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Homogenization of perforated elastic structures

Abstract

The paper is dedicated to the asymptotic behavior of periodically perforated elastic domains (3D, plate-like or beam-like). We homogenize these structures, passing to the limit w.r.t. the period. In case of plate-like or beam-like structures we simultaneously proceed to a dimension reduction. These periodic structures can be made e.g. of balls or cylinders glued, so that the surface in contact has a non-zero measure. Since the boundaries of these structures might be non-Lipschitz, the classical extension approach does not serve. We will proceed using interpolations. The Korn inequalities in the case of thin structures are based on the decomposition of beam or plate displacements. For the asymptotic behavior the unfolding and rescaling operators are used.

1 Introduction

This paper concerns the linearized elasticity problem posed in periodic domains. These domains are obtained by reproducing periodically a cell of size ε in order to get a beam-like, plate-like or 3D structures fixed on a part Γ_{ε} of their exterior boundary. The ε -cells are made by elastic materials. The reference cell is denoted \mathbf{C} . We assume that \mathbf{C} has a Lipschitz boundary and that two neighboring cells $\overline{\mathbf{C}} \cup (\overline{\mathbf{C}} + \mathbf{e}_i)$, $i = \overline{1, N}$ are connected. Under these assumptions, the whole periodic structure might not have a Lipschitz boundary.

Our aim is to give the asymptotic behavior of these elastic periodic structures as ε tends to 0. Since these structures might not be Lipschitz, one of the main difficulties is to obtain a priori estimates. The classical extension approach (see [16]) and the Korn inequalities for Lipschitz domains (see [4, 5]) cannot be used. Thus, in order to derive a priori estimates we used interpolations suggested in [9, Section 5.5]. This makes it possible to prove Korn inequalities with constants independent of ε . Note that in the case of a beam-like and a plate-like domains the derivation of Korn inequalities are also based on the decomposition of beam or plate displacements. These decompositions have been introduced in [3, 11].

To derive the limit problems we use the periodic unfolding method introduced in [7]. Since then this method has been applied to a vast number of different problems such as problems in perforated domains [6], contact problems [13, 15], problems including a thin layer [14], problems for structures made of curved rods [10], problems in domain with "rough boundary" [1, 2], to name but a few. In this context we would like to mention the first book [9] devoted to the periodic unfolding method. It contains not only the detailed theory underlying this method but a lot of examples of its application to different partial differential problems. Application procedure of the periodic unfolding method that we used here is standard and includes of the following steps: depending on the problem introduce and apply an appropriate unfolding operator, using a priori estimates for the displacement obtain uniform estimate for the unfolded displacement, which, in turn, are used to pass to a weak limit in fixed space, establish an unfolded limit problem, which can be used for extracting a homogenized problem.

As a general reference for the homogenization of elasticity problems in 3D periodically perforated domains with Lipschitz boundary we refer to [16]. In the case of heterogeneous plate-like domain we mention [9, Chapter V] where the interaction of homogenization and domain reduction, involving two small parameters such as plate thickness δ and periodicity ε in its large dimensions was investigated. For similar results in the case of a beam-like domain we refer to [12]. The novelty of this paper is the extension of the results to non-Lipschitz perforated domains.

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The paper is organized as follows. Sections 2, 3 and 4 deal with a N-dimensional (3D-like domain particular), plate-like and beam-like domains respectively. For each of them we begin by introducing the notations and by describing the geometry. Then, taking into account of the particularity of the geometry we introduce the unfolding operator for every case, derive weak limits of the fields, specify the limit problem and finally characterize the limit fields. Towards the end of the paper in Appendix we derive Korn's type inequalities for N-dimensional, plate-like and beam-like domains which are used to obtain the a priori estimates for the displacements.

Throughout this paper we use Einstein's summation convention. Moreover, in all the estimates the constants do not depend on ε .

2 N-dimensional periodic domain

2.1 Notations and geometric setting

Let $\Omega \subset \mathbb{R}^N$, $N \in \mathbb{N} \setminus \{0,1\}$, be a bounded domain with a Lipschitz boundary and Γ be a subset of $\partial \Omega$ with non null measure. We assume that there exists an open set Ω' with a Lipschitz boundary such that $\Omega \subset \Omega'$ and $\Omega' \cap \partial \Omega = \Gamma$.

Denote

- $Y \doteq (-1/2, 1/2)^N$,
- $\mathbf{C} \subset Y$ a domain with Lipschitz boundary such that interior $(\overline{\mathbf{C}} \cup (\overline{\mathbf{C}} + \mathbf{e}_i))$, $i = \overline{1, N}$, is connected,


Note that the domains Ω_{ε}^* , $\Omega_{\varepsilon}^{\prime *}$ are connected.

We are interested in the elastic behavior of a structure occupying the domain Ω_{ε}^* which is fixed on the part of its boundary. The space of all admissible displacements is denoted \mathbf{V}_{ε}

$$\mathbf{V}_{\varepsilon} = \big\{ u \in H^1(\Omega_{\varepsilon}^*)^N \ \mid \ \exists u' \in H^1(\Omega_{\varepsilon}'^*)^N \text{ such that } u'_{\mid \Omega_{\varepsilon}^*} = u \text{ and } u' = 0 \text{ in } \Omega_{\varepsilon}'^* \setminus \overline{\Omega_{\varepsilon}^*} \big\}.$$

It means that the displacements belonging to \mathbf{V}_{ε} "vanish" on a part Γ_{ε} of $\partial \Omega_{\varepsilon}^*$.

Remark 2.1. Note that the domain Ω_{ε}^* might not be Lipschitz (see e.g. Figure 2.1). In this case one can not extend the displacement in the holes of this domain.






Figure 1: Sets Ω , Ω_{ε}^{*} , Ω' , $\Omega_{\varepsilon}'^{*}$ and Ξ_{ε} , Ξ_{ε}' .

For $u \in H^1(\Omega_{\varepsilon}^*)^N$ we denote by e the stress tensor

Let $a_{ijkl} \in L^{\infty}(\mathbf{C}), i, j, k, l = \overline{1, N}$ be functions that satisfy the following conditions:

- $a_{ijkl}(X) = a_{jikl}(X) = a_{klij}(X)$ for a.e. $X \in \mathbf{C}$
- for any $\tau \in M_s^{N \times N}$, where $M_s^{N \times N}$ is the space of $N \times N$ symmetric matrices, there exists $c_0 > 0$ such that

The constitutive law for the material occupying the domain Ω_{ε}^* is given by the relation between the strain tensor and the stress tensor

where the coefficients a_{ijkl}^{ε} are given by

Let f be in $L^2(\Omega_1)^N$, one defines the applied forces f_{ε} by

The unknown displacement $u_{\varepsilon}: \Omega_{\varepsilon}^* \to \mathbb{R}^N$ is the solution to the linearized elasticity system:

where ν_{ε} is the outward normal vector to $\partial\Omega_{\varepsilon}^*$. The variational formulation of (2.5) is:

2.2 Preliminary results

The following lemma is a simple consequence of Proposition 5.2 in Appendix.

Lemma 2.1. For every $u \in \mathbf{V}_{\varepsilon}$ one has

$$||u||_{H^1(\Omega_x^*)} \le C||e(u)||_{L^2(\Omega_x^*)}. \tag{2.7}$$

Lemma 2.2. The solution u_{ε} of problem (2.5) satisfies

Proof. Taking into account (2.7), we have

2.3 The unfolding operator

The unfolding operator is defined in a similar way as for domains with holes (see [9]).

Definition 2.1. For every measurable function $\phi: \Omega_{\varepsilon}^* \to \mathbb{R}$ the unfolding operator $\mathcal{T}_{\varepsilon}^*: \Omega_{\varepsilon}^{ext} \times \mathbf{C} \to \mathbb{R}$ is defined as follows:

Below are some properties of $\mathcal{T}_{\varepsilon}^*$, they are similar to those of the unfolding operators introduced [9]. That is due to the fact that

As a consequence of the estimate (2.8) and Proposition 2.1, one obtains that the solution to (2.5) satisfies

2.4 Weak limits of the fields and the limit problem

Set

$$\begin{split} e_{ij}(v_{\varepsilon})(x) &= e_{ij}(\Psi)(x) + \varepsilon e_{ij}(\psi_{\varepsilon}\varphi)(x) \\ &= e_{ij}(\Psi)(x) + e_{X,ij}(\psi) \Big(\frac{x}{\varepsilon}\Big)\varphi(x) + \frac{\varepsilon}{2}\Big(\psi_{j}\Big(\frac{x}{\varepsilon}\Big)\frac{\partial\varphi}{\partial x_{i}}(x) + \psi_{i}\Big(\frac{x}{\varepsilon}\Big)\frac{\partial\varphi}{\partial x_{j}}(x)\Big) \\ &= e_{ij}(\Psi)(x) + e_{X,ij}(\psi)(X)\varphi(x) + \frac{\varepsilon}{2}\Big(\psi_{j}(X)\frac{\partial\varphi}{\partial x_{i}}(x) + \psi_{i}(X)\frac{\partial\varphi}{\partial x_{j}}(x)\Big), \quad x \in \Omega_{\varepsilon}^{*}, \ i, j = \overline{1, N}. \end{split}$$

Then, transform by $\mathcal{T}_{\varepsilon}^*$, that gives

$$\mathcal{T}_{\varepsilon}^*(v_{\varepsilon}) \to \Psi$$
 strongly in $L^2(\Omega \times \mathbf{C})^N$,
 $\mathcal{T}_{\varepsilon}^*(e(v_{\varepsilon})) \to e(\Psi) + e_X(\psi)\varphi$ strongly in $L^2(\Omega \times \mathbf{C})^{N \times N}$.

Unfolding the left hand side of (2.6) and using $||e(v_{\varepsilon})||_{L^{2}(\Lambda_{\varepsilon}^{ext})} = ||e(\Psi)||_{L^{2}(\Lambda_{\varepsilon}^{ext})} \longrightarrow 0$, then passing to the limit we obtain

$$\int_{\Omega_{\varepsilon}^{*}} \sigma^{\varepsilon}(u_{\varepsilon}) : e(v_{\varepsilon}) dx = \int_{\Omega_{\varepsilon}^{ext} \times \mathbf{C}} \mathcal{T}_{\varepsilon}^{*}(\sigma^{\varepsilon}(u_{\varepsilon})) : \mathcal{T}_{\varepsilon}^{*}(e(v_{\varepsilon})) dx dX
= \int_{\Omega \times \mathbf{C}} \mathcal{T}_{\varepsilon}^{*}(\sigma^{\varepsilon}(u_{\varepsilon})) : \mathcal{T}_{\varepsilon}^{*}(e(v_{\varepsilon})) dx dX + \int_{\Lambda^{ext}} \sigma^{\varepsilon}(u_{\varepsilon}) : e(v_{\varepsilon}) dx
\longrightarrow \int_{\Omega \times \mathbf{C}} a_{ijkl}(e_{kl}(u) + e_{X,kl}(\widehat{u}))(e_{ij}(\Psi) + e_{X,ij}(\psi)\varphi) dx dX.$$

¹Every function in $H^1_{\Gamma}(\Omega)$ is extended in a function in $H^1_{\Gamma}(\Omega')$ which vanishes in $\Omega' \setminus \overline{\Omega}$.

Taking into account (2.4) and using $||v_{\varepsilon}||_{L^{2}(\Lambda_{\varepsilon}^{ext})} = ||\Psi||_{L^{2}(\Lambda_{\varepsilon}^{ext})} \longrightarrow 0$ we have

$$\int_{\Omega_{\varepsilon}^{*}} f \cdot v_{\varepsilon} dx = \int_{\Omega_{\varepsilon}^{ext} \times \mathbf{C}} \mathcal{T}_{\varepsilon}^{*}(f) \cdot \mathcal{T}_{\varepsilon}^{*}(v_{\varepsilon}) dx dX = \int_{\Omega \times \mathbf{C}} \mathcal{T}_{\varepsilon}^{*}(f) \cdot \mathcal{T}_{\varepsilon}^{*}(v_{\varepsilon}) dx dX + \int_{\Lambda^{ext}} f \cdot v_{\varepsilon} dx$$

$$\longrightarrow \int_{\Omega \times \mathbf{C}} f(x) \cdot \Psi(x) dx dX = |\mathbf{C}| \int_{\Omega} f(x) \cdot \Psi(x) dx.$$

Hence, the above convergences lead to

$$\int_{\Omega \times \mathbf{C}} a_{ijkl}(e_{kl}(u) + e_{X,kl}(\widehat{u}))(e_{ij}(\Psi) + e_{X,ij}(\psi)\varphi) dx dX = |\mathbf{C}| \int_{\Omega} f \cdot \Psi dx.$$

Finally, since the functions $\Psi \in H^1(\Omega_1)^N$ such that $\Psi = 0$ in $\Omega_1 \cap (\Omega' \setminus \overline{\Omega})$ are dense in $H^1_{\Gamma}(\Omega)$ and the tensor product $\mathcal{D}(\Omega) \otimes H^1_{N,per,0}(\mathbf{C})$ is dense in $L^2(\Omega; H^1_{N,per,0}(\mathbf{C}))$ we obtain (2.12).

The solution to the variational problem (2.12) is unique. Indeed, if there are two solutions (u_1, \hat{u}_1) and (u_2, \hat{u}_2) to this problem, denote $v = u_1 - u_2$ and $\hat{v} = \hat{u}_1 - \hat{u}_2$. Taking into account the respective equalities from (2.12) and choosing the test functions v, \hat{v} , we obtain

$$\int_{\Omega \times \mathbf{C}} a_{ijkl} (e_{kl}(v) + e_{X,kl}(\widehat{v})) (e_{ij}(v) + e_{X,ij}(\widehat{v})) dx dX = 0.$$

Using property (2.2) of tensor $\{a_{ijkl}\}$ yields

So $e(\hat{v}) = -e(v)$ and thus the field \hat{v} is an affine function with respect to X. Since it is periodic with respect to X and belongs to $L^2(\Omega; H^1_{N,per,0}(\mathbf{C}))^N$ it is equal to 0. Hence, e(v) = 0 and due to the boundary conditions v = 0. Finally, the whole sequences in (2.13) converge to their limits.

Now, we prove the strong convergence (2.11)₃. By Proposition 2.1, (2.6), (2.12) we have

$$\begin{split} &\int_{\Omega\times\mathbf{C}} a_{ijkl} \big(e_{kl}(u) + e_{X,kl}(\widehat{u})\big) \big(e_{kl}(u) + e_{X,kl}(\widehat{u})\big) \, dx \, dX \\ &\leq \liminf_{\varepsilon\to 0} \int_{\Omega\times\mathbf{C}} \mathcal{T}_{\varepsilon}^* (a_{ijkl}^{\varepsilon}) \mathcal{T}_{\varepsilon}^* (e_{kl}(u_{\varepsilon})) \mathcal{T}_{\varepsilon}^* (e_{ij}(u_{\varepsilon})) \, dx \, dX \\ &\leq \liminf_{\varepsilon\to 0} \int_{\Omega\times\mathbf{C}} a_{ijkl} \, \mathcal{T}_{\varepsilon}^* (e_{kl}(u_{\varepsilon})) \mathcal{T}_{\varepsilon}^* (e_{ij}(u_{\varepsilon})) \, dx \, dX + \liminf_{\varepsilon\to 0} \int_{\Lambda^{\text{ext}}} \sigma^{\varepsilon}(u_{\varepsilon}) : e(v_{\varepsilon}) \, dx \\ &\leq \liminf_{\varepsilon\to 0} \int_{\Omega_{\varepsilon}^*} \sigma(u_{\varepsilon}) : e(u_{\varepsilon}) \, dx \leq \limsup_{\varepsilon\to 0} \int_{\Omega_{\varepsilon}^*} \sigma(u_{\varepsilon}) : e(u_{\varepsilon}) \, dx = \limsup_{\varepsilon\to 0} \int_{\Omega_{\varepsilon}^*} f \cdot u_{\varepsilon} \, dx \\ &= |\mathbf{C}| \int_{\Omega\times\mathbf{C}} f \cdot u \, dx = \int_{\Omega\times\mathbf{C}} a_{ijkl} \big(e_{kl}(u) + e_{X,kl}(\widehat{u})\big) \big(e_{kl}(u) + e_{X,kl}(\widehat{u})\big) \, dx \, dX. \end{split}$$

The strong convergence $(2.11)_3$ holds.

2.5 Homogenization

In this section we give the expressions of the microscopic field \hat{u} in terms of the macroscopic displacement u. First, taking $\Psi = 0$ as a test function in (2.12), we obtain

This shows that the displacement \hat{u} can be written in terms of the elements of the tensor e(u). Denote by \mathbf{M}^{np} the $N \times N$ symmetric matrix with following coefficients

$$\mathbf{M}_{kl}^{np} = \frac{1}{2} (\delta_{kn} \delta_{lp} + \delta_{kp} \delta_{ln}), \qquad n, p, k, l \in \overline{1, N},$$

where δ_{ij} is the Kronecker's symbol.

Since the tensor e(u) has N^2 components, we introduce the N^2 correctors

$$\widehat{\chi}_{np} \in H^1_{per,0}(\mathbf{C})^N \qquad n, p = \overline{1, N},$$

which are the solutions to the following cell problems:

$$\int_{\mathbf{C}} a_{ijkl} \left(e_{X,kl}(\widehat{\chi}_{np}) + \mathbf{M}_{kl}^{np} \right) e_{X,ij}(\widehat{\Phi}) dX = 0, \qquad \forall \widehat{\Phi} \in H^1_{per,0}(\mathbf{C})^N.$$
(2.14)

Observe that $\widehat{\chi}_{np} = \widehat{\chi}_{pn}$. As a consequence, the function \widehat{u} is written in the form

$$\widehat{u}(x,X) = \sum_{n,p=1}^{N} e_{np}(u)(x)\widehat{\chi}_{np}(X) \quad \text{for a.e. } (x,X) \in \Omega \times \mathbf{C}.$$
(2.15)

Theorem 2.1. The limit displacement $u \in H^1_{\Gamma}(\Omega)^N$ is the solution to the following homogenized problem:

(2.16)

where

$$a_{ijkl}^{hom} = \frac{1}{|\mathbf{C}|} \int_{\mathbf{C}} a_{ijnp} \left(\mathbf{M}_{np}^{kl} + e_{X,np}(\widehat{\chi}_{kl}) \right) dX. \tag{2.17}$$

Proof. Taking $\widehat{\Phi} = 0$ as a test function in (2.12) and using (2.15) give

$$\int_{\Omega \times \mathbf{C}} a_{ijkl} (e_{kl}(u) + e_{np}(u) e_{X,kl}(\widehat{\chi}_{np})) e_{ij}(\Psi) dx dX = |\mathbf{C}| \int_{\Omega} f \cdot \Psi dx \quad \forall \Psi \in H^1_{\Gamma}(\Omega)^N.$$

After straightforward calculations we have

$$\int_{\Omega \times \mathbf{C}} a_{ijkl} \left(M_{kl}^{np} e_{np}(u) + e_{X,kl}(\widehat{\chi}_{np}) e_{np}(u) \right) e_{ij}(\Psi) \, dx \, dX = |\mathbf{C}| \int_{\Omega} f \cdot \Psi \, dx,$$

$$\int_{\Omega} \left(\int_{\mathbf{C}} a_{ijkl} \left(\mathbf{M}_{kl}^{np} + e_{X,kl}(\widehat{\chi}_{np}) \right) dX \right) e_{np}(u) \, e_{ij}(\Psi) \, dx = |\mathbf{C}| \int_{\Omega} f \cdot \Psi \, dx, \quad \forall \Psi \in H_{\Gamma}^{1}(\Omega)^{N}$$

and the assertion of the theorem follows.

Lemma 2.4. The left-hand side operator in problem (2.16) is uniformly elliptic.

Proof. Using formulas (2.17) of the homogenized coefficients and (2.14), we obtain

where

$$M = \tau_{np} \mathbf{M}^{np}, \qquad \Psi = \tau_{np} \widehat{\chi}_{np}.$$

Then, in view of (2.2) and following the proof of [9, Lemma 11.19], we have

$$a_{npn'p'}^{hom}\tau_{np}\tau_{n'p'} \ge \frac{c_0}{|\mathbf{C}|} \int_{\mathbf{C}} \left(e_{X,ij}(\Psi) + M_{ij}\right) \left(e_{X,ij}(\Psi) + M_{ij}\right) dX \ge c_0 \tau_{np} \tau_{np}$$

which ends the proof.

3 Periodic plate

3.1 Notations and geometric setting

In this section, we consider a bounded domain ω in \mathbb{R}^2 with Lipschitz boundary. Denote:

• γ a subset of $\partial \omega$ with a non null measure. We assume that there exists a bounded domain ω' with Lipschitz boundary such that

- $\Gamma_{\varepsilon} \doteq \gamma \times (-\varepsilon/2, \varepsilon/2),$

- $\mathbf{C} \subset Y$ a domain with Lipschitz boundary such that interior $(\overline{\mathbf{C}} \cup (\overline{\mathbf{C}} + \mathbf{e}_i))$, $i = \overline{1,2}$, is connected,
- $\Xi_{\varepsilon} \doteq \{ \xi \in \mathbb{Z}^2 \mid (\varepsilon \xi + \varepsilon Y') \cap \omega \neq \emptyset \}, \ \Xi'_{\varepsilon} \doteq \{ \xi \in \mathbb{Z}^2 \mid (\varepsilon \xi + \varepsilon Y') \cap \omega' \neq \emptyset \},$
- $\Omega_{\varepsilon}^* = \operatorname{interior}\left(\bigcup_{\xi \in \Xi_{\varepsilon}} (\varepsilon \xi + \varepsilon \overline{\mathbf{C}})\right), \Omega_{\varepsilon}^{\prime *} \doteq \operatorname{interior}\left(\bigcup_{\xi \in \Xi_{\varepsilon}^{\prime}} (\varepsilon \xi + \varepsilon \overline{\mathbf{C}})\right),$
- $\omega_{\varepsilon}^{\text{ext}} = \operatorname{interior}\left(\bigcup_{\xi \in \Xi_{\varepsilon}} (\varepsilon \xi + \varepsilon \overline{Y'})\right), \quad \omega_1 = \left\{x \in \mathbb{R}^2 \mid \operatorname{dist}(x, \omega) < 1\right\}, \ \omega \subset \omega_1,$
- $\omega_{3\varepsilon}^{'int} = \{x \in \omega \mid \operatorname{dist}(x, \partial \omega') > 3\varepsilon\}, \ \Xi_{\varepsilon}^{'int} \doteq \{\xi \in \Xi_{\varepsilon} \mid (\varepsilon \xi + \varepsilon Y') \cap \omega_{3\varepsilon}^{'int} \neq \emptyset\},\$
- $\Omega'^{int}_{\varepsilon} \doteq \operatorname{interior}\left(\bigcup_{\xi \in \Xi'^{int}_{\varepsilon}} (\varepsilon \xi + \varepsilon \overline{\mathbf{C}})\right)$.

Note that the domain Ω_{ε}^* is a connected open set and if ε is small enough, we have $\Omega_{\varepsilon}^* \subset \omega_1 \times (-\varepsilon/2, \varepsilon/2)$. The space of all admissible displacements is denoted by \mathbf{V}_{ε} :

We are interested in the elastic behavior of a structure occupying the domain Ω_{ε}^* and fixed on a part of its boundary (see above).

The constitutive law for the material occupying the domain Ω_{ε}^* is given by the relation between the strain tensor and the stress tensor (see also (2.3))

$$\sigma_{ij}^{\varepsilon}(u) \doteq a_{ijkl}^{\varepsilon} e_{kl}(u) \quad \forall u \in \mathbf{V}_{\varepsilon},$$

where the coefficients a_{ijkl}^{ε} the same as in Subsection 2.1.

Let f be in $L^2(\omega_1)^3$. We define the applied forces f_{ε} as follows

$$f_{\varepsilon,\alpha} = \varepsilon^2 f_{\alpha}|_{\Omega_{\varepsilon}^*}, \quad f_{\varepsilon,3} = \varepsilon^3 f_3|_{\Omega_{\varepsilon}^*}, \qquad \alpha = 1, 2.$$
 (3.1)

The unknown displacement $u_{\varepsilon}: \Omega_{\varepsilon}^* \to \mathbb{R}^3$ is the solution to the linearized elasticity system

$$\begin{cases} \nabla \cdot \sigma^{\varepsilon}(u_{\varepsilon}) = -f_{\varepsilon} & \text{in} \quad \Omega_{\varepsilon}^{*}, \\ u_{\varepsilon} = 0 & \text{on} \quad \Gamma_{\varepsilon} \cap \overline{\Omega_{\varepsilon}^{*}}, \\ \sigma^{\varepsilon}(u_{\varepsilon}) \cdot \nu_{\varepsilon} = 0 & \text{on} \quad \partial \Omega_{\varepsilon}^{*} \setminus \Gamma_{\varepsilon}, \end{cases}$$
(3.2)

where ν_{ε} is the outward normal vector to $\partial \Omega_{\varepsilon}^*$. The variational formulation of problem (3.2) is

$$\begin{cases} \text{Find } u_{\varepsilon} \in \mathbf{V}_{\varepsilon} \text{ such that,} \\ \int_{\Omega_{\varepsilon}^{*}} \sigma^{\varepsilon}(u_{\varepsilon}) : e(v) \, dx = \int_{\Omega_{\varepsilon}^{*}} f_{\varepsilon} \cdot v \, dx, \qquad \forall v \in \mathbf{V}_{\varepsilon}. \end{cases}$$

$$(3.3)$$

3.2 The unfolding-rescaling operator

Definition 3.1. For every measurable function $u: \Omega_{\varepsilon}^* \to \mathbb{R}^3$ the unfolding operator $\mathcal{T}_{\varepsilon}^*$ is defined as follows:

For every $u \in H^1(\Omega_{\varepsilon}^*)$

$$\mathcal{T}_{\varepsilon}^{*}(\nabla u)(x',X) = \frac{1}{\varepsilon} \nabla_{X} \mathcal{T}_{\varepsilon}^{*}(u)(x',X) \quad \text{for a.e. } (x',X) \in \omega_{\varepsilon}^{\text{ext}} \times \mathbf{C}.$$
 (3.5)

3.3 Weak limits of the fields and the limit problem

Denote by $H^1_{\gamma}(\omega)$ the space of functions in $H^1(\omega)$ that vanish on γ

$$H^1_{\gamma}(\omega) \doteq \left\{ u \in H^1(\omega) \mid u = 0 \text{ on } \gamma \right\},\,$$

Proof. Taking into account the decomposition of the displacements introduced in Subsection 5.3 of the appendix, the Cauchy–Schwarz inequality, the estimates (5.14) and (5.21) of Corollary 5.1, we have

= |\mathbf{C}| \int_{\omega} f_{\alpha}(x') V_{\alpha}(x') \, dx' + \int_{\mathbf{C}} X_{3} \, dX \int_{\omega} f_{\alpha}(x') \frac{\partial V_{3}}{\partial x_{\alpha}}(x') \, dx'
+ \int_{\mathbf{C}} X_{3} \, dX \int_{\omega} g_{\alpha}(x') V_{\alpha}(x') \, dx' + \int_{\mathbf{C}} X_{3}^{2} \, dX \int_{\omega} g_{\alpha}(x') \frac{\partial V_{3}}{\partial x_{\alpha}}(x') \, dx', \quad \alpha = 1, 2.$$

3.4 Homogenization

In this section we give the expressions of the microscopic displacement \hat{u} in terms of the membrane displacements \mathcal{U}_m and the bending \mathcal{U}_3 .

Taking V = 0 as a test function in (3.20), we obtain

Notations and geometric setting

Let $C \in \mathbb{R}^3$ be a bounded domain with Lipschitz boundary and L be a fixed positive constant. In this section, we also assume that the interior of $\overline{\mathbf{C}} \cup (\overline{\mathbf{C}} + \mathbf{e}_3)$ is connected and $\mathbf{C} \cap (\mathbf{C} + \mathbf{e}_3) = \emptyset$. The beam-like structure is

$$\Psi = \chi_{\alpha}^{\mathbb{U}} \tau_{\alpha}^{\mathbb{U}} + \chi_{\beta}^{\underline{u}} \tau_{\beta}^{\underline{u}} + \chi^{\Theta} \tau^{\Theta}, \qquad \tau_{\alpha}^{\mathbb{U}}, \ \tau_{\beta}^{\underline{u}}, \ \tau^{\Theta} \in \mathbb{R}, \quad \alpha, \beta = 1, 2.$$

Then, in view of (2.2) and following the proof of [9, Lemma 11.19], we obtain

$$a_{\alpha\alpha'}^{hom}\tau_{\alpha}^{\mathbb{U}}\tau_{\alpha'}^{\mathbb{U}} + b_{\beta\beta'}^{hom}\tau_{\beta}^{\underline{u}}\tau_{\beta'}^{\underline{u}} + c^{hom}\tau^{\Theta}\tau^{\Theta} + 2ab_{\alpha\beta}^{hom}\tau_{\alpha}^{\mathbb{U}}\tau_{\beta}^{\underline{u}} + 2ac_{\alpha}^{hom}\tau_{\alpha}^{\mathbb{U}}\tau^{\Theta} + 2bc_{\beta}^{hom}\tau_{\beta}^{\underline{u}}\tau^{\Theta} \geqslant$$

$$\geqslant \int_{C} c_{0}\left(e_{X,kl}(\Psi) + M_{kl}\right)\left(e_{X,ij}(\Psi) + M_{ij}\right)dX \geqslant C\left(\tau_{\alpha}^{\mathbb{U}} + \tau_{\beta}^{\underline{u}} + \tau^{\Theta}\right)\left(\tau_{\alpha'}^{\mathbb{U}} + \tau_{\beta'}^{\underline{u}} + \tau^{\Theta}\right)$$

which ends the proof.

5 Appendix

5.1 A lemma

For every open set \mathcal{O} in \mathbb{R}^N and $\delta > 0$, denote $\mathcal{O}^{int}_{\delta} = \{x \in \mathcal{O} \mid \operatorname{dist}(x, \partial \mathcal{O}) > \delta\}$.

Lemma 5.1. Let \mathcal{O} be an open set in \mathbb{R}^N and $\{\phi_{\varepsilon}\}_{\varepsilon}$ be a sequence of functions belonging to $H^1(\mathcal{O}_{\kappa\varepsilon}^{int})$ (κ is a fixed strictly positive constant) satisfying

$$\|\phi_{\varepsilon}\|_{H^{1}(\mathcal{O}_{us}^{int})} \le C \tag{5.1}$$

where C does not depend on ε . We extend ϕ_{ε} and $\nabla \phi_{\varepsilon}$ by 0 in $\mathbb{R}^N \setminus \overline{\mathcal{O}_{\kappa\varepsilon}^{int}}$ (extensions with the same names). Then, there exist a subsequence of $\{\varepsilon\}$, still denoted by $\{\varepsilon\}$, and $\phi \in H^1(\mathcal{O})$ such that

$$\phi_{\varepsilon} \longrightarrow \phi \quad \text{weakly in } L^{2}(\mathcal{O}),$$

$$\nabla \phi_{\varepsilon} \mathbf{1}_{\mathcal{O}_{\kappa\varepsilon}^{int}} \rightharpoonup \nabla \phi \quad \text{weakly in } L^{2}(\mathcal{O})^{N}.$$

Proof. It follows from (5.1) that there exist $\phi \in L^2(\mathcal{O})$ and $\Phi \in L^2(\mathcal{O})^N$ such that (up to a subsequence still denoted $\{\varepsilon\}$)

$$\phi_{\varepsilon} \rightharpoonup \phi$$
 weakly in $L^{2}(\mathcal{O})$,
 $\nabla \phi_{\varepsilon} \mathbf{1}_{\mathcal{O}_{\kappa\varepsilon}^{int}} \rightharpoonup \Phi$ weakly in $L^{2}(\mathcal{O})^{N}$.

Now, we show that $\nabla \phi = \Phi$, so ϕ belongs to $H^1(\mathcal{O})$. Let \mathcal{O}' be an open subset of \mathcal{O} such that $\mathcal{O}' \in \mathcal{O}$. If ε is small enough, one has $\mathcal{O}' \subset \mathcal{O}_{\kappa\varepsilon}^{int}$. For all $\psi \in \mathcal{D}(\mathcal{O}')^N$, using the above convergences we obtain

$$\int_{\mathcal{O}'} \nabla \phi_{\varepsilon} \cdot \psi \, dx = -\int_{\mathcal{O}'} \phi_{\varepsilon} \operatorname{div}(\psi) \, dx \longrightarrow -\int_{\mathcal{O}'} \phi \operatorname{div}(\psi) \, dx = \int_{\mathcal{O}'} \Phi \cdot \psi \, dx.$$

Hence $\Phi = \nabla \phi$ for every open set \mathcal{O}' strictly included in \mathcal{O} . Thus $\Phi = \nabla \phi$ a.e. in \mathcal{O} . So, we have $\phi \in H^1(\mathcal{O})$. \square




Figure 2: Sets Ω , $\Omega_{2\varepsilon\sqrt{N}}^{int}$, Ξ_{ε} and Ξ_{ε}^{int} .

5.2 Korn's type inequality

See Section 2.1 for the main notations. We also denote (see figure 5.2)

$$\Xi_\varepsilon^{int} \doteq \big\{ \xi \in \mathbb{Z}^N \mid \varepsilon(\xi + Y) \subset \Omega_{2\varepsilon\sqrt{N}}^{int} \big\}.$$

First, we recall the following lemmas proved in [9, Lemmas 5.22 and 5.35]:

Lemma 5.2. Let Ω be a bounded domain in \mathbb{R}^N with Lipschitz boundary. There exists $\delta_0 > 0$ such that for all $\delta \in (0, \delta_0]$ the sets Ω_{δ}^{int} are uniformly Lipschitz.

Lemma 5.3. Suppose $p \in [1, +\infty)$. Let ℓ be a function defined on Ξ_{ε} . There exists a constant C which only depends on p and $\partial\Omega$ such that

$$\sum_{\xi \in \Xi_{\varepsilon}} |\ell(\xi)|^p \le C \Big(\sum_{\xi \in \Xi_{\varepsilon}^{int}} |\ell(\xi)|^p + \sum_{i=1}^N \sum_{\xi \in \Xi_{\varepsilon,i}} |\ell(\xi + \mathbf{e}_i) - \ell(\xi)|^p \Big).$$

Proposition 5.1 (Poincaré-Wirtinger inequality). Assume Ω is a bounded domain in \mathbb{R}^N with a Lipschitz boundary. Then, the domains Ω_{δ}^{int} (resp. Ω_{ε}^*) with $\delta \in (0, \delta_0]$ satisfy a uniform Poincaré-Wirtinger inequality for every $p \in [1, +\infty)$, i.e., there exists a constant C independent of δ (resp. ε) (it depends only on p and $\partial\Omega$) such that

$$\|\varphi - \mathcal{M}_{\Omega_{\delta}^{int}}(\varphi)\|_{L^{p}(\Omega_{\delta}^{int})} \leq C \|\nabla\varphi\|_{L^{p}(\Omega_{\delta}^{int})}, \quad \forall \varphi \in W^{1,p}(\Omega_{\delta}^{int}),$$

$$(resp. \quad \|\varphi - \mathcal{M}_{\Omega_{\varepsilon}^{*}}(\varphi)\|_{L^{p}(\Omega_{\varepsilon}^{*})} \leq C \|\nabla\varphi\|_{L^{p}(\Omega_{\varepsilon}^{*})}, \quad \forall \varphi \in W^{1,p}(\Omega_{\varepsilon}^{*}),$$

$$(5.2)$$

where

$$\mathcal{M}_{\Omega^{int}_{\delta}}(\varphi) \doteq \frac{1}{|\Omega^{int}_{\delta}|} \int_{\Omega^{int}_{\delta}} \varphi(x) \, dx, \qquad (\textit{resp.} \quad \mathcal{M}_{\Omega^*_{\varepsilon}}(\varphi) \doteq \frac{1}{|\Omega^*_{\varepsilon}|} \int_{\Omega^*_{\varepsilon}} \varphi(x) \, dx).$$

Let Φ be a displacement in $W^{1,p}(\mathbf{C}_j)^N$, $p \in (1, +\infty)$ and $j \in \{1, \ldots, N\}$. Applying the Korn inequality in \mathbf{C} and $\mathbf{C} + \mathbf{e}_j$ gives two rigid displacements $\mathbf{R}_{j,0}$, $\mathbf{R}_{j,1}$

$$\mathbf{R}_{j,0}(x) = \mathbf{a}_{j,0} + \mathbf{B}_{j,0} x, \mathbf{R}_{j,1}(x) = \mathbf{a}_{j,1} + \mathbf{B}_{j,1} (x - \mathbf{e}_j), \qquad \mathbf{a}_{j,0}, \ \mathbf{a}_{j,1} \in \mathbb{R}^N, \quad x \in \mathbb{R}^N,$$

where $\mathbf{B}_{j,0}$, $\mathbf{B}_{j,1}$ are antisymmetric $N \times N$ matrices. One has

$$\|\Phi - \mathbf{R}_{j,0}\|_{W^{1,p}(\mathbf{C})} \le C\|e(\Phi)\|_{L^p(\mathbf{C})},$$

$$\|\Phi - \mathbf{R}_{j,1}\|_{W^{1,p}(\mathbf{C}+\mathbf{e}_j)} \le C\|e(\Phi)\|_{L^p(\mathbf{C}+\mathbf{e}_j)},$$

$$(5.3)$$

where the constant depends only on C.

Lemma 5.4. The following estimates hold:

$$|\mathbf{B}_{j,1} - \mathbf{B}_{j,0}| \le C \|e(\Phi)\|_{L^p(\mathbf{C}_j)}, |\mathbf{a}_{j,1} - \mathbf{a}_{j,0} - \mathbf{B}_{j,1} \, \mathbf{e}_j| \le C \|e(\Phi)\|_{L^p(\mathbf{C}_j)},$$
 $j = 1, \dots, N,$ (5.4)

where the constant C depends only on \mathbb{C} .

Proof. Since the domain C_j is connected with a Lipschitz boundary, it satisfies the Korn inequality. Hence, there exists a rigid displacement R_j

$$\mathbf{R}_{j}(x) = \mathbf{a}_{j} + \mathbf{B}_{j} (x - \mathbf{e}_{j}/2) \quad \mathbf{a}_{j} \in \mathbb{R}^{N}, \quad x \in \mathbb{R}^{N}$$

where \mathbf{B}_j is an antisymmetric $N \times N$ matrix. It satisfies

$$\|\Phi - \mathbf{R}_j\|_{W^{1,p}(\mathbf{C}_j)} \le C\|e(\Phi)\|_{L^p(\mathbf{C}_j)}.$$
 (5.5)

where the constant C depends on C_i . Hence, by (5.3) and (5.5)

$$\|\nabla(\mathbf{R}_{j} - \mathbf{R}_{j,0})\|_{L^{p}(\mathbf{C})} + \|\nabla(\mathbf{R}_{j} - \mathbf{R}_{j,1})\|_{L^{p}(\mathbf{C} + \mathbf{e}_{j})} \le C\|e(\Phi)\|_{L^{p}(\mathbf{C}_{j})}.$$
(5.6)

Taking into account the inequality (5.6), we obtain

$$|\mathbf{B}_{j} - \mathbf{B}_{j,0}| \le C \|\nabla(\mathbf{R}_{j} - \mathbf{R}_{j,0})\|_{L^{p}(\mathbf{C})} \le C \|e(\Phi)\|_{L^{p}(\mathbf{C}_{j})},$$

$$|\mathbf{B}_{j} - \mathbf{B}_{j,1}| \le C \|\nabla(\mathbf{R}_{j} - \mathbf{R}_{j,1})\|_{L^{p}(\mathbf{C} + \mathbf{e}_{j})} \le C \|e(\Phi)\|_{L^{p}(\mathbf{C}_{j})}.$$
(5.7)

Subtracting yields $(5.4)_1$.

Now we prove $(5.4)_2$. First observe that

$$\left\| \mathbf{a}_{j} - \mathbf{a}_{j,0} - \frac{1}{2} \mathbf{B}_{j} \, \mathbf{e}_{j} \right\|_{L^{p}(\mathbf{C})} \leq \left\| \mathbf{a}_{j} + \mathbf{B}_{j} \left(\cdot - \frac{1}{2} \mathbf{e}_{j} \right) - \left(\mathbf{a}_{j,0} + \mathbf{B}_{j,0} \right) \right\|_{L^{p}(\mathbf{C})} + \left\| \mathbf{B}_{j} - \mathbf{B}_{j,0} \right\|_{L^{p}(\mathbf{C})}. \tag{5.8}$$

Besides, one has

$$\|\mathbf{a}_{j} + \mathbf{B}_{j} \left(\cdot - \frac{1}{2} \mathbf{e}_{j}\right) - \left(\mathbf{a}_{j,0} + \mathbf{B}_{j,0}\right)\|_{L^{p}(\mathbf{C})} = \|\mathbf{R}_{j} - \mathbf{R}_{j,0}\|_{L^{p}(\mathbf{C})} \le \|\Phi - \mathbf{R}_{j}\|_{L^{p}(\mathbf{C})} + \|\Phi - \mathbf{R}_{j,0}\|_{L^{p}(\mathbf{C})}$$

$$\le \|\Phi - \mathbf{R}_{j}\|_{L^{p}(\mathbf{C}_{j})} + \|\Phi - \mathbf{R}_{j,0}\|_{L^{p}(\mathbf{C})} \le C\|e(\Phi)\|_{L^{p}(\mathbf{C}_{j})}.$$

The previous estimate together with (5.8) and (5.7) give

$$\left|\mathbf{a}_j - \mathbf{a}_{j,0} - \frac{1}{2}\mathbf{B}_j \mathbf{e}_j\right| \le C \|e(\Phi)\|_{L^p(\mathbf{C}_j)}.$$

Similarly we obtain

$$\left|\mathbf{a}_j - \mathbf{a}_{j,1} + \frac{1}{2}\mathbf{B}_j \, \mathbf{e}_j\right| \le C \|e(\Phi)\|_{L^p(\mathbf{C}_j)}.$$

Hence $(5.4)_2$ holds.

Now, let u be a displacement in $W^{1,p}(\Omega_{\varepsilon}^*)^N$. By the Korn inequality in $\varepsilon(\xi + \mathbf{C})$ there exist rigid displacements $\mathbf{R}_{\varepsilon\xi}$ ($\xi \in \Xi_{\varepsilon}$)

$$\mathbf{R}_{\varepsilon\xi}(x) = \mathbf{a}(\varepsilon\xi) + \mathbf{B}(\varepsilon\xi)(x - \varepsilon\xi), \qquad x \in \mathbb{R}^N$$

such that (using (5.3) and after ε -scaling)

$$\|\nabla(u - \mathbf{R}_{\varepsilon\xi})\|_{L^{p}(\varepsilon(\xi+\mathbf{C}))} \le C\|e(u)\|_{L^{p}(\varepsilon(\xi+\mathbf{C}))},$$

$$\|u - \mathbf{R}_{\varepsilon\xi}\|_{L^{p}(\varepsilon(\xi+\mathbf{C}))} \le C\varepsilon\|e(u)\|_{L^{p}(\varepsilon(\xi+\mathbf{C}))}.$$
(5.9)

As above we obtain the following estimates for every $\xi \in \Xi_{\varepsilon,i}$:

$$\begin{aligned} &|\mathbf{B}(\varepsilon\xi + \varepsilon\mathbf{e}_i) - \mathbf{B}(\varepsilon\xi)| \le C\varepsilon^{-N/p} \|e(u)\|_{L^p(\varepsilon\mathbf{C}_i^{\xi})}, \\ &|\mathbf{a}(\varepsilon\xi + \varepsilon\mathbf{e}_i) - \mathbf{a}(\varepsilon\xi) - \varepsilon\mathbf{B}(\varepsilon\xi + \varepsilon\mathbf{e}_i)\mathbf{e}_i| \le C\varepsilon^{1-N/p} \|e(u)\|_{L^p(\varepsilon\mathbf{C}_i^{\xi})}, \end{aligned}$$

where $\mathbf{C}_i^{\xi} = \operatorname{interior}((\overline{\mathbf{C}} + \xi) \cup (\mathbf{e}_i + \xi + \overline{\mathbf{C}})).$

As immediate consequence of Lemma 5.4, we have

Lemma 5.5. The following estimates hold:

$$\sum_{i=1}^{N} \sum_{\xi \in \Xi_{\varepsilon,i}} |\mathbf{B}(\varepsilon \xi + \varepsilon \mathbf{e}_{i}) - \mathbf{B}(\varepsilon \xi)|^{p} \varepsilon^{N} \leq C \|e(u)\|_{L^{p}(\Omega_{\varepsilon}^{*})}^{p},$$

$$\sum_{i=1}^{N} \sum_{\xi \in \Xi_{\varepsilon,i}} |\mathbf{a}(\varepsilon \xi + \varepsilon \mathbf{e}_{i}) - \mathbf{a}(\varepsilon \xi) - \varepsilon \mathbf{B}(\varepsilon \xi + \varepsilon \mathbf{e}_{i}) \mathbf{e}_{i}|^{p} \varepsilon^{N} \leq C \varepsilon^{p} \|e(u)\|_{L^{p}(\Omega_{\varepsilon}^{*})}^{p},$$

where the constant C depends only on \mathbb{C} .

Let ξ be in Ξ_{ε} . If all the vertices of the parallelotope $\varepsilon(\xi + \overline{Y})$ belong to Ξ_{ε} , we extend the field **a** (resp. **B**) in this parallelotope as the Q_1 interpolate of its values on the vertices of the parallelotope.

this parallelotope as the Q_1 interpolate of its values on the vertices of the parallelotope. We obtain a field, still denoted **a** (resp. **B**), defined at least in $\Omega^{int}_{2\varepsilon\sqrt{N}}$. It belongs to $W^{1,\infty}(\Omega^{int}_{2\varepsilon\sqrt{N}})^N$ (resp. $W^{1,\infty}(\Omega^{int}_{2\varepsilon\sqrt{N}})^{N\times N}$).

Lemma 5.6. For every displacement $u \in W^{1,p}(\Omega_{\varepsilon}^*)^N$ one has

$$\|\nabla \mathbf{B}\|_{L^{p}(\Omega_{2\varepsilon\sqrt{N}}^{int})} \leq \frac{C}{\varepsilon} \|e(u)\|_{L^{p}(\Omega_{\varepsilon}^{*})},$$

$$\|\nabla \mathbf{a} - \mathbf{B}\|_{L^{p}(\Omega_{2\varepsilon\sqrt{N}}^{int})} \leq C \|e(u)\|_{L^{p}(\Omega_{\varepsilon}^{*})},$$

$$\|e(\mathbf{a})\|_{L^{p}(\Omega_{2\varepsilon\sqrt{N}}^{int})} \leq C \|e(u)\|_{L^{p}(\Omega_{\varepsilon}^{*})},$$
(5.10)

where the constants do not depend on ε .

Proof. A straightforward calculation and the estimates in Lemma 5.5 yield $(5.10)_{1,2}$. Then $(5.10)_2$ gives $(5.10)_3$ (recall that **B** is an antisymmetric $N \times N$ matrix).

As a consequence of Lemmas 5.2 and 5.6, one has

Lemma 5.7. There exists an antisymmetric $N \times N$ matrix \mathcal{B} such that

$$\sum_{\xi \in \Xi_{\varepsilon}} |\mathbf{B}(\varepsilon \xi) - \mathcal{B}|^{p} \varepsilon^{N} \le C \|e(u)\|_{L^{p}(\Omega_{\varepsilon}^{*})}^{p}, \tag{5.11}$$

where the constant does not depend on ε .

Proof. Since the boundary of $\Omega_{2\varepsilon\sqrt{N}}^{int}$ is uniformly Lipschitz, the Korn inequality and $(5.10)_3$ give a rigid displacement \mathbf{R} such that

$$\|\mathbf{a} - \mathbf{R}\|_{W^{1,p}(\Omega^{int}_{2\varepsilon\sqrt{N}})} \le C \|e(\mathbf{a})\|_{L^p(\Omega^{int}_{2\varepsilon\sqrt{N}})} \le C \|e(u)\|_{L^p(\Omega^*_\varepsilon)}.$$

Then $(5.10)_2$ and the previous estimate lead to

$$\|\mathbf{B} - \nabla \mathbf{R}\|_{L^p(\Omega^{int}_{2\varepsilon\sqrt{N}})} \le C \|e(u)\|_{L^p(\Omega^*_{\varepsilon})}.$$

Set $\mathcal{B} = \nabla \mathbf{R}$. Hence

$$\sum_{\xi \in \Xi_{\varepsilon}^{int}} |\mathbf{B}(\varepsilon \xi) - \mathcal{B}|^p \varepsilon^N \le C \|e(u)\|_{L^p(\Omega_{\varepsilon}^*)}^p.$$

The first estimate in Lemma 5.5 together with the above and Lemma 5.3 yield (5.11).

We assume that there exists a domain Ω' with a Lipschitz boundary such that $\Omega \subset \Omega'$ and $\Omega' \cap \partial \Omega = \Gamma$. Set

$$W_{\Gamma}^{1,p}(\Omega_{\varepsilon}^{*}) \doteq \left\{ \psi \in W^{1,p}(\Omega_{\varepsilon}^{*}) \mid \exists \psi' \in W^{1,p}(\Omega_{\varepsilon}'^{*}), \ \psi = \psi'_{\mid \Omega_{\varepsilon}^{*}}, \ \psi' = 0 \text{ in } \Omega_{\varepsilon}'^{*} \setminus \overline{\Omega_{\varepsilon}^{*}} \right\},$$

where

$$\Omega_{\varepsilon}'^* \doteq \mathrm{interior}\Big(\bigcup_{\xi \in \Xi_{\varepsilon}'} (\varepsilon \xi + \varepsilon \overline{\mathbf{C}})\Big), \quad \Xi_{\varepsilon}' \doteq \big\{ \xi \in \mathbb{Z}^3 \ | \ (\varepsilon \xi + \varepsilon Y) \cap \Omega' \neq \emptyset \big\}$$

Proposition 5.2 (Korn inequality). For every displacement $u \in W^{1,p}(\Omega_{\varepsilon}^*)^N$, $p \in (1, +\infty)$, there exists a rigid displacement \mathbf{R} such that

$$||u - \mathbf{R}||_{W^{1,p}(\Omega_{\varepsilon}^*)} \le C||e(u)||_{L^p(\Omega_{\varepsilon}^*)}. \tag{5.12}$$

Furthermore, if $u \in W^{1,p}_{\Gamma}(\Omega_{\varepsilon}^*)^N$ then

$$||u||_{W^{1,p}(\Omega_{\varepsilon}^*)} \le C||e(u)||_{L^p(\Omega_{\varepsilon}^*)},\tag{5.13}$$

where the constants do not depend on ε .

Proof. Estimates (5.9) and (5.11) lead to

$$\|\nabla u - \mathcal{B}\|_{L^p(\Omega_{\varepsilon}^*)} \le C\|e(u)\|_{L^p(\Omega_{\varepsilon}^*)}.$$

Then, using this estimate and the Poincaré-Wirtinger inequality (5.2) we obtain (5.12).

If u belongs to $W_{\Gamma}^{1,p}(\Omega_{\varepsilon}^*)^N$, applying the previous result (5.12) with u' (resp. Ω') in place of u (resp. Ω) gives a rigid displacement \mathbf{R}' such that

$$||u' - \mathbf{R}'||_{W^{1,p}(\Omega_{\varepsilon}^{\prime*})} \le C||e(u)||_{L^p(\Omega_{\varepsilon}^*)}.$$

Let \mathcal{O} be an open set such that $\mathcal{O} \subseteq (\Omega' \setminus \overline{\Omega})$. For ε small enough, the function u' vanishes in $\mathcal{O} \cap \Omega_{\varepsilon}^{**}$. Hence

$$\|\mathbf{R}'\|_{W^{1,p}(\mathcal{O}\cap\Omega_{\varepsilon}^{\prime*})} \leq C\|e(u)\|_{L^p(\Omega_{\varepsilon}^*)}$$

which allows to obtain an estimate, independent of ε , for the components of \mathbf{R}' . And thus the estimate (5.13) follows.

5.3 Korn's type inequality in a plate-like domain

In this subsection the proofs of the lemmas follow the same lines as the proofs of those in the previous subsection. The notations are those of Subsection 3.1. We recall that \mathbf{C} is a domain with Lipschitz boundary included in $Y = (-1/2, 1/2)^3$ and satisfying $\mathbf{C}_j = \operatorname{interior}(\overline{\mathbf{C}} \cup (\mathbf{e}_j + \overline{\mathbf{C}})), j = 1, 2$, connected.

Here the notations are

- $\bullet \ \Xi_{\varepsilon} \doteq \big\{ \xi \in \mathbb{Z}^2 \ | \ (\varepsilon \xi + \varepsilon Y') \cap \omega \neq \emptyset \big\}, \quad \Xi_{\varepsilon,\alpha} \doteq \big\{ \xi \in \Xi_{\varepsilon} \ | \ \xi + \mathbf{e}_{\alpha} \in \Xi_{\varepsilon} \big\}, \ \alpha = \overline{1,2},$
- $\bullet \ \Xi_\varepsilon^{int} \doteq \big\{ \xi \in \mathbb{Z}^2 \ | \ (\varepsilon \xi + \varepsilon Y') \subset \omega_{3\varepsilon}^{int} \big\},$
- $\bullet \ \Omega_{\varepsilon}^* = \mathrm{interior}\Big(\bigcup_{\xi \in \Xi_{\varepsilon}} (\varepsilon \xi + \varepsilon \overline{\mathbf{C}}) \Big), \, \Omega_{\varepsilon}^{int} = \mathrm{interior}\Big(\bigcup_{\xi \in \Xi^{int}} (\varepsilon \xi + \varepsilon \overline{\mathbf{C}}) \Big).$

Let u be in $H^1(\Omega_{\varepsilon}^*)^3$. For every $\xi \in \Xi_{\varepsilon}$ there exists a rigid displacement $\mathbf{R}_{\varepsilon\xi}$

$$\mathbf{R}_{\varepsilon\varepsilon}(x) = \mathcal{U}(\varepsilon\xi) + \mathcal{R}(\varepsilon\xi) \wedge (x - \varepsilon\xi) \qquad x \in \mathbb{R}^3,$$

such that

$$\|\nabla(u - \mathbf{R}_{\varepsilon\xi})\|_{L^{2}(\varepsilon(\xi + \mathbf{C}))} \le C\|e(u)\|_{L^{2}(\varepsilon(\xi + \mathbf{C}))}, \quad \|u - \mathbf{R}_{\varepsilon\xi}\|_{L^{2}(\varepsilon(\xi + \mathbf{C}))} \le C\varepsilon\|e(u)\|_{L^{2}(\varepsilon(\xi + \mathbf{C}))}. \tag{5.14}$$

Remark 5.1. By construction, the fields U, R are piecewise linear in each cell.

In a similar way as in Lemma 5.5 we obtain

Lemma 5.8. The following estimates hold:

$$\sum_{\alpha=1}^{2} \sum_{\xi \in \Xi_{\varepsilon,\alpha}} |\mathcal{R}(\varepsilon\xi + \varepsilon\mathbf{e}_{\alpha}) - \mathcal{R}(\varepsilon\xi)|^{2} \varepsilon^{3} \leq C \|e(u)\|_{L^{2}(\Omega_{\varepsilon}^{*})}^{2}, \quad \alpha = 1, 2,$$

$$\sum_{\alpha=1}^{2} \sum_{\xi \in \Xi_{\varepsilon,\alpha}} |\mathcal{U}(\varepsilon\xi + \varepsilon\mathbf{e}_{\alpha}) - \mathcal{U}(\varepsilon\xi) - \varepsilon\mathcal{R}(\varepsilon\xi + \varepsilon\mathbf{e}_{\alpha}) \wedge \mathbf{e}_{\alpha}|^{2} \varepsilon^{3} \leq C\varepsilon^{2} \|e(u)\|_{L^{2}(\Omega_{\varepsilon}^{*})}^{2}.$$
(5.15)

The constant C depends only on \mathbb{C} .

As in the previous subsection, using Q_1 interpolation we extend the fields \mathcal{U} and \mathcal{R} to the whole domain $\omega_{3\varepsilon}^{int}$ and obtain two fields $\mathcal{U} \in W^{1,\infty}(\omega_{3\varepsilon}^{int})^3$ and $\mathcal{R} \in W^{1,\infty}(\omega_{3\varepsilon}^{int})^2$ satisfying

$$\mathcal{U}(\varepsilon\xi) = \mathcal{U}(\varepsilon\xi), \quad \mathcal{R}(\varepsilon\xi) = \mathcal{R}(\varepsilon\xi) \qquad \forall \xi \in \Xi_{\varepsilon} \cap \omega_{3\varepsilon}^{int}.$$

Define the displacement \mathbf{U}^e by

$$\mathbf{U}^{e}(x) = \mathcal{U}(x') + \mathcal{R}(x') \wedge x_3 \mathbf{e}_3, \quad \forall x \in \Omega_{\varepsilon}^{int}, \quad x' = (x_1, x_2).$$

Lemma 5.9. For every displacement $u \in H^1(\Omega_{\varepsilon}^*)^3$ we have

$$\|\nabla \mathcal{R}\|_{L^{2}(\omega_{3\varepsilon}^{int})} \leq \frac{C}{\varepsilon^{3/2}} \|e(u)\|_{L^{2}(\Omega_{\varepsilon}^{*})},$$

$$\|\frac{\partial \mathcal{U}}{\partial x_{\alpha}} - \mathcal{R} \wedge \mathbf{e}_{\alpha}\|_{L^{2}(\omega_{3\varepsilon}^{int})} \leq \frac{C}{\varepsilon^{1/2}} \|e(u)\|_{L^{2}(\Omega_{\varepsilon}^{*})}, \quad \alpha = 1, 2.$$
(5.16)

The constant C depends only on \mathbb{C} .

Proof. Estimates (5.16) are the consequences of (5.15) and the fact that the fields \mathcal{U} and \mathcal{R} are piecewise linear on every cell.

Theorem 5.1. For every displacement $u \in H^1(\Omega^*_*)^3$ there exists a rigid displacement **R** such that

$$\|u_{\alpha} - \mathbf{R}_{\alpha}\|_{L^{2}(\Omega_{\varepsilon}^{*})} \leq C\|e(u)\|_{L^{2}(\Omega_{\varepsilon}^{*})}, \qquad \|u_{3} - \mathbf{R}_{3}\|_{L^{2}(\Omega_{\varepsilon}^{*})} + \|\nabla(u - \mathbf{R})\|_{L^{2}(\Omega_{\varepsilon}^{*})} \leq \frac{C}{\varepsilon}\|e(u)\|_{L^{2}(\Omega_{\varepsilon}^{*})}.$$

The constant C does not depend on ε .

Proof. From Proposition 5.1, there exits $(b_1, b_2) \in \mathbb{R}^2$ such that

$$\|\mathcal{R}_{\alpha} - b_{\alpha}\|_{L^{2}(\omega_{3\varepsilon}^{int})} \le \frac{C}{\varepsilon^{3/2}} \|e(u)\|_{L^{2}(\Omega_{\varepsilon}^{*})}. \tag{5.17}$$

Then, the above estimate, $(5.15)_1$ and Lemma 5.3 yield

$$\sum_{\xi \in \Xi_{\varepsilon}} |\mathcal{R}_{\alpha}(\varepsilon\xi) - b_{\alpha}|^{2} \varepsilon^{3} \leq \frac{C}{\varepsilon^{3}} ||e(u)||_{L^{2}(\Omega_{\varepsilon}^{*})}.$$

Besides, $(5.16)_2$ and (5.17) lead to

$$\left\| \frac{\partial \mathcal{U}_3}{\partial x_1} + b_2 \right\|_{L^2(\omega_{3\varepsilon}^{int})} + \left\| \frac{\partial \mathcal{U}_3}{\partial x_2} - b_1 \right\|_{L^2(\omega_{3\varepsilon}^{int})} \le \frac{C}{\varepsilon^{1/2}} \|e(u)\|_{L^2(\Omega_{\varepsilon}^*)}, \quad \alpha = 1, 2.$$

Proceeding as above, there exists $a_3 \in \mathbb{R}$ such that

$$\sum_{\xi \in \Xi_{\varepsilon}} |\mathcal{U}_3(\varepsilon \xi) - a_3 + b_2 \varepsilon \xi_1 - b_1 \varepsilon \xi_2|^2 \varepsilon^3 \le \frac{C}{\varepsilon^3} \varepsilon ||e(u)||_{L^2(\Omega_{\varepsilon}^*)}.$$

From $(5.16)_2$ we also obtain

$$\left\|\frac{\partial \mathcal{U}_1}{\partial x_1}\right\|_{L^2(\omega_{3\varepsilon}^{int})} + \left\|\frac{\partial \mathcal{U}_2}{\partial x_2}\right\|_{L^2(\omega_{3\varepsilon}^{int})} + \left\|\frac{\partial \mathcal{U}_1}{\partial x_2} + \frac{\partial \mathcal{U}_2}{\partial x_1}\right\|_{L^2(\omega_{3\varepsilon}^{int})} \leq \frac{C}{\varepsilon^{1/2}} \|e(u)\|_{L^2(\Omega_\varepsilon^*)}.$$

Since the boundary of $\omega_{3\varepsilon}^{int}$ is uniformly Lipschitz, the 2D-Korn inequality gives a rigid displacement $r(x_1, x_2) = (a_1 - b_3 x_2) \mathbf{e}_1 + (a_2 + b_3 x_1) \mathbf{e}_2$ such that

$$\|\mathcal{U}_1 - r_1\|_{H^1(\omega_{3\varepsilon}^{int})} + \|\mathcal{U}_2 - r_2\|_{H^1(\omega_{3\varepsilon}^{int})} \le \frac{C}{\varepsilon^{1/2}} \|e(u)\|_{L^2(\Omega_{\varepsilon}^*)}.$$

These estimates and $(5.16)_2$ imply that

$$\|\mathcal{R}_3 - b_3\|_{L^2(\omega_{3\varepsilon}^{int})} \le \frac{C}{\varepsilon^{1/2}} \|e(u)\|_{L^2(\Omega_{\varepsilon}^*)}.$$

Then, as above we obtain

$$\sum_{\xi \in \Xi_{\varepsilon}} |\mathcal{R}_{3}(\varepsilon\xi) - b_{3}|^{2} \varepsilon^{3} + \sum_{\xi \in \Xi_{\varepsilon}} |\mathcal{U}_{1}(\varepsilon\xi) - a_{1} + b_{3}\varepsilon\xi_{2}|^{2} \varepsilon^{3} + \sum_{\xi \in \Xi_{\varepsilon}} |\mathcal{U}_{2}(\varepsilon\xi) - a_{2} - b_{3}\varepsilon\xi_{1}|^{2} \varepsilon^{3} \leq \frac{C}{\varepsilon} \|e(u)\|_{L^{2}(\Omega_{\varepsilon}^{*})}.$$

By choosing $\mathbf{R}(x) = a + b \wedge x$ and using (5.14) that ends the proof of the theorem.

Let γ be a subset of $\partial \omega$ with a non null measure. Assume that there exists a domain ω' with Lipschitz boundary such that

$$\omega \subset \omega'$$
 and $\omega' \cap \partial \omega = \gamma$.

Denote

$$\mathbf{V}_{\varepsilon} \doteq \Big\{ v \in H^1(\Omega_{\varepsilon}^*)^3 \; \big| \; \exists v' \in H^1(\Omega_{\varepsilon}'^*)^3, \; \; v = v'_{\mid \Omega_{\varepsilon}^*}, \; \; v' = 0 \text{ in } \Omega_{\varepsilon}'^* \setminus \overline{\Omega_{\varepsilon}^*} \Big\},$$

where

$$\Omega_{\varepsilon}^{\prime*} \doteq \operatorname{interior} \Big(\bigcup_{\xi \in \Xi_{\varepsilon}^{\prime}} (\varepsilon \xi + \varepsilon \overline{\mathbf{C}}) \Big), \quad \Xi_{\varepsilon}^{\prime} \doteq \big\{ \xi \in \mathbb{Z}^{2} \ | \ (\varepsilon \xi + \varepsilon Y^{\prime}) \cap \omega^{\prime} \neq \emptyset \big\}.$$

Theorem 5.2. For every displacement u in V_{ε} one has

$$||u_1||_{L^2(\Omega_{\varepsilon}^*)} + ||u_2||_{L^2(\Omega_{\varepsilon}^*)} \le C||e(u)||_{L^2(\Omega_{\varepsilon}^*)}, \qquad ||u_3||_{L^2(\Omega_{\varepsilon}^*)} + ||\nabla u||_{L^2(\Omega_{\varepsilon}^*)} \le \frac{C}{\varepsilon} ||e(u)||_{L^2(\Omega_{\varepsilon}^*)}. \tag{5.18}$$

The constant C does not depend on ε .

Proof. Since u belongs to \mathbf{V}_{ε} , there exists $u' \in H^1(\Omega_{\varepsilon}^{\prime*})^3$ such that $u = u'_{|\Omega_{\varepsilon}^*|}, u' = 0$ in $\Omega_{\varepsilon}^{\prime*} \setminus \overline{\Omega_{\varepsilon}^*}$. Then, applying Theorem 5.1 with u' (resp. Ω') in place of u (resp. Ω) gives a rigid displacement \mathbf{R}' such that

$$\|u'_{\alpha} - \mathbf{R}'_{\alpha}\|_{L^{2}(\Omega'^{*}_{\varepsilon})} \leq C\|e(u)\|_{L^{2}(\Omega^{*}_{\varepsilon})}, \qquad \|u'_{3} - \mathbf{R}'_{3}\|_{L^{2}(\Omega'^{*}_{\varepsilon})} + \|\nabla(u' - \mathbf{R}')\|_{L^{2}(\Omega'^{*}_{\varepsilon})} \leq \frac{C}{\varepsilon}\|e(u)\|_{L^{2}(\Omega^{*}_{\varepsilon})}. \tag{5.19}$$

Let \mathcal{O} be an open set such that $\mathcal{O} \in (\omega' \setminus \overline{\omega})$. For ε small enough, the function u' vanishes in $\mathcal{O} \times (-\varepsilon/2, \varepsilon/2) \cap \Omega_{\varepsilon}'^*$. Then the terms of its decomposition \mathcal{U}' and \mathcal{R}' vanish in \mathcal{O} too. Hence, one can choose $\mathbf{R}' = 0$ without changing the estimates (5.19). So, (5.18) follows.

As a consequence of the two previous theorems, one has

Corollary 5.1. For every displacement u in V_{ε} the following estimates hold:

$$\|\mathcal{U}_{1}\|_{H^{1}(\omega_{3\varepsilon}^{int})} + \|\mathcal{U}_{2}\|_{H^{1}(\omega_{3\varepsilon}^{int})} + \|\mathcal{R}_{3}\|_{H^{1}(\omega_{3\varepsilon}^{int})} \leq \frac{C}{\varepsilon^{1/2}} \|e(u)\|_{L^{2}(\Omega_{\varepsilon}^{*})},$$

$$\|\mathcal{U}_{3}\|_{H^{1}(\omega_{3\varepsilon}^{int})} + \|\mathcal{R}_{1}\|_{H^{1}(\omega_{3\varepsilon}^{int})} + \|\mathcal{R}_{2}\|_{H^{1}(\omega_{3\varepsilon}^{int})} \leq \frac{C}{\varepsilon^{3/2}} \|e(u)\|_{L^{2}(\Omega_{\varepsilon}^{*})},$$

$$\|\overline{u}\|_{L^{2}(\Omega_{\varepsilon}^{int})} \leq C\varepsilon \|e(u)\|_{L^{2}(\Omega_{\varepsilon}^{*})}, \quad \|\nabla \overline{u}\|_{L^{2}(\Omega_{\varepsilon}^{int})} \leq C \|e(u)\|_{L^{2}(\Omega_{\varepsilon}^{*})}.$$

$$(5.20)$$

and

$$\sum_{\xi \in \Xi_{\varepsilon}} |\mathcal{R}_{1}(\varepsilon\xi)|^{2} \varepsilon^{2} + \sum_{\xi \in \Xi_{\varepsilon}} |\mathcal{R}_{2}(\varepsilon\xi)|^{2} \varepsilon^{2} + \sum_{\xi \in \Xi_{\varepsilon}} |\mathcal{U}_{3}(\varepsilon\xi)|^{2} \varepsilon^{2} \leq \frac{C}{\varepsilon^{3}} \|e(u)\|_{L^{2}(\Omega_{\varepsilon}^{*})}^{2},$$

$$\sum_{\xi \in \Xi_{\varepsilon}} |\mathcal{R}_{3}(\varepsilon\xi)|^{2} \varepsilon^{2} + \sum_{\xi \in \Xi_{\varepsilon}} |\mathcal{U}_{1}(\varepsilon\xi)|^{2} \varepsilon^{2} + \sum_{\xi \in \Xi_{\varepsilon}} |\mathcal{U}_{2}(\varepsilon\xi)|^{2} \varepsilon^{2} \leq \frac{C}{\varepsilon} \|e(u)\|_{L^{2}(\Omega_{\varepsilon}^{*})}^{2}.$$
(5.21)

The constants do not depend on ε .

5.4 Korn's type inequality in a beam-like domain

In this subsection the notations are those of Subsection 4.1.

For every displacement $u \in H^1(\Omega_{\varepsilon}^*)^3$, the Korn inequality applied in the domain $\varepsilon(\xi + \mathbf{C})$, $\xi \in \Xi_{\varepsilon}$, gives a rigid displacement $\mathbf{R}_{\varepsilon\xi}$

$$\mathbf{R}_{\varepsilon\xi}(x) = \mathcal{U}(\varepsilon\xi) + \mathcal{R}(\varepsilon\xi) \wedge (x - \varepsilon\xi) \qquad x \in \mathbb{R}^3$$

such that

$$\|\nabla(u - \mathbf{R}_{\varepsilon\xi})\|_{L^{2}(\varepsilon(\xi + \mathbf{C}))} \le C\|e(u)\|_{L^{2}(\varepsilon(\xi + \mathbf{C}))}, \quad \|u - \mathbf{R}_{\varepsilon\xi}\|_{L^{2}(\varepsilon(\xi + \mathbf{C}))} \le C\varepsilon\|e(u)\|_{L^{2}(\varepsilon(\xi + \mathbf{C}))}. \tag{5.22}$$

Remark 5.2. By construction, the fields \mathcal{U} and \mathcal{R} are piecewise constant.

In a similar way as in Lemma 5.5 we obtain

Lemma 5.10. *The following estimates hold:*

$$\sum_{\xi \in \Xi_{\varepsilon}} |\mathcal{R}(\varepsilon\xi + \varepsilon\mathbf{e}_{3}) - \mathcal{R}(\varepsilon\xi)|^{2} \varepsilon^{3} \leq C \|e(u)\|_{L^{2}(\Omega_{\varepsilon}^{*})}^{2},$$

$$\sum_{\xi \in \Xi_{\varepsilon}} |\mathcal{U}(\varepsilon\xi + \varepsilon\mathbf{e}_{3}) - \mathcal{U}(\varepsilon\xi) - \varepsilon\mathcal{R}(\varepsilon\xi + \varepsilon\mathbf{e}_{3}) \wedge \mathbf{e}_{3}|^{2} \varepsilon^{3} \leq C\varepsilon^{2} \|e(u)\|_{L^{2}(\Omega_{\varepsilon}^{*})}^{2}.$$
(5.23)

The constant C depends only on \mathbb{C} .

Set

$$\mathcal{R}(N\varepsilon) = \mathcal{R}((N-1)\varepsilon), \quad \mathcal{U}(N\varepsilon) = \mathcal{U}((N-1)\varepsilon) + \varepsilon \mathcal{R}(N\varepsilon) \wedge \mathbf{e}_3.$$

Now, using Q_1 interpolation, we extend the fields \mathcal{U} and \mathcal{R} and we obtain two fields \mathcal{U} , \mathcal{R} belonging to $W^{1,\infty}(0,L)^3$ and such that

$$\mathcal{U}(\varepsilon\xi) = \mathcal{U}(\varepsilon\xi), \qquad \mathcal{R}(\varepsilon\xi) = \mathcal{R}(\varepsilon\xi), \qquad \forall \xi \in \{0, \dots, N\}.$$

Define the displacement \mathbf{U}^e by

$$\mathbf{U}^{e}(x) = \mathcal{U}(x_3) + \mathcal{R}(x_3) \wedge (x_1 \mathbf{e}_1 + x_2 \mathbf{e}_2), \quad \forall x \in \Omega_{\varepsilon}^*.$$

Lemma 5.11. For every displacement $u \in H^1(\Omega^B_{\varepsilon})^3$ one has

$$\left\| \frac{d\mathcal{R}}{dx_3} \right\|_{L^2(0,L)} \leq \frac{C}{\varepsilon^2} \|e(u)\|_{L^2(\Omega_{\varepsilon}^*)},$$

$$\left\| \frac{d\mathcal{U}}{dx_3} - \mathcal{R} \wedge \mathbf{e}_3 \right\|_{L^2(0,L)} \leq \frac{C}{\varepsilon} \|e(u)\|_{L^2(\Omega_{\varepsilon}^*)},$$

$$\left\| e(\mathbf{U}^e) \right\|_{L^2(\Omega_{\varepsilon}^*)} \leq C \|e(u)\|_{L^2(\Omega_{\varepsilon}^*)}.$$
(5.24)

Moreover,

$$\|\nabla (u - \mathbf{U}^e)\|_{L^2(\Omega_{\varepsilon}^*)} \le C\|e(u)\|_{L^2(\Omega_{\varepsilon}^*)}, \qquad \|u - \mathbf{U}^e\|_{L^2(\Omega_{\varepsilon}^*)} \le C\varepsilon\|e(u)\|_{L^2(\Omega_{\varepsilon}^*)}. \tag{5.25}$$

The constant C depends only on \mathbb{C} .

Proof. Estimates (5.23) yield (5.24)_{1,2}. A straightforward calculation and (5.24)_{1,2} lead to (5.24)₃. Then taking into account (5.22) we obtain (5.25).

Denote

$$\mathbf{H}(0,L) \doteq \{ \phi \in H^1(0,L) \mid \phi(0) = 0 \}.$$

Lemma 5.12. For every displacement $u \in \mathbf{V}_{\varepsilon}$ one has

$$\|\mathcal{U}_3\|_{H^1(0,L)} + \varepsilon \left(\|\mathcal{U}_1\|_{H^1(0,L)} + \|\mathcal{U}_2\|_{H^1(0,L)} + \|\mathcal{R}\|_{L^2(0,L)} \right) \le \frac{C}{\varepsilon} \|e(u)\|_{L^2(\Omega_{\varepsilon}^*)}$$
(5.26)

and

$$||u_3||_{L^2(\Omega_{\varepsilon}^*)} + \varepsilon (||u_1||_{L^2(\Omega_{\varepsilon}^*)} + ||u_2||_{L^2(\Omega_{\varepsilon}^*)} + ||\nabla u||_{L^2(\Omega_{\varepsilon}^*)}) \le C||e(u)||_{L^2(\Omega_{\varepsilon}^*)}.$$
(5.27)

The constant C does not depend on ε .

Proof. We extend u by 0 in the cell $\varepsilon(-\mathbf{e}_3+\mathbf{C})$. Then, proceeding as in Lemma 5.4 we obtain

$$|\mathcal{R}(0)|^2 \varepsilon^3 \le C \|e(u)\|_{L^2(\Omega^*)}^2, \qquad |\mathcal{U}(0)| \varepsilon^3 \le C \varepsilon^2 \|e(u)\|_{L^2(\Omega^*)}^2.$$

Without losing the estimates (5.24), we set $\mathcal{U}(0) = \mathcal{R}(0) = 0$. Estimates (5.26) are the immediate consequences of (5.24)_{1,2} and the Poincaré inequality. Finally (5.22) and (5.26) lead to (5.27).

As a consequence of the previous lemma and (5.22), we have the following decomposition of a displacement $u \in \mathbf{V}_{\varepsilon}$:

$$u = \mathbf{U}^e + \overline{u}$$
.

where

$$\mathbf{U}^{e}(x) = \mathcal{U}(x_3) + \mathcal{R}(x_3) \wedge (x_1 \mathbf{e}_1 + x_2 \mathbf{e}_2), \quad \forall x \in \Omega_{\varepsilon}^*, \quad \mathcal{U}, \ \mathcal{R} \in \mathbf{H}(0, L)^3$$

and the displacement $\overline{u} \in \mathbf{V}_{\varepsilon}$ satisfies the estimates

$$\|\overline{u}\|_{L^{2}(\Omega_{*}^{*})} \le C\varepsilon \|e(u)\|_{L^{2}(\Omega_{*}^{*})}, \quad \|\nabla \overline{u}\|_{L^{2}(\Omega_{*}^{*})} \le C \|e(u)\|_{L^{2}(\Omega_{*}^{*})}.$$
 (5.28)
