estimates being however uniform with respect to x. Doing that, any formal power series of $\mathcal{O}(\mathcal{D}_{\rho_1,\ldots,\rho_n})[[t]]$ can be seen as a formal power series in t with coefficients in a convenient Banach space defined as the space of functions that are holomorphic on a polydisc $\mathcal{D}_{\rho,\ldots,\rho}$ $(0 < \rho \leq \min \rho_{\ell})$ and continuous up to its boundary, equipped with the usual supremum norm. For a general study of series with coefficients in a Banach space, we refer for instance to [3].

In the sequel, we endow \mathbb{C}^n with the maximum norm: for $x = (x_1, ..., x_n) \in \mathbb{C}^n$,

$$||x|| = \max_{\ell \in \{1,...,n\}} |x_\ell|.$$

Definition 2.1. Let $s \ge 0$ be. A formal series

$$\widetilde{u}(t,x) = \sum_{j \ge 0} u_{j,*}(x) \frac{t^j}{j!} \in \mathcal{O}(\mathcal{D}_{\rho_1,\dots,\rho_n})[[t]]$$

is said to be *Gevrey of order* s (in short, s-Gevrey) if there exist three positive constants $0 < \rho < \min \rho_{\ell}, C > 0$ and K > 0 such that the inequalities

$$\sup_{\|x\| \leq \rho} |u_{j,*}(x)| \leq CK^{j} \Gamma(1 + (s+1)j)$$

hold for all $j \ge 0$.

In other words, definition 2.1 means that $\tilde{u}(t, x)$ is s-Gevrey in t, uniformly in x on a neighborhood of $x = (0, ..., 0) \in \mathbb{C}^n$.

We denote by $\mathcal{O}(\mathcal{D}_{\rho_1,\ldots,\rho_n})[[t]]_s$ the set of all the formal series in $\mathcal{O}(\mathcal{D}_{\rho_1,\ldots,\rho_n})[[t]]$ which are *s*-Gevrey. Observe that the set $\mathbb{C}\{t,x\}$ of germs of analytic functions at the origin of \mathbb{C}^{n+1} coincides with the union $\bigcup_{\rho_1>0,\ldots,\rho_n>0} \mathcal{O}(\mathcal{D}_{\rho_1,\ldots,\rho_n})[[t]]_0$; in particular, any element of $\mathcal{O}(\mathcal{D}_{\rho_1,\ldots,\rho_n})[[t]]_0$ is convergent and $\mathbb{C}\{t,x\}\cap \mathcal{O}(\mathcal{D}_{\rho_1,\ldots,\rho_n})[[t]] =$ $\mathcal{O}(\mathcal{D}_{\rho_1,\ldots,\rho_n})[[t]]_0$. Observe also that the sets $\mathcal{O}(\mathcal{D}_{\rho_1,\ldots,\rho_n})[[t]]_s$ are filtered as follows:

 $\mathcal{O}(\mathcal{D}_{\rho_1,\dots,\rho_n})[[t]]_0 \subset \mathcal{O}(\mathcal{D}_{\rho_1,\dots,\rho_n})[[t]]_s \subset \mathcal{O}(\mathcal{D}_{\rho_1,\dots,\rho_n})[[t]]_{s'} \subset \mathcal{O}(\mathcal{D}_{\rho_1,\dots,\rho_n})[[t]]$ for all s and s' satisfying $0 < s < s' < +\infty$.

Following proposition 2.2 specifies the algebraic structure of $\mathcal{O}(\mathcal{D}_{\rho_1,\ldots,\rho_n})[[t]]_s$.

Proposition 2.2. Let $s \ge 0$. Then, the set $(\mathcal{O}(\mathcal{D}_{\rho_1,...,\rho_n})[[t]]_s, \partial_t, \partial_{x_1}, ..., \partial_{x_n})$ is a \mathbb{C} -differential algebra.

Proof. Since $(\mathcal{O}(\mathcal{D}_{\rho_1,\ldots,\rho_n})[[t]], \partial_t, \partial_{x_1}, \ldots, \partial_{x_n})$ is a \mathbb{C} -differential algebra, it is sufficient to prove that $\mathcal{O}(\mathcal{D}_{\rho_1,\ldots,\rho_n})[[t]]_s$ is stable under multiplication and derivations.

The proof of the stability under the multiplication and the derivation ∂_t is similar to the one already detailed in [45, Prop. 1] (see also [3, p. 64]) in the case n = 1.

To prove the stability under the derivation $\partial_{x_{\ell}}$ with $\ell \in \{1, ..., n\}$, we proceed as follows. Let $\widetilde{u}(t, x) \in \mathcal{O}(\mathcal{D}_{\rho_1, ..., \rho_n})[[t]]_s$ as in definition 2.1 and $\widetilde{w}(t, x) = \partial_{x_{\ell}} \widetilde{u}(t, x)$. For a given $0 < \rho' < \rho$, the Cauchy integral formula gives us, for all $j \ge 0$ and all $||x|| \le \rho'$:

$$w_{j,*}(x) = \partial_{x_{\ell}} u_{j,*}(x) = \frac{1}{(2i\pi)^n} \int_{\gamma(x)} \frac{u_{j,*}(x')}{(x_{\ell'} - x_{\ell})^2 \prod_{\substack{k=1\\k \neq \ell}}^n (x'_k - x_k)} dx',$$

where $\gamma(x) := \{x' = (x'_1, ..., x'_n) \in \mathbb{C}^n; |x'_k - x_k| = \rho - \rho' \text{ for all } k \in \{1, ..., n\}\}.$ Hence, the inequalities

$$\sup_{\|x\| \le \rho'} |w_{j,*}(x)| \le C' K^j \Gamma(1 + (s+1)j) \quad \text{with } C' = \frac{C}{\rho - \rho'} \text{ for all } j \ge 0.$$

Indeed, the definition of the path $\gamma(x)$ implies $||x'|| \leq \rho$. The proof is complete. \Box

Observe that the stability under the derivation $\partial_{x_{\ell}}$ would not be guaranteed without the condition "there exist $0 < \rho < \min \rho_{\ell} \dots$ " in definition 2.1.

Observe also that a direct consequence of proposition 2.2 is the following.

Corollary 2.3. Suppose that the formal solution $\tilde{u}(t,x)$ of equation eq. (1.1) is s-Gevrey for some $s \ge 0$. Then, the inhomogeneity $\tilde{f}(t,x)$ is s-Gevrey too.

In section 3 below, we are interested in the following question which ensues naturally from corollary 2.3:

(Q) "If
$$\tilde{f}(t,x)$$
 is s-Gevrey for some $s \ge 0$,
is the formal solution $\tilde{u}(t,x)$ s-Gevrey too?"

As we shall prove, the response to this question depends on the value of the index s and, more precisely, on the value of s in relation to the critical value $s_c = 1$.

3. Gevrey Index Theorem

In the case $s \ge 1$, the Gevrey Index Theorem below (see theorem 3.1) asserts that the converse of corollary 2.3 is true, providing thus a positive answer to Question eq. (Q).

Theorem 3.1 (Gevrey Index Theorem). The formal solution $\tilde{u}(t, x)$ of equation eq. (1.1) and the inhomogeneity $\tilde{f}(t,x)$ are together s-Gevrey for any $s \ge 1$.

On the other hand, in the opposite case s < 1, the answer to Question eq. (Q) is generally negative (hence, the converse of corollary 2.3 is false). In fact, according to the filtration of the s-Gevrey spaces $\mathcal{O}(\mathcal{D}_{\rho_1,\ldots,\rho_n})[[t]]_s$ (see section 2) and theorem 3.1, we can only be said that the formal solution $\tilde{u}(t, x)$ of equation eq. (1.1) is generically 1-Gevrey at most when f(t, x) is s-Gevrey with s < 1. Proposition 3.2 below gives just us an example in which $\tilde{u}(t, x)$ is s'-Gevrey for no s' < 1.

Proposition 3.2 (A counter-example for s < 1). Let $\varphi(x)$ be the analytic fonction on $\mathcal{D} := \mathcal{D}_{1/n,\dots,1/n}$ defined by

$$\varphi(x) = \frac{1}{1 - x_1 - \dots - x_n}$$

Suppose that the inhomogeneity $\tilde{f}(t, x)$ satisfies:

- *f̃*(t, x) is s-Gevrey for some s < 1,
 ∂^α_x f_{j,*}(0) ≥ 0 for all α ∈ ℕⁿ and all j ≥ 0³.

Suppose also that the coefficients a(x) and b(x) are analytic on \mathcal{D} and satisfy the inequalities a(0) > 0, $\partial_x^{\alpha} a(0) \ge 0$ and $\partial_x^{\alpha} b(0) \ge 0$ for all $\alpha \in \mathbb{N}^n$.

Then, the formal solution $\tilde{u}(t, x)$ of equation eq. (1.1) is exactly 1-Gevrey.

Proof. It is sufficient to prove that $\tilde{u}(t, x)$ is s'-Gevrey for no s' < 1. Using the recurrence relations eq. (1.2), we first have

$$u_{j,*}(x) = (na(x))^j (2j)! (\varphi(x))^{2j+1} + \varphi(x) \operatorname{rem}_j(\varphi(x))$$

for all $x \in \mathcal{D}$ and all $j \ge 0$, where rem_i(X) is a polynomial in X, the coefficients of which read on the form

$$c \prod_{\substack{\alpha,\beta,\gamma \in \mathbb{N}^n \\ j' \in \{0,\ldots,j\} \\ \text{finite}}} \left(\partial_x^{\alpha} a(x)\right)^{k_{\alpha}} \left(\partial_x^{\beta} b(x)\right)^{k_{\beta}} \left(\partial_x^{\gamma} f_{j',*}(x)\right)^{k_{\gamma,j'}},$$

with c > 0 and $k_{\alpha}, k_{\beta}, k_{\gamma,j'} \in \mathbb{N}$. In particular, for x = 0, the assumptions on a(x), b(x) and the $f_{j',*}(x)$'s lead us to the inequalities

(3.1)
$$u_{j,*}(0) \ge (na(0))^j \Gamma(1+2j) > 0 \text{ for all } j \ge 0.$$

Let us now suppose that $\widetilde{u}(t,x)$ is s'-Gevrey for some s' < 1. Then, definition 2.1 and eq. (3.1) imply the relations

$$1 < C\left(\frac{K}{na(0)}\right)^{j} \frac{\Gamma(1 + (s'+1)j)}{\Gamma(1+2j)}$$

for all $i \ge 0$ and some convenient positive constants C and K independent of i. Proposition 3.2 follows since such inequalities are impossible. Indeed, applying the Stirling's Formula, we get

$$C\left(\frac{K}{na(0)}\right)^{j} \frac{\Gamma(1+(s'+1)j)}{\Gamma(1+2j)} \underset{j \to +\infty}{\sim} C\sqrt{\frac{s'+1}{2}} \left(\frac{K(s'+1)^{s'+1}e^{1-s'}}{4na(0)j^{1-s'}}\right)^{j}$$

which goes to 0 when i tends to infinity. This ends the proof.

³As usual, we set $\partial_x^{\alpha} := \partial_{x_1}^{\alpha_1} \dots \partial_{x_n}^{\alpha_n}$ while $\alpha = (\alpha_1, \dots, \alpha_n)$.

Observe that theorem 3.1 and proposition 3.2 apply in particular in the case b(x) = 0, that is in the case of the classical *n*-dimensional inhomogeneous heat initial conditions problem

$$\begin{cases} \partial_t u - a(x)\Delta_x u = \widetilde{f}(t,x) \\ u(0,x) = \varphi(x) \end{cases}$$

generalizing thus the results already proved in [5, 9, 19, 27, 28].

Section 4 below is devoted to the proof of the main theorem 3.1.

4. Proof of theorem 3.1

We have just to prove the converse of corollary 2.3.

Let us fix $s \ge 1$ and let us suppose that the inhomogenity f(t, x) is s-Gevrey. By assumption, its coefficients $f_{j,*}(x) \in \mathcal{O}(\mathcal{D}_{\rho_1,\ldots,\rho_n})$ satisfy the following condition (see definition 2.1): there exist three positive constants $0 < \rho < \min \rho_{\ell}, C > 0$ and K > 0 such that the inequalities

(4.1)
$$|f_{j,*}(x)| \leq CK^j \Gamma(1 + (s+1)j)$$

hold for all $j \ge 0$ and all $||x|| \le \rho$.

We must prove that the coefficients $u_{j,*}(x) \in \mathcal{O}(\mathcal{D}_{\rho_1,\ldots,\rho_n})$ of $\widetilde{u}(t,x)$ satisfy similar inequalities. The approach we present below is analoguous to the ones already developed in [5, 45–47] in the framework of linear partial and integro-differential equations and is based on the Nagumo norms [8, 39, 56] and on a technique of majorant series. However, our calculations appear to be much more complicated than in the linear case: the nonlinear term u^m of equation eq. (1.1) generates indeed several new technical combinatorial situations.

Before starting the calculations, let us first recall for the convenience of the reader the definition of the Nagumo norms and some of their properties which are needed in the sequel.

4.1. Nagumo Norms.

Definition 4.1. Let $f \in \mathcal{O}(\mathcal{D}_{\rho_1,\ldots,\rho_n}), p \ge 0$ and $0 < r < \min \rho_\ell$ be. Then, the Nagumo norm $||f||_{p,r}$ with indices (p,r) of f is defined by

$$||f||_{p,r} := \sup_{||x|| \le r} |f(x)d_r(x)^p|,$$

where $d_r(x)$ denotes the Euclidian distance $d_r(x) := r - ||x||$.

Following proposition 4.2 gives us some properties of the Nagumo norms.

Proposition 4.2. Let $f, g \in \mathcal{O}(\mathcal{D}_{\rho_1,\ldots,\rho_n}), p, p' \ge 0$ and $0 < r < \min \rho_\ell$ be. Then,

- $\begin{array}{ll} (1) & \|\cdot\|_{p,r} \ is \ a \ norm \ on \ \mathcal{O}(\mathcal{D}_{\rho_1,...,\rho_n}). \\ (2) & |f(x)| \leqslant \|f\|_{p,r} \ d_r(x)^{-p} \ for \ all \ \|x\| < r \ . \end{array}$
- (3) $||f||_{0,r} = \sup_{||x|| \le r} |f(x)|$ is the usual sup-norm on the polydisc $\mathcal{D}_{r,\dots,r}$.
- $\begin{array}{ll} (4) & \|fg\|_{p+p',r} \leqslant \|f\|_{p,r} \, \|g\|_{p',r}. \\ (5) & \|\partial_{x_{\ell}}f\|_{p+1,r} \leqslant e(p+1) \, \|f\|_{p,r} \ for \ all \ \ell \in \{1,...,n\}. \end{array}$

Proof. Properties 1–4 are straightforward and are left to the reader. To prove Property 5, we proceed as follows. Let $\ell \in \{1, ..., n\}$ be, $x \in \mathbb{C}^n$ such that ||x|| < rand $0 < R < d_r(x)$. Using the Cauchy Integral Formula, we have

$$\partial_{x_{\ell}} f(x) = \frac{1}{(2i\pi)^n} \int_{\gamma(x)} \frac{f(x')}{(x_{\ell'} - x_{\ell})^2 \prod_{\substack{k=1\\k \neq \ell}}^n (x'_k - x_k)} dx',$$

where $\gamma(x) := \{x' = (x'_1, ..., x'_n) \in \mathbb{C}^n; |x'_k - x_k| = R \text{ for all } k \in \{1, ..., n\}\}.$ Since $x' \in \gamma(x) \Rightarrow ||x'|| < r,$

we can apply Property 2 of proposition 4.2; hence, the inequalities

$$\left|\partial_{x_{\ell}}f(x)\right| \leq \frac{1}{R} \max_{x' \in \gamma(x)} \left|f(x')\right| \leq \frac{1}{R} \left\|f\right\|_{p,r} \max_{x' \in \gamma(x)} d_r(x')^{-p} = \frac{1}{R} \left\|f\right\|_{p,r} (d_r(x) - R)^{-p}.$$

Observe that the last equality stems from the relations

$$d_r(x') = r - \|x'\| = r - \|x + x' - x\| \ge d_r(x) - \|x' - x\| = d_r(x) - R > 0.$$

When p = 0, the choice $R = \frac{d_r(x)}{e}$ implies the inequality

$$|\partial_{x_{\ell}} f(x)| \leq e ||f||_{0,r} d_r(x)^{-1};$$

hence, the inequality

(4.2)
$$\left|\partial_{x_{\ell}}f(x)\right|d_{r}(x) \leq e \left\|f\right\|_{0,r}$$

When p > 0, the choice $R = \frac{d_r(x)}{p+1}$ and the relations

$$\left(1 - \frac{1}{p+1}\right)^{-p} = \left(1 + \frac{1}{p}\right)^p < e,$$

brings us to the inequalities

$$|\partial_{x_{\ell}} f(x)| \leq ||f||_{p,r} d_r(x)^{-p-1} (p+1) \left(1 - \frac{1}{p+1}\right)^{-p} \leq e(p+1) ||f||_{p,r} d_r(x)^{-p-1}$$

and then to the inequality

(4.3)
$$|\partial_{x_{\ell}} f(x)| \, d_r(x)^{p+1} \leq e(p+1) \, \|f\|_{p,r}$$

Property 5 follows since inequalities eqs. (4.2) and (4.3) are still valid when ||x|| = r. This achieves the proof of proposition 4.2.

Remark 4.3. Inequalities 4–5 of proposition 4.2 are the most important properties. Observe besides that the same index r occurs on their both sides, allowing thus to get estimates for the product fg in terms of f and g and for the derivatives $\partial_{x_{\ell}} f$ for any $\ell \in \{1, ..., n\}$ in terms of f without having to shrink the polydisc $\mathcal{D}_{r,...,r}$.

Let us now turn to the proof of theorem 3.1.

4.2. Some Inequalities. From recurrence relations eq. (1.2), we first derive the following identities for all $j \ge 0$:

$$(4.4) \quad \frac{u_{j+1,*}(x)}{\Gamma(1+(s+1)(j+1))} = \frac{f_{j,*}(x)}{\Gamma(1+(s+1)(j+1))} + \frac{a(x)\Delta_x u_{j,*}(x)}{\Gamma(1+(s+1)(j+1))} + b(x) \sum_{k_1+\ldots+k_m=j} \frac{j!}{k_1!\ldots k_m!} \frac{u_{k_1,*}(x)\ldots u_{k_m,*}(x)}{\Gamma(1+(s+1)(j+1))},$$

with the initial condition $u_{0,*}(x) = \varphi(x)$. Let us now define the constant A > 0 by (4.5) $A := \|u_{0,*}\|_{0,\rho} = \|\varphi\|_{0,\rho}$

and let us apply the Nagumo norm of indices $((s+1)(j+1), \rho)$ to relations eq. (4.4). From Property 1 of proposition 4.2, we first obtain:

$$\frac{\|u_{j+1,*}\|_{(s+1)(j+1),\rho}}{\Gamma(1+(s+1)(j+1))} \leq \frac{\|f_{j,*}\|_{(s+1)(j+1),\rho}}{\Gamma(1+(s+1)(j+1))} + \frac{\|a\Delta_x u_{j,*}\|_{(s+1)(j+1),\rho}}{\Gamma(1+(s+1)(j+1))} + \sum_{k_1+\ldots+k_m=j} \frac{j!}{k_1!\ldots k_m!} \frac{\|bu_{k_1,*}\ldots u_{k_m,*}\|_{(s+1)(j+1),\rho}}{\Gamma(1+(s+1)(j+1))}.$$

Then, Properties 4–5 of proposition 4.2 imply the inequalities

$$\begin{aligned} \frac{\|u_{j+1,*}\|_{(s+1)(j+1),\rho}}{\Gamma(1+(s+1)(j+1))} &\leqslant \frac{\|f_{j,*}\|_{(s+1)(j+1),\rho}}{\Gamma(1+(s+1)(j+1))} + \alpha_{j,s} \frac{\|u_{j,*}\|_{(s+1)j,\rho}}{\Gamma(1+(s+1)j)} + \\ \|b\|_{s+1,\rho} \sum_{k_1+\ldots+k_m=j} \beta_{j,k_1,\ldots,k_m,s} \frac{\|u_{k_1,*}\|_{(s+1)k_1,\rho}}{\Gamma(1+(s+1)k_1)} \cdots \frac{\|u_{k_m,*}\|_{(s+1)k_m,\rho}}{\Gamma(1+(s+1)k_m)}.\end{aligned}$$

where the constants $\alpha_{j,s}$ and $\beta_{k_1,\ldots,k_m,j}$ are defined by

$$\alpha_{j,s} := \frac{ne^2((s+1)j+2)((s+1)j+1) \|a\|_{s-1,\rho} \Gamma(1+(s+1)j)}{\Gamma(1+(s+1)(j+1))},$$

$$\beta_{j,k_1,...,k_m,s} := \frac{j!}{k_1!...k_m!} \frac{\Gamma(1+(s+1)k_1)...\Gamma(1+(s+1)k_m)}{\Gamma(1+(s+1)(j+1))}$$

Observe that all the norms, especially the norm $\|a\|_{s-1,\rho}$, are well-defined since $s \ge 1$.

Following propositions 4.4 and 4.5 allow us to bound the constants $\alpha_{j,s}$ and $\beta_{j,k_1,\ldots,k_m,s}$.

Proposition 4.4. Let $j \ge 0$ be. Then,

(4.6)
$$\frac{((s+1)j+2)((s+1)j+1)\Gamma(1+(s+1)j)}{\Gamma(1+(s+1)(j+1))} \leq 1$$

Proof. Applying the recurrence formula $\Gamma(z+1) = z\Gamma(z)$ twice, we first have

$$((s+1)j+2)((s+1)j+1)\Gamma(1+(s+1)j) = \Gamma(1+(s+1)j+2).$$

Inequality eq. (4.6) follows then from the relations

$$1 + (s+1)(j+1) = 1 + (s+1)j + s + 1 \ge 1 + (s+1)j + 2 \ge 2$$

(we have indeed $s \ge 1$) and from the increase of the Gamma function on $[2; +\infty[$.

Proposition 4.5. Let $j \ge 0$ be and $k_1, ..., k_m \in \mathbb{N}$ such that $k_1 + ... + k_m = j$. Then,

(4.7)
$$\frac{\Gamma(1+(s+1)k_1)...\Gamma(1+(s+1)k_m)}{\Gamma(1+(s+1)(j+1))} \leqslant \frac{k_1!...k_m!}{j!}.$$

Proof. First of all, let us write the left-hand side of inequality eq. (4.7) on the form

$$\frac{\Gamma(1+(s+1)k_1)...\Gamma(1+(s+1)k_m)}{\Gamma(1+(s+1)(j+1))} = \frac{\Gamma(1+(s+1)j)}{\Gamma(1+(s+1)(j+1))}Q_{j,k_1,...,k_m}(s+1),$$

where Q is the function defined on $[0; +\infty[$ by

$$Q_{j,k_1,...,k_m}(q) = \frac{\Gamma(1+k_1q)...\Gamma(1+k_mq)}{\Gamma(1+jq)}$$

Since proposition 4.4 implies

(4.8)
$$\frac{\Gamma(1+(s+1)j)}{\Gamma(1+(s+1)(j+1))} \leq \frac{((s+1)j+2)((s+1)j+1)\Gamma(1+(s+1)j)}{\Gamma(1+(s+1)(j+1))} \leq 1,$$

it is sufficient to prove that

(4.9)
$$Q_{j,k_1,...,k_m}(s+1) \leqslant \frac{k_1!...k_m!}{j!}$$

To this end, let us study the variations of the function Q_{j,k_1,\ldots,k_m} . This latter is derivable on $[0; +\infty[$ and, for all $q \ge 0$, we have

$$Q'_{j,k_1,\dots,k_m}(q) = Q_{j,k_1,\dots,k_m}(q) \left(\sum_{\ell=1}^m k_\ell \psi(1+k_\ell q) - j\psi(1+jq)\right),$$

where $\psi := \Gamma'/\Gamma$ is the Digamma function. Thereby, applying the classical relation (see [1, p. 259] for instance)

$$\psi(1+q) = -\gamma + \sum_{h=1}^{+\infty} \frac{q}{h(h+q)}$$
, $q \ge 0, \gamma :=$ the Euler's constant,

we get

$$Q'_{j,k_1,\dots,k_m}(q) = qQ_{j,k_1,\dots,k_m}(q) \sum_{h=1}^{+\infty} \left(\sum_{\ell=1}^m \frac{k_\ell^2}{h(h+k_\ell q)} - \frac{j^2}{h(h+jq)} \right).$$

Next, lemma 4.6 below shows us that $Q'_{j,k_1,\ldots,k_m}(q) \leq 0$ for all $q \geq 0$ and, consequently, the function Q_{j,k_1,\ldots,k_m} is decreasing on $[0; +\infty[$. Hence,

$$Q_{j,k_1,...,k_m}(q) \leqslant Q_{j,k_1,...,k_m}(1) = \frac{\Gamma(1+k_1)...\Gamma(1+k_m)}{\Gamma(1+j)} = \frac{k_1!...k_m!}{j!}$$

for all $q \ge 1$ and inequality eq. (4.9) stems from the relation $s + 1 \ge 2$. This ends the proof.

Lemma 4.6. Let $q \ge 0$ and $h \ge 1$ be. Then, the inequality

(4.10)
$$\sum_{\ell=1}^{m} \frac{k_{\ell}^2}{h + k_{\ell}q} \leqslant \frac{\left(\sum_{\ell=1}^{m} k_{\ell}\right)^2}{h + \left(\sum_{\ell=1}^{m} k_{\ell}\right)q}$$

holds for all $m \ge 2$ and all $k_1, ..., k_m \ge 0$.

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Proof. We proceed by induction on m. For m = 2, we clearly have

$$\frac{k_1^2}{h+k_1q} + \frac{k_2^2}{h+k_2q} - \frac{(k_1+k_2)^2}{h+(k_1+k_2)q} = \frac{-k_1k_2h(k_1q+k_2q+2h)}{(h+k_1q)(h+k_2q)(h+(k_1+k_2)q)} \le 0.$$

Let us now suppose that inequality eq. (4.10) is true for all $k \in \{2, ..., m\}$ for a certain $m \ge 2$. Then, the successive relations

$$\sum_{\ell=1}^{m+1} \frac{k_{\ell}^2}{h + k_{\ell}q} \leq \frac{\left(\sum_{\ell=1}^m k_{\ell}\right)^2}{h + \left(\sum_{\ell=1}^m k_{\ell}\right)q} + \frac{k_{m+1}^2}{h + k_{m+1}q}$$
$$\leq \frac{\left(\sum_{\ell=1}^m k_{\ell} + k_{m+1}\right)^2}{h + \left(\sum_{\ell=1}^m k_{\ell} + k_{m+1}\right)q} = \frac{\left(\sum_{\ell=1}^{m+1} k_{\ell}\right)^2}{h + \left(\sum_{\ell=1}^m k_{\ell} + k_{m+1}\right)q}$$

hold for any $k_1, ..., k_{m+1} \ge 0$, which achieves the proof.

Let us now apply propositions 4.4 and 4.5: we get

$$\alpha_{j,s} \leq ne^2 \|a\|_{s-1,\rho}$$
 and $\beta_{j,k_1,...,k_m,s} \leq 1$.

Hence, the following inequalities

$$(4.11) \quad \frac{\|u_{j+1,*}\|_{(s+1)(j+1),\rho}}{\Gamma(1+(s+1)(j+1))} \leq \frac{\|f_{j,*}\|_{(s+1)(j+1),\rho}}{\Gamma(1+(s+1)(j+1))} + \\ ne^2 \|a\|_{s-1,\rho} \frac{\|u_{j,*}\|_{(s+1)j,\rho}}{\Gamma(1+(s+1)j)} + \\ \|b\|_{s+1,\rho} \sum_{k_1+\ldots+k_m=j} \frac{\|u_{k_1,*}\|_{(s+1)k_1,\rho}}{\Gamma(1+(s+1)k_1)} \cdots \frac{\|u_{k_m,*}\|_{(s+1)k_m,\rho}}{\Gamma(1+(s+1)k_m)}$$

hold for all $j \ge 0$.

We now shall bound the Nagumo norms $||u_{j,*}||_{(s+1)j,\rho}$ for any j. To do that, we shall proceed similarly as in [5, 45-47] by using a technique of majorant series. However, as we shall see, the calculations are much more complicated.

4.3. A Majorant Series. Let us consider the formal series $v(X) = \sum_{j \ge 0} v_j X^j$, where the coefficients v_j are recursively determined from $v_0 = A$ (see identity eq. (4.5) for the definition of A) by the relations

(4.12)
$$v_{j+1} = \alpha v_j + g_j + \beta \sum_{k_1 + \dots + k_m = j} v_{k_1} \dots v_{k_m}$$

with $\alpha:=ne^2\,\|a\|_{s-1,\rho},\,\beta:=\|b\|_{s+1,\rho}$ and

$$g_j := \frac{\|f_{j,*}\|_{(s+1)(j+1),\rho}}{\Gamma(1+(s+1)(j+1))}.$$

By construction, we have

(4.13)
$$0 \leq \frac{\|u_{j,*}\|_{(s+1)j,\rho}}{\Gamma(1+(s+1)j)} \leq v_j$$

for all $j \ge 0$ (proceed by induction on j). Following proposition 4.7 allows us to bound the v_j 's.

Proposition 4.7. The formal series v(X) is convergent. In particular, there exist two positive constants C', K' > 0 such that $v_j \leq C'K'^j$ for all $j \geq 0$.

Proof. It is sufficient to prove the convergence of v(X).

First of all, let us observe that v(X) is the unique formal power series in X solution of the functional equation

(4.14)
$$(1 - \alpha X)v(X) = \beta X(v(X))^m + h(X),$$

where

$$h(X) := A + X \sum_{j \ge 0} g_j X^j$$

is a convergent power series with nonnegative coefficients. Indeed, according to the assumption on the f_j 's (see inequality eq. (4.1) at the beginning of section 4) and inequality eq. (4.8), we have

$$0 \leq g_j \leq \frac{CK^j \Gamma(1 + (s+1)j)\rho^{(s+1)(j+1)}}{\Gamma(1 + (s+1)(j+1))} \leq C\rho^{s+1} (K\rho^{s+1})^j.$$

We denote in the sequel by $r_h > 0$ the radius of convergence of h.

Next, we proceed through a fixed point method as follows. Let us set

$$V(X) = \sum_{i \ge 0} V_i(X)$$

and let us choose the solution of equation eq. (4.14) given by the system

$$\begin{cases} (1 - \alpha X)V_0(X) = h(X) \\ (1 - \alpha X)V_{i+1}(X) = \beta X \sum_{k_1 + \dots + k_m = i} V_{k_1}(X) \dots V_{k_m}(X) & \text{for } i \ge 0. \end{cases}$$

By induction on $i \ge 0$, we easily check that

(4.15)
$$V_i(X) = \frac{C_{i,m}\beta^i X^i(h(X))^{i(m-1)+1}}{(1-\alpha X)^{im+1}},$$

where the $C_{i,m}$'s are the positive constants recursively determined from $C_{0,m} := 1$ by the relations

$$C_{i+1,m} = \sum_{k_1 + \dots + k_m = i} C_{k_1,m} \dots C_{k_m,m}.$$

Thereby, all the V_i 's are analytic functions on the disc with center $0 \in \mathbb{C}$ and radius $\min(1/\alpha, r_h)$. Moreover, identities eq. (4.15) tell us that $V_i(X)$ is of order X^i for all $i \ge 0$. Consequently, the series V(X) makes sense as a formal power series in X and we get V(X) = v(X) by unicity.

We are left to prove the convergence of V(X). To do that, let us choose $0 < r < \min(1/\alpha, r_h)$. By definition, the constants $C_{i,m}$'s are the generalized Catalan

numbers of order m^4 and we have

$$C_{i,m} = \frac{1}{(m-1)i+1} \binom{im}{i} \le 2^{im}$$

for all $i \ge 0$ (see [13, 15, 44] for instance). On the other hand, the convergent series h(X) defines an increasing function on [0, r]. Therefore, identities eq. (4.15) imply the inequalities

$$|V_i(X)| \leq \frac{h(r)}{1 - \alpha r} \left(\frac{2^m \beta(h(r))^{m-1}}{(1 - \alpha r)^m} |X|\right)^i$$

for all $i \ge 0$ and all $|X| \le r$. Consequently, the series V(X) is normally convergent on any disc with center $0 \in \mathbb{C}$ and radius

$$0 < r' < \min\left(r, \frac{(1-\alpha r)^m}{2^m \beta(h(r))^{m-1}}\right).$$

This proves the analyticity of V(X) at 0 and achieves then the proof of proposition 4.7.

According to relations eq. (4.13), proposition 4.7 allows us to also bound the Nagumo norms $||u_{j,*}||_{(s+1)j,\rho}$.

Corollary 4.8. Let C', K' > 0 be as in proposition 4.7. Then, the inequalities

$$||u_{j,*}||_{(s+1)j,\rho} \leq C' K'^{j} \Gamma(1+(s+1)j)$$

hold for all $j \ge 0$.

We are now able to conclude the proof of theorem 3.1.

4.4. **Conclusion.** We must prove on the sup-norm of the $u_j(x)$ estimates similar to the ones on the norms $||u_{j,*}||_{(s+1)j,\rho}$ (see corollary 4.8). To this end, we proceed by shrinking the closed polydisc $||x|| \leq \rho$. Let $0 < \rho' < \rho$. Then, for all $j \geq 0$ and all $||x|| \leq \rho'$, we have

$$|u_{j,*}(x)| = \left| u_{j,*}(x)d_{\rho}(x)^{(s+1)j} \frac{1}{d_{\rho}(x)^{(s+1)j}} \right| \leq \frac{\left| u_{j,*}(x)d_{\rho}(x)^{(s+1)j} \right|}{(\rho - \rho')^{(s+1)j}} \leq \frac{\left\| u_{j,*} \right\|_{(s+1)j,\rho}}{(\rho - \rho')^{(s+1)j}}$$

and, consequently,

$$\sup_{\|x\| \leq \rho'} |u_{j,*}(x)| \leq C' \left(\frac{K'}{(\rho - \rho')^{s+1}}\right)^j \Gamma(1 + (s+1)j)$$

by applying corollary 4.8. This ends the proof of theorem 3.1.

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⁴These numbers were named in honor of the Belgian mathematician Eugène Charles Catalan (1814-1894). They appear in many probabilist, graphs and combinatorial problems. For example, they can be seen as the number of *m*-ary trees with *i* source-nodes, or as the number of ways of associating *i* applications of a given *m*-ary operation, or as the number of ways of subdividing a convex polygon into *i* disjoint (m + 1)-gons by means of non-intersecting diagonals. They also appear in theoretical computers through the generalized Dyck words. See for instance [13] and the references inside.
