A Piecewise-Linear NDF

Microfacet BSDFs Generated from NDFs and Explicit Microgeometry

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This document contains the mathematical justifications concerning the *Piecewise-Linear NDF* presented in the paper. We provide all the mathematical details for the normalization factor, its corresponding importance sampling procedure (Section 2) as well as the Smith-Bourlier GAF computation (Section 3) thus giving practical information on its implementation.

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1 A Piecewise-Linear normal distribution function

1.1 General anisotropic formulation

We define our anisotropic Normal Distribution Function (NDF from now on) D(m) (with φ and θ the polar coordinates of the normal m) as an interpolation over φ from two normalized isotropic distributions D_x when $\varphi = 0$ and D_y when $\varphi = \frac{\pi}{2}$:

$$D(m) = \frac{\cos^2 \varphi D_x(\theta) D_y(0) + \sin^2 \varphi D_y(\theta) D_x(0)}{c} \tag{1}$$

with $c = \frac{1}{2}(D_y(0) + D_x(0))$ the normalization factor. This latter is computed in the following manner:

$$c = \int_{\varphi=0}^{2\pi} \int_{\theta=0}^{\frac{\pi}{2}} D(\theta,\varphi) \cos\theta \sin\theta \, d\theta \, d\varphi$$

$$= 4 \int_{\varphi=0}^{\frac{\pi}{2}} \int_{\theta=0}^{\frac{\pi}{2}} D(\theta,\varphi) \cos\theta \sin\theta \, d\theta \, d\varphi$$

$$= 4 \int_{\varphi=0}^{\frac{\pi}{2}} \int_{\theta=0}^{\frac{\pi}{2}} (\cos^2 \varphi D_x(\theta) D_y(0) + \sin^2 \varphi D_y(\theta) D_x(0)) \cos\theta \sin\theta \, d\theta \, d\varphi$$

$$= 4 \int_{\varphi=0}^{\frac{\pi}{2}} D_y(0) \cos^2 \varphi \int_{\theta=0}^{\frac{\pi}{2}} D_x(\theta) \cos\theta \sin\theta \, d\theta \, d\varphi$$

$$+ 4 \int_{\varphi=0}^{\frac{\pi}{2}} D_x(0) \sin^2 \varphi \int_{\theta=0}^{\frac{\pi}{2}} D_y(\theta) \cos\theta \sin\theta \, d\theta \, d\varphi.$$
(2)

 $D_x(\theta)$ and $D_y(\theta)$ have to be normalized, then $\int_{\theta=0}^{\frac{\pi}{2}} D_{iso}(\theta) \cos(\theta) \sin(\theta) d\theta = \frac{1}{2\pi}$ and finally

$$c = \frac{4D_y(0)}{2\pi} \int_{\varphi=0}^{\frac{\pi}{2}} \cos^2(\varphi) \, d\varphi + \frac{4D_x(0)}{2\pi} \int_{\varphi=0}^{\frac{\pi}{2}} \sin^2(\varphi) \, d\varphi$$
$$= \frac{2D_y(0)}{\pi} \frac{\pi}{4} + \frac{2D_x(0)}{\pi} \frac{\pi}{4}$$
$$= \frac{1}{2} (D_y(0) + D_x(0)) \tag{3}$$

Note that the formulation proposed in Equation 1 is different from common anisotropic distributions (e.g GGX or Beckmann). For example, if we choose D_x and D_y as isotropic beckmann distributions, Equation 1 gives an alternative anisotropic distribution slightly different from the conventional anisotropic Beckmann formulation.

In the case where $D_x(0) = D_y(0) = 0$, the normalization factor is null and Equation 1 is undefined. Hopefully, in such a case, the distribution can be simply expressed as $D(m) = \cos^2 \varphi D_x(\theta) + \sin^2 \varphi D_y(\theta)$ because it is already normalized.

1.2 Controllable Isotropic NDF

Our anisotropic NDF formulation (Equation 1) allows to blend two different isotropic NDFs: for example one could be defined from GGX formulation and the second from Beckmann, both with eventually different roughness parameters. This give more flexibility in NDF shape design. Unfortunately, Smith-Bourlier GAF derivation [9, 3] is not trivial.

To give more user NDF control, and to overcome the intractable GAF computation issue, we build a user controllable NDF upon a piecewise continuous isotropic NDF $D_{iso}(\theta)$ defined as a combination of n linear functions

$$D_{iso}(\theta) = \begin{cases} a_1\theta + b_1 & \theta_0 = 0 \le \theta \le \theta_1 \\ a_2\theta + b_2 & \theta_1 \le \theta \le \theta_2 \\ \cdots \\ a_n\theta + b_n & \theta_{n-1} \le \theta \le \theta_n = \frac{\pi}{2} \end{cases}$$
(4)

This distribution have to be normalized which means $\int_{\Omega+} D_{iso}(m)(m \cdot n)dm = 1$. The normalization factor c_{iso} is given by

$$c_{iso} = \int_{\varphi=0}^{2\pi} \int_{\theta=0}^{\frac{\pi}{2}} D_{iso}(\theta) \cos \theta \sin \theta \, d\theta \, d\varphi$$

$$= 2\pi \int_{\theta=0}^{\frac{\pi}{2}} D_{iso}(\theta) \cos \theta \sin \theta \, d\theta$$

$$= 2\pi \sum_{i=1}^{n} \int_{\theta=\theta_{i-1}}^{\theta_{i}} (a_{i}\theta + b_{i}) \cos \theta \sin \theta \, d\theta$$

$$= \frac{\pi}{4} \sum_{i=1}^{n} 2(a_{i}\theta_{i-1} + b_{i}) \cos(2\theta_{i-1}) - 2(a_{i}\theta_{i} + b_{i}) \cos(2\theta_{i})$$

$$+a_{i}(\sin(2\theta_{i}) - \sin(2\theta_{i-1}))$$
(5)

In the following, we always consider D_{iso} as normalized by default (already divided by c_{iso}). Now, the parameters D_x and D_y can be inserted in Equation 1. We obtain finally our full Piecewise-Linear NDF, where D_x and D_y can be discretized from any common NDFs (Beckmann [2], GGX [10], or more generally STD [7]) or directly controlled by the user by moving up or down the values of the distribution in discrete θ .

2 Importance sampling

The microfacet normal m is sampled according to the probability density function $pdf(m) = D(m)|m \cdot n|$ and its associated cumulative distribution function:

$$cdf(m) = \frac{1}{c} \int_{\varphi=0}^{\varphi_m} \int_{\theta=0}^{\theta_m} (\cos^2(\varphi) D_x(\theta) D_y(0) + \sin^2(\varphi) D_y(\theta) D_x(0)) \cos(\theta) \sin(\theta) \ d\theta \ d\varphi \tag{6}$$

The sampling of the microfacet azimuthal angle φ_m and the elevation angle θ_m is not trivial. We first describe how to choose φ_m independently of θ_m and then explain how to sample θ_m .

2.1 φ_m importance sampling

As said before, the choice of φ_m is independent of θ_m . Thus, the *cdf* becomes:

$$cdf(\varphi_{m}) = \frac{1}{c} \int_{\varphi=0}^{\varphi_{m}} \int_{\theta=0}^{\frac{\pi}{2}} (\cos^{2}(\varphi) D_{x}(\theta) D_{y}(0) + \sin^{2}(\varphi) D_{y}(\theta) D_{x}(0)) \cos(\theta) \sin(\theta) \, d\theta \, d\varphi$$

$$= \frac{1}{c} \left(\int_{\varphi=0}^{\varphi_{m}} \cos^{2}(\varphi) D_{y}(0) \int_{\theta=0}^{\frac{\pi}{2}} D_{x}(\theta) \cos(\theta) \sin(\theta) \, d\theta \, d\varphi \right)$$

$$+ \int_{\varphi=0}^{\varphi_{m}} \sin^{2}(\varphi) D_{x}(0) \int_{\theta=0}^{\frac{\pi}{2}} D_{y}(\theta) \cos(\theta) \sin(\theta) \, d\theta \, d\varphi \right)$$

$$= \frac{1}{c} \left(\frac{D_{y}(0)}{2\pi} \int_{\varphi=0}^{\varphi_{m}} \cos^{2}(\varphi) \, d\varphi + \frac{D_{x}(0)}{2\pi} \int_{\varphi=0}^{\varphi_{m}} \sin^{2}(\varphi) \, d\varphi \right)$$

$$= \frac{D_{y}(0)}{\pi (D_{y}(0) + D_{x}(0))} \left(\frac{\varphi_{m}}{2} + \frac{1}{4} \sin(2\varphi_{m}) \right)$$

$$+ \frac{D_{x}(0)}{\pi (D_{y}(0) + D_{x}(0))} \left(\frac{\varphi_{m}}{2} - \frac{1}{4} \sin(2\varphi_{m}) \right)$$

$$cdf(\varphi_{m}) = \frac{\varphi_{m}}{2\pi} + \frac{D_{y}(0) - D_{x}(0)}{4\pi (D_{y}(0) + D_{x}(0))} \sin(2\varphi_{m}).$$
(7)

Unfortunately, this CDF is not directly invertible. As shown in Figure 1, the CDF is equal to the linear function $\frac{\varphi}{2\pi}$ for $\varphi = \{0, \frac{\pi}{2}, \pi, \frac{3\pi}{2}, 2\pi\}$. If we limit the domain to $[0, \frac{\pi}{2}]$, we can observe that the shape of

the CDF is smooth and have a close-to-linear nature (exactly linear if $D_x(0) = D_y(0)$). In the manner of [6], we can combine a bracketing interval and Newton's method (alg. 1) to invert the CDF given ξ_1 , a uniform random number in [0, 1). For that, we need the derivative of the CDF:

$$cdf'(\varphi_m) = \frac{1}{2\pi} + \frac{D_y(0) - D_x(0)}{2\pi(D_y(0) + D_x(0))}\cos(2\varphi_m).$$

2.2 θ_m importance sampling

Knowing the azimuthal angle φ_m , the *cdf* to sample θ_m is:

$$cdf(\theta_m|\varphi_m) = \frac{1}{c} \int_{\varphi=0}^{2\pi} \int_{\theta=0}^{\theta_m} (\cos^2(\varphi) D_x(\theta) D_y(0) + \sin^2(\varphi) D_y(\theta) D_x(0)) \cos\theta \sin\theta \ d\theta \ d\varphi.$$
(8)

Note that $cdf(\frac{\pi}{2}) = \frac{D_y(0)\cos^2(\varphi_m) + D_x(0)\sin^2(\varphi_m)}{c}$ which is in fact the normalization factor of the *cdf*. Thus, we obtain $D_z(0)\cos^2(\varphi_m) + D_z(0)\sin^2(\varphi_m)$

$$cdf(\theta_m|\varphi_m) = \xi_2 * \frac{D_y(0)\cos^2(\varphi_m) + D_x(0)\sin^2(\varphi_m)}{c}$$

with $\xi_2 \in [0, 1)$ a second uniform random number. The problem here again is to invert the *cdf* and given a uniform random value of ξ_2 , get the value of θ_m :

$$cdf^{-1}(\xi'_2) = \theta_m$$

with $\xi'_2 = \xi_2 * \frac{D_y(0)\cos^2(\varphi_m) + D_x(0)\sin^2(\varphi_m)}{c}$. Our distribution is a continuous piecewise distribution and the *cdf* can be written as a sum of integrals:

$$cdf(\theta_{m}|\varphi_{m}) = \cos^{2}(\varphi_{m})\sum_{i=1}^{k}\int_{\theta=\theta_{i}}^{\theta_{i+1}}\frac{2\pi D_{x}(\theta)D_{y}(0)\cos(\theta)\sin(\theta)\ d\theta}{c}$$

+
$$\sin^{2}(\varphi_{m})\sum_{i=1}^{k}\int_{\theta=\theta_{i}}^{\theta_{i+1}}\frac{2\pi D_{y}(\theta)D_{x}(0)\cos(\theta)\sin(\theta)\ d\theta}{c}$$

+
$$\frac{2\pi}{c}\int_{\theta=\theta_{k+1}}^{\theta_{m}}\left(\cos^{2}(\varphi_{m})D_{x}(\theta)D_{y}(0)+\sin^{2}(\varphi_{m})D_{y}(\theta)D_{x}(0)\right)\cos(\theta)\sin(\theta)\ d\theta.$$
(9)

The terms in red color can be precomputed and tabulated and we call it T_x^k and T_y^k respectively. The sum of these two first terms is also the $cdf(\theta_{k+1}|\varphi_m)$ of the elevation angle θ_{k+1} for a given azimuthal angle φ_m . Moreover, given a uniform number ξ_2 , the corresponding elevation angle is $\theta_m \in [\theta_{k+1}, \theta_{k+2}]$. Thus, we have

$$\frac{2\pi}{c} \int_{\theta=\theta_{k+1}}^{\theta_m} \left(\cos^2(\varphi_m) D_x(\theta) D_y(0) + \sin^2(\varphi_m) D_y(\theta) D_x(0)\right) \cos(\theta) \sin(\theta) \ d\theta = \xi_2' - cdf(\theta_{k+1}|\varphi_m)$$

$$\int_{\theta=\theta_{k+1}}^{\theta_m} \left(\cos^2(\varphi_m) D_x(\theta) D_y(0) + \sin^2(\varphi_m) D_y(\theta) D_x(0)\right) \cos(\theta) \sin(\theta) \ d\theta = \frac{c(\xi_2' - cdf(\theta_{k+1}|\varphi_m))}{2\pi}$$

$$\int_{\theta=\theta_{k+1}}^{\theta_m} \left(\left(\cos^2(\varphi_m) D_y(0) a_{k+1}^x + \sin^2(\varphi_m) D_x(0) a_{k+1}^y\right) \theta + \cos^2(\varphi_m) D_y(0) b_{k+1}^x + \sin^2(\varphi_m) D_x(0) b_{k+1}^y\right) \cos(\theta) \sin(\theta) \ d\theta = \frac{c(\xi_2' - cdf(\theta_{k+1}|\varphi_m))}{2\pi}.$$

with a_k^j and b_k^j parameters of linear functions for the interval k and axis j in our picewise isotropic NDF definition (Equation 4). To simplify the notations, we note

$$\begin{aligned}
A^{aniso} &= \cos^2(\varphi_m) D_y(0) a_{k+1}^x + \sin^2(\varphi_m) D_x(0) a_{k+1}^y \\
B^{aniso} &= \cos^2(\varphi_m) D_y(0) b_{k+1}^x + \sin^2(\varphi_m) D_x(0) b_{k+1}^x \\
C &= \frac{b(\xi_2' - cdf(\theta_{k+1}|\varphi_m))}{2\pi}.
\end{aligned}$$

Now we have:

$$\int_{\theta=\theta_{k+1}}^{\theta_m} (A^{aniso}\theta + B)\cos(\theta)\sin(\theta) \ d\theta = C$$

$$\frac{1}{8} \left(2(A^{aniso}\theta_{k+1} + B^{aniso})\cos(2\theta_{k+1}) - 2(A^{aniso}\theta_m + B^{aniso})\cos(2\theta_m) + A^{aniso}(\sin(2\theta_m) - \sin(2\theta_{k+1})) \right) = C.$$

This function is smooth enough to adopt the same strategy as for the sampling of φ_m . Knowing the θ interval where is the desired θ_m (for a given ξ_2), we propose the algorithm 2. The starting point is given by the linear function $\xi'_2 = a\theta_m + shift$ with $a = \frac{cdf(\theta_{k+2}|\varphi_m) - cdf(\theta_{k+1}|\varphi_m)}{\theta_{k+2} - \theta_{k+1}}$ and $shift = cdf(\theta_{k+1}|\varphi_m) - a\theta_{k+1}$.

3 GAF computation

Following the Smith-Bourlier GAF assumptions, Ashikhmin et al. [1, 5] propose the expression

$$G_1(o,m) = \frac{\cos\theta_o}{\int_{\Omega} \langle o \cdot m \rangle D(m) \ d \ m} \tag{10}$$

where the integral is the most complicated part to compute. A first solution is to pre-compute the GAF for different values of (θ_o, φ_o) (the spherical coordinates of the vector o) and store them in a 2D-table. We propose here an alternative solution by trying to solve the integral by decomposing the integration domain in sub-domains.

$$\int_{\Omega} \langle o \cdot m \rangle D(m) \ d \ m = \int_{\varphi_m=0}^{2\pi} \int_{\theta_m=0}^{\frac{\pi}{2}} \chi^+(o \cdot m)(o \cdot m)D(m)\sin\theta_m \ d\theta_m \ d\varphi_m \\
= \int_{\varphi_m=0}^{2\pi} \int_{\theta_m=0}^{\frac{\pi}{2}} \chi^+(x_o \sin\theta_m \cos\varphi_m + y_o \sin\theta_m \sin\varphi_m + z_o \cos\theta_m) \\
(x_o \sin\theta_m \cos\varphi_m + y_o \sin\theta_m \sin\varphi_m + z_o \cos\theta_m)D(m)\sin\theta_m \ d\theta_m \ d\varphi_m$$
(11)

with $\chi^+(a)$ the Heaviside function (1 if a > 0 and 0 if $a \le 0$). When $\varphi_m \in [\varphi_o - \frac{\pi}{2}, \varphi_o + \frac{\pi}{2}]$, the dot product is positive so the Heaviside function can be dropped on this half integration domain

$$\int_{\Omega} \langle o \cdot m \rangle D(m) \ d \ m = \int_{\varphi_m = \varphi_o - \frac{\pi}{2}}^{\varphi_o + \frac{\pi}{2}} \int_{\theta_m = 0}^{\frac{\pi}{2}} (o \cdot m) D(m) \sin \theta_m \ d\theta_m \ d\varphi_m
+ \int_{\varphi_m = \varphi_o + \frac{\pi}{2}}^{\varphi_o + \frac{3\pi}{2}} \int_{\theta_m = 0}^{\frac{\pi}{2}} \chi^+ (x_o \sin \theta_m \cos \varphi_m + y_o \sin \theta_m \sin \varphi_m + z_o \cos \theta_m)
(x_o \sin \theta_m \cos \varphi_m + y_o \sin \theta_m \sin \varphi_m + z_o \cos \theta_m) D(m) \sin \theta_m \ d\theta_m \ d\varphi_m.$$

Using a trigonometric transformation, we can observe that $(o \cdot m) = \sin \theta_o \sin \theta_m \cos(\varphi_m - \varphi_o) + \cos \theta_o \cos \theta_m$ and so

$$\int_{\Omega} \langle o \cdot m \rangle D(m) \ d \ m = \int_{\theta_m=0}^{\frac{\pi}{2}} \int_{\varphi_m=\varphi_o-\frac{\pi}{2}}^{\varphi_o+\frac{\pi}{2}} (\sin \theta_o \sin \theta_m \cos(\varphi_m - \varphi_o) + \cos \theta_o \cos \theta_m) \\
D(\theta_m, \varphi_m) \sin \theta_m \ d\varphi_m \ d\theta_m \\
+ \int_{\theta_m=0}^{\frac{\pi}{2}} \int_{\varphi_m=\varphi_o+\frac{\pi}{2}}^{\varphi_o+\frac{3\pi}{2}} \chi^+ (\sin \theta_o \sin \theta_m \cos(\varphi_m - \varphi_o) + \cos \theta_o \cos \theta_m) \\
(\sin \theta_o \sin \theta_m \cos(\varphi_m - \varphi_o) + \cos \theta_o \cos \theta_m) D(\theta_m, \varphi_m) \sin \theta_m \ d\varphi_m \ d\theta_m.$$
(13)

The integrals of this equation are noted I_1 and I_2 respectively. I_1 can be analytically computed (Sections 3.1). I_2 is more complicated and we explain in Section 3.2 how to handle it.

3.1 Computation of I_1

We can see that the two terms in blue correspond to the coefficients $(T_x^n - T_x^k)$ and $(T_y^n - T_y^k)$. The two integrals over $\theta_m \in [E, \theta_{k+1}]$ can be also computed analytically. The other integrals are grouped as a sum in a function called Λ :

The two integral cannot be computed analytically and we propose to use a numerical approach to evaluate it. As our distribution is a piecewise function, we use a trapezoidal rule to approximate it:

with Δ_{θ} a constant if each sector of the decomposition over θ is equal and part1 and part2 the integrals over θ_m in Equation 27.

3.3 GAF plots

Finally, the GAF expression is

Figure 3 shown two examples of the GAF computed for two random configurations of our controllable distribution.

3.4 Correlated GAF

Previous computations are based on the Ashikhmin et al. [1, 5] expression (Equation 10). Other more convenient expressions of this function can be obtained starting from the work of Bourlier [3]. Walter et al. [10] and more recently Heitz [5] express the normal distribution in the slopes space $P_{22}(p,q)$:

$$P_{22}(p,q) = \cos^4 \theta_m \ D(m), \tag{30}$$

where p and q correspond to the surface slopes in the local coordinate system, defining the normal m, such that $p^2 + q^2 = \tan^2 \theta_m$. The one dimensional distribution of slopes is given by:

$$P_2(q) = \int_{-\infty}^{+\infty} P_{22}(p,q) \, dp. \tag{31}$$

Finally, $G_1(v)$ is obtained by the integration of P_2 :

$$G_1(v) = \frac{1}{1 + \Lambda(v)},$$

where $\Lambda(v) = \frac{1}{\mu} \int_{-\infty}^{+\infty} (q-\mu) P_2(q) \, dq$ and $\mu = \cot \theta_v$. A formal proof of these derivations is given by Heitz in [5].

Note that this GAF version is used by most rendering systems, though the discussion proposed by Ross et al. [8] or Heitz et al. [4] expresses correlated versions between masking and shadowing, considered

as physically more plausible. One more accurate formulation, equivalently computational costly, is the heigth-correlated masking and shadowing expression:

$$G(i, o, m) = \frac{1}{1 + \Lambda(i) + \Lambda(o)}.$$

Note that Equations 10 and 32 are equivalent and thus the expression of the function Λ is given by:

In Equation 16, $I_1 = \frac{\cos \theta_o}{2} + I_{11}$ and thus

Knowing the function Λ allows to compute the heigh-correlated masking and shadowing expression of the Smith GAF (Equation 33) considered as physically more plausible.

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
