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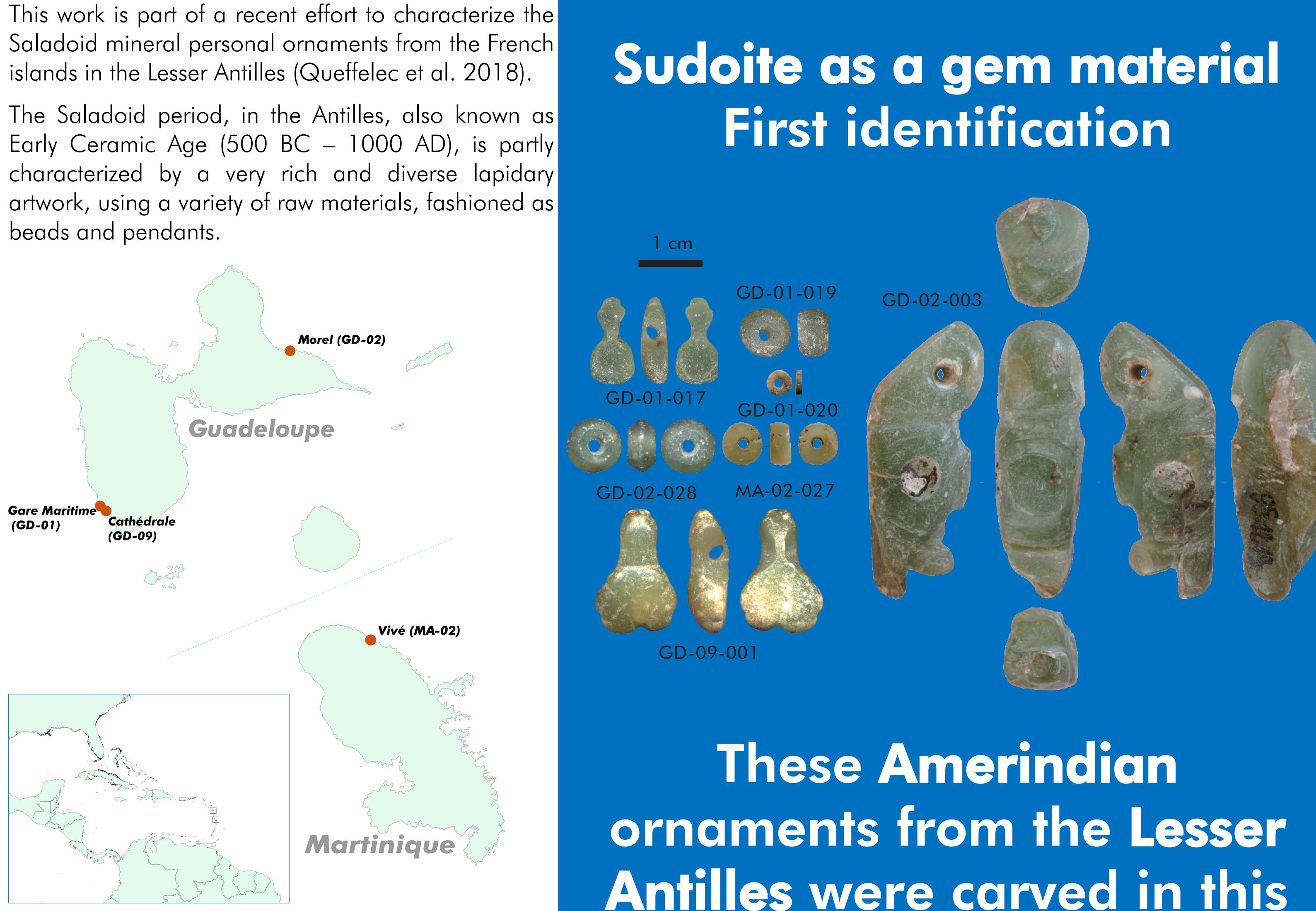

INTRODUCTION



METHOD

Raman spectroscopy (Bruker Senterra, 532 nm excitation).

XRD was performed using a rotating anode set-up, both in transmission (100 μ m beam) and low angle reflection (5°, 30 μ m beam).

XRF (Bruker Tracer 5i, 15 kV, 100 μ A, 120 s, vacuum)

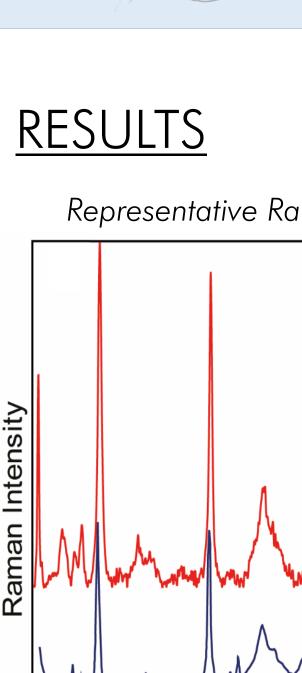


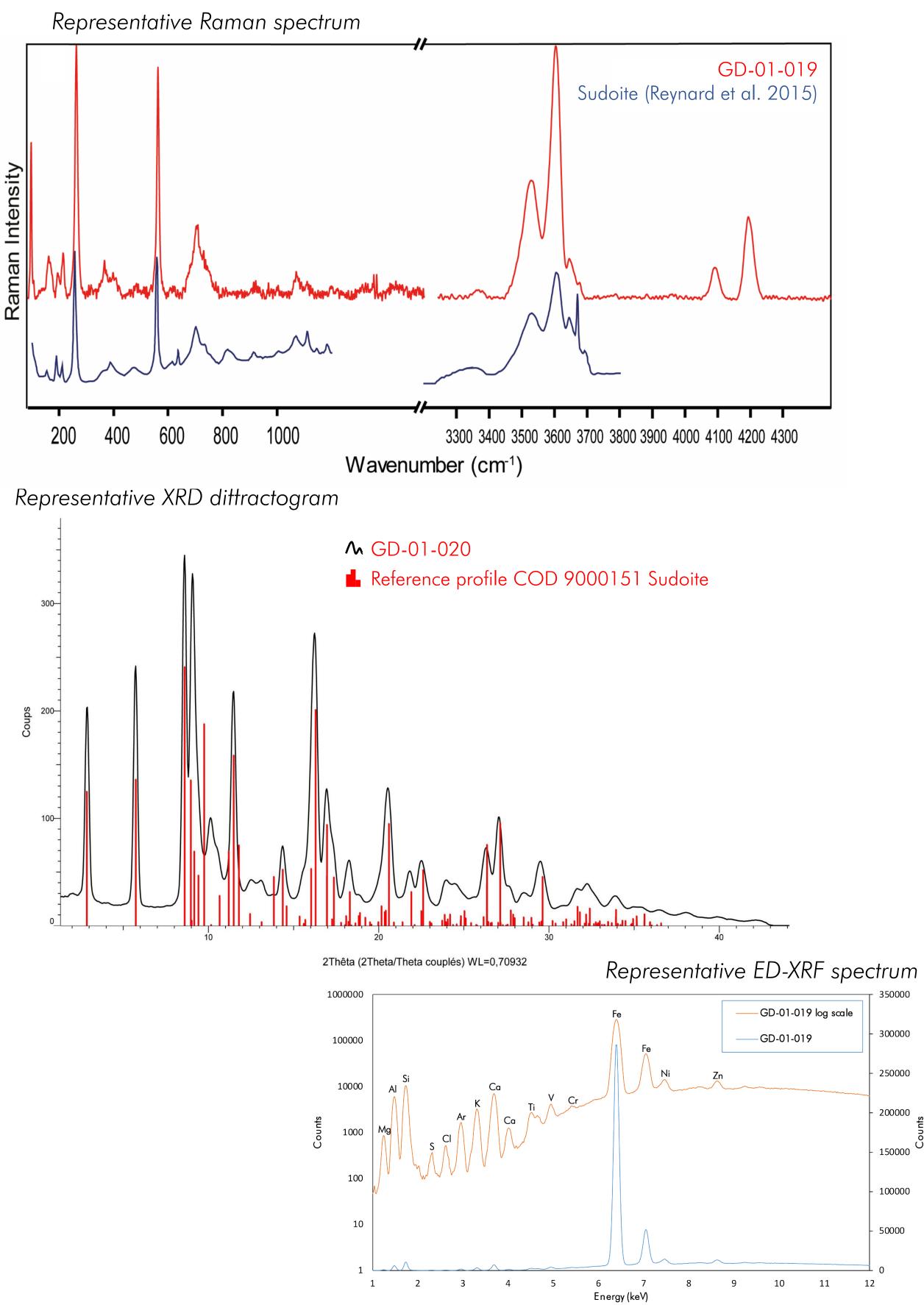
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Sudoite is typically white to light green. As all minerals from the chlorite group, it is soft and thus easy to carve.

DISCUSSION

This mineral has never been identified so far as a gem or ornamental material. It is thus a new type of the archaeological greenstones.

Sudoite is known from several metamorphic environments, especially in subductions zones. Therefore it is not surprising to find it in the Lesser Antilles, but its specific source remains unknown.

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
