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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

This is the deliverable "D4.5 Process Execution Report" of the ERSAT GGC project. This document reports the execution of the track area classification process developed during the work package "WP4 Track Survey and Track Classification" along with the main outcomes and results obtained during this process.

The goal of WP4 is to set up a standard measurement and classification system that is able to provide a prediction of the expected presence of GNSS hazard causes and degraded performance to be expected at a given track area, in order to enable the evaluation if the specific environment is suitable or not to place virtual balises or on the contrary should be discarded beforehand.

In this document, we detail the results of applying the classification standard process, by means of the developed software Toolset to the measurement data collected in the three measurements campaigns during ERSAT GGC project. This execution report addressed the main important aspects that need to be carried out for the correct application of the classification process and the results obtained with the data collected.

1. INTRODUCTION

The main goal of WP4 of ERSAT GGC project is the definition of a track area classification process with respect to the presence of local GNSS hazard causes along the railway lines to be potentially equipped with Virtual Balises. The classification process requires the collection of measurement data with COTS hardware equipment as well as the processing of this data with a dedicated software toolset. The classification process was first defined in the deliverable D4.1 [1] and further in D4.2 [2]. The development and implementation of the software toolset is presented in D4.3 [3]. A summary of the outcome of this deliverables is provided in the first sections of this document in order to support the understanding of the rest of the document.

In order to verify the classification process with respect to the proposed measurement hardware and the related experimental setup for the data collection process and to support the validation and analysis of the data with the software toolset, within the context of ERSAT GGC, three measurement campaigns have been carried out in three different countries: Spain, Italy and France.

The relevant information about the data collection process in these three campaigns was provided in D4.4 [4]. This includes the procurement and installation of the measurement equipment on the train, the specific measurement equipment setup and operation for the different campaigns as well as the scheduling of the train runs in the selected lines. A summary of the campaigns important aspects is also provided in this document related to each of the countries.

In this document, we detail the results of applying the classification process, by means of the developed software Toolset to the measurement data collected in the two identified lines where the process execution was planned, i.e. Italian and Spanish Lines. This execution report addresses the main important aspects that need to be carried out for the correct application of the classification process and the results obtained with the data collected in Spain and Italy.





2. CLASSIFICATION PROCESS

In order to instantiate the Enhanced Functional ERTMS Architecture Capable of using GNSS and Public Radio telecommunication Technologies described in ERSAT GGC deliverable D2.1 [5], the railway line shall be designed in order to locate the virtual balises in areas where the GNSS local phenomena would always lead to bound VB position errors, in accordance the accepted residual integrity risks. The aim of the WP4 is to set up a standard measurement and classification process able to provide to the railway trackside designer and the railway operator an indication on the track areas where virtual balises can be potentially located to mitigate the potential risk that the VBR Error Model might not bound the VB detection error.

In order to bound a-priori the risk that the presence of local hazards might lead to unbounded VB location errors at the virtual balise level, the following approach is followed during the process:

- The expected presence of the different hazards along the line is studied by means of a generic classification process, where generic means independently of a specific implementation of a VBR
- The track areas are classified according to their suitability for placing virtual balises
- The classification results are made available to the signalling trackside engineers that have to take the results of the classification into account during the signalling trackside subsystem design phase

Note that the assumptions and models of the classification process are exported to any virtual balise reader to guarantee the coherence of the results of the classification process with the FDE capability and GNSS Positioning algorithms implemented in a VBR. An example of the expected results of the track area classification process is depicted in Figure 1.

2.1 HIGH LEVEL REQUIREMENTS

The classification process has been designed and developed with the expectation to become a standard and cost-effective process:

- The process instantiation shall foresee a modular and scalable measurement environment, and allow to use different and interchangeable hardware and detection methods
- The process instantiation shall be based on the use of COTS measurement components
- The process will only address the local hazard causes due to the permanent properties of the track area that could potentially lead to hazardous consequences and shall be compatible with any Virtual Balise Transmission System (VBTS)
- Since there is currently no Minimum Operational Performance Standards (MOPS) reference document for the railway GNSS applications, the process shall be configurable through run time parameters, which shall be exported to the virtual balise reader

The process shall classify each track area of the line based on virtual balise placement suitability status in terms of three colours:

- Green, meaning that the area is suitable for the virtual balise placement
- Red, meaning that the area is not suitable for the virtual balise placement
- Yellow, meaning that there is not enough information to classify the area as Green or Red, and the area shall not be used for placing virtual balises. However, if necessary, further measurements and analysis would be performed in order to obtain a classification of this specific area as Green or Red.

The process shall evaluate the potential local hazard causes, such as Multipath, Non-Line-Of-Sight, and Interference, and shall give an indication of the hazard cause leading to the classification of an area as not suitable.

The classification process shall guarantee the coverage of the track areas in terms of spatial and temporal dynamics, and take into consideration the augmentation information to discard unhealthy satellites so as to avoid wrong and pessimistic classification results. The process shall allow the use of different detection techniques applied offline to the data acquired on the field during the campaign, and the inclusion of the results from simulation methods based on external data, when available, such as 3D models of the environment.

The process shall be based on an incremental collection of data from multiple train runs, and allow a comparative analysis of different sub-sets of data and enable the subsequent monitoring of the surveyed line, to deal with potential modifications of the environment that would lead to a different classification of some areas.





2.2 CLASSIFICATION PROCESS OVERVIEW

The Track Survey and Track Classification is a comprehensive process which includes several phases, starting from the preparation of the track survey and leading to the evaluation of the results and, after the trackside commissioning phase, monitoring the validity of the classification results along the line during the time or periodically. A diagram with the overview of the different steps of the classification process is presented in Figure 2.

The Monitoring Process of the results of the Classification Process after the tracksidecommissioning phase is out of the scope of the ERSAT-GGC project. D4.1 [1] provides high level requirements only of this process phase.

2.2.1 PREPARATION PHASE

The preparation phase includes the activities needed to equip the train being used for performing the measurement campaign, prepare the measurement equipment and to plan the measurement campaign. The train can be a train dedicated to the execution of diagnostic activities or a commercial train where temporally the measurement equipment has to be installed. For example, a commercial train has been used for the application of the Classification Process to the Italian Lines and a dedicated Diagnostic Train for the Spanish and French Lines.





The activities of the preparation phase are:

- The **installation** consists in the identification / procurement of the measurement equipment compliant with the requirements / recommendations described in the Classification process specification, the design of the layout of the equipment on-board of the train, the fulfilment of the necessary authorization process and the installation of the measurement equipment on the train
- The **run planning** involves the evaluation of the schedule of the train runs and of the measurements in order to obtain the desired spatial and temporal coverage and the attainment of the authorizations from the operator and infrastructure manager to perform the runs. In order to reduce the cost of dedicated runs only for the purpose of the track area classification, the process can be combined with other surveying activities carried out by infrastructure managers.

2.2.2 DATA COLLECTION AND ACQUISITION PHASE

The data collection and acquisition phase includes the field measurement campaign, the collection of the raw data from the measurement equipment on-board of the train and the acquisition of any additional data necessary to perform the degraded performance simulation based on 3D models:

- The **static measurements** consist in the collection of measurement data with the measurement on-board equipment while the train is standstill and stored in a location with nominal GNSS conditions (i.e. stored in a location with a good open sky visibility and no permanent sources of local phenomena), which will be used to determine the nominal error models or to derive the relevant detection thresholds. These thresholds are considered as calibration parameter values of the detection techniques.
- The **dynamic measurements** involve the collection of measurement data while the train is performing the runs as defined in the run planning phase, in order to gather the raw data necessary to cover the spatial and temporal dynamics of the GNSS signal behaviour along the line. The collected data will then be processed offline with the Software Toolset. During this process, relevant information about the times of the measurement runs and all the lines covered must be stored. Later on, this information is required to generate run tables that are required by the Toolset to identify relevant measurement data intervals and associate the subsequent detection results to the correct tracks.
- The 3D models & Other GNSS Navigation data: GNSS navigation data includes the augmentation data information and the constellations almanac. On the other hand, when the optional use of the toolset simulator is foreseen for extending the classification also to the degraded performance analysis due to the morphology of the environment, data acquisition consists in the gathering of 3D terrain models of the areas around the train line from the available public sources.





2.2.3 TOOLSET PROCESSING PHASE

The Toolset processing phase consists in the offline processing of the data collected during the previous phase, and involves the execution of the detection techniques on the acquired data and the subsequent track classification.

- The **calibration** phase consists in the evaluation of the static measurement data in order to compute the calibration parameters for each detection technique, and allows to tailor the thresholds and the models used by the techniques to the specific train, antenna installation, cabling and measurement equipment configuration
- The **detection** phase consists in executing the detection techniques on the dynamic measurement data acquired during the train runs, and in performing the simulation of the GNSS constellations and their visibility accounting for the 3D terrain models of the line. It includes the analysis of the augmentation data in order to discard unhealthy satellites from the evaluation
- The track domain mapping & multiple runs accumulation consists in the translation of the detection techniques results from the time domain to the space domain, the projection of the detection results to the track domain (based on a given reference track database) and finally the accumulation of the results from multiple runs. A schematic of this process step is shown in Figure 4.

- The Hazard causes assessment consists in taking a decision about the presence of a certain local GNSS hazard cause in a certain point of the railway line. This decision is made by taking into account the information of different runs, and when applicable the different satellites detection results, to reach to a final classification per threat. This assessment builds upon statistical evaluations to provide a higher and higher confidence on the detected presence of hazard causes and to discard a pessimistic classification due to a non-permanent presence of threats. The level of confidence will increase with the size of the statistical sample.
- The **overall classification** consists in the logical combination of the presence of the different hazard causes along the line to reach to a final classification result. This process also introduces a space margin or confidence interval to the results in order to provide more coherent information in case of the possible intermittent presence of threats in a certain area.

2.2.4 EVALUATION AND MONITORING PHASE

The evaluation and monitoring phase consists of the evaluation of the final classification results, the judgement of the line from a rail signalling perspective, and the inclusion of the output data in the supporting material for the signalling trackside design phases also based on the use of virtual balises.

Once the trackside subsystem is commissioned, the validity in time of the classification would be monitored to detect degradation events with respect to the classification used for the last trackside commissioned. This monitoring phase is outside the scope of the ERSAT-GGC project.







3. TOOLSET SOFTWARE

3.1 TOOLSET STRUCTURE

In Figure 5, a high level structural overview of the Toolset software developed within the project is presented.



Figure 5 Toolset Software Structure

The three main components, namely a central processing chain, campaign data storage as well as a graphical user interface, are presented in the following.

3.1.1 MAIN TOOLSET PROCESS

The main block of the software represented in Figure 5 is composed of the different processing algorithms developed according to the classification process. It consists of the following functionalities:

• Pre-processing:

This step foresees the conversion of the raw measurement data, collected with the different measurement equipment specified by the classification process, into common input files with





specified formats. These fixed formats represent the input interfaces of all the different detection blocks. The pre-processing stage enables the use of different measurement hardware within the toolset because this phase acts as a front-end for the Toolset. As long as the measurement equipment can provide the required measurement information as requested by the classification process, the measured data can be converted to the defined input file formats making the native data format transparent to the further data analysis in the survey Toolset.

In addition to the conversion of raw data into specified input file formats, the generation of commonly used information like reference location and satellite azimuth and elevation is added in this step.

• Calibration:

Calibration has to be executed at least once per unique combination of antenna, installation, cabling and receiver. It is used for several detections techniques to account for the nominal noise and multipath levels of each installation in order to adjust the techniques to achieve the desired false alarm probabilities.

- **Detection**: It consists in the sequential processing of the different selected GNSS local threats detection techniques targeting the specific threats. In particular, the implemented detection techniques per threat are [6]:
 - Interference:
 - Automatic Gain Control (AGC): Detection based on changes in the AGC Levels given by the receiver.
 - Power Spectrum Density (PSD): Detection of the presence of interference by comparing the nominal and the current shape of the spectrum in the in-band and near band frequencies of GNSS signals.

• Multipath:

- Code-minus-Carrier Delta: based on the time difference of the code minus carrier observable.
- Carrier to Noise (CN0): Detection based on multiple frequency information of the CN0 provided by the receiver.
- NLOS:
 - PVT Residual: Fault detection based on the least-squares position residual computation. This technique may detect also large multipath error.
 - Eye-fish Camera NLOS detection: based on the comparison between received satellites and visible satellites based on the information of the horizon provided by an eye-fish camera.
- **Degraded Performance**: Detection based on the simulation of areas and the expected performance in terms of number of visible satellites and Dilution of Precision.
- Classification: The classification processing, as presented in Section 2.2.3, consists in the translation of the detection results into the track area domain, the combination of the information of different runs for the same point on the track and the final decision logic about each of the considered local hazard causes and the overall classification. The final classification results account for a space domain margin or confidence interval as a VBR





receiver may need some time to recover after the presence of corrupted or limited measurements. A graphical overview of the whole classification is depicted in Figure 6.

3.1.2 DATA STORAGE

The second major part of the Toolset is the structured data repository that keeps all relevant measurements and information to perform the track area classification based on a measurement campaign. The storage of the different types of data that are input or are generated during the Toolset processing are stored in an FTP server repository to be easily accessed by each of the partners and/or users of the campaigns evaluation. Different type of information is generated during the processing, including:

- Input Data: Consist of the raw measurement data recorded during the measurement campaigns, the information about the track DB of the areas to be classified, 3D models data used for the proper simulation of the degraded performance and other information like augmentation GNSS data or almanac information.
- Pre-processed Data: The raw measurement data is converted into (partly standard) data formats utilized by the detections tools in the Toolset. This allows for the interfacing of different measurement devices running with different proprietary information. For example, raw GNSS data is converted into RINEX v3 format which enables many different GNSS receivers to be used to collect measurement data.
- **Intermediate Results:** This directory contains the results and flags provided by all the different detection techniques.
- Classification Results: In this directory, the Toolset stores the final classification results including .kml files for direct visualization as well as more detailed information on the presence of all the individual threats along the line. The GUI can be used to access this classification database and evaluate individual results.





3.1.3 GRAPHICAL USER INTERFACE (GUI)

The GUI is the primary connection between the user and the Toolset processing. The user is able to manage the different data from it as well as to launch the different steps of the processing. It contains three main tabs according to the main three functions the user needs to apply: Processing (Figure 7), Calibration (Figure 8) and Evaluation (Figure 9).

3.2 OPERATION OF THE TOOLSET

The Toolset is structured with a modular approach, and during each phase of the operation detailed in Figure 10, a dedicated part of the GUI automatically launches the appropriate modules in sequence.

The data is organized in structured folders for each campaign, with a sub-folder dedicated to each phase of the Toolset processing. The data from all the measurement campaigns is collected in a common repository, but the Toolset has to be run with a local copy of the campaign's data or direct access to a network drive containing the data.

Before the execution of the Toolset, the user has to setup the detection and classification parameters, depending on the results of the calibration phase.

A. Data gathering

The first phase of the process consists in gathering the raw data from the receiver and, when the use of the Simulation is foreseen to predict degraded performance in the GNSS chain due to the trackside morphology, the 3D terrain models from the data providers. Once the relevant data is collected, the user has to create a new campaign in the Toolset and copy the data in the appropriate input folders of the Toolset. The input data also includes the track database, describing the structure of the line, and the run tables, describing the track sections covered by each run.





B. Pre-processing

Once the data has been gathered and copied to the appropriate input folders, the pre-processing phase can be executed. This phase transforms the receiver-specific raw data in a common format, and allows the subsequent detection techniques to run seamlessly across the different receivers. The user has to launch the GUI and select the receiver that was used during the campaign from the list of the supported ones, then start the processing phase, which will elaborate in sequence on all the input files.

C. Calibration

Once the input data has been pre-processed, the calibration phase can be run. A configuration file allows the user to select which input data has to be used for the calibration of each detection technique by specifying the start and end date/time of the static data acquisition. The calibration can be launched separately for each detection technique and can be fine-tuned by selecting the specific time frame that is representative for the definition of the nominal conditions. Since the calibration phase defines the thresholds and the parameters used for that specific technique, if additional calibration data is acquired, the process has to be run again and will overwrite the previous calibration data. Conversely, if the calibration parameters calculated previously are still valid (e.g. the same train and equipment is used to perform additional runs), it is not necessary to perform a new calibration.

D. Detection

The detection phase consists in the execution of the detection techniques. Once launched from the correspondent command in the GUI, the process automatically executes in sequence the detection techniques on each pre-processed file, obtaining the results of the classification for each technique and each hazard cause for each time epoch.

E. Classification

The classification phase consists in the combination of the classification results for each detection technique for each time epoch and their mapping in the track domain. This phase can be executed for the whole campaign or for a subset of train runs, and generates the final classification results along the line both combined and for specific hazard cause. The final results are provided in different formats, including a Matlab matrix file and KML files, which can be loaded by 3rd party tools (e.g. Google Earth).

F. Evaluation

The evaluation phase consists in the assessment of the classification results and in the evaluation of the impact of each hazard cause along the line. The Toolset allows the selection of any subset of train runs that were classified, and inside it the selection of the track sections to be





evaluated. The results are then displayed both as statistics for each hazard cause, and as a graphical representation of the line on a map by means of Green, Red, and Yellow areas. It is possible to visualize graphically the classification for each hazard cause, and the user can select the extension of the smoothing window applied.

The results can be also evaluated through external tools by using the KML files, or integrated in an ERTMS design toolset by means of the txt files containing the classification flags.







4. MEASUREMENT CAMPAIGNS

During the WP4 of ERSAT GGC project, the first phase of the classification process corresponding to the measurement campaign has been carried out in different lines. The detail information about each of the campaigns can be found in [4]. In the following we provide also the relevant information about each of them.

4.1 MEASUREMENT CAMPAIGN IN ITALIAN LINE

This section describes how the track area classification process has been applied along an Italian line according to the technical specifications and Toolsets defined in ERSAT-GGC project. The first part of the process foresees a preparation phase. In this phase the following steps have been carried out in the Italian measurement campaign:

- Selection of the measurement equipment in accordance the requirements / recommendations given in the process definition.
- Approval procedure for the installation of the measurement equipment. Based on the safety-related analysis edited by Hitachi STS, the non-intrusiveness of the novel on-board architecture has been evaluated and assessed in order to guarantee the safety of the planned in-field test. The authorization letters have been sent by the technical department of TRENITALIA and RFI.
- Measurement campaign schedule selection. A schedule in terms of number of train runs to be carried in the selected line has been sent and approved by TRENITALIA and RFI.
- Installation of the measurement sub-system.

The second part of the process foresees the measurement and data acquisition on a selected line. In the Italian measurement campaign, the Cagliari - San Gavino line (part of the Cagliari-Sassari line) has been selected as the reference site. It mostly presents open sky conditions and the total distance from Cagliari to San Gavino is 50 km.

Data collection has been performed on the diesel railcar ALn668–3136, considering two different train moving dynamics:

- Static measurement (train in standstill condition) to acquire calibration data
- Dynamic measurement (train moving from the departure station to the arrival station) to acquire the input data required for the classification process.

In the Italian measurement campaign, thirty-two runs have been performed on Cagliari – San Gavino section as summarized in Figure 12. The train runs have been scheduled in different time of the day (morning, afternoon, night) to cover the reception of signals from various elevation angles and to detect the "permanent" aspect of the presence of local hazard causes. The number of train runs has been chosen to classify a higher number of points over the track in order to cover the entire line spatially.

GNSS raw data acquired during the Italian measurement campaign from the selected measurement systems have been stored in the FTP server repository as described in Section 3.1.2. For each train run, run tables have been generated and stored in the ERSAT GGC FTP server. They contain the starting and ending time for the evaluation of each run specifying also the track segments covered in the run. Figure 13 shows an example of a run table generated for a specific run executed in the Italian campaign.

As a last part of the process, all the data acquired during the Italian campaign have been processed with the track area classification Toolset (specific information on how the Toolset process has been executed is provided in the next sub-section). Finally, track classification results have been computed and stored in the FTP server repository.

The measurement sub-system directly related to the track area classification process mainly consists of an antenna and a COTS GNSS receiver able to collect all the measurements required to perform the track assessment. Based on the requirements and recommendations provided by the classification process specification [2], the hardware of the measurement sub-system used in the Italian measurement campaign has been selected considering:

- Input parameters required for the classification process
- Flexibility in the configuration of some receiver parameters
- Possibility to configure the hardware of the measurement sub-system in order to deactivate multipath and interference mitigation options
- Availability of the received power level parameters.

Based on the above assumptions, the following set of equipment has been used to carry out the data collection in Sardinia:

- GNSS antenna: Antcom's G5 antenna
- Two GNSS receivers for carrying out the verification of the process and related measurement procedures; the use of the two receivers has allowed a comparative analysis to tune the process. One receiver only is required at regime for the application of the classification process. The two receivers are:
 - Septentrio AsteRx4 OEM
 - o Javad Delta-3N
- Splitter: ZB4PD1-2000-S+
- DC block: BLK-18-S+
- Coaxial Cable
- Two laptops connected to the GNSS receivers

The selected GNSS receivers provide also PSD and AGC measurements allowing the evaluation of received power level without the use of extra hardware.

As depicted in Figure 15, all the equipment is connected to the Antcom's G5 antenna (installed on the train roof) through the splitter. One output of the splitter has been directly connected to the Septentrio AsteRx4 receiver and another one has been connected through the DC Block to the Javad receiver. The laptops, connected to the GNSS receivers, were in charge of launching the configuration/software tools and to store the data coming from the two receivers. Figure 16 depicts the antenna installation on the train roof and the on-board equipment installation.

Two GNSS receivers have been used during the measurement campaign in Sardinia in order to allow a comparative analysis of the classification Toolset results; this comparative analysis has been done for the verification of the classification process. One receiver only is required for the application of the classification process. Both receivers have been configured to record the following data in the proprietary format, for multiple constellations and multiple frequencies:

- 1. Time tag in TOW (time of week expressed in ms) and WNc (week number counter)
- 2. Code phase measurements or pseudoranges
- 3. Carrier phase measurements
- 4. Doppler frequency in Hz
- 5. GPS/ Galileo Navigation message or ephemeris data
- 6. Position and velocity in 3D Cartesian coordinate system
- 7. Position and velocity in geodetic coordinates with WGS84 datum
- 8. SBAS decoded data
- 9. Carrier to noise ratio in dB-Hz
- 10. I and Q sample or spectrum data
- 11. AGC data.







4.2 MEASUREMENT CAMPAIGN IN SPANISH LINE

The present section collects the information of the classification process preparation (installation and runs organization) and the static and dynamic collection of data performed in Spain in the frame of WP4 of ERSAT-GGC project, whose objective was the verification of the classification process in some Spanish Lines.

The classification process was executed along a Spanish line according to the process and Toolset defined in ERSAT-GGC project (see references [1], [2] and [3]). The first part of the process consisted on the preparation and execution of the measurement campaign, and the second part was the analysis of the collected data with the Toolset developed within the project. In particular, the following activities were performed:

Selection of reference site: ADIF selected the line nº528 Almorchón (Badajoz) -Mirabueno (Córdoba) which is of type E, with a total length of 130.1Km and not electrified. The measurement test campaign was limited to the section up to Almorchón (Station 37400 PK 130.1) - Alhondiguilla Villaviciosa (Station 00010 PK.40.8) that has a length of 89.3 km and a speed maximum of 60 km / h. It is a low traffic regional line, and the target reference site for the performance of the tests was selected with the aim of evaluating GNSS technology starting from low-traffic regional lines. This line section was dedicated to the survey execution during all the measurement campaign, so there was no impact on commercial trains.

- **Selection of the rolling stock**: a laboratory train from ADIF (named BT-02) was selected, and it was dedicated to ERSAT-GGC trial on site during all the survey.
- Selection of the measurement equipment: The specific GNSS measurement equipment to be provided by ADIF has been selected to be according to the technical





specifications for the survey process and Toolset recommended in the references [1] and [2].

- **Planning and preparation of the test campaign:** The integration and installation of the equipment was performed according to the equipment provider specifications. The Test campaign runs were organized to cover different times in 24h and 2 weeks to run under different epoch conditions. Tests were planned in order to have samples spaced 24h (repeatability of GPS constellation) and samples spaced 10 days (repeatability of Galileo constellation).
- Execution of the test campaign: The test campaign was executed during ten days (20th to 24th and 27th to 31st of May 2019). The line and the rolling stock were dedicated to this activity during all this period. Twenty runs were performed, and the train runs have been scheduled in different time of the day (morning, afternoon, night) to cover the reception of signals from various elevation angles.
- **Analysis of the test campaign results:** The raw data acquired were transferred to CEDEX lab for analysis with the Toolset to finally obtain the classification of this line.

The data collected during the measurement campaign located in the track section Almorchón – Alhondiguilla includes information to evaluate areas in the line in terms of multipath, satellite visibility and interferences, with the aim of classifying them as Green, Red or Yellow areas.

The **rolling stock** selected by ADIF for the measurement campaign was the unit BT-02, which is a laboratory train generally used for track and catenary auscultation tests. The unit is formed by a four-composition car with a diesel powered car, two intermediate cars and one end car with a driving cab, and has enough room inside to install al the measurement equipment.

The train was equipped with the following **measurement equipment** for the campaign execution to register the required data that will be analysed later with the Toolset developed within the project:

- GNSS measurement system comprised of GNSS antenna, GNSS splitter, GNSS receiver (Javad Delta3) and wiring provided by ADIF:
 - GNSS antenna
 - AntCom G8- PN: Ant743_A4T1-A2
 - GNSS receiver





- Javad Delta3
- GNSS splitter
 - GPS Networking LDCBS1X4-N
- Optional measurement equipment for NLOS analysis with a Fish-eye camera, provided by IFSTTAR was installed for 5 days.

There was also available additional and auxiliary equipment:

- A second GNSS receiver was used (Septentrio AsteRx2eL) during the whole campaign for auxiliary purposes
- Laptop with external hard disks
- UPS: Salicru SPS 1000 SOHO (2 units)
- Coaxial cables RG-58 WITH BNC, TNC and Type N connectors and suitable adapters
- Cabin camera (GoPro Hero7), with GNSS data recorder provided by ADIF, used to identify locations.

Additionally the on-board odometry measurement system was powered on to be collecting and registering the train speed along each run, although it was no need to use these data for the posterior analysis.



The general scheme of the devices installation is shown in next scheme:

The equipment integration, installation and preliminary tests in the train has been performed for the devices defined above with the consensus of rolling stock specialist, equipment provider and devices installation requirements. The installation, configuration and adjustment of ERSAT-GGC devices for the test execution with the BT laboratory train has been carried out in Talgo facilities







located in Las Matas and fulfilling all the procedures regarding occupational risks and industrial safety by qualified personnel.

4.2.1 GNSS MEASUREMENT SYSTEM

The GNSS measurement system comprises the antenna and receiver. The next figure shows the GNSS antenna and JAVAD receiver installed in the BT laboratory test for the test campaign:

The GNSS antenna (ANTCOM model G8Ant-743A4T1-A2) installed on the train roof fulfils the requirements defined by the supplier. There was an obstacle-free area around the antenna.

Once the GNSS antenna was installed on the roof of the train, a coaxial cable connected the antenna to the GNSS splitter (GPS Networking model LDCBS1X4-N) placed inside lab-3 car.

The GNSS (JAVAD Delta-3) receiver is connected to the GNSS Splitter via a dedicated cable to receive and process the GNSS signals.







The laptop, connected to GNSS receiver through Ethernet, was in charge to launch the configuration / measurement / recording software tools, specifically designed for ERSAT GGC project, which are required for the GNSS receiver JAVAD.

Special options for the Javad configuration are required for this project as "Galileo", "Spectrum Data Output", "Ethernet" and "Update Data Rate 10Hz" and these options are described in classification process specification

4.2.2 IFSTTAR CAMERA SYSTEM

IFSTTAR supplied a camera-based system to survey satellite constellation visibility. This measurement system had a fish-eye camera that was installed on the train roof while equipment for processing and recording data was located in Lab-3 car.

The installation requirements for the fish-eye camera system are summarized in the following points:

- The camera has to be fixed on the train roof following the adaptation indications defined by IFSTTAR to adapt the camera to the train roof to guarantee a correct installation.
- IFSTTAR equipment was connected to the GNSS splitter to receive the signal from the GNSS measurement antenna.
- Cables were fixed in the train roof from the camera to inside the train through the proper cable guiding available at the train. The wiring could be done through the gap between the two cars.

The following pictures show the final installation of IFSTTAR camera in Talgo premises located in Las Matas following Prevention of Occupational Risks and Safety procedures. Additional equipment for processing and recording satellite constellation visibility has been installed by IFSTTAR inside the laboratory train in coach Lab-3 as shown in the following pictures.

4.3 MEASUREMENT CAMPAIGN IN FRENCH LINE

SNCF (Experimental department and Innovation and research department) organized three measurement campaigns in the Paris region. SNCF chose this area, since SNCF considers important to address the main lines of France with innovation to foster the ERTMS deployment and respond to the increased mobility needs of the maximum of European citizen. Moreover, the urban and dense areas are challenging and instructive about the GNSS uses.

4.4 DESCRIPTION OF THE MEASUREMENT CAMPAIGNS

For the measurement campaign, SNCF planned round trip along three lines: The RER C is one of the five lines in the RER system serving Paris, France. It is operated by SNCF. The line runs from the north-western termini Pontoise (C1), Versailles-Château-Rive-Gauche (C5) and Saint-Quentin-en-Yvelines (C7) to the south-eastern termini Massy-Palaiseau (C2), Dourdan-la-Forêt (C4), Saint-Martin d'Étampes (C6) and Versailles – Chantiers (C8). **RER C** The RER C line is the second-longest in the network, with over 187 km (116 mi) of route. Each day, over 531 trains run on the RER C alone, and carries over 540,000 passengers daily. It is also the most popular RER line for tourists who represent 15% of its passengers, as the line serves many monuments and museums, including the Palace of Versailles. The RER D is one of five RER lines serving Paris, France. It connects Orry-la-Ville and Creil in the north to Melun, Corbeil-Essonnes and Malesherbes in the south, passing through the heart of Paris. Opened in stages from 1987 to 1996, it is the longest RER line by RER D distance, and the busiest SNCF line in France, carrying up to 615,000 passengers and operating 466 trains each working day. Almost all of

the line is located in the Île-de-France region, that is, within the
jurisdiction of the Île-de-France mobilités (STIF), but some of the
branch line ends at the north and south are outside this region.Paris Lyon MarseilleThe railway from Paris to Marseille is an 862-kilometre long railway line
that connects Paris to the southern port city of Marseille, France via
Dijon and Lyon. The railway line was opened in several stages
between 1847 and 1856, when the final section through Lyon was
opened The opening of the LGV Sud-Est high speed line from Paris to
Lyon in 1981, the LGV Rhône-Alpes in 1992 and the LGV Méditerranée
in 2001 has decreased its importance for passenger traffic.

For the measurement campaign, SNCF used a dedicated test train composed of:

- The SNCF class BB 60000 are a class of 4 axles heavy shunting and light freight diesel electric locomotives built at the Vossloh Espana works in Valencia. Since the class is primarily used as a freight locomotive the class is commonly referred to as SNCF BB460000;
- A former passenger refurbished in a laboratory platform for the SNCF ATO programs.

Nota Bene: this train is also used for SNCF internal activities like ATO program especially for obstacle detection and advanced telecommunication system.

5. PROCESS EXECUTION IN ITALIAN LINE

We provide in the following the details of the execution of the classification process based on the measurement campaign carried out in the Italian line and described in Section 4.1.

5.1 CALIBRATION MEASUREMENT AND PROCESS

The calibration phase is required for setting up the decision threshold considering that each measurement equipment installation on the train has its own properties in terms of RFI and multipath with respect to the reception of the GNSS signals. Therefore, the detection sensitivity of the detection techniques implemented in the toolset has to be calibrated for every measurement setup. This calibration must be done after the first installation and the application of modifications to the installation.

In Sardinia, calibration measurements have been acquired with the train still in a location with nominal GNSS conditions, as depicted in Figure 29.

In the Italian measurement campaign, eight hours of calibration data acquisition have been carried out covering different elevations of the satellites.

Calibration measurements have been used in the classification Toolset to generate the calibration files. In particular, calibration files are necessary for the following detection tools:

- Interference (AGC, PSD)
- Multipath (CMCD, CN0)
- NLOS (residuals based)

For AGC and PSD the files associated with the static calibration period have been manually inserted in the corresponding calibration input directory as depicted in Figure 30.

For CMCD, CN0 and Residuals threat detection tools, the correct dates and times corresponding to the static measurement data have been set in their individual configuration files. Then the calibration phase has been started for each tool as depicted in Figure 33, Figure 34 and Figure 35. The necessary input files have been automatically retrieved in the GNSS input directory.

5.5 CLASSIFICATION PROCESS

Track area classification process has been performed on the Cagliari- San Gavino line using both Septentrio and Javad data acquired during the Italian measurement campaign. The entire processing chain (i.e. Pre-Processing, Calibration, Detection, Classification) has been executed and the final classification results have been computed.

Firstly, GNSS raw data collected with both Septentrio and Javad receivers have been used in the Pre-Processing phase and input files with a specified format have been generated. Secondly, calibration files have been produced for some of the threat detection tools using the static measurement data acquired in the Italian campaign. After Pre-Processing and Calibration process have been finished, Detection process has been performed and Intermediate results have been produced. Finally, classification process has been performed on the Cagliari-San Gavino line combining results of all the threat detection tools on several runs. In particular, single run and combination of multiple runs have been considered in the classification process and final track area classification results have been generated for the Cagliari-San Gavino line. Using the





Run Selection option available in the GUI, single run and combination of multiple run have been processed with the track area classification Toolset as depicted in Figure 47.

5.6 EVALUATION OF RESULTS

After all classification results have been computed, the evaluation process has been performed for both classification results obtained using Septentrio and Javad data for different combination of runs:

- Single runs on Northbound
- Groups of Northbound runs
- Combination of all the Northbound runs
- Single run on Southbound
- Groups of Southbound runs
- Combination of all the Southbound Runs

Northbound and southbound are related to two different tracks. In particular, Northbound refers to all the runs from Cagliari to San Gavino while Southbound to all the runs from San Gavino to Cagliari.

Figure 49 shows a comparison of results obtained processing only single runs with Septentrio data. In particular are depicted classification results for run 13 (on the left) and for run 14 (on the right).

As shown in Figure 49, evaluation on a single run shows that there is not enough information to classify the track areas and the results presents a high percentage of yellow areas.

Figure 50 shows a comparison of results obtained combining groups of Northbound and Southbound Runs.

Runs 10,12,14,16,20 merged - 10.8% % yellow area



Results obtained on both groups of Northbound and Southbound Runs presents a high percentage of green areas and only ~11% of the line remains not classified (yellow percentage). Therefore, the combination of multiples merged runs allows improving the significance of the results and strongly reducing the percentage of yellow areas.

Figure 51 shows a comparison of results obtained combining all the Northbound Runs and all the Southbound Runs.

As expected the percentage of classified areas (i.e. red plus green areas) is increased while yellow areas are strongly reduced compared to single runs. In addition, global classification on





northbound and southbound tracks seems consistent because identified obstacles (e.g. overpasses) are correctly classified as threats.

The same evaluation process performed on Septentrio data has been done also on Javad data. As shown in Figure 52, as previously, analysis of single runs does not provide enough information to perform a complete classification on the line.





Figure 53 shows a comparison of results obtained combining groups of Northbound and Southbound Runs.

Also for Javad data, the combination of multiples merged runs allows to improve the significance of the results strongly reducing the percentage of yellow areas and increasing the percentage of classified areas (i.e. red plus green areas).

Finally, a comparative analysis among classification results obtained with the two receivers has been done for different detected threats. In particular, Figure 54 and Figure 55 show how the same EMI and Multipath occurrences have been detected on the line using both datasets acquired with Septentrio and Javad.

Let us clarify that only one receiver is necessary to carry out the classification process. The comparative analysis between receivers is here presented as verification evidence that the process produces similar results when using different receivers (i.e., classification results are receiver independent).

In order to provide smooth classification results and to take into consideration the time a receiver may need to track properly the satellite signals after being under the influence of some hazard cause, we apply a protection distance smoothing to the classification results. An example of the effect of the application of this smoothing is provided in Figure 56 along the track areas, where we can see the overall results after the combination of the different hazard causes results without the application of the smoothing on the left side of the figure. Please note the intermittent presence of red results nearby the station and bridge area. On the same Figure 56 on the right, we can see the output with a 20m distance smoothing. The red and yellow areas are in this case easier identifiable and the green areas ensure the mentioned protection.

Adding the smoothing with this protection distance gives us a more realistic insight about the percentage of green areas where VBs could be safely placed. In Table 1 we can see the overall results after the combination of the different hazard causes classification results. In Table 2, we can see the final results after the application of 20 m protection distance smoothing.

6. PROCESS EXECUTION IN SPANISH LINE

We provide in the following, the details of the execution of the classification process based on the measurement campaign carried out in the Spanish line and described in Section 4.2.

6.1 CALIBRATION MEASUREMENT AND PROCESS

The Spanish Test Campaign was executed from 20th to 31st of May 2019 with the aim of collecting GNSS data and information of the real environment in the frame of WP4 of the project.

The duration of 10 days was based on covering different locations of the satellites in the orbits and running under different epoch conditions.

The campaign consisted of the execution of dynamic round runs between Almorchón and Alhondiguilla stations (94Km), at a maximum speed of 40Km/h.

On May 21st, a collection of static test measurements **for the calibration of the GNSS devices** were performed with the train located in an open sky location, with the train in standstill condition. These calibration measurements are necessary to characterize properly the permanent effect of the specific installation of antenna and measurement system within the train.

The **calibration of the camera**-based system is performed off-line in laboratory before installation.

The measurement campaign was executed during 10 days, with the participation of ADIF, CEDEX, INECO, DLR and IFSTTAR.

The raw data registers of different equipment were uploaded to ERSAT-GGC repository and transferred to the lab for analysis.

Images with the rooftop fish-eye camera have been between the 20/05 and the 24/05.

6.2 CONFIGURATION OF THE TOOLSET

For each test campaign analysis in the laboratories, a New Campaign has to be created, together with the suitable folder structure and data.

In particular, for the analysis of the Spanish measurement campaign, the results were stored following the agreed structure and the following folders were created during the Toolset analysis:

- 0_Raw_Measurements:
 - Raw data coming from the Javad receiver and optional NLOS Visual data.
- 1_Input_Data:
 - Results after executing the Pre-processing data from raw measurements of the Toolset
 - Track maps and 3D models.
- 2_Intermediate_Results
 - Results after executing the Detection phase of the Toolset
 - Degraded Performance Tool output
 - Results of LOS detection based on images, when available, as optional data.
- 3_Classification_Results
 - Results after executing the Classification phase of the Toolset
- 7_Run_Tables:
 - Definition of date, starting and end time of the run
- 8_Calibration:
 - Results after executing the Calibration phase of the Toolset

According to the structure explained above and the objective of also evaluating the degraded GNSS performance by using the simulator tool, the following **data** have to be **available before starting the Toolset classification process**:

- **Raw data from calibration and dynamic runs**: data collected by the GNSS receivers during the measurement campaign,
- **3D model** of the line to be used in the Degraded Performance tool.
- **Run tables**: files created for each run, contain the information of the starting and end time of the run, and the itinerary for the run (track list). There is one of these files for each run to be analysed.

- NLOS visual, if available

Images acquired with the fish-eye camera are processed separately. The different steps of the process are: image processing in order to classify regions between sky and non-sky areas; satellite positioning in the image for identification of the sky area class. The results file contains each satellite state of reception (LOS/NLOS) for each epoch.

- **Track maps**: set of files with the coordinates of the different sections of the track. To create the track maps, the track is divided in section and nodes, as shown in the diagram below:

The files created to provide the Track Maps are:

- o Node table: this is the list of nodes and track IDs that each one connects
- Track Table: it is the list of relevant Track IDs, with its connecting nodes
- Reference Position file for each Track Section: it contains the coordinates for each track ID

Once all the data necessary for the Toolset were stored and organized, the Toolset was run, in the following steps, to finally obtain the classification for the Spanish line.

6.3 PRE-PROCESSING

The data were processed in two sets:

 Calibration Phase: First, the Calibration Phase was performed: The static tests results from open-sky location were pre-processed and the calibration process was executed for each technique (Interference AGC, Interference PSD, Multipath CN0, Multipath CMCd and Multipath/NLOS Residuals) This calibration is performed once and stored for all the next analysis of the campaign.

- **Pre-Processing of run files phase**: In this step, the Pre-processing of the raw data obtained during the **dynamic tests** performed during all the campaign is performed. The Input_Data files are obtained, ready for performing the detection phase.

6.4 DETECTION & SIMULATIONS PROCESS

After the pre-processing, the **Detection process** is executed. This step analyses the dynamic runs and the calibration results to obtain the Intermediate Results, with are the input for the next classification step.

At this stage, the simulations with the Degraded Performance Tool can be started and simulations can be done to obtain the degraded performance files which are also an input for the classification.

Then, the generated is exported to almorchonFinalReport_c.csv to be used by the Toolset.





6.5 CLASSIFICATION PROCESS

Once all the data have been pre-processed, detection tool has been executed, and degraded performance file is available, the classification process can be accomplished.

In the Classification process, the user can choose the number of runs to be classified. Individual runs have been classified in first place, and grouped runs have been classified to obtain the final results for evaluation.



6.6 EVALUATION OF RESULTS

After the classification process, the data were ready for evaluation.

The **Evaluation Process** gives the results for the selected run or group of runs for all the applicable track maps and for all the techniques.

For the Spanish Campaign result analysis, the following strategy has been followed:

- 1- Analysis of individual runs has been done, to evaluate the quality of each run.
- 2- Analysis of **grouped runs** has been done, to evaluate the complete line. The runs were grouped in groups of five runs, and then, all the twenty runs were grouped together.

For the Spanish Test Campaign the grouped runs finally selected are Runs 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, 11, 12, 13, 14, 15, 16, 17, 18, 19 and 20.

For individual runs the results showed that there is not enough information to classify the track areas, and the results are mainly 'yellow' areas.

For grouped runs **1**, **2**, **3**, **4**, **5** as it can be observed in the following overall results, the results are mainly 'green' areas but 20% of the line is still not characterized (yellow).

As the line is mainly an open sky line, with barely few buildings along the line and no urban areas, it was expected that the track areas were classified mainly as 'Green', and that multipath could occur at few points of the line due to bridge structures, road overpasses, trenches and tree canopy. This was confirmed after applying the Toolset for the final evaluation. Some particular examples are shown below.




The area of the metallic bridge over Zújar River is classified as 'Red' area due to multipath, as expected:

Finally, as presented for the Italian line, an example of the effect of the application of the smoothing of the results along the track areas is provided in Figure 80, where we can see the overall results after the combination of the different hazard causes results without the application of the smoothing on the left side of the figure.

Please note the intermittent presence of red results. On the same Figure 80 on the right, we can see the output with a 20m distance smoothing.

Adding the smoothing with this protection distance gives us a more realistic insight about the percentage of green areas where VBs could be safely placed. In Table 4 we can see the overall results after the combination of the different hazard causes classification results. In Table 5, we can see the final results after the application of 20 m protection distance smoothing.

As conclusions for the Spanish Measurement Campaign, the process defined within the project has been followed, and the Toolset developed within the project has been used over different set of data from Spanish campaign. Processing both individual and multiple runs classifications allows further analysis and diagnosis of the data. It has been observed that the classification results improve as more runs are considered, so the classification was done with all the runs of the campaign, which recorded at different epochs.

It was observed that for the Spanish Test campaign, the final classification results were in general consistent with the characteristics of the surveyed line (large open sky areas).





7. SUMMARY OF PROCESS EXECUTION

The track area classification process is composed of two major steps: The activities related to the acquisition of measurement data and the processing of this data by a software toolset to obtain final classification results over a certain or multiple track lines.

With respect to the process related to the acquisition of the relevant data, the field measurement campaigns have been carried out in three countries and scenarios (i.e. Italy, Spain and France) with the necessary measurement equipment satisfying the main requirements. The main measurement equipment consisted in GNSS COTS receivers that were able to record GNSS raw data and RF signal information (AGC, PSD). The measurement campaigns were planned and carried out with enough temporal diversity to cover properly the GPS constellation revolution (24 hours as for the Italian campaign) or even the Galileo revolution (over 10 days in the Spanish campaign).

The recorded data in Italy and Spain were processed with the software Toolset developed during the project and described in Section 3. The execution of the data processing has been performed successfully by different partners of the consortium, not only the software developers but also the testing laboratories. This has confirmed the operability of the process by railway users. The results of the processing showed that the classification process and related Toolset is able to provide the required classification results satisfying the high level requirements.

The execution of the process showed how the results obtained with only one single set of data (i.e., run) is providing a high number of yellow areas. That is, there is not enough information to determine if some areas must be classified as red or green but the yellow provides a result that protects against the lack of statistical data. As more data from different runs are combined, the results converge to a classification of the considered lines improving the availability (i.e., less yellow areas) of the results.

As a qualitative validation of the process results, the Toolset successfully provided a classification of red over areas where it is expected the presence of some type of hazard causes (e.g. due to tunnels, near high buildings, partially covered stations, etc.).







8. CONCLUSIONS

In the last ten years, many R&D projects have investigated the use of the GNSS Positioning technology in safety of life applications. In particular, the GNSS Positioning has also been recognized as a key enabler technology for introducing the concept of virtual balise into the Control-Command and Signalling Class A ERTMS system. Many projects have been sponsored by GSA, ESA, and Member State R&D organizations to qualitatively and quantitatively identify the best architectures¹ and designs to enable the introduction of this technology and the virtual balise concept limiting the impact on the existing ERTMS Standard.

The ambitions of the recent initiatives such as the S2R TD2.4 Fail-Safe Train Positioning project (started with the S2R X2R2 project), the GSA ERSAT-GGC project, the ESA SBS RailS Phase 2.1 project, and the Rete Ferroviaria Italiana ERSAT program are to investigate possible proposals for new ERTMS specifications that (a) also foresee the use of the GNSS based Virtual Balises, (b) still provide the SIL 4 Train position function, and (c) guarantee the ERTMS backward compatibility and interoperability requirements.

Any ERTMS On-board Unit compliant with this new ERTMS specifications can safely run on an ERTMS trackside compliant with this new ERTMS specifications, with the minimum **performance** required for the interoperability, provided that the ERTMS trackside has been designed and developed to enable any "compliant" ERTMS On-board Unit to provide the protections against GNSS system and local hazard causes, i.e. events whose occurrences can lead to **hazardous consequences**. These protections work safely and properly only if the Virtual Balise Reader (VBR) error models and the GNSS monitoring techniques, implemented in the VBR to bound the virtual balise location determination errors, are valid along all the track areas where the train can run.

ERSAT-GGC is <u>the first project</u> that addresses the aspects of the classification of the track areas, where virtual balises can be (logically) placed, to a priori prevent the risk that area environmental permanent properties with respect to sky visibility, multipath, NLOS, and inband and near out-of-band interference lead to unbounded virtual balise location determination errors.

To guarantee the classification of track area as suitable or not suitable for the placement of virtual balises, this classification must be done by using a **standard track area classification process**, where standard means that a trackside subsystem, designed with virtual balises located in track areas classified as suitable by the application of this process, guarantees a safe and dependable run, with the minimum **performance** required for the interoperability, of any ERTMS On-board Unit compliant with the new ERTMS specifications. In other words, the application of this standard process for classifying the track areas as suitable or not suitable for locating the virtual balises must not introduce technical barriers to access the railway infrastructure and, thus, to reach an interoperable solution. For example, track areas within tunnels or deep canyons (e.g. where the on-board GNSS antennas are located below the level of the side surface of canyons), with sources of radio frequency interferences higher than the allowed masks, with high buildings close to track rails must be **excluded a priori** for locating virtual balises.

However, the complexity around the definition and the validation of this standard process is exacerbated by **the lack** of **the Railway Minimum Operational Performance Standards** (Railway MOPS) that will describe both (a) the models of estimating pseudorange and position

domain position errors and (b) the methods of calculating the railway protection level, based on pseudo range data, augmentation data, autonomous fault detection capability, etc. to bound local and system hazard causes as well as their residual errors.

The work of WP4 in ERSAT GGC has positively addressed the complex environment related to the standard classification process by providing:

- The high level requirements of the classification process;
- A description of the suitable approaches to assess the GNSS SIS along a railway track with respect to the local hazard causes;
- A complete methodology to classify the track areas according to the presence of individual local hazard causes.
