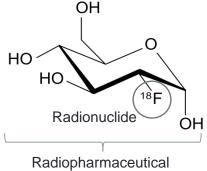

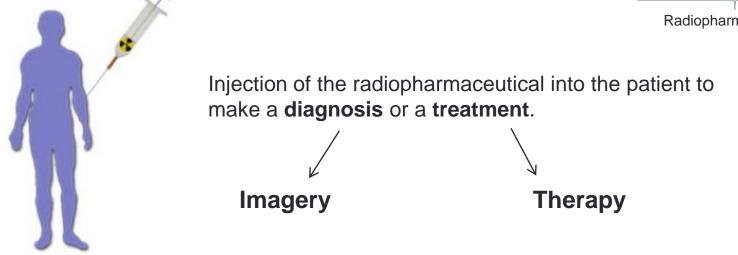

• How radionuclides can be useful for medicine ?

- Physics properties :
 - > Particle or radiation emitted by decay of the radionuclide ($\alpha,\beta,\gamma,e_{Auger}$)
 - Energy
 - Half life of the radionuclide
- Chemical properties :
 - Extraction of the radionuclide from the target
 - Radionuclide labelling …

The radionuclides are coupled with a vector to do **imagery** or **therapy**. Indeed, the tracers have an affinity with the interest area which allows to bring them to the cancer cells.





• How radionuclides can be useful for medicine ?

Imagery Low energy gamma emissions (~100 keV)

• SPECT (Single photon emission computed tomography)

Radionuclide decay by emitting a photon.

Detectors with collimators allow to deduce the emission source

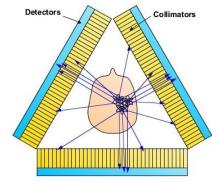
• PET (Positron emission tomography)

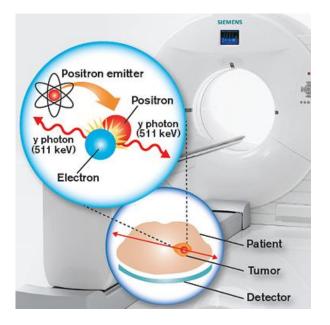
Radionuclide decay by emitting a positron.

Annihilation with an electron near the tumour.

Two 511keV photons are created and emitted in opposite direction.

Detectors allow to deduce the emission source





• How radionuclides can be useful for medicine ?

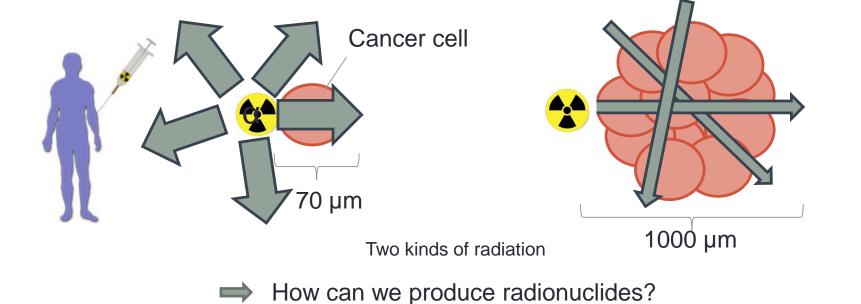
Nuclear Medicine \Rightarrow Linear energy transfer

• Brachytherapy

When it is possible, a sealed source can be placed near to the tumour for treat it.

• Vectorised internal radiotherapy





- Production of radionuclides
- Nuclear reaction between a projectile and a nucleus

Beam of particles

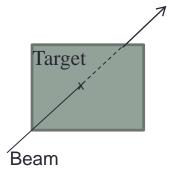
Target

Different nuclear reactions possible.

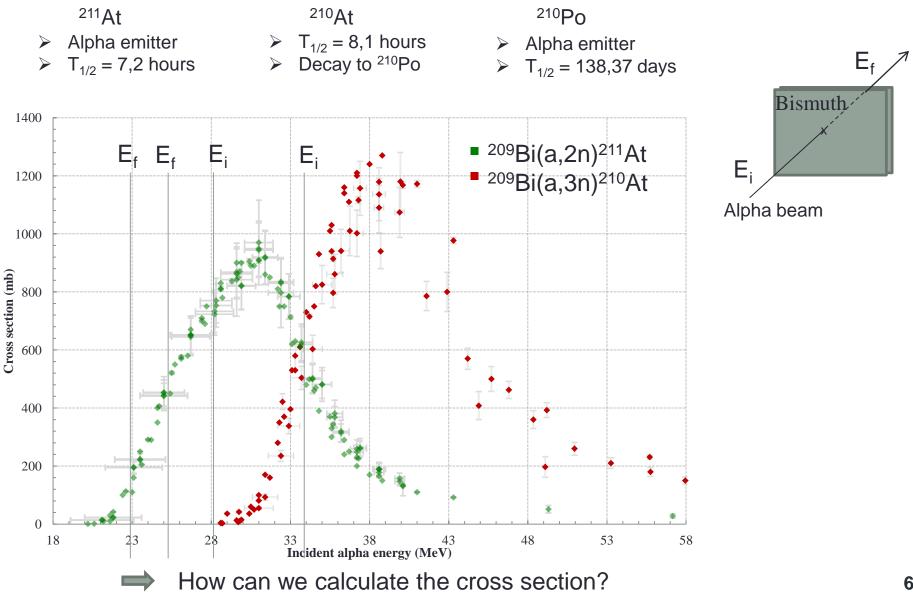


Physic value: the **production cross section** σ (cm²) Dependence with the incident particle energy.

- Accurate knowledge of the cross section allows :
 - Optimize the radionuclide production.
 - Lower the contaminants production.



Production of radionuclides



Activation formula

Act =
$$\varphi \chi \frac{N_a \rho}{A} (1 - e^{-\lambda t_{irr}}) \int_{E_f}^{E_i} \frac{\sigma(E)}{\frac{dE}{dx}} dE$$

- Parameters of the target :
 - ➤ A : atomic mass (g.mol⁻¹)
 - ightarrow
 ho : density (g.cm⁻³)
 - $\geq \frac{dE}{dx}$: linear energy transfer of the incident particle in the target (MeV.cm⁻¹)
 - $\succ \chi$: chemical and isotopic purity (only chemical in the case of natural target)
- Parameters of the beam :
 - $ightarrow \phi$: incident particles flux (particles.s⁻¹)
 - > t_{irr} : irradiation time (s)
 - E_i et E_f, Incident energy of the particle and the final energy (MeV)
- Parameters of the radionuclide produced :
 - $> \lambda$: decay constant (s⁻¹)
 - > Act : Activity of the radionuclide produced (Bq)
 - $\succ \sigma(E)$: production cross section at the energy E varying between E_i and E_f (cm²)
 - N_a : Avogadro constant (mol⁻¹)

• Activation formula with thin target (~10 µm)

➡ Energy loss of the incident particle is negligible

Act =
$$\varphi \chi \sigma(E) \frac{N_a \rho e}{A} (1 - e^{-\lambda t_{irr}})$$

e : target thickness (cm)

 $\succ \sigma$: production cross section for the energy particle in the middle of the target (cm²)

$$\sigma(E) = \frac{A Act}{N_a \rho e \phi \chi (1 - e^{-\lambda t_{irr}})}$$

To measure cross section

Act : activity (Bq)

 $\triangleright \phi$: the number of projectiles/s (proj.s⁻¹)

Parameters measured during the experiments

Stacked foils technique

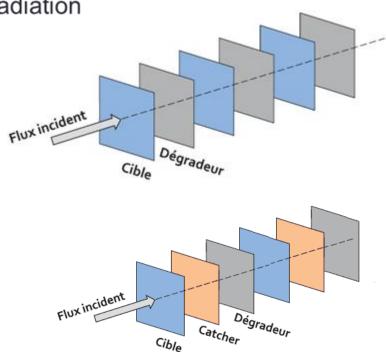
Several measurements for one irradiation

Pattern

Target : produce the interest radionuclide Degrader : adapt the beam energy

Possibility of nucleus being ejected

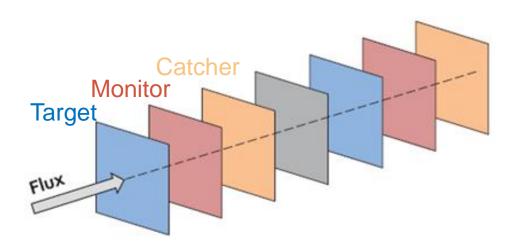
Catcher : catch the recoil nuclei



Two methods of **incident flux** φ measurement

- > Relative : using monitor foil
- > Absolute : measure the number of charges crossing the stack

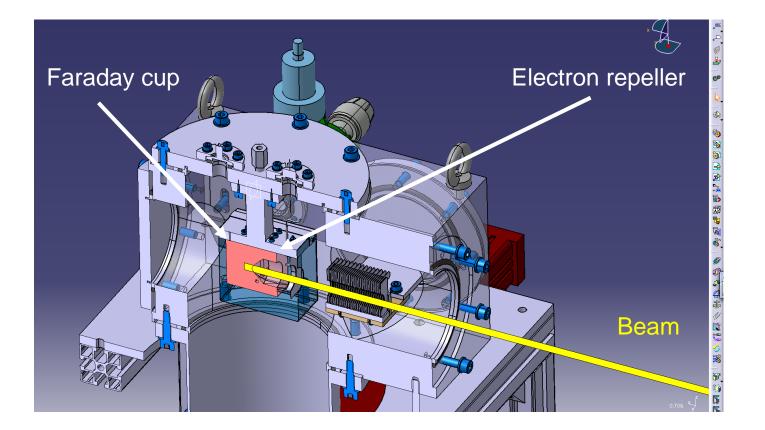
- Two methods of incident flux ϕ measurement



➡ Values recommended by IAEA^[1]

Hypothesis: $\varphi_{target} = \varphi_{monitor}$

- Two methods of incident flux ϕ measurement
- Absolute : direct measurement of the number of charges crossing the stack using a Faraday cup: error estimate less than 3%



• The measure of the **activity** : gamma spectrometry

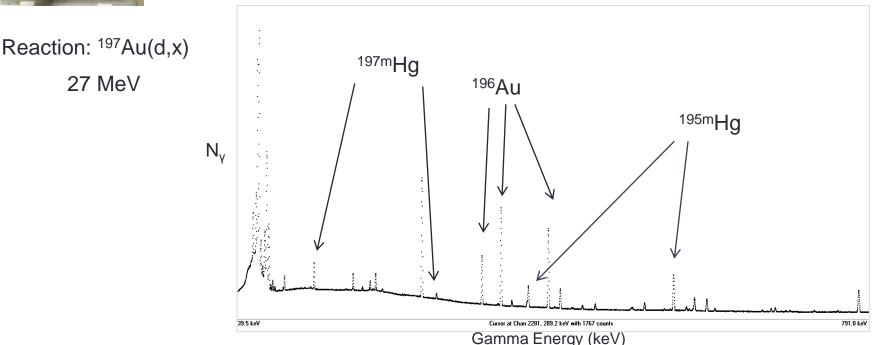
Spectrum : number of gamma photons according to their energy



After Irradiation : activity measure of all radionuclides present in the foils

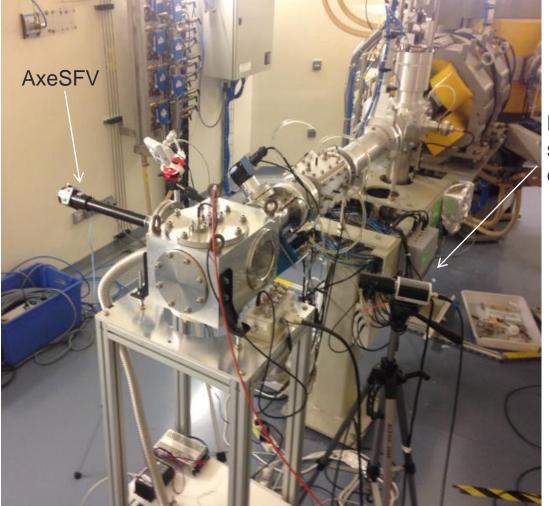
- Short counting to sort short lived radionuclides (<10h)</p>
- Long counting to sort long lived radionuclides (>10h)

Radionuclides identification by the energy of gamma photon emissions



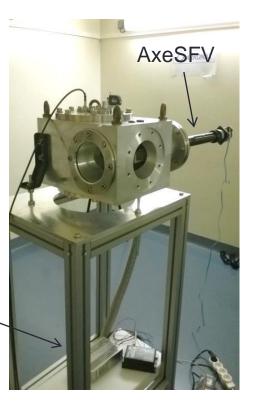

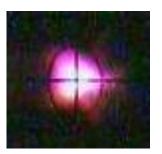

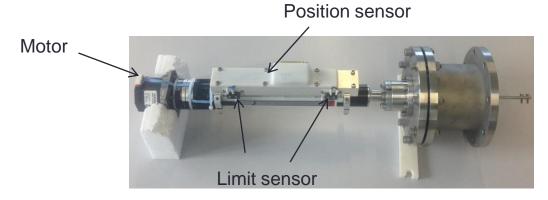
AxeSFV : a motorized axis

Automate the movement of the axis

- Exposing the alumina then the stack to the beam
- Saving time and upholding the vacuum
- Reduction of radiation exposure

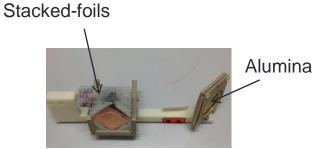


Alumina under beam





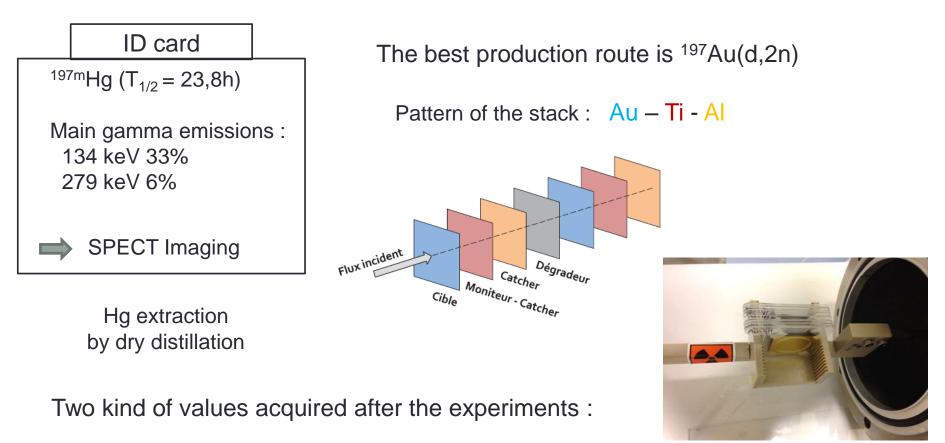

Stacked foils support

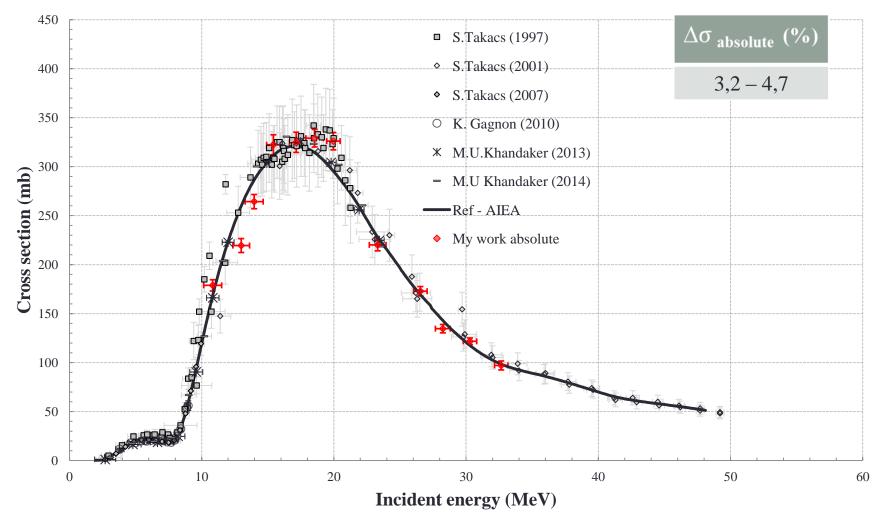
The device has made in collaboration with the mechanical department of SUBATECH laboratory.

• Results on the production of the ^{197m}Hg

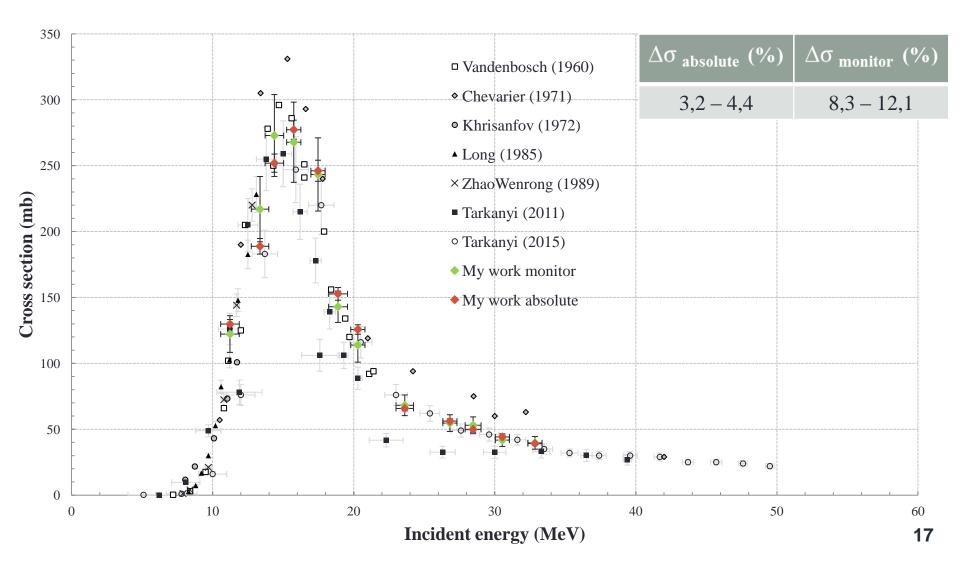


- \succ σ_{charge} (mb) : measure the number of charges crossing the stack with the Faraday cup
- \succ σ_{monitor} (mb) : using Titanium monitor foil

• Monitor reaction : ^{nat}Ti(d,x)⁴⁸V



Reaction of interest : ¹⁹⁷Au(d,2n)^{197m}Hg



Conclusions

- ^{197m}Hg is a good candidate to be use for **SPECT imaging**
- The results obtained for the monitor reactions show that the new **experimental set-up works well**.
- Our results are in **good agreement** with the IAEA recommended cross section values and other available data in the literature

Perspectives

- Our new set of data will also help extending the accuracy of databases and can be used to **constrain theoretical calculations**
- Study a new radionuclide of interest for medicine and its ways to produce it
- Study of alternative ways of production Cu67 & project with Orano.
