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## Particle Induced X-ray Emission (PIXE)



#### • PIXE method :

- Incident beam energy : <4 MeV
- Non-destructive multi-elemental method (Z >11)
- Fast analysis (few minutes)
- Quantitative analysis
- Good sensitivity (µg/g)
- Analysis of thin layers close to the surface





## High energy PIXE (HE PIXE)

- study of thick and multilayer objects:
  - Energy beam: few MeV
  - Proton range: ~mm
  - In-depth analysis
  - Adapted for thick archeologic object
  - Detection of elements thanks to their more energetic K line

Quantization requires a good knowledge of the ionization cross section :

- Experimental data
- Theoretical values

#### **Ionization cross section:** Theoretical model (RECPSSR)

- RECPSSR model takes into account the relativistic effect of the projectile
- RECPSSR model have been validated with the bibiolographic data at low energy
- The lack of high-energy experimental data does not allow to verify the model over this range in energy (30 – 70 MeV)

- ➔ constant production cross section
- ightarrow Independent of the fluorescence yield
- → Indepdendent of the intensity of a given transition b

#### **Current load measurement**

- Use of an faraday cup equipped with a guard ring
- Uncertainty : 0.5%
- For our measurements, all incident particles reach the faraday cup

→ Number of incident particles  $N_P$

- Determination of the thickness:
  - Mass with a precision of  $10^{-5}$ g
  - Surface with a high-precision scanner

- Silver:  $10.11 \pm 0.09 \ \mu m$

  - fitting of the characteristic peaks of the K layers.
  - integration on fitting curve
  - Correction dead time of detector
- Uncertainty : <1%
  - (statistic and fitting)

### Conclusions:

- We have measured ionization cross section with high-energy protons (30 68 MeV)
- It completes the lack of experimental data in this energy region
- We have compared our measurements with a theoretical model
  - At high-energy, there is an underestimation of the ionization cross section

- what remains to be done:
  - acquire new experimental data with other targets and energies
  - understand the difference between our experimental points and the theoretical model
  - to develop HE PIXE applications at the ARRONAX cyclotron.
