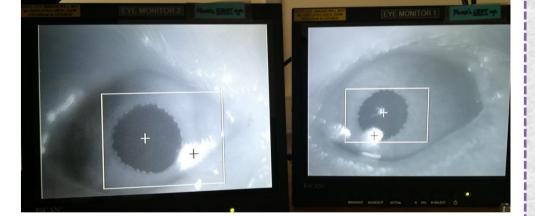


Conclusion

.Neuronal substrates of the efferent copy: direct neurona projections from the cervical the to to the abducens or accessory abducens



2. Due to the absence of vestibular and visual during this inputs experiment, the recorded horizontal eye movements are with the coherent behavioural output of an efferent copy



Our results are the first evidence that spinal-CPG can contribute to gaze stabilization mammals independently of visual and vestibular sensory inputs.
