1	Dimethyl sulfoxide (DMSO) is a dipolar aprotic solvent that can solubilize a variety of
2	polar and nonpolar molecules [1]. As a powerful solvent, DMSO has widely been used for
3	biological applications, particularly for pharmacological researches [2]. In biological assays,
4	numerous chemicals with low water solubility need to be dissolved in organic solvents prior
5	to addition to living systems [2]. The unique characteristic of DMSO is that it permeates into
6	living cells without causing significant damage, thus, making DMSO as one of the most used
7	solvents [3]. However, recent studies started to unveil a series of hidden and unexpected
8	actions of DMSO such as removal of hydroxyl radical at high concentration [4], and
9	cyto-toxicity at relatively low concentration in several biological models [1,2], including
10	plants [5], possibly due to the nature of DMSO to be readily associated with water, proteins,
11	carbonhydrates, nucleic acid, ionic substances and other constituents in living systems [3].
12	A study by Gurtovenko and Anwar (2007) [6] had elucidated the molecular mechanism
13	for DMSO interacting with synthetic phospholipid membranes, in which DMSO induces
14	membrane thinning at low concentration (< 10 %) and induces water pores at higher
15	concentration (10 - 20 %). Apparently, DMSO (even at low concentration) firstly acts on the
16	plasma membrane in living cells leading to the increased fluidity of water into the
17	intracellular spaces, therefore, implying the possibility that the cells are sensitized towards
18	hypo-osmotic shock (Hypo-OS).

19 Interestingly, Hypo-OS which is a model stimulus for studying the mechanical stretching

1	of plasma membrane in plant cells [7], reportedly stimulates the elevations of free $Ca^{2+}$
2	concentration in the cytosol and/or nuclei through the actions of putative mechano-sensitive
3	calcium channels in tobacco and rice cells [8-10]. Among the cations, Ca <sup>2+</sup> plays a pivotal
4	role as a second messenger in plants [11-13], thus, the elucidation of Ca <sup>2+</sup> signaling profile
5	upon Hypo-OS is of great importance. Here, we attempted to evaluate the effect of DMSO on
6	the hypo-osmotically induced elevations of $[Ca^{2+}]_C$ and $[Ca^{2+}]_N$ in plant cells by using two
7	transgenic lines of tobacco (Nicotiana tabacum L.; cell-line, BY-2) expressing a Ca <sup>2+</sup> -sensing
8	protein (aequorin) in either cytosol [8] or nucleus [14].
9	In the present study, we followed the recently proposed protocols, in which native and
10	fluorine(F)-substituted coelenterazines are used for reconstitution of cytosolically localized
11	native aequorin and nucleically localized F-aequorin in two transgenic lines of tobacco BY-2
12	cells (7-day-old culture) [15]. The aequorin luminescence reflecting the changes in
13	Hypo-OS-induced $[Ca^{2+}]_C$ and $[Ca^{2+}]_N$ was monitored by using a luminometer and expressed
14	as relative luminescence units (RLU) [15]. Hypo-OS was applied by injecting a known
15	volume of pure water onto the cell suspension (100 $\mu$ L) [15]. The extent of given Hypo-OS
16	was set at 112 mOsm (mmol kg <sup>-1</sup> ).
17	To study the impacts of DMSO on the Hypo-OS-induced $[Ca^{2+}]_C$ and $[Ca^{2+}]_N$ , the cells
18	were pre-incubated with different concentrations of DMSO for 5 min, which was sufficiently
19	long enough for stabilization of cells prior to addition of Hypo-OS (Fig. S1). Low (0.1 %;

1	v/v), moderate (0.5 %) and high doses (1 %) of DMSO were used and the results are shown
2	in Fig. 1(a-g). The typical traces of Hypo-OS-induced $[Ca^{2+}]_C$ and $[Ca^{2+}]_N$ showed that
3	Hypo-OS caused the biphasic increases in both $[Ca^{2+}]_C$ and $[Ca^{2+}]_N$ , consisted of the first
4	transient minor increases (1 <sup>st</sup> peak; observed within initial 30 s) and the second major
5	increases (2 <sup>nd</sup> peak; peaking time, <i>ca.</i> 85 $\pm$ 15 s) (Fig. 1a,b). Hypo-OS-triggered the 1 <sup>st</sup> and
6	$2^{nd}$ peaks in $[Ca^{2+}]_C$ and $[Ca^{2+}]_N$ were not altered by low dose of DMSO. Upon application of
7	moderate or high dose of DMSO, significant increases in the $1^{st}$ and $2^{nd}$ peaks in $[Ca^{2+}]_C$ and
8	$[Ca^{2+}]_N$ were observed (Fig. 1e,f). The most evident actions of DMSO (at high dose) was to
9	enhance the $1^{st}$ peaks of hypo-osmotically induced $[Ca^{2+}]_C$ and $[Ca^{2+}]_N$ , by 450 % and 250 %,
10	respectively (Fig. 1g). These results suggested that DMSO can enhance the actions of
11	Hypo-OS which is reflected by the increases in both $[Ca^{2+}]_C$ and $[Ca^{2+}]_N$ .
12	As the concentrations of DMSO applied in this study were much lower than the reported
13	concentration (10 - 20 %) causing the formation of pores [6], the pore formation on the
14	membranes is not likely to be induced. Instead, cells could be sensitized by DMSO's
15	membrane thinning effect [6], therefore, we have hypothesized that upon combination of
16	DMSO and Hypo-OS, transient infusion of water into the cells would be induced, and if this
17	is the case, any bulk movement of water may non-selectively accompany the movement of
18	solutes including extracellular Ca <sup>2+</sup> . In Fig. 1 (c and d), two sets of log-log plots emphasizing
19	the early events within few seconds following the Hypo-OS are shown, effectively

visualizing the impact of 1% DMSO on the Hypo-OS-induced immediate spikes prior to the 1 naturally induced 1<sup>st</sup> peak. Here, we view that such immediate supply of Ca<sup>2+</sup> may act for 2 potentiating the ion channel-mediated natural phases of  $[Ca^{2+}]_C$  and  $[Ca^{2+}]_N$  elevations. 3 Since the extents of DMSO-dependent enhancement observed in the 1<sup>st</sup> and 2<sup>nd</sup> phases 4  $([Ca^{2+}]_C \text{ and } [Ca^{2+}]_N)$  were not proportional (Fig. 1g), it is tempting to speculate that the 5 regulatory mechanisms for the  $1^{st}$  and  $2^{nd}$  [Ca<sup>2+</sup>] peaks may be independent from each other, 6 possibly involving different  $Ca^{2+}$  sources. The Hypo-OS-induced increases in  $[Ca^{2+}]_{C}$  and 7  $[Ca^{2+}]_N$  are reportedly sensitive to  $Gd^{3+}$ , a known inhibitor of stretch-activated  $Ca^{2+}$  channels, 8 suggesting that extracellular  $Ca^{2+}$  is required for elevations of  $[Ca^{2+}]_{C}$  and  $[Ca^{2+}]_{N}$  in response 9 to Hypo-OS [9,16]. In addition, internal  $Ca^{2+}$  stores, such as endoplasmic reticulum (ER), are 10 also considered to take part in intracellular  $[Ca^{2+}]$  elevations [9,15]. Recently, Wang et al. 11 (2017) [17] conducted a model assay on the side effect of DMSO used as a cryoprotectant in 12 bovine oocytes and observed that DMSO induces Ca<sup>2+</sup> release from ER allowing the Ca<sup>2+</sup> 13

elevations in both cytosol and mitochondria during the vitrification of bovine oocytes. By analogy, DMSO might enhance the release of  $Ca^{2+}$  from internal  $Ca^{2+}$  stores in plant cells under Hypo-OS.

17 Concerning the physiological significance of the use of DMSO, our stance is clear that 18 the use of DMSO in plant cellular models is far from naturally functioning physiological 19 condition. Our data clearly suggested that the use of DMSO which is highly favored in a

1	variety of biological models should be avoided in order to study the truly physiological
2	cellular responses to a variety of stimuli such as Hypo-OS. In addition, more examples of the
3	induced physiological distortion by DMSO are gradually accumulated in various models such
4	as hydroponically grown rice seedlings [5] uncovering the actions of DMSO (up to $0.1$ %,
5	w/v; 72 h) inducing the growth inhibition, cell death, alteration of protein contents,
6	accumulation of H <sub>2</sub> O <sub>2</sub> , and alteration of the antioxidant enzyme activities; and <i>Candida</i> yeast
7	[18] showing the alteration of catalase activity and expression of cell wall proteins by
8	non-lethal concentration (< 1 %, w/v) of DMSO.
9	In conclusion, DMSO may work as a factor to accelerate the hypo-osmotically induced
10	increases in $[Ca^{2+}]_C$ and $[Ca^{2+}]_N$ in plant cells. The synchronized responses in $[Ca^{2+}]_C$ and
11	$[Ca^{2+}]_N$ in the presence of different concentrations of DMSO supported the view that $[Ca^{2+}]_C$
12	and $[Ca^{2+}]_N$ may share the same regulatory mechanisms in response to Hypo-OS.

2	<b>Figure 1.</b> Effect of DMSO on the Hypo-OS-induced $[Ca^{2+}]_C$ and $[Ca^{2+}]_N$ . Aequorin signals
3	reflecting the changes in $[Ca^{2+}]_C$ and $[Ca^{2+}]_N$ were monitored after the cells were treated with
4	DMSO for 5 min prior to Hypo-OS ( 112 mOsm). Mean traces of Hypo-OS-induced $[Ca^{2+}]_C$
5	(a) and $[Ca^{2+}]_N$ (b) monitored for 5 min in the presence of different concentration of DMSO.
6	Log-log plots of aequorin signals and time course after addition of Hypo-OS visualizing the
7	DMSO-sensitized and Hypo-OS-induced immediate spikes of $[Ca^{2+}]_C$ (c) and $[Ca^{2+}]_N$ (d).
8	Peak-height of Hypo-OS-induced increase in $[Ca^{2+}]_C$ (e) and $[Ca^{2+}]_N$ (f) are compared.
9	Extents of stimulation by DMSO in the $1^{st}$ and $2^{nd}$ phases in $[Ca^{2+}]_C$ and $[Ca^{2+}]_N$ are
10	compared (g). The traces and values are means of 5 replications. Error bars in (e) and (f)
11	represent S.D. (n=5). Statistical significance ( $P < 0.05$ ) labelled with different symbols in (e)
12	and (f) were calculated with one-way ANOVA and Tukey's test.
