DARIAH Beyond Europe

DARIAH is a European consortium that develops and supports technical and social infrastructures for DH, e.g., **working groups, tools, platforms, and directories.**

What is DARIAH doing “Beyond Europe”?

The international DH community has the same needs that inspire DARIAH’s infrastructures. Why not encourage worldwide research and international cooperation with access to its well-supported resources?

This project funded and organised **three workshops** in the United States and Australia to encourage **cross-cultural exchange**, and introduce many non-European DH scholars to DARIAH.

They also highlighted the **lack of high-level infrastructural support** for DH beyond Europe, e.g., the US has a history of unsuccessful national-scale infrastructure efforts, while Australia has invested substantially in coordinated national research infrastructure in science and technology, but very little on a national scale in the humanities and arts.

How far beyond Europe?

One major outcome of all workshops was the shared recognition that, in spite of extensive funding, planning, and goodwill, these workshops were **not nearly global enough** in their reach: most importantly they were not inclusive of the **Global South**.
