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On Nonparametric Estimation for SDE with Delay

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Abstract: We consider the problem of drift function estimation of inhomogeneous stochastic differential equation with delay. It is shown that kernel-type estimator is consistent and asymptotically efficient.

1. Introduction

This work is devoted to the problems of nonparametric estimation for the non linear stochastic differential equation (SDE) with delay

$$(1.1) dX_t = S(t, X_{t-\tau}) dt + \varepsilon dW_t, X_s = x_0, s \le 0, 0 \le t \le T,$$

where $\varepsilon \to 0$. Such perturbed dynamical systems were studied in [7]. Statistical problems (parametric and nonparametric) related to such models can be found in [18]. We suppose that the function S(t,x) is unknown. Recall that the limit $(\varepsilon \to 0)$ equation is

(1.2)
$$\frac{\mathrm{d}x_t}{\mathrm{d}t} = S(t, x_{t-\tau}), \quad x_s = x_0, \ s \le 0, \quad 0 \le t \le T$$

and the trajectories X_t converge uniformly in $t \in [0, T]$ to x_t .

The problem of drift estimation for diffusion processes in *small noise* ($\varepsilon \to 0$) and large samples ($T \to \infty$) are well studied and there are many results in different statements for continuous and discrete time observations.

In this work we consider the problem of drift estimation by the observations $X^T = (X_t, 0 \le t \le T)$. We suppose that the delay $\tau \ge 0$ is known and we estimate the function S(t, x), where for a given x we take $t = t_x$ defined by the equality $x_{t_x-\tau} = \tau$. Therefore we estimate a function $S(t_x, x)$ of one variable x.

We propose kernel-type estimator and study its asymptotic ($\varepsilon \to 0$) behavior. We show its consistency and asymptotic efficiency in order of convergence.

The particularity of this model can be illustrated as follows. If we write (1.1) in integral form and change the variables $t \to t - \tau$, then for $t \ge \tau$ we obtain the representation

$$X_{t-\tau} = x_0 + \int_0^{t-\tau} S(s, X_{s-\tau}) ds + \varepsilon W_{t-\tau}$$

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Therefore the drift $S(X_{t-\tau})$ in the equation (1.1) has no even the first derivative w.r.t. t.

Statistical problems of parameter estimation related to different generalizations of the model (1.2) with the asymptotic $\varepsilon \to 0$ were treated in the works [1], [11], [12],[13], [17], [18] [22], [23], (see review in [20]). Some statistical problems for the related SDE with delay in the case of asymptotic $T \to \infty$ were studied in the works [8], [9], [14], [20].

Nonparametric estimation problems for perturbed ($\varepsilon \to 0$) SDE ($\varepsilon \to 0$) can be found in [2], [15], [16], [18]. The large samples cases of drift estimation were considered in the works [3], [4],[5], [25], [6], [19].

2. Main Results

For a given $x > x_0$ we define $t = t_x$ such that $x = x_{t_x - \tau}$ and consider the problem of estimation of the value $S(t, x) = S(t_x, x)$.

Introduce the conditions \mathcal{R} .

 \mathcal{R}_1 . The function S(t,x) is positive $\kappa = \inf_{t \in [0,T],x} S(t,x) > 0$.

 \mathcal{R}_2 . The function S(t,x) has two continuous bounded derivatives w.r.t. t and x.

 \mathcal{R}_3 . The delay $\tau \in (0,T)$ is known.

By condition \mathcal{R}_2 there exist two constants M > 0 and L > 0 such that for all $t \in [0, T]$ and all $x \in \mathcal{R}$.

$$\left|S_{t}^{\prime}\left(t,x\right)\right|\leq M, \qquad \text{and} \qquad \left|S_{x}^{\prime}\left(t,x\right)\right|\leq L.$$

Moreover, for $t \in [0, \tau]$ we have $S(t, x_t) = S(t, x_0)$ and

$$x_t = x_0 + \int_0^t S(s, x_0) ds, \quad 0 \le t \le \tau.$$

Therefore we have two different problems of estimation. For $t \in [0, \tau]$ we estimate the function $S(t, x_0)$ of one variable $t \in (0, \tau)$ and for $t \in (\tau, T]$ we estimate once more the function S(t, x) = S(t, x) of one variable $x \in (x_0, x_{T-\tau})$ because here $t = t_x$ such that $x_{t_x-\tau} = x > x_0$. Note that estimation of the function $f(t) = S(t, x_0), 0 < t < \tau$ is particular case of the similar problem considered in [10], Theorem 7.4.1. That is why we consider estimation of the function S(t, x) for $t > \tau$.

Define the random variable (stopping time)

$$t_{x,\varepsilon} = \inf \{ t > \tau : X_{t-\tau} \ge x \}$$

and put $t_{x,\varepsilon} = T - \tau$ if $\sup_{0 \le s \le T - \tau} X_s < x$. Introduce the kernel-type estimator

(2.1)
$$S_{\varepsilon}(t,x) = \frac{1}{\varphi_{\varepsilon}} \int_{0}^{T} K\left(\frac{s - t_{x,\varepsilon}}{\varphi_{\varepsilon}}\right) dX_{s}.$$

Here $\varphi_{\varepsilon} \to 0$ and the bounded kernel $K(u), u \in \mathcal{R}$ satisfies the "usual properties":

(2.2)
$$\int_{-1}^{1} K(u) du = 1, \qquad \int_{-1}^{1} uK(u) du = 0, \qquad K(u) = 0, \text{ for } u \notin [-1, 1].$$

We have to define the set \mathcal{X} of x admitting consistent estimation of $S\left(t,x\right),x\in\mathcal{X}$. Note that

$$x_{t-\tau} = x_0 + \int_0^{t-\tau} S(s, x_{s-\tau}) ds, \quad \tau < t < T - \tau$$

where S(t,x) > 0. Therefore, we can consider $\mathcal{X} = (x_0, x_{T-\tau})$, but the value $x_{T-\tau} = x_{T-\tau}(S)$ depends on the unknown function $S(\cdot, \cdot)$ and can not be known. There are at least two possibilities. The first one is to use the condition \mathcal{R}_1 , which allows us to write $x_{T-\tau} > x_0 + (T-\tau) \kappa \equiv \hat{x}$ and to put $\mathcal{X} = (x_0, \hat{x})$. The second one is to put $\mathcal{X} = (x_0, X_{T-\tau})$ where $X_{T-\tau}$ is estimator of $x_{T-\tau}$. Then to use the estimate $|X_{T-\tau} - x_{T-\tau}| \leq C\varepsilon \sup_{0 \leq s \leq T-\tau} |W_t|$ (see (A.1)) and study the introduced estimator (2.1). Here and below the generic constants are denoted C.

Similar problems and estimators of nonparametric estimation for perturbed dynamical system (without delays) were studied in [15], [17] and [18]. Of course, if S(t,x) = S(t) we obtain classical problem of nonparametric estimation of the deterministic signal in white Gaussian noise (see, e.g., [10]).

Theorem 2.1. Suppose that conditions \mathcal{R} hold then the estimator $S_{\varepsilon}(t,x), x \in (x_0,\hat{x})$ with $\varphi_{\varepsilon} = \varepsilon^{2/5}$ is mean-squared consistent

(2.3)
$$\mathbf{E}_{S} |S_{\varepsilon}(t,x) - S(t,x)|^{2} \leq C \varepsilon^{8/5}.$$

Proof. Let us introduce the set

$$\mathbb{B}_{\varepsilon} = \left\{ \omega : \ \varphi_{\varepsilon}^{-1} t_{x,\varepsilon} > 2, \ \ \varphi_{\varepsilon}^{-1} \left(T - t_{x,\varepsilon} \right) > 2 \right\}$$

and for $\omega \in \mathbb{B}_{\varepsilon}$ change the variables $s = t_{x,\varepsilon} + \varphi_{\varepsilon}u$ in the integral

$$\frac{1}{\varphi_{\varepsilon}} \int_{0}^{T} K\left(\frac{s - t_{x,\varepsilon}}{\varphi_{\varepsilon}}\right) S\left(s, x_{s-\tau}\right) ds$$

$$= \int_{-\frac{t_{x,\varepsilon}}{\varphi_{\varepsilon}}}^{\frac{T - t_{x,\varepsilon}}{\varphi_{\varepsilon}}} K\left(u\right) S\left(t_{x,\varepsilon} + \varphi_{\varepsilon}u, x_{t_{x,\varepsilon} + \varphi_{\varepsilon}u - \tau}\right) du$$

$$= \int_{-1}^{1} K\left(u\right) S\left(t_{x,\varepsilon} + \varphi_{\varepsilon}u, x_{t_{x,\varepsilon} + \varphi_{\varepsilon}u - \tau}\right) du$$

$$= S\left(t_{x,\varepsilon}, x_{t_{x,\varepsilon} - \tau}\right) + \varphi_{\varepsilon}^{2} R_{\varepsilon}^{(1)}\left(t_{x,\varepsilon}\right)$$

$$+ \varphi_{\varepsilon} \int_{-1}^{1} uK\left(u\right) du \left[S'_{t}\left(t_{x,\varepsilon}, x_{t_{x,\varepsilon} - \tau}\right) + S'_{x}\left(t_{x,\varepsilon}, x_{t_{x,\varepsilon} - \tau}\right) S\left(t_{x,\varepsilon}, x_{t_{x,\varepsilon} - 2\tau}\right)\right]$$

$$= S\left(t_{x,\varepsilon}, x_{t_{x,\varepsilon} - \tau}\right) + \varphi_{\varepsilon}^{2} R_{\varepsilon}^{(1)}\left(t_{x,\varepsilon}\right).$$

Here we used Taylor expansion of $S\left(t_{x,\varepsilon} + \varphi_{\varepsilon}u, x_{t_{x,\varepsilon} + \varphi_{\varepsilon}u - \tau}\right)$ by the powers of φ_{ε} and the properties (2.2). Of course, $\varphi_{\varepsilon}^2 R_{\varepsilon}^{(1)}\left(t_{x,\varepsilon}\right)$ is the last term of Taylor expansion.

The equalities

$$x = x_{t_x - \tau} = x_0 + \int_0^{t_x - \tau} S(s, x_{s - \tau}) \, \mathrm{d}s,$$

$$x = X_{t_{x, \varepsilon} - \tau} = x_0 + \int_0^{t_{x, \varepsilon} - \tau} S(s, X_{s - \tau}) \, \mathrm{d}s + \varepsilon W_{t_{x, \varepsilon} - \tau}$$

allow us to write

$$0 = X_{t_{x,\varepsilon}-\tau} - x_{t_{x}-\tau} = \int_{0}^{t_{x,\varepsilon}-\tau} S\left(s, X_{s-\tau}\right) ds - \int_{0}^{t_{x}-\tau} S\left(s, x_{s-\tau}\right) ds + \varepsilon W_{t_{x,\varepsilon}-\tau}$$

and

$$\int_{t_{\tau}-\tau}^{t_{x,\varepsilon}-\tau}S\left(s,x_{s-\tau}\right)\mathrm{d}s=\int_{0}^{t_{x,\varepsilon}-\tau}\left[S\left(s,X_{s-\tau}\right)-S\left(s,x_{s-\tau}\right)\right]\mathrm{d}s+\varepsilon W_{t_{x,\varepsilon}-\tau}.$$

Hence

$$\left| \int_{t_{x-\tau}}^{t_{x,\varepsilon}-\tau} S\left(s, x_{s-\tau}\right) ds \right| \leq \int_{0}^{t_{x,\varepsilon}-\tau} \left| S\left(s, X_{s-\tau}\right) - S\left(s, x_{s-\tau}\right) \right| ds + \varepsilon \left| W_{t_{x,\varepsilon}-\tau} \right| \\ \leq L \int_{0}^{T-\tau} \left| X_{s-\tau} - x_{s-\tau} \right| ds + \varepsilon \left| W_{t_{x,\varepsilon}-\tau} \right| \leq \varepsilon H\left(t_{x,\varepsilon}\right),$$

where the random function $H(t_{x,\varepsilon})$ has bounded moments.

We have as well

$$\left| \int_{t_{x}-\tau}^{t_{x,\varepsilon}-\tau} S(s,x_{s-\tau}) \, \mathrm{d}s \right| \ge \kappa \left| t_{x,\varepsilon} - t_{x} \right|.$$

From the last two estimates we have

$$(2.5) |t_{x,\varepsilon} - t_x| \le \varepsilon \kappa^{-1} H(t_{x,\varepsilon}) \to 0.$$

We can write

$$S_{\varepsilon}(t,x) = \frac{1}{\varphi_{\varepsilon}} \int_{0}^{T} K\left(\frac{s - t_{x,\varepsilon}}{\varphi_{\varepsilon}}\right) S\left(s, X_{s-\tau}\right) ds + \frac{\varepsilon}{\varphi_{\varepsilon}} \int_{0}^{T} K\left(\frac{s - t_{x,\varepsilon}}{\varphi_{\varepsilon}}\right) dW_{s}.$$

Hence on the set \mathbb{B}_{ε} we have

$$\begin{split} |S_{\varepsilon}\left(t,x\right) - S\left(t,x\right)| &= |S_{\varepsilon}\left(t_{x},x_{t_{x}-\tau}\right) - S\left(t_{x},x_{t_{x}-\tau}\right)| \\ &\leq \left|\frac{1}{\varphi_{\varepsilon}}\int_{0}^{T}K\left(\frac{s - t_{x,\varepsilon}}{\varphi_{\varepsilon}}\right)\left[S\left(s,x_{s-\tau}\right) - S\left(t_{x},x_{t_{x}-\tau}\right)\right]\mathrm{d}s\right| \\ &+ \left|\frac{1}{\varphi_{\varepsilon}}\int_{0}^{T}K\left(\frac{s - t_{x,\varepsilon}}{\varphi_{\varepsilon}}\right)\left[S\left(s,X_{s-\tau}\right) - S\left(s,x_{s-\tau}\right)\right]\mathrm{d}s\right| \\ &+ \left|\frac{\varepsilon}{\varphi_{\varepsilon}}\int_{0}^{T}K\left(\frac{s - t_{x,\varepsilon}}{\varphi_{\varepsilon}}\right)\mathrm{d}W_{s}\right| \\ &\leq \left|S\left(t_{x,\varepsilon},x_{t_{x,\varepsilon}-\tau}\right) - S\left(t_{x},x_{t_{x}-\tau}\right)\right| + \varphi_{\varepsilon}^{2}\left|R_{\varepsilon}^{(1)}\left(t_{x,\varepsilon}\right)\right| + \left|R_{\varepsilon}^{(2)}\left(t_{x,\varepsilon}\right)\right| + \left|R_{\varepsilon}^{(3)}\left(t_{x,\varepsilon}\right)\right| \end{split}$$

with obvious notation.

The first term in the last line can be estimated as follows

$$\mathbf{E}_{S} \mathbb{I}_{\left\{\mathbb{B}_{\varepsilon}\right\}} \left| S\left(t_{x,\varepsilon}, x_{t_{x,\varepsilon}-\tau}\right) - S\left(t_{x}, x_{t_{x}-\tau}\right) \right|^{2}$$

$$\leq 2M \mathbf{E}_{S} \mathbb{I}_{\left\{\mathbb{B}_{\varepsilon}\right\}} \left| t_{x,\varepsilon} - t_{x} \right|^{2} + 2 \mathbf{E}_{S} \mathbb{I}_{\left\{\mathbb{B}_{\varepsilon}\right\}} \left| x_{t_{x,\varepsilon}-\tau} - x_{t_{x}-\tau} \right|^{2}$$

$$\leq 2M \mathbf{E}_{S} \left| t_{x,\varepsilon} - t_{x} \right|^{2} + 2 \mathbf{E}_{S} \left| x_{t_{x,\varepsilon}-\tau} - x_{t_{x}-\tau} \right|^{2} \leq C \varepsilon^{2}.$$

For the last estimate see (2.5).

Further,

$$\mathbf{E}_{S} \mathbb{I}_{\{\mathbb{B}_{\varepsilon}\}} R_{\varepsilon}^{(3)} (t_{x,\varepsilon})^{2} \leq \mathbf{E}_{S} R_{\varepsilon}^{(3)} (t_{x,\varepsilon})^{2} = \frac{\varepsilon^{2}}{\varphi_{\varepsilon}^{2}} \mathbf{E}_{S} \int_{0}^{T} K \left(\frac{s - t_{x,\varepsilon}}{\varphi_{\varepsilon}} \right)^{2} ds$$

$$= \frac{\varepsilon^{2}}{\varphi_{\varepsilon}} \mathbf{E}_{S} \int_{-\frac{t_{x,\varepsilon}}{\varphi_{\varepsilon}}}^{\frac{T - t_{x,\varepsilon}}{\varphi_{\varepsilon}}} K(u)^{2} du \leq \frac{\varepsilon^{2}}{\varphi_{\varepsilon}} \int_{-1}^{1} K(u)^{2} du = C \frac{\varepsilon^{2}}{\varphi_{\varepsilon}}$$

and (below $t_{x,\varepsilon,u} = t_{x,\varepsilon} + \varphi_{\varepsilon}u$)

$$\mathbf{E}_{S} \mathbb{1}_{\left\{\mathbb{B}_{\varepsilon}\right\}} R_{\varepsilon}^{(2)} \left(t_{x,\varepsilon}\right)^{2} \leq \mathbf{E}_{S} R_{\varepsilon}^{(2)} \left(t_{x,\varepsilon}\right)^{2}$$

$$= \mathbf{E}_{S} \left| \frac{1}{\varphi_{\varepsilon}} \int_{0}^{T} K\left(\frac{s - t_{x,\varepsilon}}{\varphi_{\varepsilon}}\right) \left[S\left(s, X_{s - \tau}\right) - S\left(s, x_{s - \tau}\right)\right] ds \right|^{2}$$

$$\leq 2\mathbf{E}_{S} \int_{-1}^{1} K\left(u\right)^{2} \left|S\left(t_{x,\varepsilon,u}, X_{t_{x,\varepsilon,u} - \tau}\right) - S\left(t_{x,\varepsilon,u}, x_{t_{x,\varepsilon,u} - \tau}\right)\right|^{2} du$$

$$\leq 2L^{2} \int_{-1}^{1} K\left(u\right)^{2} \mathbf{E}_{S} \left|X_{t_{x,\varepsilon,u} - \tau} - x_{t_{x,\varepsilon,u} - \tau}\right|^{2} du \leq C \varepsilon^{2}.$$

Here we used the estimate (A.1).

These estimates allow us to write

(2.6)
$$\mathbf{E}_{S} \mathbb{I}_{\{\mathbb{B}_{\varepsilon}\}} |S_{\varepsilon}(t,x) - S(t,x)|^{2} \leq C \varphi_{\varepsilon}^{4} + C \varepsilon^{2} + C \frac{\varepsilon^{2}}{\varphi_{\varepsilon}}.$$

The probability of the compliment of the set \mathbb{B}_{ε} we estimate as follows

$$\mathbf{P}_{S}\left(\mathbb{B}_{\varepsilon}^{c}\right) \leq \mathbf{P}_{S}\left(\varphi_{\varepsilon}^{-1} t_{x,\varepsilon} \leq 2\right) + \mathbf{P}_{S}\left(\varphi_{\varepsilon}^{-1} \left(T - t_{x,\varepsilon}\right) \leq 2\right)$$
$$= \mathbf{P}_{S}\left(t_{x} - t_{x,\varepsilon} \geq t_{x} - 2\varphi_{\varepsilon}\right) + \mathbf{P}_{S}\left(T - t_{x,\varepsilon} \leq 2\varphi_{\varepsilon}\right).$$

We have for $\tau > 4\varphi_{\varepsilon}$

$$\mathbf{P}_{S}\left(t_{x} - t_{x,\varepsilon} \ge t_{x} - 2\varphi_{\varepsilon}\right) \le \mathbf{P}_{S}\left(|t_{x} - t_{x,\varepsilon}| \ge t_{x} - \frac{\tau}{2}\right) \le \mathbf{P}_{S}\left(|t_{x} - t_{x,\varepsilon}| \ge \frac{\tau}{2}\right)$$

$$\le \mathbf{P}_{S}\left(C\varepsilon \sup_{0 \le t \le T} |W_{t}| \ge \frac{\tau}{2}\right) \le Ce^{-c\varepsilon^{-2}}$$

with positive constants C > 0, c > 0. Here we used (2.5). The similar estimate we have for the probability $\mathbf{P}_S(T - t_{x,\varepsilon} \leq 2\varphi_{\varepsilon})$.

This allow us to estimate the mean squared error on the set \mathbb{B}^c

$$\left(\mathbf{E}_{S} \mathbb{I}_{\left\{\mathbb{B}_{\varepsilon}^{c}\right\}} \left|S_{\varepsilon}\left(t,x\right) - S\left(t,x\right)\right|^{2}\right)^{2} \leq \mathbf{E}_{S} \mathbb{I}_{\left\{\mathbb{B}_{\varepsilon}^{c}\right\}} \mathbf{E}_{S} \left|S_{\varepsilon}\left(t,x\right) - S\left(t,x\right)\right|^{4} \leq Ce^{-c\varepsilon^{-2}}.$$

Hence

$$\mathbf{E}_{S} \left| S_{\varepsilon} \left(t, x \right) - S \left(t, x \right) \right|^{2} \leq C \varphi_{\varepsilon}^{4} + C \varepsilon^{2} + C \frac{\varepsilon^{2}}{\varphi_{\varepsilon}} + C e^{-\frac{c}{2} \varepsilon^{-2}}$$

As usual in such situations the optimal rate $\varphi_{\varepsilon} = \varepsilon^{2/5}$ we obtain from the equation

$$\varphi_{\varepsilon}^4 = \frac{\varepsilon^2}{\varphi_{\varepsilon}}.$$

Therefore the estimate (2.3) is proved.

Remark. Suppose that the function S(t,x) is Lipshits and the function $\Phi(t) = S(t, x_{t-\tau}(\vartheta_0)), t \in [0, T]$ has K continuous derivatives. Moreover, the K-th derivative is Holder of order $\mu \in (0, 1)$:

$$\left| \frac{\mathrm{d}^{K}\Phi\left(t\right)}{\mathrm{d}t^{K}} - \frac{\mathrm{d}^{K}\Phi\left(t_{1}\right)}{\mathrm{d}t_{1}^{K}} \right| \leq H \left|t - t_{1}\right|^{\mu}.$$

The set of functions $S(t, x_{t-\tau})$ with the same constants C > 0 and μ we denote as $\mathcal{F}_{K+\mu}$.

Introduce additional condition on the kernel $K(\cdot)$

(2.7)
$$\int_{-1}^{1} u^{k} K(u) du = 0, \qquad k = 1, \dots, K.$$

Using the equality (2.4) and Taylor expansion of the function $\Phi(t_{x,\varepsilon} + \varphi_{\varepsilon}u) = S(t_{x,\varepsilon} + \varphi_{\varepsilon}u, x_{t_{x,\varepsilon}} - \varphi_{\varepsilon}u - \tau)$ by the powers of φ_{ε} we obtain the expression

$$\frac{1}{\varphi_{\varepsilon}} \int_{0}^{T} K\left(\frac{s - t_{x,\varepsilon}}{\varphi_{\varepsilon}}\right) S\left(s, x_{s-\tau}\right) ds = \int_{-1}^{1} K\left(u\right) \Phi\left(t_{x,\varepsilon} + \varphi_{\varepsilon}u\right) du$$

$$= S\left(t_{x,\varepsilon}, x_{t_{x,\varepsilon}-\tau}\right) + \sum_{k=1}^{K} \int_{-1}^{1} u^{k} K\left(u\right) du \frac{\Phi^{(k)}\left(t_{x,\varepsilon}\right)}{k!} \varphi_{\varepsilon}^{k} + Q_{\varepsilon}$$

$$= S\left(t_{x,\varepsilon}, x_{t_{x,\varepsilon}-\tau}\right) + Q_{\varepsilon}.$$

The last term is estimated as follows

$$(2.8) |Q_{\varepsilon}| \leq \frac{\varphi_{\varepsilon}^{K}}{K!} \int_{-1}^{1} \left| u^{k} K\left(u\right) \right| \left| \Phi^{(K)}\left(t_{x,\varepsilon} + \tilde{\varphi}_{\varepsilon}u\right) - \Phi^{(K)}\left(t_{x,\varepsilon}\right) \right| du \leq C \varphi_{\varepsilon}^{K+\mu}.$$

The equation (2.6) became

$$\mathbf{E}_{S} |S_{\varepsilon}(t, x) - S(t, x)|^{2} \le C \varphi_{\varepsilon}^{2(K+\mu)} + C \varepsilon^{2} + C \frac{\varepsilon^{2}}{\varphi_{\varepsilon}}.$$

Now the equation $\varphi_{\varepsilon}^{2(K+\mu)} = \varepsilon^2/\varphi_{\varepsilon}$ provides the rate $\varphi_{\varepsilon} = \varepsilon^{\frac{1}{K+\mu+\frac{1}{2}}}$ and

(2.9)
$$\mathbf{E}_{S} |S_{\varepsilon}(t,x) - S(t,x)|^{2} \leq C \varepsilon^{-\frac{2(K+\mu)}{K+\mu+1/2}}.$$

Hence slightly modifying the proof we obtain for any p > 0 the estimate

$$\sup_{S(\cdot)\in\mathcal{F}_{K+\mu}} \varepsilon^{-\frac{p(K+\mu)}{K+\mu+1/2}} \mathbf{E}_S \left| S_{\varepsilon}\left(t,x\right) - S\left(t,x\right) \right|^p \le C.$$

Recall that for the model of observations (1.1) we have the lower bound $(t = t_x)$ such that $x_{t_x-\tau} = x$

(2.10)
$$\lim_{\varepsilon \to 0} \inf_{\bar{S}_{\varepsilon}(t,x)} \sup_{S(\cdot) \in \mathcal{F}_{K+\mu}} \varepsilon^{-\frac{2(K+\mu)}{K+\mu+1/2}} \mathbf{E}_{S} \left| \bar{S}_{\varepsilon}(t,x) - S(t,x) \right|^{2} > 0,$$

where inf is taken over all possible estimators $\bar{S}_{\varepsilon}(t,x)$ of the function S(t,x) (Theorem 4.3, [18]). The inequality (2.10) shows that the estimator converging to S(t,x) faster than $S_{\varepsilon}(t,x)$ does not exist and therefore $S_{\varepsilon}(t,x)$ is asymptotically efficient in order of convergence.

Remark. Suppose that the delay τ is unknown and we have to estimate the function $f(t) = S(t, x_{t-\tau}), 0 < t < T$. The function f(t) is K times continuously differentiable and the K-th derivative is Hölder of order $\mu \in (0, 1)$. It is possible to estimate the function f(t) using even more simple kernel-type estimator than above:

$$\hat{f}_{\varepsilon}(t) = \frac{1}{\varphi_{\varepsilon}} \int_{0}^{T} K\left(\frac{s-t}{\varphi_{\varepsilon}}\right) dX_{s}$$

$$= \frac{1}{\varphi_{\varepsilon}} \int_{0}^{T} K\left(\frac{s-t}{\varphi_{\varepsilon}}\right) S\left(s, X_{s-\tau}\right) ds + \frac{\varepsilon}{\varphi_{\varepsilon}} \int_{0}^{T} K\left(\frac{s-t}{\varphi_{\varepsilon}}\right) dW_{s}.$$

As $S\left(s, X_{s-\tau}\right) = S\left(s, x_{s-\tau}\right) + O\left(\varepsilon\right)$ and

$$\mathbf{E}_{S} \left(\frac{\varepsilon}{\varphi_{\varepsilon}} \int_{0}^{T} K \left(\frac{s-t}{\varphi_{\varepsilon}} \right) dW_{s} \right)^{2} = \frac{\varepsilon^{2}}{\varphi_{\varepsilon}} \int_{-\frac{t}{\varphi_{\varepsilon}}}^{\frac{T-t}{\varphi_{\varepsilon}}} K (u)^{2} du \leq C \frac{\varepsilon^{2}}{\varphi_{\varepsilon}}$$

it is sufficient to study the integral

$$J_{\varepsilon} = \frac{1}{\varphi_{\varepsilon}} \int_{0}^{T} K\left(\frac{s-t}{\varphi_{\varepsilon}}\right) S\left(s, x_{s-\tau}\right) ds.$$

Suppose that the kernel $K(\cdot)$ satisfies the conditions (2.2) and (2.7). Then using Taylor formula once more we can write

$$J_{\varepsilon} = \int_{-1}^{1} K(u) \left[f(t) + \sum_{k=1}^{K} \frac{\varphi_{\varepsilon}^{k} u^{k}}{k!} f^{(k)}(t) \right] du + \varphi_{\varepsilon}^{K} R_{\varepsilon} = f(t) + \varphi_{\varepsilon}^{K} R_{\varepsilon}.$$

For the last term of Taylor expansion we have estimate similar to (2.8)

$$\varphi_{\varepsilon}^K |R_{\varepsilon}| \le C \varphi_{\varepsilon}^{K+\mu}.$$

Therefore we have the same normalizing function $\varphi_{\varepsilon} = \varepsilon^{\frac{1}{K+\mu+\frac{1}{2}}}$ and the same estimate for the mean squared error as in (2.9).

A. Appendix section

Suppose that the function S(t,x), $t \in [0,T]$, $x \in \mathcal{R}$ has continuous bounded derivative $|S'_x(t,x)| \leq L$ w.r.t. x, then the equation (1.1) has a unique strong solution (see Theorem in [24]). Moreover, we have the following estimates (with probability 1)

$$|X_t - x_t| \le \int_0^t |S(s, X_{s-\tau}) - S(s, x_{s-\tau})| \, \mathrm{d}s + \varepsilon |W_t|$$

$$\le L \int_0^t |X_{s-\tau} - x_{s-\tau}| \, \mathrm{d}s + \varepsilon |W_t| \le L \int_0^t |X_s - x_s| \, \mathrm{d}s + \varepsilon \sup_{0 \le s \le T} |W_s|.$$

Hence by Gronwall-Bellman lemma we can write

$$(A.1) |X_t - x_t| \le \varepsilon C \widehat{W}_T,$$

where we denoted $\widehat{W}_T = \sup_{0 \le s \le T} |W_s|$.

For the second moment we have

$$\mathbf{E}_S |X_t - x_t|^2 \le 2L^2 T \int_0^t \mathbf{E}_S |X_{s-\tau} - x_{s-\tau}|^2 ds + 2\varepsilon^2 T$$

$$\le 2L^2 T \int_0^t \mathbf{E}_S |X_s - x_s|^2 ds + 2\varepsilon^2 T$$

and by the same lemma

$$(A.2) \mathbf{E}_S |X_t - x_t|^2 \le C \varepsilon^2$$

Let us write the formal derivative $X_t^{(1)}$ of X_t w.r.t. ε , then we obtain the equation

$$dX_t^{(1)} = S_x'(t, X_{t-\tau}) X_{t-\tau}^{(1)} dt + dW_t, X_s^{(1)} = 0, \text{ for } s \le 0, 0 \le t \le T.$$

The Gaussian process $X_t^{(1)}|_{\varepsilon=0}=x_t^{(1)}$ satisfies the linear equation

$$dx_t^{(1)} = S_x'(t, x_{t-\tau}) x_{t-\tau}^{(1)} dt + dW_t, x_s^{(1)} = 0, \text{ for } s \le 0, 0 \le t \le T.$$

The proof of (A.1) can be done using the standard technique based on Gronwall-Bellman lemma.

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
