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Study of the Relationships between Homogenization of Standardized Milk and Milk Fat and Meltability and Stretchability of Emmental Cheese

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Melting and stretching abilities of heese are of great significance since 75 % of French Emmental production are consumed in a cooked form. The fat content and fat globule membrane state are expected to play a key role in cooking properties of cheese (1). The aim of this work was to study the influence of milk fat homogenization on the melting and stretching of Emmental cheese.

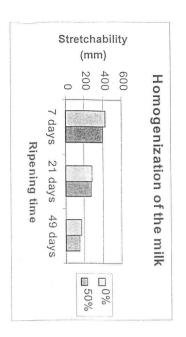
