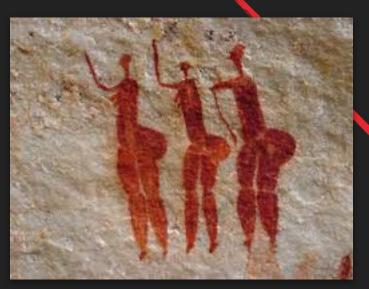

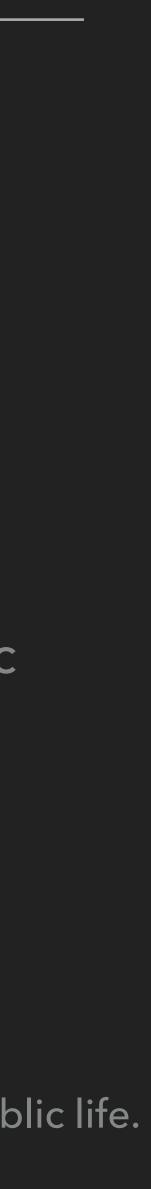


SOCIAL SPHERE

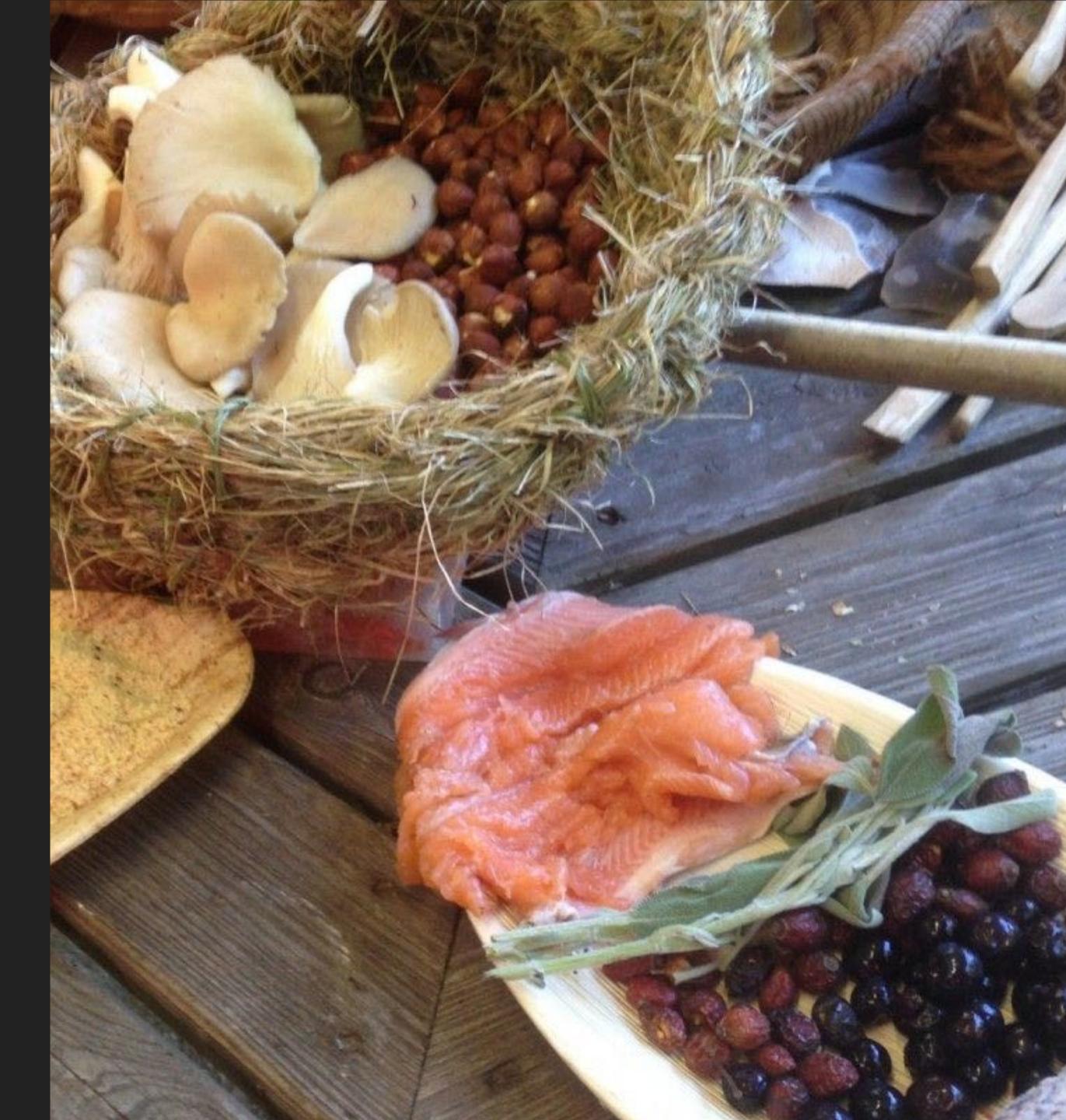
SOCIAL SPHERE

SOCIAL SPHERE

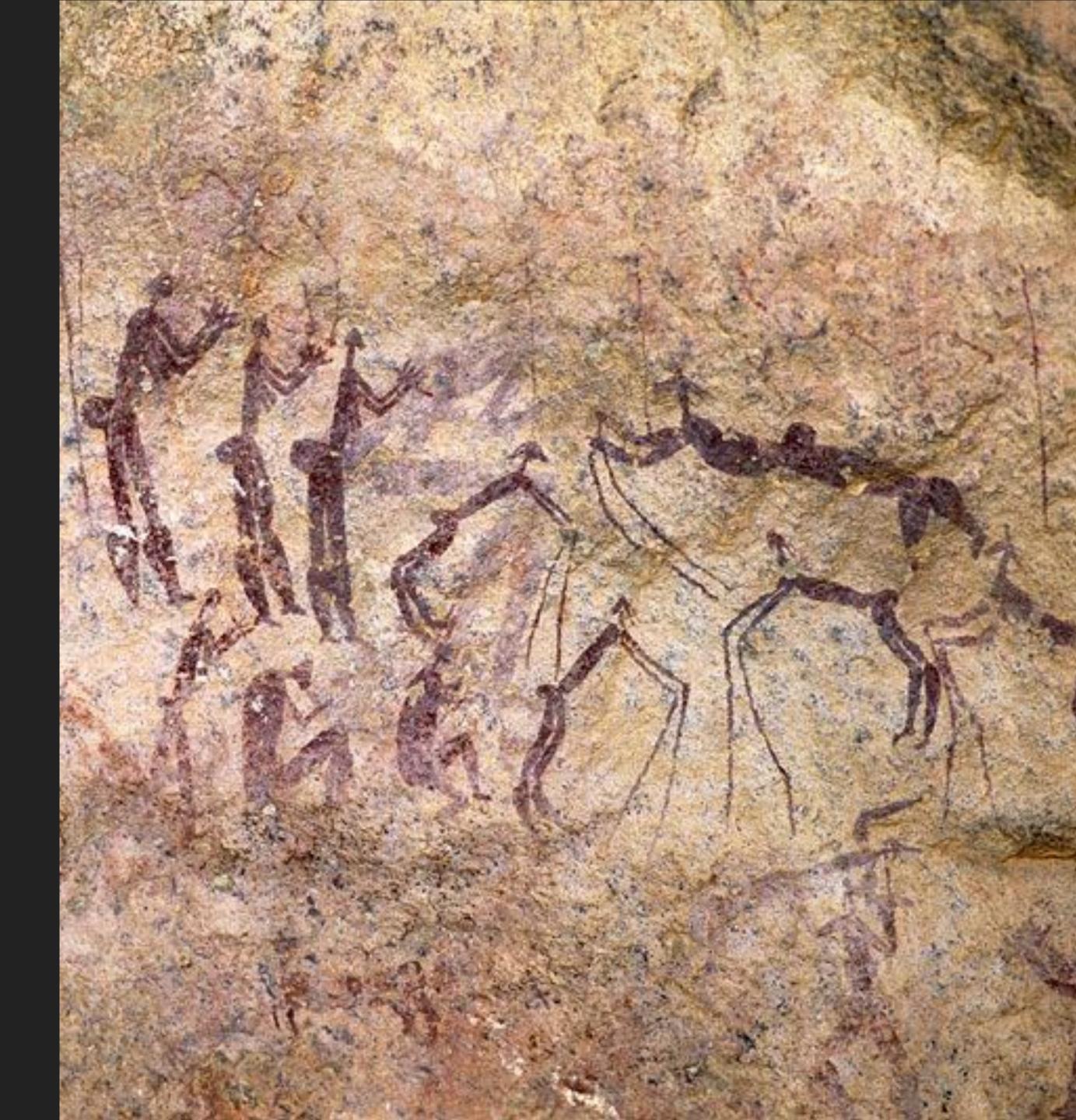
- Aggregation sites
 - Linked to rock and cave art since Upper Palaeolithic
 - A distinct time leisure
 - Learning, resilience and symbolic connections
- Time for consumption
 - Rock art production
 - Collective rituals Rites of passage

- An appropriate media is required to approach to prehistoric social spheres
 - Naturalism
 - Expressionist
 - Gender roles
 - Human interactions

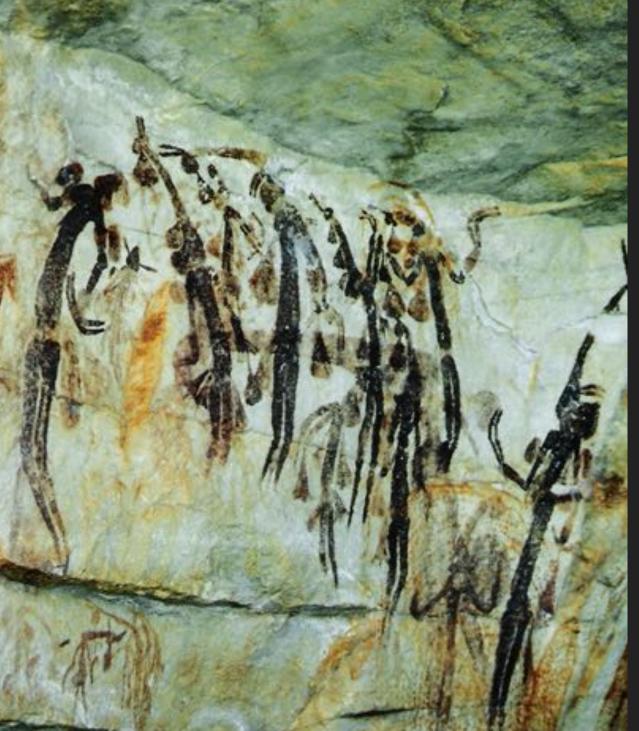

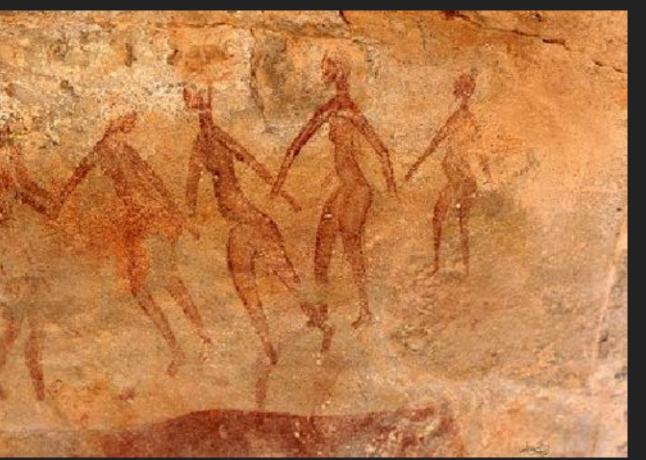

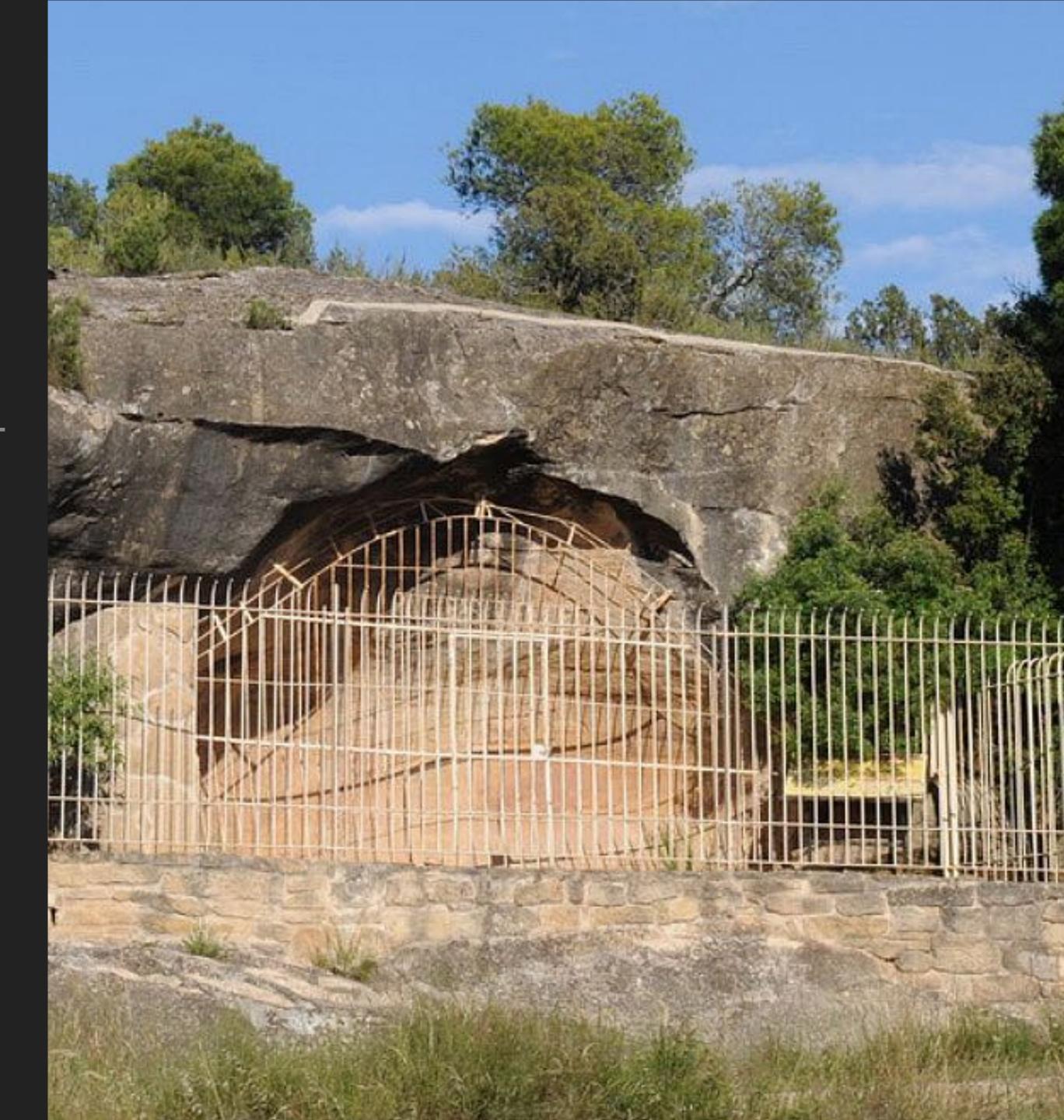

LEVANTINE ART

- First discovered in 1903
- c. 700-800 sites discovered up to now
 - Most of them included in UNESCO WHL
 - Rock art of the Mediterranean Basin of the Iberian Peninsula (1998)

LEVANTINE ART

- Made by mesolithic hunter-gatherers, since at least 7000 cal BC
- Some connections with the last stages of Upper Palaeolithic traditions
- It was probably disappeared by c. 4500 cal BC, after the arrival of Neolithic to Iberian Pninsula in 5700 cal BC

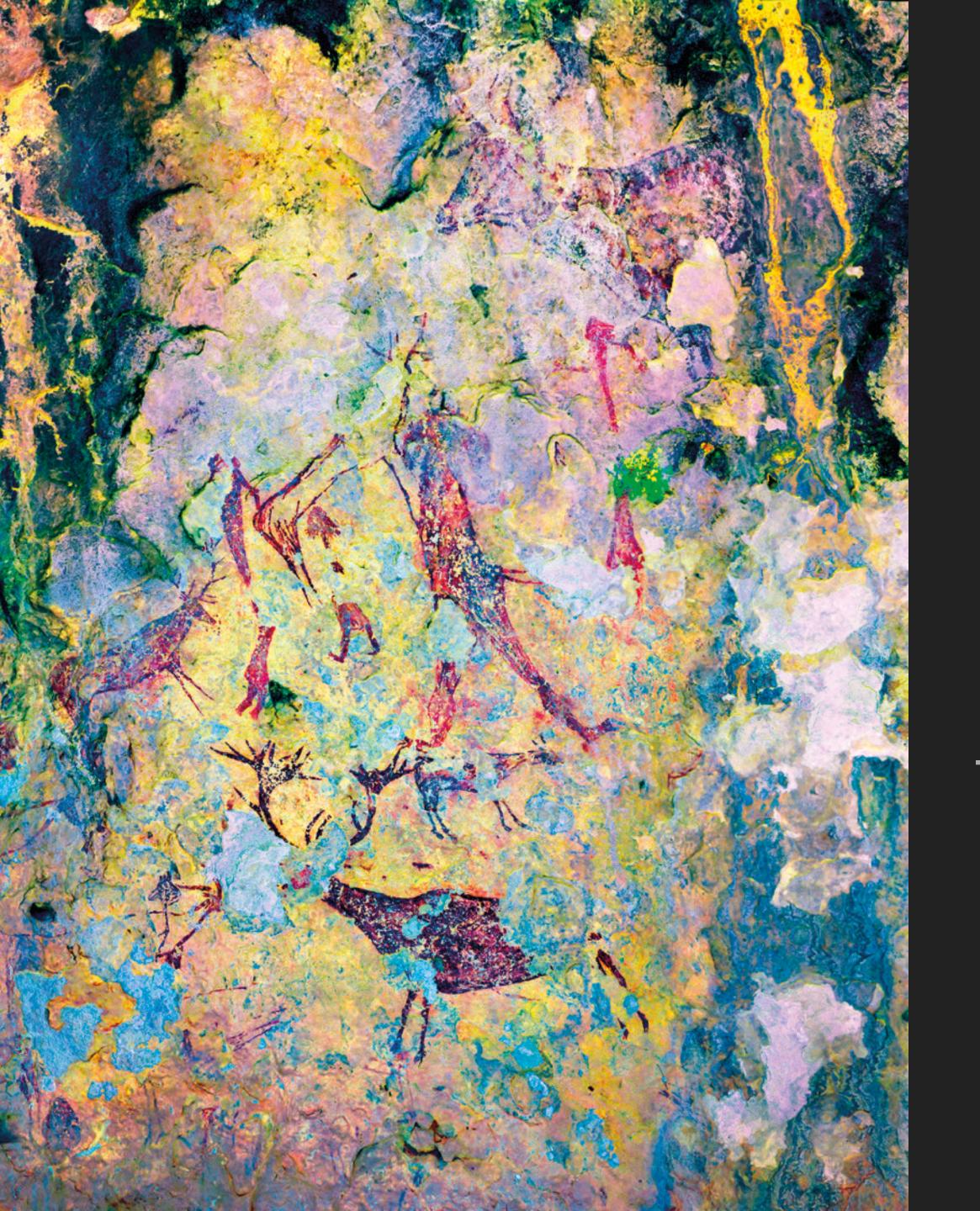

SEX DISTINCTION

- Secondary sex features
 - Breasts
 - Male genitalia
- When absent
 - Clothes
 - Skirt (female)
 - Trousers (male)
 - Objects (purses, elbow decorations)



WOMEN ROLES

- Mostly static figures (75%)
- Large variety of scenes
 - Pairs or groups of women
 - Symbolic roles?
- Explicit maternity and breast-feed are really scarce

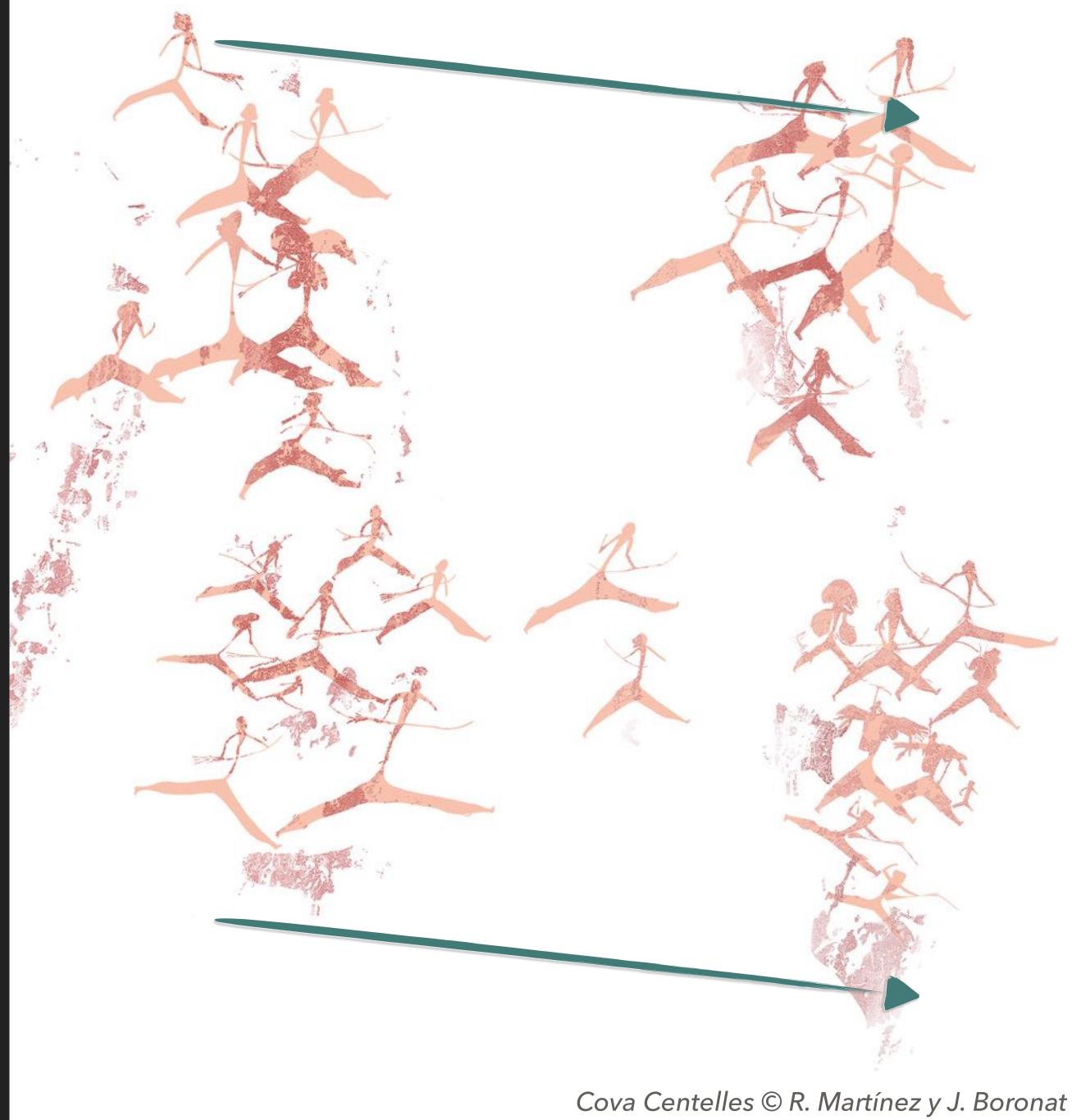

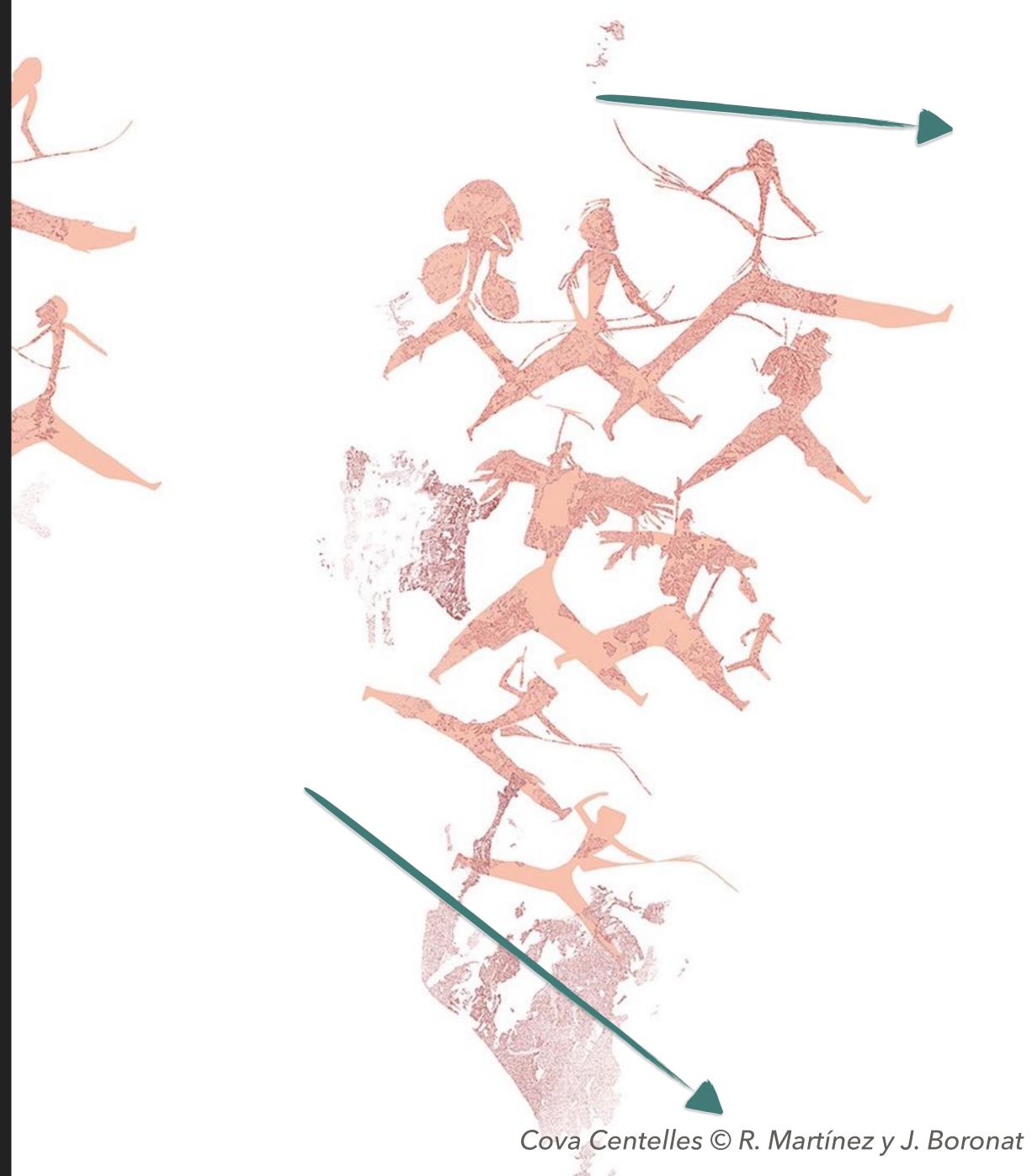
WOMEN IN COVA CENTELLES

- Moving campsite
- 30+ figures involved
- Archers and people carrying burden
- **Coordinated action**
- Carriers surrounded by archers
 - Interpreted as women carrying loads and children



GENDER ROLES IN COVA CENTELLES

- WOMEN ROLES
 - Carrying packs
 - Carrying children
 - Taking care of children
- MEN ROLES
 - Carrying packs
 - Defend flanks and rearguard
 - Attack menaces

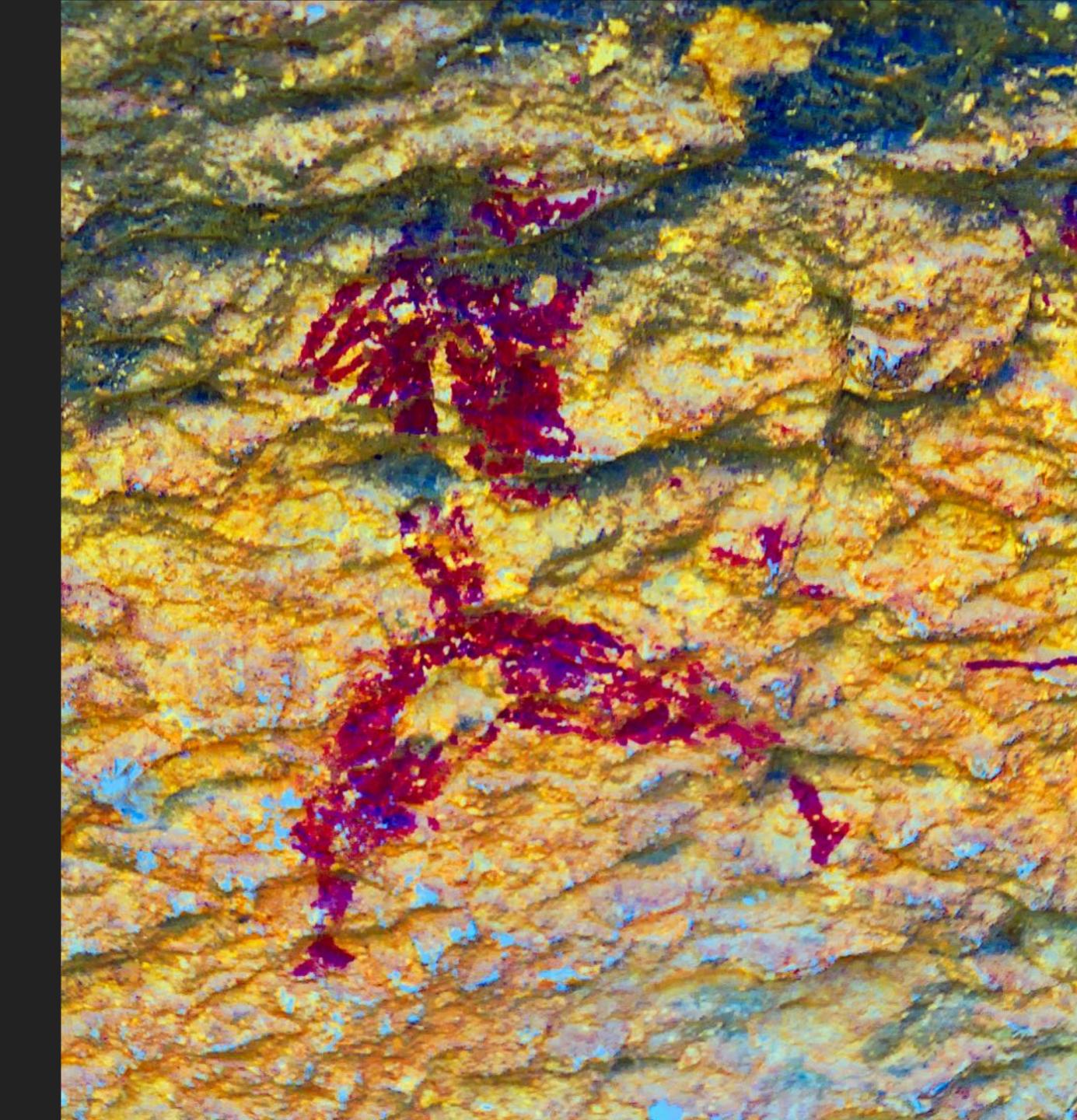






WOMEN IN TROUSERS

- Arrival to campsite
- Some women still carrying burden
- They are wearing broad trousers and show their breasts



WOMEN GIVING BIRTH

- Two women wearing trousers seated face to face
 - One is bent to help giving birth to the other
 - A small figure appear below the hips of the second woman
- Woman caring to a man laying on the floor
- Women caring other people (male and female)

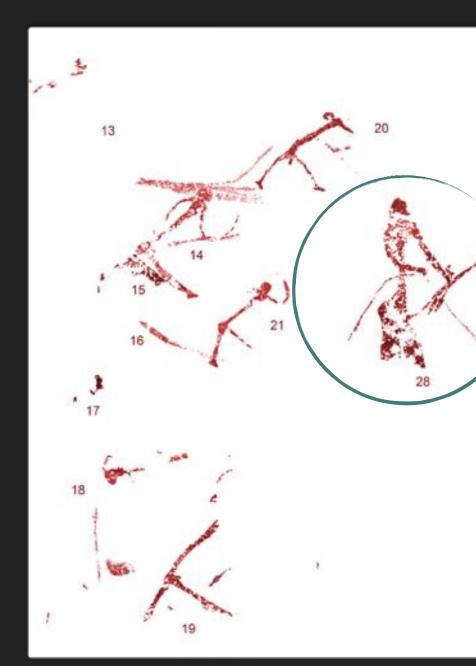

- One figure from Cova dels Rossegadors can be interpreted as a woman holding bow and arrows
- Holding an animal with a rope
- Symbolic figure?
- Lady of the beasts?



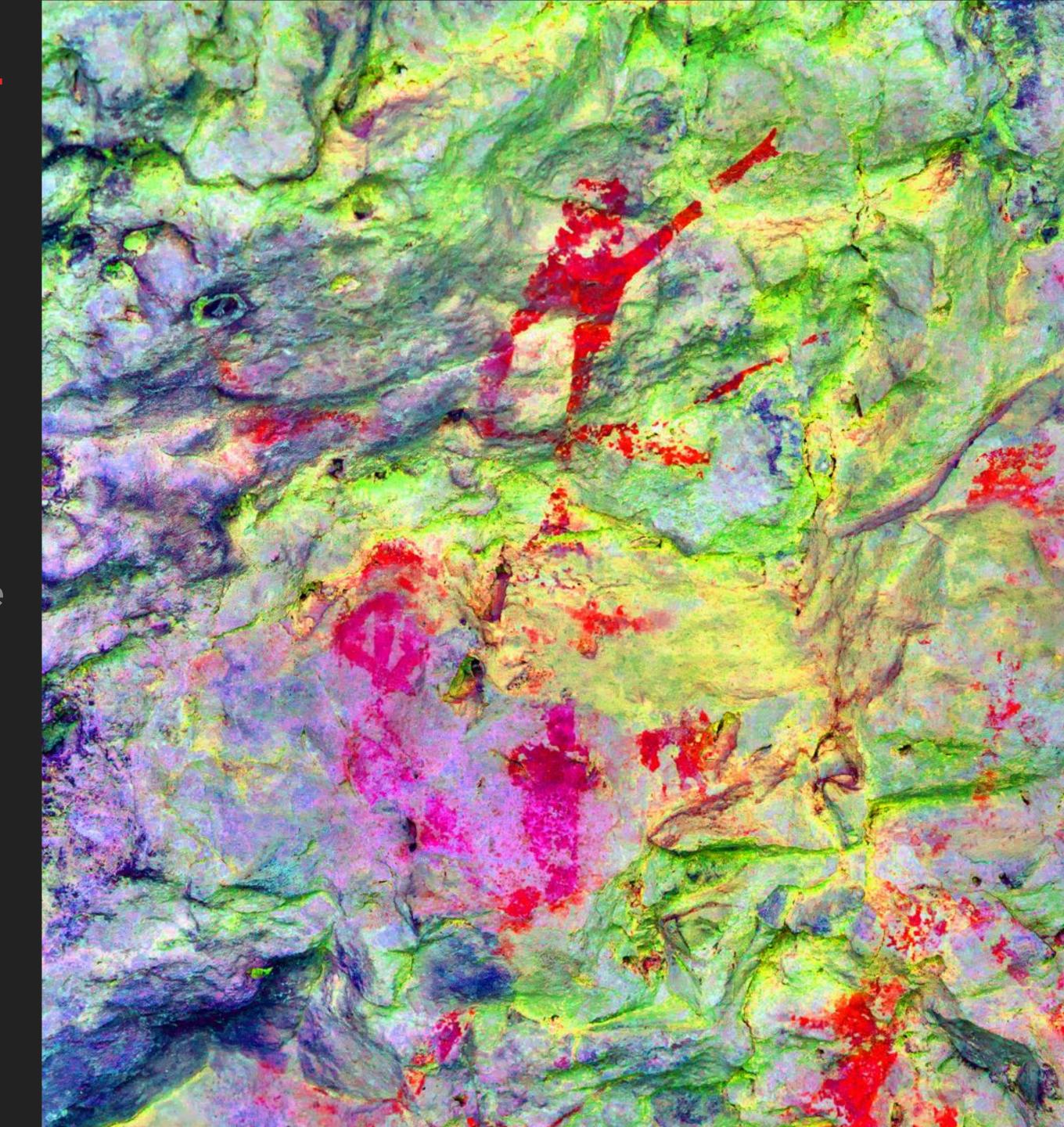






SOCIAL SPHERE IN GENDER IN LEVANTINE ART

- Significant female roles are depicted in scenes of the first stage
- Changing roles for women could be reflecting changes of hunter-gatherer societies over time?
 - From egalatirian societies to progressive subordination to men?
 - Just a symbolic world interaction? Or a reflection of everyday life?
 - Who was painting? Men, women?





LEVANTINE ART

HEADDRESSES

- Headdresses are the most striking personal adornments in Levantine art
- Mainly wore by male figures or archers
- It includes horned bonnets, flat top hats, feather headdresses, hairstyles, animals skins...
- Identity markers? Group affiliation?
- It can be used as a marker of the regional variations





IDENTITY MARKERS

- Antennae headdresses
- Worn by archers in northern areas
- Maybe some women too
 - Cultural region marker
 - Group affiliation marker
 - Fashion element temporal marker















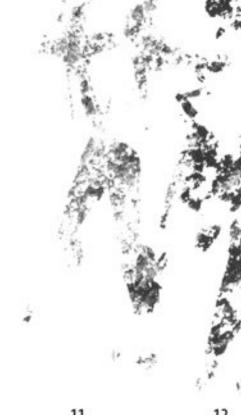






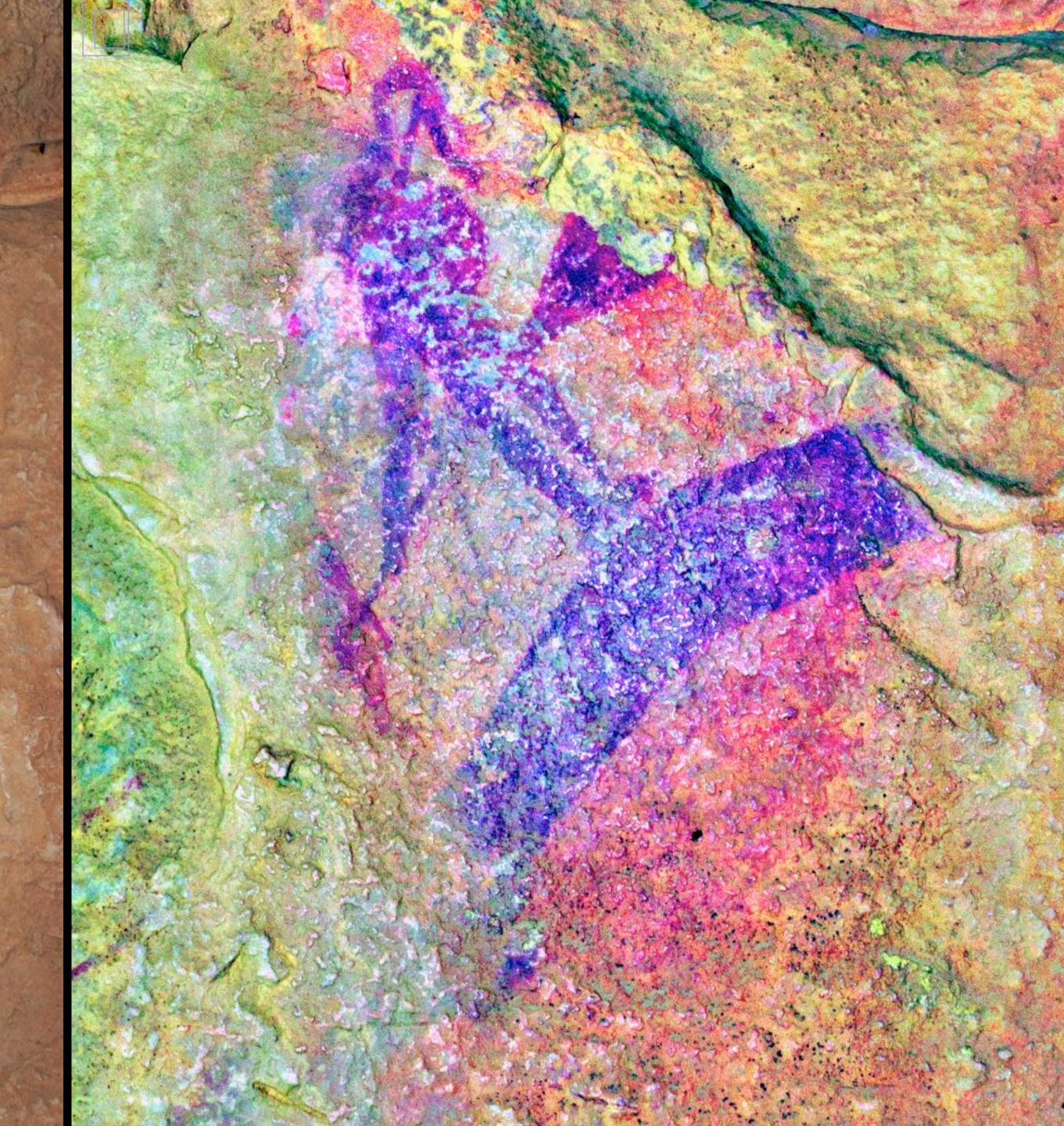




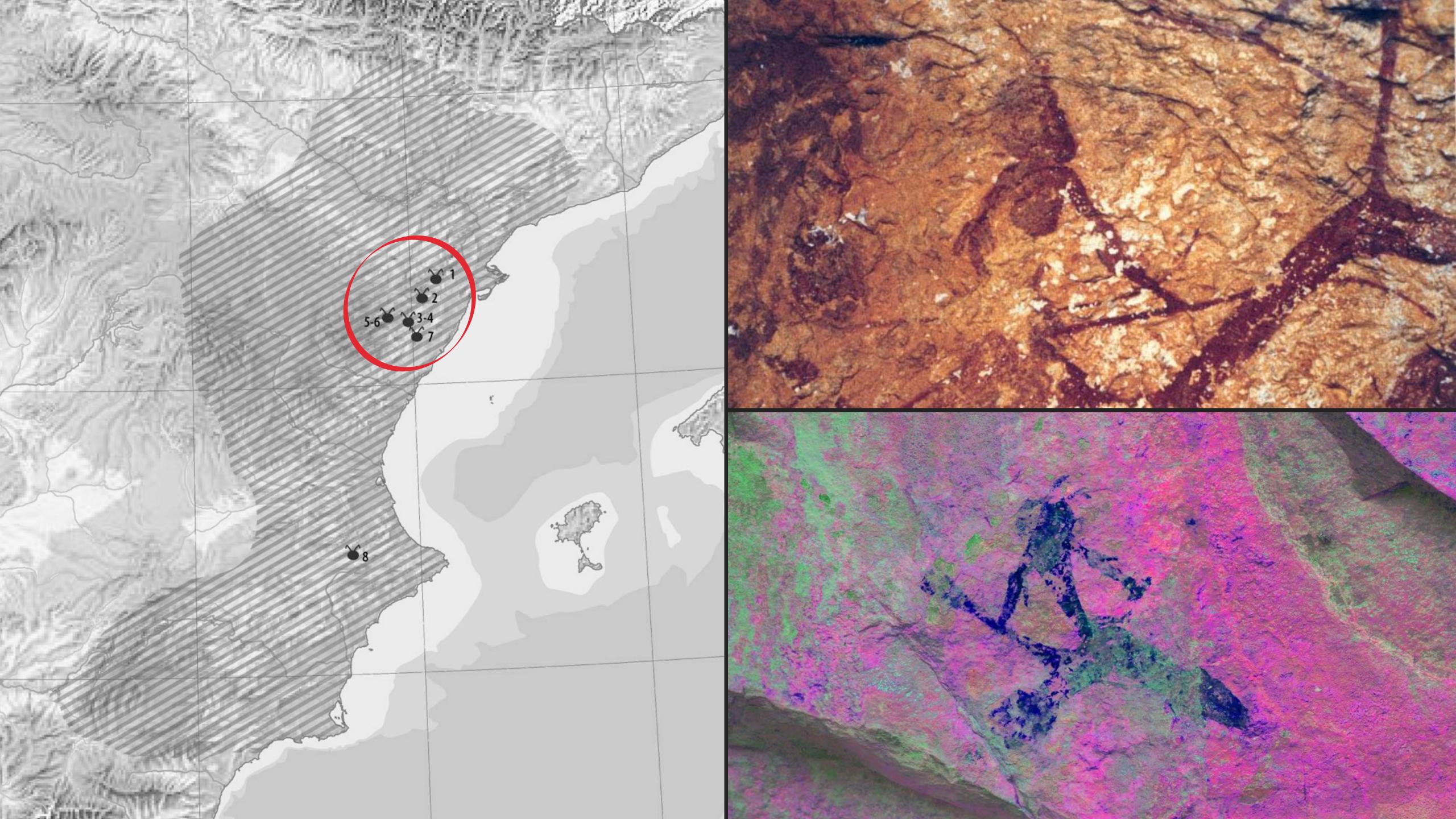




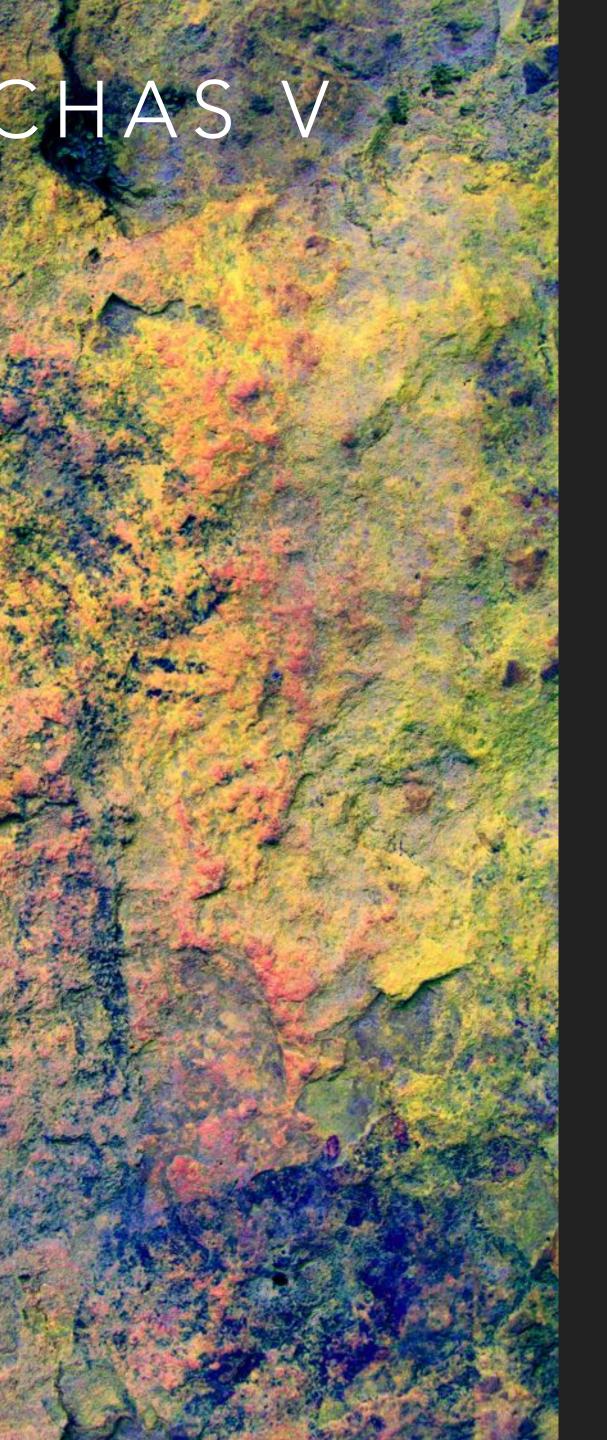

NARRATIVITY

- Hunting scenes as collective or individual actions
- Collective hunting could be a seasonal activity linked to bands gathering
 - Massive hunting as exaggeration
 - Massive hunting as prestige
 - Massive hunting as real activity linked to communal rites.

LEVANTINE ART – VIOLENCE

- Violence between people is shown in Levantine art
- War and deadly actions are a special kind of collective scenes
- Fight between two groups of archers
 - **Distance fighting**
 - Dead or wounded people
 - **Ritualistic?**



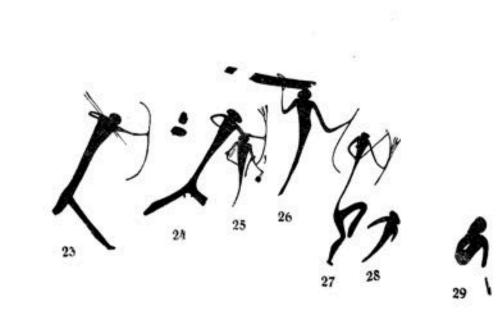


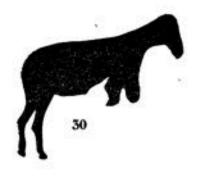

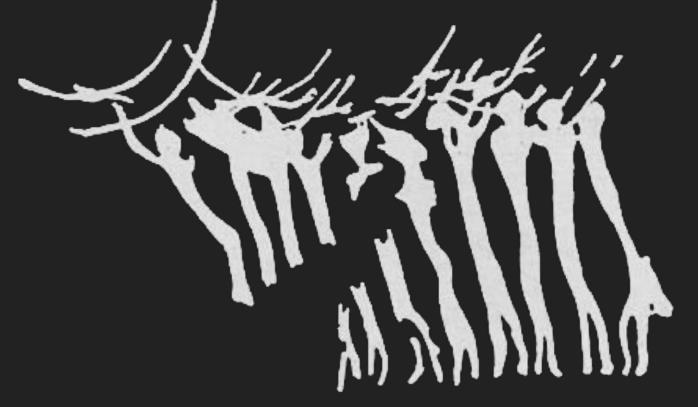




LEVANTINE ART – VIOLENCE

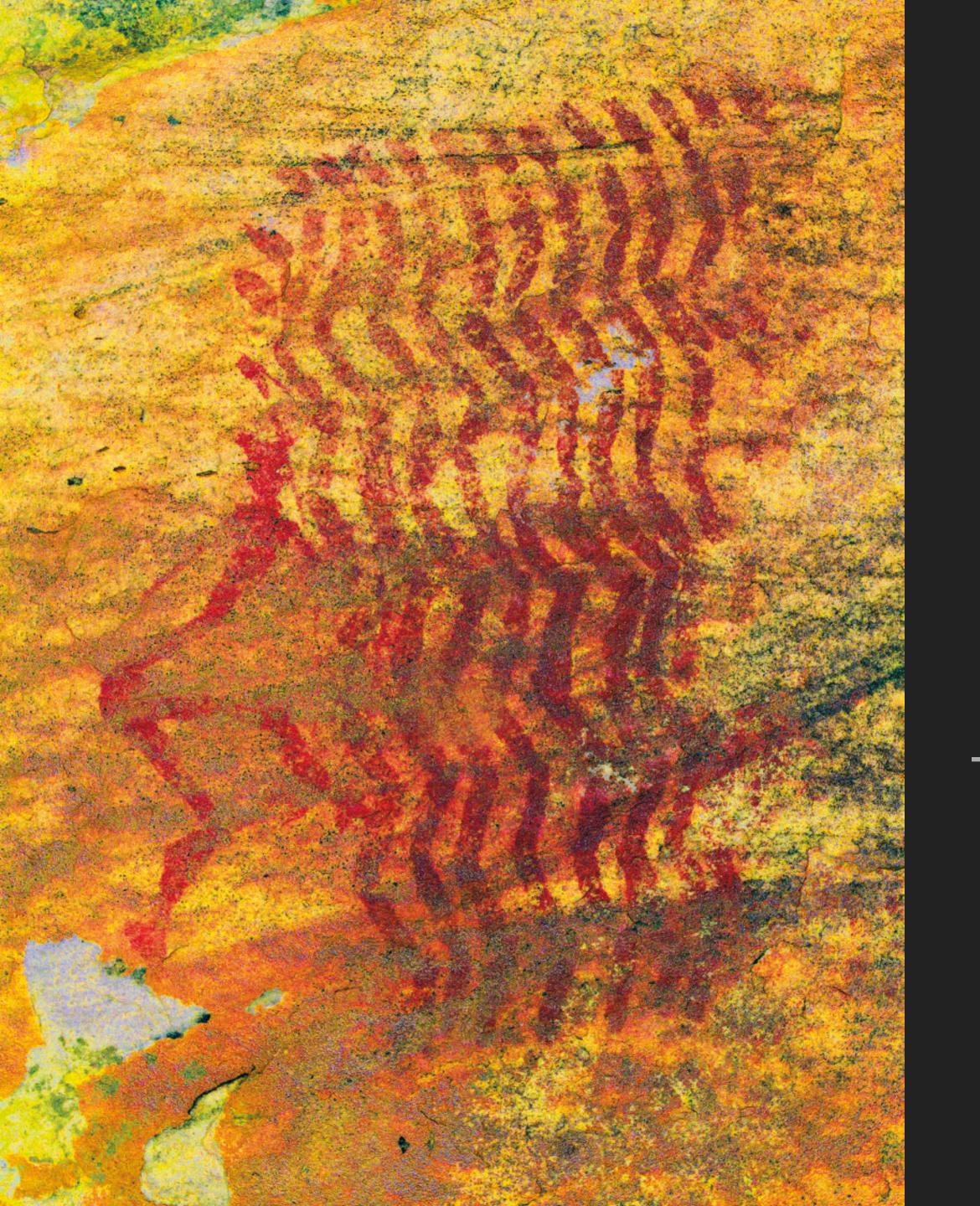

SOCIAL SPHERES

- Levantine rock art emphasises some aspects of the life of hunter-gatherers
- But other crucial aspects of those societies are completely ignored or hidden
- The codified message in Levantine scenes is culturally mediated
 - However, a significant amount of information can be retrieved





MANIPULATED MESSAGES

- Gender, identity, feast, consumption, war and violence are described in this rock art assemblage
- Social sphere shows cooperation and collective identity
- Also a growing number of conflicts
 - Gender issues
 - Subordinated women
 - Hierarchy
 - Competence and war



MANIPULATED MESSAGES

- Hunting scenes represents collaboration from social bonds
 - Large animal hunting could be connected to feast and consumption
 - Seasonal gathering of bands
 - Rock art could be sanctioning this fission-fusion strategies



MANIPULATED MESSAGES

- Rock art can be used for reconstruct some aspects of the social life of prehistoric people
- Levantine art is a privileged example of how hunter-gatherers rock art can be used for this purpose
