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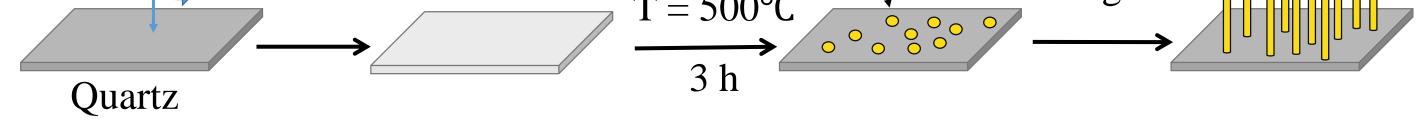

oxidative free radical after being illuminated by UV light. Taking the advantages of these chemical properties, the environmental applications were developed by many research groups using micro-nano technologies. Furthermore, ZnO has biocompatibility advantage, and easy to obtain the high aspect ratio nanowires (NWs) via low-cost synthesis method with the further advantage of being firmly anchored to the substrate, leading to more sustainable applications.

**Photocatalysis principle** 

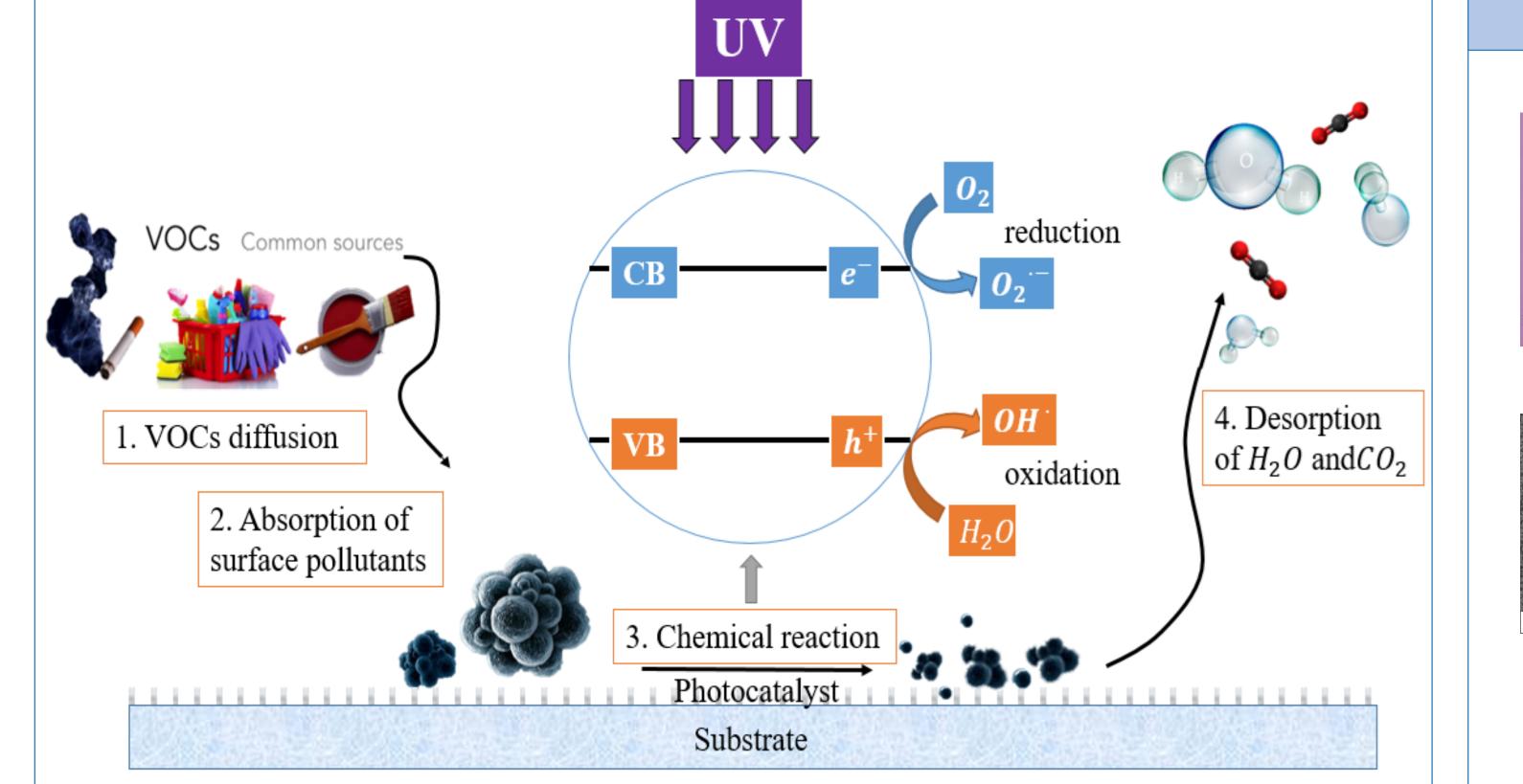


### Two steps hydrothermal synthesis diagram

(1) Seedlayer deposition (At room temperature via spin-coating)  $PVA + Zn(Ac)_2 = 200\mu L / cm^2$ 

(2) ZnO nanowires growth (At 90 °C for 2 hours)  $25mM Zn(NO_3)_2 + 12.5 mM HMTA$ 

## **Characterization of ZnO NWs**



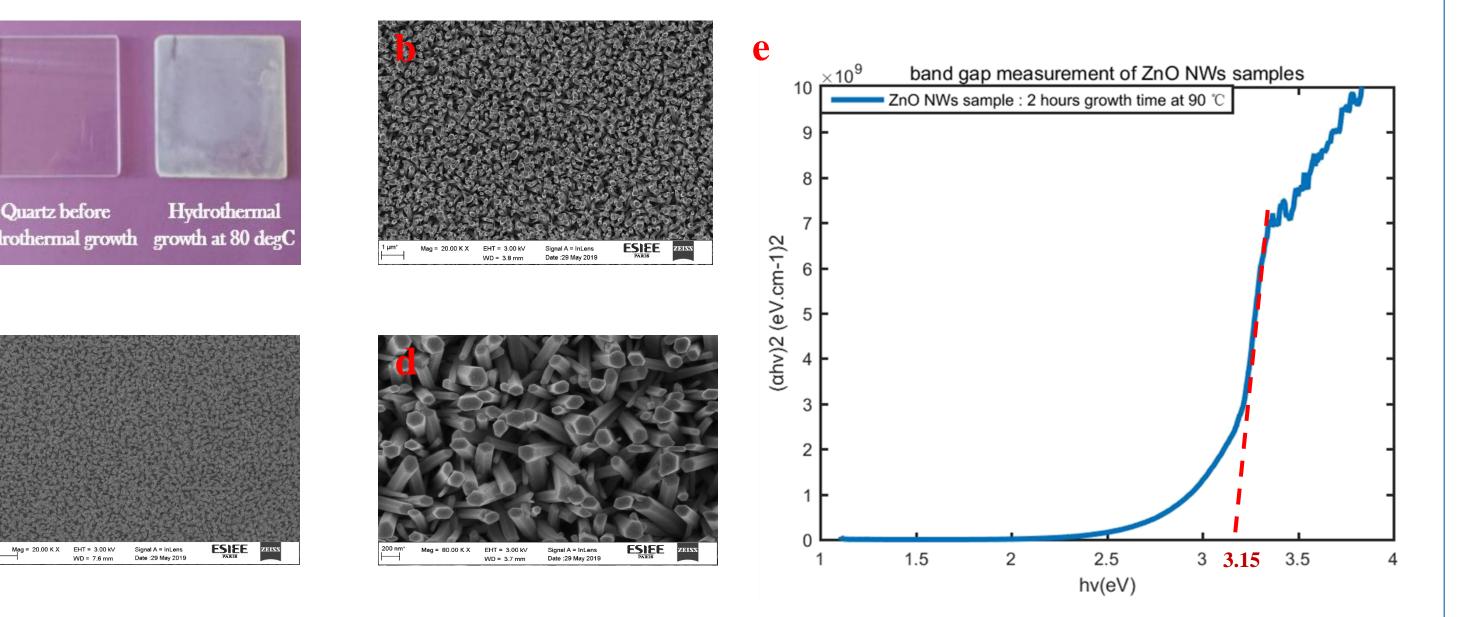


Diagram of photocatalysis principle

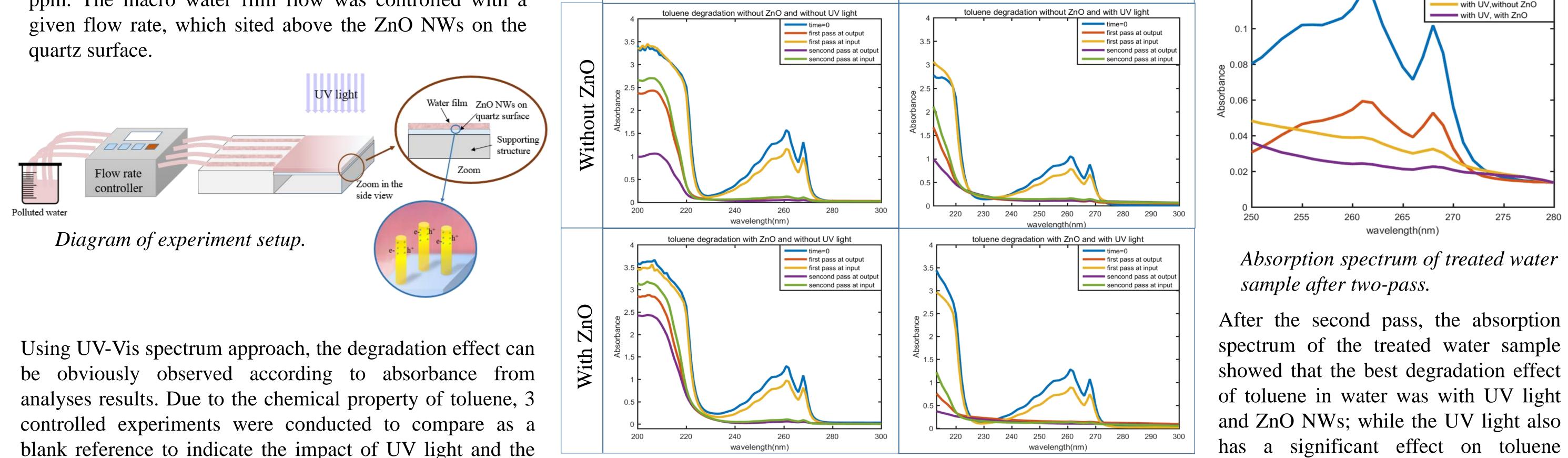

### **Degradation of toluene**

Without UV

The polluted water sample was prepared with toluene (volatile organic compounds) with the concertation of 530 ppm. The macro water film flow was controlled with a



blank reference to indicate the impact of UV light and the surrounding atmosphere.

of toluene in water was with UV light and ZnO NWs; while the UV light also has a significant effect on toluene degradation.

Degradation effect of toluene in different conditions.



• A homogeneous ZnO NWs has been successfully grown on the quartz surface via SEM observation, with a band gap of ~ 3.15 eV.

• The best performance of toluene degradation in water can be observed under UV light with ZnO NWs. The blank comparison experiments offset the volatile effect, which illustrates a further verification of ZnO NWs degradation effect with UV light.

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
