In the context of a new curriculum, CentraleSupélec proposes a new core course on *Systems Modeling – Model Representations and Analysis* for all the first year students. The students learn how to represent the behavior of a system with a well-suited model and how to evaluate the validity domain of the proposed model.

In order to make the course easy-understandable, interactive and attractive for students, Matlab-based tutorials were proposed. In addition, 201 mini-projects were proposed, developed (using either Matlab/Simulink or Python) and peer reviewed (via Edunao) by the students.

Advantages of using MATLAB (and Simulink):

- Simulate and analyze the behavior of the proposed models (continuous-time or discrete-time models, continuous-state or discrete-state models)
- Gain experience by practicing the modeling process during a mini-project with numerous application fields (energy, robotics, health, financial modeling, nature, sociology, etc.)
- Stimulate students' creativity via 201 mini-projects
