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Notes on the Chernoff Product Formula

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ABSTRACT. We revise the strong convergent Chernoff product formula and extend it, in a Hilbert space, to convergence in the operator-norm topology. Main results deal with the self-adjoint Chernoff product formula. The nonself-adjoint case concerns the quasi-sectorial contractions.

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1 The Chernoff product formula

In paper [Che68], Chernoff has proved the following Theorem:

Proposition 1.1. Let F(t) be a strongly continuous function from $[0,\infty)$ to the linear contractions on a Banach space \mathfrak{X} such that $F(0)=\mathbb{1}$. Suppose that the closure C of the strong derivative F'(+0) is the generator of a contraction semigroup. Then $F(t/n)^n$, $n \in \mathbb{N}$, converges for $t \geq 0$ and $n \to \infty$ to contraction C_0 -semigroup $\{e^{tC}\}_{t\geq 0}$ in the strong operator topology.

Note, that by condition of Proposition 1.1 the operator $C(\tau) := (F(\tau) - 1)/\tau$ for $\tau > 0$ is dissipative and F'(+0) is derivative $\lim_{\tau \to +0} C(\tau)$ in the strong resolvent sense. We also recall another version of this proposition, see [Che74] (Theorem 1.1).

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Proposition 1.2. Let $t \mapsto F(t)$ be a measurable operator-valued function from $[0,\infty)$ to the linear contractions on a Banach space \mathfrak{X} such that $F(0) = \mathbb{1}$. If

$$s-\lim_{\tau \to +0} (\mathbb{1} - C(\tau))^{-1} = (\mathbb{1} - C)^{-1}, \tag{1.1}$$

in strong operator topology, then

$$s-\lim_{n\to+\infty} F(t/n)^n = e^{tC}, \qquad (1.2)$$

for all $t \ge 0$ *uniformly on bounded* t*-intervals.*

Proof. The proof needs two ingredients. The first is the *Trotter-Neveu-Kato* theorem ([Kat80], Ch.IX, Theorem 2.16): the strong convergence in (1.1) yields for contractions $\{e^{tC(\tau)}\}_{t>0}$

$$\lim_{\tau \to +0} e^{tC(\tau)} u = e^{tC} u, \tag{1.3}$$

for all $u \in \mathfrak{X}$, locally uniformly on closed intervals $\mathscr{I} \subset \mathbb{R}_0^+$.

Now, for any t > 0 and $u \in \mathfrak{X}$ we define $\{u_n := [\mathbb{1} - C(t/n)/\sqrt{n}]^{-1}u\}_{n \ge 1}$. Then by (1.3)

$$\lim_{n \to \infty} u_n := \lim_{n \to \infty} \sqrt{n} \int_0^\infty ds \ e^{-\sqrt{n}s} \ e^{sC(t/n)} u = u. \tag{1.4}$$

The second ingredient comes from the, so-called, \sqrt{n} -Lemma ([Che68] Lemma 2). It yields the estimate

$$\|e^{tC(t/n)}w - F(t/n)^n w\| \le \sqrt{n} \|(F(t/n) - 1)w\|,$$
 (1.5)

for any $w \in \mathfrak{X}$. Then (1.4) and (1.5) imply

$$\lim_{n \to \infty} \|e^{tC(t/n)} u - F(t/n)^n u\| = \lim_{n \to \infty} \|e^{tC(t/n)} u_n - F(t/n)^n u_n\|
\leq \lim_{n \to \infty} t/\sqrt{n} \|C(t/n) [\mathbb{1} - C(t/n)/\sqrt{n}]^{-1} u\| = \lim_{n \to \infty} t \|u_n - u\| = 0.$$

Hence, by (1.3) together with estimate

$$||e^{tC}u - F(t/n)^n u|| \le ||e^{tC}u - e^{tC(t/n)}u|| + ||e^{tC(t/n)}u - F(t/n)^n u||,$$

for any $u \in \mathfrak{X}$, we obtain (1.2).

Remark 1.3. (a) Equivalence of condition (1.1) to the existence of the strong derivative F'(+0) is a part of the *Trotter-Neveu-Kato* theorem, [EN00] Ch.III, Sects.4.8 and 4.9. (b) For analysis of optimality, generalisation and improvement of the \sqrt{n} -Lemma, see [Zag17].

Definition 1.4. Equation (1.2) is called the *Chernoff product formula*, or the Chernoff approximation formula, in the strong operator topology for contraction C_0 -semigroup $\{e^{tC}\}_{t\geq 0}$.

The aim of the present Notes is *lifting* the strongly convergent Chernoff product formula to formula convergent in the operator norm topology, whereas a majority of results concerns only strong convergence, see, e.g., a detailed review [But19]. Our main results are focused on analysis of the *operator-norm* convergence of the Chernoff product formula in a Hilbert

space \mathfrak{H} , see Section 2. In Section 3 we establish estimates of the operator-norm *rate* of convergence for *self-adjoint* Chernoff product formula. The case of Chernoff product formula for nonself-adjoint *quasi-sectorial* contractions is the subject of Section 4. The Trotter-Kato product formula is a direct application of the Chernoff product formula, see Section 5.

We conclude this section by the proof of our first *Note*: for strongly convergent Chernoff product formula the *self-adjointness* allows to relax condition (1.1) to the weak operator convergence. To this aim we recall a *lifting* topology assertion in \mathfrak{H} :

Proposition 1.5. Let $\{u_n\}_{n\geq 1}$ be a weakly convergent sequence of vectors, w- $\lim_{n\to\infty} u_n = u$, in a Hilbert space \mathfrak{H} . If, in addition, $\lim_{n\to\infty} ||u_n|| = ||u||$, then $\lim_{n\to\infty} ||u_n - u|| = 0$.

This assertion implies the following statement.

Lemma 1.6. Let $S: \mathbb{R}^+ \to \mathcal{L}(\mathfrak{H})$ be a measurable family of non-negative self-adjoint operators and let H be non-negative self-adjoint operator. If the weak operator limit

$$w-\lim_{\tau \to +0} (\lambda \mathbb{1} + S(\tau))^{-1} = (\lambda \mathbb{1} + H)^{-1}, \tag{1.6}$$

for each $\lambda > 0$, then it is also true in the strong operator topology:

$$s-\lim_{\tau \to +0} (\lambda \mathbb{1} + S(\tau))^{-1} = (\lambda \mathbb{1} + H)^{-1}. \tag{1.7}$$

Proof. From (1.6) we get

$$\lim_{\tau \to +0} \|(\lambda \mathbb{1} + S(\tau))^{-1/2} u\|^2 = \|(\lambda \mathbb{1} + H)^{-1/2} u\|^2, \quad u \in \mathfrak{H},$$
(1.8)

for $\lambda \geq 1$. Since

$$(\mathbb{1} + S(\tau))^{-1/2} = \frac{1}{\pi} \int_0^\infty d\eta \, \frac{1}{\sqrt{\eta}} \, (\eta \, \mathbb{1} + \mathbb{1} + S(\tau))^{-1},$$

(1.6) also yields w- $\lim_{\tau\to+0}(\mathbb{1}+S(\tau))^{-1/2}=(\mathbb{1}+H)^{-1/2}$. This, together with (1.8) and the lifting Proposition 1.5, implies s- $\lim_{\tau\to+0}(\mathbb{1}+S(\tau))^{-1/2}=(\mathbb{1}+H)^{-1/2}$. Then strong convergence of the product of operators yields (1.7).

By Lemma 1.6, the conditions of Proposition 1.2 for the family of operators

$$S(\tau) := \frac{1 - F(\tau)}{\tau}, \quad \tau > 0,$$
 (1.9)

can be reformulated in a Hilbert space \mathfrak{H} . Then we get a stronger assertion:

Theorem 1.7. Let $F: \mathbb{R}^+ \longrightarrow \mathcal{L}(\mathfrak{H})$ be a measurable family of non-negative self-adjoint contractions such that $F(0) = \mathbb{1}$ and let $H \geq 0$ be a self-adjoint operator in \mathfrak{H} . Then

s-
$$\lim_{n \to +\infty} F(t/n)^n = e^{-tH}$$
, (1.10)

if and only if for each $\lambda > 0$ *the condition*

$$w-\lim_{\tau \to +0} (\lambda \mathbb{1} + S(\tau))^{-1} = (\lambda \mathbb{1} + H)^{-1}, \tag{1.11}$$

is satisfied.

Proof. If (1.11) is valid, then applying Lemma 1.6 we verify (1.7). Using Proposition 1.2 in a Hilbert space \mathfrak{H} for $C(\tau) = -S(\tau)$, C = -H and (1.7) for $\lambda = 1$, we prove the self-adjoint Chernoff product formula (1.10).

To prove the converse we use the representation

$$e^{-tS(t/n)} - e^{-tH} = F(t/n)^n - e^{-tH} + e^{-tS(t/n)} - F(t/n)^n.$$
(1.12)

Then $\lim_{n\to+\infty} \|(F(t/n)^n - e^{-tH})u\| = 0$ by condition (1.10), whereas by the spectral functional calculus for self-adjoint operator $F(\tau)$ we obtain the *operator norm* estimate

$$||F(t/n)^n - e^{-n(\mathbb{1} - F(t/n))}|| = \left\| \int_{[0,1]} dE_{F(t/n)}(\lambda) \left(\lambda^n - e^{-n(1-\lambda)} \right) \right\| \le \frac{1}{n}.$$
 (1.13)

Therefore, (1.12) yields for $\tau = t/n$ the limit

$$s-\lim_{\tau \to +0} e^{-tS(\tau)} = e^{-tH}, \qquad (1.14)$$

for $t \in \mathbb{R}^+$. Note that by the self-adjoint *Trotter-Neveu-Kato* convergence theorem the limit (1.14) is equivalent to

$$s-\lim_{\tau \to +0} (\mathbb{1} + S(\tau))^{-1} = (\mathbb{1} + H)^{-1}. \tag{1.15}$$

Since (1.15) is, in turn, equivalent to

$$\operatorname{s-}\lim_{\tau\to+0}(\lambda\mathbb{1}+S(\tau))^{-1}=(\lambda\mathbb{1}+H)^{-1}\,,$$

for $\lambda > 0$, the latter yields the weak limit (1.11).

Remark 1.8. (a) We note that due to self-ajointness of the family $\{F(t)\}_{t\geq 0}$ the estimate (1.13) is stronger than the \sqrt{n} -estimate (1.5) for general contractions.

(b) By definition of $\{F(t)\}_{t\geq 0}$ and by condition (1.11) the C_0 -semigroup property of $\{e^{-tH}\}_{t\geq 0}$ ensures that strong limits s- $\lim_{t\to +0}$ of the left- and the right-hand sides of (1.10) are well-defined and coincide with 1. Similarly, since by (1.14) the limits in $\lim_{t\to +0}$ s- $\lim_{\tau\to +0} e^{-tS(\tau)}$ commute, one gets that $t\in \mathbb{R}^+_0$.

2 Lifting the Chernoff product formula to operator-norm topology

The first result about lifting the Chernoff product formula to the operator-norm topology is due to [NZ99a], Theorem 2.2. Our next *Note* will be about improvement of this result by extension to any closed *t*-interval $\mathscr{I} \subset \mathbb{R}_0^+$.

Similarly to the case of the strong operator topology our strategy includes the estimate of two ingredients (1.3) and (1.5) involved into Proposition 1.2, but now in the *operator norm* topology. Since the second ingredient has estimate (1.13), it rests to find conditions for *lift-ing* to operator norm convergence of the limit (1.14) in the Trotter-Neveu-Kato convergence theorem. We proceed with the following lemma.

Lemma 2.1. Let K and L be non-negative self-adjoint operators in a Hilbert space \mathfrak{H} . Then

$$||e^{-K} - e^{-L}|| \le c ||(\mathbb{1} + K)^{-1} - (\mathbb{1} + L)^{-1}||$$
 (2.1)

with a constant c > 0 independent of operators K and L.

By the Riesz-Dunford functional calculus one obtains representation:

$$e^{-K} - e^{-L} = \frac{1}{2\pi i} \int_{\Gamma} dz \, e^{z} \left((z + K)^{-1} - (z + L)^{-1} \right). \tag{2.2}$$

Essentially, the line of reasoning is based on straightforward estimates that use (2.2) for a given contour Γ . Then arguments show that constant c is only Γ -dependent. We skip the proof.

By virtue of (1.13) and Lemma 2.1 the *operator-norm* Trotter-Neveu-Kato theorem needs *lifting* of the strong convergence in (1.15) to the operator-norm convergence.

Lemma 2.2. Let $F: \mathbb{R}_0^+ \longrightarrow \mathcal{L}(\mathfrak{H})$ be a measurable family of non-negative self-adjoint contractions such that $F(0) = \mathbb{1}$. Let self-adjoint family $\{S(\tau)\}_{\tau>0}$ be defined by (1.9) and (1.15) for non-negative self-adjoint operator H in \mathfrak{H} . Then condition

$$\lim_{\tau \to +0} \| (\mathbb{1} + S(\tau))^{-1} - (\mathbb{1} + H)^{-1} \| = 0, \tag{2.3}$$

is satisfied if and only if

$$\lim_{\tau \to +0} \sup_{t \in \mathscr{I}} \|(\mathbb{1} + tS(\tau))^{-1} - (\mathbb{1} + tH)^{-1}\| = 0, \tag{2.4}$$

for any closed interval $\mathscr{I} \subset \mathbb{R}^+$.

Proof. A straightforward computation shows that

$$(1 + tS(\tau))^{-1} - (1 + tH)^{-1}$$

$$= t(1 + S(\tau))(1 + tS(\tau))^{-1}[(1 + S(\tau))^{-1} - (1 + H)^{-1}](1 + H)(1 + tH)^{-1}.$$
(2.5)

Here we used that if t > 0 and $\tau > 0$ then for self-adjoint operator $S(\tau)$ the closure

$$\overline{(\mathbb{1} + tS(\tau))^{-1}(\mathbb{1} + S(\tau))} = (\mathbb{1} + S(\tau))(\mathbb{1} + tS(\tau))^{-1}.$$

For these values of arguments t and τ we obtain estimates:

$$\|(\mathbb{1} + S(\tau))(\mathbb{1} + tS(\tau))^{-1}\| \le (1 + 2/t),$$

$$\|(\mathbb{1} + H)(\mathbb{1} + tH)^{-1}\| \le (1 + 2/t).$$

If \mathscr{I} is a closed interval of \mathbb{R}^+ , e.g., $\mathscr{I} := [a,b]$ for $0 < a < b < \infty$, then by (2.5)

$$\|(\mathbb{1} + tS(\tau))^{-1} - (\mathbb{1} + tH)^{-1}\| \le b(1 + 2/a)^2 \|(\mathbb{1} + S(\tau))^{-1} - (\mathbb{1} + H)^{-1}\|, \tag{2.6}$$

for $t \in [a, b]$ and $\tau > 0$. By (2.3) the estimate (2.6) yields (2.4). The converse is obvious. \square

Theorem 2.3. Let $F: \mathbb{R}_0^+ \longrightarrow \mathcal{L}(\mathfrak{H})$ be a measurable family of non-negative self-adjoint contractions such that $F(0) = \mathbb{1}$. Let self-adjoint family $\{S(\tau)\}_{\tau>0}$ be defined by (1.9) and (1.15) for self-adjoint operator $H \geq 0$ in \mathfrak{H} . Then we have

$$\lim_{n \to \infty} \sup_{t \in \mathcal{I}} \|F(t/n)^n - e^{-tH}\| = 0,$$
(2.7)

for any closed interval $\mathscr{I} \subset \mathbb{R}^+$, if and only if the family $\{S(\tau)\}_{\tau>0}$ satisfies condition (2.3).

Proof. For t > 0 and $n \ge 1$ we get estimate

$$||F(t/n)^n - e^{-tH}|| \le ||F(t/n)^n - e^{-tS(t/n)}|| + ||e^{-tS(t/n)} - e^{-tH}||.$$
(2.8)

Then (1.13) and (2.8) imply

$$||F(t/n)^n - e^{-tH}|| \le \frac{1}{n} + ||e^{-tS(t/n)} - e^{-tH}||, \quad t > 0, \quad n \ge 1.$$
 (2.9)

Note that by Lemma 2.1 there is a constant c > 0 such that for t > 0

$$||e^{-tS(t/n)} - e^{-tH}|| \le c ||(1 + tS(t/n))^{-1} - (1 + tH)^{-1}||.$$
 (2.10)

Inserting the estimate (2.10) into (2.9) we obtain

$$||F(t/n)^n - e^{-tH}|| \le \frac{1}{n} + c ||(\mathbb{1} + tS(t/n))^{-1} - (\mathbb{1} + tH)^{-1}||, \tag{2.11}$$

Then (2.11) and Lemma 2.2 yield (2.7).

Conversely, let us assume (2.7). For t > 0 and $n \ge 1$ we have estimate

$$||e^{-tS(t/n)} - e^{-tH}|| \le ||F(t/n)^n - e^{-tH}|| + ||F(t/n)^n - e^{-tS(t/n)}||$$

and by (1.13)

$$||e^{-tS(t/n)} - e^{-tH}|| \le ||F(t/n)^n - e^{-tH}|| + \frac{1}{n}.$$
 (2.12)

Then by assumption (2.7) for any closed interval $\mathscr{I} \subset \mathbb{R}^+$ the estimate (2.12) yields

$$\lim_{n\to\infty}\sup_{t\in\mathscr{I}}\|e^{-tS(t/n)}-e^{-tH}\|=0.$$

Hence, $\lim_{n\to\infty} \|e^{-tS(t/n)} - e^{-tH}\| = 0$ implies $\lim_{\tau\to+0} \|e^{-tS(\tau)} - e^{-tH}\| = 0$ for any t>0. Now, using representation:

$$(\mathbb{1} + S(\tau))^{-1} - (\mathbb{1} + H)^{-1} = \int_0^\infty ds \ e^{-s} \left(e^{-sS(\tau)} - e^{-sH} \right), \tag{2.13}$$

we obtain the estimate

$$\|(\mathbb{1} + S(\tau))^{-1} - (\mathbb{1} + H)^{-1}\| \le \int_0^\infty ds \ e^{-s} \|e^{-sS(\tau)} - e^{-sH}\|. \tag{2.14}$$

Let $\Phi_{\tau}(s) := e^{-s} \|e^{-sS(\tau)} - e^{-sH}\|$. Since $S(\tau) \ge 0$ and $H \ge 0$, one gets $\Phi_{\tau}(s) \le 2e^{-s} \in L^1(\mathbb{R}^+)$ and $\lim_{\tau \to +0} \Phi_{\tau}(s) = 0$. Then $\lim_{\tau \to +0}$ in the right-hand side of (2.14) is zero by the Lebesgue dominated convergence theorem, that yields (2.3).

Extension of this statement to *any* bounded interval $\mathscr{I} \subset \mathbb{R}_0^+$ (cf. Remark 1.8(b)) needs a *uniform* operator-norm extension of the Trotter-Neveu-Kato theorem, that we present below.

Theorem 2.4. Let $F: \mathbb{R}_0^+ \longrightarrow \mathcal{L}(\mathfrak{H})$ be a measurable family of non-negative self-adjoint contractions such that $F(0) = \mathbb{1}$. Let self-adjoint family $\{S(\tau)\}_{\tau>0}$ be defined by (1.9) and (1.15), for self-adjoint operator $H \geq 0$ in \mathfrak{H} . Then the convergence

$$\lim_{\tau \to +0} \sup_{t \in \mathscr{I}} \|e^{-tS(\tau)} - e^{-tH}\| = 0 , \qquad (2.15)$$

holds for any bounded interval $\mathscr{I} \subset \mathbb{R}_0^+$ if and only if the condition

$$\lim_{\tau \to +0} \sup_{t \in \mathscr{I}} \| (\mathbb{1} + tS(\tau))^{-1} - (\mathbb{1} + tH)^{-1} \| = 0,$$
 (2.16)

is valid for any bounded interval $\mathscr{I} \subset \mathbb{R}_0^+$.

Proof. By conditions of theorem and by Lemma 2.1 we obtain from (2.10) the estimate

$$\sup_{t \in \mathcal{I}} \|e^{-tS(\tau)} - e^{-tH}\| \le c \sup_{t \in \mathcal{I}} \|(\mathbb{1} + tS(\tau))^{-1} - (\mathbb{1} + tH)^{-1}\|,$$

for $\tau > 0$ and for any bounded interval $\mathscr{I} \subset \mathbb{R}_0^+$. This estimate and condition (2.16) imply the convergence in (2.15).

Conversely, assume (2.15). Note that by representation (2.13) one gets for $t \ge 0$:

$$(\mathbb{1} + tS(\tau))^{-1} - (\mathbb{1} + tH)^{-1} = \int_0^\infty ds \ e^{-s} (e^{-stS(\tau)} - e^{-stH}).$$

This yields the estimate

$$\|(\mathbb{1} + tS(\tau))^{-1} - (\mathbb{1} + tH)^{-1}\| \le \int_0^\infty ds \ e^{-s} \|e^{-stS(\tau)} - e^{-stH}\|,$$

for $\tau > 0$ and $t \ge 0$.

Now, let $0 < \varepsilon < 1$ and let $N_{\varepsilon} := -\ln(\varepsilon/2)$. Then

$$\int_{N_{\varepsilon}}^{\infty} ds \ e^{-s} \left\| e^{-stS(\tau)} - e^{-stH} \right\| \leq \varepsilon \,,$$

for $\tau > 0$ and $t \ge 0$. Hence,

$$\|(\mathbb{1} + tS(\tau))^{-1} - (\mathbb{1} + tH)^{-1}\| \le \int_0^{N_{\varepsilon}} ds \ e^{-s} \|e^{-stS(\tau)} - e^{-stH}\| + \varepsilon$$

that for any bounded interval $\mathscr{I} \subset \mathbb{R}^+_0$ and $\tau > 0$ yields

$$\sup_{t\in\mathscr{I}}\left\|\left(\mathbb{1}+tS(\tau)\right)^{-1}-\left(\mathbb{1}+tH\right)^{-1}\right\|\leq \sup_{t\in\mathscr{I}\wedge s\in[0,N_{\varepsilon}]}\left\|e^{-stS(\tau)}-e^{-stH}\right\|+\varepsilon.$$

Applying now (2.15) we obtain

$$\lim_{\tau \to +0} \sup_{t \in \mathscr{I}} \left\| (\mathbb{1} + tS(\tau))^{-1} - (\mathbb{1} + tH)^{-1} \right\| \le \varepsilon ,$$

for any $\varepsilon > 0$. This completes the proof of (2.16).

Now we are in position to improve Theorem 2.3. We relax the restriction to closed intervals $\mathscr{I} \subset \mathbb{R}^+$ to condition on any bounded interval $\mathscr{I} \subset \mathbb{R}^+_0$.

Theorem 2.5. Let $F: \mathbb{R}_0^+ \longrightarrow \mathcal{L}(\mathfrak{H})$ be a measurable family of non-negative self-adjoint contractions such that $F(0) = \mathbb{1}$. Let self-adjoint family $\{S(\tau)\}_{\tau>0}$ be defined by (1.9) and (1.15) for self-adjoint operator $H \geq 0$ in \mathfrak{H} . Then

$$\lim_{n \to \infty} \sup_{t \in \mathscr{I}} ||F(t/n)^n - e^{-tH}|| = 0, \tag{2.17}$$

for any bounded interval $\mathscr{I} \subset \mathbb{R}^+_0$ if and only if

$$\lim_{n \to \infty} \sup_{t \in \mathscr{I}} \| (\mathbb{1} + tS(t/n))^{-1} - (\mathbb{1} + tH)^{-1} \| = 0, \tag{2.18}$$

is satisfied for any bounded interval $\mathscr{I} \subset \mathbb{R}^+_0$.

Proof. By (2.11) and by assumption (2.18) we obtain the limit (2.17).

Conversely, using (2.12) and assumption (2.17) one gets (2.15) for $\tau = t/n$ and for any bounded interval $\mathscr{I} \subset \mathbb{R}_0^+$. Then application of Theorem 2.4 yields (2.18).

3 Chernoff product formula: rate of the operator-norm convergence

Theorem 2.4 admits further improvements. They allow to establish estimates for the *rate* of operator-norm convergence in (2.15) under certain conditions in (2.16). Our next *Note* concerns the estimates of the convergence rate in Theorem 2.5. Recall that the first result in this direction was due to [IT01] (Lemma 2.1).

Lemma 3.1. Let $F: \mathbb{R}_0^+ \longrightarrow \mathcal{L}(\mathfrak{H})$ be a measurable family of non-negative self-adjoint contractions such that $F(0) = \mathbb{1}$. Let self-adjoint family $\{S(\tau)\}_{\tau>0}$ be defined by (1.9) and (1.15) for self-adjoint operator $H \geq 0$ in \mathfrak{H} .

(i) If $\rho \in (0,1]$ and there is a constant $M_{\rho} > 0$ such that the estimate

$$\|(\mathbb{1} + tS(\tau))^{-1} - (\mathbb{1} + tH)^{-1}\| \le M_{\rho} \left(\frac{\tau}{t}\right)^{\rho},$$
 (3.1)

holds for $\tau, t \in (0,1]$ and $0 < \tau \le t$, then there is a constant $c_{\rho} > 0$ such that the estimate

$$||F(\tau)^{t/\tau} - e^{-tH}|| \le c_\rho \left(\frac{\tau}{t}\right)^\rho, \tag{3.2}$$

is valid for $\tau, t \in (0, 1]$ with $0 < \tau \le t$.

(ii) If $\rho \in (0,1)$ and there is a constant c_{ρ} such that (3.2) holds, then there is a constant $M_{\rho} > 0$ such that the estimate (3.1) is valid.

Proof. (i) By Lemma 2.1 there is a constant c > 0 such that

$$||e^{-tS(\tau)} - e^{-tH}|| \le c ||(\mathbb{1} + tS(\tau))^{-1} - (\mathbb{1} + tH)^{-1}||,$$
 (3.3)

for $\tau, t > 0$. Then (3.1), for $\tau, t \in (0, 1]$ with $0 < \tau \le t$, yields, cf. Theorem 2.4,

$$\|e^{-tS(\tau)} - e^{-tH}\| \le c M_{\rho} \left(\frac{\tau}{t}\right)^{\rho}.$$

By definition (1.9) and inequality (1.13)

$$\left\| F(\tau)^{t/\tau} - e^{-tS(\tau)} \right\| \le \frac{\tau}{t}. \tag{3.4}$$

Therefore, by estimate

$$||F(\tau)^{t/\tau} - e^{-tH}|| \le ||F(\tau)^{t/\tau} - e^{-tS(\tau)}|| + ||e^{-tS(\tau)} - e^{-tH}||, \tag{3.5}$$

we obtain for $\tau, t \in (0, 1]$ with $0 < \tau \le t$

$$||F(\tau)^{t/\tau} - e^{-tH}|| \le \frac{\tau}{t} + c M_{\rho} \left(\frac{\tau}{t}\right)^{\rho}.$$

Since for $\rho \in (0,1]$ one has $\tau/t \leq (\tau/t)^{\rho}$,

$$\left\| F(\tau)^{t/\tau} - e^{-tH} \right\| \le (1 + c M_{\rho}) \left(\frac{\tau}{t}\right)^{\rho} . \tag{3.6}$$

Setting $c_{\rho} := 1 + c M_{\rho}$, we prove (3.2) for $\rho \in (0,1]$.

(ii) To prove (3.1) we use the identity:

$$(\mathbb{1} + tS(\tau))^{-1} - (\mathbb{1} + tH)^{-1} = \sum_{n=0}^{\infty} \int_{n}^{n+1} dx \, e^{-x} \left(e^{-xtS(\tau)} - e^{-xtH} \right),$$

here $\tau, t > 0$. Substitution x = y + n yields

$$(\mathbb{1} + tS(\tau))^{-1} - (\mathbb{1} + tH)^{-1} = \sum_{n=0}^{\infty} e^{-n} \int_0^1 dy \, e^{-y} \left(e^{-(y+n)tS(\tau)} - e^{-(y+n)tH} \right),$$

that gives the representation

$$\begin{split} (\mathbb{1} + tS(\tau))^{-1} - (\mathbb{1} + tH)^{-1} &= \\ \sum_{n=0}^{\infty} e^{-n} \left\{ \left(\sum_{k=0}^{n-1} e^{-ktS(\tau)} \left(e^{-tS(\tau)} - e^{-tH} \right) e^{-(n-k-1)tH} \right) \int_{0}^{1} dy \, e^{-y} \, e^{-ytS(\tau)} + \\ e^{-ntH} \int_{0}^{1} dy \, e^{-y} \left(e^{-ytS(\tau)} - e^{-ytH} \right) \right\}. \end{split}$$

Hence, we obtain the estimate

$$\|(\mathbb{1} + tS(\tau))^{-1} - (\mathbb{1} + tH)^{-1}\| \le \sum_{n=0}^{\infty} e^{-n} \left\{ n \|e^{-tS(\tau)} - e^{-tH}\| + \int_{0}^{1} dy \, e^{-y} \|e^{-ytS(\tau)} - e^{-ytH}\| \right\}.$$
(3.7)

Note that assumption (3.2) and estimate (3.4) yield for $\tau, t \in (0, 1]$, with $0 < \tau \le t$,

$$\left\| e^{-tS(\tau)} - e^{-tH} \right\| \le (1 + c_{\rho}) \left(\frac{\tau}{t}\right)^{\rho}. \tag{3.8}$$

To treat the last term in (3.7) we use decomposition

$$\int_{0}^{1} dy \, e^{-y} \left\| e^{-ytS(\tau)} - e^{-ytH} \right\| =$$

$$\int_{\tau/t}^{1} dy \, e^{-y} \left\| e^{-ytS(\tau)} - e^{-ytH} \right\| + \int_{0}^{\tau/t} dy \, e^{-y} \left\| e^{-ytS(\tau)} - e^{-ytH} \right\|.$$
(3.9)

Since by (3.8) for $\tau, t, y \in (0, 1]$ and $\tau/t \le y$

$$||e^{-ytS(\tau)} - e^{-ytH}|| \le (1 + c_{\rho}) \left(\frac{\tau}{ty}\right)^{\rho},$$

we obtain for $0 < \tau \le t$ the estimate

$$\int_{\tau/t}^{1} dy \, e^{-y} \left\| e^{-ytS(\tau)} - e^{-ytH} \right\| \le (1 + c_{\rho}) \int_{0}^{1} dy \, e^{-y} y^{-\rho} \left(\frac{\tau}{t} \right)^{\rho}. \tag{3.10}$$

Moreover, for ρ < 1 one obviously gets

$$\int_0^{\tau/t} dy \, e^{-y} \, \left\| e^{-ytS(\tau)} - e^{-ytH} \right\| \le 2 \left(\frac{\tau}{t} \right)^{\rho} \,. \tag{3.11}$$

Taking into account (3.10) and (3.11) we obtain from (3.9):

$$\int_0^1 dy \, e^{-y} \left\| e^{-ytS(\tau)} - e^{-ytH} \right\| \le \left[(1 + c_\rho) \int_0^1 dy \, e^{-y} y^{-\rho} + 2 \right] \left(\frac{\tau}{t} \right)^{\rho}, \tag{3.12}$$

for $\tau, t \in (0, 1]$, with $0 < \tau \le t$.

Finally, by virtue of (3.8) and (3.12) we get for (3.7)

$$\|(\mathbb{1} + tS(\tau))^{-1} - (\mathbb{1} + tH)^{-1}\| \le \sum_{n=0}^{\infty} e^{-n} \left\{ n (1 + c_{\rho}) + (1 + c_{\rho}) \int_{0}^{1} dy \, e^{-y} y^{-\rho} + 2 \right\} \left(\frac{\tau}{t}\right)^{\rho}.$$

Now, setting

$$M_{\rho} := \sum_{n=0}^{\infty} e^{-n} \left\{ n \left(1 + c_{\rho} \right) + \left(1 + c_{\rho} \right) \int_{0}^{1} dy \, e^{-y} y^{-\rho} + 2 \right\}$$

we obtain estimate (3.1).

Remark 3.2. In Lemma 3.1(i) it is shown that for $\rho = 1$ the condition (3.1) implies (3.2). But it is *unclear* for converse since Lemma 3.1(ii) does not cover this case.

The next assertion extends the result of Lemma 3.1(i) to any bounded interval $\mathscr{I} \subset \mathbb{R}_0^+$.

Theorem 3.3. Let $F: \mathbb{R}_0^+ \longrightarrow \mathcal{L}(\mathfrak{H})$ be a measurable family of non-negative self-adjoint contractions such that $F(0) = \mathbb{1}$. Let self-adjoint family $\{S(\tau)\}_{\tau>0}$ be defined by (1.9) and (1.15) for self-adjoint operator $H \geq 0$ in \mathfrak{H} .

If for some $\rho \in (0,1]$ there is a constant $M_{\rho} > 0$ such that the estimate (3.1) holds for $\tau, t \in (0,1]$ and $0 < \tau \le t$, then for any bounded interval $\mathscr{I} \subset \mathbb{R}_0^+$ there is a constant $c_{\rho}^{\mathscr{I}} > 0$ such that the estimate

$$\sup_{t \in \mathscr{I}} \|F(t/n)^n - e^{-tH}\| \le c_{\rho}^{\mathscr{I}} \frac{1}{n^{\rho}}, \tag{3.13}$$

holds for $n \ge 1$.

Proof. Let $N \in \mathbb{N}$ such that $\mathscr{I} \subseteq [0,N]$. Then representation

$$\begin{split} F(t/Nn)^{Nn} - e^{-tH} \\ &= \sum_{k=0}^{N-1} e^{-k \ tH/N} (F(t/Nn)^n - e^{-tH/N}) F(t/Nn)^{(N-1-k)n} \,, \end{split}$$

for $n \ge 1$, yields the estimate

$$||F(t/Nn)^{Nn} - e^{-tH}|| \le N||F(t/Nn)^n - e^{-tH/N}||.$$
(3.14)

Let $t' := t/N \le 1$ and $\tau' := t'/n \le 1$. Then $t \le N$ and $0 < \tau' \le t' \le 1$. By Lemma 3.1(i) we obtain

$$||F(t/Nn)^n - e^{-tH/N}|| = ||F(\tau')^{t'/\tau'} - e^{-t'H}|| \le c_\rho \left(\frac{\tau'}{t'}\right)^\rho,$$

and by (3.14) the estimate

$$||F(t/Nn)^{Nn} - e^{-tH}|| \le c_{\rho}N\left(\frac{\tau'}{t'}\right)^{\rho}.$$

Let $n' := Nn \ge 1$. Then

$$||F(t/n')^{n'} - e^{-tH}|| \le c_{\rho} N^{1+\rho} \left(\frac{1}{n'}\right)^{\rho}, \quad t \in [0, N].$$

Setting $c_{\rho}^{[0,N]}:=c_{\rho}N^{1+\rho}$, we prove the theorem for $\mathscr{I}=[0,N]$. Since for any bounded interval \mathscr{I} one can always find a $N\in\mathbb{N}$ such that $\mathscr{I}\subseteq[0,N]$, this completes the proof. \square

To extend Theorem 3.3 to $\mathscr{I} = \mathbb{R}_0^+$ one needs conditions when the values of τ, t are allowed to be unbounded.

Theorem 3.4. Let $F: \mathbb{R}_0^+ \longrightarrow \mathcal{L}(\mathfrak{H})$ be a measurable family of non-negative self-adjoint contractions such that $F(0) = \mathbb{1}$. Let self-adjoint family $\{S(\tau)\}_{\tau>0}$ be defined by (1.9) and (1.15) for self-adjoint operator $H \geq 0$ in \mathfrak{H} .

If for some $\rho \in (0,1]$ there is a constant $M_{\rho} > 0$ such that the estimate (3.1) holds for $0 < \tau \le t < \infty$, then there exists a constant $c_{\rho}^{\mathbb{R}^+} > 0$ such that for $\tau = t/n$ the estimate

$$\sup_{t \in \mathbb{R}_0^+} \|F(t/n)^n - e^{-tH}\| \le c_{\rho}^{\mathbb{R}^+} \frac{1}{n^{\rho}},\tag{3.15}$$

holds for n \geq 1.

Proof. The arguments ensuring that (3.3) yields estimate (3.6) go through verbatim if we assume (3.1) for $0 < \tau \le t < \infty$. Then setting $\tau := t/n$, $n \in \mathbb{N}$ we deduce from (3.6)

$$||F(t/n)^n - e^{-tH}|| \le c_\rho^{\mathbb{R}^+} \frac{1}{n^\rho}, \quad n \ge 1,$$

for $t \in \mathbb{R}_0^+$, where $c_{\rho}^{\mathbb{R}^+} := 1 + c M_{\rho}$. So, this proves (3.15).

Remark 3.5. We *Note* that in Theorem 2.5 we established the self-adjoint operator-norm convergent *extension* of the Chernoff product formula for any bounded interval $\mathscr{I} \subset \mathbb{R}_0^+$ under *t-dependent* condition (2.18), which is necessary and sufficient.

We *Note* that Theorem 3.3 and Theorem 3.4 prove self-adjoint operator-norm Chernoff product formula in \mathbb{R}_0^+ with *estimate* of the *rate* of convergence. They are also based on *t-dependent* fractional power condition (3.1), which is necessary and sufficient for $\rho \in (0,1)$.

Our next *Note* is that *t*-dependence in assumption (3.1) for $\rho = 1$ can be relaxed. The assertion below extends to \mathbb{R}_0^+ (with convergence rate) the established in Theorem 2.3 operator-norm convergence of the self-adjoint Chernoff product formula for bounded interval $\mathscr{I} \subset \mathbb{R}^+$. It yields an operator-norm version of original Chernoff product formula, see Proposition 1.2.

Theorem 3.6. Let $F: \mathbb{R}_0^+ \longrightarrow \mathcal{L}(\mathfrak{H})$ be a measurable family of non-negative self-adjoint contractions such that $F(0) = \mathbb{1}$. Let self-adjoint family $\{S(\tau)\}_{\tau>0}$ be defined by (1.9) and (1.15) for self-adjoint operator $H \geq 0$ in \mathfrak{H} .

If there is a constant $M_1 > 0$ *such that the estimate*

$$\|(\mathbb{1} + S(\tau))^{-1} - (\mathbb{1} + H)^{-1}\| \le M_1 \tau, \tag{3.16}$$

holds for $\tau \in (0,1]$, then for any bounded interval $\mathscr{I} \subset \mathbb{R}_0^+$ there is a constant $c_1^{\mathscr{I}} > 0$ such that the estimate

$$\sup_{t \in \mathcal{I}} \|F(t/n)^n - e^{-tH}\| \le c_1^{\mathcal{I}} \frac{1}{n}, \tag{3.17}$$

holds for $n \ge 1$.

Proof. By virtue of (2.5) and (3.16) we obtain the estimate

$$\|(\mathbb{1} + tS(\tau))^{-1} - (\mathbb{1} + tH)^{-1}\| \le M_1 \tau t \|(\mathbb{1} + S(\tau))(\mathbb{1} + tS(\tau))^{-1}\| \|(\mathbb{1} + H)(\mathbb{1} + tH)^{-1}\|.$$
(3.18)

Then (3.18), together with estimates $\|(\mathbb{1} + S(\tau))(\mathbb{1} + tS(\tau))^{-1}\| \le 1/t$ and $\|(\mathbb{1} + H)((\mathbb{1} + tH)^{-1}\| \le 1/t$, for self-adjoint $S(\tau)$ and H, imply for $0 < \tau \le t \le 1$ and $\rho = 1$ the estimate (3.1) and thus (3.2). Finally, applying Theorem 3.3 we extend the proof to any bounded interval $\mathscr{I} \subset \mathbb{R}_0^+$.

Now we extend Theorem 3.6 for condition (3.16), to infinite interval $\mathscr{I} = \mathbb{R}_0^+$. To this end, similar to Theorem 3.4, one needs additional assumption valid on infinite *t*-intervals.

Theorem 3.7. Let in addition to conditions of Theorem 3.6 operator $H \ge \mu \mathbb{1}$, $\mu > 0$ and for any $\varepsilon > 0$ there exists a $\delta_{\varepsilon} \in (0,1)$ such that

$$0 \le F(\tau) \le (1 - \delta_{\varepsilon}) \mathbb{1},\tag{3.19}$$

is valid for $\tau \geq \varepsilon$. If there is a constant $M_1 > 0$ such that (3.16) holds for $\tau \in (0, \varepsilon \leq 1)$, then there exists a constant $c_1^{\mathbb{R}^+} > 0$ such that (3.17) is valid for infinite interval $\mathscr{I} = \mathbb{R}_0^+$.

Proof. Since (3.16) implies the resolvent-norm convergence of $\{S(\tau)\}_{\tau>0}$, when $\tau \to +0$, and since $H \ge \mu \mathbb{1}$, there exists $0 < \mu_{\varepsilon} \le \mu$ such that $S(\tau) \ge \mu_{\varepsilon} \mathbb{1}$ for $\tau \in (0, \varepsilon)$, where ε is sufficiently *small*.

On the other hand, (3.18) for self-adjoint $S(\tau)$ and H, yields

$$\|(\mathbb{1} + tS(\tau))^{-1} - (\mathbb{1} + tH)^{-1}\| =$$

$$\leq M_1 \frac{\tau}{t} \|(\mathbb{1} + S(\tau))(\mathbb{1}/t + S(\tau))^{-1}\| \|(\mathbb{1} + H)(\mathbb{1}/t + H)^{-1}\|,$$
(3.20)

for t > 0. Since $S(\tau) \ge \mu_{\varepsilon} \mathbb{1}$, $\tau \in (0, \varepsilon)$, and $H \ge \mu \mathbb{1}$, we obtain estimates

$$\|(\mathbb{1} + S(\tau))(\mathbb{1}/t + S(\tau))^{-1}\| \le \frac{1 + \mu_{\varepsilon}}{\mu_{\varepsilon}},$$

$$\|(\mathbb{1} + H)(\mathbb{1}/t + H)^{-1}\| \le \frac{1 + \mu}{\mu}.$$

By (3.20) these estimates give

$$\|(\mathbb{1} + tS(\tau))^{-1} - (\mathbb{1} + tH)^{-1}\| \le M_1^{\mathbb{R}^+} \frac{\tau}{t}, \tag{3.21}$$

for $\tau \in (0, \varepsilon)$ and t > 0. Here $M_1^{\mathbb{R}^+} := M_1 (1 + \mu_{\varepsilon}) (1 + \mu) / \mu_{\varepsilon} \mu$.

Note that if $\tau/t \le 1$, then by (3.4)

$$||F(\tau)^{t/\tau} - e^{-tS(\tau)}|| \le \frac{\tau}{t}, \quad 0 < \tau \le t < \infty.$$

Therefore, (3.3), (3.5) and (3.21), which are valid for $\tau \in (0, \varepsilon \le 1)$, allow to use the result (3.17) of Theorem 3.6 for the case $0 < \tau \le t < \infty$, and $\tau = t/n$, $n \ge 1$. This yields

$$||F(t/n)^n - e^{-tH}|| \le \widehat{c}_1^{\mathbb{R}^+} \frac{1}{n},$$
 (3.22)

for bounded interval: $t \in [0, \varepsilon n)$, and for $\widehat{c}_1^{\mathbb{R}^+} := 1 + cM_1^{\mathbb{R}^+}$.

Now let $t \ge \varepsilon n$. Then by assumption (3.19) we have

$$||F(t/n)^n|| \le (1 - \delta_{\varepsilon})^n = e^{n \ln(1 - \delta_{\varepsilon})}, \quad t \ge n\varepsilon.$$
(3.23)

Note that $H \ge \mu I$ implies $||e^{-tH}|| \le e^{-n\varepsilon\mu}$ for $t \ge n\varepsilon$. This together with (3.22) and (3.23) yield for a small $\varepsilon > 0$, cf. (3.21), the estimate

$$||F(t/n)^n - e^{-tH}|| \le \widehat{c}_1^{\mathbb{R}^+} \frac{1}{n} + e^{n \ln(1-\delta_{\varepsilon})} + e^{-n\varepsilon\mu},$$

valid for *any* $t \ge 0$.

Since $\widetilde{c_1} := \sup_{n \ge 1} n(e^{n \ln(1-\delta_{\varepsilon})} + e^{-n\varepsilon\mu}) < \infty$, there exists constant $c_1^{\mathbb{R}^+} := \widehat{c_1}^{\mathbb{R}^+} + \widetilde{c_1}$ such that (3.17) is valid for $n \ge 1$ and infinite interval $\mathscr{I} = \mathbb{R}_0^+$

4 Nonself-adjoint operator-norm Chernoff product formula

The results on the *nonself-adjoint* Chernoff product formula in operator-norm topology are more restricted. The most of them concern the *quasi-sectorial* contractions [CZ01].

Definition 4.1. A contraction F on the Hilbert space \mathfrak{H} is called *quasi-sectorial* with semi-angle $\alpha \in [0, \pi/2)$ with respect to the vertex at z = 1, if its numerical range $W(F) \subseteq D_{\alpha}$, where closed domain

$$D_{\alpha} := \{ z \in \mathbb{C} : |z| \le \sin \alpha \} \cup \{ z \in \mathbb{C} : |\arg(1-z)| \le \alpha \text{ and } |z-1| \le \cos \alpha \}. \tag{4.1}$$

The limits: $\alpha = 0$ and $\alpha = \pi/2 - 0$, correspond, respectively, to non-negative self-adjoint contractions and to general contractions.

A characterisation of quasi-sectorial contraction semigroups is due to [Zag08], [ArZ10].

Proposition 4.2. C_0 -semigroup $\{e^{-tH}\}_{t\geq 0}$ is, for t>0, a family of quasi-sectorial contractions with $W(e^{-tH})\subseteq D_\alpha$, if and only if generator H is an m-sectorial operator with $W(H)\subseteq S_\alpha$, the open sector with semi-angle $\alpha\in [0,\pi/2)$ and vertex at z=0.

Note that if operator F is a quasi-sectorial contraction and $W(F) \subseteq D_{\alpha}$, then $\mathbb{1} - F$ is also m-sectorial operator with vertex z = 0 and semi-angle α . Using the Riesz-Dunford functional calculus one obtains estimate

$$||F^n(\mathbb{1} - F)|| \le \frac{K}{n+1}, \ n \in \mathbb{N}.$$
 (4.2)

The estimate (4.2) allows to go beyond the Chernoff \sqrt{n} -Lemma (1.5) and to establish the $(1/\sqrt[3]{n})$ -Theorem [Zag17].

Proposition 4.3. Let F be a quasi-sectorial contraction on \mathfrak{H} with numerical range $W(F) \subseteq D_{\alpha}$ for $\alpha \in [0, \pi/2)$. Then

$$\left\| F^n - e^{n(F-1)} \right\| \le \frac{M}{n^{1/3}}, \ n \in \mathbb{N},$$
 (4.3)

where M = 2K + 2 and K is defined by (4.2).

Next we recall nonself-adjoint operator-norm extension of the Trotter-Neveu-Kato convergence theorem for *quasi-sectorial* contraction semigroups [CZ01] (Lemma 4.1):

Proposition 4.4. Let $\{S(\tau)\}_{\tau>0}$ be a family of m-sectorial operators with $W(S(\tau)) \subseteq S_{\alpha}$ for some $\alpha \in [0, \pi/2)$ and for all $\tau > 0$. Let H be an m-sectorial operator with $W(H) \subset S_{\alpha}$. Then the following conditions are equivalent:

$$(a) \qquad \lim_{\tau \to +0} \left\| (\zeta \mathbb{1} + S(\tau))^{-1} - (\zeta \mathbb{1} + H)^{-1} \right\| = 0, \ \ \textit{for some} \ \zeta \in S_{\pi - \alpha};$$

(b)
$$\lim_{\tau \to +0} \left\| e^{-tS(\tau)} - e^{-tH} \right\| = 0$$
, for t in a subset of \mathbb{R}^+ having a limit point.

Therefore, the estimate (4.3) together with Proposition 4.4 and inequality

$$||F(t/n)^n - e^{-tH}|| \le ||F(t/n)^n - e^{-tS(t/n)}|| + ||e^{-tS(t/n)} - e^{-tH}||,$$
 (4.4)

yield *nonself-adjoint* operator-norm version of the Chernoff product formula for quasi-sectorial contractions (cf. Proposition 1.2 in [CZ01]):

Proposition 4.5. Let $\{F(\tau)\}_{\tau \geq 0}$ be a family of uniformly quasi-sectorial contractions on a Hilbert space \mathfrak{H} , that is, $W(F(\tau) \subseteq D_{\alpha}$ (4.1), for all $\tau > 0$. Let family $\{S(\tau)\}_{\tau > 0}$ be defined by (1.9) and (1.15). If H is m-sectorial operator with $W(H) \subset S_{\alpha}$, then

$$\lim_{n \to \infty} ||F(t/n)^n - e^{-tH}|| = 0, \text{ for } t > 0,$$
(4.5)

if and only if

$$\lim_{\tau \to +0} \left\| (\zeta \mathbb{1} + S(\tau))^{-1} - (\zeta \mathbb{1} + H)^{-1} \right\| = 0, \quad \text{for some } \zeta \in S_{\pi - \alpha}.$$
 (4.6)

Remark 4.6. Since semigroups $\{e^{-zS(\tau)}\}_{z\in S_{\pi/2-\alpha}}$, $\tau>0$, and $\{e^{-zH}\}_{z\in S_{\pi/2-\alpha}}$ are holomorphic in sector $S_{\pi/2-\alpha}$, proof of the Chernoff product formula (4.5) for nonself-adjoint quasi-sectorial contractions is based on the Riesz-Dunford functional calculus. To establish the operator-norm convergence *without* rate it successfully (although *not* completely, since t>0) substitutes the self-adjointness in the proofs in Sections 2 and 3.

We use this calculus to prove the operator-norm Chernoff product formula for quasi-sectorial contractions *with* estimate of the rate of convergence. We *Note* that this is a generalisation of the Chernoff product formulae proven respectively in Theorem 3.6 (for self-adjoint case) and in Proposition 4.5 (without rate of convergence).

Theorem 4.7. Let $\{F(\tau)\}_{\tau \geq 0}$ be a family of uniformly quasi-sectorial contractions on a Hilbert space \mathfrak{H} and let $\{S(\tau)\}_{\tau > 0}$ be a family of m-sectorial operators defined by (1.9) and (1.15) for m-sectorial operator H with $W(H) \subseteq S_{\alpha}$. If there is L > 0 such that estimate

$$\|(\zeta \mathbb{1} + S(\tau))^{-1} - (\zeta \mathbb{1} + H)^{-1}\| \le \frac{L \tau}{\operatorname{dist}(\zeta, -S_{\alpha})},$$
 (4.7)

holds for $\zeta \in S_{\pi-\alpha}$, then for any bounded interval $\mathscr{I} \subset \mathbb{R}^+$ there is a constant $C^{\mathscr{I}} > 0$ such that estimate

$$\sup_{t \in \mathscr{I}} \|F(t/n)^n - e^{-tH}\| \le C^{\mathscr{I}} \frac{1}{n^{1/3}} , \tag{4.8}$$

holds for n > 1.

Proof. Estimation of the last term in inequality (4.4). Since by (1.9) and conditions on $\{F(\tau)\}_{\tau\geq 0}$ operators $\{S(\tau)\}_{\tau>0}$ are *m*-sectorial with $W(S(\tau))\subseteq S_{\alpha}$, the Riesz-Dunford formula

$$e^{-tS(\tau)} = \frac{1}{2\pi i} \int_{\Gamma} d\zeta \; \frac{e^{t\zeta}}{\zeta \mathbb{1} + S(\tau)},$$

defines for $\tau > 0$ a family of holomorphic semigroups $\tau \mapsto \{e^{-tS(\tau)}\}_{t \in S_{\pi/2-\alpha}}$. Here $\Gamma \subset S_{\pi-\alpha}$ is a positively-oriented closed (at infinity) contour in $\mathbb C$ around $-S_\alpha$. The same is true for m-sectorial operator H since $W(H) \subseteq S_\alpha$:

$$e^{-tH} = \frac{1}{2\pi i} \int_{\Gamma} d\zeta \, \frac{e^{t\zeta}}{\zeta \mathbb{1} + H}.$$

We define $\Gamma:=\overline{\Gamma_{\varepsilon}}\cup\Gamma_{\delta}\cup\Gamma_{\varepsilon}$, where the arc $\Gamma_{\delta}=\{z\in\mathbb{C}:\ |z|=\delta>0, |\arg z|\leq\pi-\alpha-\varepsilon\}$ (for $0<\varepsilon<\pi/2-\alpha$) and $\Gamma_{\varepsilon},\overline{\Gamma_{\varepsilon}}$ are two conjugate radial rays with $\Gamma_{\varepsilon}=\{z\in\mathbb{C}:\ \arg z=\pi-\alpha-\varepsilon,\ |z|\geq\delta\}$. Then for t>0 one gets

$$||e^{-tS(\tau)} - e^{-tH}|| \le \frac{1}{2\pi} \int_{\Gamma} |d\zeta| |e^{t\zeta}| ||(\zeta \mathbb{1} + S(\tau))^{-1} - (\zeta \mathbb{1} + H)^{-1}||. \tag{4.9}$$

Since operators $\{S(\tau)\}_{\tau>0}$ and H are m-sectorial with numerical ranges in open sector S_{α} , by condition (4.7) we obtain:

$$\left\| (\zeta \mathbb{1} + S(\tau))^{-1} - (\zeta \mathbb{1} + H)^{-1} \right\| \le \frac{L\tau}{\delta \sin \varepsilon}, \quad \text{for } \zeta \in \Gamma_{\delta},$$
(4.10)

$$\left\| (\zeta \mathbb{1} + S(\tau))^{-1} - (\zeta \mathbb{1} + H)^{-1} \right\| \le \frac{L\tau}{|\zeta| \sin \varepsilon}, \text{ for } \zeta \in \Gamma_{\varepsilon} \vee \overline{\Gamma_{\varepsilon}}.$$
 (4.11)

Then for t > 0 the estimates (4.9) and (4.10), (4.11) yield

$$||e^{-tS(\tau)} - e^{-tH}|| \le \frac{L\tau}{\sin\varepsilon} \left\{ e^{t\delta} + \frac{e^{-t\delta\cos(\alpha+\varepsilon)}}{\pi t \delta\cos(\alpha+\varepsilon)} \right\}. \tag{4.12}$$

Hence, inequality (4.12) proves the existence of $N^{\mathscr{I}}$ such that for $\tau = t/n$

$$\sup_{t \in \mathscr{I}} \|e^{-tS(t/n)} - e^{-tH}\| \le N^{\mathscr{I}} \frac{1}{n}. \tag{4.13}$$

To estimate the first term in the right-hand side of (4.4) we use Proposition 4.3. Then

$$||F(t/n)^n - e^{-tS(t/n)}|| \le M \frac{1}{n^{1/3}}.$$
 (4.14)

The inequalities (4.4) and (4.13), (4.14) prove the estimate (4.8).

Remark 4.8. Note that the rate (4.8) of the operator-norm convergence of the Chernoff product formula for quasi-sectorial contractions is slower then for the self-adjoint case (3.17). This rate is limited by *non-optimal* estimate due to Proposition 4.3.

Corollary 4.9. Let $\{S(\tau)\}_{\tau>0}$ be a family of m-sectorial operators defined by (1.9) and (1.15) with $W(S(\tau)) \subseteq S_{\alpha}$ for some $\alpha \in [0, \pi/2)$. Let H be an m-sectorial operator with $W(H) \subseteq S_{\alpha}$. Then there exist M' > 0 and $\delta' > 0$ such that

$$\|e^{-tS(\tau)} - e^{-tH}\| \le \frac{M'}{t} e^{t\delta'} \|(\mathbb{1} + S(\tau))^{-1} - (\mathbb{1} + H)^{-1}\|,$$
 (4.15)

holds for positive τ and t.

For extension of Theorem 4.7 to \mathbb{R}_0^+ the estimate (4.15) suggests a weaker form of the operator-norm Trotter-Neveu-Kato theorem. We *Note* that, under *stronger* than (4.7) (the *t*-dependent resolvent condition, see (3.1) for $\rho = 1$) we obtain a new version of Proposition 4.4.

Theorem 4.10. Let $\{F(\tau)\}_{\tau \geq 0}$ be a family of uniformly quasi-sectorial contractions on a Hilbert space \mathfrak{H} . Let $\{S(\tau)\}_{\tau > 0}$ be a family of m-sectorial operators defined by (1.9), (1.15) with $W(S(\tau)) \subseteq S_{\alpha}$ for some $\alpha \in [0, \pi/2)$ and for m-sectorial operator H with $W(H) \subseteq S_{\alpha}$. Then estimate

$$\sup_{t \in \mathscr{I}} \left\| (\zeta \mathbb{1} + tS(\tau))^{-1} - (\zeta \mathbb{1} + tH)^{-1} \right\| \le \frac{L^{\mathscr{I}} \tau}{\operatorname{dist}(\zeta, -S_{\alpha})}, \quad \zeta \in S_{\pi - \alpha}, \tag{4.16}$$

holds for any interval $\mathscr{I} \subseteq \mathbb{R}_0^+$ if and only if the condition

$$\sup_{t \in \mathscr{I}} \|e^{-tS(\tau)} - e^{-tH}\| \le K^{\mathscr{I}} \tau , \qquad (4.17)$$

is valid for any interval $\mathscr{I} \subseteq \mathbb{R}_0^+$.

Proof. Necessity of (4.17): As in the proof of Theorem 4.7 we use the Riesz-Dunford functional calculus for holomorphic semigroups to obtain estimate

$$\|e^{-tS(\tau)} - e^{-tH}\| \le \frac{1}{2\pi} \int_{\Gamma} |dz| |e^{z}| \|(z\mathbb{1} + tS(\tau))^{-1} - (z\mathbb{1} + tH)^{-1}\|, \tag{4.18}$$

for the same contour $\Gamma \subset S_{\pi-\alpha}$. After change of variable: $z=t\zeta$, the right-hand side of estimate (4.18) gets the same expression as (4.12), but for δ substituted by δ/t . This yields (4.17) for any bounded interval $\mathscr{I} \subset \mathbb{R}_0^+$.

Sufficiency of (4.17): First, using the Laplace transform, we estimate:

$$\left\| (\zeta \mathbb{1} + tS(\tau))^{-1} - (\zeta \mathbb{1} + tH)^{-1} \right\| \le \int_0^\infty ds \, e^{-s\operatorname{Re}\zeta} \left\| e^{-stS(\tau)} - e^{-stH} \right\|, \tag{4.19}$$

in the half-plane $\mathbb{C}_+ = S_{\pi/2}$. To this aim we let $\varepsilon \in (0,1)$ and $N_{\varepsilon} := -\ln(\varepsilon/2)$ such that for $\zeta \in S_{\pi/2}$ and $\tau > 0$, $t \ge 0$

$$\int_{N_c}^{\infty} ds \, e^{-s\operatorname{Re}\zeta} \left\| e^{-stS(\tau)} - e^{-stH} \right\| \leq \varepsilon.$$

Therefore, one gets

$$\left\| (\zeta \mathbb{1} + tS(\tau))^{-1} - (\zeta \mathbb{1} + tH)^{-1} \right\| \leq \int_0^{N_{\varepsilon}} ds \ e^{-s\operatorname{Re}\zeta} \left\| e^{-stS(\tau)} - e^{-stH} \right\| + \varepsilon \ ,$$

that by condition (4.17) for any interval $\mathscr{I} \subseteq \mathbb{R}_0^+$ and $\varepsilon \in (0,1)$ yields

$$\sup_{t \in \mathscr{I}} \left\| (\zeta \mathbb{1} + tS(\tau))^{-1} - (\zeta \mathbb{1} + tH)^{-1} \right\| \leq \frac{1}{\operatorname{Re} \zeta} \sup_{t \in \mathscr{I} \wedge s \in [0, N_{\varepsilon}]} \left\| e^{-stS(\tau)} - e^{-stH} \right\| + \varepsilon \leq \frac{1}{\operatorname{Re} \zeta} K^{\mathbb{R}_{0}^{+}} \tau + \varepsilon. \tag{4.20}$$

Since ε may be arbitrary small, we obtain the estimate (4.16) for any $\zeta \in S_{\pi/2}$.

For extension of ζ to sector $S_{\pi-\alpha}$ we note that semigroups involved into estimate (4.19) are holomorphic in sector $S_{\pi/2-\alpha}$. Therefore, the Laplace transform is also valid for integration along the radial rays: $se^{i\varphi} \in S_{\pi/2-\alpha}$. Then conditions for convergence of Laplace integrals take the form:

$$-\pi/2 < \varphi + \arg \zeta < \pi/2 \quad \land \quad -(\pi/2 - \alpha) < \varphi < (\pi/2 - \alpha), \tag{4.21}$$

that yields $\arg \zeta \in S_{\pi-\alpha}$ and makes $\operatorname{Re}(e^{i\varphi}\zeta)$ proportional to $\operatorname{dist}(\zeta, -S_{\alpha})$.

Corollary 4.11. *Linear* τ -estimate (4.17) *implies*

$$\sup_{t \in \mathscr{I}} \|e^{-tS(t/n)} - e^{-tH}\| \le K_1^{\mathscr{I}} \frac{1}{n}, \tag{4.22}$$

for any $n \in \mathbb{N}$ and any bounded interval $\mathscr{I} \subset \mathbb{R}_0^+$. Then the same line of reasoning as in Theorem 4.7 yields under t-dependent resolvent condition (4.16) the estimate

$$\sup_{t \in \mathscr{I}} \|F(t/n)^n - e^{-tH}\| \le C_1^{\mathscr{I}} \frac{1}{n^{1/3}}, \tag{4.23}$$

for $n \geq 1$ and any bounded interval $\mathscr{I} \subset \mathbb{R}_0^+$.

We *Note* that extension (4.23) of the operator-norm Chernoff product formula for quasisectorial contractions on \mathbb{R}^+_0 inherits the estimate of the rate of convergence established in Proposition 4.3.

5 Comments: Trotter-Kato product formulae

The first application of the Chernoff product formula (Proposition 1.2) was the proof of the strongly convergent Trotter product formula, see [Che68]:

$$s-\lim_{n\to\infty} \left(e^{-tA/n} e^{-tB/n} \right)^n = e^{-tH}, \quad t \ge 0.$$
 (5.1)

Here A and B are positive self-adjoint operators in a Hilbert space $\mathfrak H$ with domains dom A and dom B such that dom $A \cap \text{dom } B = \text{core } H$ of the self-adjoint H. Note that operator family $\{F(t) := e^{-tA}e^{-tB}\}_{t \ge 0}$ is not self-adjoint.

Later the operator-norm Chernoff product formula from Sections 2 and 3 was used to lift (5.1) to operator-norm topology, as well as to extend it from the *exponential* Trotter product formula to the *Trotter-Kato* product formulae for Kato functions \mathcal{K} , see [NZ98].

Recall that if a real-valued Borel measurable function $f:[0,\infty)\to[0,1]$ satisfying

$$0 < f(s) < 1, \quad f(0) = 1, \quad f'(+0) = -1,$$
 (5.2)

then $f \in \mathcal{K}$. Different conditions on local continuity at t = +0 and global behaviour on \mathbb{R}^+ select subclasses of the Kato functions, see Appendix C in [Zag19]. If functions $f, g \in \mathcal{K}$ substitute exponents in formula (5.1) then it is called the Trotter-Kato product formula.

To apply a full power of the self-adjoint Chernoff product formula (Sections 2 and 3) we symmetrise and produce *self-adjoint* family $\{F(t) := g(tB)^{1/2} f(tA)g(tB)^{1/2}\}_{t\geq 0}$. Let positive operators A and B be such that operator $A+B=: H\geq \mu\mathbb{1}$ is self-adjoint. If F(t) is sufficiently smooth at t=+0 and satisfy (3.19) (see [IT01] (1.2)), then (3.16) holds for $\tau=t/n$ and Theorem 3.7 proves the operator-norm convergent symmetrised Trotter-Kato product formula:

$$\|\cdot\| - \lim_{n \to \infty} (g(tB/n)^{1/2} f(tA/n) g(tB/n)^{1/2})^n = e^{-tH},$$
 (5.3)

uniformly on \mathbb{R}_0^+ with O(1/n) as the rate of convergence, see [IT01], [ITTZ01]. There it was also shown that this rate is *optimal*.

For proving convergence of the *nonself-adjoint* Trotter-Kato approximants, for example the simplest: $\{(f(tA/n)g(tB/n))^n\}_{n\geq 1}$, note that for $n\in\mathbb{N}$ and $t\geq 0$:

$$(f(tA/n)g(tB/n))^n = f(tA/n)g(tB/n)^{1/2}F(t/n)^{n-1}g(tB/n)^{1/2}.$$

This representation yields:

$$||(f(tA/n)g(tB/n))^{n} - e^{-tH}|| \le ||F(t/n)^{n-1} - e^{-tH}|| + 2||(1 - g(tB/n))e^{-tH}|| + ||(1 - f(tA/n))e^{-tH}||.$$

Then by estimates (3.22) and (4.2) we get for $n-1 \ge 1$

$$||F(t/n)^{n-1} - e^{-tH}|| \le (\widehat{c}_1^{\mathbb{R}^+} + K) \frac{1}{n}, \ t \ge 0.$$
 (5.4)

On the other hand, since $f, g \in \mathcal{K}$ and H = A + B:

$$\|(\mathbb{1} - f(tA/n))e^{-tH}\| \le C_C^A \gamma[f] \frac{1}{n} \text{ and } \|(\mathbb{1} - g(tB/n))e^{-tH}\| \le C_C^B \gamma[g] \frac{1}{n},$$
 (5.5)

where $\gamma[f] := \sup_{x>0} (1 - f(x))/x$ and similar for g. Inequalities (5.4) and (5.5) yield for some $\Gamma > 0$ the estimate

$$||(f(tA/n)g(tB/n))^n - e^{-tC}|| \le \Gamma \frac{1}{n},$$

which proves the asymptotic O(1/n) for $n \to \infty$.

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
